I no sooner finish writing the last column, than it's time to start writing the new one. Well, time flies when you're not paying attention.

Lots of things to discuss this issue, most of it of major importance, so please stay with me to the end on this.

First, I hope that you like the new look for the *Communiqué*. The new format gives us more space and allows us a good bit more leeway in the use of photos and artwork. **Press Corps** - We have about twenty-two people in the *Starfleet Press Corps*. For those of you new to *Starfleet*, the SPC is the official fleet "wire service". They collect stories about local chapter events and pass them on to the *Communique* for publication. We are interested in getting more correspondents out in the field, so those of you who would like to try your hand at journalism are invited to join. The cost is \$2.00 (which covers your membership card and postage), and should be sent to me at my P.O. Box. For the membership at large, I would like to invite you to send in your birth, wedding or graduation announcements so that we can share the happy times in your life with the fleet. Again, just send them to my attention at the P.O. Box address listed in the front.

While on the subject of the good ol' U.S.P.O., a kindly tip from my local Postmaster. When writing to various people in Starfleet, always include the addressee's name on the envelope. While my postman knows that anything "spacey" goes to my address, his substitute tends to miss those things. This is especially true if the person has a post office box, since it is likely that different people will work the boxes in a given week including temps and subs. Technically, the U.S.P.O. is supposed to deliver mail only to the name listed on the card filed when the box was opened, thus in my case, "David Allen" and "Starfleet". The key word is of course "Starfleet" that permits mail with "Archives", "Cornrnunique" and "Press Corps" to be delivered. While this is fine for me (I've got my bases covered), how many ship captains, RCs or academy schools have bothered to make that distinction with their mailman or post office? So to avoid problems, always include the name of the person to whom you are writing.

Ship Reports - Since my move in June, I have taken the opportunity to further upgrade my computer system. The most interesting addition is a FAX board that will permit my system to send and receive a FAX, 24 hours a day. The FAX board will share the same phone line as my BBS and will be available to any ship that would like to send me their reports for the Communique. The BBS also will be available, but you must first write me for a password. The board is not available to the general public and you will not be able to log on without a password. The phone number is 919-230-1405 and will be available after August 15th. Modem settings are 9600/2400/1200/300 N,8,1. Modems must support the V.32 protocol to log in at 9600 baud. FAX machines are more ubiquitous than computers, and are even available at the post office in some cities. If you must use a public FAX, it will cost you about a one to two dollars a page, so shop

around. If you have an Office Depot store in your town, they generally have the best price.

The latest interesting changes in the computer scene involves the joint Sears/IBM venture called Prodigy. This is an on-line service similar to Compuserve, but with lots of commercials. While Prodigy itself is of moderate interest, its E-Mail facilities are what make it truly useful to Starfleet members. Ten bucks a month buys you unlimited access (18 hours a day) to the service and since it is now available in over 100 cities nationwide, that means logging in is a local call, thus sending mail anywhere in the country to another subscriber is very cheap, (Think of it as unlimited "next hour" delivery for \$10.95 a month.) Another important point in its favor is that it is much more secure than conventional echo mail, since only the recipient will read your message. Private messages are truly private, not subject to accidental or intentional intrusion. You can pick up a kit at your local Sears store or Business Center or you can call 800 759-8000. The kits are \$49.95, but have been sold as low as \$29.95 (Some test markets have offered them free for 3 months!. For those of you without moderns, Sears is selling the kit bundled with a 2400 baud modem for around \$175.00. This fall also will see the introduction of the IBM PS/1 and while a lot can be said for and against the system, it will come bundled with Microsoft Works, Prodigy, and a modem. The low end system starts at \$999.00, with the hard disk based color version going for \$1999.90. This is too high for some folks and reasonable for others, I mention it simply as a service to the folks out there thinking of adding a computer to their consumer goods collection.

As I mentioned last issue, I will be riding in a 90 mile bike tour for Multiple Sclerosis. I have asked for the Fleet to support this endeavor by sending in pledges to sponsor my entry. Any amount is welcome and every dollar helps. I have offered my vintage Phaser II as a prize to the individual or group that donates the most. So far the top donation is \$35.00. Someone is getting an awfully cheap Phaser. If you wish to contribute, send a check to me (made out to the MS Society) by August 20th.

One of the other toys I picked up during the computer upgrade, was access to a scanner. As such, I am building a library of ship, region, and division logos for use in the *Communique*. While I have nice copies of some of these logos, I am still missing quite a few. I would like to ask those of you with logos to send me clean, camera-ready copies no larger than $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ for our use in the newsletter.

I wish to thank Capt. Mark Haynes of the Odin,

for the wonderful time I had at Shore Leave. He did a super job of setting things up for the Fleet Conference (Hey Mark, can we have a meeting at like two in the afternoon instead of the ungodly hour of NINE AM?) Thanks also to the Captain and crew of the Sovereign for going out of their way to make me feel welcome during and after the con. Shore Leave is also the source of this issue's cover, drawn by Sharon Young who graciously allowed us to use it. For those of you who would like to get a print of her work, there is an ad for her catalog.

Ratification Vote - As Jeannette said, there was a screw-up in the printing of the constitution. The voting deadline will not permit us to print the results in this issue. The results will be announced first in the *Fleet Status Update*, then in the next *Communique*.

Election Guidelines & Deadlines - Candidates for the 1990 election for Commander, Starfleet must obtain nominations from five (5) chapter chairpersons or Regional Coordinators. Persons submitting nominations must do so in writing between August 1st and September 1st 1990. This means that your letter must be in my mailbox ON or BEFORE the deadline. I will call the candidate(s) September 2nd and inform them of their nomination. At that time they must inform me of their choice of running mate. Candidates wishing to campaign in the Communique must have their campaign letter in my hands ON or BEFORE September 15th. Ballots will be included in the October/November Communique and must be postmarked NO LATER than November 15, 1990 and received no later than November 30th. The cards will be mailed to and counted by a certified public accountant who will certify the results. Candidates will be notified of the results by phone on December 1st. A copy of the CPA's letter will be printed in the December/January Communique.

Enough said!

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

HELP WANTED!

Chapter of the Year Coordinator

Starfleet needs someone to coordinate the 1990 Chapter of the Year Contest and subsequent contests. This person would organize the contest, send out information, collect the entries, have the entries judged, get the awards mailed to the winners, and do write-ups for the Communique. These duties will run approximately eight months out of each vear.

There is no minimum rank or service time required for this position. There will be no rank promotion attached to this position. Applicants for the Coordinator's job will send the following information and materials to Admiral Sue Hampton, 3401 Argyle Lane, Greensboro, NC 27406 by October 1, 1990.

1) Applicant information including full name, SCC number, address, phone number, and qualitications for this position

2) Outline of plans to publicize and organize the contests and schedule of deadlines.

3) Sample flyer/letter that would be sent to ship captains explaining the contest rules.

4) Sample article for the Communique outlining contests and deadlines.

ideas that will be very useful to you in setting up your group.

There are a few points in the handbook for OCC that need to be clarified a bit. On page 5, question number 9, it says that a shutttle's monthly progress is not included in ship reports. In actuality, a mothership should indeed report on the status and progress of their REGULATION shuttles. "Inter -nal" shuttles have no official status in Starfleet and should not be treated as separate groups. (Any internal group wanting to change their status to regulation can contact SHoC for the forms needed). This report should not be a copy of the shuttle's monthly report, but rather the captain's appraisal of how the group is developing. These opinions will help the Regional Coordinator when it comes time to evaluate the shuttle for promotion to ship status. It doesn't need to be more than a couple of sentences long unless the situation warrants it, but it is a necessary part of your report.

In the highlighted box on page 9 the statement which begins "When ten or more members of Starfleet ... " needs to be clarified. This statement is referring to a starship chapter...shuttles still only require five paid Starfleet members in order to meet the membership requirements for launch.

The third item is found on page 10 under the heading "Promotions". It states that "A starship

6) List of anticipated costs including copying, postage, plaques, and shipping.

Starfleet Scholarship Coordinator

Starfleet will be accepting applications for the position of Coordinator for all of the Starfleet Scholarship programs. This person will be responsible for sending out information and applications as requested, writing update articles for each issue of the Communique as well as write-ups on all winners for the Aug/Sept (91) issue. 

Greeting from the USS Alioth (pronounced AY-lee-oth) of Provo, Utah; Runner-up Chapter of the Year 1989. We are very honored by this recognition and will try very hard to live up to it.

Our founder was Capt. Carollynn Montgomery. She recruited the first members through her display of Star Trek collectibles at a local mall. In October, 1986 we became the Shuttle Alioth off the USS Achernar, and Carollynn launched us full-tilt into the Starfleet mix of fun and public service. We were commissioned the USS Alioth in August, 1987. At that time we were the only Starfleet representation in Utah. The Alioth is an upgraded heavy cruiser; our missions are primarily exploratory.

Some positive press coverage brought more members, and we picked up momentum. In 1988 we were Runner-up Rookie Chapter of the Year. In May, 1989 Captain Montgomery retired as CO to accept the post of Director of SACOM. I, XO Lynnette Knox, became the *Alioth's* second CO. In November, 1989 our first shuttle became the *USS Dominion*, of Ogden, UT. Our second shuttle, in Salt Lake City, UT, will become a full chapter in August. Two new Utah shuttles are in the very early planning stages.

We contribute groceries to the local

food bank each month, and "adopt" a family every Christmas. We've answered phones for public TV, recycled aluminum, raised money for the Red Cross, sent books to a school in Ghana, and sold blood plasma to raise money for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Each April we handle registration and lunch for the Provo "WalkAmerica". In 1989 we were the Walk Chairman, organizing and running the whole thing. The 1988 Walk brought in \$20,000; the March of

The ship has planned carpools to the Salt Lake City *Creation Cons*, appeared in costume at the openings of *Star Trek* movies, and "dressed up" a dance club's *Star Trek* Night. We play *Star Trek* games, have Christmas panties, Halloween costume parties, and our annual family picnic*. (*"Bring your family, let them see *Trekkers* doing things just like regular people! Originally organized by Dan McGinnis, Ronda McGinnis, Chris Kronenberger, and Sandy Grant, the shuttle *Hexum's* story began on August 17, 1987 at a dining room table. These four friends decided it would be fun and exciting to start a new *Star Trek* club and bring to it a different purpose. The name Hexum was chosen in memory of the late actor Jon-Erik Hexum. The *Hexum* chose this individual to honor his contributions to many charities and the community.

After trying to launch as a shuttle from several ships in the region, Dan McGinnis called Admiral Chris Smith of the USS Lagrange in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio. Chris arranged for the shuttle to be launched from the Lagrange. On February 5th, 1988, the shuttle Hexum and its twenty-three members were officially launched as a Starfleet shuttlecraft.

During the nine months as a shuttlecraft the *Hexum* grew rapidly. They held a recruiting booth at Scott AFB Air Show and recruited 36 new members to *Starfleet*. This was the largest single recruiting activity the shuttle endeavored. From those members, we continued to grow.

As a shuttle, the *Hexum* participated in several fund-raisers for local charities. Contributions of time and money were made to the American Heart Association, Cerebral Palsy Foundation, Muscular Dystrophy Association and local food banks. In addition, the shuttle held many activities for the enjoyment of the crew. Events such as trips, BBQ's, parties and celebrations were very common.

The Hexum was commissioned by RAdm.

Eric Gay, then Regional Coordinator for Region 12, on November 5, 1988 as the largest shuttlecraft in the history of *Starfleet*. With its commissioning, the *Hexum's* one hundred and five members set out on an even more adventurous voyage.

The Hexum, along with our friends from the Discovery, hosted the Galactic TrekFest convention in St. Louis. This con also served as the Region 12 Conference, FAdm. Jeannette Maddox, Adm. Sue Hampton and VAdm. David Allen attended from HQ. During the conference, Hexum CO McGinnis was appointed Regional Coordinator. Galactic TrekFest raised over \$1,200.00 for children's hospital and pediatric AIDS research.

The USS Hexum has participated in regional conferences, both summit meetings, recruiting booths, charity work, community service projects, continuing education programs and much more. The Hexum makes an annual contribution to the Jon-Erik Hexum Memorial Scholarship for the Performing Arts. The crew is environmentally conscious and continues an extensive recycling campaign to support ship's programs.

Members of the crew are involved in Red Cross-related programs, community sponsored education programs and much more. The *Hexum* has always sponsored the *Starfleet* Scholarship Fund and continues to encourage support of this fine educational program.

The Hexum raises funds for its charities through bowl-a-thons, yard sales, pizza sales, candy sales, and events such as dances and parties. The *Hexum* meets on the fourth Saturday of each month at the New Baden


American Legion Hall. There are scheduled activities throughout the month, as well as countless unscheduled activities. The crew gathers to watch ST:TNG every Saturday evening and will use any reason as justification for getting together.

She is a relative newcomer to Starfleet but according to her Captain, a very active and helpful member. Ursula has been very active in helping to form a new shuttle in the Dayton, Ohio area. As reported by her CO, "Considering what little spare time Ursula must have (with several non-Trek activities), I feel it is heartening that she chooses *Starfleet* and *Star Trek* as two of her hobbies. In a country fast becoming materialistic and self-involved, it is a pleasure to know a young person with so much going for herself yet still embracing the ideals portrayed in Star Trek."

What are these non-Trek activities that keep Ursula occupied? It would probably take a larger newsletter to list everything. Being a teenager, most of her time has been spent with school and school projects. National Honor Society and Junior Council on World Affairs are two favorite groups as well as the Muse Machine, a cultural experience program that she has worked with for the past four years, Ursula plays the piano and like so many of us enjoys reading science fiction. Her plans to study Social Sciences and the Humanities at Duke University result from her own view towards the stars. "I am curious to discover what lies behind the bright facades of the stars...to do this I plan to enter a field of the humanities or social sciences, not the sciences, for true exploration of the stars is also an investigation of the soul and psyche of the human animal. Duke University will help me achieve this goal of exploring outer space by searching through inner space. And who better to aid me in my efforts than Starfleet -- an organization that at the same times supports space exploration and social altruism.'

The following is a one-act play that Ursula wrote as her submission for the *Starfleet* Scholar ship:

The Interrogation A One Act Play in Two Parts

The Characters

Ursula Szmulowicz — a sweet, innocent looking girl of eighteen.

The man - a fellow who in many ways resembles a gangster. He has a rough voice, but a gentle soul and firm handshake.

The lamp - a large, steel, light producing object.

The Setting

The action takes place in a small, dark room with two chairs, one, which Ursula sits on, in front of the lamp (see The Characters) and one, which the man uses, behind it.

Part I - The Beginning

(There is a click, followed by a hum of power, as a a very bright lamp is switched on, blinding Ursula. The man is hidden from her by the glare of the light. However, she can picture his rough, cruel face from the tone of his voice.)

Man: (In a rough voice) "0.K. kid, now tell me all you know."

Ursula: (In a trembling voice, although she does not belie her fear in any other way.) "According to Socrates, I know nothing."

Man: (Angrily) "Just give me the basics, you know, every significant event that has taken place in your life up to this moment, and any other piece of information you deem appropriate."

Ursula: (Resigned to her fate but frightened. Also surprised by the man's sudden eloquence.) "Fine, I give up. My name is Ursula Szmulowitz. At the moment, I am seventeen years old. I am the valedictorian of my high school class and am a National Merit Finalist. Also, I am one of 300 finalists in the Ohio University History Exam Competition - 17,000 students participated. On a Sunday morning in April I was..."

Man: (Testily) "Hold it. I know all this basic stuff. Tell me about something that has influenced your life. Somethin' like the first time you learned that Santa Claus isn't real."

Ursula: (Haltingly at first, but then more confidently) "Well, I suppose an event that truly influenced my life took place in the second grade."

Man (Very excited) "Good, this is exactly what I need to hear. Talk to me, kid."

Ursula: (Calmly now) "I am talking to you. As I was saying, in second grade a very influential event took place in my life. Occasionally, my English teacher, Mrs. Atkinson, held little reading contests in our class. To win, a person had to read and report on the greatest number of books. In one of these contests I won second place and a little clown doll. From the experience I learned to love books; since the second grade, I have been devouring every one in reach."

(A sniff is heard from the man, and then a flash of white is seen. From behind the lamp there is heard the honking of a nose.)

Part II - After Blow

Man: (In a somewhat nasal, but awed, tone) "That was beautiful. I feel so...inspired. Tell me - what do you read?"

(The man sniffs a few times and then stops.)

Ursula: (Gently) "I read everything. My reading interests are diverse and range from the comics to the classics. I can relax with an issue of *The Uncanny X-men, Solaris, The Story of English,* or mythology, comics, and mystery."

Man: (In a clearer voice) "Since you're a sci-fi fan, do ya like those science fiction TV shows?"

Ursula: (Excited) "Actually, yes. I am a fan of both *Star Trek* and *Doctor Who*. Recently, I joined Starward Bound, an organization of science fiction enthusiasts. Also, I hold the rank of petty officer on the *USS Polaris*, a *Starfleet* vessel. Unfortunately, I haven't been able to do much other than pass OTS with *Starfleet* and my ship since the meetings are far away and are on Monday - a day a lot of homework is assigned. Yet, with the formation of a shuttlecraft in the city in which I live I hope to become more active."

Man: "That's really great. Do ya belong to any other organizations?"

Ursula: (At ease) "Yes. I belong to various other groups both in and out of school. One of the out of school activities I take part in is Medical Explor-

ers. This group, a coeducational division of the Boy Scouts of America, is a two year program to explore the medical field by first hearing lectures on the divisions of the medical field and then by jobshadowing hospital employees."

Man: "Do ya want to be a doctor?"

Ursula: (Hesitant) "I'm not certain. I am, however, interested in medicine. Therefore, even if I do not enter the medical profession, this experience is exciting and useful.

"Also, for eleven years I have been playing piano. At the moment, I am performing S'Wonderful, Solace, and the Harmonious Blacksmith. In the past I have played many other classical and popular pieces."

Man: "What kinda music do ya like hearn'?"

Ursula: "The sort of music I listen to is usually dependent on my mood, but I always enjoy big band, jazz, and classical music.

"In addition to these out of ;school activities, I also take part in school organizations such as the National Honor Society and its sub-division, the social Service Committee. In the committee the members plan various service activities such as sewing at a soup kitchen, volunteering at a banquet for the needy, and listening to young children read. Another of my activities is the Junior Council of World Affairs (JCOWA), a foreign affairs group of which I am treasurer. Through JCOWA I participated in a model United Nations, in which I represented Spain and Poland, and in foreign bazaars, in which the group portrayed the costumes, entertainments, foods, and cultures of France, Saudi Arabia, and Thailand. The chess club is also one of the activities I take part in. Also, I belong to the Muse Machine, a group that attends many exciting cultural events in the Dayton area."

Man: (Quickly) "Which 'cultural events' have ya seen?"

Ursula: "Well, I've seen operas such as Aida, Madame Butterfly, and The Ballad of Baby Doe; operattas like The Pirates of Perzance; and musicals such as The Wiz, Guys and Dolls, and Can-Can. Also, I have attended the philharmonic, art exhibits such as the Son of Heaven, and plays such as The Brute and MacBeth.

Man: (Surprised) "ya saw all those shows in Dayton?"

Ursula: (In matter-of-fact tone) "All but the Son of Heaven, the Chinese national treasure exhibit, which was in Columbus,"

Man: "Do ya travel much?"

Ursula: "Not really. However, (excited) I did go to Europe - Austria, Hungary, Poland, and Czechoslovakia - for a month. While I was there I saw most beautiful art works and wonderful buildings and cathedrals. (Solemn) I also visited Auschwitz, the concentration camp in Poland. The very atmosphere of the death camp was filled with a sorrow that affected everyone there; the sadness crept into our throats and remained there in one big lump. It was hard to believe that so many deaths took place in Auschwitz - the day was the most beautiful of the summer, and the sun shed its brightest rays upon the mass graves of countless murdered people."

(A long silence. Ursula lowers her head.)

Man: (Abruptly) "So, what do ya want to do with yer life?"

Ursula: (startled. She looks up.) "I plan to go to undergraduate school and then graduate school where I will earn a master's and a Ph.D degree. Although I am undecided as to which major to choose, I hope it shall be in a field of international study such as international law, international business, or diplomacy. I also hope to find a career in this field."

Man: "Admirable. Ya have any hobbies"

Ursula: "Yes. As I stated earlier, I read. In addition, I collect comic books; the books I collect, however, are not the mindless 'kiddie' productions the public considers the norm of the ;comic book industry, but are instead the more mature, interesting productions that are thought-provoking, as well as amusing. Another hobby is watching movies; I enjoy viewing films not only because of the plots, but also because I enjoy examining their special effects and direction. Also, I have been reading mythologies of various cultures for some years and have enjoyed them all. My other interests include cricket, harpsichord and big band music, special effects, and japanese animation."

Man: :That's quite a list ya have there, kid. Do ya have nay time for a job?"

Ursula: (Confidently) "Oh yes, I am the copy editor of the English section of a Hungarian weekly newspaper - *Szabadsag*. Through the newspaper, I have a window on occurrences in Eastern Europe."

Man: "That's pretty interesting. I'd love ta talk ta ya more - you're a good kid - but I have another interrogation to give."

Ursula: (Sweetly) "That's fine, sir."

(The man stands up, emerging from the light. Ursula gets up. The man extends his hand, and they shake hands firmly.)


Man: "I hope ya will get da scholarship."

Ursula: (Towards the direction the man exited) "Goodbye."
