

I have informed the rest of my family that our living room will continue to be STARFLEET Subheadquarters for two more years. You can read the specifics about the election in another section of this newsletter. Thank you for indicating your satisfaction with out past efforts and your willingness to support our efforts for the next two years. All Ahead Warp Factor One!

MEMBERSHIPS: Our membership assembly line is back up to speed. I am caught up on sending out packages and even with our Chief of Computer Operations no longer living five minutes away, I feel, that we can get out the packages quickly. Again, Captains and Commanders, if a member has not received his/her membership package by six weeks from the time the application was sent to headquarters, it is time to start checking. Write me a short note with name, address and the date the application was sent to headquarters. The checks are deposited in Burnsville, NC., and memberships are processed through Cary and Greensboro, NC. Depending on the time of the month a check can get deposited, clear the bank, and be listed on a monthly statement before the membership package is mailed out.

Starting in January, 1990, the renewal packages will not have the blue and silver STARFLEET sticker or the blue and white UFP sticker. We will be sending a larger stack of the memo pads and possibly a new sticker. The 5"x8" cardboard Certificate of Membership will not be in the renewal packages

as everyone received in 1990. Family memberships, both new and renewals, will be combined in one envelope per address to save money.

MEMBERSHIPS AT CONVENTIONS: This program of offering membership packages at conventions has been very well received and has accounted for lots of new members. A very nice side effect is that I don't have to lick envelopes and stamps for those members. A few reminders . . . I need four weeks advance notice, or I cannot guarantee that you will have enough, or any, packages for your convention. It is still required that the Regional Coordinated be notified and approve. The approval can be a separate letter or written note on the original convention membership package request from the chapter. Instruction sheets come with each box on where to send what for quick processing.

CONVENTIONS AND TRAVEL PLANS: I have held off making any convention plans until the election was over. Now that I know that I will be representing STARFLEET again, I will be starting my social calendar for 1991. This is not too early for plans for the National Conference to start. If your chapter or region feels that you would like to host the National Conference, let us know. Ideally, the National Conference would be at a convention that has a very positive attitude towards Star Trek and STARFLEET. Hotel accommodations and food and necessities should be reasonable. A group rate for STARFLEET members is an added bonus. This site changes from year to year to give different regions a chance to host and attend this event. In 1988, it was Cleveland, Ohio; 1989 — San Jose, CA; 1990 — Kansas City, MO, so the door is open for any place that we have membership.

I'm still late getting around to reports, but finally I'm all caught up on getting Directories out. And, although they were a month late getting out, the 5th issue of UNIVERSAL TRANSLATOR is out. I'm anxious to find out how the Pen Pal of the Year turns out.

We'll be starting on issue 6 this week and hopefully that one will go out on time. It looks like the update part might be a few pages less, so that'll cut cost.

And then we begin work on the 1991 Directories, as well as find a new look for the cover of the newsletter.

We will be making a few changes for 1991. When I took over the Service, it had 64 members and printing up directories was no big deal. But it grew so fast and in 1990 I have spent over \$1,000 on printing directories; almost \$300.00 on postage; plus the expense of envelopes and paper to do the masters on. For updates/newsletters, I spent a total of \$17.50 per person for the year. My income in 1990 was more than it will be in 1991 and my expenses will be greater. So, I can no longer afford

to do this out of my own pocket. Therefore, starting with the 2nd week of November (because nothing will be going out until January) all Directories will cost \$5.00 each. Anyone, whether an old member or new will have to pay \$5.00 to get a 1991 Directory. Anyone wanting the updates/newsletters will have to send in an additional \$5.00. And even with this amount, it will not cover the entire cost of putting it out. So, I will still be spending money out of my own pocket.

We also hope to get some fund raisers going during 1991. I am looking for a fund raiser chairperson right now.

Right now, our membership stands at 197, with 25% getting the updates/newsletters. I have sent in a list to the Chief of Computer Operations for verification of current STARFLEET memberships. I'm sure when I get that back, there will be some deleting to do. I have also deleted those who have been MIAs for the past 14 months.

One problem that we have is that people don't write. When a new person gets his/her Directory and


they write to some people, they never get a response. Which makes us, who write, wonder why they join a Pen Pal Service if they aren't going to write letters. But we feel with the \$5.00 fee for the Directory, that only those who are sincere about writing will join.

I appreciate the little article about the Pen Pal Service that David Allen ran in the COMMU-NIQUE. It was quite a pleasant surprise. A nice article. Thanks, David.

In my first year as Director, we have grown considerably and brought a little more life to the program. I feel good about what we've done and what we still have planned for the future. The people getting the newsletters seem to enjoy them a lot. And we have a lot of fun putting it out.

We hope that our service is still pleasing and satisfactory to our superiors at Headquarters. I'm still very thankful for the opportunity to be director of this service.

To The Students: In this issue, I have a few serious points to cover concerning STARFLEET Academy.

- BOUNCED CHECKS Unfortunately, in spite of the low tuition, and the prospect of ridiculous bank fees, we had have had several instances of bounced checks. Checks that bounce will be forwarded to STARFLEET headquarters. You will be sent a bill, which will include not only the school's tuition but any bank charges incurred. Further, your STARFLEET membership will be put on hold until the matter is resolved..
- TUTTON PAYMENT Checks or Money Orders must be made out in the **Director's name only**. Please do not use School Name or include the director's rank on the check or money order as this will make it impossible to cash or deposit.
- CHEATING We have had too many instances of cheating. Members have copied off of one another to complete their tests or just physically copied (using a Xerox copier) the test and sent it in. Anybody caught cheating will be barred from that school. There will be no exceptions. Please note: when attending the Academy, it is not required nor recommended that you give copies to your Records Officer, Commanding Officer or any other member of your ship. Copy it for your own records. Do NOT give it to anyone else.
- COMPLETION TIME: You have ten weeks to complete your college classes. Academy tests are always being modified, changed and updated. We want to keep the tests being taken as current as possible. We will not accept tests that have been outstanding for more than one year. Anything returned in over 10 weeks will have points deleted for lateness.
- POST GRADUATE SCHOOL: Currently PGS has a large BACKLOG and is on hold until a new director has been found.

Basic Flight School Advanced Flight School, and TOP GUN will be taught out of New York as well as the various Craft Courses as they come on line. Currently work has begun on AM-13, AM-14, and AM-20 covering in order the KillerBee, the TomCat, and the Tiger Hawk shuttle fighters.

Work on the FM-00 Strike Group Commander's Handbook is finally completed with a great reception at its unveiling at the Region 1 Conference RovaCon. A course to accompany it will hopefully be done soon. Major David Kling now in Virginia is still working up the Marine Command & General Staff School with what will be the new Major, Lt. Colonel, and Colonel requirement courses for the promotion recommendation. First Sergeant L.W. McPherson of the USS POTEMKIN is developing the Drill Instructor's Course for Senior Non-Comms in the Fleet.

If you sent an item to the VAS since mid-June, you are affected by the delay.

By now you probably have seen the notice in Admiral Rob Lerman's STARFLEET Academy report on the Vulcan Academy of Science in the Communique.

Anyone who has experienced a loss such as this can appreciate the empty, frustrating feeling. Greetings and salutations from the STAR-FLEET Disabled Consultant Program! For the majority of you who may not know about the DCP, let me give you a quick summary (the other 6 or so people can skip this paragraph!)

The Disabled Consultant Program is an information and resource tool for STARFLEET, its members, ships, and any con organizers who want to use it to increase knowledge and awareness of our disabled members, and to make STARFLEET and cons more accessible to them. Hopefully, this will also increase our membership as well!

There is now a library of taped COMMUNI-QUES available to our visually impaired members. Most of 1990 is available. It's free to members (although donations of blank cassettes are always welcome!), and any interested nonmember is entitled to one free issue, to check us out. Also, I'd love to get ship's newsletters and fanzines in the library, so any ships out there who want to volunteer please send me any taped issues you want available. These also will be available to any interested ships - so how about it? Are you curious as to what a ship from the other Coast is writing? Get in on a tape exchange - send me one of yours, and I'll send you one from a different ship. I'm also working on getting STAR TREK books on tape, but at this point am waiting for the written authorization from Simon & Schuster. More on that as it works out.

Thanks to some excellent help from Ens. Peg Driesel, the DCP was able to have sign language interpreters available for CreationCon in Hartford in October. Additionally, Braille programs will be made available at Vulkon in St. Petersburg in November, through the DCP. If any ships are planning cons, and would like to offer these services, please let me know, and I can get you in touch with some of the local resources. In addition, the DCP can help with checklists, etc. that can help in con organizing and keeping the needs of the disabled in mind.

Based on the idea that some people simply lack the finances to invest in conventional housing, but who otherwise are completely qualified to own property, this program assists interested folks in doing just that — acquiring property and building it themselves.

Utilizing a combination of materials donated by major corporations and bought at inexpensive prices, volunteers are made up of people working towards building and owning their own property, this novel idea has provided an alternative where before there was none. Families are screened for reliability and need prior to being allowed to participate.

Recently, the USS LaGrange took part in one of the HFH's housing Blitzes, a once a year annual house building from scratch. They helped in the painting and other work that goes into making a house livable, spending the time to make another person's dream come true.

The LaGrange plans to participate in next year's events where it is hoped that ex-President Jimmy Carter might put in an appearance to do carpentry.

Habitats For Humanity is an international organization, and if you look in your telephone book, you might be able to find a local chapter.

CHAPTER OF THE YEAR RULES

Submissions for the Chapter of the Year 1990 will be accepted after January 1, 1991. The deadline will be March 1, 1991. This is a way to recognize those STARFLEET chapters that are very active, providing many opportunities for their members. First Place, Runner-up and Honorable Mention places will be chosen in the two categories, Chapter of the Year and Rookie Chapter of the Year.

STARFLEET chapters that are commissioned before July 1, 1989 are in the regular Chapter of the Year category. 

A True Story by Judith Allison



As promised, we have sent a STARFLEET shuttle to deal with the problems in Kuwait. They will probably be joined by the soon-to-be-official shuttle ARMSTRONG and there's yet another group trying to start up in Heidleburg, also on a military base. The mothership of SANDSTORM is the USS Hexum in Region 12.

I am pleased to announce that there will be a listing of shuttles included in the membership packets. This will be updated on a regular basis and should prove to be a welcome addition. In addition, the next Communique will have a page to include NEWSBRIEFS (NOT Shuttle reports) from shuttles. These will be included on a first-come and space available basis and should be sent to the Communique Office before the official Communique deadline is JAN 5th). PLEASE keep them short so we can include as many as we can. OK?

There has also been some interest in a shuttle newsletter. Please include your thoughts on this matter with your next report to ShOC. If there's enough interest, we'll give it a try.

A few things on VRR's. I've got four VRR's in my file that I can't process because they were received incomplete. For shuttles you must include:

 Name, address, PHONE NUMBER and SCC number for the CO and XO of the shuttle.

A Xerox copy of the OTS certificate for the CO and XO (you do not need OCC to launch a shuttle).

 A total of FIVE current members of STAR-FLEET. ONLY 2 members from a family membership can count towards the minimum number.

4) A check made out to STARFLEET for \$5.00. After it is completed, send the ENTIRE package to your Mothership (if you have one, otherwise send it to the Regional Coordinator). They will sign it and forward it to the Regional Coordinator who will sign it and forward it to ShOC. Your shuttle tour of duty begins on the date that your VRR is approved by ShOC.

In regards to OCC, due to the backlog of tests, if you haven't received your results by the time you need to send in your VRR for ship commissioning, don't worry. As long as you have applied to OCC and send a copy of the certificate to the Chief of Operations within 60 days after commissioning, that will be sufficient to fulfil the OCC requirement. It is recommended that you start preparing for commissioning after you pass the 6 month mark...it'll give you plenty of time to get things taken care of.

I'd like to clarify the regulations surrounding monthly reports. I can't emphasize to much the importance of making sure that your reports are received on A PROMPT AND TIMELY BASIS. You must report to your mothership, your Regional Coordinator and ShOC. I need your reports here at ShOC no later than the first day of each month. If the CO can't get the report out on time, he should delegate the responsibility to his XO (that's what they're there for!) or some other member of the crew. Missing reports will be dealt with according to what is specified in the Membership Handbook...a shuttle CO is as much a Chapter Chairperson as a ship CO. You have the SAME responsibilities. I am proud to say that out of 50 shuttles, I'm only missing 4 reports. That just shows you what a fine bunch of people I have to work with. Let's try for 100%...I'd like to make the Chief of Operations jeal-

As to mundane matters, thanks to everyone who's been so patient with me over the last couple months. I've been trying to get my house refinanced and...well, let's just say that I'd rather face a room full of angry Romulans than face a banker in his office. Well, I got it so things should get back to normal real soon.

Starfleet Invades **Space Academy**

Space ... The Final Frontier. This was the voyage of the Space Academy Team Enterprise. Its three-day mission: to survive simulations, to land the shuttle, to boldly go where few Fleeters have gone before!!

OK, so maybe it's a bit much, but nothing can really capture the spirit of the trip fifteen enthusiastic STARFLEET members and I (plus three unsuspecting non-Fleet members) had in October when we attended the adult version of Space Camp in Huntsville Alabama and trained to be astronauts - the space farers of the future. Maybe it wasn't really outerspace, but it gave us a chance to live our dreams of outerspace travel here on

Members from ten different ships and shuttles (USS Alaric, USS Bonaventure, USS Encounter, USS Excalibur, USS Guardian, USS Pendragon, USS Triumph, USS Vigilant, and Shuttle Star League) from 8 different states (California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Nevada, North Carolina, and Washington) and with varied backgrounds melded together into a wellfunctioning team — the Enterprise team, of course. For that weekend, there was no STARFLEET business, no ship boundaries, no ranks, only a group of visionary individuals who came to learn about space and have fun doing so. It was a fantastic experience.

The 3-day session started each morning at 6am with reveille (we were even awakened one morning with music from Star Trek IV) and lasted until 9 or 10pm. We were tired, but the enthusiasm and spirit ran high. We were treated to guest speakers, simulator training, shuttle missions, and learning to live with people in a small spaces (bunk beds and group showers). Some people could have used the simulator helmets in the bunk beds, at least it would have cut down on head-

The guest speakers were German Rocket Team member Walt Weisman and astronaut Mike Mullane. Weisman spoke on the history of the MSFC and the Rocket Team and management principles - "Hang Loose" - and left us with a quote from Werner Von Braun: "There is no such thing as an expert in missiles and space, only varying degrees of ignorance." Mullane told the us more than we ever wanted to know about the space toilet and its mishaps and gave us a beautiful orbital tour (via pictures) of the Earth. The planet looks so fragile from orbit, its scars from mistreatment evident.

During the simulator training a few people discovered that they were not meant to be spun around and hung upside down for extended periods of time (we won't name any names, you know who you are), and everyone took turns landing (or crashing) the shuttle simulators. We discovered muscles and areas of our bodies that we never knew existed (the hot showers felt good after a simulator session), but we didn't care, we were in training for our dreams.

Then came the missions (the best part). All of the training and expectations culminated in those two missions where the Enterprise team competed with the other three teams for the "Best Team" award.

The first mission, Discovery, went fairly well during

launch. We received a congratulatory message from the President of the Federation once the shuttle was in orbit. The commander and I (the pilot) missed our satellite launch window, but we continued on toward Space Station Regula I.

Before we reached Regula I however, all video and audio was lost with them. Phaser fire was heard just prior to losing contact and a message that they were under attack by aliens was received. The Payload EVA team saw Klingons board the station (it was not on the channel monitored by the cockpit crew, so we missed it all) and drove them off by throwing ham sandwiches at them (and to think, the Federation

were thwarted in their attempts to steal the rotation chair on K7, but the chair was rendered unusable. K7 also located a Tribble in the LDEF (Long Duration Exposure Facility) seeds (happily munching away, thus jeopardizing the experiment) and attempted to capture it. It finally landed on the stomach of one of the station specialist during an upper body fluid shift experiment and remained there happily purring until I transferred it to my shoulder for safe keeping. Mission control told us to keep the tribble on the station in order to isolate it. However, one tribble apparently escaped into the shuttle during crew transfer and began multiplying in the mid-deck, but the shuttle was able to land successfully anyway.

The space station officer was overcome by radiation and began slipping fast. Then the downlink printer to mission control failed due to a Nanite infestation. Things were definitely going from bad to worse. Mission control advised the station to dismember the Space Station Officer (preferably after he died) and use his irradiated body to kill the Nanites. Fortunately, when the officer was buried in space, he was regenerated by the Genesis device (which was stolen by the Klingons on the Discovery mission) and was able to rejoin the team.



wasted all that money on weapons when all they needed was a good deli). However, the Klingons did manage to steal the Martian soil samples and the Genesis Device before leaving. The EVA team then beamed down to mission control to report a successful mission and beamed back up.

By the time Discovery docked, it was all over. Docking and crew transfer went well but, because the mission was running behind schedule (thanks to the Klingons), Q had to intercede and speed up the landing sequence to bring the shuttle safely to Earth on time.

The second mission was aboard the new shuttle Endeavor and received the following message from Federation President T'Sin:

While the shuttle was launching, Space Station K7 was experiencing grave problems. Ferengi traders

Despite all the Trek-ish problems, Enterprise got excellent ratings on both missions. We were told that we were a very imaginative and creative group. The word unique came up too, but it was probably meant in the fondest way. Everyone will certainly remember this

Finally came graduation. We all received our wings, signifying that we were astronauts. And, even though we were not awarded the Best Team Award. the counselors and staff agreed that we were definitely a unique and imaginative group and that they all

enjoyed working with us.

Many of the crew said goodbye at that point, vowing to return next year for the second level of training. The rest went for pizza and to rehash the missions (old war stories always sound better over food). No one was really upset about not having won the competition because everyone had had so much fun (even the ones who had to hang upside down, spin around and/or be thrown around by EVA simulators).

All in all, the team made new friends (both Fleet and non-Fleet members), gained a better appreciation for what it takes to keep the space program going and, most importantly, had fun in the process. We acted as true members of the Fleet (as Khan said, "We're all one big happy Fleet"), and can actually say that we graduated from the academy as astronauts!


