

Greetings from the Fleet Admiral's Number One. Like Commander Riker, my duties are many and varied, trying to keep the Fleet running as smoothly as possible. It seems that no matter how fast I type and answer letters and stuff membership packages, there are more waiting when I turn around!

MEMBERSHIPS: Complete membership turnaround time is averaging 4-5 weeks. Chapter C.O.'s should keep in mind when writing about a member's package Give me six (6) weeks from the time that they mailed their application (not when they think they might have mailed it.) I can usually give you an answer in a couple of days as to the membership status. Requests for membership packages for conventions continue to come in and seem to be an effective recruiting aid. It is very important that chapters in the same area get organized about this before the convention. Recently, I had two cases of different people or chapters requesting packages for the same convention. This is one of the reasons that requests are to be cleared through the R/C before coming to me.

SCHOLARSHIPS: Activity is increasing as the deadline gets closer. All requests for applications that were postmarked and/or received by May 1 received the information. June 1, 1991 is the postmark deadline for materials to be received for the scholarship so that the winners can be chosen by June 15th. They will be

announced in the next COMMUNIQUÉ, hopefully with pictures and articles about the winners. Don't forget to look for raffle tickets and information about the scholarship T-shirt raffles. These autographed T-shirts are certainly unique collectors' items. Everyone has a chance to be a winner.

This month will have some breathing time with school out and not too many activities planned for my mini-Marines aboard our ship. Next month, we "gear up to go." I am especially looking forward to returning to Maryland for the STARFLEET National Conference at Shore Leave. This is always a grand chance to meet more members of our club. Those of you who are familiar with Anne McCaffrey's, *Dragon-riders of Pern* series can understand that I would love to be able to "time" it and spend more time with everyone, but I would probably meet myself coming or going and that would be disastrous.

I had a member write to me and ask about my closing comment in the last issue of the COMMU-NIQUÉ. I said to always cut up your six-pack holders (soda or beer). Birds and animals can become entangled and trapped in the plastic holders causing great pain and death. Even holders that are deposited in regular trash dumps can still be uncovered or somehow encountered by the animals. I have done this for many years but was reminded again of the potential consequences when our own William Shatner featured the problem on his show, "Rescue 911." MAKE A NOTE: CHANGES IN MEMBERSHIP FEES

Many thanks to all of the Fleet members who responded to the problem of the inadequacy of the current STAR-FLEET annual membership fee. Thanks for your input and thanks for you support. We have found that although no one wants to have to increase the membership fee, 99% of the membership would rather do that than have to scale down the services and material that each member receives for their annual dues. The decreases would have included sending out a much smaller membership package and having fewer issues of a much smaller COMMUNIQUÉ.

By calculating the escalating printing and first class postage costs, we have found that the total cost for a membership package plus six (6) issues of the COMMUNIQUÉ now stands at about \$12.40 per member. This means that the Fleet goes into the hole \$2.40 for each new or renewing member that sends in their annual membership dues. We had hoped to cover the difference with merchandise sales, but the Fleet is growing at such a tremendous rate that the membership sales cannot keep up with the

increasing gap. This has remained true even with the added benefit of family memberships.

There are also many other operating costs that have not been figures into the \$12.40 such as the cost of the Fleet phone, the command level newsletter (the Fleet Status Update) and all of the milyuns and milyuns of letters that have to be written and mailed out to keep the Fleet functioning smoothly.

So, with the consent of the STARFLEET membership, as of August 1, 1991, the individual annual STARFLEET membership dues will increase from \$10.00 per year to \$15.00 per year. The annual membership dues for a same-address family of two will be \$22.00. The annual membership dues for a same-address family of three or more is \$25.00.

The membership fee for areas other than the United States is \$20.00 for an individual (U.S. Funds) and \$30.00 (U.S. Funds) for same-address family memberships of two or more. The address remains unchanged: **PO Box 430**, **Burnsville. NC 28714**

EARTH DAY UPDATES

The USS Joshua, in conjunction with the Genesis Project, celebrated their first Earth Day event on April 21, 1991. As most of you read in the last Communique our event was sponsoring a Starfleet "forest," and as of this writing we are proud to announce the planting of 26 trees in the forest. We wish to thank all the ships and shuttles who donated trees to this event

I would also like to thank the many ships and shuttles who sent me information as to what they do on a long term basis and also what they had planned for their Earth Day event. The response to all this was overwhelming!

Our day was a success even though the weather was not in our favor. It started out at 38 degrees (to those that are used to it that is not cold, but bear in mind we Texans are used to baking at 95 to 115 degrees; it was COLD!!). We showed up to Richfield Park at 8:00 a.m. and promptly started dancing around to keep from turning blue. Our planters had their "demonstration planting" at 9:45 a.m. (given by Tim Hightshoe of the Parks and Recreation Department) and by 10:00 a.m. started planting the trees. They were able to plant over 100 trees that day, even before the festivities started at 12:00 p.m. All in all over 200 trees, mostly donated by local merchants, were planted. HOORAY!!!

At exactly 12:00 p.m. our celebration started with two of our members, James Delmont and Tracie Merchant, performing acoustic guitar and singing songs. The Genesis Project

The Genesis Project is not a new scientific invention to change our dying planet into a thriving one within minutes. It is, however, a collection of people throughout Starfleet who are concerned with our environment and want to make a change.

It all started in 1990 with a few people and a great idea. Being interested in Star Trek is not only going to conventions, saying 'live long and prosper', and watching television all the time. It also means we are very interested in the future, OUR future. Our future depends on us, now, to do something about the mistakes that have been made before they go beyond our capabilities of stopping the cycle. Earth Day was just the launching point of this project. What I had proposed to Starfleet was this:

To have a department that solely concentrates on environmental issues. There seems to be a large number of members who do a lot of that and this department is being put together to help organize it all into a single energy to recognize everyone's effort at helping our Earth. All

I am hooking up with other organizations across the county to help keep up to date information on hand. If you have questions we will research it for you and send the information as soon as it is available.

Every club that contacted me about Earth Day had fantastic ideas and news to tell. This department will assist you in getting the word out as to what you are doing and help other ships\shuttles get a start on what they want. All Academy programs must be completed within 10 weeks from when your packet was sent out, this will keep all outstanding tests current. If you are going to be late, please request an extension. Extensions are granted for a 2 week period only, so please be aware that if you take foo many tests at once, that may cause a problem in completing your tests in time. All tests must be completed within 6 months. Any that are not completed within the 6 months time limit will become null and void. Once this happens, you must re-apply with the tuition to take the course again. There are too many old versions of tests and this will help keep all tests up-to-date.

A reminder, you must complete your tests by yourself. Do not give copies of your test to anyone else, only make copies of your test for yourself. The original should always go back to the Academy school for which you applied.

Anyone that has a complaint must document any such complaint in writing and send it to the Director of Starfleet Academy. Also, any phone calls to the Academy HQ can only be taken between the hours of 6:30pm and 9pm Pacific Time. I DO work and am not home during the day. If I am not home, please try another night as it is hard to return calls.

Anyone sending an application to anyone in Starfleet Academy must include 2 first class stamps, or if from a foreign country, you must include a International Reply Coupon for the same amount. It is real hard to answer questions or send back any materials without the stamps, so please include them anytime you write to us.

If, for some reason, you don't have an application for an Academy program, you may write to me for the most current version of the Application. It is not required to have an application to apply. Be sure to include your name, complete address, SCC #, rank, the chapter to which you belong, and the tuition cost of \$3.00 in US funds.

 STARFLEET TUITION CHANGES: We are having to change the financial format of the Academy to comply with IRS requirements as we work toward our non-profit status.
 Since the Academy is a function of STARFLEET as a whole, the fees are required to go through the Fleet bank account instead of into the individual directors' accounts.

There were lots of phone calls and discussions among the Executive Committee and we came up with all kinds of intricate schemes trying to find the best way to handle all of the extra paperwork. We finally decided on a method that only required one page of instructions and only required mailing checks and applications back and forth about a dozen times.

On the very day we were going to make that complicated scheme official, HQ got a letter from Fleet member G. Chen in New York. He had a very simple solution that seven Admirals hadn't been able to come up with. He suggested that HQ issue Academy tuition vouchers. So brilliant and so simple! We had already decided that to make the Academy easier for everyone, the tuition fee for all academy schools would be the same.

So the procedure for applying to any Academy school is send \$3.00 to HQ (PO Box \$30, Burnsville, NC 28714) for each school you wish to attend. HQ will send you an Academy tuition voucher. Send the voucher and your application to the school of your choice. The director of that school will guide you from there

Each tuition voucher is \$3.00 or you can purchase a booklet of five (5) vouchers for only \$12.00 (a Fleet Bonus) in case you want to attend more than one Academy school. If the purchaser doesn't use all of the vouchers, he/she can sell them to other Fleet members (only STARFLEET members can attend Starfleet Academy). If the members want do so, a Fleet chapter can purchase several vouchers and have them on hand to sell to chapter members. That would save the mail

delay of writing for each voucher individually.

At the end of each month, the directors of the Academy schools will send copies of their receipts for school expenses to HQ and will be reimbursed from the Academy funds.

This change in Academy financial policy goes into effect immediately. We hate to throw in this extra step for attending STARFLEET Academy, but believe me, it's much easier than some of the crazy schemes that were proposed by the Admirals! Our grateful thanks go to Mr. Chen for his good advice.

WHY MARINES? Part 2

The Marines are an integral part of the Federation forces. Acting under STARFLEET Command, we work with starships and other vessels in exploration, defense, and security. But we are also quite autonomous, as Marine exercises are often undertaken far from the nearest starbase or command center. In fact, most of our duties are those which are simply too small, on a galaxy-wide scale, to be of primary importance to STARFLEET. But the Marines' operations are no less important for all that, as allowing small disputes and emergencies to get out of hand could quickly cause the collapse of the entire Federation from within.

What, then are the duties and responsibilities of the STARFLEET Marines? It is an open question, as the force is somewhat loosely organized, enabling them to meet any contingency with a maximum amount of flexibility. Our primary functions, or 'main missions' however, are:

1. Operations alongside conventional planetary forces.

2 The protection of UFP interests galaxy-wide. 3.To count a UFP 'Show of Force' throughout the Treaty Zone when necessary



MERCHANDISE FUND RAISING

John T. Hopkins • Quartermaster

The merchandise fund raising program is designed to help the ships of the fleet raise money by permitting a local chapter to buy STARFLEET merchandise at reduced prices which they can resell at conventions and other events.

This program is available only to chapters as a ship project and is not available to individual members (unless the member is a dealer on a regular basis, at which point he\she would fall under our Dealer Participation Program).

Very simply. the plan works like this. The Quartermaster's office will give your ship a 25%

discount on orders of \$100 or more. If you resell at regular prices, this will give you a 33% profit. Keep in mind that you may not sell at prices above those set by STARFLEET. Your ship may chose what items or combination of items it wishes to sell. The rest is up to you.

Not only is the use of merchandise a good fund raiser, but it also works very well as a recruiting tool. I don't know how many times I have been at a Con and a person would walk up to look at the merchandise and I would ask: "Are you a member of STARFLEET?". The answer generally is: "No. What is STARFLEET?". Now

is that an opening for recruitment or what!

There are a few restrictions regarding participation in this program, and the Captain and First Officer will be required to sign an agreement regarding this program and the ordering of merchandise. Here is an outline of the major conditions of our program.

-The Quartermaster will only process orders of \$100 or more after discount.

-All sales will be cash up front. (Remember the Quartermasters's motto: "In God we trust, everyone else pays cash.")

-All shipments will be mailed parcel post and will be insured for the amount of the purchase (after discount).

-Please allow 4 to 6 weeks for delivery.

-Because we are a simple Fan Association and not a major corporation (which can keep large inventories), we can not guarantee that we will be able to fill your order completely. This is not to say that we will not try, but that we can not guarantee it. If there is a problem you will be contacted. If you have questions about availability before ordering, do not hesitate to contact me.

 -Your ship can not sell at prices ABOVE levels set by STARFLEET. This is to protect against price gauging.

-There will be NO returns for unsold merchandise, so when you order please keep this in mind. (It should be noted at this point that unlike fresh fruit, this stuff will be good for a while. So if you don't sell it all at this Con, you can sell it at the next Con or other event, or even to another ship.)

-Your ship can not sell in bulk to any person or organization other than a ship of STARFLEET. Note: The Regional Coordinator in your area will be advised of ships that have made bulk purchases, so you may want to contact him/her to see if any other ships in the region have any surplus they would be willing to part with.

-To insure that only ships will be participating in this program, both the Commanding Officer and First Officer will be required to sign the Order and Participation Agreement.

Most STARFLEET members know the basic mission of the OTI: to serve as a reference and research service specializing in the technical aspects of Star Trek. The ships, uniforms, equipment, planets, cultures, and life-forms of the worlds of Star Trek are the specialty of the OTI. Most of you also know the basic operation of the OTI: If you've

got a question, contact OTI, and if there's an answer, I'll find it for you. If no one else has an answer, some reasonable speculation is in order, and OTI is the most comprehensively-equipped part of the Fleet to engage in realistic speculation. With an information-base of virtually every technical manual and blueprint set every produced, OTI is the ultimate reference source for STARFLEET members!


OTI also maintains several specialized information products for members' use. First, there is the most accurate Star Trek timeline available, including events from "Star Trek: The Original Series", the "Star Trek" films, AND "Star Trek: The Next Generation", not to mention a wide range of novels, background-manuals, etc. It's the most comprehensive and accurate timeline you can get. Second, for those

1990 CHAPTER OF THE YEAR WINNERS!

The 1990 chapter of the Year Committee Judges' Panel selected U.S.S LaGrange, NCC-3916 and U.S.S. Joshua, NCC-3700 as Chapter of the Year and Rookie Chapter of the Year, respectively. The Panel named U.S.S. Sally Ride, NCC-643 and U.S.S. Triumph, NCC-26228 the Runner-up and Rookie Runner-up, respectively, and awarded U.S.S. Alioth, NCC-1828 and U.S.S. Ranger, NCC-2206 the Honorable Mention and Rookie Honorable Mention, respectively. The judges applauded the work of all the starships that participated.

In their final meeting Earthdate 9104.07, the judges took a last look at the submissions, which they had viewed individually over the course of about six weeks, each confirming his impression of the comparative merits of the entries.

Having satisfied himself of his own ranking order, each judge was ready for the voting.

The judges had already agreed not to discuss their opinions among themselves until after the first ballot, and the only if serious differences came to light. As it was, no argument was necessary: the winner of each first-place award was either first or tied for first on the list of each of the judges. It was not a runaway victory, however; the numerical scores of most of the ships (which the judges have asked not be revealed here) were quite close to the top.

As one judge remarked, "not only was it difficult to choose because they were all so different, they seemed to be working so hard, you hated to have to choose at all."

No matter how good you are, there is

always room to improve. The judges, some of whom made copious notes, agreed to send their summarized comment to each chapter for future reference.

They also agreed to help with a handbook for the shuttles who get to organize the competition in years to come. (It has been quite an education. I strongly recommend that shuttles bid to get the assignment next year.- CQ)

After the decision was made, two of the judges immediately joined starfleet, a tribute to the example set by the U.S.S. Star League's commissioning party (Part II) where they were entertained by the happy crew and presented with a small token of our thanks.





A VISIT TO VULCAN

The USS CHALLENGER hosted a special Vulcan Forum on April 6, 1991 at the Manchester Township Library NJ. The project was a joint venture with the Ocean County Library system and area STARFLEET chapters. A large library meeting room was the setting for the three hour event, which featured displays of Vulcan maps, planetary models, posters, various Vulcan literature, and carefully gleaned footage of Vulcan. The goal, in addition to having a lot of fun, was to bring Star Trek's favorite red planet alive, present the planet's philosophy, Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations, and the promotion of the STARFLEET organization.

When his chance comes, he utters two monotone words: "Emotional humans!" and the crowd once again surges to their feet with joy as the visitor makes a somehow familiar symbol with his hands. 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
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
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
