

If you weren't there, you missed one of the best events of the year. What was it? The STAR-FLEET National Conference, of course. The Conference was held at the Shore Leave convention near Baltimore, MD on July 12-14th. There were over 430 STARFLEET members at the conference. Every-

one seemed to have a great time meeting friends that had been made by correspondence and by phone conversations or looking up friends that hadn't been seen since the last National Conference. Handshakes, hugs and mile-a-minute chatter was the order of the day. The week-end was non-stop...from the terrific STARFLEET meetings, informational panels and activities at the recruiting table to a Fleet wedding, dancing until four in the morning and taking a Merry-Go-Round ride with a contingent of Klingons.

We want to say "Many Thanks" to Fleet members Mark Haynes and Cindy Geppi who coordinated the STARFLEET program with the staff of STAT and who spent the entire weekend trouble shooting and making sure everything was running smoothly. We also want to send our sincerest thanks to the Star Trek Association of Towson for welcoming STARFLEET to their convention and allowing us to use their facilities for our 1991 National Conference. Their generosity is appreciated by everyone in STARFLEET.

For the Command Staff of STARFLEET and other interested Fleet members: another issue of the Headquarters' newsletter, "Fleet Status Update" should be in trans-

mission mode soon. The FSU had been put on "hold" because of a lack of funds in the Fleet treasury. Other Fleet expenses took precedence over the specialized Fleet Status Update. But that STARFLEET can-do spirit has come to the rescue once more. Two Fleet members, who wish to remain anonymous, have sent funds to get the FSU back on line. Many, many thanks to them. Hopefully, with the increase in the annual membership dues, the FSU can become a regular publication again.

And speaking of dues, please remember that as of August 1st, 1991, each category of the STARFLEET annual membership dues will increase by \$5.00. Thus, the cost of the individual annual membership dues will go from \$10.00 to \$15.00, the cost of the two-member family dues will go from \$17.00 to \$22.00, etc. The Executive Committee really hated to institute the dues increase. WE were proud to be able to provide Fleet services for so little. But inflation has caught up with us. After doing some sinple calculations, we found that each member of STARFLEET was receiving \$12.40 worth of materials for their \$10.00 membership. And this only covered the membership package plus 6 issues of the COMMUNIQUE. It did not include the multitude of correspondence and services it takes for the routine functioning of Headquarters. But a random poll of the membership showed that they would much rather increase the membership fees than eliminate any of the materials and services provided by STARFLEET. Thanks, everyone, for your

FINANCIAL REPORT



WHO'S ON FIRST? WHAT'S THAT ADDRESS?

The STARFLEET Executive Committee wants to continue our policy of Open Door Communications but members need to realize there is a chain of command and work with it. For the newer members this information is for future reference; for older members and Command Staff, don't skip this! Now is the time to read carefully, and make a copy to post in your Fleet office work area.

- •STARFLEET HQ: Memberships, renewals, monthly chapter and region reports, newsletters (optional), and requests for Academy vouchers.
- Vice Admiral Sue Hampton: Scholarship questions, requests for membership packages at conventions (need R/C approval), questions concerning membership packages that are late or lost or replacement parts of packages.
- Chief of Operations Tom Davis: copies of monthly chapter and region reports, chapter or inter-chapter problems that have been handled at Region level and not been resolved.
- The Communique Office: articles, special ship reports, classified ads, corrections for printed articles, change of C.O. or ship address. (Also goes to Computer Operations.).
- Director STARFLEET Academy Rob Lerman: Questions about Academy courses, problems that HAVE been discussed at individual school levels and not resolved.

- Director Shuttle Operations Kenny Proehl: Requests for information to start a shuttle, VRR forms to launch a shuttle, copies of monthly shuttle reports, problems between shuttle and ship after they have been discussed with ship C.O. and R/C.
- Chief of Computer Operations David Forvendel: Change of address, ship/shuttle roster (member's name and SCC # ONLY, requests for roster print outs.
- •Quartermaster Jack Hopkins, 115-B Farmwood Dr., Kernersville, NC 27284: Merchandise orders, problems with merchandise, ideas for products, requests for information on getting uniforms, props, insignia.

What about things not listed above?

Think about it a few minutes before writing or calling. Shuttle and chapter members, have you talked with your Department Head, chapter First Officer or Commanding Officer? Have they had reasonable time to respond? Did you send a S.A.S.E.? Was the response reasonable (if they didn't agree with you that doesn't make the response wrong)? If you still feel the need for further explanation or intervention, go to the next level above your chapter which is the Regional Coordinator. Shuttles have the option of also going to the Shuttle Operations Director (Shuttle

and Ship C.O.'s go back and read the last few sentences; they apply to you). Have you worked with your R/C first and effectively? If there is still a need, then Chief of Operations Tom Davis is the next in line. Document facts. not thoughts and "maybes" (Example: "I heard that she said that he was going to...") You don't need to involve the Vice Commander or Fleet Admiral at this point. If it continues to be unresolved, they will be advised by Tom Davis for final decisions. C.O.'s: If you have a problem or complaint, DO NOT BURY IT IN THE MIDDLE OF YOUR SHIP REPORTS! They should be handled as separate communications ideally in separate envelopes. Reports are important, but may get set aside until the time to file the next level monthly report. Then your questions have not been answered quickly. Don't expect Officers to be able to give you a concrete answer during a phone call on some situations. Have the courtesy to write and explain the situation calmly, and give them the opportunity to think about it before replying. In any instance when you write a letter while angry or frustrated remember the Golden Rule: "Do unto others..." Wait until the next day and reread your letter to see if tone and words are really what you wish to convey to that person.



Many things have happened since last I wrote this column. The Office of Communications is expanding and working on projects to help facilitate smooth reporting within Fleet.

NEW COMMUNIQUÉ FORM PENDING: On the drawing board is a new Communique form that will be sent to ship and shuttle commanders to be returned at Communique deadline. This CQ form will allow ship chapters to highlight some of their activities over the two month period. This is, hopefully, an improvement, because it will allow each chapter to write specifically what they are doing. This is going to be an optional form; Ship reports sent to the Communiqué office will still be summarized as best we can. However, if you want to have something specific written from your perspective, this will be an ideal way to insure its inclusion. Incidentally, even prior to the completion of this project, if you have a specific chapter report, send

it along to us around September 1, 1991 or shortly before. If it's 150 words or less, we will print it as is. If it runs over 150 words, it will be subject to editing for space limitations. A word of caution — the Communiqué staff has final say on content of reports as with the summarizing of the ship reports.

PEN PAL SERVICE: This office has been recently assigned to the Office of Communications after the resignation of the former director, Cathy Addlesee. Ray Greenberg is the new director. Please address all correspondence to Ray at PO Box 457, Rancocas, NJ 08073. There will be a transition period, so we ask for your patience while Ray gets everything setup and organized. A friendly note in his direction would be nice, as well.

WRITERS' & ARTISTS' CONTEST: We have taken the manuscripts to the judges and they are, at this moment, reading submitted materials. We received many good pieces in both fiction and art, and are looking forward to a wonderful publication in December. Judges include: Carmen Carter, Kate Maynard, Tawn Stokes and Brenda Shaeffer. Submissions included a number of good science fiction stories and poetry, and Star Trek art. All STARFLEET members are to be commended for their efforts.

SPACE CAMP: You can still go to Space Camp on the September 20th weekend. However, you must now send full payment to the Communiqué office as quickly as possible (no later than the end of August), and they will still try to accommodate you. Send monies (made out to STARFLEET, please) to PO Box 457, Rancocas, NJ 08073.

VESSEL REGISTRY UPDATES: Please send all requests for Vessel Registry Updates to: PO Box 457, Rancocas, NJ 08073. Please include an SASE & one extra 29¢ stamp for each Vessel Registry you'd like. We try to get them out about every six weeks. If you have changes for your chapter, send those requests to the Rancocas address as well.

HOW DO YOU PRONOUNCE THE WORD "RANCOCAS"? We've gotten a few requests for correct pronunciation of the Rancocas mailing address for the Communiqué. It goes like this: Ran-Coke-Cuss" (smile). So if you think of a Classic Coke Can running and 'cussing, it's kind of hard to forget.



All Academy programs must be completed within 10 weeks from when your packet was sent out. This will keep all outstanding tests current. If you are going to be late, please request an extension. Extensions are granted for a 2 week period only, so please be aware that if you take too many tests at once, that may cause a problem in completing your tests on time. All tests must be completed within 6 months. Any that are not completed within the 6 months time limit will become null and void. Once this happens, you must re-apply with the tuition to take the course again. There are too many old versions of tests, and this will help keep all tests up-to-date.

A reminder, you must complete your tests by yourself. Do not give copies of your test to anyone else, only make copies of your test for yourself. The original should always go back to the Academy school for which you applied.

· STARFLEET TUITION CHANGES: Just a reminder, all schools now accept STARFLEET Academy Vouchers (from STARFLEET HQ, PO Box 430, Burnsville, NC 28714) at \$3.00 per voucher or five (5) for \$12.00. STARFLEET Academy does not handle any voucher requests, so please direct them to HQ. Please when sending in a voucher to the school of your choice, put your name, SCC# and school you are applying to on the back of the voucher. This will help in our recordkeeping on each student. Send the voucher and your application to the school of your choice. The director of that school will guide you from there. If the members want do so, a Fleet chapter can purchase several vouchers and have them on hand to sell to chapter members. That would save the mail delay of writing for each voucher individually. As of October 1st, no school will be taking any money for any course, only the vouchers will be allowed.

Anyone sending an application to anyone in STARFLEET Academy must include two (2) first class stamps or if from a foreign country you must include an International Reply Coupon for the same amount. It is real hard to answer questions or send back any materials without the stamps, so please include them anytime you write to us.

•WHY THE VOUCHERS: We are having to change the financial format of the Academy to comply with IRS requirements as we work toward our non-profit status. Since the Academy is a function of STARFLEET as a whole, the fees are required to go through the Fleet bank account instead of into the individual directors' accounts.

At the end of each month, the directors of the Academy schools will send copies of their receipts for school expenses to HQ and will be reimbursed from the Academy funds.

This change in Academy financial policy goes into effect immediately.

• OLD OTS FORMS: I would like people who have taken the old OTS under FAdm Smith's administration to make a copy of their diploma, score sheet and SCC # along with your name and send it to my office. I am trying to compile all old OTS records (as none was turned over to me when I took office). I thank all of you who have sent their copies in.

WHY MARINES? Part 3

Another function of the STARFLEET Marines is to work with the ships of STARFLEET. Marines assigned posts on starships and other vessels are known as Fleet Marines. Fleet Marines are ready at any time to move in on trouble; consequently they cannot be sequestered to permanent duties as garrison or containment forces. The entire idea of a quickly activated strike force is defeated if all the Marine units are tied down. For most purposes, we can assume that most STARFLEET Marines are among this ready-force, no matter where they are stationed.

All of these things are secondary to the fact that it is the human, or humanoid element of the STARFLEET Marine Corps that actually makes it work; plus the single-minded determination and 'espirit de corps' that is shared by the Marines.

Although it is the Federation ideal to "...explore new worlds, to seek out life and new civilizations, and to boldly go where no man has gone before.....", it is the job of STAR-FLEET to protect the Federation from its enemies within and without. It was once said that a good defense is the best offense. The Marines are the 'good defense/best offense'. It is the job of the Federation diplomats to extend the velvet glove of peace to alien civilizations and cultures, but it is the job of STARFLEET and the STARFLEET Marines to be the 'iron fist' in that velvet glove.

While this not a work of art or printing excellence, the Starfleet (from the imaginary Starfleet of Gene Roddenberry, not STARFLEET, the Star Trek Fan organization) Medical Manual Supplement certainly qualifies as a labor of love by STARFLEET member and Star Trek fan, Dan Bromley. Produced on a Commodore 64, this 62 page manual made for interesting reading. All of the lifeform drawings and information were created by Dan, and while some other companies could do it better with flashier materials, Bromley's work has some interesting points and facts that help when trying to create a character for both role playing and/or writing Trek fiction.

If you can get by the somewhat up and down quality that a dot matrix printer makes, this velobound

piece can be quite a gem.

The second drawback only comes in the price — \$25.00 per copy. We thought it was bit steep, however, if you want to add to your character library, are willing to pay a little bit more, this is the buy for you. You must also include three (3) SASEs addressed to the following: (1) your Regional Coordinator, (2) Shuttle Operations Command, (3) STARFLEET ARCHIVES. Your \$5.00 shuttle fee covers a nine (9) month supply of Shuttle Status Report Forms.

When applying to go to full ship status, please avoid needless commissioning delays, by having the following materials ready to submit with your VRR: OTS and OCC certificates from both the Commanding and First Officer, OTI and SHoC Validation Card. You must also send three (3) SASEs addressed to: Shuttle Operations Command, Chief of Operations, and STARFLEET Archives. Please include your check or money order for \$10.00 made out to STARFLEET.



Ok, what is "STARFLEET DTS"? The STARFLEET Department of Technical Services was organized in early May 1991 (9105.00) as the logical successor to the Office of Technical Information (OTI). Its primary function is to supply needed "Technical" information to individual STARFLEET members, shuttlecraft/starship chapters upon request. It also serves as the administrative body that issues/approves shuttlecraft/starship names, NCC numbers, and starship types. DTS serves as an "umbrella" organization made up of several smaller subsections. They are as follows:

· Office of Research & Development

Reviews and approves requests for shuttlecraft/starship names and ship types, as well as issuing that all important NCC (chapter) number. Most all ship designs from the "Trek Universe" are open to consideration (including those of your design). And yes, that does include Federation ship designs from ST:TNG! Don't forget a SASE!

· Office of Graphic Design

Can assist shuttlecraft/starship chapters in "how-to" for design of insignia/logos for their individual needs. Don't forget a SASE!

• Office of Technical Information

Headed by RADM Alex Rosenzweig (see previous Communique for more specific information), serves as a fleet "database" of technical information. Everything from Anti-Matter to Zienite, the fleet "library" has it all. Don't forget a SASE!

TREK CLASSIC — **25 YEARS LATER**

It seems that everyone is doing something to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of Star Trek. However, in the book publishing industry, one set of books stands head and shoulders above the rest. Coming from an unlikely source, this series of four books was written by a long time fan of Star Trek, and covers the history of Trek from the original series through the aborted attempts at revival in the 1970s, the feature films and the syndicated, Star Trek: The Next Generation.

Ed Gross, author, publisher and avid Star Trek and science fiction fan has been into the genre since childhood. Born in 1960, Ed recalls his strongest memory of that time - playing Dr. McCoy using a "Tiger Gun" as his phaser and the salt and pepper shakers as his medical instruments. Seems that more than the Star Trek prop people had that idea. He was "fascinated" by Mr. Spock's ears, and was hooked on the show and the adventures from that point on.

When asked about conventions, Ed chuckled and replied, "My father brought me to my first Star Trek convention in New York. I remember getting into long lines to see Gene Roddenberry. I was twelve years old, didn't know who Gene was and when I asked, well, boy, what looks I got."

"I got totally involved in Star Trek in 1978. You know, I became a great fan because of all those cliche reasons — the rapport, the philosophy and the themes. I've always loved the episodes that dealt with allegory, the really powerful themes and the stories with strong emphasis on the issues."

His quest to chronicle the history of the series began during the "Lost Years", that period between cancellation and Star Trek: the Motion Picture. I interviewed Harold Livingston who wrote the screenplay for ST:TMP and Jon Povill, story editor of the aborted STII series and associate producer of ST:TMP.

"It has turned into a monster. I've been researching on an ongoing basis the history of Trek for the past seven years, and it's expanded, going from one book to four. One of the book's length was originally 1900

What makes these books really interesting is the angle — the majority of the interviews are with writers, directors and the myriad of behind the scenes people you seldom hear from.

"I've had people open up with me about Star Trek. They've given lots of information, cratefuls. I've been amazed. I've written on a lot of subjects, and never have I seen this level of cooperation.

From the Classic series through the Next Generation, people like D.C. Fontana, David Gerrold, Joseph Pevney, John Meredith Lucas and John D.F. Black have helped immeasurably in making these books as historically accurate as possible, and a really good buy at the \$12.95 + 2.00 p&h price.

For STARFLEET members, Ed has gone one step further, offering to reduce his first book by \$3.00, so that the price is only \$9.95 + \$2.00 p&h.

Why, you ask? I'm looking to make a living, and I try to give people value for their money. However, I've found that if you take the time to become part of an organization like STARFLEET, that's true Star Trek fans, and fans who are into community service as well, you are something special. It's Ed's hope that these various books will answer many questions, entertain and become one of the great history books of a legendary series. He is a dedicated Star Trek fan who started with an outside publisher and in the end, to give the most information, started his own publishing company, Image Publishing. Image has many plans in the works, beyond this first book, including a Next Generation encyclodepia. On August 12, The Making of The Trek Films will be out. Again, Ed is offering a \$3.00 reduction off of the \$14.95 + 2.00 p&h price for STARFLEET members.

Brian Tochi

Part One Of A Two-Part Conversation

Along with DeForest Kelley, Diana Muldaur, Mark Lenard and Majel Barrett Roddenberry, Brian Tochi joins the elite ranks of those who have made the transition from the old **Star Trek** series to **Star Trek**: **The Next Generation**. This well-known actor was originally considered for the role of Data.

You have seen **Brian** Tochi in a number of films including Lieutenant Nogata in Police Academy, Sergeant Nogata in Police Academy 3, Toshiro Takashi in Revenge of the Nerds, Young Tadashi in The Octagon and Tommy in the Omega Man. You have also seen him on television- a lot. He was a regular on The Bionic Six, The Renegades, Razzmatazz, Space Academy, Anna and the King, and Chan Clan, and he was a guest star on Santa Barbara, St. Elsewhere, and the Twilight Zone. Now he has re-appeared on Star Trek the Next Generation. He would appreciate Starfleet's help. Writing letters to the show asking for his character of Lieutenant Lin to return could make the difference.

STAR TREK: THE FOUNDATION

SF: What had you done in television and film prior to "The Children Shall Lead: episode for Star Trek?

Brian: God, I'd been in so many things. I was looking at an old resume last night. I used to have a three page resume.

SF: What's the first thing you remember?

Brian: Well, the first show I did was called He and She with Richard Benjamin and Paula Prentiss. I was their adopted son. It was only on for one season. Then there was one called Along Came Kim-I was Kim. It had a wonderful cast; Kenneth Mars, and Jack Cassidy. For some reason I have a great recollection of working on that show.

SF: And after those shows?

Brian: Well, I did a lot of commercials. And, a lot of television things.

SF: You were with Jonathan Harris in Space Academy.

Brian: Right. In fact I just called him the other day. We're going to get together real soon.

SF: Is Jonathan currently in anything?


Brian: Well, in his huge, brad, wonderful way of saying things, he said, "Brrrrian. I am now the king of voice-over: And I said, "That's great, Jonathan. I'm just happy you're alive still". He just laughed.

SF: How old is Jonathan Harris?

Brian: I don't know. He would never say. But, Jonathan has the spirit and the enthusiasm of a teenager. He is so much fun. We have a really special relationship. We always got along. We would socialize after the shows and keep in contact. So, I have a very special place for Jonathan Harris. He was always holding us kids on his lap, giving us Tootsie Pops and telling us stories about the theater. He's quite the character. He kept everyone in stitches.

SF: Do you remember when you first met him?

Brian: Yes. It was embarrassing. Whenever you do a series or a film, you have to go and get insured. So, you go to a doctor and, basically, the doctor says whether he thinks you'll live long enough to finish the project. About all he does is stick a thing in your mouth, take your pulse and listen to your heart and say, "Yeah, you're fine." Well, I remember going to this one doctor, this famous Doctor Michaelson, and Jonathan Harris was in there. I didn't know his name, but I recognized him, of course, from Lost in Space. So I went up to him and said, "Hello I'm Brian Tochi and I understand you are going to do Space Academy. I've been hired to do Space Academy with you. I'm sorry," I added, "but what's your name?" Well, he looked at me and said in that long, broad way of his, "Pulease, young man", like I was supposed to know or something. My God, I felt so- well, you know what could I say- I really didn't know his name.



SF: Did he remind you of that when he met you on the set of Space Academy?

Brian: No, not at all. Everything was just great. **SF**: Wasn't Space Academy the first show that had marketing spin-offs where you had your image sold as a doll?

Brian: As a matter-of-fact it was. You know what's interesting? I just remembered, I did Star Trek with a girl named Pamela Ferdin. She was also a regular in Space Academy.

SF: What other science fiction have you done for television.

Brian: I was in Project UFO.

SF: What did you do in that series?

Brian: I have no idea. I do remember that there was a guy named Greg that starred in the series that was a real jerk. Nobody liked him. That's about all I remember about it.

SF: What part did you play in The Octagon?

Brian: Oh, The Octagon? Tom, how did you know I was in The Octagon?

SF: Research, Brian, research. That's what us writers do.

 $\boldsymbol{Brian} \colon I$ am beginning to see that. Actually I did that one as a personal favor to Chuck Norris.

SF: How did you come to know Norris?

Brian: Well, here's something I am sure most people don't know. Jonathan Harris used to give Chuck

Norris acting lessons. This is like a big secret.

SF: Not any more.

Brian: Uh, yeah. Well, Jonathan was tutoring Chuck in his acting career. He used to call me and say, "Oh my God, I just had another session Chuck Norris". So I met Chuck that way.

SF: Tell me about your recurring role as Dr. Alan Poe in St. Elsewhere.

Brian: God, where are you digging all this stuff up from? I was hired to be a recurring interm, but that was the year they fired a bunch of people. My character never came back.

SF: A lot of actors say they will never work on a soap opera. How did you find working on Santa Barbara? Brian: Well, I had always said that, too. But once I got involved I was really impressed. Now I have the highest respect for sop actors. I mean, they have to learn

scripts really fast and improvise almost all the time. They rehearse, but not like you would for a play or a film. That was also during the writer's strike, so we would frequently get the script the same day we were to shoot it. It was a lot of very hard work. I did that job for seven months. I really enjoyed it. It was a great learning experience for me.

SF: You also do a lot of voice over work. **Brian**: Er, yes. In fact I do.

SF: You were Karate One in Bionic Six and read for Alan and Davey in the Chan Clan. Brian: My God! You really have done your research. I'm, like, sitting here thinking were did this guy get all this stuff. Even I don't remember what my name was. What were we talking about?

SF: I was going to ask you to compare working in voice-overs to working in front of the camera.

Brian: Well, you don't have to worry about how you look. There is a smaller circle of actors that do voice overs. I think that is because you usually have no preparation time. You go in, they hand you the script, you go over the script once and then just do

SF: Let's in another direction. Tell me about producer Paul Maslansky.

Brian: Well, Paul is one of the nicest guys in Hollywood - in the whole business. One of the most successful producers here. He is very approachable. For Police Academy he put together a group of actors and made them a family. That says a lot for man's abilities.

SF: There was once a rumor that one of Star Trek movies would be a Police Academy format. Did Paul ever indicate he had knowledge of that idea?

Brian: No, he never mentioned it.

SF: Another man you have expressed great respect for is Ricardo Montalban. How did that relationship begin? Brian: Actually, that began with the series Anna and the King where I played opposite Yul Brynner. I became very close to Yul. He was a wonderful person. That led, later to my playing the part of the Crown Prince in the Los Angeles Music Center's production of The King and I opposite Ricardo. He was an absolute gentleman. The dictionary could define gentleman as Ricardo Montalban.

SF: That is quite a complement.

Brian: I meant it to be. We used to go to dinner together and talk and that sort of thing. What you see of him on the screen he is. Who else in the world could have played the role of Khan as well as he did?

The June '91 issue of The Trekzine Time contains some interesting components other than their LOCs: a cartoon by the very talented Juanne Michaud (who work will be appearing regularly) plus an informative lead article by Margo Kay entitled "Ways To Flesh Out Your Cardboard People Into Real Holographic Projections."

Ms. Kay's article addresses topics such as the importance of being aware of your character's personal goals, ideals and self-image, avoiding cliche characters, alien characters, naming of characters and toe-tags (habits and/or mannerisms which help reveal some-

thing about your characters.) Other topics discussed in the article are the characters use of tools (the way they manipulate them can tell the reader important things about your story person.) Ms. Kay also stresses the importance of speech patterns when trying to set up your character for the reader. Reproduce foreign or regional accents accurately, but don't overdo it. Create a living, changing, real character that the reader can identify with and care about.

The article goes on to discuss ways in which to introduce your characters. Describing character motives, traits and appearance is one way. A slightly

SF: Let's go back a little way in your Star Trek career, to the time you were Ray Tsingtao.

Brian: Oh, well that's, I mean -er, wow, you have a lot of information.

SF: What do you remember of that part?

Brian: That was amazing. Because Star Trek was a childhood fantasy for me; space and adventure and all that. But when I went to the set it was so different, so unique compared to any other set I had ever been on. There were lights blinking here and there, and strange sounds, doors sliding - I mean, it was not your typical room with desks and chairs you know. It was really a kind of wonderment. And, it was so great, because the people in the show were really nice.

SF: Do you remember any one particular person? Brian: The nicest person there had to be Nichelle Nichols. She was a real sweetheart. She couldn't do enough for everybody. I also remember sitting on Shatner's lap around lunch time and I was kind of lying down looking up, and I remember seeing this net above his forehead. I had no idea, at that age, what it was. I certainly do remember that net - I can visualize it right now. I remember that about Bill Shatner. He really was nice and really very funny. Shatner and Nimoy were always joking around a lot.

SF: Do you remember Walter Koenig?

Brian: Walter was more of a serious kind of person. He didn't laugh much. He was always telling us kid actors that "You want to be little gentlemen, now." I can remember running around with a couple of the other yours cast members and Walter would say, "Now, you just stop that, there. You be little gentlemen". He was kind of stick in the mud in my mind.



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
