Region 12 held their fourth, annual summit on April 24,25,26, 1992 in Columbia, Missouri with a record 124 people in attendance representing 24 chapters. Fleet Captain Jim Herring coordinated the Summit this year.

We also had guests from afar Commodore David Kloempken and Capt. Rich Nacula of the USS Atlantis (Region 7) attended.

The auction which raised over \$500.00 for the Region 12 treasury, \$115.00 for the George Takei Scholarhip, and \$121.00 for the Space Explorers Scholarship.

Topics of the conference included leadership skills, fundraising and diplomacy Among the many things discussed at the top of the list were leadership, good delegation, the importance of working together as a team, temper control, and replacement of bad leaders. The How-To's of Tact and the basics of Public Relations were also covered

Many fundraising ideas were exchanged from the Sally Ride's successful cookbook sales to merchandising and fanzines. Lots of questions were asked and brainstorming abounded

Highpoints of the conference included Jim Herring's crew presentation of a picture Jim dressed in the most unusual of uniforms a buckaneer hat, and high priest's robe. It was auctioned. Jim tried to get it back, but was outbid by people pooling their funds to stop him.

Attendees were interviewed by the The Columba Daily Tribune, as well as a local television station who, during their telecast, incorporated special "beaming" effects into their presentation of the event.

It was decided to make a Region 12 quilt which will include the logo of each ship. Helen Pawlowski, 70, member of the USS Discovery, is going to do the quilt. It will be auctioned at next year's Summit.

STARFLEET **ELECTION** RULES

Attention Fleet members! It's almost that time again. Time to refresh everyone's memory of the rules and regulations of the upcoming STARFLEET Election Here goes:

The schedule of election events during an election year are;

- August 1 September 1 Nominations for President accepted.
- September 2 Qualified candidates announce their choice for Vice President and begin campaign
- September 15 Deadline for campaign letter to be submitted to the Communiqué.
- October/November Communiqué voting ballots are included in mailing of newsletter
- October November 15 voting takes place
- December/January Communiqué results of the election are announced.
- January 1 elected officials take office.

The Chief of Communications shall coordinate all election activity unless that officer becomes a candidate for President or Vice President. In this event, an eligible member of the Executive Committee will assume the responsibilities of running the election.

The officer in charge of the election shall engage a CPA at Fleet expense to count and certify the ballots.

Only official ballots issued by the Chief of Communications may be used by the membership for voting and must be postmarked on or before November 15th of the election year

Nominations of candidates for President may be submitted by Chapter Chairpersons or Regional Coordinators. All nominations must be signed and dated and no person shall nominate more than one candidate in each election. A nominee must receive live (5) nominations to become a candidate. Once a member has been accepted as an eligible candidate for President, that candidate must publicly announce within ten (10) days of notification of eligibility, his/her choice for Vice President.

A candidate for President, as well as the member who will serve as Vice Pres dent, must be active members of STARFLEET and at least twenty-one (21) years of age due to obvious legalities.


Next on the Press Corps agenda, is the subject of interviews. Not long after Issue #50 went to press, I received a request for permission from a Press Corps member to interview a Next Gen star during an upcoming convention. As a result, the following precedence has been established should any other Press Corps member decide he/she would like to conduct a similar interview.

Keeping in mind that how we conduct ourselves during an interview (and the expertise with which we ask questions) is a direct reflection on STARFLEIET as a whole, professionalism and courtesy is a *must!* Therefore, before a obtaining any interview, it as required that you write to me at the address listed above to request permission to perform said interview. A list of questions you will be asking must also be submitted for approval. Please remember to allow sufficient time for your request to be processed.

Once approved, you will then receive a 'Letter of Introduction'. This letter, along with the list of questions, is designed specifically to introduce you to the person you are interviewing as a member of the STARFLEET Press Corps. All materials should be mailed (Priority, Federal Express. etc.) at least one week in advance to the interview. Also, we request that interviews are taped, and a copy included with your submission, so as to assure that accurate information is being relayed back to us. (As always, should you or any of the STARFLEET Press Corps members be caught or captured, we will disavow any knowledge of your actions.) All tapes become property of the Office of Communications. The Communique staff reserves the right to refuse any interviews received at this office from individuals who do not follow protocol. Sorry to sound like such a meany about all this, however, it is in the best interest of STARFLEET and its members that we ask you to comply.

Promotions, and lack of same, without full disclosure to the parties involved also seems to be an issue that crops up frequently. Much misunderstanding falls prey to that hoary monster "Lack of Communication" which rears its ugly head in the form of dissatisfaction, disharmony and, if left unchecked, the eventual disintegration of a very good chapter.

A STARFLEET Chapter exists for the wishes of a majority of the members. While a CO may have been influential in starting a chapter, it is not his/her chapter, it is for the members. There are going to be individual differences about ideas and activities promotions seem to be a real touchy point). Just because one or two people are unhappy about a decision or policy does not justify a demand for a vote of confidence at the following meeting. It does mean that the officers and members may need to listen carefully, consider both (or three or four) sides of an issue, then decide what is best for the general membership. This decision may not be what the Captain really wants, but captains needs to realize that they are the representative leader of the club.

We are called "starships", but are in reality, local chapters of a fan club. Captains Kirk and Picard had the final say so on their ships, but even they listen and consider the opinions of those around them. You as chapter C.O.'s and X.O.'s must exercise tolerance and patience when dealing with members of your crew. You are here to be the "McCoy's" and "Gurnan's" and listen and guide people to the chapter's goals. Keep your ship and crew on the straight and narrow so that others can follow your example, not complain about your actions.

As Spock said in Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan "The needs of the many outweigh the needs of the few...or the one." On starships, as in life, sometimes just listening to the needs of the many and acting responsibly for the betterment of the whole is enough to avert misunderstanding and disaster. Only on rare extreme circumstances (as in Star Trek III) does the needs of one person outweigh the needs of the many.



Needless to say, the status of the STARFLEET Marine College has been a difficult situation to resolve with regards to whether it should stay with the STARFLEET Academy or be relocated under Starfleet Marines International(SMI). It seems that on any given day, the answer to this question would flip-flop back and forth. I, thus apologize for any inconvenience this ambivalence may have caused any member of STARFLEET or marine.

To arrive at a consensus of opinion, I have canvassed every member of the SFMC/SF Senior Command Staff and invited opinions as to which direction we should go. Interestingly, the vote was split evenly between the eight marines I contacted. It seems that many members of STARFLEET want the Marine College to STAY in the Fleet. Likewise, this opinion is shared by a number of ship captains. Therefore, it is my final decision that the Marine College stay with the STARFLEET Academy at this time since it appears to meet the needs and wishes of the greater membership

There are some key provisions that will change as part of the decision for the Marine College to stay in the Academy:

(1) The Marine College will continue to be administered by the present Commandant of the College - Joe Maurantonio. In essence, this aspect has not changed.

(2) All Marine College courses will be written and developed under Starfleet Marines International as part of the 'professional development' aspect of SMI. This is new! Having SMI write the college curriculum insures that all course work remains consistent from fan club to fan club. Otherwise, over time, differences may arise if courses are written from two or more sources. Joe Maurantonio will handle this function from a SMI level

(3) STARFLEET members will continue to use the SFA voucher system as required by STARFLEET Headquarters policy.

(4) By allowing the College to remain with the STARFLEET Academy, courses will continue to be recognized for the promotion of marine personnel both active and reserve.

(5) Support manuals and other technical materials will be written under the auspices of Starfleet Marines International, as previously planned by Don Jones.

The aforementioned statements should cover the majority of the points concerning the operation and administration of the Marine College. We realize the college is for YOUR benefit and professional development.



A STAR TREK VISION by Barbara Leonard

A curious thing happened to me this post October, an old flame was rekindled - my love for Star Trek. Friends and family who have known me for all these years give me that funny look as if to say, "You're still into that weird TV show?" When Star Trek first came into my life, I was about 13.

That was in 1972 when the show was in full syndication, being shown nightly at 5 PM, as for many of us everything came to a standstill for that hour, regardless of how many times I'd seen each episode I walked the halls of my high school imagining I was on the Enterprise. As a shy, introverted teenager, trying desperately to come to terms with my fleeting emotions, I adopted Spock as my mentor I perceived myself as an alien among humans, wanting to fin in, but harboring the need only in the deepest part of my heart.

Over the years that followed, my love for *Star Trek* waned. Never completely, but certainly with less of my youthful passion. I never missed a movie and caught the show whenever I could, but I wasn't "living" it, as I once had. Now it has come around again, and, as an adult, my view of our changing world, our changing universe, has matured. Why then does Star Trek beckon to me once again with so much fervor?

In STAR TREK IV: THE VOYAGE HOME Kirk describes earth in 1986 as having a "primitive and paranoid culture". I assure you his assessment in 1992 would not fare any better. I, for one, am deeply disturbed and pained by what's happening in our communities: increases in violence and drug use, the crisis within our families, our nation's economic instability; and my personal hopeless indifference towards political scandal alter political scandal.

My job in a youth service agency leads me to various locations throughout the state. Recently, while talking to a co-worker in Brooklyn, I was told that she has to personally escort our young people to our program because they are confronted by drug dealers in the neighborhood. A few nights earlier, a bomb went off on the block where she lives. The impact actually started her TV and "The Honeymooners" came on! In buffalo later that week, I overheard a woman telling an elderly man in the McDonalds that she urged her granddaughter not to go to the teen program in the community the night before. She was saving how relieved she was that the girl didn't go. The program location became the scene of a shootout later that night four youths were hospitalized for gunshot wounds. It isn't something the media is overdramatizing. It is happening in real people everyday in our world, in our nation, in our state. I can't help but wonder, what's happening to our civilization? Where are we headed?

And then there is *Star Trek. I* need to believe it is a vision for our future, not merely an escape. In the *Star Trek* universe there is hope. It conveys an evolution of ourselves that we love to tell about, where we use above our dangerousness and paranoia. Clearly, the 23rd and 24th Century is not without problems. Our friends have to contend with more than a light dose of violence, greed, and as depicted so well in *STAR TREK VI: THE UNDISCOVERED COUNTRY* hatred and racism. Perhaps the very thought that we survive is the consolation I so desperately need in my life today.

It is said that visualization is the first step in making a dream become a reality. My passion for *Star Trek* is about that vision. When I look at the stars in the night sky, I feel within my soul that it is our destiny. I'm not sure how or when, but I'm certain it is coming.

PROBING A CONTROVERSY

A controversy has arisen over Pocket Books latest hard cover novel PROBE. Apparently, the original manuscript drafted by Margaret Wander Bonanno was reyeeted by Paramount. Since Pocket Books already printed the dust jackets, the novel was re—wr1tten with the help ol Gene DeWeese. However, it is Margaret Bonannds name which appears on the lront cover. We interviewed Ms. Bonanno to discuss the release ol PROBE. Pocket Books declined to comment.

We have been receiving reports that the book PROBE recently released by Pocket Books was not actually written by you. Is this true?

I was amazed because it bears no resemblance to anything I wrote. On sheer word count, if you took every word I wrote and laid them back to back, they would come out to 7% of the manuscript - 25 pages out of 345. What they did finally after a whole year of taking it apart, throwing this out, putting that in and rearranging it, they forgot how the pieces worked anymore. So, they handed it off to Gene DeWeese, who is the only one who had the courage to put his name in the box on the copyright page, and he rebuilt a whole new book from my outline. It is extraordinary. It bears no resemblance to anything I wrote, It is a work of genius, but it ain't my book

Had you thought of having your name pulled off of the book?

Well, I went around about that. Basically, I handed the manuscript in December, 1990. It was apparently healthy enough to leave Pocket Books with approval to go out to Paramount. It came back from Paramount with instructions to "please delete the original characters that you used in Dwellers in the Crucible." Pocket said they needed the manuscript rewritten in six days I was given an insoluble problem. I couldn't do the rewrite in that time frame. Pocket handed it oft to a rewriter. Pocket knew I would squawk about keeping my name on it, because another writer had squawked over rewrites. Of course, that writer had the foresight to put a clause into her contract before hand I had no such clause. So, basically, Pocket let it be known that if I expected to get my contract money, I would have to sign an Addendum to the contract saying that I would keep my name on the book REGARDLESS of what happened to it afterwards. You know, I had a choice between having no money or having some money, so I signed this Addendum.

Did you get to see the rewrites before you signed the Addendum?

I signed the Addendum in January, but I did not get to see galleys until March, and at that point, it was still half mine. You could almost recognize some of the text as being something I had written. Basically, Paramount owns the copyright. Recently an article by SF writer Charles Platt in the February issue of *OMNI* magazine shed some light on this somewhat touchy subject. Apparently, Mr. Platt has entered into an agreement with a cryonics organization called Alcor, located near Riverside, California, to have his remains frozen in liquid nitrogen at the time of his death.

This process involves the writing of a will, signing certain legal documents and, of course, considerable cost. The current minimum fee is \$41,000 but the fee can be covered by a life insurance policy that makes Alcor the beneficiary.

Although there is a distinct possibility that the procedure will fail, the prospect of success is just as frightening. Being revived may be a painful process. There may be brain or tissue damage. Remember Challenger's shuttle craft Hipparcos, named after the Greek astronomer? Its twentieth-century predecessor, the first astronomy satellite launched by the European Space Agency, is doing well despite the long delay in

getting it into orbit.

The project took twenty years to develop and initially it was planned to measure 120,000 stars in a 2-year mission. It was finally launched in November 1989 with more modest ambitions. The first results are promising: accurate data on the positions, movements, and brightness of 18,000 stars. The project is slated to continue until the end of 1992. According to the ESA, Hipparcos is accurate enough to see a golf ball at the top of the Empire State Building from the Eiffel Tower, which is 3600 miles away.

On March 11th a bill was introduced in Congress that would allow NASA to start negotiating for the purchase of space hardware from the former Soviet Union, The purchase would be made without first getting a license form the State Department. Stated Representative Dick Zimmer, a Republican from New Jersey who introduced the bill, "This legislation would give NASA immediate access to a storehouse of some of the world's finest space material." Zimmer said some of the things up for sale include the Energia, the worlds most powerful rocket, and the backup of the Mir space station, the world's only existing space station. This also includes "airtime," should American astronauts decided to visit the station as well as replacement modules. (A call to Representative Zimmer's office stated it was not the Space Station itself)

NASA officials already are considering using Soviet Soyuz spacecraft as an emergency rescue craft that would be permanently docked at the US space station. The US space station is scheduled to be built late this decade.





An Interview With JEANNE DILLARD - Part II

Author, Star Trek and Science Fiction Novels

As reported in the last issue of the *Communique*, we had the opportunity to talk with Jeanne Dillard while she was appearing at the Vulkon Convention in Atlanta. Since many members of STARFLEET are amateur writers, we thought a little advice from a professional might inspire us.

What writing techniques do you use to get a book started and to keep the book going once it is started?

What happens to me is that I will get a germ of an idea. I plan all my books before I start writing them. I have this theory that a lot of the trouble with writers block comes because somehow your subconscious knows you haven't figured out the ramifications of the plot. So I tend to tell people to figure it all out first. You have to do that before you start, otherwise, you may have an unfinished novel. Stephen King was quoted in Writers Digest where he said, "I never do any outlines." But, he also said he had a bunch of unfinished manuscripts. See, he can afford to put those away. I have to be sure that the idea that I start working on is going to be something I can finish and develop

Once you finish the outline, do you then just write?

Then I say to myself, this is a scene I am going to do. Usually what I will do is plant the seed the night before by reflecting briefly for a few moments on the scene that I need to do the next day. Usually it resolves itself by morning. Either that or I will grab friends and say FIGURE OUT THIS LOGIC PROBLEM RIGHT NOW! HOW DO I GET THIS CHARACTER ONTO THE ROMULAN SHIP? It is sort of thing that I get it into the subconscious and usually by morning it is all figured out. But, then I have to force myself to produce. It depends on what my schedule is when I am writing. But I tell myself I must produce five pages a day. If I am doing this full time, I can certainly do at least that much. I take weekends off because I am doing this five days a week. While my husband is at work, I figure, I can take advantage of the lovely silence. Lately, I have been able write more than five pages a day. I used to have this mental block of doing more than five if I didn't have to. But now, I actually come up with ten a day. Usually, I get up first thing in the morning with my cup of coffee, take my lap top, and start. Sometime I write out by hand. I used to do everything by hand. I have all of Star Trek V and all of The Lost Years written out

How closely do you follow the outline that you put together?

I will follow the outline that I put together pretty darn close, except that I will always change something major, especially the ending. I am going to be giving a proposal to the people at Dell on this nest book. I have almost finished the proposal, and I know it is going to change radically from the ending I currently have. The original proposal for *The Lost Years* has a completely different ending. Especially where the Vulcan character, Sotek, is in the mind of the high priestess. I had no idea that was going to happen. It was not in the original proposal. I got to the scene, what an idiot I am, he has to be there. So that is the kind of stuff where your subconscious works things out. Your story will always change as you write it. But it is very important to know when you have enough to sustain the story. You can always figure out a better way to do it by the time you get to the end. However, you need to see if you have enough drama and enough pacing to sustain a story before you start it.

Do you every reach a lull?

Here is where I have problems. The part I really hate is when I am doing the development of an idea. When I cannot have a nice pile of pages at the end of the day. I hate the part when I am trying to dream up an idea. There I am sitting alone saying to myself, "I am working now. I am coming up with an idea now. Yes, I know I am going to figure out what happens at the end of this book." I have not figured out the ending for my new book, and it is driving me up the wall. But once I have an outline, the ball starts rolling. Once you do the first page that is. After nine books, I still find it incredible intimidating to write the first page and first chapter. There is nothing worse. So, I figure out a place to start, and start it. If it is total garbage. I will throw it out. Once I get started, everything becomes clearer.

A Conversation with GEORGE TAKEI

Star Trek VI; The Undiscovered Country was billed as the "last" movie. Since Sulu was given his own starship, how would you feel about continuing the movie series with the crew of the Excelsior?

Well, I think we should look back first of all on that question with the history of all the Star Trek movies Paramount has a habit, a congenial habit, of marketing every one of the movies as the "last" one. In the case of Star Trek: The Motion Picture, it was to be the only one - **THE** motion picture, that was it. It made a ton of money, and that's what persuaded them to do one sequel.

They announced it as the only sequel, and to emphasize the oneness of it, they killed off Spock. That was going to be the end of it. That was released, and that made more money than the first one!

Then, they started talking about a trilogy, which means three. You can't have four and have a trilogy, so the suggestion was that the third one was going to be the last one. Again, to underline the finality of Star Trek III, The Enterprise went down. that was released, end that made e ton of money, too. So they decided to do another last one, Star Trek IV, and so forth and so on.

Every one of them has been marketed as "the last one," so I would think Star Trek fans would look beyond Paramount's ploy. What determines "the last one" is the box office. This one [VI] is over \$72 million. I am reasonably confident it will go oyer \$75 million. The indicators are there with about \$75 million and a concerned letter writing campaign by the fans that we will have Star Trek VII! I must say that at the end of Star Trek VI there was a scene which shadowed the return of Captain Sutu!

Star Trek distinctly opened and closed doors with your acting career. Are you grateful to Sulu for "typecasting" your career?

for "typecasting" your career? My career hasn't been typecast. I mean, I've been very lucky in that respect Star Trek's a nice home to keep coming back to, and I know some of my colleagues have complained about that.

With me, I've got a picture out called Prisoners of the Sun, starring Bryant Brown and myself. It's out on video, incidentally, from Paramount Home Video! It's a powerful film, a much lauded film, and one that I'm very proud of. In that, I play a character that's not Sulu at all. It's if anything, it's a wide stretch. I've done another film which hopefully will be coming out later this year, *Return to the River Kwai*, in which I play a character that is totally different. I've been doing a lot of television guest spots. So, no, no, no, I'm far from being typecast Star Trek has opened up doors for a great many really challenging acting opportunities for me.

Last year, you did the controversial movie Prisoners of the Sun and Return to the River Kwai, plus a guest voice on The Simpsons, which certainly makes you a diversified actor. What does the future hold for you in Hollywood?

I've been doing a few other things. You use the word "diversified." I have at regular column in a magazine call *Transpacific*. I don't know if you get it here m the South or not, but it's a regular column. In the December issue, when Star Trek VI came out, my column was, on my 25 years with Star Trek. If any of you could gel a hold of that magazine, I kind of capsulize my quarter-century with Star Trek.

I'm very active in the political and civic arenas in Los Angeles. I've been involved eleven years on the Board of Directors of the Southern California Rapid Transit District. We're now under construction on the, what I call the "Star Trek Subway System" in Los Angeles The first leg



of which is now in operation in downtown Los Angeles and downtown Long Beach. The second phase is going to open next summer from downtown Los Angeles to McCarthy Park along Wilshire Blvd. I'm also on the Board of Directors of the Japanese-American National Museum, which is going to be opening on April 30th. As a matter of fact, my next column which appears in March is on the Japanese-American National Museum.

Speaking of my association with *Transpacific*, not only do I have my regular column in that magazine, but periodically, they send me to some Pacific Rim city to do travel pieces on it. In the March issue, there is also my story on Hong Kong. I was in Hong Kong last November for *Transpacific*, and in another issue, I did a piece on Seoul, Korea. But the March issue has my article on Hong Kong, as well as my column dealing with the Japanese American National Museum.

Several years ago, you co-wrote a novel with Robert Aspirin, and last year, you co-wrote one of the Star Trek comics with Peter David. Is writing just a hobby with you, or are you actively pursuing it as a career?

Well, as I said, I write a regular column and do the travel pieces for *Transpacific*. I get paid for it, so I fancy myself as a professional writer! I do enjoy fiction writing as well. Yes, when things slow down, if I'm not away every weekend, I just may take up my next fiction project.

But columns are easy to do. I can do them as I'm crossing from the West Coast to the East Coast. Travel pieces I enjoy doing because you get to visit cities that I would love visiting and then recording it and sharing it with my readers. So, yes, writing is both a hobby, a passion, an advocation, as well as a profession.

One of the things as an actor, not speaking specifically of Star Trek, is that you do a lot of traveling and a lot of theater appearances. I read of a play you did in Scotland a few years ago. Do you enjoy working in theater productions?

Theater is my true love I did a play last year - actually it started - in the fall of 1990 - in New York called *The Wash*. It ran for three months, then we brought it to Los Angeles where it played for another three months. Then I began work on Star Trek VI.

I've also performed, as you say, at the Edinburgh Festival in Scotland in a play titled *Undertow* which the BBC bought. They've been trying to get it done as a movie. They gave me a start date on the film of November of last year, and then they pushed it bank to January. Now they were talking about April, but as April gets closer, it's getting real wobbly. Apparently, the recission in Britain is even worse than in the United States. I think it's a depression in Britain. And so, they have been having their difficulties in getting wok on the film version of Undertow started.

Some of the original cast have been approached about doing appearances on The Next Generation. What would future Star Trek appearances have to have to keep you interested?

Some of my colleagues from my generation made guest appearances on The Next Generation, but they've all made their appearances as old, dried up, shrivelled up, baggy, saggy, fright wigged old men. And I don't want to see Sulu appear like that. So what I've suggested to Rick Berman is, since we've demonstrated in Star Trek IV the ability of slingshooting back in time to the 20th century, there's no reason why we can't do that in reverse and slingshot forward in time a few decades. Captain Sulu could appear

as I am right now, without all that makeup appliance, whitening of the hair, and all that drying up, pruning up process by makeup.

Whoopi Goldberg asked that Nichelle Nichols to do an appearance as Guinan's grandmother, a completely different character than what she did as Uhura. If they created a totally new character, a new concept, would you be interested in doing that?

Would I play a different character on The Next Generation? They've never discussed that with me, so this is a new idea that you're suggesting. I haven't thought of it. I don't know. As an actor, I would feel it a challenge because I'd have to certainly create a character totally different from Sulu. Yeah, I think that would be an interesting challenge. I would enjoy that.

Several months ago, we lost Gene Roddenberry, who had an obvious impact on your career and your life, When you look hack and see the name Gene Roddenberry, what do you remember about him?

It's not the name Gene Roddenberry. but the person Gene Roddenberry He was so many things to me, a person who gave my career a whole new kind of energy.

He was my mentor, he was a dear friend, he was a counselor, he was a guide, and he was my inspiration. He was all those things. He really was a very extraordinary human being. Very few people are blessed with having a person like that play a part in one's life. I feel very very lucky to have been able to share a part of my life with him and have him share a part of his life with me.

Star Trek VI gave advance to Captain Sulu and gave him his own command. What was your overall opinion of the movie?

High time, high time! Much too tardy, I think, frankly! It's the best Star Trek movie yet, be far, head and shoulders! There's a whole galaxy of difference between Star Trek VI and the others.

And the last question, do you feel you have lived long and prospered?

We've lived much longer than we ever anticipated! Yes, we have prospered in many, many more ways than the obvious. The riches have been in terms of human relationships, in terms of opportunities, in terms of growth, and the opportunity to gain friends, people, ideas, and hopefully, wisdom.

writer Isaac Asimov died April 6, 1992 of heart and kidney failure He was 72)

He wasn't there when the original series was conceived. He never scripted an episode or a movie. He was never involved with a Trek fan club. He had nothing to do with the birth of the Next Generation. Yet, for all that Isaac Asimov had almost as much to do with my getting involved in Star Trek fandom as any of the people who did such things.

Assuming you haven't lived under a rock for the last 40 or 50 years (and if you did, how did you ever learn of Star Trek?), you've heard of Dr. Asimov. A science fiction writer with his roots firmly plated in sf's "Golden Age," he was one of the best-known, and most prolific, practitioners of that era's style, with an incredible number of short stories to his credit as well as several series of novels including the I, Robot and Foundation books, His literate, readable works were usually involved in nature but straightforward in approach, often featuring intelligent, scientific "men of action" as protagonists. With a degree in biochemistry, he was also acclaimed as a master of science fact, with considerable talent for making science accessible to the intelligent, if scientifically ignorant, lavman.

I first met him in a junior high library, 20 years ago. While the encounter may not have affected his life, it made changes in mine that have lasted to this day

Having recently made a clean getaway from a parochial elementary school with a very small library, I looked forward to making the acquaintance of the very much larger version my new school afforded. As an avid reader, I wanted to find some authors whose work I'd never encountered before. But where to start? Being a methodical, if eccentric, child, I decided to go through the fiction section alphabetically beginning with "A." Of course, I hoped to find an author with a large body of work, so if I liked what I read I could go back and get more.

Well, you can guess whose name came up, and I shot through the Bicentennial Man and Nightfall story collections like a guided missile. The Gods Themselves came next on the reading list, and the Foundation books (only

(Authors note; Famed science and science fiction a trilogy then) proved an intricate and marvelous delight. It was my first real exposure to science fiction - and what a treat it was! Enough so that my next literary jump was to the "C's," and Arthur C. Clarke (The library didn't have any Ben Bova. I found him later.) While I still enjoyed reading historical and detective fiction, science fiction shot to the top of my reading list, and stayed there. I'd found a literature of ideas, a literature of hopes and dreams and aspirations, and I loved it.

> Not too long after this, a local TV station started syndicating Star Trek, Well, shoot, that was sf, wasn't it? I figured it was worth a look.

> Sure was. You might say the rest is history, but there's a little more to the story than that. You see, in the introductions to his books and short stories, Dr. Asimov had described for me the wonderful, idiosyncratic, unique world of sf fandom, and the amateur writers it fostered. The picture he painted made it sound like a pretty nifty place. Someplace a bright, quirky teen like me, with a taste for words and wordcrafting, might fit in.

> But, even after three or four years of concentrated reading, my sf background really wasn't very strong. And certainly not strong enough to qualify me as a hardcore sf fan. Besides, by this time I'd developed quite a taste for that particular permutation of sf called Star Trek. Might Star Trek fandom have a place for me?

> Sure did. I had a short but intense fling with ST fandom in the late 70's/early 80's, and felt more at home there than I'd ever felt anywhere else. I got busy for a few years there, and lost touch with fandom for a while, only to fall for it even harder in the late 80's, Since then, I've been more active - and have written more - than at any other time in my life. For the most part, I've also been happier.

> But, though I've gotten away somewhat from Dr. Asimov and the "Golden Age" sf to which he introduced me, I've never forgotten that it was him, some 20 years ago, who first set my foot on the fannish path I now walk.

> From a ST fan and a sf fan. Thank you, Dr. Asimov. And prosper.

STARFLIGHT II: TRADE ROUTES OF THE CLOUD NEBULA

Without a doubt, this is the best space exploration game I've ever played. Although it's difficult and takes a long time to complete, if you're looking for the most indepth. realistic computer simulation of exploring strange new worlds, seeking out new life and new civilizations, and boldly going where none have gone before, this is the best way that I can think of. Although hardly new (released in 1989), it is still available in many stores or through mail order companies.


In the game, you take the role of a starship commander for Interstel, a Starfleet-ish organization which has ordered you and similar starship crews to get to the root of a mystery. The Spemin, a race of sentient blobs that once posed about as great a threat as a pack of Paklids, have suddenly acquired a powerful new technology and are threatening to enslave the universe. Having just discovered the mysterious sector of space where this technology was gained, you and your fellow starships (who give you next to no aid in your mission) are to thoroughly explore the entire region, exploring planets and making relations with the local alien races in the hopes of gathering enough information to prevent all the sentient races of the universe from serving mucous cocktails to Spermin slavelords! Sound like fun?

The vastness of the sector will astound you. There are about 60 star systems, with over 500 planets in all. (You don't have to explore ALL of them, but it IS possible!) Over time, you must tram your crew in the fine arts of starship operations and upgrade your ship to be better equipped for transversing the void and for dealing with hostile races. Not all aliens are your enemies in this game - far from it. Aside from the five different races that can comprise your crew, there are about 30 or so types of aliens that live in the sector, each with its own language, customs, trading style, and secrets. There are a race of Ferengi-type traders called the Humna, a group of perpetually depressed beings called the Dweenie, a violent warrior society known as the G'Nunk, a race of living computers called the Grozek, and a race of humanoid birds called the Mbe just to name a few. As you establish relations, good or ill, with these races, They'll be more likely to tell you what they know about the Spemin mystery.

Visually, this game falls a bit short, and that is my only real complaint On planets, the variety of non-intelligent lifeforms like plants and animals that you can capture and analyze all look sort of alike. You need to use a command called "describe" when you encounter something, or else you run the risk of confusing a harmless Pop Berry Plant with a deadly Stinging Cone Creature Encounters with other ships are similar; unless you deliberately order your science officer to scan them, all of the ships just look like blobs. There are, however, some nice graphics scenes. If you have VGA, ship-toship communications look spectacular. I was once talking with an Alien captain, and through the mist surrounding his bridge I could see his first and second officers giving me dirty looks! Scenes looking out your viewscreen while orbiting planets can be breathtaking (again, VGA is best), and the SD perspective as you land is nothing short of stunning.

A major plus of this game is the open-ended storyline. You can proceed in any direction that you wish. There is no time limit, and there are no "off limits" until you do a certain thing as is the case with many adventure games. You do, however, have to train your crew well

before you progress too far. An inept communications officer mis-interprets alien messages. Untrained science officers can't tell an ice world from a gas giant. Inexperienced navigators get you lost, and if your doctor is too "green", then you can kiss your crew goodbye if they ever get injured. Likewise, the better ship you have, the more likely you can survive travel in Nebulae, battles with alien warships, and other sticky situations. All of this takes money, but the end results are impressive. A starmap is built into the game, to make plotting courses easier. There's even some humor added in, like an II, you don't need to have played Starflight I prior to this exchange of messages that you can monitor at starbases game. between an officer and a loan shark.

In conclusion, this game is great, but absolutely NOT for the faint of heart. There is almost no straight "shootem-up" action its all careful planning, exploring, mapping, trading, mining, selling, buying, planning, exploring, etc. On a scale of 1 - 10 (10 being the best), this game gets a 9.2. Superb in almost every way. This is THE best tool for all of us armchair starship commanders and explorers everywhere, no matter what planet we hail from!


