Lemme hear you say ... hey now...

Hiya Fleet fans—it's eleventh hour crunch time here at *Communiqué* HQ. Everyone's hard at work on yet another thrill-packed issue of the STARFLEET Newsmagazine. I'm sure it conjures up mental pictures of happy dedicated workers, not unlike the "We Are Santa's Elves" sequence in the CBS holiday classic *Rudolph*, *the Red-Nosed Reindeer*. Actually, it more often resembles one of the more chilling passages of Dante's *Inferno*, with twisted sweat soaked bodies writing in agony, while brutal taskmasters apply the lash. Yet, somehow, through it all, we remain dedicated to the STARFLEET vision keepin' the dream alive.

Anyway, let me put my whip aside for a moment and discuss a few areas of concern.

Two or three weeks after each Communiqué mailing I start to receive "missing issue" letters. These usually read "Everyone else in my chapter got their Communiqué except me - can you please send me one?" or "You thieving creeps you've cheated me for the last time!" Luckily, 99% of the inquiries read like the first one, but the problem is the same. Occasionally, for various reasons, members don't receive an issue they're entitled to. If you're one of those people. I sympathize with you - I really do. Back in the mid-80's I went through a four-year period where I received exactly two Communiqués! Of course, I think STARFLEET only produced about two issues then, but that's another story. Missing issues are a recurring problem and, because of myriad of reasons, one that we will probably always have. However, let me explain how the Communiqué is mailed out, and maybe we can alleviate some of the more solvable problems.

Every other month, when we take the master pages of the printer for the current issue, we also take along a box of mailing labels. On these labels are the names and addressed of every STAR-FLEET member/family entitled to receive that mailing. In most instances, those labels were printed about one week prior, so we are using the most up-to-date list available. The *Communiqué* mailing labels are printed in Texas by RADM Clayton Melanson, our Fleet Computer Chief. For those of us in the *Communiqué* offices, this is our *only* brush with the membership roster. Remember that - it will be important later.

Our crack printing team at Printing Concepts (a free plug for Ron and the gang) then takes our master pages, that issue's photos, and any advertising art, and begins the process of assembling a Communiqué. They do the necessary photo work, make printing plates, and in a few days I go in to approve a dummy copy of CQ. After making sure all the photos are in the right place and checking for unforeseen "weird things" the issue goes to press. The mailing labels are affixed to the mailing cover by machine during the printing process. As the issues are folded, staples, and trimmed, they are bundled up for deliver to the post office. When I come in to pick up the extra copies, the *Communiqué* is already in the mail.

If you are not receiving your *Communiqué* or are having problems getting them or know someone who is, please check the following items.

- 1. Has your membership expired? This one slips by more than you might think. Your expiration date is found on your mailing label.
- 2 Have you recently moved? With every mail ing, we get about 40-50 Communiqués re turned marked "Moved - no forwarding ad dress" " Attempted Not Known" and "Return to Sender." We try to list missing members to that they can receive the Communiqués they paid for, but if we don't know where they are. we can't send them anything. Also, on a purely practical side, it's a waste of the Fleet's money to mail out Communiqués that just get send back. If you move, please send address cor rections to the Chief of Computer Operations, 3510 Willow Ridge, Arlington, TX 76017. DO NOT send address corrections to the Com muniqué. We do not have access to the Fleet data base and cannot make corrections. Re member what I said earlier - our only contact with the membership roster is via the CQ mailing labels. Also, if you move, be sure to notify your local post office. If you do, the will be happy to forward your mail for at least three months. So if you don't notify STAR FLEET right away, you'll still get your Communiqué.
- 3. Is your address correct on the mailing label? If a street or city name is misspelled, you are at the mercy of the experience of your local mail carrier - if he or she is familiar with the area, they will often delver mail to addresses that are wildly incorrect. However, if you get a new mail carrier..... Again, send any correc tions to the Chief of Computer Operations.
- 4. When did you renew your membership? Unfortunately, some members renew their memberships during that grey period between the time the mailing labels are printed and when the Communiqué is actually mailed. These members are entitled to that issue, but do not appear on the main mailing list. We do receive a second set of labels that include these names, and those issues are sent separately at a later date. If you don't receive your Communiqué when everyone else in chapter does, it may be due to this reason.

Our staff puts a lot of work into this magazine

and it is very frustrating for us to hear that someone didn't receive an issue. If you did not receive your copy of the Communiqué, please write to us at the Communications office, and we will be happy to send you out a copy. Please allow a sufficient amount of time (2-3 weeks) after a mailing to ascertain that you have missed an issue. The Post Office is a mysterious place where many unusual things can and do happen.

Letters - we get letters. Some of you are expressing concern that the "Dear STARFLEET" section of the Communiqué is starting to resemble the snake found on the computer BBS. While I don't think we have degenerated into guite the venomous hate-fest that some ST networks have become, I am somewhat concerned that the tone of the letters we receive on Fleet matters is taking on an increasingly negative and petty focus. When we assumed the editorship of the CQ, we wanted to allow Fleet members to be able to express themselves freely and an open letters column seemed to be the best way to do that. I did not want the Communiqué to be a rah-rah rag for the current administration, but rather a forum for the members. Honest and constructive criticism is vital to any thriving organization and we have no problem with that. Before you dash off an open letter to the Fleet (and that is what "Dear STAR-FLEET" is - an open letter to your fellow Fleet members) be ready to accept responsibility for what you are saying. If you accuse ADM Jones of doing something wrong, you should expect ADM Jones to respond to what you are saving. Indeed. ADM Jones has a right to respond to your criticism. I would also like to see a conscious effort to refrain from character assassination and innuendo. We have had to edit or not even print some letters because the author got carried away in the vilification of their intended target. Remember that STARFLEET is a volunteer organization and people are only human. Everyone makes mistakes and are prone to lapses in judgment. Please show a little consideration and understanding for your fellow members before you start pointing fingers. After all, as Trek fans, we're supposed to be a little more tolerant of others.

The *Communiqué* is *your* forum. Use it wisely. I try to use a light touch in editing your material and try to remain editorially impartial. We do our best to verify some of the more questionable observations of our correspondents, but until the Fleet allots us a bigger budget (or *any* budget), for that matter) to afford to conduct *A Current Affair* type investigative reporting, we make so with what we got.

That's all folks, as always, thanks for the overwhelming abundance of articles. Its appreciated and we'll see you next issue.



A truly successful community service presentation should be three fold. It should create a sense of purpose for the crew. It should be profitable for the intended purpose. It must be visible to the public, presenting the ship in a positive manner. The presentation need not be vast in size, but if the idea has enough merit, it may take on a life of it's own.

STARFLEET Jr. ACADEMY (SJA) as presented by the USS Jeannette Maddox, NCC-14514 has indeed proven to have a life of it's own. It seems to fulfill each of the aforementioned goals, as a bonus!

Starting with an initial "bean bag" type game, presented for Special Olympics (at the ships own expense), SJA now consists of 6 departments. These include "Tribble Trouble", "Q-Ball", "Quarks' Ferengi Controller", "Tribble aoption", "Worfs' Predicament", and "Data's Dilemma.

SJA is a series of games designed test a cadets aptitude in various areas. Some of these SJA "tests" are complex commercial arcade games that have been revamped with the Trek mythos. An example of these would be our "Tripple* Adoption". This commercial game is known as claw or crane game. As an Academy test, the cadet must try to pick up a Tripple* and transport it to a safe zone. If successful, the cadet wins the Tripple, not an easy task.

(* A Tripple is a genetically engineered Tribble. The Tribble has been banned from interplanetary travel due to it's ability to procreate by itself. Thanks to work by the *Maddox* scientists, the Tripple is now very popular across the universe

and very safe on all planets as they not require three (3) to multiply. Hence the name, Tripples.) After several tries, the machine is opened up and the cadet is shown a maze of wires, switches, computer chips and finally the dial that controls the claw. We explain that games like these, the ones in front of every "WalMart" across the country, are there because they take your money and deliver a prize very seldom. Hopefully the cadet will be less apt to bug

mom for money to play the games every time they go to the store. The cadets have a great time and the sponsors love the concept.

Other games are original adaptations of popular carnival games, such as the game of Tic Tac Toe. Our adaptation is known as "Data's Dilemma". Instead of tossing the balls into the target, they must be rolled. Terms involving trajectory and rebound seem to thrill the cadets.

SJA is usually presented at an existing even. A sponsor pays

our fee based on how long the academy will run and how many events there will be. Typically, this would be \$600 for five games for 4 hours.. Each cadet receives a Certificate of Achievement, a *Maddox* Communicator Pin, and discount food coupons supplied by cooperating vendors. Other prizes like Trek photo buttons, Tripples and Ferengi Friendship bracelets may also be won.

Much of the equipment used in these presentations is from a rental source but have been "revamped" in a Star Trek theme. After a SJA presentation, we take the facade off and return the game to the company. The original adaptations are owned by the ship. While more simple in operation, they have proven to be just as popular as the more complex commercial games.

Some presentation of SJA may be free to the public. The sponsor may use SJA to help attract customers to a larger event. Others may have a charge, ranging from \$1.00 to \$2.50. This happens when they are used as a fund raining event for a specific charity and all ticket costs become donations to that charity. The *Maddox* policy is to collect tickets, be we do not directly sell the tickets. In addition, a ship's store is available to sell and desired prize not won in the academy tests.

Upon completing each of the tests, the cadet proceeds to the graduation ceremony. Each certifi-

I believe the graduation ceremony, as designed by Senior Petty Officer Leddon, to be the key part of the entire conference. (Leddon staunchly refuses an officers rank. He is proud to let everyone know "he works for a living!".)

This year SJA will collect fees in excess of \$4,000 benefiting our charities and ship's operations. In each case another charity additionally benefited from the presentation. It had proven to be so popular, we have had to limit out presentations to one per month.

I recommend your ship consider STARFLEET Jr, Academy as a possibility. If you would like more information about setting up your own SJA, write CAPT Christine Leddon, 2724 S Seneca #C11, Wichita, KS. 67217. Please send a stamped, self addressed, legal size envelope.

Remember. If your ship is reaching out to the community through service work, let us know about your success. Be sure to include crew pictures. Other ships can build on your ideas. Make a difference, Make it so!

Currently, the most important item to ShOC is the absence of many shuttles' Department of Technical Services letter. We cannot put our seal-of-approval on shuttles waiting to become ships until we have your DTS letter, so to any shuttles who still haven't sent us copies of your DTS letter, please do so! Also note that ShOC will not approve future applicants as shuttles unless we have a DTS letter with their VRR (RC's and ship captains take note!)

To clarify some confusion which has arisen recently, we are now asking shuttles to use the Date field in you Shuttle Status Report to specify the month and year for which the report is being filed. For example, if you are filling out a report for December, 1993, enter 12/93, rather than the date on which you are filling out the report. Remember reports are due 15 days after the end of the month for which they are to be filed (December, 1993 reports are due January 15, 1994 for example.)

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Finally we would like announce that ShOC has the ability to send out both fax and email in addition to standard U.S. mail. Therefore, if you submit a question on your Shuttle Status Report to which you would like a rapid reply, please include either a fax number or Internet email address along with the question. Please do this on each report for which such a question is asked, as we will not be keeping a database of fax numbers or email addresses.

Attending the Academy should be a rewarding experience. I've been talking to a lot of Fleet folk lately, looking for ways to tailor CFS and make it more interesting and challenging for your. Here's what your have told me.

"Are any colleges based on just televised Trek and the movies?"

"I can't afford to buy all those novels!"

"It's no fun taking a test you can't finish because you don't have the books!"

I went back and looked at my CFS exams through your eyes. The 23rd Century/TOS bachelor's and master's tests make use of written resources like *Mr. Scott's Guide to the Enterprise, The Worlds of the Federation,* and some of the Pocket Books novels. The 24th Century/TNG bachelor's and master's are 99% based on televised Trek (there's just one exam question that isn't). The Ph.D. exam, on both the 23rd and 24th centuries for a "Professor of the Humanities" degree, pulls 20% of its material from written Trek.

My first response to that summary is, with just three seasons of TOS episodes, it's necessary to use written resources to fill out a complete course and make it substantial. But, as I think about it now, that's not necessarily true. And with six-plus seasons of TNG episodes, the 24th Century alone is very rich in life and detail.

While the wealth of written Trek we have today is great and can really deepen a reader's appreciation and enjoyment of the Trek universe, it's not for everyone. The average fan today is a fan because of the episodes and movies. That's where you started. The books and tech manuals and fanzines came later, if at all. I know that's where I started. And the novels and other materials I found were a delight, especially when there was no other Trek to be found. When I began to develop CFS, it was natural to me to pull from those sources. I didn't think twice about it.

Thank you for making me think.

It's always been my intention to revise the College of Federation after Next Generations' last season, to make use of all the new information that's been revealed since CFS was created after five TNG seasons. With your input, I'll still be revising all the tests. However, version 2.0 of CFS will be **based solely on Trek episodes and movies.**

You took the time to let me know, and your comments have helped me learn how to make CFS more of what you're looking for when you come to the Academy. The College of Federation Studies was created to be fun and to challenge your Trek knowledge, not to be frustrating and exclusive to those who can afford to invest in all the myriad resources available to Trek enthusiasts.

In the meantime, CFS is here for your enjoyment and entertainment. Hundreds of cadets have enrolled this past year and found something they liked. It's possible to succeed with exception scores even if you don't like access to written scores even if you don't have access to written Trek resources. (No one has even come close to washing out!)

I encourage you to communicate with the directors of Academy colleges you attend or are

interested in. Let them know what you enjoy. Let them know if you have problems. One thin I discovered when I started to work on CFS is that there are no manuals, no guidelines for new Academy directors to help them avoid traps and pitfalls, or even to let them know what to expect from cadets! All there is to go on is personal experience, and everyone's experience is different.

Each SFA college is developed from a private vision, by a volunteer who invests a lot of time and resources to create something new. That "something new" is for you, the members of STAR-FLEET. Without feedback from you, a director never quite knows if he or she succeeded.

I look forward to welcoming many of you into the College of Federation Studies in the months ahead. As soon as the last serial episode of TNG is broadcast, watch your *Communiqué*' for news of changes at CFS to meet *your* needs.

That's what you've been telling me, and that's what we'll do.

P.S. Many, many fans have written me to ask if I will be including *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine* among the courses at CFS in "24th Century Studies." I know that just one season had produced volumes of information about the Ferengi, the Bajorans, the Cardassians and the surrounding universe. But it has only been *one* season. It took me *five* seasons to be comfortable that I had

enough material to develop courses on *The Next Generation!* And believe me, I have my hands full with Classic and TNG right now. I think I'll leave the challenge of devising the next Academy course to another creative soul out there. I'm sure it will be a good one...but you might want to wait just a bit longer!

By-Laws Revision Update:

To all Fleet members who sent in suggestions for the Revised By-Laws, thank you! On any single point, I now have about a dozen perspectives. This is extremely helpful in drafting the new Constitution, but please understand if not all viewpoints end up being expressed in the draft which is ultimately sent to the Admiralty Board. Sometimes, a balance will have to be struck, and, where appropriate or necessary, entire viewpoints will not find expression in the draft precisely in order to ensure a balance. To quote the Kirk-Unit, "C'est la vie."

By the way, you may have noticed in the previous paragraph that I have used "By-Laws" and "Constitution" interchangeably. That is because, in parliamentary parlance, the terms are interchangeable. I think some Fleet members might be confusing "By-Laws" with "Standing Rules" or "Regulations" or "Operations Manual". It is my understanding that a Starfleet Operations Manual is also in the works - the product of a separate committee - and that this document will discuss such things as ranks, promotional guidelines, ship and shuttle protocols, and other "operational" details of the Fleet in the Star Trek sense. The By-Laws [or Constitution], on the other hand, will lay out the basic parliamentary framework of Starfleet. Hopefully, then, the By-Laws [or Constitution] will be concise (i.e., short).

The Good Lord willing, the draft By-Laws/ Constitution will be sent out to the AB on Monday, November 1st. The debate/amendment process will undoubtedly take several months, so it may not be until the Summer of '94 before the By-Laws/Constitution is referred out of the AB to the general membership. In that regard, I would urge patience upon you all.

Tax/Finances Update:

Here, patience may be rewarded. We may have a solution worked out to this problem, but it will take some considerable accountant's fees (given the state of the records, at least double the previous estimate), and some **very** delicate negotiations with the governmental authorities. Because of the delicacy of these negotiations, I really can't say any more than that, except I would urge *everyone* not to listen to or spread any gossip or rumors about this matter. We *are* working things out, and I am pleased to report that litigation is **NOT** an option. Be calm, and there will be peace.

WorldCon Report

The occasion was the WorldCon '93 "Birds of a Feather" [i.e., "break-out" meetings of like-minded

science fiction groups, usually away from the main convention premises] gathering of STAR-FLEET and KAG at the World Science Fiction Convention in San Francisco. From a temporal and geographic standpoint, it was more specifically on Sunday, September 5th, in the White Pearl Room of the Hotel Nikko (which, by the way, is a healthy walk from the principal convention site, the Moscone Center).

Members of the STARFLEET Headquarters Staff, as in Rob and Kim Lerman, Admiral Timmy and yours truly (as "J.A.G. Officer – West," but in Marine livery as well, consistent with holding a reserve commission as a major – Semper Fi!), had journeyed to San Francisco on the Sunday of WorldCon '93 to "Meet the Fleet," which rendezvous had been orchestrated and organized by Alyson Dyar [loud cheers and applause].

Officers and crew members from Alliance, Atreides, Carson [Region 17 – Sun Valley, NV], Defiance, Highroller [also Region 17 – and also Sun Valley, NV], Nautilus [Region 15 – Rocky Hill, CT], Notorious, Simonov, Stellar Wind, Thurgood Marshall [New Orleans, LA – not currently a registered STARFLEET shuttle or ship] and others, a total of 16 Federation types in all, had a most cordial "get together," with high volumes of information being exchanged and computer "tech-ese" being spoken.

Then someone mentioned that KAG was also scheduled to have a break-out meeting of its own. and that QelDas was on premises. "I have a wicked thought," said FADM. Lerman with a mischievous grin, and what followed was a flawlessly executed operation that took QelDas zantai-QlavaG (recently promoted Admiral of the Western Fleet, Klingon Assault Group) completely by surprise. All of the STARFLEET personnel formed a flving squad, neutralized QelDas' retainers and minions with only a brief exchange of phaser and disrupter fire, and served the new Klingon admiral with an arrest warrant formally signed by FADM Rob Lerman and attested by Fleet Captain Alan L. Ravitch, visiting Region 15 Coordinator and member of the STARFLEET Admiralty Board.

The warrant was drawn up to enforce the payment of "war reparations" due Big Brothers and Big Sisters following the STARFLEET Marine Corps (SFMC) rout of KAG at the Battle of ShuttleCon. The Marines, you see, had raised \$119.00 for Big Brothers and Big Sisters to bond the arrest of QelDas at ShuttleCon, but KAG never came up with the matching "bail" money. In its daring daylight raid on the KAG meeting at WorldCon, then, STARFLEET issued a "gentle reminder" to QelDas about the "tribute" KAG owes to Big Brothers and Big Sisters.

And what was QelDas' response to being served with the warrant? "Sutai? Is there a 'QelDas sutai-QlavaG' present? I don't think so." Apparently, the warrant had the wrong honorific (the drawer of the warrant – a certain J.A.G. officer who shall remain nameless – had been unaware of QelDas' promotion to admiral at the time). "That's okay," said the officer service the warrant, recovering brilliantly, "you match the description." This was aside from the fact that everyone in the room knew who QelDas was in any event.

Nice try, zantai, but as Theodore Roosevelt was wont to say, "Why spoil the beauty of the thing with legalities?"

After QelDas got "ketched good," she and her KAG colleagues invited Fleet to join their meeting, and what followed was a living demonstration of the highest principles of IDIC. Through the dynamic of a joint meeting, the two clubs discovered how truly interdependent they really are, and how "playing" with each other enables both groups to flourish much more so than if they were aloof toward, or allowed themselves to become insulated from, each other. Underneath the turtle heads and body armor are Star Trek fans, too, who laugh and joke and make fun of themselves "just like the Feddies do." It was a wonderful, enlightening, eye-openings experience, to be sure, one which portends of even more intense, goodhearted "fun" between STARFLEET and KAG.

STARFLEET Armed Forces Advocacy Program by CAPT Paul C. Dyl, Director

Greetings, I am Paul Dyl, the new director of the STARFLEET Armed Forces Advocacy Program. In July I was appointed by FADM Rob Lerman to create a program which I had suggested in which would assist STARFLEET and its members who currently serve in this nations Armed Forces.

This assistance ranges from creating military STARFLEET chapters to a pen pal service for the Armed Forces, to a data base that would help track STARFLEET members who lose contact due to military deployments to normal ETS or PCS moves. This would also serve the membership to locate any chapters in the new movement locations.

The program will also assist in policies in STARFLEET that could affect the member due to military service. This ranges from chapter CO's who fail to meet the one year requirement to retain the rank of Captain due to Permanent Change of Station (PCS) orders to automatic extensions to registered Fleet members in the Armed Forces Program for STARFLEET Academy, to Chapters whose membership is made up of military to adjust their reporting each month due to military deployments.

The program will also have a bi-monthly newsletter in which will recognize the activities of Starfleet members in the Armed Forces and their chapters.

The program is organized into five sections; The HQ section which contains the Director and Assistant Director; Army Affairs; Naval Affairs; Marine Affairs; Air Force Affairs; and Coast Guard Affairs. The National Guard and Reserves will fall under their respective branch assignment.

What must you do to register in the program? You first must be a current STARFLEET member and currently serve in one of the above mentioned services. The next step is to send a SASE to me with your name, address, branch of service, and phone # if applicable to me at: 8G Rhine Rd., Ft. Bragg, NC 28307-5100. I will then send you an information packet and registration form so that I can add you to the data base and contact the service branch chief so that they may contact you. There is NO COST to be registered in this program, and only sending SASE's for the newsletter is required.

If you qualify so far and you are interested in becoming one of the service chiefs, then send me a brief resume on your STARFLEET background and your military background. I will be accepting the applications until November 30th.

So if you're in the United States Armed Forces, then stand up and be counted!





Mailing frequencies open....

It's hard to believe that summer is over and Christmas in just around the corner. Each year it seems like Christmas decorations appear earlier and earlier. This year I actually saw some out before Labor Day! Of course I was waiting for the store to open the first day the new Enterprise ornament went on sale....ah, but I digress and you all probably want to hear about stamps.

The reporting period of August and September was another good one with ships sending in almost 12 pounds of stamps. For all you new shuttles out there that are wondering what I'm talking about here's the scoop.

STARFLEET Stampede is a community service program sponsored by STARFLEET International. STARFLEET members save canceled postage stamps, trim and sort them and send them to a central location to be sold to stamp dealers. The funds raised go to two charities. UNICEF and ASAP. Stamps should be trimmed with between 1/4 and 1/2 inch paper left on all sides. They should be sorted in groups of foreign, commemorative. love. definitive. and postcards (left whole). We have tried to sell Christmas stamps too, but there is just no market for them so those are being dropped from the list. If your ship or shuttle has not gotten the info packet on Stampede or you need another one please let me know. As always, SASE's are appreciated.

I get a lot of notes with the stamps I receive and ideas on what various chapters are doing with their stamp drive. I will be including a "Hint of the Month" In each Communiqué so send me your ideas. This issue our hint comes from Rene Boles of the USS Hawkeye. Rene writes, "I have an idea. You know how hard it is to find stamps with a 1/4" of paper all the way around? I'm very conscious of where I put stamps on envelopes and I'm sure you are too. Wouldn't it be nice if everyone in STARFLEET placed their stamps a little more "down and to the left" on the envelopes? Certainly we can when sending something to another member. Whenever we pay a bill or send in a catalog order we should assume a STARFLEET member may be working at the destination and going through the trash or recycle bins for stamps." Thanks Rene and good thinking. OK, all together now, "Down and to the Left"!

There are a couple of things I would like to pass on. First of all I notice that a lot of you are paying first class postage to send me your stamps. I appreciate the gesture but this is not necessary. There is no cut-off time as Stampede is an ongoing project so third class/parcel post or whatever is the lease expensive is fine. (Of course if you have LOTS of extra money I cheerfully accept cash, checks and money orders.) Secondly, I hear a lot of people talk about finding uncanceled stamps. I want to be very clear that it is not legal to reuse postage stamps that have gone through the mail. If you put a stamp on an envelope then never mail it or receive an SASE that you can't use it's OK to soak off the stamp and reuse it. Stampede doesn't sell uncanceled stamps and if you are ever approached by someone offering to do so contact your postmaster or postal inspector immediately. This kind of transaction is against the law and I'm sure Captain Decker would not be happy if he had to transport across the country and bail you out – right Gary?!

Since Christmas is coming up please remember that those bright red, green and blue envelopes used for Christmas cards can't be used for Stampede. The colors will tint the stamps. Also I must regretfully ask that you no longer save Christmas stamps. There is just no market for them and I haven't been able to sell what I have collected. We raise the most money from Foreign, Commemorative and Love stamps. We now have a buyer for intact stamped postcards so add that to your list.

Valsalva. The prize for the most stamps sent in for this report goes to the Shuttle Continum in Pensacola, FL. They sent in almost three pounds of stamps. Congrats and a Stampede t-shirt is on its way to you and your crew.

Dear Communiqué,

I hope that Dan will have a word with the people producing these shirts and ask them to desist. While everybody has their faults, all the candidates who sought the office of Fleet Commander were paragons of virtue and propriety compared to the sad clowns we had to vote for in the national election.

Folks need to understand that running an organization this size ain't easy, and most of the time t'ain't fun. If you make a decision to do something, 1% of the people will really like it, 19% will like it, 20% will be annoyed by it, and 10% will be truly hacked off. The other 50% don't even know what is going on. If you ask the average person on the street, "What is right with the world?", they will ponter a few seconds and either say "Nothing!" or mumble a few positive points. So, I beseech my fellow members to be considerate of their criticism and apply common courtesy when writing letters or speaking in public. Most of all, I ask them that for every negative point they bring up about somebody, they mention something positive. Remember, personal attacks are never warranted, rarely forgiven and never forgotten.

Enough pontificating! My thanks to Rob and Anita for the job they are doing. Thank you Jeannette and Sue for the job you did and thanks to Steve Smith, Eric Stillwell and all the other unsung heroes who made STARFLEET what it is today.

First, one misunderstand where the "Trekkie" label originated. For we surely did not choose this rather gawky and diminutive appellation for ourselves. Simply, when Star Trek fandom was in its infancy, and began to attract attention of the various media, broadcasters and newspaper people needed an easy to use term to apply to those deeply involved in what could be considered not less than a phenomenon. Thus, the term "Trekkie" was born. Since the job of the media is to inform the uninformed, the general public as given the word by default.

So, after more than 25 years, and an official entry in the Oxford Dictionary, the word "Trekkie" is firmly seated in the minds of the media and the public. One would think that we, as a group, would take pride in leaving such an incredible mark on human history. But, I see this is not the case.

Time and time again, at a movie opening or other special event, I'll see a curious on looker approach one of us uniformed/costumed fans and innocently ask "Are you a Trekkie?" only to receive a vehement reply, "No, I am a Trekker!"

In the best case scenario, the costumed fan explains the difference and the on looker walks away confused, probably thinking to themselves "So what? Are you a Star Trek fan or aren't you?"

In the worst case scenario, the encounter ends with the Trek fans looking for his nose at the "insufferable boor" while the on looker walks away thinking that Trek fans are snobby, rude elitists.

The same is true when one of us tries to explain "Trekkie/Trekker" difference on television. Only instead of one person being confused or offended, it's the entire viewing audience. "But, 'Trekkie' doesn't describe who I am," I can hear you lament. Sure, it does. It merely states what the world originally intended. You are a Star Trek fan nothing more, nothing less. By accepting that, as "Trekker" or "Trekkie," you accept all that it means to be a fan of Star Trek. Be it positive or negative. If you are wanting to change the image of what Star Trek fans are, that must be done through powerful actions and not through some clever manipulations of terms and definitions.

So, let's leave semantics in English class. Personally, I prefer neither of the terms; however, when someone asks, "Are you a Trekke?" I stand up and say, "Yes, I am. Are you one too?" You'd be surprised at how many new friends you make that way.

Spending two days on our feet without so much as a thank you, or other consideration for the group, from Creation's show manager is not mine or my crew's idea of a good relationship which is why we walked out on the show, I will not tell others not to work with Creation, but will advise them to watch the treatment they get and if it is one side, then they should think about walking out and following thru if necessary.

The STARFLEET Policy And Recommendations Committee By CAPT Kaye Downing, Chairman

Have you ever wanted to change a policy that STARFLEET presently has? Have you a suggestion for the better operation of the Fleet? Do you have an idea? For an organization to grow and to be dynamic it must evolve and change with the wishes of the membership. STARFLEET is *your* organization and now with the establishment of the Fleet Policy and Recommendations Committee *you* can assist in making STARFLEET International the best Star Trek club in the world, and, more importantly, a club that responds to the needs and want of its membership at all levels of participation - local to national - within this organization.

This committee was formed at the request of FADM Lerman as a channel by which the general membership could submit recommendations and request policy changes in order to make STAR-FLEET more responsive to the needs of its members. The committee can only recommend policy changes or implementation methods to either the Admiralty Board or the Executive Committee, for it has no enactment authority.

The members of this committee are all volunteers who represent each region's membership within STARFLEET. Presently Regions 01, 02, 03, 04, 07, 12, 15 and at-large members have representatives. Regions 06, 09, 10, 11, 13, 14, 16, and 17 are currently without representatives. This is where YOU, the reader, come in. The committee is looking for volunteers to represent these regions. The only criteria for volunteering is having an open mind to the various topics discussed, a willingness to work, and to not hold either an Admiralty or Executive Board position.

Treknet BBS access is desirable but not necessary, as each member is provided with all pertinent discussion information that takes place on the BBS. The Committee is also looking for a Vice-Chairman to assist the administration and functioning of the committee. Potential representatives and vice-chairman candidates should send their resumes to the chairman November 15.

Every six to eight weeks, three or four suggests items will be submitted to the committee members for discussion. Items are put on a list and the committee will work through the list. Each committee member will receive a listing of items to be discussed. Potential topics may be submitted via the regional representatives or directly to the committee chair. After an item is discussed a report is prepared and forwarded to the Fleet Admiral for his disposition. Items should be submitted in the following format: Topic, Suggested by, and a one or two paragraph description of the topic. Presently the committee is working on the following topics: Bulk mailing of the Communiqué, the introduction of the rank of Senior Commander, standardized criteria for promotion to the rank of Captain and above. The committee welcomes any comments both pro and con on these topic. Send them either to the committee chair or to your regional representative. It strikes me as a particularly immodest to be write about something of which I am so proud as I am of the USS Jeannette Maddox. But then, I realize that it is not my accomplishments I'm writing of, but those of the fifty-odd members of the ship's complement, and of an incredibly generous community: Wichita, Kansas.

Wichita lies in the central Arkansas River Valley in some of the most fertile farm land in the world. It produces more aircraft than any other city, and is home to Pizza Hut and the Coleman Corporation. Generosity is second nature to our people; helping your neighbor is important. "There, but for the Grace of God, go I," seems to be a wide spread attitude. The Great Plains breeds humility.

My first contact with STAR-FLEET was at the launch of the Shuttle *Maddox*, I was very impressed by the quality of the cos-tuming, and the decorations, and by the demeanor of the people present: These were not wild-eyed trekkie types; the actually hold down jobs and behave in socially acceptable, responsible ways! Them Commander Bob Livingston began to speak.

I like what he said. He talked about community involvement and about helping others in need. He talked about how, at their first organizational meeting, in April of '91, a tornado had ribbed through and over, a town just ten miles east of Wichita. Their response had been to abandon the meeting,

rush to the scene, and offer their assistance to the authorities. These people cared.

In the early days we were a reflection of our founding members, particularly Bob Livingston, or "Cap'n Bob" as we all referred to him (much to his embarrassment). He set the tone for the *Maddox*, and like some home-grown sensei kept us focused. We were a small group, and only by focusing tightly would we be able to accomplish anything. We decided on community service, and, in particular, children's charities. Other activities and charities were permitted, but they were not allowed to detract from out "Prime Directive." Cap'n Bob spoke of a day when people would recognize us and say, "Look, it's those *Maddox* people again. Where ever you go, they're always there, helping kids." And he always believed that one day we'd be the premier ship of the Fleet.

As a response to his wish, we named our ship after the current Fleet Admiral, who had just announced she would not run for a third term. In spite of the potential political complications, we felt that her contributions far out-weighted any problems, and that this type of recognition was deserved.

In that first year we accomplished a great deal: We helped with maintenance and promotion of a 1930's theater in Augusta, raised \$600 for Big Brothers/Big Sisters, assisted with the Special Olympic

Games, worked in a River-bank clean up project, staged a fly-in breakfast for an antique and experimental aircraft group, assisted the Institute of Logopedics (since renamed Heartspring, a foundation for the research and treatment of communication disorders), participated in education activities at the County Observatory, assisted in the local Public Television Station with their fund-raiser, and participated with "Starfleet Command" members in a parade to kick off the Wichita River Festival. This set the mood of cooperation with our rival, which continues to this day.

It's an impressive list of tasks, and it was all a great deal of fun. But the most important event was the Special Olympics. It was there that we recruited Mr. Jay Jones, the organizer of the Kids Games, which provided activities between events for the athletes. Mr. Jones encouraged us to build a "Star Trek related" game for the kids, which

we did, and then manned the game for the event.

In September, 1992, we were commissioned as the Paladin Class Scout USS Jeannette Maddox, NCC-14514, by Fleet Admiral Jeannette Maddox.(Who wants to be a Galaxy Class, everybody's a Galaxy Class.After all, it's the scouts who are *really* on the edge of the unknown).

In the course of the following year we would build upon a conceptcalled"STARFLEET Jr. Academy." With Mr. Jones' guidance, we put together a display of six arcade and carnival style games, designed "Star Trek" themes and artboard for them, and then used them to draw crowds of children

for local charity events. The event organizers would then reimburse us for the use of materials and the cost of renovation and repair of the games. As a result, our general coffers grew at a fabulous rate that none of us would have believed six months before. The other result was just as spectacular: Children actively sought us out, we were just TOO much fun. And the sponsoring charities, almost without exception, profited, sometimes enormously, from our drawing power. From June of '92 to June of '93, STARFLEET Jr. Academy appeared nine times. We were so successful that event organizers were building their fund-raisers around us; and in August of '93, one of Kansas' largest hospitals asked us to help with their back to school health screening.

In addition to STARFLEET Jr. Academy, we were able to maintain our relationship with Big Brothers/Big Sisters. With a new program spearheaded by CAPT Livingston, we raised hundreds of dollars of new toys, and distributed them through the Salvation Army to young victims of Hurricane Andrew. He following year, using the same format devised by Cap'n Bob, the number of toys tripled when we assisted children driven from their homes by the Floods of '93.

Coming to a Theatre Near You

Last time I discussed people's lack of knowledge of the classic movies and books of science fiction. It is my opinion that folks who haven't seen or read the classics, have no frame of reference to judge anything they watch today, and thus should be a lot less opinionated and talkative on the subject. While discussing my prior article with some friends, we fell into debating what books and movies are required reading for any self-respecting *Star Trek* fan.

After much animated conversation on the subject, I decided to be guided by the sagely Richard O'Brien:

> Michael Rennie was ill The Day the Earth Stood Still Be he told us where we stand. And Flash Gordon was there In silver underwear, Claude Rains was the Invisible Man Then something went wrong For Fay Wray and King Kong, They got caught in a celluloid jam Then at a deadly pace, It Came From Outer Space And this is how the message ran.

Science Fiction—double feature Dr. X will build a creature. See androids fighting Brad and Janet. Anne Frances stars in Forbidden Planet Oh—at the late night, double feature Picture show.

I knew Leo G. Carrol Was over a barrel When Tarantula took to the Hills And I really got hot When I saw Jeanette Scott Fight a Triffid that spits poison and kills Dana Andrew said Prouse Gave him the Runes And passing him used lots of skills. And When Worlds Collide Said George Pal to his bride I'm going to give you some terrible thrills

Thus, I have made a list of ten movies and ten books that fit the bill. I have not placed them in any particular order, and since I am likely to get lots of grief for leaving off someone's favorite, I don't need the added argument about ranking.

This month I will start with film. These movies

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are all considered classic of one kind or another and should not be viewed as an all inclusive list. These are the core movies that, if you had to explain the concept of science fiction to a stranger, would define the genre in its many incarnations.

Day the Earth Stood Still (1951)- This was the first of the benevolent alien movies. Up until this movie, aliens from another planet were generally up to no good. Snatching bodies, eating brains and the like were the general modus operandi of your 1940's space alien, but Klaatu (Michael Rennie) is a peaceful and dignified alien who has come to observe earth and deliver a message. Special effects are very subdued, but effective, especially Klaatu's companion, the police robot Gort. Patricia Neal stars as the unsuspecting Earth woman who unknowingly plays host to the alien while he travels incognito. The film was directed by Robert Wise, who later directed Star Trek: The Motion Picture. Considered a minor masterpiece even outside science fiction circles.

Forbidden Planet (1956)- To this day, this film can hold its own against any modern work of science fiction. Yes even I the realm of special effects, Forbidden Planet can go toe-to-toe with Industrial Lights & Magic and walk away undefeated. Beautiful matte work (especially in the scenes in the Krell labs, nice animation, impressive miniatures and an eerie musical score set the atmosphere for this movie that is the prototype for ever Star Trek episode ever written. Leslie Nielsen stars as the commander of the C57-D, a star cruise that journeys to Altair to follow up on the fate of a colony ship. There they discover Morpheus (Walter Pidgeon) and his daughter (Anne Francis) who seem none to anxious to be rescued. This movie marks the beginning of the long career of Robby the Robot, whose drv, unintentional humor is very charming. This is a very important movie in Robot lore as it is the first film to recognize Asimov's Laws of Robotics, though not by name. The musical composition for this movie was created on the earliest forerunner to what would later become the Moog Synthesizer. In watching this movie, turn the lights off and make some popcorn, it is rather scary (in a very pleasant, non-Alien fashion). This movie has everything you would want in a story: Brave spacemen, a pretty love interest, a subtle villain/ mad scientist, psionics, a robot, and an ancient city of a dead super race, the KRell. It's an action/ adventure film, a horror film, a comedy, a mystery, but above all else, a great science fiction movie.

War of the Worlds (1953)- Loosely based on H.G. Wells' novel of the same name, (which means you still have to read the book when we get

to the literature section), this is another movie that stands the test of time from a technical and artistic stand point. Gene Barry stars as the leader of a group of scientists who try to save the world from hoards of slavering martians. Interesting notes about this movie include the fact that the Martian space ships clearly influenced the design of Klingon battle cruisers and the sound effect for their death rays were used as the photon torpedo effect. This is another scarv film that can give you some chills, if you can stop being jaded for a moment and harken back to a time when simpler things frightened you. If you like this movie, check out the rock opera version of the story done in the 70's narrated by Richard Burton and now on CD. This version is truer to the book (but you still gotta read the book).

The Outer Limits (1962) - One of the eeriest shows of the day, more so than the Twilight Zone. This show ran for only two seasons, yet it is one of the most memorable of the 60's. The infamous "Control Voice" that admonished you "Do not attempt to adjust your television set... We are in control," set the tone for something truly unique. OL was the proving ground for many famous actors and writers, a number of whom would later grace Trek, both behind and in front of the camera. Unlike Twilight Zone, OL dwelt almost exclusively in the realm of science fiction. Everything about this show was alien: the music, the writing, the costumes, and the atmosphere all combined to be somewhat unsettling to the viewer. The special effects, while occasionally cheesy, get downright scary now and again. These people were producing a show on a shoe-string budget and had to get very creative in their work The musical score is a masterpiece of discordance, evoking at time feelings of utter despair and loneliness so appropriate to a few episodes. Music which can strike an emotional chord is rare, especially in a TV show.

Episodes to watch are: Demon with the Glass Hand, starring Robert Culp and Arlene Martel (T'Pring). The Soldier, starring Michael Ansara (Kang). Both of these episodes were written by Harlan Ellison who later sued (successfully) the producers of The Terminator for plagiarizing his work. If you meld the two episodes together, this is readily apparent. Other episodes to watch are Don't Open 'til Doomsday, the Man Who Was Never Born, The Strange Decay of Radioactive Particles (featuring Leonard Nimoy in a walk-on part), Corpus Earthling, O.B.I.T., and Nightmare, which true to its name, gave me nightmares.

There has been talk of later of remaking OL into a modern day series. This was attempted with *The Twilight Zones* a few years back, with rather poor results. In the case of *TZ*, the absence of Rod Serling doomed the show; he was its soul. Even more important, *TZ* was the product of a particular era in America, and era not long gone. OL is also from that era and, alas, can never be duplicated.

My last suggestion about *The Outer Limits* is to rent the video on a Friday night and watch it alone, with the lights out.

Invasion of the Body Snatchers (1956) -While the 1978 version is good and co-stars Leonard Nimoy, the original is a must see. This

movie was a product of the McCarthy-Era communist phobia. Despite the bad title, a chilling movie

The Andromeda Strain (1971) - Michael Crichton's (Jurassic Park) tense drama of a extra-terrestrial virus brought back to earth by a space probe with disastrous results.

2001: A Space Odyssey (1968) - Yes, everybody talks about this movie, but how many folks have seen it! A tad pretentious at times, it is still a visual delight. HAL, of course, is the computer's computer, the forerunner to all the mad computers of Capt. Kirk's era. The movie, however, gives HAL a bad rap in that he is viewed as a psychopath who just decides one day to snuff the crew. This misconception was cleared up in 2010, though the book version of 2001 spent and entire chapter explaining that it was all the fault of us deceitful humans. 2010 worth seeing and a good movie, it's just not on the list of classics.

Star Wars (1977) - If you have to ask why this movie is on this list, then go to your room. Star Wars ushered in the second renaissance of science fiction which continues unabated to this day. It redefined the standards for special effects, musical scores and action pacing. I could go on for pages telling you what is right about this movie, but nothing I could say would convey the majesty and sheer excitement generated by this movie. The only problem with seeing this movie today on video tape is that it loses a lot of its impact on the small screen.

The Twilight Zone (1959) - Yet another one that if you have to ask why, there's no hope.

Dr. Who (1963) - This BBC series is the longest running science fiction series on television (it went on hiatus in 1988 or '89). This series is chock full of cheesy special effects and rubber monsters, but this in no way detracts from its charm. Dr. Who will never win any science awards, but the writers knew how to tell a story. The series revolves around the adventures of a renegade time lord, who wanders the universe and time in his TARDIS (Time And Relative Dimensions in Space). With the help of his human companions, The Doctor foiled legions of the most determined villains such as the Daleks, the Cybermen and his evil counter-part, The Master. The Doctor was played over a number of years by seven different actors (eight if you count the two movies). The transition to new doctors was explained away by the time lord's propensity to "regenerate" when seriously injured, the acquiring a different appearance and personality. The series is found primarily on PBS stations and the new Science Fiction Network. About twenty episode are on video tape.

As I said at the beginning, this is by no means an all inclusive list. Other films with legitimate claim to this list are: *Silent Running, This Island Earth, Fahrenheit 451, Dr. Strangelove, Bucka*roo Banzai, Planet of the Apes, Metropolis, The *Time Machine, Mad Max, The Road Warrior, The Fly* (1954 version), *Master of the World, Day of the Triffids, When Worlds Collide.* The list can go on, but I'll save that for another day.

For the next six months she served an increasingly rigorous apprenticeship under the tutelage of Bob Livingston, with assistance from VADM Dan McGinnis (Region 12RC). She assume command on June 5, 1993.

Our very success presents and on-going danger: The USS Jeannette Maddox could very well become overshadowed by the success of STAR-FLEET Jr. Academy, and overlooked or forgotten by community leaders. It is now our task to broaden the appeal of the Jeannette Maddox, and to extend our scope. Having secured a place in our community, the Maddox and crew must not venture forth and secure our place in the Fleet. The Armin Shimerman Scholarship for (profitable) Business is a major step in that direction. We are becoming more active in Fleet projects such as the STRFLEET Stampede and Starship Earth. Our members are being actively encouraged to attend STARFLEET and 12th Fleet functions as often as possible.

At the same time, we will never flag in our efforts, with the help of our fellow Kansans, to render assistance to those in need. There is a special warmth to spending time with friends and crew when you know that you can help lift a fallen stranger or comfort a frightened child.

Not long ago, at a volunteer appreciation dinner for Heartspring volunteers, one of the event's leaders present was heard to say, "There's those Star Trek people! Every time I'm at a children's event, they're there too, helping out." Take not Cap'n Bob! If we're not the "premiere ship of the Fleet" yet, we're working on it!

STARFLEET Invades New Jersey: The Region Seven Conference By Hartriono Sastrowardoyo, USS Challenger

It waits at the edge of the Final Frontier—but most of all, it waits for you.

"Seaside Heights, New jersey, is as close to the Final Frontier as one can get. Just drive down Route 37 until you hit water, back up ten feet, and hang a left, and there you are," Said Traci Girogianni, giving directions to the USS Alpha Centauri.

Fourteen out of the twenty-nine Region 07 chapters showed up, representing the span of the region from Maryland to up-state New York. Billed as the first free-standing, non-convention conference in Region 07, the weekend of September 10-12 was a mixture of fun, fellowship, and meetings, combined with activities on the boardwalk and the celebration of Mardi Gras.

Special guest at this conference was Steven Lance, who played the Vegan in the *Star Trek:The Motion Picture* rec reck scene. Steven also has appeared in Woody Allen's *Stardust Memories* as well as numerous TV and radio commercials. He is currently working on a book, *Written Out of Television*, containing anecdotes of TV stars. His book includes interviews with Susan Sackett in the *Star Trek: The Next Generation* chapter, and with Jimmy Doohan in the chapter about *Star Trek.*

Steven Lance talked about his experiences with the first *Star Trek* film. For instance, the rec deck originally included electronic games. When it was decided to have more people in the scene - Steven said there were 200-250 people originally - the games were carpeted over. Steven also told how he, like the others, was told to react to the destruction of space station Epsilon 9 by the V-Ger entity. Well, Steven can't see without his glasses, so all he could do was point at the screen!

Though minor incidents typical of first-time events cropped up here and there, the conference was declared a success. Julie Ann Scuill of the Shuttle Valiant was able to attend the conference, which was handicapped-accessible, although a lack of communication resulted in her being housed in a upper-floor room-and there were no elevators. (It should be pointed out that a fully accessible hotel with con facilities is a difficult place to find in a seaside area). A dinner dance was held Saturday night, with catering provided by the Hershey Hotel, and DJ-ing by the the newly-minted CAPT Mike Smith of the USS Lexington. And there was a special surprise when someone remembered Traci Giorgianni's birthday and gave her a cake in front of the conference attendees.

The success of the conference has given rise to thoughts of holding a similar free-standing conference next year. No hassles of running through a convention to make a meeting, just relaxing time meeting with everyone. Does any other Region 07 ship want to hose the conference next year? Or would you like a repeat performance from the USS Challenger?

Leaders? Or Followers?

"On the Road Again,""...and Again,""...and Again," could be the theme song for the United States Space Foundation as it presents aerospace workshops for teachers across the county. "Getting Comfortable Teaching With Space" seeks to promote aerospace awareness and to stimulate young people's Interests in math, science, and technology.

CAPT Diane Griffin of the USS Star Union NCC-2112 and crewmember Maureen Smith attended one of these weeklong sessions at Maxwell AFB by the city of Montgomery, Alabama. Dr. Jerry Brown, Director of Education of USSF, led and workshop. He and other career professionals delivered lectures on the principles of rocketry, the effects of zero gravity on human physiology, and basic aeronautics to name a few. To provide some "real" experiences, Dr. Brown constructed an underwater training course with PVC pipes. Swimming through the course face down, sideways, and upside down, the teachers simulated astronaut training in the large tank at Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama. No easy task. Dr. Brown also wanted his charges to get a sense of zero gravity. As the engines revved up on the C-130H Hercules, he asked the pilot to make some parabolic loops and then waved good-by. Fortunately, little bags were strategically placed around the "Herk." The able crew, part of the 908th Tactical Airlift Group, Air Force Reserve, delivered all safely back to "terra firma." Diane and Maureen enjoyed making their own model rockets. "Mo's Miracle" made an embarrassing and impromptu nosedive on its first mission (to disturb gases in earth's lowest atmosphere) but recovered some glory in a second attempt. And anecdotes? John Hartsfield, Director of the luka Tri-State Learning Center in Mississippi, spoke like a walking encyclopedia on the space program. He recalled some people asking him to sign a petition to name the first space shuttle "Enterprise."The Bicentennial was around the corner in the 70s, and on the drawings boards there was an air of certainty about the name "Constitution." The success of that campaign surprised him, but not as much as floating rat droppings startled a certain shuttle pilot. When reminded of the live broadcast, the pilot told Mission Control (expletive deleted) what to do with its live broadcast. He wanted those (expeltive deleted) droppings out of his cockpit. The "waste retrieval system" had malfunctioned on the rodent cages.

Eventually class discussion focused on the future of America's space program. Congress recently voted 216 to 215 to fund the space station. One vote saved the next planned stage of pace exploration - - Space Station Freedom. It would be difficult for any program to keep or attract qualified professionals when careers and paychecks are balanced on this and other close votes. When asked about funding. Dr. Brown stated that funding was not the problem. "It's a matter of leadership, willpower, and commitment." Someone brought up the idea of waiting. "There is a window of opportunity now," Brown emphasized. In other words, people are trained, a plan is in place, and hardware is available. "That Two

window may close," he continued, "due to disease, population pressures, wars, or natural disasters." Sooner or later, according to Dr. Brown, men and women will become residents of space rather than visitors. At this point, Americans can lead the way and take advantage of that 'window of opportunity." Or Americans can follow another nation's footsteps into the cosmos.

Graduates deserve a graduation ceremony, and GCWTS was no exception. Dr. Richard Chappell, a research specialist at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama, was the keynote speaker at this workshop. He compared NASA's program to Columbus' quest for a new route to the riches of the East. Like the famous explorer, NASA does not know exactly what will be discovered or exactly how much the voyages will cost. If the space program ends up an a program on paper, who would push the technological envelope? How would future resources be developed? America's space program and its technological spinoffs have benefitted people worldwide in terms of global communications, flame resistant substances, devices of the handicapped, and numerous others. For every dollar spent on manned space exploration, there is at least a \$7.00 return. With willpower and commitment, American can continue to lead the way to the unknown "riches" of the solar system and beyond.

After experiencing the "real" thing Diane and Maureen were ready for their real life. Besides families and helping to keep the USS Star Union shipshape, Diane teaches kindergarten in a classroom full of critters from an iguana to hamsters, and Maureen serves as a gifted teacher for elementary students in a resource room packed like a child's closet. Crewmembers enjoyed hearing about their experiences and looking over the armload of materials passed out at WKSP

ShuttleCon '93: The Region 04 Conference by Gary Scott Decker, Fleet J.A.G. **Officer - West**

"I slept with Gene Roddenberry."

Thus did John DeLancie explain to a special private session of STARFLEET and Klingon Assault Group (KAG) members how he landed the role of "Q" in Star Trek: The Next Generation. The STARFLEET/KAG "Meeting With The Stars" was part of ShuttleCon '93, the combined STAR-FLEET Region 04 and KAG Western Fleet conference, which was convened over the August 6 - 8 weekend. For the second year in a row, the joint conference was held at the Visalia, California Convention Center, in the heart of the San Joaquin Valley, next to the Radisson Hotel.

Not to be upstaged, Robert O'Reilly ("Gowron" of Klingon fame, who was the other featured guest star of the convention joining Mr. DeLancie in the closed STARFLEET/KAG presentation) responded, "I thought that was you in the bed."

Thus began a delightful hour of friendly repartee interlaced with some enchanting insights into the personalities and careers of two extraordinary actors. John DeLancie had the house in stitches describing how be "backed into" a full scholarship at Julliard -- and how he "poohpoohed" his audition with a nondescript director by the name of John Houseman, "My father summed up the entire experience with his typical wit and charm, "explained Mr. DeLancie. "He said to me, `YOU IDIOT!"'

As happened in 1992, the entire DeLancie family was in attendance atthe convention, John's wife Marnie and their two sons Owen and Keegan, all of whom were charming tothe last. Mr. O'Reilly was in the company of his manager (and president of his fan club), Debbie Griffith, and both of them taught the STARFLEET Marines in attendance a thing or two about how to party. The Friday night of the con, before the "official" Fleet functions commenced, the Fourth Marine Regiment hosted a pool party at the residence of Marine CAPT Paul Walker, and "Gowron" was in the thick of things. In addition to commanding a spit-and-polish Presentation of the Colors at the Opening Ceremonies, complete with rifle-and-swords honor guard, LT COL Ortiz, along with CAPT Debra Roberts (CO of the USS Defiance, Region 04 flagship, and chair of the Region O4 Conference). CDR Helen Slagter (Vice Regional Coordinator -North for Region 04) and LT CDR Andrea Maher (Deputy Counselor, USS Defiance) led the assembled STARFLEET members in an a capella rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner" that outshone any performance which might be heard at a major league ballpark on any given game day. No bashful mumblers amongst the Fleet personnel. The experience was electric, and brought this writer to tears.

Starfleet and KAG panels abounded, to the point that, as is usual with most STARFLEET conventions, the Fleet members attending the panels did not get to see much of the guest stars. Dinner [on Saturday night] and Brunch [on Sunday morning] With The Stars helped, though, as did the private STARFLEET/KAG session mentioned previously. Michael Berryman and Mark Scott Zicree were also guests of the convention, and were most gracious in making themselves available to the fans for conversation and autographs.

"Select individuals" eligible for arrest, though, did not include QelDas. Well, the Marines took care of that, All during the convention, the Marines solicited contributions for the arrest of QelDas, and by Sunday afternoon the sum stood at \$119.00, cash, With two camcorders to record the event, and before a TV news crew filming the convention as well, SFMC confronted KAG in a corridor separating the meeting rooms in the convention center, and served the warrant on QelDas.

And what was the Klingon response'? To dismantle the jail!

The Marines proudly presented their warrant money to Lee Tidwell, CO of the host ship USS Gallant but the Klingons made no offer of any bail money for QelDas at all. She was released, then, on the field of battle, to witness her colleagues-inarms' abject retreat before the assembled hosts of STARFLEET.

This is a great and glorious moment for the Marines," beamed a proud GEN Jackson. "It demonstrates beyond all doubt that the Klingons have no honor. Long live the STARFLEET Marine Corps!"

[PERSONAL OBSERVATION: While GEN Jackson's enthusiasm can be understood (he was, after all, speaking in the flush of victory), no one should misinterpret this flash of bravado as more than a good-natured "dig" at our Klingon brothers and sisters. The DJ got the McPherson, SFMC Commandant, during the Marine Awards Ceremony at Shutllecon, himself acknowledged that the Klingons are the Marines' "most worthy adversary," testimony to the esteem in which KAG is truly held by their Federation brothers and sisters.]

With A Klingon, \$3.00" promotion. Loujaue message, acted upon it in a most worthy manner, and what followed was a dance party of legendary proportions. Simonov and Reliant set new standards for "wild and crazy" - ness, and Robb Jackson, the next morning, grunted, "I have never danced myself to the point of physical exhaustion, but I did last night CDR Tim Moore, Chief of Security aboard the Defiance, observed, "On a

Shuttletion '93 generated nearly \$1,600 for Big Brothers and Big Sisters. To borrow a Klingon phrase, "Kai ShuttleCon!"

One of the crowning glories of the convention was the costume contest and Delegates Ball. QelDas and Beth Stireman, a proprietor of Orion Traders (a Star Trek store in Fair Oaks, CA, just east of Sacramento), both of whom are master costumers in their own right, were the judges for the ShuttleCon costume contest. "Best STAR FLEET" went to the Marines, a group entry consisting of Rex Moffett, Loujaue McPherson and Robb Jackson. The costume routine employed by the Marines was a series of left-faces, and pandemonium ensued when Robb Jackson, in the middle of it all, obediently turned right face. You've never seen a man pirouette so fast as Robb did when he tried to correct himself. To his great credit, Loujaue kept a straight face while on stage, and allowed himself to collapse on the floor clutching his sides only after the presentation was concluded.

USS Defiance did the Fleet proud (and also served IDIC well) by winning "Best Adapted Klingon From The Television Series" (Andrea Maher, Robbie Robbins and Jim Kletzing in a group presentation), "Best Overall Klingon" (Klanna Black, who dyed her hair blond for the occasion to match her white, copper-trimmed outfit) and "Best of Show" (Craig Baker, as a Catian with blades in a costume which had to be seen to be believed).

But what had everybody talking was the Delegates Ball. After enduring a slow start to the proceedings with some rap songs, CDR Mark Hagen (Second Officer aboard the USS Simonov, and recently appointed Aide to the Fleet Admiral) got things going by pulling the DJ aside and saying, "Uh, excuse me, but let me give you three party was an eleven." ShuttleCon was a living embodiment of that time-honored maxim that the fun you have is the fun you make, and that with the proper attitude any event can be a party. Goodwill and camaraderie abounded. with many of the STARFLEET panels expanding into continuing, convention wide dialogue. The Counselors 'Roundtable, for example, when the next

"numbers" are not yet in, early estimates are that panel came into the meeting room, found itself migrating into the hotel lobby, only to be continued to breakfast the following morning, only to seize a vacant room later that afternoon. Similarly much good Marine business was conducted (surprise!), and some fast friendships were forged (always be alert to alliterations). As is usual for such events, though, there still wasn't sufficient and received a "Blood Duel" packet from Fleet time for everything.

Encountering Patrick Stewart At Ocean County College by Hatriono Sastrowardoyo, USS Challenger

No, it wasn't the good captain in person -- but it was him narrating The Voyager Encounters, a show at the Robert J. Novins Planetarium in Ocean Co. College, NJ, which runs through November 21st.

Fans may remember the Voyager 6 probe from the Star Trek: The Motion Picture. That was based on Voyagers 1 and 2, two deep-space probes launched in 1977. In twelve years, the Voyagers have photographed every planet except Pluto, and made many discoveries about our solar system.

Using many of the photographs, Patrick Steward wove a tale of wonder and amazement pointing out unusual and intriguing sights, many of which scientists are still unsure of. His narration complemented the show, and gave the audience a sense of being out in the Final Frontier, and a yearning to discover more strange, new worlds.

Fleetwide Project Proposal by Alan Purvis, USS Odin

In 1989, shortly after I joined the Shuttle Tereshkova, NOC-1793/5, the Charlottesville, VA chapter of STARFLEET, I proposed a community service project to the membership, one in which I believe and wholeheartedly endorse: Donating blood. This project can be an ongoing effort by any community service or civic club, doesn't cost any money, and takes up very little time (approximately one hour per participating member every two months).

The idea was enthusiastically received by the crew and we joined two other groups, the Charlottesville - Albemarie Javcees and the Monicello Area Kiwanis Club, for a bi-monthly bloodmobile. I'm proud to say that I was a former member of the former and a current member of the latter, so I had a few contacts with both groups. After the initial reaction to a Star Trekoriented club, they warmed to our involvement, and the project was good to go.

In the winter of 1990, I read in the Communiqué where the Klingon Assault Group (KAG) had challenged the membership of STARFLEET to a "Blood Duel" to see which organization could donate the most blood to the Red Cross in a calendar year. The Klingons had the testicular fortitude to suggest that since STARFLEET members numbered 5,000 worldwide, and KAG numbered 300 or so, that the odds were even. I was quick to answer the challenge on behalf of the USS Tempest (nee Shuttle Tereshkova), being CMO and Bloodmobile Chairperson at the time, Captain Douglas Glenn, now OO of the USS Umiak.

That year (1991), our brave crew donated 40 pints, roughly one per crew member, all for the Federation. We "done good," as the saying goes, because Fleet Captain Glenn called me personally to thank me and ask if I would represent STARFLEET for the next "Blood Duel." Evidently, the Tempest crew had donated more blood than any other starship. Incidently, we never heard back from the Klingons.

Unfortunately, personal constraints prevented me from answering that challenge at that time. Now, however, I have resolved those constraints and as ADC/Command of the USS Odin, NCC-1875, I would love to see my starship be the flagship for a reprise of the "blood battle" with the Klingon braggarts. I would like to now formally issue a challenge to our Klingon friends to see how many units of blood we can donate to the Red Cross for another one-year period to begin at the time of their choosing. I look forward to hearing from our worthy opponents soon.

I wanted to have a high quality uniform, that looked like the two piece uniforms then depicted on the show

I thought that it wouldn't be that hard to change the jump suit patterns made by Simplicity, I believe, into a suite that had a supper in the back and a collar. Thanks to my previous experience in a junior high home-ec class I had taken several years earlier, I had the drive and somewhat the know-how to make my first Star Trek uniform.

My uncle, who got me into Trek, went with me to that convention and also wanted a uniform. We agreed that I would make his uniform first with the understanding that I might make some mistakes but would correct them to the best of my ability, This would make for a hopefully better product on the one I would wear eventually. So I started. I utilized an old White sewing machine to do the work, and with may hours -- I mean many hours -of work, I completed the job. I think it took me like three days of constant work to finish. I had succeeded in modifying the pattern to house a zipper in the back and a collar around the neck, The finished product was something that would get comments for many conventions to come-because it was unique, to say the least.

Next, I made my own uniform. The first one I had made was command red in color. Mine would be engineering gold. I went through the same laborious process and cut the time down to one

day thanks to all the experience I got from the first uniform.

I started something that I continue to do todaymake uniforms- because one of my friends decided that he wanted a uniform too. I helped his girlfriend's mother construct it, bringing my uniform total to three. Since my friend was a big boy, I gained the experience of modifying the uniform pattern yet again so that it would tit him. Well, people were constantly commenting on all three of our uniforms as we attended many conventions together.

Then I became aware of a great new product--the third season jacket pattern! The minute I saw one. I got it. I proceeded to construct myself a uniform this time first. I decided on a blue sciences division color and went to work. following the details of the pattern to a "T" as they say. Well, whoever made the pattern, didn't quite construct it to Starfleet specifications. Don't get me wrong--they did a heck of a job. However, I am a perfectionist and didn't like the looks of the finished product. The front piece ended up having curved edges along the sides of the contract bodice and it looked frankly "cheesy." The pattern had no detailed instructions, which in turn ended up in a not-so-perfect fit in the end. I decided to go to modifying again by making another jacket.

I proceeded to "fix" the curved bodice problem and make it a custom fit. It looked sharp and it was unique -- you don't see many science division uniforms at conventions. It drew mega attention at my first convention I'm happy to say. But, I had a problem. I had a blue uniform that I was not totally pleased with still on my hands. So, I advertised at a convention and sold it for around \$50 to a gentleman through the mail.

I was getting pretty experienced after making five Trek uniforms. The first jacket took me nine hours and the second attempt took me about the same. But now my uncle didn't have a matching jacket yet. You guessed it. I did end up making my uncle a command red jacket as well. It took around seven hours to make. Just over Christmas break I made yet another uniform, in command red, for a friend in Arizona. This was an experience. Not only did I have to modify the pattern to make it look good, but I also had to modify it to fit a very tall man who is blessed with slight love handles (sorry Jim). This took me a total of six hours, my best time yet.

As of now I have made seven Trek uniforms--wow, I guess that's really a lot of work. During the construction of my sixth uniform, my uncle and I decided to videotape the process and film a sort of how-to video on making *Star Trek: The Next Generation* jackets. I did this for two reasons: I really thought that other Trek fans out there needed guidance on how to make their uniforms look sharp and correct by including how to modify the pattern on the video. Secondly, I thought, "Hey, there really might be a market out there for something like this. I might make a fortune!"

Yeah, right. So, we made the video while we were doing the work on the sixth uniform anyway. It wasn't like I built a uniform just for the video. We thought, why not let the camera run during the process'? We went into this venture hoping that I could pay for the videotapes I had bought to dub off these potential "hot Items" (which amounted to the sale of one tape). Well, to date, I have sold a grant total of three tapes. Not too bad. I have advertised here in the Communiqué when I can beat the deadline and have had good response. So, anyone out there reading this article, who is in dire need of guidance in making a uniform, look for my ad in the Communiqué. My video might be just the ticket.

Well, I don't know how many more uniforms I will make in my career. I already have my eye on a Picard Jacket--which I have a design for already that I did myself, or maybe a Deep Space Nine uniform. which can only gain in popularity. Who knows? All I know is that even though it is hard work, it pays off in the end. That first time you wear your uniform to a convention and someone says, "Wow! How did you do that? That looks great," you'll feel very proud. They're also very attractive to TV stations who want trekker to interview (just ask me or my uncle).

HUGO! At the recent Worldcon, the TNG episode "The Inner Light" beat out Aladdin, Aliens 3, Batman Returns, and Dracula to win the Best Dramatic Presentation Hugo award!

AND EMMYS! When the Emmys were handed out in September, STAR TREK was the winner of these awards:

Main Title Theme Music (Deep Space Nine) Sound Mixing, Drama Series ("A Fistful of Datas") Makeup, Series ("Captive Pursuit")

Young Indiana Jones and Babylon 5) THE PARAMOUNT WARS: The struggle for control of Paramount continues unabated at this writing. QVC and Viacom are each bidding for ownership of the studio, with Viacom (at this

ownership of the studio, with Viacom (at this writing) currently offering the higher bid, a deal worth a whopping \$10.2 billion. (As of mid October, QVC is in the process of gathering support in order to return with an even higher bid. A deal with Bell Atlantic is waiting on ruling from the FCC as to its legality.)

STAR TREK:VOYAGER: The brass at Paramount are ignoring the takeover wars and concentrating on plans for a new network. Negotiations are already in progress with potential affiliate stations across the country. Paramount, through their recent deal with Chris-Craft Industries, already owns a handful of stations.

Flagship series for the new network will be Star Trek: Voyager, a new Star Trek series. According toa report in TV Guide, this will be a ship-based series centered around the USS Voyger, a scoutship with a crew of 200. In the pilot episode, the Voyager will pursue a renegade Starfleet vessel into a wormhole where disaster strikes. Both crews must learn to work together in a strange new universe. Projected premiere is January, 1995. Trek producer Rick Berman has stated that the final episode of TNG will set into motion some of the premises of the series.

MOVIE TALK: It is being rumored that William Shatner has managed to price himself right out of a major-sized role in the upcoming TNG film. The plan to mix TNG and TOS characters in the script has not changed, however.

AND TNG \overline{TV} TALK, TOO: Variety reported a rumor on September 24th that TNG would go to an 8th season if the next TV spinoff wasn't ready

in time. No one is offering any confirmation on this.

Meanwhile, at Starcon in Denver, Gates Mc-Fadden reported that everyone except Patrick Stewart was under contract for an 8th season should there miraculously be one. (She did note that Patrick, by contrast, is currently the only cast member who is signed for the TNG film.)

WALTER KOENIG: Walter did indeed make that graceful exit from the hospital that I mentioned last issue, which is certainly good news! He continues to recuperate at home, but is back on the convention circuit as well.

His illness forced him to give up a role as Knight One in the upcoming *Babylon 5* series, but he will be cast in another guest-starring role down the road. He also still intends to submit scripts for the series. (*With thanks again to Carolyn Atkinson of WKI.*)

THE HOLIDAY SEASON: With Christmas closing fast, a Hallmark representative confirmed at a Collectors' meeting that Hallmark would be back next year with another ST ornament.

FRAKES' SEQUEL: Jonathan Frakes will be returning to reprise his role from the miniseries "North and South." The sequel "Heaven and Hell" has gone into production. Jonathan's wife Genie Francis will also be returning to carry on her role as well.

THE UNPRINTED WORD:Look in January 1994 for "Transformations," the first audio-only ST story. Narrated by George Takei, this is a tale of Captain Sulu and the Excelsior. It will not be released as a book.

POLLSTERS: In a survey taken by "Entertainment Weekly," students at the University of Alaska chose Classic Trek for their "TV fix." MIT students, on the other hand, elected to go with TNG.

Enterprise Stamp Vs. the Bureaucratic Double Standard by Bill Kraft, Star Trek-Enterprise Stamp Committee

In 1985 the Star Trek-Enterprise Stamp Committee embarked on a mission that might have daunted Captain Kirk himself. The committee petitioned the Citizen's Stamp Advisory Committee in Washington to issue a special stamp, jointly recognizing and jointly bearing the likeness of NASA's space shuttle Enterprise and its fictional namesake, Star Trek's USS Enterprise. While some might regard such a proposal as a frivolous homage to a fictional television series, the positive impact the show has had for over two decades, the humane ideals it represents, and the *Continued next page* public consciousness it has raised in support of America's space program are very real, indeed! The two space voyagers, one real, the other imaginary, are a marrying of where our space program began and how far our dreams can take us.

Support for the proposal was prompt and encouraging. Since 1985 the proposal has elicited support from over 17,000 petition signers and had been endorsed by Governors, U.S. Representatives, U.S. Senators, space-science educators, over 50 planetariums and observatories, NASA, the National Science Foundation, the California Institute of Technology, the Space Studies Institute and half a dozen of science fiction's most distinguished literary luminaries.

In spite of such high calibre support, the Washington committee has raised a number of objects, which we have addressed and refuted. The Washington committee has objected that Star Trek is a commercial enterprise, and, therefore, is ineligible, while at the same time approving a Laurel and Hardy stamp, which is, in nature, just as commercial as the Enterprise proposal. Laurel and Hardy films, run in syndication, and other Laurel and Hardy products continue to bring a profit to copyright owners around the U.S.

Secondly, the Washington committee argues that the intent of the Laurel and Hardy stamp is to honor the men rather than to promote any commercial prospects. Applying the same logic, we contend that our intent is to recognize the larger idealism that the NASA shuttle and "Star Trek" represent rather than to promote any commercial prospects. If the logic applies in one case, it applies in the other. A double standard has been applied to the exclusion of our proposal!

Not only had a double standard been applied to the case of Laurel and Hardy, it has also been applied in the case of the Postal Service's promotion of its dinosaur stamp series. In 1989 the Postal Service, in conjunction with MCA Incorporated, which owns the rights to the film, *The Land Before Time*, launched a sweepstakes campaign to promote the new series of dinosaur stamps and the MCA video release of the film. Available at your local post office was a flyer urging you to win a trip to an authentic dinosaur habitat and to discover the joy of finding a dinosaur T-shirt offer inside the videocassette.

Apparently, the Postal Service is willing to condone this sort of selective commercialism. If politics makes for strange bedfellows, then it had better move over to make room for the Postal Service and MCA, Inc. to climb in with it. The juxtaposition of postal and commercial ventures constitutes, by implication, promotion of a commercial enterprise and blurs postal guidelines to render them inconsistent with contradictory.

Another perplexing objection raised by the Washington committee is its contention that Star Trek's "limited appeal" would not make the stamp viably attractive to the public, thereby curtailing its sales. Does a show that has run continuously for almost 25 years lack appeal? Does a show that spawned over 400 fan clubs and been translated into 42 languages lack appeal? Does a show behind five box office hits lack appeal? Does a show teatured on the cover of a 1986 Newsweek lack appeal? Does a show to pervasive that it

brought "To boldly go where no man has gone before," "Live long and prosper," and "Beam me up Scotty" into the lexicon lack appeal?

Such a stamp as we proposed would virtually guarantee the Postal Service a financial windfall. The public at large, stamp collectors in particular, and an enormous number of space-science enthusiasts would beam to their local post office to by the stamp. A Postal Service consistently in the red ought to welcome such an opportunity.

As we approach the threshold of space, it is vital that the Star Trek ideals of hope, optimism, and compassion be nurtured and propagated for future generations. Postal guidelines that arbitrarily inhibit the of steering of thou ideals area disservice to humankind in space; and, since Star Trek uniquely articulated thou ideals within the context of mass entertainment, it and its NASA counterpart are a deserving subject for a stamp.

Why does the Washington committee selectively apply its guidelines to exclude our proposal? Is the Washington committee's agenda determined by the personal bias of its members? Whey does the Washington committee shut its ears and mind to an idealism that has fired and fueled the imagination of two generations of Americans? Perhaps if the Washington committee shut down its bureaucratic force field for but a moment the voice of the people might get through.

Hailing Frequencies Open to all STARFLEET Members.

We need YOU to beam aboard this drive and to WRITE LETTERS to your congresspersons, U.S. Senators and the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee in Washington. Our drive has now been endorsed by the scientific community, members of Congress and science fiction writers in 41 states. Were is the voice of the fans? If we are to penetrate the bureaucratic force field in Washington, we need your voice. Our committee will not be deterred by bureaucratic stonewalling and the fabricated objections of the stamp committee in Washington. It was Captain Kirk who proclaimed in "Star Trek III," "I do not believe in a no-win scenario." Neither do we!

Malibu's Star Trek: Deep Space Nine Comic Debuts by Stephen J. Haenn, USS Endurance

Malibu Comics has secured exclusive rights to create and publish a regular series of comic books based on Star Trek: Deep Space Nine. The first issue was released in August and was written by Star Trek veteran Mike W. Barr, illustrated by Gordon Purcell and edited by Tom Mason.

Malibu Publisher Dave Olbrich said, "As longtime admirers of both Star Trek and Star Trek: The Next Generation, we are extremely pleased to be a part of the launch of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine."

Writer Barr said, "I'm very excited about getting back into the Star Trek universe." Having been a Star Trek fan since the beginning, Barr is very familiar to the challenges of writing scripts based on the new TV show. "Before I wrote a single line of classic Trek," Barr said, "I had been a fan for 12 years. Now I'm writing Deep Space Nine before the series is even six months old."

Under the arrangement with Paramount, Malibu Comics will be able to create all-new stories and adapt actual scripts from the series. Like the series' premier episode, the comic book debut will feature occasional crossover visits from Captain Picard and other characters familiar to fans of Star Trek: The Next Generation. "We will be using the same frame of reference," Barr said, "and the characters will be able to refer to situations established in various episodes of Star Trek: The Next Generation." Full of original ideas, Barr is not yet planning on adapting any existing episodes of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine.

Andrea Hein, Paramount Pictures' senior vice president, said "The new arrangement reflects Malibu Comics' commitment to bringing an ideal blend of artistic and editorial skill, as well as personalized attention, to this new extension of Star Trek franchise.

When Barr wrote his first story with Kirk, Spock, and McCoy, he knew the history and background of the characters. "With Deep Space Nine, I'm discovering things about the characters every week," he said. "It's like meeting a new friend -- the more time you spend with them, the more you learn about them. I regard the Deep Space Nine characters as new friends."



DS9 Skybox Cards To Be Released Late 1993 by Stephen J. Haenn, USS Endurance

The 125-card set of the Skybox's *Star Trek:Deep Space Nine* trading card will be released late this year, according to George White, Skybox's V. P. of Public Affairs. "One card is specially enhanced and will be available exclusively in the September release of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine #2 comic book from Malibu Comics," said White.

Skybox has done several sets of Star Trek cards that have been very successful. In 1992, the second set of Star Trek: The Next Generation cards were awarded a Gummie award as best non-sport card of the year from the publication Non-Sport Update. "They're the bible of the industry," White said. "For us to win that award was very special for us." Skybox recently shipped a 50-card mini-set of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine cards based on the television series' 2-hour premiere special. The Deep Space Nine mini-set osld out prior to shipment.

This latest set of card from Skybox will includes 100 regular cards, 20 technical cards, four foil embossed space scenes and one super 3-D card.

Mission Report: The Joan Rivers Show by Hartiriono Sastrowardoyo, USS Challenger

Nichelle Nichols, Star Trek's Uhura, and Dan Masden, President of the Official Star Trek Fan Club, were among the guests at a taping of The Joan Rivers Show on June 29th. Someone decided it would be nice to have Star Trek fans in costume in the audience, and could Dan help? Dan passed the word onto Kathy Boudreau of Creation, who in turn contacted, among others, Region Seven Coordinator Alex Rosenzweig. Some STARFLEET members got in touch with Kathy at the NYC Con held the weekend before taping, and the STARFLEET ships Asimov, Chal-lenger, Lexington, and Sovereign were able to send representatives Others in attendance included the Federation's Arcturus-A, the Bajoran Republican Army, the Klingon groups "First Alliance" and "The Eleventh," part of the imperial Klingon Expeditionary Forces. Also present was UFP/British Starfleet's Enterprise-D.

The topic of the show was on fan clubs. Who runs them, and what interests people to join them? Besides Dan, there were presidents from The *Gilligan's Island*, Boy George, Elvis, and *Flying Nun* Fan clubs, as well as Dawn "Mary Ann" Wells from *Gilligan's Island*. Obviously the Star Trek fans were more interested in Nichelle.

Nichelle stated that the reason why *Star Trek* is so enduring is that it presented values at a time when the prevailing mindset was to drop out and give up. The show offered great hope to people, she continued, and the characters were real, that they were adult while also entertaining.

She also said that Ricardo Montalban was her favorite star from the series: "Is that a body?" she asked. And of course, her favorite episode is any where Uhura gets to leave the bridge.

When asked if the cast keeps in touch, Nichelle said that the cast does stay close with each other and with the fans, Somewhere, every weekend, is a convention, and there is still a demand for Star Trek stars to talk with the fans and sign autographs. She also said that she's known Dan "forever" and that he does a fantastic job with the Official Fan Club.

Nichelle revealed that she signed a contract with Putnam for her autobiography, entitled Beyond Uhura, due out next year. As reported in the Asbury Park (NJ) Press and New York Magazine, it is full of insights on Nichelle and here character. Besides and familiar story of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., asking her to stay on the show, the book says that Spock was supposed to have kissed Uhura in "Plato's Stepchildren" - but William Shanter interjected, saying, "If anybody is going to kiss Uhura, it is going to be the Captain." Also in the book, Nichelle Nichols admits that she had an affair with Gene Roddenberry.

Several of the STARFLEET representatives thought we would meet with Nichelle after the taping. Nichelle had to leave, but that didn't stop some of us from making an impression upon the audience. (To quote *Challenger's* Chief Science Officer, "We will be remembered well, if not well remembered.") Not only were we in front of the camera--with most of the Klingons in the front row—but Lockheed, *Challenger's* dragon mascot, showed up for the taping. Some of us brought flags and ship T—shirts. The most memorable moment was waiting --in costume--in CBS' lobby where mundanes either looked at us askew or took picture of us. Contrary to rumor, the guy from the *Arcturus-A* and i did not ask for handstamps or charge admission to those who didn't have one! We were sorely tempted to, though...

For those interested in our fifteen seconds of fame, the show aired July 13th. Videotapes of the show will be around, I'm sure. Just ask anyone from the STARFLEET chapters who attended-somebody's got to have a copy!

The Trek Chef by Edmund Trafford, USS Republic

Over the years, we've been exposed to a great deal of culinary variety in the ST universe. We've seen Vulcan "plomeek soup" from Classic Trek ("Amok Time") and the noxious Klingon "gagh" from STTNG. We've seen a formal diplomatic buffet (the Classic episode "Journal to Babel") and the interior of a well-appointed ship's galley (STVI—even though starships are supposed to be routinely equipped with food synthesizers). We've encountered the ubiquitous "Saurian brandy" in its funny bottle and the contraband "Romulan ale." This is but the tip of the culinary iceberg, so to speak, but let's look at these things a little more closely.

First, the "plomeek soup" seems simple enough to identify. Since Vulcans are known to be vegetarians, we can only conclude that this is some kind of vegetarian broth, with or without a carbohydrate filler (noodles, etc.). The carnivorous Klingons, on the other hand, obviously take great delight in their "gagh"; I guess they prefer food that fights back. I suspect that eating gagh is a lot like swallowing goldfish. At least raw oysters don't move!

'Saurian brandy" is certainly some form of ethanol-based liquor. With no other reference to its origin (is "Saurian" an ethnic group - like Russian vodka—or is it perhaps a flavor, like apricot brandy?) we can only speculate, and your guess is as good as mine. "Romulan ale" is easier. Of course, it is some potent form of fermented grain or hops, like beer or stout (as opposed to a fermented fruit wine, for example), and it acquires its distinctive crystal-blue color in the brewing process.

I had trouble accepting the presence of a full galley and formal officers' dining room complete with white-gloved stewards on a starship in STVI. Not only is it a waste of valuable space, but it also seems a waste of trained personnel time to prepare and serve food by hand. ('I went to the Academy for four years for this?") On the other hand, perhaps there are special occasions, like the reception in "Journey to Babel" and the recep-tion at the end of STV, which require the prepara-tion of individual dishes not available through the synthesizers.

However, even in the 23rd century when food and drink are routinely dispensed from a handy wall slot, I hope some things - like Scotty's favorite single-malt whiskey - will continue to be lovingly produced by hand!

An Interview With Robert Wolfe by Kelly Cline, USS Carson

One of the most popular episodes this past year has been "A Fistful of Datas." We all enjoyed seeing Wort, Data, Troi and Alexander in an old west adventure on the holodeck. I don't think I'll ever forget seeing Won in that cowboy hat. This was such a creative episode that I had to find out more about the person who wrote this episode. *How did you become a writer*?

I went to film school at UCLA, but I discovered that making your own 16mm films is incredibly hard work and, moreover, very, very expensive. I took a screen writing class and, while it was still incredibly hard work, it was much cheaper, and in the end you had a product that you could sell (at least in theory), and I enjoyed it much more. I've been writing scripts ever since, and recieved a Masters in screenwriting a few years later. But the bottom line is you become a writer by being stupid enough to call yourself one, and stubborn enough to keep calling yourself one until every one else believes you.

How did you write this episode?

Uh, on a computer? No? Okay, it's along and involved process from pitch to completed script, but essentially you talk about it with the staff, and, if all goes well, they give you the assignment to write the script. Usually you get about two weeks to write it, then they either give you a rewrite or assign it to one of the staff. In my case, Brannon Braga, who is now a story editor, did the rewrite (and did a very nice job).

How did get the idea for this episode?

Gene Roddenberry always said Star Trek was Wagon Train in space. In the old show, they did a western episode that I was always fond of. I thought it would be nice to finally do a *Next Generation* that paid tribute to Star Treks roots in the western.

What do you think are the strengths and weaknesses of "A Fistful of Datas"?

The main strengths of "A Fistful of Datas" were the performances. Brent Spiner, Michael Dorn, Marina Sirtis and everyone else did terrific work, for which I am eternally grateful, Also, Brannon did a wonderful re-write which strengthened the plot without removing any of the fun of the premise. As to the weaknesses, I'm much too close to the script to be unbiased. On one hand, I want it not to have any. But on the other, I see things that bother me in my own work that no one else sees. (Although I wonder if people are getting tired of holodecks.)

What advice would you give to aspiring writers?

I'm not exactly the voice of experience, so I'm just repeating what one of my professors said in school: "Write every day. Writing is hard work and sometimes you don't want to do it, but you get better with practice. And when you're not writing, read. If you want to be a good writer, you have to read good writing. That means Shakespeare and Marlowe, Joseph Conrad, Dickens, Steinbeck, Twain, all the usual suspects."

Robert Wolfe mentioned that he is now working on *Deep Space Nine*. I'm sure we'll see more fascinating episodes from this guy!

Design Prototype--USS Enterprise NCC-1701-F by Michael Anthony Cericola, USS Wasp

While working in the county jail, a fellow officer (Deputy Carter) and I stared playing with the idea of what future namesakes of the USS Enterprise would look like. This was no easy matter since each version of the Enterprise contains technology that is revolutionary for its time. The Constitution Class starship had an operational lifetime of about 20 years (with refits every five years) and the newest Galaxy class starship has an operational lifetime of about 100 years (with major system-wide refits every 20 years). With the lifespan that the current Enterprise will exist how revolutionary would the "E" version be; nonetheless the "F" version.

Well, we are talking science fiction and both Officer Carter and I spent several hours debating how a future vessel would operate. The following is a general idea of what we came up with. PROPULSION SYSTEMS

Both of us believed that the traditional "warp" factor would be meaningless in perhaps 200-300 years after the ST:TNG format. With the span of Warp 9 to Warp 10 going somewhere from 1500c to infinite velocity, Enterprise "F" may use a variation of warp propulsion that would push her into the 9.8-9.9 range. Certainly the new engines would be capable of traditional 'warp" speeds but the newest system might enable exploration of other galaxies to be conducted within 2 to 3 years. Will impulse drive still exist? We thought it would. How much can you improve sub-light travel'? TRANSPORTER TECHNOLOGY

This was tricky. Obviously it would have increased range (perhaps away teams could be sent from outside the star system?). The real challenge is to keep the transporter from becoming too omnipotent. Beaming through shields should be perfected by this time. I thought the most intriguing prospect was if some Iconian technology was introduced to make the device more versatile. ideas anyone?

SHIELDS AND WEAPONS

Cloaking device'? We thought so, but we wanted more, Graviton field generators are nice, but how about a system that can absorb energy in small amounts to extend shield effectiveness?

Weapons posed a major debate. We figured virtual doomsday weapons would be possible (e.g. a hand phaser that would dissect a Borg vessel) but that would be inconsistent with the ideals of Starfleet and Roddenberry's vision. Whatever would be developed, it would need to be used in a defensive posture. Perhaps a new Phaser weapon mat could "stun" an entire ship without damaging vessel or crew'?

COMPUTERS AND SENSORS

Well, we have Faster-Than-Light computers in the "D"version. What more can we do? My idea was to build a symbiotic computer capable of limited telepathy. The new system could anticipate the desires and needs of crew and passengers. Cater thought that was going too far. We both agreed that sensor range and capability would be vastly superior.

SHIP CONSTRUCTION

Enterprise "F." Will she be bigger, smaller or

what'? Carter believed that it could be a small vessel for a crew of 20, but the major debate rested on where would the ship go. If used for intergalactic travel, it would need to be the same size or larger than the Galaxy Class starship in order to hold crew and their families; plus include enough space so nobody experiences "cabin fever" on extended missions. Whatever her size, we played around with the idea of a shape-shifting vessel. Carter felt this could be confusing if Main Engineering could bounce from deck to deck. More than 27 years ago, the seeds of what would grow to become the cultural phenomenon called STAR TREK were sown in one man's psyche. That man was Gene Roddenberry. Piece by piece, he constructed a whole new universe parallel to our own for us to play in and dream in. He peopled it with beings who have lived long and prospered; they have also gone forth and multiplied into many successful Trek movies and two spin-off series.

One of Mr. Roddenberry's classic creations was the enterprising starship captain named James T. Kirk. William Shatner was the actor who brought him to life, then wrestled with the persona for more years and through more controversies than his original contract called for.

Through his book of "Star Trek Memories," Shatner endeavors to take the reader back into the cultural, business, political and personal climates that gave birth to the phenomenon. He takes you backstage, but you won't be seeing the Enterprise or the terrain of an unknown planet. While the United States and particularly Hollywood in the 1960s might be considered alien, this tour focuses on people - - the writers, directors, producers, gaffers, actors, f/x artists and others who first collaborated to bring STAR TREK to the television screen. Many of their names have passed into cinematic legend, and this is really their book. That's why it isn't title "<u>My</u> Star Trek memories."

Through extensive interviews, Shatner allows other people's words to set the tone and pace. Majel Barrett, Bob Justman, Bjo Trimble, Leonard Nimoy, Dorothy Fontana, Eddie Milkis, Nichelle Nichols, Fred Frieberger - - these people and many more formed the creative trust that brought Trek into existence and kept it breathing for its first three years. Their stories are often as fascinating and colorful as their careers have been (especially the few elusive hints sprinkled throughout the book, of stories that haven't been told and retold over the years). many of these individuals could write their own "memories" and be worth the book-lengths. There are just a few of glimpses of Shatner's personal take on Trek's early, rocky road to icon status. His guidebooktype narrative jumps back and forth a great deal through a variety of recollections, but ultimately provides the continuity that ties them together. William Shatner's story is one that would have been extremely interesting to read, if he had allowed "Star Trek Memories" to focus on his unique position in Trek lore. Instead, he serves only as the guide on this journey. And while he's doing that, he tries to convey a nonchalance that doesn't work, especially in some of the pointed jabs he aims at himself and his now-famous Attitude. Was Captain Kirk a job for an actor or a lifetime commitment to the phenomenon and to the fans? Of course, it was a job but a powerful one. Shatner briefly touches on his view of the popularity of Trek and his own character. What he conveys in those few instances seems to be a belated appreciation for the show's longstanding popularity and fan influenced rebirth. Suddenly he is seeing Trek fandom through new eyes, and ves it did do a lot for his career. But this sudden conversion after decades of indifference makes its sincerity questionable.

"Star Trek memories" doesn't have anything truly new or earth-shattering for longtime fans. Only those who discovered Trek with THE NEXT GENERATION in the 1980s will not have heard most of these stories and rumors and reports through the grapevine over the years. They may have to struggle to keep the thread of the story as it is unraveled through multiple voices, but the history does run true.

Not since the Whitfield/Roddenberry "Making of Star Trek" (1968) and David Gerrold's "The World of Star Trek" (1973) has a book sought to document the beginnings of Trek and explore why it happened and how. Star Trek Memories does this from a unique and untried perspective, through others' eyes and thoughts and illustrated with many black-and-white photos and sketches that haven't been published as part of such a compilation before.

But it cuts short too soon. The book stops with the television show's cancellation--just three short years out of a history that spans decades. The wealth of that history dealing with Trek's syndication success and its regeneration in feature films is left untapped, tucked away ... perhaps waiting for the next book?`



Deep Space Nine has now warped it's way into Star Trek lore with it's first season of nineteen episodes. May I offer a standing ovation! DS9 has proved that it is a worthy successor to the Star Trek of the past, and yet still has it's own style and flair. By all measures it had a fantastic first season. I think mat it's done so well (as opposed to TNG's wobbly beginning) because it had a running start. When DS9 began production, they already had a crew of directors, makeup artists, set builders, casters, and most especially writers, who knew how to make great Star Trek.

They really had a doozy of a season finale, taking on startlingly relevant social issues with the exciting action and intricate plot we've come to expect from Star Trek, 1 had to smile when I realized how different it was from TNG's finale, and yet still both are great Star Trek. Sisko's an interesting character with some real possibilities. I was a bit disappointed that we didn't see many episodes that gave us a chance to look inside of him after the premier. I hope this next year will give him some really dramatic, gut wrenching episodes that give us a chance to see more of what makes this man tick.

Major Kira is a good solid character with lots to build on. She really got a fabulous episode with "Duet." The intense drama of the Cardassian war criminal who wasn't may have been the year's best episode. And of course who could forget her wonderfully dramatic role in "Progress" when she had to evict that old farmer. My only qualm is that sometimes she is a bit too hysterical. I do think she went a over the line in "Battle Lines." They'll have to remember what Shakespeare said about sound and fury signifying nothing.

I think one of the best ideas Berman& Piller had when they were setting up the show was to bring over O'Brien. What can I say'? I just plain like the Irishman! Also, his family gives the show a nice springboard for stories. I only wish they had included a family when they were building the next generation.

I like Dax, and the episode of her name was excellent. That tight courtroom drama questioned the responsibilities of a joined person and really made me think about what makes a person. Unfortunately I think Dax may be the least utilized character on DS9 so far. Once she and Sisko adjusted their relationship, I don't think they knew what to do with her. Like Sisko, we need to see what gets her worked up, what she cares about.

We need to see more taunt drama with Bashir too. They really could do a nice episode that puts him in a place where he is forced to mature.

It was good to see Q on DS9, I hope he starts making a yearly appearance there. TNG will be ending after this next year, and I really doubt that he will show up in the TNG movies. Somehow having an omnipotent being on your side tends to kill the tension necessary for a movie. I enjoy the character, so I'm glad to know that he won't disappear with a flash when TNG leaps to the movies.

Quark is a likable rogue, and more than just a villain. I thought it was a perfect illustration of his character in "Duet" when in one breath he was expressing sympathy for the survivors of the concentration camp and in the next breath trying to figure how to make money off of them.

Odo is a real backbone of the series. Despite early similarities to Data and Spock, his cynicism and search for his people make him quite unique. And of coursed the Quark/Odo scenes are becoming as much a part of Star Trek as the Spock-McCoy feuds are.

They need to give us more Bajoran culture. In TNG the Klingons were developed with intriguing ritual and mystery. More of this kind of thing needs to be incorporated into the Bajorans. I don't mean they should be Klingonized, but we need to get a better idea of the Bajoran mindset. I think the development of Bajoran culture should be turned over to the writer who did so well with the Klingons, Ron Moore.

I don't think there's any doubt that DS9 got off to a great start and we'll have lots of fun seeing where they take us in the years to come.

BOOKS **Alien Nation:** The day of descent 6 dark horizon Reviewed by Rhonda E. Green

Yo, Terts and Slagsl Grab a glass of White Gold and listen up! If you are a fan of Alien Nation, or even just an enthusiast, you are missing out if you haven't read the new novels yet.

Book #1, *The Day of Descent* was written by Judith and Garfield Reeves-Stevens (remember Prime Directive?) This book is the prequel to the series. We are given Sikes' first days as a detective, George's final days as a slave, and the events leading up to those first days in the Mojave Desert We can now put faces on the people that were only mentioned before, like Matt's daughter, Kirby, and George's brother, Ruhtra. We meet the first Purists and the Overseers before they lost control. This book is a must read for any and all who want background information on everyone involved.

Book #2, Dark Horizon, was written by K.W. Jeter and is based on the screenplays "Green Eyes" (the season Finale) and "Dark Horizon" (the proposed season premiere). This novel allows us to pick our jaws up off of the floor where they fell when FOX announced that it had cancelled the series after one season. This book was a page turner. More than the series, or the first novel, it makes us privy to the characters thoughts as the races cope with new, intermingled lives, and how important each are to the other. Justas a Chekkah warrior arrives on Earth to assimilate into the culture in order to return the cargo to their masters, a deadly bacteria is released by the Purists to kill the Tenctonese. We learn exactly how the two cultures are learning to live together -- or not! We see just how much of their culture and behaviors were lost, but also how much has been gained.

I only expect great things from book #3, *Body* and Soul, by the Trek-world-famous author Peter David. It should be available in November. Until then, *Aim see terrata yas rifym vacwa vots tla*.

GAMES Absolute For Game Boy Systems **Star Trek: TNG** Reviewed by C.J. Palmer

Most of you know by now of the three Star Trek 25th Anniversary video games: One for the IBM-PC, one for the Nintendo 8-bit system, and one for the Game Boy. Now there is a Next Generation game. At present, it is only available for the Game Boy system, but a Super Nintendo version is expected out soon.

The Game Boy version is very well done considering the format, The graphics are excellent for this type of video game (8-bitwith monochrome graphics) and it has very good playability. It is a bit longer than the 25th Anniversary Game Boy game, but it is a little better done. It has the same basic layout, but in a Next Generation setting. The controls are easy to master, but the game is tough to master and will prove a challenge to even the most experienced of players.

The Game Boy version has one drawback; The audio is not as good as I would have hoped for. Use the headphones for better clarity.

There is a also a Super Nintendo version due out later this year (expect a Christmas release) for Spectrum Holobyte. This writer has had the opportunity to play-test the prototype. Despite a few bugs, it is an excellent video game, This version uses SNES mode-seven graphic; with a 32,768 color palette and full digital audio with an embedded Dolby surround track. Lt will be a 12 to 16 megabit cartridge with either a battery backup or password (at this point, no one knows for sure which), to save a game in progress. It is on of the most visually stunning 16-bit video games I have seen. The control lavout takes a little getting used to, but makes full use of the 8-button layout of the SNES control pad. The game is long, but not tedious or tiresome. If the finished product looks anything like the prototype, it will be well worth the money.

The Game Boy version is already on the market from Absolute and retails for \$32.95. The Super Nintendo version is expected to retail at about \$55-\$70,

There is no definite word from any publisher as to whether an IBM-PC version is in the works, When the official word comes out, I will let you know as soon as possible.

It couldn't end like this- not after all I had been through! I'd spent months and precious fuel scavenging the planets and moons in the nearby constellations for every scrap of precious minerals I could find, and even that wasn't easy. Between lightening storms, earthquakes, and molten lava I had lost several landers and a good portion of my crew. And when we occasionally found life, it was hardly friendly - luckily, when captured, the critters would make us some extra money with a Melnorme treader with a flair for biodata.

Now my holds were filled to the brim, I had successfully negotiated an alliance contract with the bizarre race of religious bird-like humanoids called the Pkunk (the friendly little guys even gave me three of their vessels to add to my fleet!), and now I was heading home at maximum hy-

perspace speed. With the resource units I would make for the sale of minerals to the commander of Earth Starbase. I could buy more fuel, more crew, or build more modules for my starship. I might even have enough to construct more ships form companion fleet- in any case, I would be one step closer to overthrowing the evil Ur-Quan Hierarchy that had subjugated the people of Earth the her allies for far too long.

But now the red alert sirens were blaring, and the image on my viewscreen filled me with horror - two blazing red globes connected by a single pylon, pulsing with energy. These strange probes had been plaguing the nearby systems for weeks - professing to come in peace, and then breaking off in the middle of conversation to attache. There must have been some error in their command program, and right now I wished I had assigned higher priority to discovering and informing their creator of this flaw.

Quickly, I looked over my options. I did not have enough crew left for sustained combat, and I didn't want to risk any of my support ships in battle. Diplomacy was not an option - these probes had a twisted logic all their own. Then, a desperate plan came to me - when the probe attacked, I gunned my engines and headed straight for a nearby planet. The probe's electrical bursts danced over my hull, and I almost heard the screams of my crewmates perishing. But a spread from my ion guns drove the probe back a few klicks, enough time to enter the planets gravity field.

Using the planets gravity as a slingshot, I zoomed ahead of my aggressor and activated the hyperspace escape module that the Starbase Commander had given me, I knew that my ship would be immobilized for ten long seconds as the device charged, but the distance I put between my self and the probe should have been sufficient. SHOULD have been ... I crossed my fingers and bit my lip. Six seconds had passed. My ship flashed wildly, and the probe was almost upon me. Four...three...two...the lightening bolts lashed out again, and I knew I would not survive another assault ... one ... just as the bolt would have connected, my ship rocketed into hyperspace, leaving my assailant cursing in binary. I had lived to oppose the Ur-Quan another day.

There's where a game gets to you. Star Control II draws you right in with its engaging plot, easy to read manuals, and non-linear storyline, Your goal is to build up your ship and fleet to the point where you can overthrow the Ur-Quan, but to do so you'll need to make alliances with other starfaring races and avoid being toasted by the Ur-Quan and their battle thralls.

While the graphics are absolutely stunning, and the music (even without a sound card) some of the best I've ever heard, the secret to Star Control II's success is its diversity, The game is enormous, with hundreds of beautifully rendered planets and stars, dozens of alien races each with their own unique cultures and spacecraft, and a plot that is complex but not overwhelming.

Although your quest is a daunting one, the designers went out of their way to make things easier for you. Although you spend most of the early portion of the game mining planets to improve your ship enough to even FIND other

civilizations out there, the two most useful items in the game (in my opinion) are available to you fairly early on. Planets can be scanned for weather conditions, temperature, minerals, energy sources, and several other factors from orbit before you land and explore them - it's a good thing, too, because hostile planetary conditions will make exploration and mineral gathering difficult if not deadly. It's nice to be prepared! For those of those like me who are better adventurers than combat jockeys, the programmers (bless them!) installed an optional "auto-pilot" that fights vour battles for you, although you make the command decisions. Although the manual describes this as akin to "taking a shower with a rain coat on," I found this game challenging enough withouthaving to worry about having guick enough reflexes. A built-in starmap and auto-navigation makes plotting courses easy, and for those who want combat experience without risking their campaign, the came has a separate stand-alone program called SuperMelee that lets you try out any ship in the game against any other ship. This is a full game in itself, as you can play against the computer or another human player and you can even assemble whole fleets to go at each other.

Of drawbacks, Star Control II has very few. One is that the captain (you) controls all ship functions - it would have been nice to have separate crewmen for navigation, communications, etc., that you could name and such. Although the game's graphics, sound, and animation are unmatched, you need a high-end computer to run the game properly - my 386/33Mhz with 2 MB of RAM works just line. In addition, while I applaud Accolade for making music you can hear without a sound card, you really need one to fully appreciate the game. Star Control II is laced with humor throughout, but much of it is dependent on sound. For example, the race mentioned above, the Pkunk, are religious lunatics. Often, when one of their ships is destroyed in combat, for no reason at all the ship reappears in a burst of light as a loud "HALLELUJAH" blares over your speaker. I was rolling in laughter, but those without my sound card might not be able to share my appreciation. Finally, the copy protection gets really tiresome after the first few times you play. Every single time you run the game, it asks you to locate a star on the enclosed paper starmap. This gets very tedious after a while. In Accolades attempt to deter software piracy, they wind up hurting legitimate owners more. To its credit, Accolade will replace lost or destroyed maps as long as you prove your ownership.

But these are extremely minor faults, as this game is as close to perfect as I've seen them come. There is a terrific balance between exploration, diplomacy, plot intrigue, combat, and strategy. The plot is riveting, engaging, and fast moving enough to draw you in after only a few sessions. There are about 100 hours of play possible here, I'd wager, with some replay value in that it is possible to win the game without meeting each and every one of the alien races. This games gets a 9.8 on my scale of 1 to 10. Bravo, Accolade, this is the best attempt I've seen yet at a space exploration simulator, and I don't impress easily. Now if only I could get rid of those stinking probes...

Growth Industry: Space Industrialization by Brent W. Shacklett, USS Khai Tam

The Cold War is over. Defense sensitive industries and companies are ebbing; companies that were mainstays in the US economy only a few years ago are no longer such a great deal for investors; even IBM is reorganizing. American industry and world industries are realigning themselves, trying to absorb the vast new information technology and the changes that have arisen in the last few years. Third world countries that just a few years ago were considered "banana republics" are designing and launching satellites and building major appliances and automobiles, while being one of the "industrialized nations" now means leading in information and "high tech" technologies. We all have come a long way since 1945.

So, what are the new business opportunities and investment vehicles that will fuel the 21st century?

We are today poised on the edge of the greatest potential change in the answers to these and many other questions since the introduction of the moving assembly line (thank you, Mr. Henry Ford).

Transcending the Limits to Growth:

In the next few years, commercial ventures in space could provide improved information services, unique space-derived products, and perhaps up to 60% of America's, and, yes, the world's, electrical energy. In the long run, the commercialization of space could also act as a stepping stone to the large scale colonization of space and entire new markets for goods and services.

Most of the world's countries today face monumental problems, but the dilemma of the nonindustrialized, undernourished, and undercapitalized nations is particularly alarming. With soaring populations, they must undergo social changes at a considerably higher rate than all other countries in history. Their combined growth, based on the current rate, will bring well over a billion new people in the next 20–25 years alone.

There are no longer empty continents with lush vegetation into which vas populations can migrate. Efforts at population control can be intensified, but he time lag between declining birthrates and slowing population growth will be many decades, during which time the population will continue to grow vigorously.

The expansion of Earth-based industries needed to support improvement in the global standard-of-living at the population levels predicted for the next 30-40 years has triggered serious concern about the availability of energy and raw materials as well as the environmental burden caused by waste products, waste heat, and pollutants (such as getting the developing Third World countries, and especially China, to sign the Montreal Protocol on the protection of the ozone layer).

It is inevitable that Third World countries will and should develop their societies, bringing them up to par with me industrialized countries; but how? The planet has very limited resources and a diminishing capacity to handle the mistakes the present industrialized countries have made and are making along these lines. What to do? Do we allow society to divide into a groups of haves and have-nots, endlessly fighting over resources, or do we find, using our great information and technological capacity, solution for everyone, including Mother Earth?

The industrialization of space, however, appears to offer a solution to the limits-to-growth problem. Such a move could generate new products and services and eventually could shunt energy- and pollution-intensive industries into space where both energy and waste reservoirs are plentiful. The resources of space could be used to create wealth for all mankind without detrimental effects on Earth's environment.

Foremost among the needs of the large majority of mankind are industrial development and diversification, increasing employment, slowing the growth of population, planting schedules, and weather forecasting. Developing and re-invigorating our cities, providing better and more affordable health care, as well as developing new markets for goods and services are key.

In addition, industrialized nations have the concerns of energy shortages, energy independence, the depletion of raw materials, environmental damage, and economic stagnation.

The goals of the space industrialization program therefore include making a major contribution to increased productivity on Earth without taxing the environment, generating new values through extraterrestrial productivity, and providing new options for future growth, including the permanent settlement of space and long-range colonization and exploration projects.

Space industrialization, from a business viewpoint, may help us transcend the social woes of the times by tapping the virtually unlimited energy available in space and by exploiting space's excellent transmission characteristics for energy and information, In addition, space offers almost infinite room for human activities, a benign environment (except in the radiation belts where we must provide protective cosmic radiation background shielding) and plenty of raw materials. To exploit these resources of space to maximum advantage, future space industrialization will utilize very large structures, long flight durations, and manned orbital service and maintenance of the shuttle and planetary exploration fleet(s).

The long-range goal of space industrialization is the expansion -- and thus the survival -- of mankind. Nearer-term goals of space industrialization are three-fold; To furnish space-derived services for which agencies, industries, and the public are willing to pay; to provide space-derived products or goods that are salable and profitable; and to provide energy from space.

The space shuttle program provided the first step in establishing a permanent presence in space and then to industrialize -- reusability of equipment. Shuttles were designed to be launched, fly their mission in Earth orbit, and the land and be recycled to another mission and launch -- making the shuttle the most economical and cost-effecttive transportation method available to handle the launching of delicate and specialized satellite

equipment or for running specialized experiments that could not be done remotely from the ground. Standard liquid-fueled and solid-fueled rockets work well for some applications such as satellite launches, but the shuttle's human element makes space an "operating environment" It's time for the next step.

The Space Station - Our First Permanent Outpost:

Not only will the new space station be a launch platform for new probes and planetary missions to the moon, Mars, Venus, and the outer planets, but it will also serve as a testing ground form new industrial applications and technologies that can fulfill our obligations and goals with new products, new forecasting, new medicines, new industrial applications and processes, and, like the information revolution that preceded it, other things that we, even now, could not conceive of in our wildest dreams.

The space station will allow for re-fueling, weather forecasting and observation, ozone monitoring, and probably most importantly, act as a staging area for moon-related activities including a new moonbase that would soon follow. Space station activities and facilities would allow world industries to test new products, processes, and create a new generation of space-based related products and applications.

For example, in the weightlessness of space,

large, structurally perfect, single crystals can be grown and will prove to be valuable to the electronics industry. This one area could be worth over \$2 billion by the year 2000. Other electronic products that could be made better in space due to its unique environment include compount semiconductors, integrated circuit chips, magnetic switches, relays, magnetic detectors, ultrasonic and optical-frequency filters, superconductors, radiation detectors, holographic storage crystals, and a variety of specialized medical and industrial compounds.

Space industrialization is expected to have numerous other applications in the areas of materials science, metallurgy, composite materials, and the creation of new compounds and alloys. Great potential exists, too, for growing and processing biological products in space, including pancreatic cells (for insulin), pituitary cells, macrophages (useful in early detection of immunological reactions), bone marrow, blood cells (including lymphocytes which help organ transplant reaction), enzymes, and sperm cells (for rapid and pure growth of farm animals).

The production in space of the enzyme urokinase, for example, could prevent up to 50,000 deaths per year alone in the United States due to thromboembolisms caused by blood clotting. The cost here on Earth is \$1,200 per dose; in microgravity, urorkinase could be produced for \$75-100 per dose, including transportation cost to and from space. But, faced with spiraling costs and threatened cancellation, NASA Administrator Daniel Goldin in March sent engineers back to their drawing boards to develop a cheaper version or the 20vear-old proposed design of the space station -one that can be developed in five years, can be delivered to space in eight or nine shuttle missions instead of 17, may or may not be permanently staffed, and can achieve scientific objecttives in 10-15 years instead of 30. 'We had two choices," explained Goldin in a recent interview. "We had an opportunity for no space station, or we had an opportunity for a space station."
