Official Election Announcement

On November 21, 1994, the CPA engaged by the Starfleet Election Coordinator (Vice Admiral Lori Anne Brown) conducted a conference call with Vice Admiral Anita Davis, Fleet Admiral Rob Lerman, Captain David Miller (representing Vice Admiral Dan McGinnis) and Vice Admiral Janis Moore. The results of the Starfleet Election Balloting, as provided by the CPA, were

Janis Moore - 450 votes Anita Davis - 496 votes Rob Lerman - 737 votes Dan McGinnis - 1032 ---- 2715 votes cast ----

Voter tumout was approximately 33.9% (based on the number of current members on the roster as of 10/15/94), which was a marked improvement over the approximate 26% turnout of the 1992 election and years previous. Approximately fifty ballots were either returned as undeliverable or were disqualified due to incorrect markings, lack of markings, etc.

The Starfleet Admiral Board will be reviewing some complaints that were filed during the Election process after ballots were mailed. Any questions of comments regarding the complaints should be conducted in private, and any decisions reached by the Admiralty Board on these complaints will be final.

Mailing Frequencies Open

As I'm sure all of you know, first class postage is going up in January. I have already had inquiries about how this would affect how Stampede stamps are sold. Actually, there will be no change due to the rate increase. Most of our stamps are sold by weight, so unless they make the new stamps a *lot* bigger, that wont' change. One good thing to look forward to is a lot of new commemorative stamps. I urge you to save commemorative stamps if you don't have time to save al the other stamps. Over 50% of our Stampede funds are raised from the sale of commemoratives.

Now this is the time of year you see a lot of bright red, green, and blue envelopes. Remember, we can't use stamps on those bright papers. The stamps are soaked off prior to being sold, and one or two red or green ones can tinit a big batch and render them unusable. Also, lately I am getting stamps with staples in them. These are considered damaged, and they can't be sold. I know you hear this from me all the time, but one more time - - Christmas stamps, Just Say No.

For those reading this column for the first time, let me explain what the Stampeded program is all about.

Starfleet Stampede is a community service program sponsored by **Starfleet** International. Fleet members (and friends) save cancelled postage stamps, trim and sort them, and send them to a central location to be sold to stamp dealers. The funds raised go to two charities, UNICEF and ASAP. Stamps should be trimmed with between 1/4 and 1/2 inch of paper left on all sides. They should be sorted in groups of foreign, commemorative, love, definitive, and postcards (left whole). Christmas stamps have been dropped because there is NO market for them. When you send your stamps in, please use the least expensive way. Stampede is an ongoing project, so third class or UPS is fine. Each chapter or individual that sends in stamps will be mentioned by name in this column for the month your contribution was received.

The months of October and November were good ones with over eighteen pounds of stamps collected. Our star contributor was the USS Stellar Wind. They collected over half of this total. A big

thank you goes out to Cmdr Adam Day and the crew of USS Stellar Wind. The rest of the contributors for this period were: USS Alliance, Shuttle Andromeda, USS Bonaventure, Denis Bauschard, Elenore Claassen, Thersa Clark and the Dispatch staff of the Placer County Sherrif's Department in Tahoe City, CA, Sherry Hopper and the College of Federation Studies, Chris Wallace of DTS, USS Equinox, USS IDIC, USS Jeannette Maddox, USS Joshua, USS Jurassic, Shuttle Legend, USS Moonchaser, USS Nighthawk, Elizabeth Phillips, USS Sparrow Hawk, USS Triumph, Sue Uram, William Vodrey, and, finally, a mystery envelope with no name from Warren, OH.

I can't say often enough how much I appreciate all the work that all of you spend collecting and sending in these stamps. Our project is not big and flashy, but over the years, hundreds of dollars have been raised from the sale of what is basically recycled material. The size of your ship doesn't limit your participation, and there has been an increasing num-



For the past two years, a project called *Starship Earth* has mobilized members of *Star Trek* fans organizations around the world in an effort here are a start when the start of the star


effort to raise funds to plant a memorial grove of trees in memory of Gene Rodden-



A Shiny Happy Starfleet Bv Ed Tennant Shuttle Ambassador

[Author's note: This article was written for New Frontier's the newsletter of the USS Challenger, three years ago. It was withheld from publication due to "security reasons." according to the Starfleet Intelligence Public Relations Division, and pulled at the last minute. With the increasing warming of relations with the Klingon Empire, SFIPI decided that this article could be released. The author has since updated the article] When one thinks of Starfleet, the usual thought

is of Starfleet Naval, the largest division of Starfleet, which encompasses the starships that we are all familiar with. However, there are other divisions of Starfleet as well. Colonel West's involvement in the attempted assassination of the Federation President at Khitomer shows that there exists Starfleet ground forces, and the well - known Commander Shelby is a part of Starfleet Tactical. Starfleet Intelligence's involvement in a number of operations is increasingly becoming more apparent, but there exists a division of Starfleet that encompasses elements of both Starfleet Intelligence and Starfleet elements of born Starlieet Intelligence and Starlieet Tactical, known simply as the Starlieet Aggressors. In the declassified *Enterprise* exercise known as "Lovely Angel," the USS *Hathaway* (CA-2598) was pitted against the *Enterprise*. That's the type of mission the Aggressors usually perform, using simulated Threat starships and tactics (whether the energy be Klingon Romulan Gorn, Kzinti Tholian enemy be Klingon, Romulan, Gom, Kzinti, Tholian or otherwise) against Federation starships in order for the Federation to develop counter-tactics. The Aggressors are primarily a naval unit, although there exists a Starfleet Marine Aggressor unit and Rangers and SEALS have been participants in

Rangers and SEALS have been participants in these Aggressor units. Some of these simulated Threat starships are older frigates, usually of the Loknar or Chandley class. These has the added advantage of having "wings" on which to paint Bird-of-Prey markings on them. Most of the Aggressors' ships come from "the other Starfleet," known official as the Starfleet Ready Reserves, either other ships awaiting disassembly, decommissioned ships in storage

and unlikely to be assigned any mission, or prototypes with no foreseen further use. These ships are usually pitted against Enterprise-class heavy cruisers, or Decatur/Belknap-class strike cruisers. Not all of the Aggressor ships are museum pieces, however. They have a formidable opponent with the USS *Komsomolsk* (DN-2600), which, although only 87% complete, hold guite well against the Excelsior/Ingram-class space control ships.

Down at the Arcturus Test Range, there exists a rumor that a few captured Klingon ships are actually crewed by Federation personnel and used as Aggressors. Beyond what is public record of captured Klingon ships, all of which are under the jurisdiction of Starfleet Intelligence, there is no concrete evidence to support this. There is also little evidence to find out just how big the Aggressor fleet is. Several of the ships still bear the names that were assigned to them at decommissioning, names that may have been adopted by a later ship. Others bear the name of the project they were constructed under (as in the case of the USS RangerCL-2701, which was also given its Project number as its NCC number, and the decommissioned USS Ranger DD-777; both conflict with the current shuttle carrier USS Ranger.) Still others may have never been officially readed but given pages by the crews who flaw

Ranger.) Still others may have never been officially named, but given names by the crews who flew them. (This is the reason for the USS *Silent Running*; when Starbase 29 failed to detect them on long-range sensors, the base commander was heard to exclaim, "This can't be! They're silent running!" -- and the name stuck.) Before it was disbanded, the 580th Special Operations Wing was assigned to the USS *Challenger*, and it performed as a Klingon Aggressor Unit. The Cold Detente with the Klingons and increasing exchange programs with them halted Aggressor unit actions for awhile. However, at least fifteen units still remain active and on stand-by alert, and there is no indication that these remaining unite will be disbanded. remaining unite will be disbanded.


These feeling are apparent in all the different activities that the region participates in; from Christmas in October in K.C., the many different community service events in Wichita, right to my



Pleiades Meteor Showers at Emerald Bav by Lt Commander Anne Woods, Shuttle Golden Gate - San Francisco, CA

12 August 1994

In August, I was able to take a wonderful three day kayaking trip (through CAL Adventures in Berkeley, California) to Emerald Bay, which is at South Lake Tahoe, to watch the Pleiades meteor showers. Emerald Bay is a beautiful little spot, reachable only be boat A (except for the rangers). Attention, Please by Lt Barbara Slater Chief of Security, USS Charleston

'Tis the season to be jolly, to share fellowship with your family and friends and to be thankful for all the good things in our lives, but 'tis also the season to be especially wary and watchful. This is the high point of a thief's calendar year, because of all the goodies and crowds and homes left empty while you work that extra seasonal job to pay for all the goodies.

You know about being aware of everyone around you in a crowd, and for the need to keep your money, cards, and keys safe from pursesnatchers and pickpockets. You know about checking around and under your car when you return to it, and making sure that the backseat or trunk doesn't have uninvited passengers in them. You know about keeping your doors and windows locked while you're driving, and not picking up hitchhikers or stopping in dangerous neighborhoods. You might even have a "Club" securing the front wheel of your car.


What about your home or apartment? Do you have double-cylinder deadbolts installed in all doors that connect to the outside? Do you use them, until it becomes habit to activate the lock when you leave the premise! Do you have devices in your window frames to keep from being slip up from the outside by a thief who just broken the glass and opened the window lock? Do you have window locks that must use a key to open them?

If you live in your own home, you can make these modifications yourself. If you rent, you can insist that your landlord install at least the deadbolts. The window-frame slide-stoppers are available in hardware stores, and you can install them yourself.

Keep your home and yard looking like someone is constantly there. Don't let mail or papers or trash accumulate. Use timers on a couple of lights in the house so it isn't dark. If your neighbor is willing, and has two cars, invite him/her to park one of them in your parking area if you're going to be gone for awhile, or have a second job at night. There are inexpensive motion-detector sensors you can buy and install on the backside of your dwelling, so that if someone is there, the light goes on. I understand you can hook one of these up to an alarm, too.

If the streetlights are not in proper working order, so that a thief can hide in the darkness, bug the electric company until they're fixed. Keep shrubbery and trees trimmed in such a way that a thief can't hide behind them while working on entering your home, or use them to climb to a second-story window, porch, or door, which you should secure in the same way that you do your first-level accesses. Keep your outside toolshed and/or laundry room locked - the robber will look for tools in both of these places. If you have a sliding door, fix it so that it locked and unslideable when you want it to be so. A really determined thief might break the glass anyway to get in, so make sure that the doors to the room can be secured.

Such a burglar might kick in a deadbolted back door. since the deadbolt doesn't usually extend into the wall studs around the door. You can put an alarm system on the door to alert the police, but there is a simpler way to back up the deadbolt on the back door. Put a bar of wood or metal across the door, and anchor the bracea for it on the wall

Starfleet celebrates its 20th anniversary in 1994. Many things have changed in the twenty years since a nad of die-hard fans got together to share memories of a "dead and gone" TV show. *Deep Space Nine, Star Trek: The Next Generation,* and even the series of feature films were far in the future. All that remained of *Star Trek* besides sporadic late night airings on independent TV stations was its legion of dedicated fans.

The fans were made and are the building blocks of which the *Star Trek* legend is made. Twenty years ago, "Trekkies" came out of the woodwork to attend widely scattered conventions in hopes of seeing their favorite stars, getting their hands on some of the rare merchandise available, and sharing their enthusiasm with other fans.

Tweny years later, *Star Trek* is an accepted part of American culture. Nearly everyone is aware of some aspect of *Star Trek*. "Trekkers" abound. People wear their fandom on their bumpers, their personalized license plates, their jackets, sweatshirts, T-shirts, ties, and ever their underwear. The "*Enterprise* arrowhead" is recognized almost universally, and the names and faces of Kirk, Spock, McCoy, and Scotty are held more readily that those of major world leaders. Conventions are held every weekend somewhere across the nation, and merchandising is a multimilion dollar business.

So, with all this immense popularity, why are there only eleven people on the rolls of the USS Whatchamacallit? You just can't seem to find the fans to populate your ship. It's not because the market is not there; it's because you're not reaching it as effectively as you could be.

There are literally dozens of ways that you can let people know that you exist. Most of them are absolutely free; some will set you back the cost of a stamp or two. I am going to outline here a few of the methods and ideas I've used over the years in promoting **Starfleet** and some of my personal business ventures.

Two of the main problems that stand in the way of successful promotion are **ignorance** (too much) and **motivation** (not enough). Most people are not aware of the resources available to them or don't know how to take advantage of them.

Let's say that you're the CO of a ship, your monthly meeting is about to get underway, and you find yourself looking around the room at the same six, eight, or ten faces you looked at last month, the month before, and the month before that. You've got thirty people on your roster, but these are the faithful few. You're not getting anywhere, and you just wish you could get a few new faces around the table to help start things up. The doors are open, but people aren't coming in. Why?

The first step in attracting new people to your ship is to have a clear idea of who and what you are. You are first and foremost a Star Trek fan! You are a weirdo! That's right - you ARE weird. "Fan" is short for fanatic, and "weird" means off, unique, or eccentric. Look it up if you don't believe me. You are an eccentric fanatic. Come on, repeat after me, "I am WEIRD!" Don't you feel better? Don't you feel cleansed? Say it again, "I am WEIRD!"

again, ram WEIRD! Seriously, so many ships are floundering around and in trouble because they afraid to step out and be identified. "We don't want to go out in public in uniform. People will think we're weird." "Oh, we can't go there. They might think we're weirdos." I don't think we should do that. You don't want people to think we're weird or something." I have heard these words and others like them from the lips of more than one **Starfleet** member - - and, friends, these are the lips that will sink ships. We ARE weird. So what? We're not criminals, drug abusers, or sex offenders. We're *Star Trek* fans trying to do a little good for our communities and have a little fun while we're doing it. With the widespread level of acceptance



that Star Trek has achieved, it's not something to be ashamed of. If you're not proud of your organization, you shouldn't be part of it. After all, we're not the only ones in our communities that dress up funny and run around trying to help people. Think about the Shriners. They were funny hats, funny clothes, and drive funny little cars, but does anybody think the enormous good they do is funnny or weird! I don't think so. Why should we be any less respected?

Okay, off the soapbox and on with the subject. The best way to let people know you're out there is to attract attention to yourselves. Stop having your meetings in basements and living rooms, and start having them in restaurants and shopping malls. Have you got a community center or recreation center in your town? I'll bet they've got a meeting room you can use. How about the public library? What about that picnic pavilion in the park? Go any place that has a public meeting facility. They're generally free, and all you have to do is ask in advance. A hundred people might stare or laugh at you, but if ten come up and ask you questions and five of them sign aboard, is it worth it?

Now that you're having your meetings in public, *let the public know you're having a meeting*. It's a lot easier than you think. Here are just a few ideas I've used over the years:

Newspapers. Almost every newspaper, small town or big city, has a community bulletin board or something. Look through your paper. You'll find club notices like "The Kiwanis Club will meet at...", "This month's Rotary Club meeting will be...". Or Boy Scout Troop 111 meets...."

at...", "This month's Rotary Club meeting will be..." Or Boy Scout Troop 111 meets...." Lion's Clubs, MADD, Knights of Columbus, Weight Watchers... they're all there. Is Starfleet: The International Star Trek Fan Association there? It is in my local papers, both of them, and in the "Neighbors" section of the big city newspaper next door. Every month. It's advertising that doesn't cost anything. Just send in a press release: "The International Star Trek Fan Association, will hold its monthly meeting at 7 pm on Monday, April 1 at the Community Center. Mr. John Jones, director of the local food bank, will be the guest speaker. Refreshments will be served following the meeting. The public is invited. For more information, call 555-5555." It works. While were on the subject of newspapers, has the public detail.

your ship done anything lately? Did you visit a hospital? Did you collect food for the food bank? Did you take part in a walk-a-thon? Did you put it in the Newspaper? Why not?! It's news! "Shuttle NoName, local chapter of Starfleet, recently held a food drive to benefit the local food bank. Fifteen members took part, manning collections boxes at area food stores. Over two hundred pounds of canned and packaged food was collected. The Simple, group plans another drive in the spring." but it gets you noticed, Send a press release out on everything you do. Newspapers are always looking for filler items. Are you planning something big? Get your local features editor to send somebody out to interview you. They'll do it. I've been interviewed three times by two different newspapers in the last nine months.

Let's turn on the TV. Local stations are required to provide a certain amount of air time for public service. Same with radio, but we'll get there in a minute. Most local cabal companies provide local access, too. If you local station has a community calendar feature, use it. Send them the same press release you send the newspaper. A station I used to work with in South Carolina does a brief public service feature in which a reporter does an on-camera interview with someone involved in a community interest event. If a station in your area does something like this, take advantage of it. Some TV stations, especially cable stations, will allow you to produce your own "infomercial" type program.

Radio is a great way to get the word out. Here again, stations are required to devote a certain amount of airtime to public service. Get on their community calendar. If you're going to be doing something that qualifies as community service, such as collecting food, having a car wash for MDA, etc., Write a PSA (public service announcement), and send it to the public service director at your local station or stations. Keep it brief and basic. A thirty second PSA is best. Announcements that re long and wordy usually get tossed out.

If you have a talk-format radio station in your area or one that is operated by a college or university, you have some good opportunities for exposure. In my several years as a talk show host, interviewed actors and entertainers, authors, politicians, and celebrities of all kinds. Often. though, my most interesting shows were those that featured local people involved in things of interest to toher local people. Unfortunately. nobody from Starfleet ever approached me for an interview, but if they had, I would have jumped at the opportunity. Not just because I'm a fan, but because Starfleet is interesting. It's unique and has a broad listener appeal. Find a talk show, and get on it. You'll be amazed at the results.

Let me pause her for a word of advise. When you are presenting yourself to these media outlets, be positive about what you are doing. If you call up one of these people and start your conversation with "You wouldn't be interested in doing an interview about **Starfleet**, would you?", you'd be right. They probably wouldn't be interested. Be positive. Make them think they're really missing something if they don't talk to you. Boldly go where... well, you get the idea. And, for Pete's sake, if you are not a brilliant orator or great public speaker, find somebody in your group who it. It's nothing to be ashamed of. Surveys show that public speaking is one of the things Americans fear most. However, there is no faster way to make a bad first impression on a listening or viewing audience than to be a nervous norvus who fidgets around, plays with his hands, looks at his feet, and says, "Duh, ummm, like, you know" every time he opens his You are representing hundreds of mouth. thousands of potential Starfleet members. Try to make the best impression you can.

As you can probably tell, I get a lot of my exercise getting on and off soapboxes. Anyway, getting back to the topic again, don't neglect or over look bulletin boards. Have you ever walked into a big supermarket, discount retailer, or coin laundry and noticed a bulletin board full of notices for babysitters, cars for sale, yard sales, and stuff like that? How many hundreds of other people do you suppose see those boards every day? Are seeing your notice there? How about vou schools, community centers, and other public facilities? I got three new members the first week after my wife put up one of our notices on the bulletin board of the community college she attends. Make them notices that will get noticed. A 3x5" white index card is going to get lost in a sea of other 3x5" white index cards. Use yellow ones or something else eyecatching. I do mine up on computer using fancy fonts and graphics, but you can do fine with a neatly printed index card as long as it catches someone's attention.

Another opportunity not to be missed is the opportunity to speak to other groups in your community. Get over the idea that you're just part of

I must confess that I approached my first viewing of ST:Generations with a great deal of trepidation. For the past year, once it became clear that Paramount had indeed committed itself to the demise of ST:TNG on the little screen, the move to the big screen was made not on artistic grounds but on economic grounds. It has been the past history of the movie industry, especially with regard to science fiction films, that when the decision to proceed with a project is based on a vague concept (as in this case the desire of the Paramount film dept. to usurp a project with a built fan following to that they could finally have access to a picture that make money for a change), rather than a clearly coherent artistic vision as with the Star Wars Saga, the movie goer gets a bad product, and the devoted fan leaves the theater thinking that a lot was missing. Let me say firt off that this review is written the day after I saw the film with a "sneak preview" audience. The energy usually available in such an environment is frequently contagious, because the audience contains individuals who were willing to stand in line (in this case in the a cold drizzle from tropical Storm Gordon) for the privilege of beating their friends to see the film. In addition, the preview crowd gets to see the film before the major local movie critics have their say. With all that said, let me say that I will wear two hats during this review: a bonafide movie & movie music buff + a Star Trek fan. I am mildly incorrigible, so I do plan to see the film again in order to pick up on the dialogue that I missed during the sustained laughter of the excited preview night crowd.

Let me say a word about the demise of the Enterprise-D. Gene Roddenberry always said that the ship is a character in the Star Trek mythos. To destroy the ship on its first trip to the movie sized screen was a major tactical error. There were no opportunities for the camera to gaze lovingly at the hull of the *Enterprise-D* as in ST-TMP. While ST-TMP has its problems, I will always remember the rousing cheer from the audience on opening night when we got to see every meter of the *Enterprise* when Kirk approached it in his shuttlecraft. Also if you look very carefully at the saucer crash sequence, the scale is impossibly flawed. The saucer section should have towered over the trees that it crashed into. This fact is evident at the end when we see the miniature sized people walking on top of the hull.

The AB during the Orlando International Conference named me to chair a committee to solicit opinions as to the future of Correspondence Chapters in fleet. Amongst the discussion was the formation of a separate Correspondence Club (non-geographic region) as well as a Fleet Department Chief position. After several months of discussion, it was decided by an overwhelming majority that a Representative who would act as a resource and advisor would be best. I was appointed to that position on 9410.14.

We have many ideas and plans to help our fellow Correy COs including a respiratory of chapter handbooks; newsletter exchanges; a history of Correspondence clubs in fleet (which I hope to None in the next few months); and the current project (now available) a detailed profile of each Correspondence Chapter. This profile is especially useful for a fleet member who is unassigned and looking for a correspondence chapter to join but is unsure what each Chapter has to offer. ON THE DEATH OF LEGENDS

It's not hard to appreciate Star Trek Generations as a well-made movie. The special FX were tremendous. The camera work was wonderful. The pacing allowed the viewer a breathing space between the fast-action sequences that took you on a roller coaster ride through the galaxy. The music was compelling, the lighting mood-enhancing, the faces familiar and dear. Generations gave us action on a cosmic scale; and a climax to shake the universe, because death is truly shattering.

So, while it's not hard to appreciate this seventh entry into Trek feature filmdom (which seems to have evaded the curse of the odd-numbered movies!), I wish someone could tell me, why do I feel ... Cheated? Why do I feel angry? Why was this movie, the long-anticipated collaboration of Trek's most famous captains on the silver screen so unsatisfying?

Perhaps because it was based on death - two deaths - - and because those deaths went uncelebrated and unacknowledged.

Captain Kirk deserved a better end, and certainly more memorable last words ... "Oh my?" The first ten minutes of the movie, when Kirk was lost to the stars...now that was poetic justice. That was death fit for a man of his stature. And while his second death was truly to save millions of lives, it just felt wrong. He was entitled to more than just falling with the scaffolding off that mountain. Even having Soran kill him would have felt more...right.

The second death? I'm referring to the death of the Enterprise-D. with which we sailed the stars for the past seven years. As I watched the saucer section crashland on Veridian-3, I thought it was truly a spectacular effect, but my thought afterward was... so what? What did this accomplish in the story? Why was it necessary? Just to make a big bang? And afterward, not one word about the death of this lady of the stars. The crew merely picked through her bones for their personal belongings and said that she could not be salvaged. This was a rather ignominious end for a galaxy-class starship. can't help but draw comparisons between this and the scene from The Search for Spock. As the Enterprise flamed out over the Genesis planet, McCoy justified her death for the audience, pointing out that Kirk had once again turned death into a fighting chance for life. That There was no was a reason for the sacrifice.

reason to sacrifice the *Enterprise-D*. The scene was wonderfully graphic, but it was gratuitous and unfulfilling.

Just as unfulfilling as the death of Picard s brother and nephew - - the scenes where he dealt with that loss were absolutely wonderful, and that event did serve to set him up for what he would find in the Nexus. But it'still seemed wrong. There was no subtlety, no finesse, no style. Just great acting on Patrick Stewart's part.

Perhaps, ultimately, I'm unsatisfied with the supposed end of Classic Trek. If they had to go out, at least *The Undiscovered Country* let them ALL go out with a bang. I'd rather have wondered and imagined what happened to Kirk and Company. Classic Trek didn't have to end with death. It wasn't necessary. ST-6 ended with life and promotion and a sense of forward-looking and moving. Someone else said to me that the first 15 minutes of the film were "pure Genes" and I have to agree.

Is it Trek? I don't know, and frankly to me it doesn't matter. What do we do with this new and improved, emotional Data? I don't really care right now, for some reason. That wasn't the point of the movie for me. Sure there were YATIs ('yet another Trek inconsistency) and some of them were really whoppers! But all in all, this was a well-directed, well-produced and well-lensed movie. It was a troubling film, too. I can't resolve how I feel, and maybe seeing it a few more times will help.

Is it truly over? Again, I don't know. Rumors are rampant, with the most rampant being: Well Kirk died *within the Nexus*, so is he really dead? As Spock once said, WI have been dead before." And, les we forget, there are always possibilities.

Like the possibility that Guinan and Uhura will one day share the same starship... like the possibility that Kirk's still alive in the Nexus... like the possibility that androids dram and love and fear....

Star Trek: Generations was about the death of legends, but how do you kill a legend? I don't think this was the way. Or, rather, it's the concept that maybe you can't keep a good legend down? I'll keep my fingers crossed.

Even when she was dead on her feet, she held it together and kept working everything through. (And we're all grateful she didn't break George Takei's arm!) They played with the children and opened their hearts to them, making sure Care+Con lived up to its creators' vision. For all their concern and their joy... for understanding the First times can be challenging and a bit rough... thanks. Together, we made it happen.

It'should have been called hearten for the eighteen celebrities who opened their hearts to the children and the fans, giving of themselves in very special ways. Some fringe fan club. <u>Starfleet</u> is a recognized, respected international organization. We promote the world's most popular science fiction scenes, and we do lots of good stuff while we're at it. We may be weirdos, but we're good legitimate weirdos! We're the kind most people don't mind having around. I have a couple of young officers on my crew who joined Starfleet as an alternative to Boy Scouts. You can't get any more legit than that. So, go volunteer to speak to the local Kiwanis or Rotary. Register with a speakers bureau. Talk to people. Even if they're not interested in joining up, you've established yourself as a viable presence in the community.

Above all, be visible. Get a unit together for a parade. Man the phones at a PBS or MDA telethon. Get a group together, and go shopping or have lunch -- IN UNIFORM. Be everywhere. Make people say, "Oh, there's the Star Trek people again." Once again, some may state, some may laugh, but some will join.

One final trip to the soapbox. Please, on the subject of visibility. Throughout this article, I have emphasized high visibility as the way to successful growth. Public meetings, public events, and public appearances are all vital to your efforts to bring new people aboard. But bear in mind the most important aspect of all this public exposure: your public image.

public exposure: your public image. Let's assume you have implemented a few of the suggestions I've set forth here. You're having your meetings in public places; you're getting on TV and getting your picture in the paper you are doing lots of public events and making lots of public appearances. What are people seeing. How are vou representing yourselves and Starfleet? Are people seeing sharp-looking officers and crew members in neat, well cared for uniforms, or are they seeing a bunch of ordinary looking people in sloppy jeans and a T-Shirt? But if you are working at a function where presentability is important, then, by ail means, be presentable. I realize that not everybody has access to a uniform; I know a lot of people can't afford uniform; I know a lot of people can't afford uniforms. I know, too, that there are a lot of people who just plain don't want a uniform. Fine. I've seen a lot of really nice looking Starfleet and Star Trek shirts and tees at conventions and conferences and such. My crew happens to be very uniform oriented, but the members that aren't generally all have something appropriate to wear for dress. Some have bought Official ship T-shirts that we had made up, some wear Starfleet Academy's shirts that they got at conventions, and some wear different varieties of Star Trek shirts. All look really sharp and nice, and I'm very proud of them. Patrick Stewart once walked off the set of a morning news show because he objected to the way a member of the show's cast was doing schtick in our costumes. He felt that the Starfleet uniform was being treated highly and disrespectfully. I wonder how he would feel about a Starfleet member who how he would leer about a Stanleet member who turns up at a public event wearing a uniform tunic with a pair of flowered shorts, sneakers, and a leather peace symbol around his neck. Hey, I know this is all supposed to be fun but while you're having fun, think about the public's perception of what you're doing. Don't get carried away and damage the timage that I hope some of the ideas I've presented here can

I hope some of the ideas I've presented here can be of some use to you in helping to brand your membership. The idea will work regardless of whether you are a well-established ship or a brand new shuttle. And, of course, I don't mean to imply that these things are the know-all, be-all, end-all ideas when it comes to PR and recruiting. If I've helped you, I'm glad; if I've offended you, I 'm sorry - but either way, I hope I've made you think. The way we think and the things we do today wilt set the course for Starfleet's next twenty years. Starfleet... the adventure will continue.

HISTORY In the 26th century, The Dominion makes its move to conquer the Federation. *Deep Space* 23 (which replaced DS9 over the years) was cap-tured, Bajor was occupied within days, and The Dominion effectively crippled virtually all Alpha Quadrant interstellar travel within months. The Dominion's strategy (which would unfold over a 50-60 year period) would leave all Alpha Quadrant civilizations economically and militarily cripple when the final invasion fleet arrived

cripple when the final invasion fleet arrived.

With no effective way to defeat The Dominion and no way to reach the Gamma Quadrant via the Bajoran Wormhole, Federation scientists and Starfleet began focusing on a different approach to the problem.

MISSION PROFILE (ORIGINAL) As conceived, the *Revolution*-class starships were to be a showcase of the latest Federation technologies in a diplomatic and military environ-ment. The U.S.S. Enterprise NCC-1701-F was to the reliability of several new technologies (the least of which being Soliton Wave Propulsion) under the rigorous demands of space exploration and the defense of Federation interests. After The Dominion began their invasion (which occurred four years prior to the completion of the Enterprise "F"), the Federation Council and the Starfleet Corps of Engineers began re-evaluating the mission specs for the Revolution-class project.

PRJECT: GATEWAY

In the late 25th century, Federation scientists experimenting with exploring other s". The schedule for achieving this mode began "realities". of exploration was as follows:

First, successfully open a stable "doorway" to another realty and be able to "seal" is closed. This was accomplished 37 years prior to The Dominion's invasion.

Second, insert probes through the "doorway" to scan the immediate area beyond it. This was achieved within two years.

* Third, send a remote-controlled probe which could transmit telemetry back to its control-ler through the "doorway". This was achieved within six years.

reality. Original experiments did not control which reality the "doorway" opened onto. This was accomplished within ten years.

* Fifth, send a person (and later, an away team) through the "doorway" for limited investiga-tions of the alternate reality. This was achieved in five years.

* Sixth, send a manned craft through the "doorway". Seal the "doorway" and reopen it in three days for the return of the vessel. This was achieved with seven years.

Seventh, enable a full-size starship to cross into an alternate reality for a long-term (six months or longer) exploration of alternative realities. The project scientists had made plans for a special ship to be used at this phase, but The Dominion's invasion abruptly halted all funding and limited all resources for achieving this goal. This stage was expected to be achieved within twenty years.

MISSION PROFILE (MODIFIED) The technology used in Project: Gateway was standard for any size application. The same theory applied, only capacity and power of the equipment used had to be modified. Realizing that there was no way to combat the threat posed by The Dominion, the Federation Council voted to use the U.S.S. Enterprise NCC-1701-F to explore alternate realities.

The specific objectives of the Enterprise are as follows.

Search for alien technology that may 1 enable the Federation to stop all Dominion hostility. 2.

STARSHIP TECHNOLOGY

The *Revolution*-class Enterprise will be equipped with the following features....

Soliton Wave (FTL) Propulsion -- Capable of Warp 9.7 until fuel exhaustion.

Accelerated Time FTL Computer Core with Positronic Brain Interface -- Operates at ten to fifty times normal time rate. Computer core has a positronic COU (Central Overseeing Unit) that enables the ship to "think" as a living organism while the COU is the only component considered "sentient" and is housed within a special android which can leave the computer core itself.



DS9 Burrs? In an editorial, Chris Gore, editor in chief of Sci Fi Universe (Nov 94 issue) writes that "DS9 has nothing to say. It opens each week without the inspiring narration (as with Classic Trek and the Next Generation, there's "Space, the final frontier These are the voyages...") DS9's opening offers some soothing new age music with a collection of standard special effect shots. So, what is the goal and purpose



of DS9?" He concludes with, "The Trek team should stick with starship adventures -- it's simple -- the sense that each week we visit someplace

new where anything is possible. That's exciting. That's true Trek." Quite possible, Mr. Gore is a classic Trek fan at heart. At any rate, he does have at least one valid point. The purpose of DS9 is not evident, since the opening narration is not used. However DS9 does have a mission statement -- at least it was printed on card #1 of the Topps DS9 card set:

The Mission: "It waits... on the edge of the galaxy, beside a passage to unknown regions of the universe, space station Deep Space Nine is the gatway for the exploration, intrigue, and enterprise that mark the continua-tion of the human adventure into space...the final frontier."

Granted, the mission statement is not as grand as "Space, the final frontier", no as politically correct as TNG's "...where no one has gone before." Nevertheless, the statement incorporates a pun and a phrase which exercises the text different statement incorporates a pun and a statement incorporate stateme which continues the Trek tradition.

Point of View: Comparisons between Classic Trek/ST:TNG and Deep Space Nine are inevitable, since at one point, DS9's viewers declined slightly. One possible explanation was that viewers the ST:TNG would be in its final season and that "Generations" was in development, and so, devoted the time to ST:TNG while it was still available. Michael Piller (Sci Fi Universe 11/94) did admit, too, that "the problem (of some of the ST audience tuning out) may be something to do with the fact that people would rather watch space monsters, enigmas and anomalies than politics." However, co-executive producer Ira Steven Behr cites story editor Robert Wolfe's observation in best explaining how DS9 differs from Classic trek and ST:TNG. Says Wolfe: "You go out into the great void and explore and

Avery Brooks The Greater Philadelphia Star Trek Expo by Rosalind Brinson, USS Renegade




