



I look forward to working with each of you as the year progresses! Happy New Year!





Sitting here parked in front of my Macintosh, I have had plenty of time to contemplate this commitment that I've gotten myself into. I greatly appreciate the vote of confidence




that Dan has show in me to allow me to serve in the STARFLEET Communications office.

World: the *Discovery*, the *Godspeed* and the *Susan B. Constant.* The larger star is "the star they steered her by" and the promise of that new world. And as the starship *Jamestown* would become involved in helping in the Hampton Roads community- and the community at large, our motto is: "Let Me Help".

"Jamestown" is also important in US Naval history! Our Executive Officer (now current Commanding Officer) Richard Hewitt discovered that there were three vessels named Jamestown: two were sailing ships and the last a diesel communications ship that saw action during the Vietnam war. A few years ago, Mrs. Gloria Lyons discovered our recruiting display at a local Children's Hospital fundraiser. She peered at a section of our display that showed past ships named Jamestown and said "Yes! Here it is!" Her husband, Captain Henry Lyons, was the last skipper of the last naval vessel Jamestown! Afterwards, she sent us some material from her husband's ship, including the ships patch and ship's letters that were sent to the families of crewmembers. It was very exciting to have this connection to one of our namesakes! All the vessels named Jamestown served with distinction.., as we strive to do on the "starship" Jamestown !

'The Jamestown has racked up some nice accomplishments! To date, we begat six shuttles (who proceeded to do a lot of begetting on their own!) with five at starship status. Of those, the first shuttle Asgard which became the USS Heimdal, is commanded by Vice Admiral Linda "Grandma" Neighbors, the current commander of the First Fleet! In Florida, the shuttle Calvpso became the USS Encounter (now disbanded) which became the 1987 "Chapter of the Year". Former Encounter members Barbara Cotten and Sherri Bowen have been past commanders of the Second Fleet. The shuttle *Explorer* in Portsmouth, VA became the starship *Powhatan*, the shuttle Chesapeake in Richmond, VA became the starship *Chesapeake* 

the starship *Appalachian* in Tennessee. The shuttle Unicorn in mid- Tennessee didn't fly, but she certainly tried hard!

Other *Jamestown* highlights include hosting the 1983 STARFLEET National Conference at "AtlantiCon 1" in Virginia Beach. In keeping with our motto of "Let Me Help", we've been able to benefit: the USMC Toys for Tots program, the USS Alaric's "Wheels for David" fund, the Children's Miracle Network Telethon, the American Cancer Society, The March of Dimes, the Muscular Dystrophy Association, our local Public Television Station, the Salvation Army, Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters, and the Virginia Air and Space Center. Each 'ear, we take part in the "March of Dimes WalkAmerica" and we volunteer at the MDA Telethon. At each meeting, canned goods are donated for the Salvation Army, and currently, we're collecting soda can pull tabs for a national not-for-profit organization that will benefit the Children's Hospital.

Jamestown meetings take place the 3rd Sunday of each month at the new Virginia Air and Space Center in Hampton. We try to have guest speakers on a regular basis, and they've included movie modelbuilder (and honorary Jamestown member!) David Merriman, who built a beautiful classic Enterprise model for an individual for \$10,000!; former USS Enterprise Commanding Officer Captain Daniel Roper; Marsha Bartusiak- a regional finalist in the "journalist in Space" program; and by speakerphone, we had modelbuilder Ed Miarecki as a guest! We have regular recruiting displays at area "Waldenbooks" and at events like the "Langley Air Force Base Community Appreciation Day" and area conventions. We also enjoy taking part in area parades!

Our fun activities include "Lazer Tag" with the Powhatan and the local Klingon chapter IKV *Bat'leth*. We like to party at our bi-monthly "Rec Deck" nights, and at our anniversary and Christmas parties. XO and CMO Cmdrs John and Mary Anne Winsely like to host "theme" parties (like "Stupid Movie Nite!") and we like to party with our Our annual ship's auction is a lot of fun and picks up a few bucks for the mighty "Jimmy-T!"

Recently in Williamsburg, the Jamestown celebrated her 12th anniversary as the oldest starship in Virginia. It was well attended, with representatives from the starships Maat, Powhatan, Chesapeake, Nighthawk, Heimdal and Yeager. Representatives from the new "STARFLEET Marine International" post "Fort Khe Sanh" (including the SMI Commandant, General Jim Harris!) were there, as well as members of the IKV Bat'leth. Our special guest was the commander of the First Fleet, Vice Admiral Linda Neighbors; with Captain Willy Smith, who is the commander of the First Fleet's "Second Quadrant". Having so many fellow members and guests in attendance made this anniversary extra special, as it also marked my last celebration of her anniversary as her Commanding Officer. Effective October 1st, the start of our fiscal vear, my XO Richard Hewitt, assumes command of the Jamestown.

My thanks to all of you who've been friends of the *Jamestown* during my command, and have hung in there with us with our newsletter trade! I'll still be a member of the *Jamestown*, and always available to help as I can. The *Jamestown* will always be special to me, not only because I founded her, but for the ideal she represents, as outlined in her mission statement:

Michael Berryman, who played Captain Rixx on the TNG episode "Conspiracy", as well as the Starfleet Headquarters alien communications officer in "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home", took time out from signing autographs to share his thoughts on Star Trek.

He liked his role in the fourth movie because "the uniform fit well," even though it also meant four hours of makeup and the wearing of contacts, which he hated. Still, he spent a week on the set, and remembered will Leonard Nimoy and Mark Lenard, the latter of which

appeared in the scene with him, involving the exploding of the window at Starfleet Headquarters.

## An urgent appeal to all Star Trek fans!

Want to take a ride on the starship Enterprise - or new starship Voyager? Want to stand on the decks of Deep Space Nine? Well, you can't, now. For many years Paramount has closed the Star Trek IV and film sets to the public. Even a guided tour of the Paramount studios won't get you onto these sets.

From 1973 until the first movie was written and produced, a continual barrage of letters was received not only at NBC, hut at Paramount as well. This convinced them to bring Star Trek back.

If you would like to take part in this letter writing campaign- if you would like to see the Trek sets opened for tours- we need your help now! Send your letter to one or more of the addresses listed below. Remember to tell the people you're writing to; a) you're only asking that the sets be opened during hiatus, not while actual filming; and b) that you'd be willing to pay admission for a tour.

Don't write the words Star Trek anywhere on your envelope- your letter will be shunted off with the fan mail. Don't mention this fan club or any other that you may belong toclub has somehow badgered you into writing and that it's the club, not you personally, who is interested in opening the sets. Type or computer print your letter if you can; this looks more business like. And above all, he polite. As Bjo Trimble noted, in describing her "Save Star Trek campaign", nobody is going to finish reading a letter that starts out, "You big dumb S\*\*\*.

We have enclosed several sample letters for you to consider while writing your own. Feel free to crib hits and pieces if you like. Original letters always count for more than form letters, but if you are really crunched for time, you might just want to copy one of our sample letters and send it.
