




The View From STARFLEET HQ

Things are going great here at Headquarters and STARFLEET in general. We've just returned from a terrific International Conference where I feel we got a lot accomplished and set some important precedents for the direction of STARFLEET.

I really enjoyed having the opportunity to meet so many members and representatives of our chapters. An event such as this is where you will always find the family atmosphere of STARFLEET show through. This is an aspect of our association that is representational of its uniqueness among social, civic or fan organizations.

Sitting in on sessions with the Executive Committee in its entirety, and a fully represented Admiralty Board, both firsts in the History of STARFLEET, were truly wonderful experiences. The Admiralty Board sessions were very interesting. Great strides were taken in the way STARFLEET manages and governs itself. Many items were discussed and voted upon by the AB. Your representatives took great care in trying to make the best decisions possible for the members and future of STARFLEET. Some of those decision were tough ones, but they had to be addressed. The special AB Section of the Communiqué' details many of the items that were before us and will inform you of the votes of each

issue. For the first time—you, the membership, can actually see how votes were cast and by whom. Just as votes of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives are available to the public, so are those of your representatives on the Admiralty Board.

Part of the excitement I feel surrounding the Admiralty Board Sessions is the knowledge that the steps we are taking with the AB actually serves to distribute power away from central authority. These are important and significant moves towards democracy in STARFLEET. One of the first of these moves is the establishment of four standing committees of the Admiralty Board. These committees will be comprised of AB members and will examine detail, the proposals of this administration.

Some of the items approved involved amendments to the STARFLEET

Constitution. Of course these require a vote of the general membership, you will soon be seeing ballots on those issues placed before you.

A new STARFLEET project, Challenge of the Heart, (More details next issue, and in the CSR. -ed) was announced at the International Conference and given a warm reception. In fact, the reaction was so overwhelmingly positive and so much money was generously donated at the IC, that an account specifically for this project has already been established. I've even heard that chapters of Region 3 are already doing of the stable of the stabl fundraisers in support of this worthwhile endeavor. Way to go, STAR-FLEET, and kudos to the USS Keplar!

Twenty-one years ago, STARFLEET was founded as a small Star Trek fan club in Texas. Over the ensuing two decades we have changed in many ways. Today, this association continues a fine tradition begun so long ago. We have become known in many of our communities as a group that can be depended upon to help whenever there is a need. STARFLEET has developed from just another fan-club that shares news about Star Trek - into a non-profit corporation that provides community services, charity projects, and a host of activities to hundreds of chapters.

happy to announce this as part of our international conference.

Our new program is an international fund raising effort designed to run in six-month cycles. The program director will coordinate fund raising efforts and information on a worldwide basis. Each six-month project will focus on one thing charitable, educational, or other internationally recognized effort dependent upon public support. Although the focus for the first cycle has been chosen, future efforts will be decided by polling the chapters for their opinion. Chapters and individual will be



encouraged but will not be required to participate. Our Program Director will be responsible for disseminating information regarding the focus of our program, and will circulate suggestions for fundraisers and information on efforts underway by chapters around the world, as well as coordinating a public relations campaign to bring or efforts to the public forefront.

Our project director, Betsy Matteis, has been a STARFLEET member for nearly ten years, active in many capacities on the local level including her current position as chapter CO. She is the Region 2 Shuttle Coordinator and served as Co-Chair for last year's International Conference. She is a past recipient of the STARFLEET Space Explorer's Scholarship, as well as the 1993 Disabled Services Reva Service Award.

Our first project, the "STARFLEET Challenge of the Heart", will focus on something which will touch all of us directly or indirectly. The World Health Organization estimates that each day 6,000 cases of HIV the Human Immune Deficiency Virus, are diagnosed worldwide.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, there are now approximately 1 million people in the United States diagnosed with AIDS, the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, 4.5 million cases worldwide, and 1.5 million of these are children. The World Health Organization further estimates that by the year 2000, 40 million people worldwide will be HIV positive, there will be 10 million cases of AIDS, and approximately 8 million deaths. There are treatments, there is hope, but there is no cure.

There are those of you who are going to say why raise money for HIV and AIDS! There are other diseases - - heart disease, cancer, and others, that affect and kill more people each year than HIV and AIDS. What makes HIV and AIDS different? The difference is ignorance - - for which there is a cure.

The difference lies in the fact that no other disease has people such as United States Senator Jesse helms proclaiming in public that government funds should be cut for research into treatment and cures for HIV and AIDS. His reason? Only perverts and people who deserve to die get HIV and AIDS. It's amazing, isn't it? No other disease engenders the amount of fear response, the discriminations, or the spread of disinformation as HIV and AIDS. Because of that aspect, we are establishing educational efforts as well as research to the recipient of our first six-month cycle. Chapter and members are asked to make their donation in this effort on a local level, with full reporting to the program director, or to channel funds thrugh the director's office to me made as one mass donation at the end of the six-month cycle.

As individuals we, as an organization, can make a difference in our community. It is not

COVER PHOTOS WANTED

ATTENTION: STARFLEET PHOTOGRAPHERS! Are you looking for an outlet for your overactive imagination? Our "Starfleet fiction" cover photos have met with good response over the past four issues. In order to continue to provide these, we need your help.

All you need to do is imagine a scene of a Starfleet/Star Trek related theme, stage it, and shoot it. Keep in mind that anything related to the present day should be kept to an absolute minimum or (preferably) eliminated altogether from the frame. **(example:** When we shot the "Starbase Twelve" cover for issue #67, we asked everyone not to wear their glasses, and though it was about 14 degrees Fahrenheit, we obviously couldn't wear our coats. We also framed the shot so you couldn't see the parking garage to our immediate left or the Interstate Highway to the right of the building.) Photos can be normal snapshot size, black and white or color can be used. However, the best way for us to work with them is 5" x8", and black and white (if possible).

Be sure to include the name of the photographer, chapter, a description of the subject, and a phone number we can contact. If an inset goes with it (such as the ship on the cover of this issue), pleased do not do it yourself. Send it as a separate picture and we'll drop in in appropriately. It's been another couple of busy months here at Ops where the staff has spent long hours making sure each chapter's files (hard copy and computer) are up to date and complete as possible. Although such work is not the most challenging, the correspondence we receive guarantees there's never a dull moment for us.

One area of Operations that has been very slow, the last two months, is ship commissionings. This can only mean that we will, one day soon, be up to our (unpointed) ears in VRR's from ShOC, since we know that ShOC is launching new shuttles all the time. In addition, we have at least two chapters scheduled to graduate from the EFC (Existing Fan Club) Program shortly

Fan Club) Program shortly.

On the opposite side of the coin, some of you may be away that several ships have elected to withdraw from STARFLEET to become independent fan clubs. Although we don't, normally, make a point of mentioning chapters that have been DE-commissioned, we feel that we must make a comment here. Many of the crew members of these clubs are still Fleet members and have remained active in Fleet. Unfortunately, the officers and crews of these clubs have met with unwarranted hostility from some of their fellow Fleet members. We would like to point out that these clubs, and their members, have made significant contributions to STARFLEET over the years. These people are our friends, our neighbors, and our fellow fans. They deserve to be treated with the same dignity and respect as anyone else. Just because the chapters have gone independent does not mean that they have abandoned Gene Roddenberry's vision; they have just chosen to pursue it in a different way. We should all wish them well, and, should they ever decide to return their clubs to STARFLEET, welcome

them with open arms.

We'd like to thank all of you who are using the MST (Monthly Status Report) forms, or the same general format, for your chapter reports. This makes report processing more convenient and accurate for us, especially the data entry staff. Some of you who have been using the MSR forms (or format) may receive a surprise in the mail one day soon. Starting in June, each month we will be selecting, at random, several reports which use the proper format. Those ships will then be sent a special little token of our appreciation. Just our way of saying "Thank You," for making our job a bit easier!

Sadly, the average for reporting seems to be approximately 66%. This means that roughly one third of the Fleet is listed as FTR (Failed to Report). However, non-reporting is definitely not a problem for Region 15. We'd like to offer a hearty congratulations to all the chapters of Region 15 who have helped that region maintain a PERFECT reporting record for the first four months of this year! It is the only region, with more than one ship, which has maintained a 100% reporting record. Take a bow, Region 15!

By now, all chapter COs should have received two issues of the CSR (Command Status Report). If not, please make a notation on your monthly form or contact Fleet headquarters (to the attention of Chief of Staff, Dave Miller) so that we can make sure you get them. As always, Operations is here to serve the chapters and RCs. We may be contacted via e-mail (at "opshq@aol.com"), snail mail (P.O. Box 11686, Memphis, TN 38111-0686), or the telephone number listed in the CSR. We discourage the use of carrier pigeons as the fire-lizards have been known to toast first and look for message capsules later. Smoke signals are also discouraged due to the unreliability of the



local weather (far too much rain this year, thus obscuring any possible messages of this type) If you can think of any other way to contact us, please feel free to give it a try. We're always open to new ideas.

Finally, we are very pleased to note that we have been contacted by numerous individuals and groups regarding the formation of new chapters in states or countries where few or no chapters had previously existed. Most recently, enquiries have been received from as far away as Ireland and New Zealand. STARFLEET may not be perfect, but the word is spreading that Fleet is "the" place to be for Star Trek fans the world over!! Thanks to Gene's dream, we'll continue to strive to better ourselves, our organization, and our world.

Academy Updates: Capt. Helen Pawlowski is the Dean of the Academy, and the Vice Commandant (no, don't touch that!) so you may take any Academy problems, comments and suggestions to her, as well as to me. She is also the person to whom you send any ideas for new classes. Capt. Sherry Anne Newell is our new Assistant Dean. Send critiques of the courses to her. In June, Helen drove from Missouri to pick up Sherry in Oklahoma, then both drove down to Houston to work on Academy business with me. It was a long, hot drive in a car with no air conditioning. Then we spent a hectic but productive all-nighter, the results of which will be some positive things in the near future.

Academy Procedure: To take a college course, you send an SALSE and a check or money or to Academy Headquarters. You will get that envelope back with vouchers for college courses, and Academy application, and critque form. Fill out the application and send to the school of your choice - - NOT back to Academy HQ! The college Director may send you a selection of schools to choose from, and indicate if there are additional costs, such as books or course material needed. You may send a selfaddressed, stamped postcard to an Academy Director to inquire about this. You will also include a SALSE for that school, possibly other postage if the material is heavy enough. will be explained better on future applications

SALSE: This is a Self-Addressed LONG Stamped Envelope. Though I originally said a self-addressed stamped envelope was not neces sary, we have discovered that there is just too much postage involved in making the Academy work. Also, small envelopes will just not do; for any answers, always use a long envelope such as a business-sized #9 or #10. From your end, it is a few stamps, from our end, it is hundred of stamps per week! Non-USA members should send IRC's (International Return Coupons) in the correct postage

VOUCHERS: Each voucher is worth \$1.00 and you may buy as many vouchers as vou wish, even if you have no idea what colleges you wish to take. Your ship or shuttle may buy large amounts of vouchers to resell to members, give as gifts, or use as incentive prizes, whatever. At this point, only the bright red vouchers are acceptable, all older vouchers are hereby

GUIDELINES: Capt. Sherry Newell is working on a new Academy Guidelines booklet, which will describe each college, and all the various courses available in each one, with prices and amount of stamps needed for each. Patience, this takes a while to put together.

Hello from the Academy. Since assuming the newly created position of Vice Commandant of the Academy in March, all solvable problems and answerable questions inherited from the previous administration have been addressed. In addition, Academy students may increase their appreciation of the knowledge and skills utilized in many real-world occupation. (No Academy course is a substitute for "real-world" education!)


GUIDELINES FOR DIRECTORS: Monthly reports including instructions for stamps, anticipated costs of materials, suggested sources, copies of certificates and current copies of course materials (including Key to exams) must be submitted to the Dean of approval. Subsequent alterations in any of the above must be submitted within two weeks of proposed changes. In this fashion, the Academy may keep abreast of what is happening in the schools.

GUIDELINES FOR STUDENTS: All students requesting course information should enclose their SCC# and a legal sized SASE with their inquiry. After determining which course of school has been chosen, the required vouchers and stamps must be tendered to the school in question. All tests must be legibly printed or typed (double spaced) and SCC# and return address must be

First, write or e-mail to ShOC for a shuttle information package . This contains a VRR and details on what I'm about to briefly discuss. It also tells you how to contact the Department of Technical Services (DTS) to reserve your shuttle's name.

To launch your shuttle you need the following items. None can be skipped.

- Five STARFLEET members in good standing
- 2. CO and XO must be 18 years or older.
- CO and XO must have passed Officers 3. Training School (attach copies of certificates)
- Copy of certificate from DTS reserving shuttle/ship name. Capt. Cowart provides a very nice c ertificate for this purpose.
- Completed VRR signed by shuttle CO, support chapter CO, appropriate Region Coordinator(s). If your shuttle and support ship are in different regions, both RCs must sign the VRR. Space is provided for this.
- Check/money order for \$5 payable to STARFLEET.

If any of the signatures or documentation are missing, you will be asked to provide the material before your shuttle is fully launched from ShOC. Any questions can be addressed to the ShOC office by: mail to PO Box 23321, Richfield, MN 55423; phone at 612-928-4291; or e-mail to <SFShOC@aol.com>.

taking a medical course will not make you a doctor, or even gain you a First Aid card. Taking the engineering course will not give you an Engineering degree.







ON A MIS-NUMBERING OF IMPORTANCE



Planning for Toys for Tots collection and distribution by the local Marine Corps Reserve starts in late summer and runs till Christmas eve, where the donated toys are distributed to economically disadvantaged children in the local communities. That's right folks, all toys collected stay right in the community for distribution!

Planning for your collection/challenge should start as early as possible. Some helpful hints:

Contact your local Marine Corps Reserve, explain who you are and what you would like to do. They will be grateful for your support and supply you with collection boxes, banners, posters, flyers and a money barrel. Yes, they accept cash donations!

Once you have the support of the Marine Reserves, contact your local malls/stores where you would like to have your collection. (A large mall with several toy stores would be ideal; or a Wal-Mart/K-Mart type store.) Explain to them who you represent and what you would like to do. Most malls have a publicity department that will schedule you in to their facility and also, provide you with free publicity.

One of the most frequent asked questions I have been asked lately is how much money is raised from the sale of the stamps. Most of the stamps are sold by weight. They go for anywhere from \$1 to \$5 per pound. Sometimes I have been able to sell a small amount of special stamps for a set amount, depending on the stamps. So far in 1995 I have raised over \$300. That is usually doubled after the International Conference due to a lot of chapters holding their stamps for the Round Up contest. I also run raffles and donated items in auctions to help out when I have the chance. I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Joe Motes of Vulkon who has allowed me to add Stampede items to his auctions. I would also like to thank the USS Joshua Public Relations Officer, Sue Harke, for her efforts in obtaining and donating autographed photographs of several Voyager actors.

Along with the fun I try to put into stamp collecting, I enjoy using my position as Stampede Coordinator to educate. One of the charities our donations go to help is the American Syringomyelia Alliance Project, Inc. I send out information about this charity in my yearly mailing but for those of you who haven't seen the flyer, let me give you a quick summary of what the disease is and the services our

donations help support.

In Syringomyelia a fluid filled cavity grows within your spinal cord, usually in the neck area. The cavity may expand gradually across or along your spinal cord, initially reducing your sense of heat or touch and then cause wasting of your muscles. Severe disability can develop. Hi! I just read the *Communiqué*'. Not bad! After reading your article re ranks, I thought I might share a few thoughts derived from the archives of the OTI.

In the case of the original Star Trek series, if you reference Bjo's <u>Concordance</u>, you will find the confirmation that the rank of Fleet Captain is indeed the highest Commissioned (non-Flag) rank. You'll also find the corroboration for the idea that the insignia for a Fleet Captain is three solid stripes.

In the later movies, you correctly noted that a Commodore's insignia was in fact designed. Although it's only a quick shot, the insignia can be viewed in "Star Trek IV", worn by the Caitian officer in the final Council scene.

I'm also given to understand (though I haven't received a copy of the new handbook yet, my renewal not due, 'til late 9507) that you used, for the movie-era rank of Fleet Captain, the Captain's insignia with two side arrowheads. This makes sense, since that insignia (originally suggested by Shane Johnson as Commodore) is a good transition point between the Captain and Commodore insignia established by Robert Fletcher

I hope this is of some help. It also should be good to know that we do have an "official" source (the Concordance) to help us establish the boundaries between grades. Take care, and 'til next time

The Astra was formed in Calgary on August 29th. 1990 by seven devoted Star Trek fans, who had met each other at a science fiction convention. We liked the structure and organization offered by STARFLEET, having seen the USS Equulus in operation, and decided to form a shuttle under their supervision. We were graciously given permission to do so by then - Commodore and CO April Gorman. After a long and arduous process of struggling for recognition of our existence by STARFLEET, we were given a retroactive launch date of April 1992; We then became the USS Astra, a Hanson class Anti-Borg fighter, with the first ever Romulan/Federation design, complete with cloaking device, and deflector shield plating. It took the Office of Technical Services three months of arguing to decide that our design was acceptable, but they finally did, saying that the Astra was the "most unique and unusual design ever approved" by that office!"

Our official designation is the USS Astra, NCC-77210, our motto is "Per ardua as astra" (Through adversity to the stars) and we are one of Calgary's largest and most active Star Trek clubs, with over 80 members in nine Departments: Command, Sciences, Communications, Operations, Engineering, Security, Medical and Ship's Services, as well as the 420th Marine Strike Goup, 15th

Regiment. We are the flagship of Region 10, and publish the Regional newsletter, the *Ten-Forward*. We have two shuttles, the *Chrysalis* in Nanaimo, and the *Celestia* in Calgary. We have an associated group called the *Maquis* that is spread throughout Southern Alberta, and we have Away Team members in New Brunswick, Costa Rica, and France, as well as Lethbridge, Edmonton, and Nanaimo. Currently, the *Astra* published a bi-monthly newsletter, The Astradiem; has established a Ship's archives which includes autographed photos of Star Trek celebrities, autographed convention program books, various sets of uniform patterns, and newsletters/fanzines from clubs in North America and Europe. Most of our past and current projects feature involvement in charity fundraising.

Profile of An Admiral: The Career of Alex Rosenzweig

When Read Admiral Doug Glenn asked my to write a profile on Alex Rosenzweig on the occasion of his promotion to full Admiral and the tenth anniversary of the USS Avenger, I said why not. After all, I've known Alex for about 14 years-- he and I are the "old men" of Region 7.

Alex was my First Officer on the USS Constitution, my Commanding Officer on the USS Avenger, my mothership CO and later I served as his Chief of Comm/Fleet 7 Editor, and Vice Region Coordinator. Who has followed his career in STARFLEET for so long outside his family?

Our senior statesman an be described in many He is a technical wizard, and has served (actually he created the position) as Director of the Office of Technical Information for many years. He has been in STARFLEET for almost 14 years and in that time served as a founding member of three ships.

He served as Region Coordinator for 6 1/2 years and has sat in the center seat of the USS Avenger for a decade. How did it all start?

"I served on the USS Revere for about 14 months. I wrote to the CO and said I'd be interested in serving in the sciences or engineering s ections. He wrote back and said, thank you for your interest, but I really need an XO. I was an Ensign for about four months until I was promoted to Commander," Alex said.

Then came the USS Constitution, a chapter which has a unique history in STARFLEET. The Revere merged in a sense with the Constitution. One of the benefits of this merger was that the Revere's XO, Alex, would become the Constitution's XO which at the time was needed. The ship also gained a Science Chief in the form of Alex's good friend Julianne Pudick.

Conditions on the ship [become such that] one June day at a Creation NYC con, 25 officers, including Alex and I decided the time was right to form the USS Avenger. The Constitution folded about six months.

"When we left the Constitution, we just wanted to Do it right this time," Alex said. He was unanimously voted in as the new chapter's Commanding Officer. He

carried the rank of Commodore then.

How was OTI created? Alex recalls that in 1984, "I approached STARFLEET. Even at that time. I had this huge technical collection, They said 'go ahead' "Part of Alex's duties were to assign serial numbers to various ship classes, review ship designs and to research various schematics. One technical journal Jackill's Ships of the Fleet, Volume II - ed.] even has a Rosenzweig class design in tribute to his technical work. Alex has submitted many materials to technical publications in STARFLEET and beyond. He's gone so far as to write back his opinions to Mike Okuda and others on ship designs and technical points.

Even when OTI was absorbed into the Department of Technical Services, Alex continued to work along with the Directors of the department.

Ok, so how did Alex become Region Coordinator? Well in a not so surprising move actually. The Region was growing, Many ships were shuttled off the USS Avenger and Alex was a notorious record keeper of Fleet membership records and other materials which continue to clutter up his parents home. That is with the exception of what he has been able to push

off to the current RC (me) to clutter up his home.

"I succeeded Faye Esswein in 1988. Jennifer Levine (then CO of the USS Konkordium) and I were approaching her on Fleet 7 (the Region's first newsletter and still going strongly today). She said fine and then dropped the news she was stepping down. At that time, we had 6 shuttles and 8 ships in the region," Alex added.

Under Alex's reign the Region saw much growth. It was during this time when the Region held their first Regional Conference which began as little gatherings at some of Creation's bigger cons, and eventually became full blown workshop sessions at cons and later at hotels where the could stand alone.

So what are some of his most vivid memories from his long tenure as a chapter chairman? "Twenty-odd people (and we do mean odd) in a small hotel room to form the Avenger is one. There was the 20th Star Trek Anniversary Con trip (to Anaheim, California), the Regional Trip to Ren Faire in 1993, where we departed in ST uniform while the musicians played the Courage theme fan faire. The gueen had been presented with a necklace

which was command star emblem, and you could see it radiate out there in the

"We thought we had pulled the whole time warp thing off until as left medieval player remarked. and don't forget when you go back, head for the other side of the sun, Alex concluded.

Matt Cohen was Alex's first XO. I served as his second first officer and was succeeded by Capt. Jon Lane, a long time friend of his who was also the ship's Science Chief. Later, Ed

Johnson was the #1, but when he too moved out of the area, Carlos Maldonado received the number two spot.

"We compliment each other," Carlos said moments before the start of the gala formal

Avenger Anniversary party.

But what is like to be a CO and a RC for so long? What drives a man to continue on with such vigor and excitement? Is it the thrills? Is it the power? Is it the cheap sex?

The Sex isn't cheap," Alex said with a grin. Hmmmmm!

What is it about STARFLEET which keeps you a solid supporting member? "That

straight forward uncertainty!" Alex replied la Rear Admiral Jennifer Lavine French, former SHoC Director came from Region 15 to join Alex and the Avenger on their special day. Alex was part of Jennifer's wedding party last year when she married Captain Scott French. "There are lots of memories of Alex." For the first time in the history of STARFLEET, the Admiralty Board was convened in its entirety. Several AB members were represented by proxy (most of those proxys having been personally secured by the RC they would represent), but every Region and EC member had representation during these meeting.

Another first during these meetings was a booklet provided to each AB member detailing the business they were there to discuss. The booklet, 3/8" thick, detailed some 20 issues that were up for consideration by the Admiralty Board this weekend.

A closed-door policy was maintained through most of the weekend and participants were requested not to discuss the details of the discussions outside the meetings until the end of the weekend. The reasons for this were to help keep the AB on track and to prevent the rumor mill from getting out of control while we worked our way through the issues before us.

All actions of this AB meeting were recorded (another first) and are presented here for the benefit of STARFLEET's membership. In the past there has sometimes been confusion after meetings about what was actually decided. Things have actually been put into place after being specifically voted against in previous AB meetings. This administration wishing to avoid that kind of confusion, is putting everything in writing and placing it before you in the *Communiqué*.

Each chapter must select a city of charter. This city must be with a reasonable distance of the residence of the CO and in the same geographic "reasonable distance" and "same geographical area" to be determined by ShOC and the RCs.

Should the chapter desire to change it's city of charter, such change must be with the concurrence of the Chief of Ops and the RCs if more than on involved. The Vessel Registry shall include in its listing of the chapter the most current city of charter or if a correspondence chapter a designation that the charter is a correspondence chapter. Correspondence shall be assigned to the Region in which the CO resides.

YEARLY CHARTER RENEWALS FOR CHAPTERS

Submitted by Admiral Cindy Krell

Due to depletion of funds, STARFLEET can no longer afford to continue services such as the CSR, updated copies of the Vessel Registry, membership rosters, etc., after the first chartered year for each chapter.

Option

- 1) Once commissioned, a charter will be good for one year from the date of issue. To renew the chapter's charter, a yearly fee will be assessed. Upon receipt of the renewal fee, a new charter is issued. Implementing this on newly commissioned chapters will require the charter to show a fate of expiration. For chapters presently holding a charter, a renewal date must be set.
- 2) The easiest method for record keeping would be to set the same expiration date for all chapters. A new chapter would pay a prorated cost when commissioned. Realistically, it will not be possible for Operations to issue all renewal charters in one month. With assistance from Computer Operations, sixty days is probably a more reasonable turnaround time.

Fee:

The fee should be set at an amount which will adequately cover the expenses incurred by Fleet Headquarters to provide the above mentioned services to a chapter for one year. Twelve dollars (\$12.00) has been suggested. This allows for prorated fee of \$1.00 per month. The fee shall be assessed each January 1st. This resolution becomes effective January 1, 1996.

Standing Committees of the Admiralty Board

The Admiralty Board shall be divided into four standing committees. The Commander, STARFLEET and Vice Commander, STARFLEET shall sit as ex officio members of all committees. The committees shall receive detailed information on areas under their review and shall be provide the opportunity to initiate policy recommendations with respect to their areas of review.

Each AB member shall serve on one committee and shall serve a period of two years on that committee. In the event of a vacancy, the committee assignment will be filled by the individual next named to serve that office. The standing committees are:

Finance Committee: This committee shall have general supervision of the financial matters of the Fleet, including the creation of the annual budget and regular reports on the financial condition of the Fleet. The Committee will examine past revenue & spending patterns of the association and submit a general budget guideline to the full AB for approval. The administration will authorize only those expenditures that have been approved by the budget and any supplementary budget authorizations of the AB.

This committee will receive copies of the semi-annual audit report from the CPA and the Statement of Financial Condition report at year end. Utilizing this information, the Finance Committee would be put in a position to recommend various financial controls to assure compliance with all federal regulations.

Scholarship Committee: This committee shall have general supervision over the Scholarship Program and the administration of those funds entrusted to STARFLEET on behalf of future scholarship recipients. The committee shall initiate policy recommendations that govern the Scholarship Program and how is shall be awarded.

Corporate Committee: This committee shall have general supervision over the corporate record, requirements and legal aspects of the association. The committee shall receive copies of the annual tax returns submitted on behalf of the association and any other information relevant to the corporate or legal concerns of the association. The committee shall initiate policy recommendations to assure that STARFI FET complies with all federal state and international laws

committee shall initiate policy recommendations to assure that STARFLEET complies with all federal, state and international laws.


The Corporate Committee will receive copies of various CPA reports and the annual Statement of Financial Condition report that will be attached to the annual tax return.

Membership Committee: This committee shall have general supervision over all matters affecting the general membership, chapters and regions where not already assigned to another standing committee. Policy matters affecting the Fleet as a whole are initiated in this committee.

No committee shall have exclusive jurisdiction over any matter and every AB member is free to submit proposals, motions, etc. to the Admiralty Board for consideration. However, in general, motions, proposals, etc. should be referred to the committee exercising general supervision over the matter to assure an appropriate address of the matter is held and that no duplicate work is being done.

The standing committee's shall not exercise any authority, power or position inconsistent with the STARFLEET Constitution and all committees shall work with the appropriate members of the Executive Committee to develop policy, receive answers to questions and to address specific concerns.



Is the Galaxy class A Failure?

(Note - this article includes information from the Board of Review on the loss of the USS Enterprise * CKE 1701-D at Veridian III, chaired by Admiral Alex Rosenzweig)

Is the Galaxy class large exploratory cruiser, the pride of the Starfleet, a failure? Has the Federation spent a hundreds of trillion of credits on a class of vessels that suffer from one, if not more, serious and possibly catastrophic design flaws? And are these vessels so complex, that ever Starfleet crews are unable to properly man them?


The Galaxy Class Starship Development Project was approved in 2343 to develop a new class of multi-mission starships capable of performing a widerange of duties, including exploration, military, diplomatic, and colonization, in the tradition of the Constitution, Enterprise, and Ambassador classes. This class was to be the flagship of the late 24th Century fleet and the design goals and mission objectives were suitably ambitious. Meeting them resulted in the most sophisticated achievements in multi-miss ion ship systems design. The result was a serious of vessels costing tens of trillions of credits apiece, showcasing the latest in Federation technologies. However, with a projected spaceframe life of 100 years, such an astronomical cost could be justified over that time

The lead vessel, USS Galaxy, entered service in 2357, followed over the next five years by the USS Yamato (CKE 71807), the USS Enterprise (CKE 1701-D), and the USS Odyssey (CKE 71832). Two additional vessels were later added to the construction program with an additional six hulls taken to the spaceframe stage before work was halted. This was done to allow the six operational hulls to be "debugged" in service, so that any changes or upgrades that might be found to be necessary could then be integrated during the construction stage.

How, less than fifteen years after the *Galaxy's* commissioning, she is only on three vessels still operation. *Yamato* was lost due to a complete systems failure brought about by an alien computer virus from the Iconian homeworld. The *Odyssey* was destroyed in combat with the Dominion, and the Enterprise with a Klingon D-22. Though the circumstances varied between the three vessels, the cause of the loss of each vessel can be traced to a warp core breach. In the case of the *Yamato*, the virus destroyed the computer system, resulting in a series of systems failures leading to the loss of the containment fields in the anti-matter storage system. The resulting release destroyed the ship. With the *Odyssey*, a Dominion cruiser rammed the ship in the containment area, resulting in a core breach which destroyed the ship. In both cases, the nature and speed of the accident prevented the safety systems from engaging and ejecting the core. The new Leeder Energies LN-81B drive incorporates additional manual ejection systems and

stronger construction, which should cure the problem.

But the most serious loss is that of the *Enterprise*. It appears that it was through what can only be described as gross negligence on the part of her crew, that the vessel was lost. This leads to the question that these vessels are too complicated to operate. Based on pure stats, the D22 class scout was no match whatsoever for a Galaxy class cruiser. However, reaction times by the crew were slowed by the complexity of the system and this resulted in ineffectual return fire. And as witnessed in the loss of the *Odyssey*, this complexity also required extensive and time-consuming bypassing of damaged systems, which also delayed return fire. This class, with so much cutting edge technology (some would say, bleeding edge, due to the untested nature of so many of them), is far more complicated to operate than her forbears. Much of this is due to her size and mission capabilities, which require incredible computerization and automation, otherwise her crew size would be enormous, cutting into those mission capabilities and duration. Additional and enhanced training of starship crews should help reduce and eventually






eliminate, this from happening again with another vessel.

In numerous incidents, it has been show that the tactical capabilities of he Galaxy class are woefully overrated. Though they mount an extensive weapons and shield suite, they have time and time again been outmatched by lesser opponents. Though never designed as a gunboat, they have time and again been called upon to be just that since they were the most powerful vessel in the inventory. However, with the entrance of specialized combat vessels like the Olympus class and the USS *Defiant* prototype should reduce this role. And when "gunboat diplomacy" is necessary, these tactical deficiencies have been addressed with the Galaxy (II) class project. The first vessel of this class, USS *Bright Star* (CKE-71800), has successfully

defended herself against Ferengi and Romulan forces. Portions of those tactical upgrades are now being considered for retrofitting in the remaining three vessels and adding to the six under construction.

Another area where the class has been criticized is, ironically, one of those considered her strengths—her capability as and Explorer. Mounting the most advanced sensor and laboratory suites ever installed on a Federation vessel, the ship requires a massive power source and truly phenomenal computer power. And even with the best of those, there are still a myriad of scheduling and equipment conflicts that need to be addressed by the Operations Officer. Having all this handled by a single officer is, in itself, a problem. Only the Enterprise enjoyed an artificial lifeform capable of juggling all the data and requests with ease. The other six vessels had to rely on "normal" lifeforms

I hope you enjoyed last issues Science Tidbits. We have dug deeper into our database of information and have come up with a few items that we hope you will enjoy.

Entertainment: Captain Picard met a female officer, in one ST: TNG episode, that shared his enjoyment of music. They ended up playing a number of duets where she used a music synthesizer / piano key board that could be rolled up for storage. In today's electronics, we use non-flexible metal and ceramic electronic circuits which prevent us from producing equipment with this type of flexibility. However, this may soon change as recently, the French National Center for Scientific Research has announced a new technical breakthrough. Inventors there have developed a paper thin plastic transistor that contains NO metal parts. Scientists say that this breakthrough could "lead to flexible electronic devices, such as computer screens that roll up like window shades," and "PC's that fold up and store in your pocket". (ComputerLife, Jan 95, pc. 42, Norm Ennis, ÙSS Paegan)

Food: Although it will probable be some time before we have "replicators" to produce our food for us, the technology behind cooking machines just took a big step forward. Sharp Corporation (maker of electronic items and appliances) has produced a microwave oven that knows when the food is done, then shuts itself off. A sensor inside the oven measures humidity and temperature. The readings are "led into a neural network - a type of computer circuitry modeled on the brain - that has been trained to spot the combination of temperature and humidity that signals when different kinds of food are cooked." The Japanese are being offered a more advanced model that can be "trained" to cook foods to individual taste. It may not be a "food replicator" but with frozen meals, electronics can turn tings on over the phone, and ovens that know when food is done cooking, it sure come close. (Business Week, Sept. 26/1994, pg... 144, Norm Ennis USS Paegan)

Medical: On a recent ST: Voyager episode

when Neelix lost is lung, we found out that even it the future it is difficult to replace body organs. Even Captain Picard ended up loosing his real heart and getting a mechanical replacement. Today, thousands of people die each year waiting for a heart transplant donor. Even those who receive a donor heart must use antirejection medication for the rest of their life. Récently, Medtronic, Inc. has developed a surgical procedure called "Cardiomyoplasty". This procedure removes some back muscle (with blood vessels and nerves still attached) and attaches it to the heart. A special device (like a pacemaker) is attached to the muscle to electrically stimulate the back muscle and allow it to assist the normal operation of the heart muscle. This procedure cost half as much as a normal heart transplant and has no risk of organ rejection. Some patients leaves the hospital in only 8 days after the surgery. This procedure was approved in Europe in Jan. of 1994 and testing has been approved at some medical centers in the US by the FDA. Maybe when we get to the 23rd century, Jean-Luc will not need

GARRET WANG AT VALLEY FORGE

"Fifth Stop on the Ensign Harry Kim World Tour"

Garrret Wang, better known as Ensign Harry Kim on ST: Voyager, was born in Riverside, California, and moved to Indiana, Bermuda, and Tennessee before settling down in Los Angeles. Garret has been training as an actor for six years, of which he has been auditioning only during the last two. His first job was in a Burger King commercial playing the employee, turning around with a tray of food exclaiming, "And new low prices!" Garrett admits that he "looked so dorky," but apparently was so good that he did more Burger King commercials. Garret also did a Big Red chewing gum commercial (which he says is still running), as well as a Chase Manhattan and Kellogg's Rice Krispies Treat's commercial. His last role before Voyager was as Margaret Cho's boyfriend on "All American Girl."

Garrett says that he auditioned six times for the role of Harry Kim. After being paged by his agent, he was placed on hold for five minutes, "I thought he was looking through the thesaurus to find words to break the news to me," he said. Garrett also remarked that his agent merely said, "Garrett, you got the job," nonchalantly, as if it wasn't a big deal.

It was a big deal when he stepped onto the set and found out they didn't have a captain yet. Later, he was told it would be Genevieve Bujold, whom Garrett worked a day and a half with. (The scene with her involved Janeway piping aboard Kim and Paris, where she says, "Mr. Kim, it's not crunch time yet.") Garrett recalled that he felt as though Genevieve didn't want to be there, and later recounted a scene on the bridge where she sat down, closed her eyes and after a beat, softly said, "Engage." The feeling was that of "Oh, Boy...."

Garrett said that there was no big fight, no throwing of phasers or anything like that which may have been reported by the tabloids. Genevieve simply realized that there were time constraints that she couldn't adhere to, and Garrett was glad when she realized that before the series had fully gotten underway. He started worrying though, when he did a quick check of the male/female ratio on Voyager, and wondered that if they were going t choose a male captain-- was there going to be a Suzy Kim instead? Garrett was relieved when they chose Kate Mulgrew, whom he described as a "Sherman Tank" for her take charge personality. "That's a captain," he said.

What's it like on Voyager? He read a letter from a director, asking them to look at the two styles of Star Trek shaking: What was done on DS9 and what was done on "Caretaker", the Voyager pilot. Yes, there are differences, and the director asked them to learn to bounce from the center, that it should be more natural, and that they should ask Avery Brooks, Rene Auberjonois or Nana Visitor for a demonstration. "Right..." said Garret, asking rhetorically, "Can you me saying "Avery -- can you shake for me?" (And yes, Garrett did learn the right way to shake, by practicing in the mirror. He says he can now shake at any moment, with any number of styles of shaking. Garrett further remarked that if anyone yelled 'shake' at him, he'd probably do it.)

The Voyager crew are all jokers, due to the long hours thev work, but Robert Duncan

McNeil more than any other. Due to his hairstyle, Robert was given the nickname "Fluffy" initially, but is now known as "Spike." Garrett notes that Robert is the Rico Suave of the crew, that he's charming in real life. Ethan Phillips is Mr. Straight Face, as he never says that he's kidding. Tim Russ is like his Vulcan character, as he tries to keep a straight face. Because Tim hates to zip up his uniform, he's known as "Zipperman" among the crew. 

lwith all their families and faults. And even when these concerns and needs are adequately addressed, they add to an already taxed power and computer systems maintaining life-support and comfort for 1000+ embarked personnel. So these missions often are not as effective as sending dedicated research craft, or require a greater amount of time spent on-site to obtain an equal amount of data.

So is the Galaxy class a failure? Based on the fact that three vessels have been lost in less




than one-fifth of their expected service life, one could argue the case. However, with a vessel of such complexity and grandiose mission objectives, and considering most have served on the edge of Federation space in harm's way, these losses can be explained. In the end, it is felt by many in Starfleet command that while the Galaxy class aspires to follow her heavy cruiser predecessors as a highly-effective multi-mission vehicle, the system complexities and weaknesses result in a "Jack of all trades, Master of none"-type vessel. A ship that can do many things, but none of them very well. This is in stark contrast to such vessels as the



Constitution / Enterprise class heavy cruisers, which were the workhorses of their Fleets.

Veridian III Review recommended a number of courses of action. The first was to explore smaller, more specialized starship classes (such as the specialized starship classes (such as the Intrepid) to meet the goals originally slated to be filled by the Galaxy Class. The second was to correct deficiencies in the Galaxy class, either through enhancement of the basic design [i.e. the Galaxy (II)], or through newer starship designs (like the Skylark CKE 97300 class). In addition, they recommend a revised and addition, they recommend a revised and enhanced training program for all officers, crew, and civilians serving aboard Galaxy class vessels to improve erew efficiency. I, for one tend to concur with the Board's views.







directory. The Justice had covered all media bases now, press, radio, TV, and the internet. We had really made our mark.



The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry's STAR TREK: FEDERATION SCIENCE Interactive Science Exhibit was coming to a local museum in February, 1995 and we were ready as always. The actual exhibit opened on February 1, but a handful of dedicated members, showed up on a Tuesday (January 31) for the press preview, Justice



members worked on volunteer basis at the exhibit (which consisted of mock-ups of the Enterprise D's bridge, Sickbay, and Engineering) every Saturday for three months, logging over three hundred hours! On our final day there the museum gave several members communicator pins to show their thanks, and have already asked us what will be the next project we work on with them. Another

"satisfied customer"!

Now with Justice going into only its fifth month as a full STARFLEET chapter, we are working on a second and final showing of our well received Mock Trial, compiling a "Guide to Justice" manual, and putting together a "STARFLEET USO' variety show for the Region Seven Conference in September. Only Q knows what other great fun projects await the gallant crew of the Justice, but we do know that we will do it with the great style that only the USS Justice can bring to STARFLEET!

and cited them almost being dead together as a reason for them to do so!

He was confused about the question of Paris and Kim dating (although I did mention to Garrett I thought they would be after all the looks Paris gave him during "Caretaker".) When it was clarified that the question was referring to Kim and Paris dating the Delaney sisters together, Garrett said that there were no plans to see them as yet.

Someone also asked why does bad stuff happen to Kim, saying that he's been poisoned, diseased and kidnapped. Garrett didn't have an answer, offering as a possible explanation, "He's a pro at it," and also mentioned that it's possible to download the "Kim scream" from computer boards.

In closing, Garrett said that his favorite episode was "The Trouble With Tribbles." and that he's amazed when he realizes that he's on Star Trek, that he's doing a show that's been around since the 1960's. He didn't know when he would get a promotion, but said that it would be nice to move up after a couple of seasons.

Garrett sees himself as a role model for Asian-Americans, as Voyager is one of the four shows that doesn't stereotype male Asian-Americans (citing as the others the 1960's Star Trek, the 1970's Barnaby Jones and the 1980's 21 Jump Street.) He says that the part of him that is in Harry Kim is the commitment to the job, trying to do the best he can. With actors like Garrett Wang making the most of the character and him keeping Kim from being the stereotypical Asian-American, it's a surety that Kim will make his way through the ranks of Starfleet.






