If there are any price reductions, you will be advised, and anyone who has already registered will be advised of their rebates. As soon as all the contracts are negotiated, we will let you know.

Many of you have expressed the opinion that STARFLEET should should be taking more responsibility for the conference, planning, scheduling, financing, in order to having some of the scheduling problems seen in 1994 & 1995. and also to assist the local committee in as many ways as possible. Having experienced a series of problems so late in the 1996 Conference process has also emphasized the potential for major problems in the future. This has caused a reorganization of the bid and conference process.



A complete prospectus of the new bid process will be published shortly from this office and we will provide it to Region Coordinators. It will also be available for anyone wishing to prepare a future bid. The major change will involve STARFLEET taking responsibility for final approval of budgets and contracts. This will also provide for a more intense involvement by STARFLEET in the scheduling planning process which should help eliminate the scheduling problems which have occurred in the past. We

found that as an organization we were not taking any of the responsibility, however we were taking the heat for a lot of the problems that occurred. Hopefully the changes we are putting in place in improve things all around.

In other news, the position of Stampede Coordinator will be open as of January 1, 1996. Gail Rushing will be stepping down. If you are interested in this position please forward your resumé to the office of Vice Commander. We thank Gail for her past services. She has done a great job with the position and will be missed.



- \* I like reading about the new shuttles in every issue. Can you put their addresses in the CQ also? Keep up the good work.
- \* I sure there a number of people who would like the opportunity to welcome new shuttles into STARFLEET. Perhaps ShOC would provide us with those addresses and I have no objections to including them, space permitting.
- \* There is no longer a Shuttle Cathark in Region 2 and the address has been Stuart since May 1994 NOT Palm City.
- \* Thank you for the correction, we will adjust our records once we verify that with ShOC.
- \* If a person wants complete ship reports for the Region or the Fleet, have them available for SASE and/or a reasonable cost.
- \* That sounds like an Operations matter and we'll certainly forward that suggestion to them.
- \* More real news about what is going on at HQ and less "fluff"-otherwise it's ok (I know space is limited.)
- \* Well, first of all, start addressing issues relevant to STARFLEET!

## SHUTTLE GPERATIGNS CGMMANA









#### **HIV FACTS**

In support of Operation: Aware in Region 3 and STARFLEET: Challenge of the Heart, I have listed below some Facts and Myths associated with the HIV/AIDS virus as learned through the HIV/AIDS course offered by the American Red Cross.

Fact:

HIV or AIDS can be acquired through sexual intercourse with an infected partner. Latex (and only Latex) condoms can help protect you from contracting HIV/AIDS.

Sharing drug needles with an infected partner can transmit the virus. Doing drugs is risky business in itself, but if you feel that you must, clean the needle with a solution of bleach and rinse thoroughly with water several times.

It is impossible for a blood donor to get HIV from donating blood. Each needle is brand new and sterile when opened. It is used only once, then destroyed. So don't be afraid to donate blood, many lives depend on your contribution.

You cannot "catch" HIV from:

Shaking hands, hugging, coughing, sneezing, a kiss, swimming pools, toilet seats, straws, spoons or cups, food, insects (such as mosquitoes) animals and most important of all, you cannot "get" HIV/AIDS from being a friend!

I strongly suggest that all STARFLEET members take a HIV/AIDS instruction course through the American Red Cross, it was truly and eye-opening experience for me!

## The Return of a Legend Book Review

Star Trek Concordance

By Bjo Trimble 322 pages Citadel Press \$19.95 USA \$27.95 Canada

November 1995 has seen the return of a legend. An unusual thing about this legend is that it happens to be a book. Not just any book, but a brand new edition of Bjo Trimble's Star Trek Concordance.

When does a book become a legend? In this case it is when it has been recognized as such a valuable reference tool that a copy has been kept in the Star Trek offices at Paramount for years. It is when it becomes such a prized collectible that people will pay hundreds of dollars for a copy of the 1976 edition.

It was with excitement and enthusiasm that I opened up this new edition of the Concordance. Still I wondered, "will this add to my Star Trek reference resources or merely duplicate what I already have?" The answer is that there are some wonderful inclusions to this edition making it a valuable addition to my Star Trek library.

Bjo's extensive research and consultations have resulted in such special sections to this edition as a 7 page section on Star Trek vessels, pages for Parts and Sections of Star Trek vessels, 13 pages titled "Cosmos - Star Trek Astronomical References, as well as over 22 pages of actor and production cross references including everyone from writers to cameramen to make-up artists, etc.

and by air date). Missing this time is the listing in order of Star Date. This is probably for the best. I too have long given up placing any significant meaning to those.

Then there are the episode synopsis. The first thing that leapt out at me was that the first pilot episode, The Cage is included this time. (It was missing in previous editions, presumably because it was thought to not be available in its original form.)

The synopsis have had a change or two in format. Delightfully, Bjo has included original (or "working") titles for the episodes. You decide if the one they went with was the most appropriate. Also included are title references such as the quote from The Rubivat of Omar Khayyam (1859) from which the title of the episode. Tomorrow is Yesterday is derived.

As if that were not enough, we are given the titles of the episodes in all the languages Star Trek has been dubbed into for foreign distribution including: Afrikaans, Catalan, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Spanish and Zulu. Some of the foreign titles are clever. Some are actually better than the original American titles and some are just amusing, such as the Spanish title for Bread and Circuses: Alimento y diversion (Translation; Food and Fun). Perhaps a little too literal?


There are some very interesting points of trivia to be found in these pages, for example; Patterns of Force has never been shown in Germany. (Perhaps our German members could verify that.)

Naturally, this book covers the episodes of the original series. It also covers the oft' neglected Animated Star Trek Series, (Bjo's introduction to these argues the legitimacy of the animateds in the Star Trek canon). The movies are covered in their entirety, but the only episodes of the "spin-off series included are those featuring original series characters as this book is primarily concerned with the original Star Trek.

Of course, it would not be the Star Trek Concordance without a liberal helping of fan art providing illustrations for the tome. Many of the pieces are really wonderful works and serve to make this professional volume more personal for the fans who read it. Perhaps there are other reasons as well, but I feel that in using the fan art, Bjo is saying to her audience, "I too am one of you." Interestingly, if you are familiar with the

1976 edition, you may notice that Greg Jein, whose artwork appeared in that previous Concordance, now appears under the production references as a Miniaturist. Modelmaker, Designer.

All in all the Star Trek Concordance, 1995 edition is a welcome addition to the deluge of Star Trek products flooding the market in recent years. Bjo's attention to detail and longtime personal experience with the subject makes this an exhaustive look into a media phenomena, and a must for Star Trek enthusiasts. ₡

#### WARP DRIVE MAY BE POSSIBLE

On 19 January, 1994, Dr. Miguel Alcubierre, of the Department of Physics and Astronomy of the University of Wales, College of Cardiff, Great Britain, submitted a paper for publication containing mathematical proofs that faster-thanlight travel is possible. His article was entitled: The warp drive: hyper-fast travel within general relativity. This article was very favorably reported in an article entitled SPACETIME HYPERSURFING in the September-October issue of American Scientist, Volume 82. Another paper has now been published supporting Alcubierre's findings, entitled: SETI, THE VELOCITY-OF-LIGHT LIMITATION, AND THE ALCUBIERRE WARP DRIVE: AN INTEGRATING OVERVIEW, by Dr. H.E. Puthoff of the Institute for Advanced Studies at Austin, Austin, Texas. It has been accepted for publication in Physics Essays, Vol. 9, No. 1, March 1996. Copies of these papers are now circulating throughout NASA and the aerospace industries. The gist of these papers is that spacetime is a dynamical entity that twists and distorts under the influence of concentrations of energy. A disturbance in spacetime can be created such that the region in front of a spaceship is contracted while the region directly behind is expanded. The distortion itself will propel the

spaceship forward like a surfer riding the crest of a breaking wave. This mechanism does not violate Einstein's special theory of relativity, which holds that no object can travel faster than the speed of light. Light also travels in spacetime, and is carried along with the ship. The light is still traveling at the speed of light relative to the ship, and the ship itself is not accelerating relative to the spacetime in its immediate vicinity. The spaceship can actually travel at an arbitrarily great speed. The acceleration as seen by someone outside of the warp field would be huge, but to the traveler within the ship it would be zero, and there would be no time dilation! Theoretically, with such a drive you could go to the Andromeda galaxy and back between breakfast and lunch.

Speaking of lunch, it is never free. No free lunch, no free launch. The key to the Alcubierre warp drive is what he calls "exotic matter." Exotic matter has a negative energy density, unlike normal matter with positive energy density. Such negative energy was first postulated in 1948 by the Dutch physicist Hendrik Casimir, and he suggested experiments to prove its existence. M. Sparnaay conducted experiments which measured what has come to be called the "Casimir Effect" in 1958, and these measurements are taken to be a confirmation that negative energy densities are possible.

Anti-matter passed from science fiction to hard science and industry some years ago. Now it looks as if warp drive may also be advancing into the real world of practical physics. Don't sell the house and give away the cat just yet - warp drive may not be soon, but who knows? Keep up your visual scanning, watch the journals and this space.

## SCIENCE AND TREKNOLOGY

Computers Galore: If you watch the crew of Star Trek (TNG) when they use the computer aboard the USS *Enterprise*, we notice how efficient the ship's computer is and how it is able to provide all the information and communication to the various control panels and ship sensors. The ship drawings show one or two major computer units (sort of like the old IBM mainframes). However, maybe there is something different going on.

Today, many offices around the country have multiple personal computers and many of these are being networked (linked together to allow sharing of information). Until now, this communication has been on a very simple level (sharing files or passing e-mail). About a year ago, Radius Company developed a program that, when used with their hardware, allowed 4 or 5 networked computers to work on a single job in the off hours (such as late at night). But this was only the beginning.

Using software developed at Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, owners of multiple computers can combine the power of those systems simultaneously to coperate on a single computational effort. This software is available over the Internet and is

called PVM or Parallel Virtual Machine. Up to 125 workstations may be linked together (even of different architectures - i.e. Mac, PC, Unix, etc.) to perform tasks that normally require a supercomputer. This program still requires the computers to work during off-hours but it is a big step in the advancement of computing power. This approach also has the advantage of being able to lose several computers (possibly to battle damage from phaser hits) without losing much computing power. (Very important if you are light years from home!). (Industry Week, Oct. 17,1994, Norm Ennis, USS *Paegan*).

On a Medical Note: I have always wondered why most of the cabins aboard the USS Enterprise always have the lights on, even when the crew members are sleeping. Oh Yeah, so OK, once in a while someone says "Computer, lights at 25 percent" or something like that, but we know it's just for effect.

OK, so why do the lights always seem to be "ON"? Well, recent research into the body's internal clock had turned up a real organic mechanism which helps to regulate the body's sleep and energy cycles. A bundle of nerves called the "supracharismatic nuclei" tell your body when and with what intensity to turn on your energy motor for the day. The supracharismatic nuclei are receptors which are regulated by a chemical called "melatonin"

don't get their wake-up call, and you drag around all day."

Now here is where the light comes in. Your sleep and your melatonin supply are based on exposure to light during our "24 Hour" cycle. The correct exposure to light and a minimum amount of sleep helps to produce that 'wake up feeling great" feeling. Some people get "Seasonal Affective Disorder" (SAD) during the winter, which is a caused by exposure to low light levels over a long period of time. Adding extra light at the right times during the day helps cure both SAD and can help you wake up feeling like you had a great nights sleep (p.s. Don't forget proper nutrition and exercise). So now we know that the reason the lights are on in the cabins is that the ship's computer is providing the correct amount of light, to produce the correct amount of melatonin to help the body get a good night's sleep for the crew. #### **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

As STARFLEET continues to grow larger, it becomes increasingly important the we examine the organizational structure of our association and make changes that are needed to assure that the organization operates in a fair and efficient manner.

For more than two decades, the Commander, STARFLEET has exercised enormous constitutional authority to administer this association. This must end.

I am pleased to wholeheartedly recognize that change is needed in the power of the office I hold. Having served as a Region Coordinator for more than six years prior to my election to this office, I know the important role an RC plays in STARFLEET. While our traditions are long standing, constitutional amendments are needed to assure that this association continues to move forward for many years to come.

Over the past year, we have made many decisions that affect the structure of this association. These decisions, while painful as they may have been, were necessary to assure a strong and democratic organization for our future. The huge growth in membership over the past year is indicative of the need for additional improvements.

At' the July 1995 Admiralty Board meeting, this administration submitted to the Admiralty Board a series of resolutions that would restrict the authority of the Commander, STARFLEET and permit a greater involvement by the Region Coordinators. These resolutions, while adopted with resounding majorities by the Admiralty Board, require the approval of the membership in order to amend the STARFLEET Constitution. If approved, these amendments shall take effect on May 1, 1996. The Inspector General, STARFLEET has been designated to receive and tabulate all ballots on these amendments.

As you read these proposed amendments and think about their impact, I would like to encourage you to remember that all change is done in with small steps. It is essential that this occur, especially in an all volunteer organization like STARFLEET. Also, please remember that no amendment is perfect, nor is it the exact wording that you may like. We are all forced to accept compromises and the Admiralty Board believes these are the best compromises that are possible at this time. Future amendments will address other issues and enhance these proposals.

Please consider the amendments that are presented herein and use the enclosed ballot to cast your vote on these important administrative changes. On behalf of the Executive Committee and the Admiralty Board, I encourage and ask for your support on these amendments.

#### Amendment # 1: Create Article IV Section XI to read as follows:

Any vacancy on the Executive Committee shall be filled by appointment of the Commander, STARFLEET, pending approval by a simple majority of the Admiralty Board. The Commander, STARFLEET may appoint any officer to fill a temporary vacancy.

Prior to the appointment of a new Region Coordinator, each Commanding Officer in the affected region shall be polled by the Commander, STARFLEET for a nomination of a candidate to serve as their next Region Coordinator. If the Commander, STARFLEET does not select the candidate who shall receive the most votes from Commanding Officers in the affected region, he shall submit, along with a reason why the majority candidate was not appointed, the name of his appointee to the Admiralty Board for confirmation prior to the nominee taking office. If a simple majority of the Admiralty Board shall agree, the nominee shall be appointed and assume office.

#### Amendment 2: Amend Article III Section II to read as follows:

The governing body of STARFLEET shall be an Admiralty Board. The Admiralty Board shall consist of the members of the Executive Committee and the Regional Coordinators. The function of the Admiralty Board shall be to formulate policy and to set directions and goals for the international organization.

The Admiralty Board shall consist of four standing committees: Finance Committee, Corporate Committee, Scholarship Committee and the Membership Committee. The Admiralty Board shall determine, by appropriate resolution, the duties and responsibilities of each committee.

Each member of the Admiralty Board shall serve on one committee. The initial terms of office on each committee shall be two years for members of even numbered regions, and one year for members of odd numbered regions. Thereafter, all members shall serve two year terms. The Executive Committee members shall serve the duration of their term.

The Commander, STARFLEET shall make appointments to each of the standing committees and to such other select committees as may be required from time-to-time. In the event a committee member is unable to complete their term of office for any reason, their successor shall complete the term. In the event of a tie, each committee shall determine how such ties shall be broken.

#### Amendment 3: Create Article III Section IV to read as follows:

The Member Handbook shall not be modified without the approval of a simple majority of the Admiralty Board. Policies adopted by the Admiralty Board shall be included in the next revision of the Member Handbook.

#### Amendment 4: Amend Article V Section VII to read as follows:

The Commander, STARFLEET may serve any number of terms of office and may appoint, replace, or retain any of the appointed positions within the administration. While the Commander, STARFLEET may replace any member of the Admiralty Board for cause, he/she shall not remove any Region Coordinator, who is a member of STARFLEET, in good standing, without the approval of the Executive Committee and a simple majority of the Region Coordinators presently serving on the Admiralty Board.

The Commander, STARFLEET shall order a polling for nominees for the office of Region Coordinator in any region where a majority of the Commanding Officers of that region so request and in any region where the sitting Region Coordinator shall fail a vote of confidence of the Commanding Officers of that region. The new Region Coordinator shall be selected in a manner defined by this Constitution.

#### Amendment 5: Amend Article III Section III to read as follows:

The administrative body of STARFLEET shall be the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Commander, STARFLEET, in a manner consistent with this constitution, and shall consist of the following members (in order of succession):

Commander, STARFLEET - President
Vice Commander, STARFLEET - Vice President
Chief of Operations, STARFLEET
Chief of Communications, STARFLEET
Commandant, STARFLEET Academy
Chief of Shuttle Operations, STARFLEET
Chief of Computer Operations, STARFLEET

The function of the Executive Committee shall be to perform and supervise the daily operational activities of the association and to implement the decisions of the Admiralty Board. The Executive Committee shall be the final authority in the interpretation of the constitution, handbook and procedures of the association. The Admiralty Board shall be the final authority in the interpretation of the policies of the association.

#### To Learn From the Past in Order to Seek the Future..." The Creation and Development of a Starship, The Story of the Shuttlecraft Shiloh, NCC-1881 /04

It all started when the family went to see a movie

Not just any movie but STAR TREK GENERATIONS. We went to a theater in Jackson, Tennessee. When we got there we found a display set up by members of the USS Alacrity. There were membership forms and accompanying literature which I read eagerly. What drew me to the organization was two things—the community service aspects, which I found unique for such an organization, and STARFLEET Academy. Friends had said that if you wanted to "know anything about Star Trek, just ask Jeff." I found that I could use some of my "inert" information on Star Trek through taking courses through the Academy. So we sent in our application.

This was the first step in the creation of a new chapter within STARFLEET.

I found that going to meetings in Memphis was impossible. Although a new chapter, the Providence, was forming in Jackson, 25 miles away, the location and time was just not suited for the family. The idea of forming a new shuttle was shared with Fleet Captain Deborah Leafey of the *Alacrity*, and Commander Carolyn Pate of the *Providence* who gave enthusiastic support for the new shuttle.

The first meeting of the Henderson, Tennessee chapter of STARFLEET was held at my home on February 28, 1995. Several students from the local university, Freed-Hardeman, attended the meeting. Officers were elected-Jeff Higdon, President (CO); Karen Higdon, Vice-President (XO); Peggy Ridgeway, Secretary-Treasurer (2ndO).

Meetings were held on the Third Saturday and Fourth Thursday of each month. Freed-Hardeman was kind enough to help supply a location for most of the meetings.

Also at the first meeting, our goal was to choose a name for the new chapter. The names chosen were "Olympiad", Wolverine" and "Shiloh", our main choice being the later name. Intrepid Class was also picked as the class of


starship we would be when we become a full starship. With the requests off to the Office of Vessel Registry and membership forms for the rest of the charter members of the crew, plans were shaping on our mission statement and motto. On April 28 we were granted our name, Shiloh, and our future Naval Construction Contract Number, NCC-74683, as well as the approval of our starship classification.

In May our formal petition for shuttle status was sent off and we were commissioned a chapter-in-training on June 14. It is also ironic that our sister shuttle, the *Providence* (out of Jackson), was also commissioned on the very

same day.

It was during this time Commander Higdon was contacted by Captain Bjo Trimble, Commandant of STARFLEET Academy to see if our son, Chris, could become a consultant to the academy, to check the tests given by each school to see if modifications were needed to help our mentally handicapped Starfleeters taking courses within the academy. The contact also gave the skipper the opportunity to apply for, and was appointed to the position of Director of the . College of Federations Studies.

Tim Raines, our Operations Officer, came up with our motto: "To Learn From the



The choice of our first community service project came naturally. Shiloh National Military Park is within 35 miles of Henderson and a recent article in the Jackson Sun stated the need for help in the park. The commander then

contacted S hilo h NMP for information on what our g r o u p could do to help. They put us in contact

with Ranger Brian McCrutch-en, who outlined various ways to help the park out.

With a visit to the park and McCutchen attending a meeting of the Shiloh, the choice of maintaining and cleaning monuments in the "Adopt a Monument" program was a natural one. Two monuments were chosen (Next issue: A close-up article on those monuments).

On October 26, Commander Higdon and his family became the first non-SFHQ staff to visit STARFLEET Headquarters in Belleville, Illinois and met Fleet Admiral Dan McGinnis, Captain Wayne Cavalier and other HQ staff members. Accompanying the Higdons was Captain Helen Pawlowski, Dean of STARFLEET Academy. After an inspection of HO and answering questions concerning the members of the *Shiloh*, Fleet Admiral McGinnis and his party, Commander Higdon and his family and Captain Pawlowski met at the Cracker Barrel Restaurant in Belleville for dinner. Starfleet uniforms were worn by the Shiloh crew and Captain Pawlowski to honor the Fleet Admiral.

On November 16, the crew of the *Shiloh* raided the studios of WFHC-FM, 91-FIVE, an non-commercial, educational radio station, and staged a "takeover" of the airways. Aired from 7-9 p.m., the program featured the music of Star Trek and skits concerning the Starship *Shiloh*, to go boldly where no fan has gone before.

As the growth of the Shiloh continues the expectation of becoming a full-status chapter increases. Participating in Christmas parades in both Henderson and Jackson are being planned. Recently the opportunity to "Adopt a Highway" between Henderson and Jackson on U.S. Highway 45 was initiated.

## The Doctor Is In: Robert Picardo at Valley Forge 9508.18 By Captain Hartriono B. Sasti

Robert began his talk by saying that he didn't know when he would be given a name or what that name would be. He also commented that he was tired of going to the producers asking them those questions. And, Robert continued, in order for him to humiliate himself completely, he stated that he would sing a song that he created, voicing those concerns, which he did to the audience's delight. I never knew Robert had such a good voice!

It's probably due to Mr. Picardo having 20 years as an actor. He was born and raised in Philadelphia, as was John deLancie, although he said he didn't know him. Robert's acting experience included a stint in his high school's production of "Taming of the Shrew." (By a bizarre coincidence, his high school drama teacher was named Shakespeare.) He admitted to being a bit nervous because he was home, and he still has strong ties to Philadelphia, auctioning off a signed Voyager cast photo, proceeds of which went to the Delaware Valley Friends School. The minimum bid was \$300. It sold for \$475, and Robert mentioned that he had sold a few photos beforehand for the school.

Before Voyager, Robert landed a role in Leonard Bernstein's "Mass", a musical piece originally commissioned for the opening of the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, and also played a leading role in its European premiere. His Broadway debut was with Danny Aiello in the comedy "Gemini", and he also did work at the Los Angeles Public Theater with "Beyond Therapy" and "Geniuses".

Robert's television work includes the role of Mr. Cutup in "The Wonder Years", for which he was nominated for an Emmy Award. He is also probably familiar to viewers as Dr. Dick Richards on "China Beach". Which did he enjoy more, China Beach or Voyager? It was a difficult question for him to answer, as he saw China Beach as more an actor's show, while he felt Voyager was more plot oriented. Robert did say that he had a better time doing Voyager than China Beach, and the only thing needed to make the Star Trek experience complete was to have Dana Delaney in a ST costume! (How about it Mike, Rick and Jeri? After all, if you can get Sharon Lawrence....)

While on China Beach, Robert had trained to direct an episode, but never got the chance to do so due to the show ending. He did say that he was interested in directing an episode of Voyager, that he was in the middle of training for it, and that his first episode as director might be next year.

How did he get the part of the holographic doctor? Robert said that he got the Voyager pilot script while he was doing a play. He was encouraged to read for the Doctor, but he wanted to try out for the part of Neelix. (Interestingly, as recounted in the June Alert Five, Ethan Phillips wanted the part of the holographic doctor.)


Robert read that Neelix was humanoid, and thought to himself, "How much makeup would be involved, anyway?" He was a finalist for the character, but didn't get the role. While Robert liked the character of Neelix, he reconsidered testing for the Doctor, and read only once for it, in front of the producers.

He ad-libbed one line in his testing. The line was, "I believe someone has failed to terminate

my program." Robert read it as scripted, then added, "I'm a doctor, not a nightlight." That cinched the part for him!

Robert sees his character as a mix of contrasts, of being arrogant yet vulnerable, of being an individual having an enormous wealth of knowledge with no control of his existence. He wants to create his own character; he doesn't want to be a repeat of Data.

He does like his character, enjoying the comic relief. Robert had no idea there was so much humor in his character, and said that it was written for his strengths. He further commented that if he feels a line should be substituted, they usually allow it if he goes through the right people. As an example, he



cited "Learning Curve", where he thought it would be appropriate for the Doctor to try and show his compassion for his patient, even if it was an inanimate object.

Robert does make fun of the overly dramatic moments in the episode. In "Phage", they cut to a commercial after he says, "His lungs have been removed," referring to Neelix. In rehearsal, Robert Beltran laughed after that line, and Robert Picardo recounted that it took three takes to do that scene.

In take one he stated, "His lungs have been removed— and that's a bad thing." The second take had him saying, "His lungs have been removed. You haven't seen them anywhere, have you?" On the third take it was, "His lungs have been removed. You haven't... Oh, my God!"

As for other cast members, Robert said that Robert Duncan McNeil was the biggest practical joker, and recalled how he had screamed during a mind-meld performed by Tim Russ during "Ex Post Facto". He also said how Robert Beltran has a quirky sense of humor, breaking into song at any moment, and asked that at his next con appearance the audience should ask him to dance.

Roxann Biggs-Dawson also has singing talents. He concluded his talk and introduced her by singing a duet with her, Sonny and Cher's "Bahe", with changed lyrics!

## ENGINEERING The U.S.S. Ki Rin CORNER

A New Twist on the Strike Cruiser Concept

(Editors Note - I have always been a fan of the Belknap class Strike Cruiser and thought I'd take a break from all the TNG/Voyager issues this time around and write something for you Movie Era chapters.)

With twenty vessels currently in service, the Belknap (Mk. 20) class is one of the most successful ship classes in current service. These vessels currently are stationed along the Romulan Neutral Zone and as part of scientific task forces centered around Tikopai class exploratory cruisers.

Due to their success on the Romulan Neutral Zone, it was decided to deploy some of these task forces along the Klingon Neutral Zone to free-up the Enterprise class cruisers currently on assignment there to perform the exploratory roles for which they were designed. Though on paper the Belknaps were a match for the Klingon counterparts, in reality they were outgunned as the Klingons usually traveled in groups of two or three ships.

#### DEVELOPMENT AND CONSTRUCTION HISTORY

Though the program did not work out as hoped, Starfleet continued to show interest in replacing the Enterprise class with the Tikopai. Starfleet commissioned a design study of improving the tactical systems of the Belknap so that it could better hold its own against the Klingons. This new program was named the Improved Strike Cruiser Concept. The U.S.S. Ki Rin (CS 2539) was currently under construction and it was decided to use this starship as the platform to test the new systems.

#### PROPULSION AND **POWER SYSTEMS**

The Ki Rin was already scheduled to receive the "Ikeda" LN-68 Mod 1 linear warp drive unit, so no additional modifications to the power plant were necessary. The standard Scarbak Propulsion Systems RSL impulse drive unit was replaced with the more powerful RSM model.

#### TACTICAL SYSTEMS

The standard weapons mix of eight RIM-12C

and one RSM-14B phaser banks were improved to the RIM-15A/RSM-20B units standard on the Enterprise class heavy cruiser. The Mk 7 Mod 1 phóton torpedo system was also upgraded to the Enterprise's Mod 2 specification. The "Merlin" force field deflector system and Kotri CIDSS (Close-In Deflector Shield System) deflector supplement was installed. The CETIS /TACAR fire-control system with the 2016L "Sneaky Pete" sensor system, 25/ADA countermeasures support system, and a Link 22 communications core were also installed.

The Aegis fleet-fire control Zone. system was considered, but scrapped due to cost considerations and the fact

that these vessels were designed to operate independently.

#### TRIALS AND TESTING

The Ki Rin was laid down on July 6, 2285 at the Cosmodyne Shipyards on Earth. The vessel



#### CONCLUSION

Additional vessels of this type are being planned, most probably the Sur Cha, Mira, Aveley, and Alor which are now either under construction or preparing to be laid down. It is also possible that additional vessels of the Excel (CS 2545) series will be built to this specification. However, another proposal has been forwarded to use Avenger or Chandley class heavy frigates in a protection role for Tikopai's, as these ships have proven to be wellmatched against Klingon forces in their natural configuration.





- \* Opinions are a dime a dozen. Stick to the facts about Star Trek, STARFLEET, etc.
- \* I would like to see the CQ expanded to include more articles featuring individual ships and members as well as reprints from chapter newsletters.
- \* Just beef up the excellent work.
- \* Proofread all articles, etc. before printing. Several times, parts of articles have been repeated by mistake.
- \* The fonts and graphics are great for the most part, but sometimes there is too much clutter on pages- hard to read.
- \* Put all the reports on one page don t make me turn 2 or 3 pages away to be able to finish a report or article.
- \* Every time when new staff comes in to take office I've noticed a change in the CQ. I would like to see new improvements in the CQ in upcoming years.
- \* I don't care about STARFLEET other than as a source of Star Trek info. You guys need to proofread. i.e. Focus, 3rd Column. Lots of wasted space.
- \* The CQ always reflects the skills, personality, and technology available to the staff. Editing the CQ is a kind of combination of assembling a puzzle and writing a story. You have to take the pieces you can find and assemble them so that they fit, keeping it interesting and attractive while keeping in mind the overall picture. - \* No problem!
- \* More entertainment news from the nets. Software review (ST Screen savers, audio clips, games) Local convention reports. \*\*State of Accounts (quarterly) of where money is spent!
- \* How about a section to let us know how the finances are and how much each of the scholarship funds are?
- \* STARFLEET financial information is to be made available in the Command Status Report available from your Commanding Officer, Region Coordinator, or from HQ for \$1.00.
- \* There should be a section of the CQ that features an original creative story or article that is based on the fictional Star Trek universe. Please, please eliminate long, dry and boring reports and articles. There should be a definite set length for EC or selected officer's reports and a lot shorter than currently acceptable.
- \* Less lengthy reports/comment-type articles. Lots more original/creative type stories/articles. Some reports are too dry and BORING! (and TOO long!)
- \* We've been considering asking the EC to set a limit to the length of their articles. As long as I can remember, the CQ has tried to avoid running fictional stories. The closest we allow ourselves currently are features such as Engineering Corner. The primary mission of the CQ is to provide the members with helpful information about our organization and the activities of our fellow members. We try, as we can, to provide news and info regarding Star Trek and explorations of the 'real' universe around us. You may be interested to know that we are looking at the possibility of producing a fanzine of 'Fleet members work for 1996.
- \* I'm happy with it.
- \* You are doing better. This is the first issue in years that I have read more than one or two pages of
- \* I understand the expense problem, though I wish the CQ was mailed in a correct size envelope to protect the issue while in transit.
- \* Your right, it is partly a matter of expense, It is

- also a matter of time required to sit and stuff/seal every CQ.
- \* Keep up the good work.
- \* The only problem I've had with the CQ has been the print quality of a couple of recent issues.
- \* Print using a laser printer (i.e. for print master copies) more balanced coverage of Fleet (include good and bad events but presented in a positive way how can we help & improve it if we don t know what s happening?)
- \* I think our print quality has improved over time and as I figure out what I'm doing. I would certainly do this on a laser, if I could afford one. It is certainly not in the 'Fleet budget.
- \* Better Regional Summaries. Who's responsible? Is it clear to everyone.
- \* Region Summaries are primarily provided by STARFLEET Operations. Region Coordinators are encouraged to provide their own as they will be more current at press time. When we have individual ship reports, they are often used to supplement the summaries if necessary.
- \* Ship listings should be limited to one issue. Only new shuttles/ships should be listed in the 6 remaining issue. The space could be used for more features from the fleet.
- \* The problem I found is deadlines are about two weeks before I get the Communiqué.
- \* Never let that stop you from writing. We have to have a deadline, but we try to be as flexible as we can. If nothing else, perhaps we can use what you send in the next issue.
- \* Would like to see the missing issue if material hasn t run in succeeding CQ issue. Also, would like to see the results of the 1993 Newsletter contest!
- \* As far as I can tell, the "missing issue' never existed as a prepared Communiqué. If it does exist, it was never passed on to me. Most of the usable material turned over to me has been used in the past year.
- \* Keep up the excellent job!


