Communiqué Soapbox

Occasionally, I receive comments about how the CQs are labeled and mailed. I thought a short explanation of the mailing process may assist some who are having difficulties and I thought this was a good opportunity to share my opinions on some of the rumors and complaining that occasionally crosses my desk.

From the beginning, I believe it is important to understand that once any piece of mail is deposited with the Post Office we are unable to insure its delivery and, in fact, we have no way of knowing whether it is delivered or not. The United States Post Office handles trillions of pieces of mail each year and I'm sure that some do not make it to their destination. Does that mean that the whole country is conspiring against the person who didn't receive their mail? No, of course not. It means that the mail was damaged, misdirected or lost.

At Headquarters, I personally supervise all incoming and outgoing mail. I maintain detailed logs that contain the names and dates of every piece of mail that is received at HQ and every piece of mail that is mailed from HQ. Since January 1995, Headquarters has received and processed more than 20,000 pieces of mail. On an average day, Headquarters will receive, sort and distribute approximately 75-100 pieces of mail. On Mondays and Fridays the amount of mail can exceed three times this amount. Following a CQ mailing or a major convention, our mail drastically increases, especially membership renewals. And, what's more interesting, none of these numbers count the hundreds, if not thousands, of pieces of computer mail that comes in to each of the Executive Committee members that I do not track, but often research. And, while I'm on the subject, don't forget those Long Self-Addressed Stamped Envelopes (LSASE) when you request something. By including a LSASE, you will assist in assuring a more prompt answer and you relieve the postage burden that the Fleet must incur to answer routine correspondence

I have been accused of throwing away labels for certain members. To them I say this: Get over yourselves. Every member who is entitled to receive a CQ has one deposited in the mail. Period. If you do not receive the materials you are entitled to receive, follow this simple procedure:

1. Are you a valid member?

- 2. If yes, did we receive and process your membership payment?
- 3. If yes, have you moved?
- 4. If yes, do we have the correct address?

If all these are answered in the affirmative, then there is obviously a problem with mail delivery. Since I personally watched the mail being loaded at the post office, I must assume that the problem could be on the recipient's end. Contact your post office and speak with the postmaster who handles your mail delivery.

Membership packets and CQs to countries other than the USA are sent

in large envelopes. In the cases of Canada and Australia, materials are boxed and sent to mail distribution centers in each of those countries (Pam Bowyer and Alan Yates, Sr., respectively). If you live In Canada or Australia, please contact these individuals to check the status of materials that were intended for you.

One thing I must insist upon is your cooperation in writing legibly. Many applications come in with writing that is so bad that we cannot possibly know who the application or letter is from. If we cannot read your writing correctly, you increase the probability that mail is misdirected. And, while I'm on the issue, it is your responsibility to make sure we have a valid address for you. STARFLEET cannot continue to send a member multiple copies of anything because we do not have a valid address. There is one member who has moved five times since last September.

The next time you feel like complaining, remember that's not what this organization is about. If you are not a part of the solution, then you are part of the problem. We don't need more problems. So, volunteer to help resolve the issues instead.

There have been a few individuals who still have axes to grind and are taking every opportunity they can to make a fool out of themselves. I feel sorry for them, but they always get what's coming to them. The Golden Rule has taught us all that very well. Some say that the CQ paints only a good picture of the Fleet and leaves out the negative. If so, thank God for that. We get enough negative things in our individual lives, we don't need to see it in print. The association is not about the negative. It is about the positive. I heard once at a Region 12 Summit that this organization stands for is helping people. Creating controversy and spreading rumors does not help people. It only makes a fool out of those who are so stupid as to try to spread them.

My mother grew up in the south and taught me not to be anyone's garbage can. I hope your mother taught you the same. Listening to rumors and gossip and focusing on people's failures is not productive and it fills your mind with bad things.

Like many other mothers and fathers across the Fleet, I donate my time



Their Star Trek cons are put on all over the United States in hotels and other convention centers. There was a dealer's room with items sold that cannot be found in regular stores. Photographs, postcards, mugs, plates, t-shirts, pens, trading cards, books, comic books, jewelry, etc. related to Star Trek, Star Wars and a variety of other popular TV shows and movies were among the many products sold. Collectibles that you would usually have to mail order. Autographed photos of stars you may never get to meet due to distance and expense. There were also blooper reels and videos played, an auction, a costume contest and doorprize drawings among other activities. The main attraction is a Star Trek star from one of the series or movies. Saturday's feature was a special guest from Star Trek: Voyager, Ethan Phillips, who plays Neelix on the series that shows locally on WFXG Fox 54 on Sunday nights at 10:00 pm. Mr Phillips was as funny as his character Neelix on the show. His hour and a half talk was a series of humorous and serious answers to the various questions that he fielded. For example:

Q: How many children do you have?

A: Nine. Q: Nine?

A: No real children, nine fake ones.
Afterwards, Mr. Phillips signed one or two autographs each for an estimated crowd of 450 people. Try to imagine how it must have felt to talk for about one and a half hours and then to sign one's name about 900 times. It makes my arthritic fingers tired just to think of it.

This past weekend, I attended the Trek-O- conventions, I know that there was a lot of hard work involved with putting on the convention: the promoter and any other assistant had to make arrangements to reserve the rooms used for the convention, the chairs needed for the crowds, the various tables used for display of the vendors' wares, microphone set-up, projection equipment set-up, and various signs that had to be posted set-up, and various signs that had to be posted (disabled seating, price list, convention program, etc.) The dealers also spent a lot of time in preparation for the fans. They had to drive their truckload or van-load of goods for several hours to a convention site, then spend several hours unloading boxes of their goods from their vehicles to the vendor's room, and arranging their wares on various tables and display racks.

After the convention on a Saturday, if the con moves off into another town, the dealers will then have to spend hours packing up their wares, putting the boxes in their vehicles and driving for hours to the next convention site. After arrival in a new town,the vendors will then need to unpack the boxes from their vehicles, unpack the goods from their boxes, and rearrange the wares on tables and display racks again.

So, I have a healthy appreciation for the grueling, back-breaking, hours-long work that those dealers go through in setting up their various displays for the crowds to enjoy, with much of the work taking place late at night or early in the morning in order for the displays to be ready for perusing by the crowds during the be ready for perusing by the crowds during the six or seven hours of a convention. If you noticed the red lines in some eyes or tired expressions behind some of those smiles, now you know


why.



Innerspace. Pale grains of sand stretch into the distance along a rippled bottom. The graceful pattern occasionally interrupted by dark stones or fossilized debris. Suddenly the murky depth is pierced by a brilliant light. The light shimmers across the vast sandy plain until the beam finally rests upon the darkened outline of some forgotten hulk. The light illuminates the outline of a sunken ship. Its carvings and figurehead still intact. The light plays across the decks of the vessel and highlights cutlasses in their racks, poised cannon, and delicate strands of rope still threaded through a massive iron and wood anchor. The light strays to the side and a glimpse of the owner is perceived. It is a deep sea remotely operated vehicle being driven by a student thousands of miles from the sunken vessel

The vehicle is part of the JASON project, an advanced interactive "telepresence" field trip organized by the JASON Foundation for Education. Every year this remotely operated vehicle (ROV) takes part in an educational broadcast that is sent to awaiting junior high students around the world.

Going on its seventh year in operation, the JASON Foundation for Education (JFE) has become responsible for touching the classroom

lives of millions of students worldwide. By broadcasting scientific expeditions involving the oceanographic, biological, and geological sciences to Primary Interactive Network Sites (PINS), JFE has been able to change the perception of education today. It uses a large spectrum of technologies, from robotics to satellite communications, and enables junior

high students to catch glimpses of hidden wonders within the world around them.

The JASON Project takes place once each year. It is controlled and operated by scientists, engineers, technicians and other devoted personnel whose efforts eventually lead to the numerous scientific adventures that "involve" millions of children.



JFE is supported by a unique alliance of public, private and non- profit organizations that are committed to the improvement of science and technical education for all students. JFE is interested in the future and it truly believes that by changing the world of a child, you change the

world.

STARFLEET International is composed of people from all walks of life. Each one of its members believe in the improvement and advancement that technologies like the JASON Project have to offer.

STARFLEET International strives to become a part of these advancements through its motto, "Let me help". In many cities around the world, STARFLEET members are constantly lending a helpful hand and making a difference.

Now the time has come for the members of STARFLEET to lend a helping had toward the possibilities that projects like the JASON Project has to offer for the future. Learning to work with the local media

STARFLEET chapters have received some good advice in the past two years about how to get media coverage. For example, the Region One Summit in April 1995 included a workshop on public relations. And past Communiques have included various ideas tried by some of the clubs.

In general, the suggestions are from public relations officers or club members who tried to cope with frustrating situations. Most of the ideas are worth trying. Some ideas I've heard, while well-meant, just wont work.

If a club has a better idea of what to expect from the media, it is more likely to get media coverage when truly deserved. And the members will be less likely to demand special treatment that they have no right to seek, or get mad at the journalists for a problem that the club itself caused

To add some perspective to the publicity discussions, here are some tips from the U.S.S. *Tycho*. Her captain is a radio announcer and her first officer is a newspaper reporter.

1. Designate a public relations officer

It doesn't matter if your ship's captain takes on this role or delegates it to the ship's counselor or a secretary/treasurer. But one person should act as lead spokesman for the ship. The public relations officer should be able to intelligently answer questions about the chapter, about STARFLEET and about any special projects you have in progress. This person also should be able to direct a reporter to the best available club members for interviews on specific topics.

If you have someone in your chapter who works for a newspaper or broadcast station, please do not appoint that member to be the club's public relations officer. That person could lose his professional job because of the resulting conflict of interest.

2. Get to know your hometown media

Your chapter's hometown is unique. You could be a campus chapter, one of five Star Trek clubs in a metropolitan area, or the only STARFLEET chapter in your entire state. This situation will have an impact when you seek press coverage.

What works for a STARFLEET chapter in a

major city will not work for a club in a rural community. For example, one chapter told me it has been ignored by the metropolitan daily newspaper, but gets plenty of mentions on three radio stations.

While a broadcast emphasis works for that chapter, such an approach won't be relevant to a ship that is 30 minutes away from any TV or radio stations.

A chapter in a rural setting might get its only press from the occasional black and white photo in a community weekly newspaper.

The chapters with the best media opportunities would

likely be in medium-sized cities where the editors and station managers enjoy Star Trek or at least tolerate it; have the expertise and technology to handle a story professionally; and have plenty of space and time to devote to local news.

Each club's public relations officer must spend some time doing this research. What are the local media in your area? Did you forget about the campus newspaper or the community radio station two towns away? How and when do they want news submitted? Who do you talk to? If that person is not available, who do you ask for? What kind of news are they likely to bother with and what don't they want? How far in advance should you submit a press release?


It does you no good to send a press release for five consecutive weeks to the wrong editor. Learn to be efficient with your efforts.

3. Meet any deadlines you are given.

Ask for specific details in advance and meet your deadlines - no excuses are allowed.

Feature story and special event deadlines are

often earlier than people realize. Most of the Sunday paper goes to press nearly a week before you see it on the newsstand. A calendar item for Saturdays paper may have to be turned in by Thursday noon. The schedule for an entertainment section is set two or three weeks in advance.

Daily deadlines are even shorter. A reporter often gets assigned a story in the morning, with instructions to submit the final version by 5 p.m. that day

Although you meet a deadline, publication may not be guaranteed. If a major shooting happens across town, all kinds of stories will get pushed out of the newspaper that day-including the photo of your children's carnival.

4. Have a positive and helpful attitude

Don't ever tell an editor: "Your newspaper could use some 'good news' coverage, so here's a topic for you to consider."

That's not the way to introduce yourself. Such a statement means you don't bother to read the newspaper, or you'd know about the many positive stories it already runs. You will annoy the editor greatly and discourage him from wanting to do a story on your club.

Instead, propose an idea for a news or feature

One suggestion is to provide the local connection to a national news event. With 1996 being the 30th anniversary for Star Trek, using that anniversary as a news event might spark some interest from an editor. Call up your newspaper or television station and let them know you can arrange for local fans to comment on the anniversary and the impact of Star Trek on our society. Let them know you have members with uniforms who can pose for a story. You might get a good response.

Or consider getting involved in projects that will get news coverage whether you are involved or not. This might include the July 4th parade, the city's Halloween party or a Habitat for Humanity building project. Wear your club T-

If an article can be fitted into one column, then by all means, go for it! But, if not, there was nothing wrong with the tiny "Trek-bits" article across three columns on page 14 of issue #72.







GCIENCE AND TREKNOLOGY

I've been told that the current needle-less injections system for getting injections was developed by someone who saw Star Trek as a child and was fascinated by the hypospray used by Dr. McCoy. The trouble with injectors (be they needle or spray) is that they are still painful, while the injections on Star Trek never seen to hurt. Skin patches do not hurt but since the stratum corneum (outer layer of skin) only allows the smallest of molecules to pass thru the skin, there are many chemicals that cannot be given this way. Many drugs cannot be taken orally (like large protein molecules) as they tend to breakdown in the stomach, so they must be injected into the body to be effective. But don't give up. Science is currently experimenting with a method using low frequency ultrasound to combination with drugs. The ultra sound causes extremely small holes (thru the principle of cavitation) to open up in the skin cells which allow the drugs to pass easily


thru. The holes close up soon after the treatment. This method has been used to deliver insulation (for diabetes), gamma interferon (an immune system booster), and erythropoietin (an anemia drug) across the skin of cadavers. Tests with live people are scheduled within a year. (Science News, August 12, 95. Mary Collier-Corson, Chief of Ops/Sciences, USS Transcendence)

Treknology has a serious side and a fun side. You can now buy a full size Next Generation hand phaser that will control your TV and VCR. The unit is available thru several mail order places like 800-Trekker (\$39.95) (Thanks to Eugenio Angueira, e-mail from TrekMD@AOL.com). You can also buy what looks very much like a Next Generation Tricorder that is really a weather forecasting station, measuring temperature, humidity, pressure, light intensity, electromagnetic radiation, and with a colorimetry (color

matching) function to determine plant health. It is called "Tricorder Mark 1" and comes with 16 million color screens and Federation and Star Trek menus. It costs \$499.00 from Vital Technologies Corp. (Sci-Fi Magazine, Jan/Feb issue, pg. 33, Christine Killian, Chief Science Officer, USS *Peacekeeper*).

As a father you take pride in the accomplishments of any offspring. Usually the bigger the accomplishments, the bigger the pride in the individual offspring. But when the child is mentally disabled, every accomplishment is a BIG one.

Lieutenant, j.g. Christopher Jeffery Higdon was born developmentally delayed. In his case he was unable to speak clearly, and usually did not, until the age of four. Since the age of two he has been in special schools.

He has been diagnosed with a form of Soto Syndrome, although the doctors are not sure (he does not have the abnormalities of this syndrome). That, with a recent diagnosis of Marfin Syndrome, puts each accomplishment that much greater. Marfin Syndrome is a medical condition and is classified as a heritable disorder of connective tissue. Signs include diagnosis of heart/lung problems, as well as a thin, tall lanky look to the individual, among other things.

Chris was born in Rockford, Illinois, on April 30, 1980. He was born premature, at four pounds, fifteen ounces, at a total length of 18 inches, with an abnormally large head. Today he stands six feet, one inch tall, due to the Marfin Syndrome, only two inches shorter than his father.

Chris currently attends the Child Developmental Classes (CDC) at the Chester County Junior High School in Henderson, Tennessee. Although he would be listed as an 8th grader, his reading skills are that of a 6th grader and his comprehension skill is that of a 5th grader. His teacher, Mrs. Maureen Talley, describes him as an intelligent young individual, excelling in mathematics and history, who loves to draw. To say he draws on the back of his papers (including tests) can be a problem for Chris. His favorite things to draw are things to do with Star Trek. Recently he drew a whole scene from Star Trek: Generations.

Since preschool, except for one year, Chris has participated in the area Special Olympics in Mississippi and Tennessee. The one year he was not allowed to participate was the year he was diagnosed with Atrial Valve Prolapse, a heart condition contributing to the Martin Syndrome. Since then he has been cleared by his physician to participate in the Special Olympics.

Chris has been very excited about being a member of STARFLEET. In an attempt to get him more involved, his father contacted the then commandant of STARFLEET Academy, Bio Trimble, to inquire about the types of test the academy schools put out for handicapped members such as Chris. This lead to his appointment as a special consultant to the academy

In mid-fall Chris successfully passed Officer's Training School and was commissioned an Ensign aboard the USS *Shiloh*. His current assignment is Helmsman and assistant to the captain. He previously served as Assistant Security Chief in charge of the Armory. On March 1, 1996, Ensign Higdon was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant, Junior





Treatise on the Use of the Cloaking Device in the Galaxy (II) Class Starship

When the design parameters of the Galaxy (II) Class Starship Development Project were being laid out, one of the areas of emphasis was on the tactical systems of the class. Though on paper the Galaxy Class mounts an impressive tactical array, in application the vessels of this class have been found lacking - even against starships many times their inferior.

It is an unfortunate comment on the state of intergalactic affairs that weapons research in the Federation continues to advance. The "fruits" of these labors were examined and then implemented into the Galaxy (II) class to make it better able to defend itself against Threat forces they may encounter.

One of the more hotly debated upgrades, both within the Federation and her interstellar neighbors, has been the implementation of the FCE-2 cloaking device as part of the FSS shield system upgrade.

As by its model designation, this is the second type of cloaking device used by the Federation, replacing the FCE-1 model used by many Starfleet vessels in the late 2200's. These devices were disallowed under the Treaty of Algeron with the Romulan Empire, partly due to the fact it was developed using technologies from Romulan and Klingon devices stolen by James T. Kirk, and were removed from service as the vessels were retired or refit.

Though the Treaty prevented the Starfleet from actually fielding a device, research continued (both official and unofficial), though the designs (with the exception of the system installed on the U.S.S. Pegasus) never left the laboratory.

With the discovery of new, more powerful Threat forces (the Borg and Dominion), and the instability of the Klingon and Romulan Star Empires, the decision was made to prepare a new cloaking device for possible future integration into Starfleet vessels. In an effort to limit the "threat" factor such a device might cause amongst the Federation's neighbors, the decision was made to make it part of the shielding system. The FSS shield system, under development at the same time, was chosen as the system to use. This prevented weapons to be fired through the field without disrupting it, making the cloaking device useless as a strategic "first-strike" weapon. As it also reduces shield effectiveness by 60%, a cloaking

device adds little, if anything, to the defensive aspects of the ship it is installed on.

So why build a cloaking device? While of limited use as a weapon, the cloaking device allows a great deal of flexibility to the more traditional mission of Starfleet - exploration.
When exploring civilizations not yet ready for first-contact, yet possessing sensor systems sophisticated to detect Federation vessels, the cloaking device would allow them to observe without being observed. And while there is a valid point to be made about their use in espionage-related matters against other governments, let's just say this allows us to "even the field" in that area.

Laboratory trials were successful and, befitting her status as the Starfleet's "testbed" vessel, the Galaxy (II) class was chosen to test the design. Currently, as per Starfleet protocol, only the lead vessel of the class, USS Bright Star (CKE 71800) was fitted with the FSS/FCE-2 system. Any future vessels of this class will, for the moment, use the FSQ-4 system which does not mount the FCE-2. Adding the two vessels of the Griffon class exploration battleship (USS Griffon and USS Pendragon)

shirt or other regalia to distinguish your chapter. When the media shows up, be cooperative as they look for a photo opportunity.

Or call the media when you plan premiere promotions for Trek movies. TV stations often like to interview fans waiting in line for the first local showing of a major movie. Tell the newsroom what theater you'll be at -- and that you plan to show up in uniform.

5. Understand the limitations of free publicity When you buy an advertisement, you can dictate to some extent when or where the ad will be placed.

But you don't have that editorial control when you ask for free publicity. A meeting notice might not appear in the same column or page each week. Or the radio station can add you to their Community datebook reports, but can't guarantee the newscast times.

Available newspaper space is at more of a premium than you may realize. The newspaper industry is facing a newsprint paper shortage combined with skyrocketing prices. During the past year, many newspapers increased advertising rates, increased newsstand prices or cut back on the number of pages.

And some broadcast stations are more generous with their public announcement times than others. A community datebook may be a daily part of one station's log during the noon hour, but not at the competing station across town.

6. Get involved for fun and service, not for the new coverage

Be realistic when you decide to join a public service project or community event. You are not guaranteed to be the focus of any resulting news coverage.

For example, your STARFLEET chapter has a blood drive with the Klingons. The published newspaper photo is of a Klingon talking to a blood donor, with your club mentioned in the photo caption as "also participating."

When that happens, are you going to get mad? Are you going to claim the newspaper isn't being fair about its coverage?

If so, you may want to rethink why you do public service.

Remember that the universe is bigger than your pile of news clippings


So what if the journalists in your town ignore your club -- whether it be out of ignorance or outright dislike? You can still thrive as a STARFLEET chapter.

Here's our situation: The U.S.S. *Tycho* headquarters is in Fremont, Ohio, about 30 minutes away from Toledo, Ohio. Our best local media options would be with Fremont's dally newspaper and community radio station. But *Tycho* officers work at both media outlets.

As a result, the journalists' code of ethics places big restrictions on what we can do with promotion in our own hometown. You will never see a feature story on the U.S.S. *Tycho* in our newspaper, although there is a large local interest In Star Trek, NASA and space exploration. And the radio disc jockey doesn't dare mention the *Tycho* on the air, although he gives a weekly space news report.

We have no such restrictions on the Toledo media market. And it's true that half our membership is from Toledo. But it's not realistic to expect much coverage in the bigger city, especially when Klingon and Romulan chapters are active in Toledo.

Competition from the "alien" Star Trek clubs in Toledo is the big reason why our chapter dedicated our biggest "Star Trek: Generations" promotion efforts in the smaller city of Tiffin. We missed out on the TV interviews in Toledo, but we were the stars at the small movie theater.

that also mount the FSS/FCE-2 system, that makes only three Ships of the Line with the system out of the hundreds currently in service.

And though there are no plans to do so, studies are underway to allow the FSO-series of shielding systems used by most current Federation starship compatible with the FCE-2 design, should such a need for this capability

arise. This should serve notice to other governments that, while the Federation takes her Treaty requirements seriously and treats them with respect, we will not be bullied.

Any questions regarding current disposition of cloak-equipped vessels should be directed to the Department of Technical Services, in care of Starfleet Headquarters.

8. Do your own publicity

Our scrapbook doesn't have a pile of newspaper clippings. But it is full of photographs we've taken ourselves, convention souvenirs and articles from our own top-notch newsletter.

And we don't have to worry about getting the word out about our STARFLEET chapter. Nearly every month, somebody new hears about us through fliers we've placed at the library, comic stores, book stores and word of mouth. I even met a local convention promoter at a costume shop and gave her our pamphlet.

Despite the "lack of publicity," chapter membership has thrived. The U.S.S. *Tycho* was commissioned in April 1995. Our roster listed 32 STARFLEET members as of January 1996.

So if you feel neglected by your hometown media, consider our situation. The U.S.S. *Tycho* is neglected on purpose. We just explain the circumstances to newer members and refuse to get upset about it.






