My Command Staff presented me with a plaque of thanks for a decade of leading a unique ship. A commissioning plaque was also presented, and has been placed proudly in my living room.

It's been a long journey, and hard to believe I've remained in the center seat all this time (guess I'm just a glutton for punishment). Our second special anniversary party was also a very special occasion. It was our annual Pool Party held at my place, and also featured a visit from the Fleet Admiral who took up the mantle of cook, as in days past. Mike flipped many a burger and barbecue chicken.

We had a surprise visit from Fred, the Chief Engineer of the USS *Temperance*. Many of us adjourned to the Seaside Heights boardwalk after the party where, by tradition, I was tossed into my pool by my crew.

Along with Matt Myers, I have had more contact with Chapter COs and members than anyone else in Fleet, I think. I am also the Commanding Officer of the Correspondence Shuttle Normandy, Deputy Commandant of the STARFLEET Marine Corps, and Internal Programing Chair for IC99, STARFLEET's 25th Anniversary. My contact information is at the end of this column.

Now that I have stepped up to attempt to fill the shoes left by VAdm Monaghan, I have made a few alterations to the way Ops works. There are a few areas I need to cover here but I will be as brief as I can.

### **District Vice Chiefs**

As of the January MSR reporting period (Jan. MSRs due by Feb.1, late by Feb.5th) each Region has been assigned to a District Vice Chief (DVC) of which there are three; DVC East, DVC West, and DVC International. The three DVCs will responsible for all MSRs (E-mail and US Mail) for their Regions. Here is a breakdown of each DVC's area of responsibility:

A note concerning DVC International Regions: All Regions with international chapters as well as chapters in the US will report to Capt Johnson. Currently this only affects R13 I believe.

### **Operations Problem Solving**

As you can see Ops also has a priority now. Operations Problem Solving is my focus for STARFLEET Operations. Each month, each DVC will submit a monthly report of who reported and who didn't. Along with this report will be a very brief activity summary noting highlights that will go to the Communiqué for the chapter summaries. Also in this report will be the problems that the chapters have had and what action each DVC took to troubleshoot. That's right, the DVC is the first line in problem-solving with Operations. They see the problem first and will attempt to assist as best as they can; if they cannot handle it, they will forward it to the proper EC department or to me.

Now, by no means does this mean that the door to the Ops

Chief's office is closed. Anytime a member or chapter is having a problem they think I can assist with, then by all means they should contact me. What I will do is go back to the DVC and see if this has been an ongoing problem or is new, as well as what, if anything, they have done. From there I will address the problem directly and attempt to resolve it as best I can.

### **Ops by the Numbers**

As of this writing, I am aware of at least two if not three chapters pending commissioning very soon. As I process them there will be announcements Fleetwide noting the newest addition to the "Fleet Family."

As much as I am saddened by any decommissioning, they will occur. However, that does not stop the crew from working hard to be recommissioned. At this time I am talking with one former chapter who has stayed in contact with its regional command staff and will be returning to Fleet through EFCP.

### **Filing MSRs**

Very quickly let me reiterate that the simplest way for those who are online and have web access to file their MSRs is to use the Ops MSR web page at msr.sfi.org or on the Ops site at www.musc.edu/~mccabedb/ops/This is the easiest way to send copies of your MSR to everyone who needs to receive them.

As I said before, the deadline for MSR is the first of the month following the reporting period. However, they will not be counted as late by Ops till after the fifth, and not as FTR (failure-to-report) until after the RC Report deadline of the 15th of the following month. If they are received after that point they will still be credited but as late

reports on the next month's summary.

#### **Housekeeping Issues**

There are very few of these, really. Anything that would have been sent to VAdm Monaghan in the past now should come to me.

A note to all RCs: Recently FAdm Smith noted that all Regional Reports should go to his Chief of Staff from now on. This is in addition to filing them with the Chief of Operations. FAdm Smith has simply delegated his processing and review to his Chief of Staff; it does not affect the requirement that the RCs needs to report to the Chief of Operations.



Many times, people hear rumors or receive mail about seemingly major concerns, or opportunities to help other people out, and rush off to rally their friends and neighbors to join the effort without first confirming the truth behind the rumor. And so it begins — you tell two friends, who tell three other friends, who tell more friends, and eventually the rumor gets back to you — which appears to confirm the validity of the original message or phone call or whatever, because now you've heard it from multiple sources.

Item four of the STARFLEET

Officer's Code of Conduct is, "I will never assume, but always verify."
This is an excellent rule for use in everyday life, not just your STARFLEET life. If you take the time to verify the truth behind what you hear before you pass it on, you help to eliminate the spread of misinformation.

Whether it's a rumor of a new computer virus (never run any program that's been sent to you over email unless you know and absolutely trust the sender — and even then, run a virus-scan program over it first), or a pending piece of legislation (no, the FCC is not planning on taxing Internet usage), or how to make a dying child's wish come true (Craig Shergold's cancer entered remission years ago, he just turned 20, and his family still gets four bags of postcards each week, which are sent directly to a recycling center), just because it sounds important doesn't mean it's

As you all may have heard by now, the chapter charter fee is no more. But, so is a free subscription to the CSR for each chapter. Chapters, shuttles, and individuals, must now subscribe to the CSR directly. The new VRR form will have a box or section to subscribe to the CSR, if you wish.

Effective immediately, the VRR

fee is a flat \$10, for both new launches and commissionings. This represents an increase of \$5 for new launches. However, you will be

However, you will be getting additional items as part of your launch packet to offset this. Copies of both the START and Recruiting manuals will be included with all new launch packets.

The cost of both these manuals, as well as the extra postage incurred, should take up most, if not all of the increased fee. However, the short, and long term benefit to a new shuttle that both these manuals represent, is invaluable. We firmly believe that they will greatly enhance any new shuttle's chances for success, both short and long term.

That's all I have for real news this month. I will close with a few reminders.

1) Summit/Conference season is fast approaching for a lot of regions. Traditionally, shuttles like to either launch or commission at these events. If this is the case with your group, please, please plan on starting your VRR through channels as far in advance as possible, up to two months ahead of time. This will allow plenty of time for the US mail to get your VRR from person to person, to process your

VRR, and get either a launch or commissioning packet to you in time for the big event. I *hate* being the bad guy, and putting a damper on such special events in a new club's memorable times, by holding up a VRR because it got to me the day before their event, or because of problems with the VRR, etc. If the VRR starts far enough ahead of time, it goes a long way to preventing that from happening.

2) When filling out a VRR, the CO & XO must include their rank. This block is for your *current* rank, and *not* that rank which you will attain by virtue of either launching or commissioning your chapter. If you try to anticipate your new rank, and list that, then ShOC or Ops will assume that you already hold that rank, and will not make your promotion certificate to include with your launch or commissioning packet. It's in your best interest to put down your rank pre-launch, or pre-commissioning.

3) Plan on a full nine months for your shuttle term. Not eight, seven, six, or five, etc. Nine. When the former ASL program gets revised (which is first up after the manuals are in release), we will re-visit this.

That's it for now. Thanks for being so patient, and understanding. And look for all the long absent missing info next issue! Smooth sailing!

### Star Trek's Gay Presence

"Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations."

It is a phrase that found its place in Gene Roddenberry's legendary STAR TREK, a philosophy that spoke to the very heart of his fictional world. "IDIC," as it came to be called, was a credo that called for inclusion of everyone, no matter how different they might be from the norm. The very idea of "the norm" itself was questioned, showing that it, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder. Although no specifically gay characters have vet appeared in any incarnation of STAR TREK, the universe that Roddenberry created has a definite "gay presence," which assures us that gay people too are part of IDIC.

The fact that this gay presence is presented matter-of-factly, rather than singled out for ridicule or abuse, is cause for celebration among STAR TREK's many gay fans. Repeatedly, the shows and films have asserted that prejudice, discrimination and bigotry (in all their forms) are wrong, and that no one, including gay people, should be subjected to them. In STAR TREK, being gay is just another part of the diversity of the universe, no more cause for alarm than a different skin tone or a bumpy forehead.

The gay presence can be felt throughout STAR TREK's different incarnations, indeed, it is in the very fabric of the universe Roddenberry created. The following episodes are occasions where the gay presence is most strongly felt.

The Original Series first season episode "The Devil in the Dark" was one of the first STAR TREK stories to directly address prejudice and fear. Written by Gene L. Coon and directed by Joseph Pevney, it featured a monster that was murdering the workers of a mining operation. When Kirk (William

Shatner) and Spock (Leonard Nimoy) hunted the creature down bent on killing it, compassion allowed them to discover its true nature. The "Horta," as it was called, was killing out of desperation and self-defense — the miners had unknowingly been destroying its eggs. With true intentions revealed, the Horta and the miners were able to start working together to their mutual good.

Everyone who has ever felt misunderstood or misinterpreted can relate to this episode. The plight of the Horta is a clear metaphor for any outsider that is feared simply because it is unfamiliar. Much of the prejudice gay people experience can be traced to feelings much like those of the miners: fear of the unknown clouding reason and judgment.

In The Next Generation's fourth season episode "The Host," written by Michael Horvat and directed by Marvin Rush, the nature of love and the issue of same-sex affection are explored.

When Dr. Beverly Crusher (Gates McFadden) falls in love with Trill ambassador Odan (Franc Luz), she doesn't realize that he is a joined species — a host body with a symbiotic parasite living inside. But when Odan is injured and the parasite is removed from the host body, she begins to question her feelings. What is it she loves? Is it Odan the host body, now dead? Or is it Odan the "symbiont" itself, the small slug-like entity that carries with it the experiences and memories of all its previous hosts? The answer seems to be Odan the symbiont, because when it is temporarily inserted into William Riker's (Jonathan Frakes) body, Beverly resumes her relationship with it/him. But when the symbiont is joined with its new Trill host (Nicole Orth-Pallavicini), who happens to be female, Beverly says their relationship must end. Accepting her decision, Odan gives her a good-bye kiss on the hand and leaves her.

The gay presence is very strongly felt in this episode. Most obviously in the scene when Beverly first meets Kareel, Odan's new host. The ambassador seems quite ready to continue its/her romance with Beverly, not seeing the fact that they are now the same gender as any obstacle. But the most telling point is that when the doctor says she cannot continue with Odan, it is not because it/he is now female. Rather, it is the shifting nature of the Trill appearance that she finds disconcerting – she could not live with the constant

In TNG's fifth season appeared "The Outcast," written by Jeri Taylor and directed by Robert Scheerer. This story, about a member (Melinda Culea) of the sexless/androgynous J'naii race that feels "forbidden" female feelings for Riker and is punished with brainwashing for it, has a very obvious gay presence.

The parallels between the way the J'naii prohibit romantic/sexual feelings of any kind and the scorn and prejudice gay people face are clear. Presuming to judge and dictate to others how and with whom they can love is shown to be oppressive and dangerous.

"Rejoined," from Deep Space Nine's fourth season, has the most direct expression of the gay presence of any STAR TREK story so far. Written by Ronald D. Moore and Rene Echevarria and directed by Avery Brooks, it explores what happens when one of Dax's former host's wives comes aboard the station. Unexpectedly falling in love all over again, Dax (Terry Farrell) and Lenara (Susanna Thompson) must deal not only with their own conflicting feelings, but with the Trill taboo that forbids re-starting relationships with

former lovers. After a passionate liaison, Lenara decides she cannot break with law and tradition and leaves the station and a tearful Dax behind.

Despite the fact that it was Tarias Dax, a male Trill, that had the relationship with Lenara's former (female) host in the past, the most memorable image from "Rejoined" is that of two women enthusiastically kissing. But it is not the fact that Jadzia and Lenara are the same gender that is objectionable, but the Trill tradition that forbids "re-association."

Kira (Nana Visitor) expresses disbelief that in Trill culture reassociation is seen as "unnatural." Why, she wonders, are two people who love each other supposed to ignore those feelings? Indeed, this very contradiction is what many gay people are pressured to adopt. The label "unnatural" is certainly familiar to gays as well, despite all evidence that homosexuality is, in fact, a normal and natural variant in mammalian sexuality.

Like "The Outcast," the story shows that suppression of natural urges, as well as trying to legislate love, are doomed to fail. Dax is willing to continue the relationship despite the taboo, and we cheer her free-minded attitude. Like Dax, many gay people decide to live the lives they want to, regardless of how others might feel about it. We are saddened that Lenara does not have the strength of character to resume the marriage that Dax does.

The experience of being shunned and exiled is something every gay person can relate to, and having the courage to stand against oppression and prejudice is something we all can aspire to.

All of these STAR TREK episodes show beyond a shadow of a doubt that discrimination is wrong, and that same-sex affection and

love are options just as viable as any other. There is a sense that sexual orientation (be it heterosexual, homosexual, bisexual or some other yet-to-be-discovered preference) is no longer important. The humanity of STAR TREK's time has outgrown its prejudices about sexual orientation as it has those about race and religion. A person's sexuality is just one more aspect of their personality, not any more or less interesting than their eye color or body type.

But progress can take a long time, and the humanity of today is not as evolved of that in STAR TREK's time. The fact that the episodes with the most gay presence have been controversial is no surprise.

Just as people objected to a female first officer in STAR TREK's original pilot "The Cage" (Majel Barrett as Number One), thirty years later people wondered if a female captain (Kate Mulgrew as Kathryn Janeway) could carry Voyager. Just as people protested the interracial kiss between William Shatner and Nichelle Nichols in the Original Series episode "Plato's Stepchildren," so would people protest the same-sex kiss between Terry Farrell and Susanna Thompson thirty years later in "Rejoined."

But the keepers of STAR
TREK's flame have never been
frightened of controversy. From
the beginning, the shows have
examined what it means to be a
present-day human being within a
science fiction setting. "To boldly
go where no one has gone before,"
to seek out universal truths regardless of contemporary dogma, to
bravely say that discrimination is
wrong with no exceptions, these
are the missions of STAR TREK.

One of the most important functions of TV and film, indeed of art itself, is to act as a mirror. Everyone longs to see themselves in art. STAR TREK has always been light-years ahead of other television shows in its inclusive philosophy. Where else in the late 1960s could viewers see a multi-ethnic group of such diversity working together for a common goal? Where else could viewers see a vision of humanity's future where courage, thought and compassion had replaced fear, bigotry and ignorance? Diversity was, and is, the standard in the STAR TREK world.

That diversity is one of the reasons that world has such a remarkable legion of fans. They are from every walk of life, from every race and creed, every color and orientation. Everyone, no matter how "different," can watch STAR TREK and see something of themselves. Everyone can watch it and see a future where they are a part of a noble group that is committed to exploration and peaceful coexistence.

From a Japanese helmsman to a Russian ensign, from a blind engineer to a gifted adolescent, from an African-American commander to a lonely outsider, from a Native-American first officer to a female starship captain; people can watch STAR TREK and see themselves — they can watch it and say "There I am." They can watch and feel a part of the fascinating tapestry that makes up the human race.

Thanks to STAR TREK's gay presence, its many gay fans can do the same. Even if there never is an openly gay character in STAR TREK, the gay presence is there. Gay fans can be grateful to Gene Roddenberry for creating the world of STAR TREK, and we can be grateful to Rick Berman, Michael Piller and Jeri Taylor for carrying it on.

We can thank them that "Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations" includes gay people, and always will.

### Accord on planetary patrol

USS Accord, a Soyuz-class tactical frigate assigned to the Seventh Fleet, spends most of its time on border patrols and other deepspace journeys that keep ship and crew away from the Federation's population centers.

A few times each year, though, *Accord* is responsible for a patrol through Sector 001, Earth's Solar system. Surprisingly, the vessel usually manages a sweep inbound through each planet's orbit to the sun in about an hour.

Of course, we're now talking not about the fictional starship's duties, but about the STARFLEET chapter's activities. *Accord* is one of a few groups in the Ithaca, New York area responsible for monthly cleanings and checkups on the ten stations that make up the Carl Sagan Memorial Planet Walk.

The Planet Walk, a project of Ithaca's Sciencenter, is a one-to-five-billion scale model of our own Solar system, laid out on a 1,200 meter route between the Ithaca Commons downtown pedestrian shopping mall and the Sciencenter itself, on the outskirts of town. The scale is such that the nearest star, Alpha Centauri, would be situated roughly in Hawaii. So, of course, Sciencenter representatives have been negotiating to install an Alpha Centauri monument at the Honolulu airport!

Each of the planet monuments includes a scale model of the individual planet, centered in a Plexiglas window the size of the sun. (The sun monument, as you can see in the picture to the right, has a carved hole representing the size of our star.) There's also a porcelain-enamel plaque at each station that displays a NASA photo of the planet and information about each, and above each window is the planet's Zodiac symbol, affixed in metal.

The patrol duties include noting the condition of each monument,

cleaning up litter, scraping off foreign substances (bird droppings and gum are common), and wiping off the Plexiglas windows with window cleaner and paper towels.

Lieutenant Commander Sandra Kisner, one of Accord's longestserving members, has been coordinating the group's participation in this remarkable community project. Accord was represented at the dedication ceremonies in November, 1997, at which Cornell alumnus Bill Nye "the science guy" spoke, and was even mentioned in the welcoming remarks. We've now patrolled the Planet Walk three times, and have been asked to take on two additional months in addition to the two we've been responsible for each year.

Dr. Sagan, the noted astronomer who brought astronomy to the masses through the PBS television program "Cosmos," was a professor at Ithaca's Cornell University.





(His senior seminar on critical thinking was even better known, on campus at least, than his course offerings involving

astronomy.) He and his wife, Dr. Ann Druyan, collaborated on the movie version of the novel *Contact*, which starred Jodie Foster, Mat-

thew McConaughey, and Tom Skeritt. He died late in the production stages of the movie, and about eleven months before the Planet Walk's completion and dedication, in December, 1996.

Greetings from the STARFLEET Liaison to the OCP.

1998 is over and the Overseas Coupon Project has enjoyed another tremendous year. In the past, the yearly totals have been good, but nothing could compare to the past two years. In 1997, we had a growth period and ended up with donations totalling more than \$1,000,000 in coupons. For 1998, however, the news just kept getting better. As of February 28, 1999, the final total for 1998 coupon donations is \$1,242,990.80 worth of coupons!

But the news is even better than that. In 1998, the STARFLEET chapters who have collected and sent in coupons reached another fantastic milestone. The total coupons collected and sent by STARFLEET chapters is \$1,064,639.21!

That's right, STARFLEET broke the million dollar mark in 1998.

None of this great news would have been possible if not for the chapters of STARFLEET and the drive they have shown in making this program work. 
The fun part of being the Fleet Historian, is when you can track a Chapter from today all the way back to the Mother Chapter. Today we have three such chapters, and we would like to share that genealogy with you.

In 1974 the Independent Star Trek Club - The USS Enterprise in Lufkin, TX, reorganized as STARFLEET, and the USS Enterprise became the first Chapter in that organization. Two years later, they apparently changed their name to the USS Endeavor and no real chapter has held the name USS Enterprise since, though that name had appeared on the Vessel Registry under the command of one Adm. J.T. Kirk.

Between 1976 and 1980 the USS Endeavor spun off a new chapter the USS Bon Homme Richard, which spun off the USS Antares no later then 1982.

The USS *Antares* the home chapter of our Fourth Fleet Admiral Fran Booth, shuttled off the USS Confederation in 1987. The USS Confederation shuttled off the USS Andromeda out of Houston, TX (and my second assignment in STARFLEET) in 1988 under the command of Captain Liz Patton. The Andromeda shuttled off the USS Rhyanna out of San Marcos/Austin, Texas on September 24th, 1991. The Rhyanna then turned around and shuttled off the USS Bexar on July 2nd, 1993 in San Antonio, Texas. The USS *Bexar* shuttled off the Space Station Camelot (the second chapter to hold that name) on May 15, 1996 in Austin, Texas.

The Rhyanna, the Bexar, and the Camelot are all still active and have a proud heritage to claim. Congrats!

Meeting and interviewing Patrick Stewart was certainly fun. He would not allow us to videotape his con talk. We didn't expect to be able to interview him on camera. We figured the best we could do was to tape his presentation, but he surprised us with a half hour personal interview.

Another great meeting was our first encounter with John "Q" DeLancie, who posed with many for pics after a long interview at a con in a small room as we propped up a very small video camera using books.

Our presentation of a plaque on behalf of not only our ship but the township of Lakewood was very special to not only us but to Armin Shimmerman, who attended high school there.

We'll never forget seeing Avery Brooks at Fort Washington or the cast of Lost In Space. The language Jonathan "Dr. Smith" Harris used to describe Network Executives was certainly... colorful.

One time a certain former Ops Chief, Charlie Kim, and I ended up bringing back a new temporary officer. If you ever hear anything about a Yeoman "Leather & Lace" Thompson, don't ask!

We hosted two mini-R7 Conferences in connection with two very disorganized cons in Atlantic City a

few years later where we helped out with panel talks and security (but had a lot of fun along the way, with the exception of then Security Officer Ken Fedunewicz's heart attack).

Our adventures at the Franklin Institutes Galaxy Ball, Federation Science Display, and the Princetonbased American Cancer Society Dinner Dance put us in the newspapers and in uniform for some memorable fun. One of those events had Ass't. Security Chief Kenny Dohn collide with the back end of my then 1984 Oldsmobile Cutlass, destroying his rental vehicle. "I was driving along, I turned the radio knob, and there you were." It certainly made the night of Manchester Twp. Police who upon seeing us in costume wondered why one of our cars couldn't have "beamed out of the way."

When we hosted the 1993 Region 7 Conference in Seaside Heights, which brought in 120 STARFLEET officers to the community, the mayor was flabbergasted at meeting a Green Orion Slave girl during our STAR TREK promenade. The USS Albany member greeted him wearing a very short gold dress and he replied, "You must have come a long distance to be here."

Another Seaside Heights mayor welcomed everyone to our Costume Ball, which served as the launching party for the USS *Thagard*.

Speaking of launchings, we helped give birth to not only the USS Thagard (in Philly), but the USS Lexington (northern New Jersey), USS Valiant (western New York), USS Justice (northern New Jersey), USS Belgica (our first ship outside of the Region and outside the country), Runabout Quantico (which hopefully someday will become the USS Guadalcanal) in Pittsburgh PA, and the USS New Horizons (also based in upstate New York). It was the first existing club to the "sponsored" by our chapter as opposed to being in the shuttlecraft program. In many ways we lent a lot of support to the Region's first correy chapter, Shadowstar. Then there was the USS Prevailing Wind, our shuttle in Harrisburg PA. Some of those groups have left STARFLEET, one doesn't exist any longer, and two became Fleet

Our original core group, our first Command Staff, had our doubts about STARFLEET when we formed. We were restless to form and we did hit some snags and an incident or two which made us uncomfortable. However, we remained with SF and we're glad we did. Your then rebellious CO ended up becoming Region Coordinator, a position I've held for two terms now, about four years. Along with other chapters, we've had our share of membership problems with SF, some of which are being corrected now. We've also had some interesting times with Fleet Admirals. Many 7th Fleet ships nearly left STARFLEET during the nearly two-year period of the Dan McGinnis administration. It was a tough time to be a new RC.

Crew members of Starfleet's USS Lief Erickson converge on a Greenville book shop to plan a Klingon counter-attack – as well as food drive, to down cold colas and just talk Trek.

The battle will be a fiery laser-tag skirmish against the Klingon club out of Easley.

"I've been a Star Trek fan all my life," said Henry Peden, of Fountain Inn, captain of the USS Lief Erickson, smiling a welcome above his red, Jean-Luc Picard-style uniform shirt. "I joined a Star Trek club and then Starfleet two years ago."

He's also chief charity officer. The club recently raised \$1,808 in a month by clipping super-market coupons to be used by American servicemen stationed in Okinawa and Germany.

The Overseas Coupon Project and other projects aren't just to pass the Starfleet's time since there are no troubling tribbles in Greenville County or alien viruses to slip onto the ship, Peden said.

"Star Trek creator Gene Roddenberry's dream was to help others," Peden said. "We want to get out and help people in the community. We're just carrying on his dream."

Peden has an inch-thick listing of Starfleet chapters all over the world – all small writing, said Gary Hollifield of Mauldin, club yeoman and medical officer. Hollifield was certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation – CPR – and basic first aid to become the chapter's medical officer.

"Star Trek is what brings us together and then we go out into the community," Hollifield said, also a Mauldin High School student, aspiring broadcast journalist and employee of Taco Bell. "I like to focus on how everybody gets along on StarTrek, no matter how they look."

Upcoming projects will be to participate in a county-wide food drive and to install an aquarium in a Mauldin senior citizens' home.

The nine men and women – both students and professionals — around the fold-away table in a back room at the Open Book on South Pleasantburg Drive offered similar tales of long-time Star Trek admiration.

They meet the second Sunday of each month for business matters, but gather at various members' homes for cookouts and other activities during the rest of the month.

"I've got all eight movies, most of the regular Star Trek and Next Generation episodes on tape, the books, a lot of action figures, posters," reeled off Debbie Butcher, a courier for BankAir from Simpsonville. She accepted the title of the chapter's biggest fan from fellow crew members.

For Barbara Blair of Greenville, Southside High School student and aspiring actress, each episode is a glimpse into what could be.

"I like Star Trek," she said,
"because it's better than (the world)
is right now."


