MICHAEL D. SMITH — COMMANDER, STARFLEET 1997-2000

With Fleet Admiral Michael Smith due to complete his second term in office at the end of 2000, the Communiqué commissioned Vice Admiral Johnathan "Gumby" Simmons to conduct an interview with our outgoing Commander, STARFLEET.

Gumby: Mike, Welcome and thanks! Mike: Anytime :-)

Gumby: Q: Four years Mike... You took over Starfleet at what some would say was its worst time and help bring about very positive change. Looking back, how has Starfleet changed in that time?

Mike: Well, we've definitely grown as an organization. When we started 4 years ago, I don't think anyone really understood that STARFLEET had evolved past "just a fan club." Now more people understand that, and this is definitely a good thing. We've also become more electronic-friendly. I'm sad to say that my predecessor really gave the electronic side of things a seriously bad reputation.

Gumby: I remember that period.

Mike: Fortunately, we've been able to overcome it and integrate our electronic presence as part of how we operate the organization on a daily basis.

Gumby: Bringing Starfleet into the 21st century!

Gumby: Q: How much has the electronic presence helped our organization?

Mike: With our award-winning home page for news and information, to the ability for members to look up their information online, to join and renew online, and more, it's been a definite help to the organization as a whole. It's really gotten our name out there. Add that to the IRC channel that allows folks to help stay in contact, the electronic side of things has definitely helped STARFLEET.

Gumby: I know that I am not the only person to have met new friends on the IRC channel.

* *Mike nods in agreement*. Quite true. It's always nice to go to events and put faces to the names on IRC.

Gumby: Q: You have been a big influence on Starfleet in the past four years. What do you feel is your greatest contribution to the Fleet?



Mike: It always has been a team effort. I don't count myself any higher than anyone else, and to be honest, there are people in the organization who've had a much greater impact that I personally had. I'm just glad that the team I was able to put together worked so well. I guess it really comes down to that... the fact that I was able to put together a great team of people.

Gumby: Q: Some of those people are going on to serve in the next administration... How do you feel about that?

Mike: I think it's a great thing. We have proven, capable leaders who will continue to do honest work for the members of STARFLEET. The voters set forth a mandate during the past election, and I'm glad to see that many of the people I've brought on board will continue to serve our members.

Gumby: Q: Over 40% voter turnout this election, which is a record turnout. What do you think attributed to the high number of returns?

Mike: During my trips across STARFLEET this year and in all my CQ articles, I always made it a point to remind the members to vote in the election. I'd like to think that my words had some effect in that regard.

Gumby: Q: Mike, what was your most memorable experience as Fleet Admiral?

Mike: Getting the word that we had cleared the issues with the IRS.

Gumby: Now that was a pack-a-lunch project!

Mike: Yes, it was. Chuck Freas was a Godsend for the organization. If it weren't for him, I'm not sure STARFLEET would have been around to see its 25th birthday.

Gumby: Indeed! Chuck was a big part of that project... we should say "Thanks, Chuck!"

Mike: We did earlier this year by awarding Chuck a three-year Honorary Membership. It's not much for all his work and effort, but it's the least we could do for him

Gumby: Only three? He almost single-handedly saved us... from the IRS!

Gumby: Q: Will you continue to actively serve Starfleet, or is this a full retirement?

Mike: I currently serve the STARFLEET Marine Corps as Commanding Officer, Forces Command, and I'll be taking on some role or another with the San

STARFLEET ACADEMY ONLINE: ONLINE VOUCHERS (OLV) — QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

By Commodore Carol Thompson • Online Voucher Coordinator

Question: Red paper Vouchers. Online Voucher Codes. What's the difference?

Answer: Starfleet's red paper vouchers have been around for a long time. The advantage is that vouchers can be used as currency for anything Starfleet charges for, including Academy classes.

Starfleet Academy's Online Voucher Codes are used ONLY for Online Academy Classes. The advantage is that if you need to take your OTS right away, you can have your diploma or confirmation letter in a day or two.

Question: How do the Voucher Codes work?

Answer: When a class is taken

completely online, a student will register online, type in a Voucher Code, read the material, and take the test online. The student will be e-mailed a diploma or a confirmation letter (like the SFMC Academy sends.)

Question: How do I get Voucher Codes?

Answer: Online Voucher Codes are purchased from the Online Voucher Contact (OLVC). The postal address of the OLVC appears on the first page of the Online Academy website. Voucher Codes cost \$1 or one red voucher each. Once payment is received, the OLVC will e-mail the codes to the purchaser.

Since most courses only require one code, it may seem uneconomical to spend one stamp and one check or money order to order one code to take

one class. However, codes may be purchased in quantity by a Starfleet Vessel through a designated Officer and sold to crewmembers. Ambitious crewmembers may also buy several codes at once for their future classes.

Question: When will more classes be offered at the Online Campus?

Answer: The Online Academy is still being developed. Tests from the regular campus of Starfleet Academy need to be adapted for online use. This will take time. Check the website once in a while for newly-posted classes.

Question: Where is the website?

Answer: Go to http://www.sfi-sfa.com/sfi-sfa and follow the link to the Online Academy.



During my time with Starfleet I have served aboard a few ships in various capacities from Security to Executive Officer. I currently serve aboard the USS Cherokee. I am XO, cook, publisher of the newsletter (The Medicine Shield) and I do our MSRs.

My personal life is no less interesting. I am in prison, have been since May 30, 1982, and I will be home no later than May 30, 2002. I am sure this will raise several eyebrows, and even more questions which I will gladly answer. But don't let this news stop you from taking our course and having some fun. I am qualified to offer it.

I have completed a 6,000 hour Cook's Apprenticeship and received my certificate in January. Through Luzerne County Community College I have enrolled in the Culinary Arts Program with a high grade point average. One class, Applied Foodservice Sanitation & Safety, offered a National Certification exam. I answered 79 out of 80 correctly.

I am also taking, by correspondence, a course in Hotel & Restaurant management. While in the kitchen I was also invited, time and again, to "cater" the meals for our Jewish congregation. As a result of that, because of my love for this work, one man's father offered me my own business once I am home (in return I would cater for his synagogue). And so I have tried to bring a little bit of all this to B.U.R.P.S. Future courses will reflect this same love and devotion as well.

issue a Certificate, if you've passed.

5. Anita will mail the Certificate of Completion to you.

NOTE: If you are in prison, please make that clear to Admiral Davis as she will be the one grading your papers. I know that I am not the only inmate in Starfleet. Under Pennsylvania Department of Corrections policy, I cannot have contact with other inmates.

VESSEL READINESS CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

The US Navy requires that all its ships pass certification tests before the ships are deemed sea worthy and battle ready. This led to an idea radically different from the usual Starfleet Academy course. There are no tests, no manuals, and no tuition beyond 2 first-class stamps. Instead of each crewmember taking classes for his or her own benefit, the crewmembers of a Starfleet Vessel pool together all of their diplomas to meet certain certification requirements.

The purpose of the VRCP is to encourage crew members to take Starfleet Academy classes for the good of their ships. All the diplomas earned by a crew are collected by a Starfleet Vessel's Certification Officer and submitted to certify departments on a ship. Once all a Vessel's departments are certified,

the Vessel receives a Vessel Readiness Certificate, stating that the vessel is spaceworthy.

Starfleet Vessels of all kinds are encouraged to enter the program: Starships, Outposts, Stations, Shuttles, Pre-shuttles, Relay Stations, Garbage Scows, Love Boats, and Life Pods, to name a few.

Participation in the program is VOLUNTARY, FREE, and FUN! Starfleet International does NOT require any of its vessels to be certified.

The VRCP has greatly expanded the lists of diplomas for each department. Hopefully this will make it easier for vessels to earn their certificates. As new Academy Classes are offered, the VRCP will be updated to reflect those additions.

A little more than three years ago, the members of USS Athena became aware of the plight of a small child in their area and determined to do all they could to help him and his family. A small group of friends from USS Athena, USS Highlander, and USS Dauntless pooled their creative talents to create a fundraising mechanism. In October 1997, the world was first exposed to the "wonderful madness" known as The Dominion.

Since that time, the local community's support for Julien Fleming and his family has dwindled. For the past two years, the primary source of donations for Julien's care

has been Science Fiction fans. The fundraising efforts have taken such diverse forms as The Dominion's celebrity kidnappings (Lisa Berkenbilt, Michael D. 

COMMANDER, STARFLEET

EDWIN LESLIE "LES" RICKARD, JR.

Gumby: Congratulations on winning the election, Les!

Les: Thanks Gumby. I am happy to get the opportunity to serve STARFLEET Gumby: We are lucky to have you as our next vict... er, Fleet Admiral.

Gumby: Q: Now that you know that your administration assumes office on 01 Jan 2001, what steps are you taking to assure a smooth transition and transfer of records?

Les: We are putting together a transition plan as we speak. One of the things I would like to do is mail a letter to all RC's with the transition plan so that they can inform their respective CO's. This would include information on the changes of address for the "mission critical" areas such as Membership Services, Operations (for MSR's) and other similar areas. Internally, we are developing a communication system that will be our standard for the next two years for all of the Fleet Staff.

Gumby: Q: What will be your first official act as Commander: STARFLEET?

Les: I haven't given that much thought really.

Gumby: Just having won... I can understand that!:)

Gumby: Q: Have you appointed a cabinet? If so, who?

Les: Admiral Tom Monaghan will be my Chief of Staff... SFI Treasurer will be Fleet Captain Tammy Willcox and I am hoping the AB will nominate and appoint Howard Cronson as Internal Auditor.

Gumby: Tom and Tammy bring a lot of experience to the table. We are lucky to have them serve!

Gumby: Q: What will be your first goal upon taking office?

Les: STARFLEET has moved forward in so many areas over the last four years. My first duty as Commander, STARFLEET will be to nominate, and hopefully, install a new Inspector General, STARFLEET. Danny Potts has done an outstanding job as IG, and he will be sorely missed. But my first and foremost goal is to, with the help of Howard, Tammy and the other members of the EC, found a firm financial accountability procedure that Fleet can use even after we are long gone from the Executive Committee. **Gumby:** That is definitely a step in the right direction.

Les: I do not fault the past but know that we must improve in the future. There is always room for improvement.

Gumby: Q: Voter turnout was over 40% this year... up from previous returns. How do you feel about that? Les: I was very pleased to see the turnout. I think that that was because we had two very good teams putting out two excellent platforms. People were fired up and really wanting to be a part of this process because of that I think. If we can maintain the same level of professionalism in the coming elections I think we will see that number increase.

Gumby: That's Great!

Gumby: Q: What do you feel is STARFLEET's greatest area of improvement? What steps will you take to improve it?

Les: Working together. There are often times when we don't seem to be as much working together as working against one another. The EC and AB need to work as a team, in tandem, to solve Fleet's issues. I want to include the people, that is the members in this, and the only way to do that is work with the representatives they elected.

How do we do this? I am not quite sure. But the first step is opening communication and keeping it open. Discussing the issues not arguing them.

Gumby: Q: As you know... every one of the proposed amendments passed. What are your thoughts on this?

Les: I would like to look at each of these closer and talk to not only the EC but the AB about any thoughts they have on enacting them. If there are problems then we certainly want to make the appropriate changes.

Gumby: Q: Now that we know what kind of 'fleetie you are, can you tell us a bit about your mundane life? I understand you were involved in a *big* event in September.

Les: Yes, I certainly was! On September 23rd 2000 I was married to another member of STARFLEET, Deidre "Dee" Smith. Dee and I live in a subdivision just outside Winston-Salem, North Carolina. We don't live alone - we share our home with two furry little ones, Chewy and Sunny. Chewy is a three year old German Shepherd which I raised from birth. Sunny is an 11 year old Cocker Spaniel that has been a part of Dee's life since high school - and the two little ones will have to share their spotlight with another little one in the coming year. Dee and I recently discovered that we will be parents in late June 2001!

As for the rest of my "mundane" life, I am a Police Officer by profession and have been since December of 1991. I have served the Thomasville Police Department in varying capacities over these nine years and enjoy the challenge each and every day.

Gumby: Q: How do you think your job as a police officer will help you in

your position as CS?

Well, as I have said to many before, in my department we operate as a Community Policing Agency (COP). This concept is not a new one, having been developed, in part, by the Metropolitan Police in London, England many years ago. The core of COP is the interaction of the police with the public...getting out of their cars and talking to the people. We learn what their problems are and work with them to solve them - not just respond when there is a symptom or result of a problem. It is being proactive instead of reactive.

I have a similar concept about this as CS. Getting out there and being available to each member whether they are enlisted, Officer, EC or AB. Asking people what they think works and doesn't and how they feel it can change for the better. Working with them to solve the problems, pointing to the people that can help if I can not. Realizing that we don't always have to wait for a problem to surface is the first step.

Gumby: Q: Finally... Is there anything you'd like to say to the Fleet?

Les: I am still somewhat speechless. But I think that if I had anything to say it would be thank you to everyone who voted.... for me or for Robert. The most important thing is to have your voice heard. Now that the election is over we will get on with the business of running fleet and my door is always open to questions or chat!

Gumby: Les, thank you for taking the time for this interview! I look forward to working with you... and I know many of the readers of this interview will look forward to that too!

Les: Thank you and thanks to the readers!

VICE COMMANDER, STARFLEET

GORDON GOLDBERG

Gumby: Q: Another term on the EC, Gordon... 2 more years to your sentence! Congrats and may the gods have mercy on your soul!

Gordon: *laugh* Thanks, Gumby... I guess I'm just a glutton for punishment...

Gumby: Q: Just what exactly is it that a Vice Commander-STARFLEET does anyway?

Gordon: Well, in addition to assisting the Commander, STARFLEET in running the organization, and waiting to step in if the CS is incapacitated, the VCS is also responsible for overseeing the Fleet Division Chief program, the various STARFLEET charities programs, and now the Diplomatic Corps as well... and is constitutionally charged with production and revision of the Membership Handbook. One of my major projects will be improving the flow of communications and cooperation between the various Executive Committee departments. In addition, with Les as CS, we'll be implementing a double-signature control on the STARFLEET checking account, and I'll be one of the three people (Les and Tammy Wilcox, our Treasurer, are the other two) out of the two signatures.

Gumby: Q: That sounds like a full plate Gordon. Any new programs under development? Gordon: New programs? Not specifically under the office of the VCS, although I'll be involved with much of the changes we'll be making in how fleet does business in general. We'll also be continuing to work on revamping the FDC program to make it more user-friendly, and more of a resource center

for chapters and members in general.

Gumby: Q: Can you tell us more about the FDC revamping?

Gordon: Sure! Basically, the direction we want to go with the FDC program is, as I said, to make it more of an information-sharing, resourcecentered program, and less of a "command structure" element. One of the problems we've had with the FDC program is resistance from various Regional Coordinators to what they see as an intrusion into their regional reporting and command structure

Gumby: Q: This would prevent the thinking that RDC's "fall under" FDC's, then?

Gordon: yes, exactly... in that there is a perceived overlap between the FDC programs and the RDC programs in those regions that have bothered to maintain RDC programs

Gumby: I, for one, am glad that a clarification will be made. I have always seen FDC:ShOC as a resource and assistance program and have operated it as such.

Gordon: Right - that's exactly how it should be... and we're seeing a move in that direction in the various other FDC programs, but that's the way we want them all to eventually be run. While some regions may want to appoint the VFDC designated to serve that region to also serve as the RDC, it's not a necessary thing

Gumby: Q: As you know... every one of the proposed amendments passed. What are your thoughts on this?

Gordon: *laugh* well, my

immediate reaction is "Oh, God"

Gumby: I love that response!

Gordon: As you probably know, there were three out of the seven amendments that I actively spoke out against, as did former VCS Chuck Freas, in fact, most of the people who helped to draft those amendments ended up voting against those three as well. Unfortunately, they passed, and we'll have to live with them -- at least until STARFLEET decides to amend them further to fix the problems we found with them.

Gumby: Q: Is there any aspect of STARFLEET that you'd like to see changed?

Gordon: In the corporate sense? I think we're moving in the right direction, professionally. Things have improved a lot in the last four years, and I see some great advancements planned for the next two. So I'm fairly happy with the direction we're moving in. On the personal side, I'd like to see us, as a whole, be a little more understanding and appreciative of the work done by the volunteers in our organization.

The best example I can point to is our loss of Teri Smith who decided to step down from membership processing because of burnout. Burnout is a really big problem in many volunteer organizations, but especially in STARFLEET, and most especially in the area of membership processing -- not just because of the workload, but because it's essentially a thankless job. Membership processing spends hours and hours getting the membership packages out, and rarely gets any

"thank-yous" -- just complaint after complaint from people who didn't get their packages "fast enough" or whose packages never got to them because of bad mailing addresses and such.

Gumby: Then I think we should take a moment to thank Teri here in this forum for all her efforts!

Gordon: Definitely - we can't thank Teri enough - thank you thank you, Teri, for all of your hard work!!!

Gumby:

Thankyouthankyouthankyou!!!! :)

Gordon: and while we're at it, I'd also like the say thanks to the CQ publishing team and the web production folks in Communications, who also get more complaints than kudos, even though the kudos are extremely well-deserved

Gumby: Q: Where do you see Starfleet a year from now?

Gordon: A year from now? I see us operating well in the black, financially, with regular financial reporting, thanks to the system Les, Tammy, and others have put in place. I see the Executive Committee working even more closely with the Admiralty Board than it has been in the past, and I see us doing more outreach to expand the international regions. I see improvements in membership services, and improvements in the membership packages themselves.

Gumby: Q: Finally: Is there anything you'd like to say to the Fleet?

Gordon: Yeah -- thanks, folks! I look forward to serving you for two more years - now let's get back to work!



CHIEF OF OPERATIONS

Gumby: Congratulations on the election, vato! You da' OpsMan!!! MarkV: Thanks!

Gumby: Q: What will be your first official act as Chief of Operations?

MarkV: Well I guess my first action will be to deal with email MSR's and mailed in MSR's. Most people write their MSR's like the Chief of Ops is reading them. They expect him to help. I want to bring that back.

Gumby: Aside commissioning chapters and tracking MSR's, what other duties do you have as Chief of Operations?

MarkV: My department oversees the Correspondence Chapter Operations Department, The EFCP, and the Armed Services program. Right now I have good directors in those positions and I plan to rely on them more since they have their fingers on the pulse of those types of chapters.

Gumby: Q: Is there any aspect of Ops that you'd like to see changed?

MarkV: Well, that is a good question. Ops is already undergoing some changes. With Alex Rosenzweig being ShOC we will be transferring DTS/ OTI/ASDB and EFCP to ShOC. That way it will be one stop shopping so to speak for all new chapters.

Gumby: Q: Have you appointed a staff? If so, who?

MarkV: My new Vice Chief and I will handle all MSR's. People expect the Chief of Ops to read their MSR and I agree.

Gumby: We have the same attitude over in ShOC!

Gumby: Q: Have you appointed a staff? If so, who?

MarkV: At this time I am working on my staff. Tom Monaghan will be moving up with Les so I have to decide if I will replace him. Matt Myers is also standing down and since I will not have DVC's I am working on the best candidate for my Vice Chief. I am trying to get recommitments from Barbara Paul and David McCabe but I am having problems getting in touch with them. Michelle Fanelli is returning, Peter Lutz is returning. I hope Mike Urvand will stay and continue to do MSR summaries but I have yet to hear from him.

Gumby: Q: What do you see as Ops' greatest area of improvement? What steps will you take to improve it?

MarkV: I want to basically do what Mandi Livingston has been saying. We need to be more customer service oriented. I want to make sure that all chapters know we are here to serve them and not the other way around. If they have a problem them I want to help.

Gumby: Excellent!

Gumby: Q: Where do you see Operations a year from now?

MarkV: In the next year I want to see Ops working closer with CompOps when it comes to rosters. We need to make sure that all CO's know for sure who SFI says they have on their chapters vs. whom they think they have on their chapters. Since we get MSR's and I want all chapters to start putting their SFI rosters on the MSR's we can help straighten out any problems and make sure that those who want to be assigned are assigned

to the right chapters. I need to work with Mark Anbinder on this but we have a CompOps Liason and I want to put him to work. We get MSRs and they don't... so they do not always know what changes need to be made in ranks, assignments, and positions. I forgot to mention that we have the Chapter Assistance Program. This is a service to those chapters who are struggling for whatever reason to keep 10 members. Peter Lutz is coming back and he and I have already been talking about what he wants the program to

MARK VINSON

Gumby: Q: What about Joe Blow **Stuffed Animal Crewmember?**

MarkV: Yes, that is something that I want to look in to.

Gumby: Q: Finally... Is there anything you'd like to say to the Fleet?

MarkV: THANKS!!!!!! I will work to make sure your votes were not misplaced. I want to continue the work started by Tom Monaghan and Les Rickard while introducing some background stuff that will help all of SFI's records be more correct.

CHIEF OF COMMUNICATIONS

MICHAEL MALOTTE

Gumby: Congratulations Mike! Now that you will be the next Chief of Communications, what's next?

Mike: Thanks for the kudos, Gumby! First order of business will be keeping things running as they have been, for the most part. For the first time in years, the CQ is coming out on time and most folks are getting it... I plan to maintain that. On the horizon, though, is one of the most exciting things to come around in a long long time... it is the STARFLEET Helpdesk.

Gumby: I certainly have had no problems getting my CQ!

Mike: Great! We love to hear that!

Gumby: Q: What will be your first official act as Chief of Communications?

Mike: Probably the unveiling of the STARFLEET Helpdesk - Greg Trotter, my Senior Vice-Chief of Communications, will be overseeing this. It will be a complete change in how problems experienced by members will be handled.

Gumby: Q: You mention the STARFLEET Helpdesk... would you explain to the readers briefly what the helpdesk is?

Mike: in a nutshell, there will be a webpage interface - email will be used as well. When the member experiences a problem, they contact the help desk. Once a complaint is received, the member is, within minutes, sent a reply from the helpdesk with a queue number. This shows that the problem has been received and logged... from there; it will be assigned to an individual who "owns" this issue until resolution is found. All processes concerning the issue are logged within the program for historical and future reference. This process will span all factions of the EC and be a way for all departments to work together better than ever before!

Gumby: That is an outstanding idea! Mike: We think so - Greg and I have been playing with the software and it's quite unbelievable what all it can

Gumby: Q: Communications is more than just the CQ and the Helpdesk... Can you tell us some of your other duties as Chief?

Mike: First and foremost, will be to assure that the CQ is done on time, every time... second will be to assure each member gets one... from there, it's overseeing the various departments under my office and assure they

work smoothly. I'm a real "hands on" type of guy - not to the point of micromanaging but I will know what's going on

Mike: Yes and no - the original response will be automated - the concerned member will get an email back saying the issue was received - from that point, it is handled by a member in charge of that particular issue and it is this live person who will work the issue through to resolution. Mike: Greg has been working on it for over 18 months himself and we have been in contact together about this for the last few months

Gumby: Awesome!

Gumby: Q: What do you feel is the CQ's greatest area of improvement? What steps will you take to improve it?

Mike: Timely information - it's also the hardest thing to do. While I have no concrete plans for improving the timeliness of the info, it is a subject of discussion - as we come up with ways to do it, fleet will be the first to know.

Gumby: Q: Have you appointed CQ Staff members? If so, who?

Mike: Communications Staff is as follows: Senior Vice-Chief - Greg Trotter - also oversees the helpdesk; CQ Editor - Kurt Roithinger; Assistant CQ Editor - Dave Pipgras; CQ Summaries -Mike Urvand; Historical Editor - Scott Akers; Chris Wallace - Stellar Visions; Wendy Fillmore will oversee all of it and I think is an excellent choice as she has done both the Stellar Visions and the CQ; Ed Nowlin will stay on as Vice Chief of Electronic Services; Mike Dugas remains as online director; John Adcock will be taking on the STARFLEET News Service and has great plans for revamping it; Joe Brouhard stays on as Head of Electronic Gaming; Mike Wilkerson will be the new Webmaster assisted by Don Willits... that pretty well covers it at the moment - there will be a few more here and there but most of the staff is in place.

Gumby: Wow! Now that's a staff! Gumby: Q: Are there any planned changes to the SFI Website?

Mike: Not too many - a design change probably but the content will be as good as it is now.

Gumby: Q: What do you feel is the CQ's greatest strength?

Mike: No problem Gumby - it's been a pleasure I certainly hope so - there's nothing worse than a position without responsibility!

CHIEF OF SHUTTLE OPERATIONS

ALEX ROSENZWEIG



Gumby: Q: Congratulations on the election, Alex!

Alex: Thanks! It's pretty exciting, isn't

Gumby: Yes, in fact, it is a thrill for me because I get to work with you in ShOC!

Alex: I'm very much looking forward to working together again. We almost got to be on the ShOC staff together once before, of course, but it got a bit short-circuited, as you'll recall.

Gumby: Yes that was Jennifer French, Chief of ShOC back in '94. I was her Vice ShOC then.

Alex: Yup.

Gumby: Q: Now that you know that you are inheriting ShOC for the next two years, what will be your first goal upon taking office in January?

Alex: Now, my first goal will be to make sure that we have a smoothly-running operation, and take a good look at what we can do to make it even better.

Gumby: Q: What will be your first official act as Chief of Shuttle Operations?

Alex: To declare the transition complete and the relocated office to be open for business. That includes announcing the staff as it is at that moment and letting the 'Fleet know we are here to serve them.

Gumby: Q: You have a long history

with the Department of Technical Services, which is responsible for approving ship classes and NCC numbers; Now that you are Chief of ShOC, what will happen to DTS?

Alex: I will be continuing to serve as DTS Director. I need to sit down with new Ops Chief Mark Vinson and decide officially whether DTS will stay as part of Ops or move to ShOC. In practice, whichever way we do it, it will speed the process of serving the 'Fleet, because more of the early groundwork for a group will be able to be done faster. Seriously, one of my conditions to Les of accepting the ShOC slot was that I also be allowed to keep DTS.

Gumby: Q: So, in effect, if DTS is given to ShOC, you will be able to approve shuttles even quicker?

Alex: Potentially, because I'll already have their name approval on file, although they will still need to include the correct paperwork. The big thing is that I become aware of a potential group from the moment they apply to reserve a name, sometimes well before they're actually ready to go to shuttle status. By having both parts of the process covered, I'll know about potential groups from the very start.

Gumby: Q: What do you feel is ShOC's greatest area of improvement? What will you do to improve it?

Alex: ShOC must improve its communications, with the rest of the EC, with the regions, and with the Fleet. I intend to work to build networks of communications on all those levels, so we can be more able to grow the Fleet in a positive and successful way.

Gumby: Q: Have you appointed Staff members? If so, who?

Alex: Our Vice Chief of ShOC will be Johnathan "Gumby" Simmons, who has a very long and distinguished history of service with ShOC, and whom I'm very pleased to be working with. Our Staff Assistant and Webmaster is Biff Bassett, who has also done some remarkable work in his time with ShOC. We may be adding more persons, as the need arises, but these gentlemen and I will be the ones to get things started. I should note that Denine Sanders chose to retire at the end of the Smith Administration, and her work should not go unappreciated. Thanks, Denine, for all you did.

Gumby: I am sorry to hear she is retiring because Denine was the BIG help in redoing the START manual! She put in countless hours in on that project alone... and still found time to do other stuff! The START manual and the ShOC program are better now, because of her! Thanks, Denine... for EVERYTHING!

Gumby: Q: Is there any aspect

of ShOC that you'd like to see changed?

Alex: The main aspect of ShOC that I see in need of change is its communication. I want to make ShOC more responsive, and more able to provide information that other parts of the Fleet might need. I also want to improve the idea that ShOC is a critical part of a team, with the regions and chapters of the Fleet, too, because in truth, the process of chapter building is a team effort.

Gumby: Q: What do you feel is ShOC's greatest strength?

Alex: Simply put, its ability to help people and make a difference. ShOC can help new chapters grow. Dennis put it really well a while back, saying, "I launch shuttles." and then following with a litany of the good things that could come out of that. Those are still the words to live by.

Gumby: Q: How do you feel about the EFCP (Existing Fan Club Program) ? Should it become a part of ShOC instead of Operations?

Alex: I think EFCP itself is a wonderful idea, because bringing groups that already exist into Starfleet poses a unique set of challenges that the regular shuttle program doesn't handle ideally. In fact, considering that EFCP is part of the process of bringing chapters into Starfleet, Mark Vinson and I have

agreed that it will be moved into ShOC, pretty much bringing all the chapter-development functions under one roof, as it were.

Gumby: Q: What are your thoughts on the "30 mile guideline"?

Alex: In general, I believe in it. Now, it's never totally cut-and-dried, of course. Some areas clearly have the population to support multiple chapters close by, and sometimes groups can cover a market better by creating several specialized chapters instead of one generalized one. But if the "50 Km

Guideline" (as I like to call it) is to be waived, I think it should be done in a coordinated way, with the RC and existing area chapters involved and supportive, as much as possible.

Gumby: Q: What will be your policy on "Accelerated Shuttle Launch"?

Alex: That's something that will have to be looked at in some detail before we can reactivate it. A set of clear criteria for how to qualify will have to be worked out before the program can be put back into operation. It's not going to be on the first tier of things to

be done, to be honest, because I want to make sure we have the existing ShOC apparatus humming smoothly before I start playing with things like that.

Gumby: Q: Where do you see ShOC a year from now?

Alex: If all goes well, I'd like to see ShOC operating as a smooth, efficient program for helping new groups form and grow into being Starfleet chapters. I'd like people to look at ShOC and say; "They really made a difference for us." That would make me very proud. Note that I said, "They." Let's not forget that

the ShOC staff is a team, too. We will get things done as a team, too, and that will be our strength.

Gumby: Q: Finally... Is there anything you'd like to say to the Fleet?

Alex: Really, just that I and the ShOC staff are really looking forward to serving the Fleet, and hoping that we can be worthy of the trust and faith that Les has placed in us, and that the membership places in us, to make one of the most important programs to Starfleet's future a success.



CHIEF OF COMPUTER OPERATIONS

Gumby: Mark... Congratulations on the election!

Mark: Well, thank you! We're very pleased at how forcefully the Fleet announced they want our group to serve.

Gumby: This is true... Fleet had over 40% voter turnout this year. What do you think about that?

Mark: I thought the turnout was remarkable. Such large, spread-out groups rarely vote in such large numbers, even when the outcome of the election is so important to the group. Just look at the US presidential election. Hmmm, on second thought, don't.

Gumby: Q: Now that you know that you are inheriting CompOps for the next two years, what will be your first goal?

Mark: My first goal, and my biggest challenge, is to fill the role of Membership Processing coordinator. Someone has to take over a job that Teri Smith has revolutionized over the last two years. It's a difficult job that requires pretty constant attention, and we know from past experience that the Fleet won't tolerate shabby performance. I'm lucky in that I've been a part of CompOps for the last two and a half years, and Chief since May, so I have a head start on knowing what needs doing. So, while we need to find someone to take over for Teri, everything else should continue to run fairly smoothly.

Gumby: Teri leaves BIG shoes to fill.

Gumby: Q: Membership services and processing are a big part of STARFLEET. What changes, if any, will you make? Mark: We've spent the last year improving the performance the members see when they deal with us from a membership services standpoint. Keeping up processing new memberships and renewals, and getting the packets out, is key. But also, being responsive to inquiries and fixing problems is important. The biggest improvement I'm looking for is in the area of getting people their Communiqués, which is our responsibility from a logistical sense. We manage the mailing list data that the mailing house uses to send the newsletters out. We've managed to fix the problems for a LOT of people, but there are still people who don't get their newsletters, and I'm not going to be satisfied until everyone's getting what they're entitled to.

Gumby: I have had very good service from CompOps... All my ship too, come to think of it!

Mark: I'm delighted to hear it. I know not everyone has had the same flawless service and smooth experience, but we do our best.

Gumby: Q: Will the vanity email addresses still be available in the next administration?

Mark: Yes, I think STARFLEET's Internet presence is very strong, and the sfi.org domain name is a big plus we have. I hope to do a little more proactive work to get more people taking advantage of the fact that EVERYONE can have an sfi.org address if they want it.

Gumby: Q: Is there any aspect of CompOps that you'd like to see changed?

Mark: Sirloins and martinis in the CompOps staff lounge!

Gumby: A man after my own heart

Gumby: Q: Expansion of the website into Member/Non-Member areas was a topic of much discussion during the campaign. Any plans on this?

Mark: We've already got the needed mechanisms to have such things as members-only availability of a brandnew CQ issue. I think that's not unreasonable. I'd be reluctant to do TOO much segregating of material, considering we feel the web site is a HUGE recruiting tool.

Gumby: Q: Any new programs in the works?

Mark: Not yet. We want to improve the ways in which we remind people to renew. So... improvements in several areas... nothing new until I'm satisfied with what we've got.

Gumby: Q: How about a different color mailing label on the CQ they get before their membership expires?

Mark: We have very little control over the mechanics of the mailing labels. We give them a database and they get printed out at the mailing house. I like the idea of coming up with a better way of flagging those labels, though. Thanks.

Gumby: Q: CompOps is more than just Website and Labels... What other things do you do?

Mark: Well, the web site is only a small part of the Internet presence. The e-mail, mailing lists, FTP archive, and even web redirects for regions and chapters are a big part, too. The web site is not just a promotional and reference tool, but a path to accessing the member database for COs, XOs, and RCs. Rosters, and such.

Gumby: Note to readers... check out http://www.sfi.org/compops/ for info on all the neat stuff they do...

Gumby: Q: Where do you see CompOps a year from now?

Mark: Tahiti. Oh, I mean... I think we'll be doing mostly the same things, though a little bit better in most areas. There are other areas I'd like to explore down the road; we'll see how the first several months go. Replacing Teri means we have to start over on a few things, so I'm reluctant to push too hard on new stuff.

Gumby: Q: What staff members do you have?

Mark: Michael Dugas and Lisa Fogelman are going to seem like the veterans... even though they both took their jobs this summer, as Rosters and Web Developer, respectively. Brett Morrow is going to help out with the Internet Presence infrastructure work, taking over for Greg Trotter, who's found himself a new role with some new challenges in Communications. I should add that Mike and Lisa are BOTH replacing ONE guy... Blair Learn. He built a lot of the web resources we have now, such as the member lookup and rosters stuff. Now that the election is over, we're diving into the membership processing staff question.

Gumby: Q: Finally... Is there anything you'd like to say to the Fleet?

Mark: As I've been saying the last several months, please help us out by renewing in a timely manner and keeping your address current, and PLEASE let us know when you perceive a problem, so we can fix it rather than letting it stew.



FIRST ANNUAL WILDERNESS CHALLENGE

On September 30 - October 1 weekend a small group of STARFLEET Marines set out on the First Annual Wilderness Challenge. WC2K was a two day event of hiking and camping in the mountains of Tennessee and North Carolina and took place in the Great Smoky Mountain National Park.

Originally it started as two experienced hikers, who happen to be railroad buffs, taking a hike along the old railroad beds of the Little River Lumber Co. The LRLC logged the Mountains, of what now is the northwest section of the GSMNP, back in the 20's and 30's. The decision was then made to turn it into a Marine event and we invited any STARFLEET Marines and STARFLEET members to attend.

Early in the year I started collection of all the maps and literature I could on the Park so we could choose the trails we wanted to take and to get our backcountry permits arranged for. This was a task that proved to be more difficult than expected, since we wanted to stay on unique trails as much as possible without having to back track.

Once the trails were decided on and it began to look like a reality we started looking for a name to call our event. We finally decided on Wilderness Challenge and put if before, then Commandant, Brian Davis for permission to call it an SFMC event, which he approved. It was set up as Les Rickard as the leader and I as the navigator (since I was so familiar with the topography of the Park at this point).

At one time we had as many as 25 people planning on attending. At the end it was considerably less due to emergencies, work, and previous commitments. Four people ended up attending. They were Larry Morris and Ed Lamb of the 78th Marine Strike Group aboard the USS Khai Tam, and DJ Allen and Myself, Wade Olson, from the 674th Marine Strike Group aboard the USS Relentless.

I had planned it as an adventure to span spectacular mountain views, deep forest and wildlife experiences and wonderful views of mountain streams and rivers. It was all of that and more. Whenever we would stand in awe of the beauty and say, "It doesn't get any better than this," it got better.

In respect to the weather it couldn't have been closer to perfect than it turned out. The mornings were crisp and clear with temperatures in the forties with a high of upper sixties during the day. The skies were crystal clear and the sun in abundance (except in the deep woods). We were extremely pleased that the weekend turned out as beautifully as it did.

In respect to the trails the first day couldn't

have been farther from perfect than it turned out. The Appalachian Trail is not like any other trail I've hiked in the whole Park. I had hiked several trails calculating how fast full day of this we were all exhausted and wondering if we would make it out of the Park the next day. Even though our next days trip would be shortened by two miles

hikers could travel over various terrains to get the most accurate plan I could. But the Appalachian Trail proved to be the exception to any rule. The AT follows the mountain tops for the entire seven miles we were on it. Steep inclines and down grades proved to be most strenuous when carrying a 45 pound pack. And in most places the trail is only six inches wide and worn five inches into the ground, making it hard to place one foot in front of the other. After a

due to the fact that we didn't make our designated campsite for the night, forcing us to camp where we weren't supposed to, we still had twelve miles to hike.

We set up camp as the sun disappeared behind the mountains, completing most of our setup in the dark. Then we had to break out the MREs and warm them up. We were so exhausted we found we didn't have the strength to prepare the whole meal and settled with the entrees and hit the sack. I slept pretty soundly until I heard the bear scrounging around our camp. He sounded pretty angry so I grabbed my flashlight just in case I needed to conk him on the nose, and look out of my tent. Even with the little light from the moon filtering through the trees I couldn't see him. But he sounded like he was really close to Larry's tent. I thought, "Oh My God! He ate Larry! You Ba....Oh, that IS Larry. Never Mind," and slept the rest of the night knowing no bear would come anywhere near us with that noise going on.

The second day we started out to find we only had seven minutes of hiking left before we left the Appalachian Trail and started north. This trail was considerably better than the AT except that part of it hadn't been traveled in quite some time. Someone had been through recently and chopped the weeds and bushes that had overgrown the trail and left the clippings to hide the obstacles underneath. This was the cause of a badly sprained ankle by of the hikers. Shortly after that the trail turned into the railroad beds that Les Rickard and I had originally planned to hike. If it hadn't been for the sprained ankle and the fact that we were all sore from the day before we would now have had the ideal hiking conditions; wide trail, steady downgrade and wonderful scenery along the rivers. This really aided us in finishing the twelve miles we had that day and we ended the hike about 30 minutes before sundown.

The experiences were priceless. Trudging through the woods as the sun is disappearing, knowing your camp is still three hours away. Having to scout a new camp in the rough because it's too dangerous to continue hiking in the dark. Knowing you couldn't make it back to civilization for food or shelter even if your life depended on it. Standing on a rock ledge looking down four thousand feet to the valley below. Wondering if you're going to run into a bear that you know is near by because of the large piles of fresh bear dung you've seen. Walking along a narrow trail on the very edge of the mountain hoping you don't trip and fall several thousand feet. Scaring up wild turkeys, skunks, and other small animals along the way. The teamwork that is necessary to travel nine miles through the wilderness with an injured person. Eating MREs (meals ready to eat, or more commonly know as "Meals Rejected by the Enemy"). This truly was the experience of a lifetime.

Despite the difficulties we encountered all in all the trip was very enjoyable. We all felt it was well worth the effort and don't regret it a bit. And we're all looking forward to next years Challenge.



Personal Log: Stardate 490010.28. I have heard a lot of reports about the various attractions available at Starbase Nevada, but to be honest, I was not ready for the sensory overload. There were tons of attractions, both natural and man made, to keep one occupied for months. In fact, there was enough

Admirals Dyar and Roithinger prepared for the events that they would be hosting, while Admiral Wallace, Captain Willits of the USS Jaguar (who arrived just after we did), and myself made plans to see some of the local interests and historic

sites

Of course, Starfleet took the priority (after all that was the reason we were there). We started with breakfast at the local eatery, and attended one of the two primary conference events. It was here that we touched upon the goals of the conference, and introduced ourselves to other members of the fleet - many of whom we have known for a long time only by name or via subspace communications.

Fleet Admiral Smith arrived, as well as Admiral Goldberg, the Vice-Commander, Starfleet. At the conference, after some of the typical meeting business, Admiral Smith took the stage and laid out his plans for the continuation of several Starfleet programs, as well as asking the various commanding officers to assist him in making the transition to the new Commander, Starfleet as smoothly as possible. I found that both of these officers were very friendly, and I can say it was a pleasure to finally meet "the boss" in person.

After the morning's events, Admiral Wallace, Captain Willits and I then took a private transport to take us on a tour to the various locations in the

Our first stop (after getting lost for a few minutes -- hey, we did not have a navigator, just Command Staff) we made it to the historic Hoover Dam located on the Colorado River. And just as it was described in a Starfleet Historic documentary, it was a sight to see

The dam was (and frankly is) an engineering masterpiece to rival that of any starship so far. It was started in the very early 20th century as a way to keep the river from flooding into settlements of that time. The dam itself extends from the riverbed (about 30 plus feel below the surface of the river) to about 500 feet in the air. It was built using what could only be considered crude methods by our standards today, using a wire and large containers to transport mixing compounds to the actual construction site.

The dam was constructed in several stages, the first being to stop and divert

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the river so that the foundation could be constructed. To do this, the river was blocked about 1/4 of a mile upstream, and tunnels were drilled through the mountainside to allow the water to flow past the work site. Once this was done, the actual construction could begin. This would consist of workers making several thousand concrete slabs (each weighing several tons) in place (since they could not be moved due to the weight). Despite the various rumors and stories, no one was buried alive in the dam as it took several hours to make each slab, at roughly one foot per hour (which means if you could not get up from a foot of cement and get out of the way in two hours, well, what can I say?)

Once the construction was completed, the initial dam was destroyed and the new one took over -- and has been in operation ever since. If you are ever in need of something to do for shore leave, I suggest checking this out, and taking both the Lake Mead tour, as well as the 'Hard Hat' tour of the dam. Well worth the time and effort.

After that, we decided to take a walk down the main promenade strip, which is what the place is best known for. There are hotels and shops that range from the mundane to the, uh, extreme. There are buildings that are scaled down versions of New York, Paris, Egypt and more. There is even a hotel that is shaped like one of the ancient

great pyramids! And don't even get me started about the casinos! There must have been at least twenty different Ferengi there - all taking notes!

The place is a phenomenal experience in general. We even went to a pre-holodeck adventure scenario based on Starfleet itself! The 'experience' as they call it was very interesting. Gives you an idea of what entertainment was like before the advent of holotechnology.

We arrived back at our quarters shortly before 0100 hours the following day. We knew we would be very tired, but the fun and adventure was well worth the loss of some sleep.

The next day was quite the event as well. We attended an awards banquet, where several officers were issued some much-deserved promotions. Among those were Chris Wallace to full Admiral, Kurt Roithinger to Vice Admiral, and our host for the evening, Ed Nowlin, to Rear Admiral. We said our congratulations to all of the fine officers who received promotions, and moved on to the next series of events.

The last day of the conference held a special surprise for Captain Don Willits. It seems that his wife, Commander Daisy Wan, managed to plan a very special event for him, without his knowledge. Little did he know that his entire crew was aware of the event (she even managed to wrangle the cooperation of both myself and Admiral Wallace).

Under the pretense of going to have breakfast at one of the local establishments, we decided to choose another location, and made our way to the Venetian Hotel. By this time, Captain Willits was curious as to why we passed up all the restaurants. It was all Admiral Wallace and I could do to keep a straight face, but a straight (and somber) face we did.

Each member also received permanent promotions to ranks held during the Shuttle phase of the USS Dominator's existence.

The ceremonies were concluded by refreshments and socializing by all present. The socializing lasted an hour and all personnel shuttles were loaded and departed back to the respective ship locations throughout the South Carolina and North Carolina sectors of Region One.

With RMHC's help, HFA has grown from humble beginnings - 20 sites in 1992 - to 345 affiliated sites in 41 US states and Canada. Through this network, HFA is providing home visiting services to more than 33,000 families each year.

USS PREVAILING WIND MEMBER IN SICKBAY

What does a family do when a beloved husband and father is diagnosed with a life-threatening disease; anything and everything they possibly can. After they tire from the stress and grief they dig deeper into their fortitude and try harder.

John P. Coffey is in desperate need of a liver transplant and has traveled with his wife, Lori, from Pennsylvania to Florida for necessary testing to determine whether he physically qualifies for the procedure. His doctors felt he could not wait for the years necessary in Pennsylvania to move up on the transplant list and sought out a newly certified institution with a shorter waiting period.

John is luckier than many because he has health insurance--as long as he pays the monthly premium. The

airfare to Jacksonville was covered by a charitable institution. He is a Vietnam veteran and should qualify for the anti-rejection drugs he may need in the future through Veterans' Administration. Also, he has been authorized for Social Security to help compensate for lost wages since he can no longer work.

What other obstacles must these Starfleet members overcome? Lori has used all of her work leave giving care and taking her husband to doctor and hospital appointments. While she will be able to return to her job in the future, she is currently without an income and must pay \$230.00 a month for health insurance through her employer. In addition, they must make certain their children have enough funds to support the household in Pennsylvania while they cover their hotel, grocery and transportation expenses in Florida. As you could guess, Social Security does not stretch that far.

The Coffeys met while John was stationed at a Naval base repairing and maintaining helicopters, and Lori worked in a luncheonette on base. They have 3 lovely daughters and a 21/2 year old grandson named Sean. According to an ex-coworker, John was always the type of person who worked hard and did more than his share. He still tries to help at home as much as possible on a "better" day. When he first found he must leave his job, his work friend, Vickie, collected an amount of money in her great concern for the family. his reaction was strongly against such aid. This man had always been a helper, not one who accepted gifts easily. He has had to develop the patient courage needed to live one day at a time and concentrate on his family's welfare instead of his pride. As the other John Coffey said in The Green Mile, "I'm tired, Boss. Dog tired."

Although we are a small club, we felt we must take action on behalf of this family. We have contacted service organizations,

the family's church and Friends of the Faire (as in Renaissance Faire) to which the couple also belongs. We are funddiscussing and raisers are requesting donations. Our goal is to raise at least \$4000.00 towards the expenses of the next few months. The Sovereign had been in service for ten years, and we celebrated on Saturday, June 17, 2000, with an affair at Swan Caterers at 15th and Shunk Streets in south of Philadelphia. My own experiences there were these:

My escort to the affair, Patricia Jordan, who was also Joseph Horton's and Lorrie Nelson's escort, arrived twenty (20) minutes before I had expected her. I have always enjoyed bold cuisine and would like to share with you all a few of my more memorable dining experiences.

My first experience with exotic foods while in the military was on the island of Guam in 1978. I'll explain about my first experience with exotic food stuffs initially and why I like bold eating later on. My hosts, my neighbors, were hosting a wedding. It should be noted that the island of Guam is approximately 38 miles long by 8 miles wide at its widest point. So, when someone tosses a big bash, it's not uncommon for several hundred people to show up. To proceed, I was offered what looked like a small rack of ribs and to be quite honest here, was well on my way to being the life of the party. It tasted good as far as I was concerned and I had several helpings. It was meat and I was hungry! Imagine my surprise when I found out afterwards that I had consumed several helpings of barbecued fruit bat. Legalities and protected status aside it was tangy, may have been the sauce, but quite palatable. That experience renewed a desire that I have had to this day to stay away from the mundane munchies that so frequent our lives and to go forth and scarf with daring and audacity.

The Pacific Rim offers many unique culinary choices. For example, if you like hot and powerful peppers then you need to try a little something called a Boonie Pepper. Located also on the island of Guam, Boonie Peppers are just a couple or three inches long at best but are packed with quite an attitude. They WILL

bite back and make jalapenos look like sweet bell peppers. You toss a few of these in your stew and you'll remember it I gua-ron-tee!

Not to be outdone for total tasteness is an item called Balut, and is pronounced "bah-LOOT." Balut originates in the Phillipines and is a boiled embroynated 9 to 14 day old duck egg. The time honored method of embryonating the egg is unique. They put numerous layers of hay on

extended amorous activities.

Proceeding from the Phillipines to Korea we find the pungent delicacy called Kimchi which consists of fermented Chinese cabbage and ground red chilies. The recipes are numerous and almost every Korean family has their own favorite. Basically, the cabbage is soaked in a salt water solution for 24 hours, and then afterwards the solution is replaced with a pepper water solution



top of the egg and then pour warm water on the hay several times a day. During this process the egg is in the ground. Then they harvest and boil the egg after 14 days for balut. At this time the embryo is almost a full duckling, with crunchy feet and feathers. When eaten, the egg yolk is reduced, the egg white is hard, and the amniotic sac is filled with liquid. So be careful when opening balut, because you might spill the liquid which is quite a delicacy. In case anyone is interested Balut is also rumoured to be an aphrodisiac. It is a common Phillipine custom to eat Balut before proceeding with and allowed to soak for another 24 hours. As in the Phillipines the dish is prepared outside as the whole concoction is placed in a kimchi pot and buried underground in the summer or in the snow during winter. It's amazing to be in Korea during the major cabbage harvests. A "cord" of cabbage stacked like firewood will be placed on every block, and the residents will emerge and fill their earthenware kimchi pots. Kimchi is a major source of Vitamin C for Koreans and unlike Japan-where one is expected to indicate pleasure with food by slurping and burping and other sounds often rude to

Westerners-Koreans are quiet eaters. Even excess talk is considered impolite during a meal. Perhaps they need a warrior or two to wake up the feast. In their defense it should be noted however that the smell one first encounters when opening a kimchi pot for the first time is quite strong and worthy of any warrior's mettle. "Hoo-whee!"

Proceeding south to the island nation of Japan an adventurous eater can find many foods worthy of search and consumption. Looking for something neat to eat is half the experience and one should not be reluctant to spend some time searching and sampling. Aside from an overall liking of seafood and Japanese food in general I preferred for sheer ease of eating, plus the weird looks one gets, barbecued Tako (octopus) arms. The meal is simplicity itself, the arms are cut off the body, skewered with a shiskabob stick, and put in the barbecue rack. In a few minutes a crunchy and delicious experience is ready. Barbecued octopus arms are not rubbery like steamed or boiled octopus. The same thing goes for Ika or squid. I must add here that no Japanese meal would be complete without a helping of Wasabi or simply, Japanese horseradish. Wasabi comes in three grades. They are Grade 1, which is basically a wasabi wanna-be and should not sully a warrior's palate. Next is Grade 2 which isn't much better and should also be ignored. Finally, comes Grade 3 which is 100 per cent pure wasabi. Wasabi is grown from a plant that takes 2 years to cultivate. The fiery, unique taste that opens even the most tight of sinuses is one you will never forget. Wasabi is usually a lime green paste that sits to the side of the main course. A mangHom's typical introduction is usually along the lines of, "Hey, wonder what this tastes like...YOW!!!" It is a condiment worthy of Kahless Himself! Try it with your next helping of blreQtagh won't you?

As we move on to the country of Spain let me get you started by introducing your taste buds to a

wonderful beverage called Sangria. Sangria is a Spanish wine and fruit punch combo. What is really neat about Sangria is that the recipies are numerous. Every bar and family has their own particular style. Some are practically water and others... not so watery! While I was stationed at Torrejon Air Base, Spain from from August 1983 until September 1986 one of my favorite hobbies (I was single then) was to go Tasca hopping. Tascas are spanish bars that offer assorted munchies with their drinks. Aside from the usual chips and such one can find Escargot, the infamous, but oh so tasty French snails. Escargot meat, despite its shock value, is not slimy or foul tasting. The nutritional value is high as some species have a nearly 20 percent protein content as well as possessing chemicals that lower cholesterol and a high amino acid content allowing for ease of digestion. I often ate a dozen or more with my sangria for a supper. Now, if you want something for strange looks with gossip to go with it, I suggest you try Haggis.

Now I know Haggis is a Scottish dish, but you must remember here, I was stationed in Europe and the Spanish put their own twist on the recipe. Traditionally, Haggis is made with a sheep's stomach as a casing. It is filled with oats, onions, spices and the other edible organs that are cooked first and then chopped up. These are called "pluck,"--things plucked from the sheep carcass--and include the "lights," or lungs. It should be mentioned here that Haggis lovers, as with other foods I have mentioned previously, love to hold Haggis contests and quarrel over recipes--much the way Texans fight over chili. When people mention Haggis the shock value rises in the room considerably but, for all its strange look and lore, Haggis is basically a big, round, spicy sausage...and that sucker is yummers!! If that doesn't entice you warrior please notice that Haggis has a tradition much like Klingon foods.

Every January 25, when Scotland celebrates the birth of her greatest poet Robert Burns in 1759, Haggis is served with Roast Beef, Dunlop Cheese, and spinach and the Haggis is addressed by a member of the party, ceremoniously, in the form of verses from Burns' poem, "Address to a Haggis." Oh, and did I mention

whisky is also served.

Now, making our way back to the United States after that great meal, let introduce you to a western classic, a meal sure to freak out the 9 to 5 burger munchers, that sidewinder sampler, the Rattlesnake. I first had rattlesnake in 1980 when I was stationed in Texas near Sweetwater. Mine was deep fried, which I really don't recommend. I prefer mine baked or plank broiled in front of an open fire. To me it tastes better and is more tender as well. Also, if you're ever in any of the western states do yourself a "flavor" and have some rattlesnake chili

So as a salute to the open minded scoutmasters that infused a generation of us kids with the desire to experiment and try "different" foods, and to you the SuvwI tlhIngan I offer my final recipe..."The Grasshopper Tortilla." You'll need the following:

About 1000 grasshoppers -- the younger the better (Surf the Internet as there are businesses that deal in insect foods).

1/2 cup chili sauce Pinch of salt Garlic

Onion

1 Lemon

1 Cup Guacamole (I prefer to make my own)

6 Tortillas

Directions: Soak the grasshoppers in clean water for 24 hours. Change water, boil them after rinsing, then let dry. Fry in a pan with garlic, onion, salt, and lemon. Roll up in tortillas with chili sauce and the guacamole. According to the recipe, "It serves six if you can find six."

In closing, let me propose that adventurous eating not only satisfies your appetite, it breaks barriers. When I was overseas I discovered along with learning the local languages eating the local foods made an enormous impression on host country natives. As for the insect meals, just remember that the American Indians and Australian Aborigines have eaten insects as far back as history can trace them and they are still here. Perhaps that will help put your meal in perspective.

17 years, Bill Hermann administered a program to honor the 240 Marines killed and the 151 more wounded when an Islamic suicide bomber crashed into their barracks. He encouraged Starfleet members and other organizations to send cards, letters, and packages to the Marines of that unit, the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit. The program expanded quickly to honor all servicemembers away from home with cards and letters. Bill's official functions were to obtain temporary zip codes for the US Post Office each year and to report the number of "Any Service Member" pieces of mail sent to the Department of Defense.

Sadly, Operation Eagle is gone. Bill has others interests and he just can't do them all. He has just started another large project; something had to go and Operation Eagle is it. Thanks, Bill. Because of security interests, the DoD won't allow packages this year anyway. However, you can still send cards and letters (13 oz or less) to service members through Operation

Abby, and you can mention Starfleet on the inside. You can report these cards and letters on your monthly and quarterly reports, too, either as Service Time or in specific numbers if your ship or region gives awards on this basis.

The USPS creates the same type of zip codes for Operation Abby; they are operational Nov. 15, 2000 - Jan. 15. 2001. Here are the addresses:

For Europe & SouthWest Asia: Any Service Member OPERATION DEAR ABBY APO AE 09135

For the Mediterranean Basin: Any Service Member OPERATION DEAR ABBY FPO AE 09646

For the Far East: Any Service Member OPERATION DEAR ABBY APO AP 96285

For the Pacific Basin: Any Service Member OPERATION DEAR ABBY FPO AP 96385

If you want to send condolences to the USS Cole, many of the crew were airlifted to the mainland for leave. One wounded female officer had to be given a direct order to board the medivac helicopter; she didn't want to leave her command, which included some of the missing. All able personnel will be recalled as soon as the Cole reaches dry dock in Virginia.

In the meantime, the Commanding Officer is still aboard, supervising the efforts to recover the remaining bodies. All these people, the living and the dead, are American heroes. You can send letters and cards to the USS Cole at ATTN: Commanding Officer, USS Cole DDG-67, FPO AE 09566-1284. (This is a military-style address, so it is addressed to the Commanding Officer; he does not open all of these himself.) If your card or letter arrives early, it will be held until the crew returns to their ship.



A WORLDCON FOR STARFLEET?

First there was Bruce Gray, who wanted to do a special flyer. And Irvin Koch ... the Chair ... who needed to ... point out some things. Then Mary Kane said Allyson Dyar wanted an article.... So there was a ... discussion ... and when the flyer was done ... it looked like the start of an article.

BRUCE: A full line of Star Trek programming, panels, discussions, movies, videos, and much, much more will be run by Star Trek fans for Star Trek fans.

IRV: I think we can promise it will be run by Trek fans, but run for ALL fans. One object of the game for us is to "de-balkanize" fandom to what little extent we can

BRUCE: This flyer is to give to Trek fans at Trek cons, not everyone. I applaud your sentiment in trying to "de-balkanize" fandom, but I still think that we need to stress this another way - by simply having the programming at all. The key is to get Trek fans to be willing to shell out hard-earned moolah to support and vote for US. However, I think that the "for Trek fans" can be dropped without further comment.

IRV: I wouldn't promise a "full line" of Trek programming. People will think it's a full blown Trek con inside the Worldcon, like Dragoncon. Depending on a ton of other factors, like other Program Blocks, meeting rooms available, etc., what we can promise is PROBABLY: <shudder, goes to count blocks in the TO (Table of Organization) and how many rooms that will take > Oh, < grumble >.

For the time that we have the meeting rooms, excluding the Ballroom, in the Convention Center, maybe 50% of the time there would be an ST program in one of them. Maybe. This is the first I've planned down to that level and it was cold water in my face. It will not be the same room, all the time, either, due to guessing what needs what size room, and trying to mix the various sub-groups. However, there should be a pretty much full time room of ST stuff in the hotel that has Program... and some kind of "lounge," which may be shared.

BRUCE: OK, so we won't have space for everything. But do we want to do "alternate" programming in hotel(s)? The all-night gaming will certainly have to do that.

IRV: The plan is still to have "some of everything" in the Convention Center and then more of the specialized stuff at the Hotel, along with the 24 hour activities. "Night Owl" and "Day Lark" ("main program" at night as well as early in the morning) will also be over there.

Not to mention that the ST fans should in many cases be happy that there are "blocks" of about the same scope for B5, SW, Brit. TV/movies, American TV/movies, other TV/movies etc., etc. ... with the provision that some of the blocks currently in the TO may get merged into Brit./etc., Am.TV/etc. or something ... depending on how much interest there is in what circa January 2004. The same provision says there may be new blocks if something new appears with wide enough interest.

BRUCE: Heck, "Voyager" will be long over by then, and at least one totally new Trek TV show, and minimum of one new Trek movie by then. But I agree with you - many Trek fans are fans of other

media programming. So I included a new paragraph about other media programming. :-)

IRV: Obviously we can promise panels and discussions. We are promising movies and videos but exactly what they'll be is way way TBA.

BRUCE: Just saying we will have the panels and discussions, movies and videos will be enough for now. A lot of this will depend on who we get for guests (which is also a discussion for after winning

sig grin>.

IRV: Actually, about six months before the site selection vote (where "we" win or lose), we (our Directors, which includes you now) will vote on what "Guests" we're going to have. That is how many and what type. Then we vote on who will be invited for each slot. Those are the only "Guests" and there's no way we'll be able to afford any who make their living from performing/appearing. The other 493 or more "program participants" will be whoever chose to come on their own. They'll probably get their membership money refunded, but that's all -and that includes a great many "big names."

On the "much more," well... yes... but that phrasing may get us in trouble if people expect a media con complete with big name stars selling autographs.

BRUCE: We might have one or two of them, too... just by default. However, I toned this section down by simply removing the "much".

IRV: Bottom line is, that paragraph needs work.

BRUCE: Note that this flyer needs -very- little work to be "translated" into a flyer for B5 fans, Star Wars fans, or anything else we decide to cover in the media field.

IRV: Precisely.

A Worldcon For Starfleet?

What's an article about bidding for the Worldcon* (World Science Fiction Convention) doing in a Starfleet zine? Worldcons are supposed to be full of people not exactly enthusiastic about 'media fans." Not this one. OK, so the Chair of the Charlotte bid for the 2004 Worldcon wouldn't have joined Starfleet if the Registrar wasn't the long time Captain of the Charlotte Starfleet Ship, Hornet.... <bli>blink> At that point you can conclude this group is not "just" media fan friendly, but looking to have a much larger ST, and things that ST fans find interesting, program, than you're ever likely to see from a Worldcon. It's also worth noting that the Games Division (yes, a whole Division, not just a little piece of the Program Division) is currently headed by Bruce Gray, who worked on ST conventions since the '70s and one of the other Board of Director Members is Harry "FANDOM DIRECTORY" Hopkins, who some of you may be familiar with.

The prestige of a World Science Fiction Convention can and often does attract guests who would not normally come to a "regular" Trek con, including Producers, Directors, Writers, Artists, high-level technical staff, special effects wizards, and maybe even an actor or actress.

For example, one of the main guests at a recent Worldcon was to have been J Michael Straczynsky, Executive Producer, Executive Director, and sometimes writer of Babylon Five. (Although he had to cancel at the last minute due to personal health problems.) Other past Trek related guests have included writers like: Fred ("Arena") Brown, Harlan ("City on the Edge of Forever") Ellison, Theodore ("Shore Leave") Sturgeon, Norman ("Doomsday Machine") Spinrad, and

Other media related programming is being planned that should please everyone, including Babylon Five, Hercules/Xena, Star Wars, other American TV and films, British TV and films, Anime, and more!

But it will never happen unless Trek fans get out to register and get out to vote. To vote for us, you must join the 2001 World SF Con as at least a Supporting Member (\$40). Their address is:

Millennium Philcon, P O Box 310, Huntingdon Valley, PA 19006-0310.

A supporting membership gets you all their publications, which are considerable, one year's vote on the Hugos, and two years' right to nominate - and there is, after all, a Best Dramatic Presentation category. You will then, in 2001, receive a ballot, and probably must pay an additional \$40. That second \$40 will get you a supporting membership for the 2004 Worldcon, no matter where it is. Note that this also includes the same benefits as the supporting membership for Millennium Philcon. If you also gave us a full \$40 pre-support as well, and we win, you will be automatically converted to a full attending member.

ON THE HUMANOID CONDITION

Fans of Star Trek: The Next Generation may recall an episode entitled "The Chase" which involved a discovery by Professor Richard Galen that many of the humanoid races in the galaxy are in fact descended from a common ancestral seed planted on many worlds by an ancient protohumanoid race.

I would like to expand upon my previous article on the humanoid condition and share some thoughts

on exactly what makes up a "humanoid" in the greater scheme of life in both Star Trek and on our planet (this is written as speculation based on some research I have done in the Star Trek television and motion picture catalog as well as in the Star Trek Encyclopedia, and is meant to entertain as well as raise questions as to what constitutes "humanoid" - discussion is welcome)...

Nomenclature of hominids: Classically, the "model" hominid has been Homo sapiens or "thinking man" however, since the discovery of other humanoid forms, a new system has been designed to define the specific genera and species: - Homo will be reserved for those genera (regardless of Order) to define humanoids - sapiens will be reserved for those species that, regardless of any other classification, define a sentient species.

Given the sheer number of hominid species that exist, a further classification into subspecies is in order (there may in fact be more than one Homo sapiens) and therefore subspeciation will be defined by the indigenous environment (in most cases the home planet or variant thereof) of the species in question. Examples: Homo sapiens terra - Earth man or Terran Homo sapiens vulcanis - Vulcan Homo sapiens cardassiensis - Cardassian

On sentient life forms

Several recent presentations of life have

brought up the question of sentient life? What defines sentient life? Recent legal determinations, particularly those of the android Data have suggested that a sentient form understands several basic concepts of existence: - self-awareness - self-determination - understanding of one's own existence in time as it relates to past, present, and future - understanding of one's own existence at it relates to the existence of other species - understanding one's

forms such as nanites, metalloorganic life, and such

A determination of the sentience of certain holograms is in its early stages (given that certain holograms meet the criteria for sentience and can in some cases program fully aware 'offspring'). The following nomenclature is presented for both Soong androids and holograms for consideration: Cyber sapiens soong - Soong Android

* Database here refers to the Alien Species Database maintained by the Xenobiology Department of USS Hawkeye, Region 1.

As the Xenobiologist of USS Hawkeye, I maintain an up-to-date database of all the alien species presented in Star Trek television and motion picture media, official Star Trek publications (such as the Encyclopedia), and Star Trek: The Magazine and Star Trek:

Communicator. The purpose of this is to present an up-todate synopsis of every species encountered (and as far as I can tell, it's more complete than Paramount's Xenology database at their official web site at http:/ /www.startrek.com/library/ xeno.asp) - I have also recently included information on alien species presented in various Starfleet fan fiction archives, and I regularly correct any spelling or grammatical mistakes based on what I see in the various Star Trek publications and media.

The complete Alien Species Database (which is updated weekly according to new species discovered by USS Voyager) can be accessed at: http://www.angelfire.com/nc2/sardis/xenobio.html.

It is not the purpose of this database* to present the genera and species names of every sentient life form in the galaxy, but this does serve as a guide to: 1. nomenclature of new sentient life forms 2. definition of hominid forms 3. a broader understanding of the role of each species in the scheme of humanoid life




I am excited and honored beyond words to be Region 15's Regional Coordinator. Time to get those warp drives online, fired up and start having some FUN!!!!!"
