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

The purpose of this address is so that you know both where we stand at this date and the goals that my administration has for the coming year. It is my intention to make this an annual event during my term of office as vour President, and I hope that successive administrations will continue to do so.

I was elected to this office on a platform "idealism tempered practicality." While I plan to continue those of aspects the Organization that worked well under the Smith administration, where necessary or prudent I will be changes. making Our primary goal, as it has been with previous administrations, is to ensure the timely

someone and wait to hear back, wondering if they ever even received your message. We have high hopes that the new STARFLEET Helpdesk (see article in the Communications section) will improve HQ's responsiveness and get you the assistance you require.

Our third goal is to reform how STARFLEET finances are handled, to ensure that accountability and solid record-keeping are in place at all times and all stages. To that end, I have assembled a "Finance Reform Task Admiral Chris Wallace. Their job will be to draft policy on how STARFLEET should set up, administer, and report on financial matters both for my administration and, hopefully, those that follow.

On the subject of finances, Fleet Captain Tammy Willcox has posted a complete financial report as of January 2001 to both the STARFLEET electronic mailing list and the *Communiqué*. This report will be published monthly to the STARFLEET electronic mailing list

and the *Communiqué* will also show the report relevant for the month of publication (February, April, June, August, October, and December). Full financial disclosure is important to me, and I want to ensure that members know, on a regular (monthly or bi-monthly) basis, where STARFLEET stands.

One thing that you will hopefully learn over time is that I am very goal-oriented. I asked the Executive Committee to send me some thoughts and goals that they would like to work toward. As this is the beginning of an administration I just said "Tell me

what you would like to see and things that you and your department would like to work on or improve." They have sent these goals in as part of their own CQ articles, so I will not repeat them here. I do, however, ask that you please review them.

Executive Committee alone cannot make STARFLEET better. Though it is from the EČ that policies are formulated and drafted, Admiralty Board, consisting of each Regional Coordinator, and the Commanding Officers of the Fleet's chapters serve as conduits from you, the members, to us at HQ. Your thoughts, ideas, suggestions, concerns, given to your CO and then to your RC, helps us stay "in touch" with your desires and needs.

Together, I hope we all, leadership and member, work together to continue making STARFLEET the best Star Trek fan club ever. My email and post office mailboxes are always open and I welcome your thoughts.

Greetings from the STARFLEET Treasurer's office! Let me give you a little bit of background on myself so you'll be more familiar with me. I'm FCAPT Tammy Willcox and I joined STARFLEET back in 1982. I currently serve not only as Fleet Treasurer, but Region One Co-Treasurer, and Commanding Officer of the USS Maat.

In the past I have held various other regional and Fleet positions including: College of Trade and Commerce Director, FDC of Special Services, RDC of Special Services, R1 Co-Webmaster, Regional Relief Fund Coordinator, etc.

In addition to the STARFLEET oriented treasury or funds that I've worked with, I also managed or audited accounts with several other volunteer organizations.

STARFLEET's new checking accounts have been opened at the First Virginia Bank in Virginia Beach, VA. I have opened two accounts, one is a general STARFLEET operational account and the other is strictly for the Scholarship program. ### STARFLEET DIPLOMATIC CORPS

The SFI Diplomatic Corps (DC) is an ambassadorial department whose primary goal is to establish contact and engage in friendly communications with other fan organizations. While the department first looks to Star Trek based fan organizations, we also look to other fan organizations. The DC understands that fleet is made up of a diverse membership and that fandom just does not end at Star Trek. Therefore, we will communicate with any organization that would like to enter in friendly relations with any part of Fleet.

Organizations are stand-alone chapters of fandom, small groups of fan chapters, localized organizations and international organizations and fan association. The DC is open to all and to provide assistance.

When the DC initiates communication with another organization or is contacted by other organizations, we are doing so simply as ambassadors. Our goal is to help with relations between our respective groups and thus we evaluate potentially thorny situations and try to provide possible solutions.

The DC never commands, but makes suggestions. It is the decision of the person we are working with to either accept or reject the suggestions. If the person rejects the suggestions, but still wants us to work on the situation, we will continue the work until either a solution does not appear possible or one of the parties decides to leave negotiations.

Which brings us to the second part of the DC's primary goal, what happens after the start of communications. It really depends upon the people involved. The DC can simply help to set up communications between the two entities, set up some kind of document stating the two entities' attempt at friendly communications, or help set up a diplomatic arena which the two entities could function in and with.

Once an agreement is established between two entities, the DC can come in and arbitrate any problems that arise. The DC then functions as an outside party not involved in the situation and brings partiality to the table. Again, the DC provides suggestions as to a solution as we do not command. The final decision is left to the parties involved. The DC will do what ever is possible to find a solution to any problem.

A secondary goal of the department is to help promote multi-functional events between two parties. The DC helps promote multi-functional events between affiliates of STARFLEET and STARFLEET. An affiliate is a party with which Fleet, through the DC, is in communications. The second is that the DC helps to promote inner-fleet multi-functional events. This means that two or more Fleet chapters are working on an event can ask the DC for assistance.

The purpose of this is to help set up events where multiple numbers of fans can gather and have a good time. It is not the purpose of the DC to take over any ones job or run

the event, but to be there to provide help. As an ambassadorial arena, multifunctional events are a part of what we do

The DC is still looking for a few members to fill a couple of positions still available. Regional Ambassadors are permitted to form staffs within their offices. A member can contact their local Regional Ambassador to see if they are taking applications for staff. Another method a member can take is to join one of the DC's committees. The committees bring together a large group of people to discuss issues. When issues are finalized, the committee formally submits them to the Director, DC for review. Information on the committees can be found at the DC's web site.

I would also like to point out the new "Meet the Director" initiative that I have started this year. I will be on IRC (Internet Relay Chat) on the Fleetchat network for a minimum of one hour, once a month, for any person who'd like to speak with me. The channel is #sfi-dcs and my nickname is DCS-Guy. Whenever I'm online, I'll always be in that channel.

For those of you who don't know, or have never heard of me, my name is Mark A. Vinson and I'm here to serve you as the new Chief of Operations, STARFLEET. I am the Commanding Officer of the USS Panther City, NCC-63543 which is located in Fort Worth, Texas. I have been the CO since its inception as a shuttle and the two years we have been a full chapter.

I've been a member of Region Three's Executive Committee since 1992 serving in many different positions -- Communications, Computer Operations and finally as Chief-of-Staff -- before Les Rickard asked me to be Chief of Operations. Since I joined in 1990, I have also held the position of Director of Correspondence Chapter Operations for three years while I was CO of the Correy Chapter the Space Station Freedom III. I have seen Fleet go through many changes, in these eleven years -- some for the best and some for the worst. I will work to make sure your votes were not misplaced. Pete Lutz), and the Armed Services program (led by VAdm. Barbara Paul). These officers are good directors and I plan to rely on them heavily these next two years. My Senior Vice-Chief is Brigadier Dennis

Rayburn; he will help me with the Monthly Status Reports. My Chief-of-Staff is RAdm. Mike Urvand, who will help me keep the STARFLEET Vessel Registry up-to-date.

Commanding Officer's and Reporting Officer's will notice a change in how the Monthly Status Reports will be filed and handled by the Ops department.

We have simplified the MSR filing procedure with an online form at http://msr.sfi.org/. This form will email not only SFI Ops but also your respective RC and if you are an Armed Forces Chapter, a Chapter Assistance Program Chapter or a Correy Chapter all you have to do is check one box. That is all. Your MSR will be delivered to all who

need it. This is the preferred method of MSR filing. If for some reason the form does not work, or you just don't want to use it, you can email your MSR directly to <MSRReports@sfi.org>. If you do it this way we ask that you download the email form from our website <a href="http://www.sfi.org/">http://www.sfi.org/</a> ops/msr.txt>. PLEASE NO ATTACHMENTS. Half the time they get scrambled in the process. Just cut and paste the form into the body of an email message and fill it out. All you have to do besides emailing it to MSRReports@sfi.org is to email it to your respective RC and to any other department you are supposed to.

If you prefer to send in your MSR via postal mail, please send it to me at: Mark A. Vinson, 1047 Cottonwood Trl., Benbrook, TX. 76126. You will still have to send copies to your respective RC and any other department you are supposed to, but I will make sure that within SFI Ops it gets to where it is supposed to be

Over the next two years I plan to utilize my real life experience with managing databases to make sure that the info contained in your MSR's and Change of Command Forms are entered properly into the membership database. With the help of Don Willit's in CompOps (who is also a database manager) rosters should be more accurate and up-to-date. Don and I want to make sure that all CO's know who SFI thinks is on their chapters vs. whom the CO knows is on their chapters.

We know the Vessel Registry is in need of updating and Mike Urvand and I have been working hard on getting it corrected. We also know that the database needs work and are working on it Region by Region. If you have online access, please look at the rosters and if you see a change that needs to be made, send the information (wrong information and corrected information) to me at **ops@sfi.org**, or send me a letter via postal mail at the address above.

Please remember that we are human and, as such, don't have the gift of telepathy. So let us know if there is something you need or you are having problems. I encourage all of our members and chapters with comments and questions to please feel free to e-mail or write any of us in STARFLEET Operations.

"I'm sorry, Dave, I can't do that." In the movie that made this year famous, the HAL 9000 computer wasn't being all that helpful when things really mattered. Sometimes it feels that way in STARFLEET. While we can usually find some person to open the pod bay doors, sometimes there are some issues -- whether it be about memberships, Communiqués, commissionings, or whatever -- that have some trouble getting resolved.

There's a lot of reasons for this, but mostly it comes down to the fact this is a volunteer organization, and with the limited resources that the organization has, some things get missed. And when the ball is picked up again, the member may have to explain everything to someone completely new.

The STARFLEET Helpdesk answers e-mail sent to helpdesk@sfi.org. The software will put your problem into our database, and email you back a tracking number. That number is your key to finding out the status of your question: you'll know STARFLEET got it, and we'll be able to find the status of any Helpdesk request.

We'll be the first ones to see your questions, and we'll answer them when we can. When we can't, we'll make sure that we find the right people to answer the question. I want to make this clear: this is not designed as a layer of bureaucracy between you and the departments of STARFLEET. By all means, feel free to contact them directly.

But, if you're not sure where to go, or you have a problem that can't seem to get resolved, send us an email at **helpdesk@sfi.org!** We'll get right on it

Now, I realize that not everyone has access to email. So, we have a voicemail/fax number for those without email access. If you do have email access, we strongly recommend that you continue to use <helpdesk@sfi.org>. But for those that don't, they can call (507) 299-2015. This is a number in the US, and yes, it's a toll call. You can send faxes to the same number. Make sure to leave us enough information so we know how to get back with you!

### STARFLEET COMMUNIQUE SUBMISSIONS GUIDELINES

With the advent of a new administration and with me formally taking over the Editorial reigns on the STARFLEET Communiqué, I thought it would be prudent to publish some basic guidelines covering submission. Eventually, this document will be compiled into a FAQ, with the URL to be listed in the Collophon (usually page 2 of the Communiqué).

When submitting material to the STARFLEET *Communiqué*, please note that submissions via the Internet are preferred. You can submit material to the following e-mail address: **cq@sfi.org** (Attachments are acceptable, though if at all possible, please compress the files via a program like WinZip or Stuffit).

Hardcopy submissions **MUST** be typed. Please do not send us handwritten submissions. If you do, they **WILL NOT** be used within the CQ. Hardcopy submissions should go to:

Here are some basic guidelines for what kind of files/objects to send:

### **Images/Photos:**

The \*.JPG and \*.TIF file formats are preferred. In general, they will yield the best reproduction quality. If possible, please send the highest quality and largest size sensible (if you use Adobe Photoshop, f.e., save a JPG at quality level 10-12 and about the size of a computer screen -- 800x600 or better).

Please do not try not to re-size smaller pictures to fit the above guideline -- just send them on 'as is' (you usually loose more quality in scaling up than you can ever hope to gain from the increase in size). Due to the fact that some of these images can get quite huge, we generally prefer that people just put them in a FTP/HTTP directory and send us an email (at the address above) with the URL and we will go grab them overnight.

If you choose to mail us a photograph, please include either a SASE or the appropriate amount of return postage (we have plenty of priority mail mailing supplies)

so that we can return the images after we're finished processing them for use in the CQ. If you do not want us to return them, please indicate as much in your mailing. Upon completion of that particular CQ, we will turn over any such pictures to the office of the STARFLEET Historian for the purpose of archiving.

One last caveat about the pictures you send to the CQ: If the pictures are so dark that all you can see are teeth and eyes or if the picture is too blurry, fuzzy or you can't make out who is who -- please don't send it. It's not that we don't want/need your effort, but in order to guarantee that the output of the CQ is visible and recognizable by all it's readers, we really need pictures that are crisp and bright. Overexposed pictures are actually far more useable for publication in the CQ then pictures that are in focus, but set against very dark surroundings.

### Artwork/Logos:

Any type of vector artwork would be most preferred (\*.ai, \*.eps, \*.wmf, \*.cdr). We can use raster images (JPGs, TIFs), but the quality simply is not the same. For best results, please send computer files (either via email or on a floppy disk via the USPS). If you send strictly a hardcopy, we will try our very best to rebuild the image in a computer format, but there simply is no guarantee that we will have enough time to complete the task.

If sending a raster image, the same criteria apply as noted for the pictures above, except that the art \*\*\*MUST\*\*\* be on a white background. The other very important thing to do is to include the credits for the artwork, as you want them to appear.

### Written Stuff:

When submitting articles via email, (almost) anything goes -- Word for Windows (all versions) files, Word Perfect (recent versions) files, ASCII Text (\*.txt) files or simply put it into an email and send it to the aforementioned address (the overwhelming favorite amongst those who submit to the CQ right now).

One caveat: do not imbed images into a Word for Windows/Word Perfect file. If you really have to, \*PLEASE\* send us the images individually as well. Hardcopy submissions are pretty much covered above. Font and format are pretty much up to each and every ones choosing. One inch margins, double spacing and any type of standard font (Arial, Times New Roman, any non-cursive Typewriter font) would be optimum, but half-inch margins, single spacing and the use of the Courier font won't get you any minus points.

Some final words on submissions: Please also note that the CQ Staff reserves the right to edit any submissions as necessary. This is usually done solely to adjust size or correct errors or mistakes and is for the most part not done in order to alter content. If the content of a submission is deemed offensive or objectionable, the CQ staff reserves itself the right to exclude it from publication altogether. For the most part, this simply means to please watch your language. The CQ Staff are the very first ones to champion the rights of free speech and whatnot, however, children and young adults \*DO\* read this publication. Frankly, asking folks to keep their articles civil is not a matter of freedom of speech, but one of common courtesy towards those who do not need to be exposed to such material -- especially from a source that really is not designed to berate or titillate others. Similarly, we prefer that submissions do not include graphic descriptions of sexual acts or acts of extreme violence.

We usually will try to meet anyone making such submissions halfway, but again, the CQ is simply not the forum to use four letter words and engage in the dissemination of erotica -- no matter how relevant it may seem to the Star Trek universe.

Lastly, while we try to include everything submitted into each CQ, sometimes material will be left out -- either due to duplication of other material or simply due to the constraints of size and space. If possible, we will include these articles in the next CQ.

### **Content Creation**

As STARFLEET continue to progress and change, we welcome an increasing number of new ideas and new columns to the CQ. If you have an idea for an article or a column for the CQ but are not quite sure about how to progress or where to go with it, simply contact the CQ Editorial staff for input and

suggestions. We can be reached at: cq@sfi.org or at the mailing address listed above.

### **Developing Articles**

If you are developing an article on your own volition and you think it is suitable for inclusion within the CQ, it is yours to do with as you please and the CQ will always be glad to have your submission.

However, if you are developing an article or item for the CQ on behalf of the CQ staff (i.e. you were specifically asked by a member of the CQ or STARFLEET Communications Staff), we require that you \*NOT\* publish said article or item in any type of Chapter or Regional newsletter until \*AFTER\* it has appeared (either in part or in full) in an issue of the STARFLEET Communiqué.

# I'M Shoc'd! Admiral alex rosenzweig Chief of shuttle operations, starfleet

Greetings, and welcome to the voice of ShOC for the new administration! We'll start off slowly, but I hope to make this column interesting and fun, too, with some thoughts and suggestions that everybody, from experienced long-term members to new folks just starting out, might be able to appreciate.

First, though, I'd like to start by introducing the staff of ShOC, who'll be helping make this department the place to go for chapter-development. We have a lot of fine people, who are here to help you, so let me introduce them and give a few sentences about what they do.

Vice Admiral Johnathan "Gumby" Simmons is the Vice Chief of Shuttlecraft Operations. Gumby will be backing me up on the administrative level, and will also be the liaison to the regional shuttle operations personnel. Together, Gumby and I will be working with the regions to develop ways of helping the Fleet grow in a managed and effective way.

Gumby will also be serving as the ShOC Publications Director. His exceptional work with the START and MOM manuals, and work creating effective and useful forms, has made a huge contribution toward making ShOC a better department, and I am very pleased that that will continue.

Fleet Captain William "Biff" Bassett is the Staff Assistant and Webmaster, and he served ably and well under Admiral Gray. I am exceedingly pleased that he will also be staying on to work on the team with me and the current ShOC staff. Watch for further developments on the website, as we add new sections for the benefit of the Fleet.

New to the staff is Captain Sandy Berenberg, who will serve as Shuttlecraft Development Specialist and liaison to Computer Operations. A lot of what he'll be doing is working one-on-one with shuttles that might need a little extra help or attention. The personal touch can be important, and Sandy will help ShOC make sure that it can reach out directly to the shuttles. That's not to say that I or Gumby won't

be available, but if we're caught up doing administrative stuff, Sandy is another person to help out.

Sandy will also be maintaining the ShOC database, and making sure that information flows smoothly to and from Computer Operations.

Now that covers the core ShOC staff. But ShOC is also now home to two more departments, both of which are important, too. These are the Existing Fan Club Program (EFCP) and the Department of Technical Services (DTS). Both have transferred to ShOC from Operations, due mainly to the fact that their organizational administrative roles are involved with developing new chapters.

Yours truly will continue to serve as the Director of DTS. Administratively, DTS is the agency that reviews and approves requests by STARFLEET chapters and shuttles for names and registry/NCC numbers. Groups seeking chapter status have their requests approved by DTS as a prerequisite for commissioning. The other general function of the DTS is the oversight of two "sub-agencies" that operate under its aegis. They are the Office of Technical Information (OTI) and the Advanced Starship Design Bureau (ASDB).

I also serve as the Director of the OTI. OTI is a reference and research service specializing in the science and technology of the Star Trek Universe. Have you got questions about starships? Planets and stars? Alien civilizations? The history of Star Trek's future? If so, OTI is the office to ask.

The ASDB, which continues to be chaired by Admiral Chris Wallace, exists to help you create new designs which will still fit within the well-organized world of Star Trek. Thanks to both Paramount and lots of dedicated Star Trek fans, the hows, whys, and wherefores of Star Trek engineering are well-understood, and the ASDB stands ready to help you make your new design work, and indeed, be one that we can add to the ever-growing world of Star Trek.

The other new addition, the Existing Fan Club Program, is headed by Brigadier General Jill Rayburn. Jill has been doing a fine job in that position, and when the Program came to ShOC, I was very happy to have Jill come with it to become a part of the ShOC team. If a group that isn't a part of STARFLEET wants to join our fine organization, Jill – aided by her staff – will be one of the first point-of-contact for them, and we look forward to helping many such groups become part of the STARFLEET family.

And that's the primary ShOC team right now. As time goes along, we may find the need to add more people, and in that case, I'll be letting the Fleet know about any new positions that may come open.

Meanwhile, don't hesitate to get in touch with us. Our contact information is in the staff listing elsewhere in the Communiqué. We're here to help you, the shuttles and chapters and members of STARFLEET, get the most out of this organization, so don't be afraid to use the resources that ShOC offers. That goes not only for groups who are already shuttlecraft, but those just getting started and wanting to eventually become shuttles and then full chapters. If you're thinking about starting a shuttle, do not hesitate to contact us, because we can help right from the very start. For those of you on-line, we also have a Shuttle Operations website, which is just filled with useful information. It can be found here: <a href="http://www.pcisys.net/~biff/">http://www.pcisys.net/~biff/> Check it out!

In other news, as we're getting started in these first weeks of the new administration, we're not planning on making a whole lot of changes yet. But we will be looking at the various operating procedures and seeing what might benefit from some tweaking. Right now, there's really only one significant change, and that's from the DTS side of the house.

Put most simply, if you're going to reserve a name with DTS, be sure that there's a pretty good likelihood that you will be going ahead and getting that new chapter underway. The reason

is that, effective immediately, reserves will no longer be open-ended and unlimited. Once a name-reservation is made, a group will have six months to go to shuttlecraft status. At the end of that time, the group may apply to have their reservation extended. If I don't hear from the group, though, the name will be released again, so anyone can reserve it.

We also have one other change. ShOC has a new insignia! In working to create a logo version that was a bit friendlier for letterhead and related uses, we ended up redesigning the whole thing. It's gotten a lot of positive reviews from our staff, and we hope that you'll all like it, too. I'd like to thank the graphic artist who did the lion's share of the design-work on the new insignia, LCDR Lauren Milan of FH 1860 Avenger (and the Office of Graphic Design). She did a great job, and it's appreciated.

Now, for the roster of groups seeing their names in print. <BG>

Four shuttlecraft have graduated the Program since I assumed the reins, and have been sent on to Ops for commissioning to full chapter status. Congrats, folks! These groups are:

welcome Ops Chief Mark Vinson, who's already working in the database, to the clan!

One of the members of the CompOps extended family isn't all that far from the trunk of the ol' family tree. Greg Trotter, now working under Mike Malotte in STARFLEET Communications, heads up the STARFLEET HelpDesk project, and is working closely with us on membership problems, such as helping folks who haven't been getting their Communiqué.

And, of course, we're working closely with Tammy Willcox, STARFLEET's dedicated treasurer, who handles all of the money we receive for membership

My thanks to everyone for their patience as we've made the transition to an almost entirely new Computer Operations team over the last few months. ### **CHANGE IN COMMAND?**

If your chapter is getting a new Commanding Officer or Executive Officer, whether by election, appointment by fiat, or bloodless coup, you need to tell STARFLEET all about it. Filing a "Chapter Change of Command form" ensures that the Fleet's contact information for each chapter is current, and provides spaces for multiple signatures to confirm that the change of command is valid and approved by the chapter's membership.

Remember that, while it's not up to STARFLEET how your chapter selects a CO or XO, Ops does want to be confident that the change is known, and approved, by your chapter's members. Also, remember that a CO and XO must be at least 18 years of age, and must have passed Officer Training School (OTS) and Officer Command College (OCC), both of which are courses available from the STARFLEET Academy.

Of course, chapter COs and XOs must also be members in good standing of STARFLEET. Keep in mind that membership processing can take 6-8 weeks, so someone who's about to become a CO or XO shouldn't wait until the last minute before submitting a renewal or new membership application!

The Change of Command form must be send to your Regional Coordinator and to the Chief of Operations. (The Ops copy must include photocopies of the OTS and OCC certificates for the new leader or leaders.) Please note that, while some versions of this form still say you must send the form to the Chief of Computer Operations, this is no longer required.

In the ages before starships roamed space, the US Navy required that each of its ships pass a series of tests or drills in order to become certified for sea duty. A Starship, Space Station, or other Vessel should also pass inspection before it is put into service. Each department and ultimately the entire

vessel can earn its certification.

This series of certifications is to be earned through the efforts of the entire crew of a STARFLEET Vessel (hereafter referred to as "Ship".) The purpose of this program is to combine the efforts of a crew taking Academy classes. In the past, members took classes individually for their own edification, receiving promotion points for earning each diploma. (OTS and OCC were the only Academy courses that affected the entire Vessel.) The VRCP is designed to provide a platform in which Fleet members can pool their diplomas for the good of the ship.

#### APPLICATION PACKET

The CO of the Vessel or a Designated Certification Officer should submit all applications for your Vessel. You may apply to the VRCP in three ways:

- 1. If you apply on the Academy application, a Certification Application Packet will be mailed or e-mailed to you
- 2. You may e-mail me directly **betazoid@mosquitonet.com** requesting an Application Packet.
- 3. Alternately, you may print out the VRCP applications by clicking on the hyperlinks online at: http://www.mosquitonet.com/~betazoid/vrcp.htm.

Return your Vessel Profile with your first Departmental Application. Return each Departmental Application with copies of required diplomas (hereafter called a "diploma packet.") and TWO FIRST CLASS STAMPS. When all of your departments are certified, submit the Vessel Readiness Certification application and copies of all the certifications. Include ONE FIRST CLASS STAMP.

### HOW IT WORKS & REQUIREMENTS:

Rather than one or two people taking all the classes, the entire STARFLEET crew will fulfill the requirements by submitting copies of diplomas from classes they took at STARFLEET Academy. (The VRCP does not administer its own exam.)

The ship can certify one or more departments at a time. Once all existing departments of a ship are certified, the ship will receive a STARFLEET Vessel Readiness

Certificate, which may be updated as conditions on the ship change.

Department Readiness Certificates include (Requirements are in parentheses):

- Command Readiness Certification (OTS, OCC, and choice of 1 diploma from EACH of any other TWO schools)
- Operations Readiness Certification (4 diplomas from College of Starship Operations)
- Security Readiness Certification (Choice of 4 diplomas from School of Strategy and Tactics, Security School)
- Tactical Readiness Certification (Choice of 4 diplomas from School of Strategy and Tactics, Security School)
- Engineering Readiness Certification (Choice of 4 diplomas from School of Engineering, College of Starship Operations)
- Science Readiness Certification (4 diplomas from Vulcan Academy of Science)
- Medical Readiness Certification (4 diplomas from Academy College of Medicine)
- Counselors Readiness Certification (4 diplomas from the Counselors' College)
- Chaplains Readiness Certification (Choice of 4 diplomas from Seminary [still being developed], Counselors College)
- Communications Readiness Cert. (Choice of 4 diplomas from College of Communications, College of Computer History, School of Language Studies, STARFLEET Officers' Radio School)
- Cadet Corps Readiness Certification (4 diplomas from any school. This is restricted to cadets or former cadets with cadet diplomas only.)
- Education-Recreation Readiness Cert. (Choice of 4 diplomas from College of History, School of Literature, School of Language Studies, School of Music, College of Trade & Commerce, Acrocademy)
- Diplomatic Corps Readiness Cert. (Choice of 4 diplomas from Klingon Warrior Academy, School of Cultural, Anthropology)
- Marine Strike Group Certification (Completion Confirmations for PD-10,

PD-20 and choice of two -10/-20 level courses in the Branch of the ship's MSG. If copies of the confirmations are not available, the CO or OIC of the MSG should submit a letter stating which courses have been completed.)

Other certificates may be created for unusual or combined ship operations.

Note: "Choice of 4 classes" followed by a list of schools means that the crew may take classes from any or all of the listed classes or schools. Commissioned Vessels with 10 or more STARFLEET personnel must submit FOUR diplomas for each department. Shuttles with 5 or more STARFLEET members but fewer than 10 must submit TWO diplomas for each department. Preshuttles with fewer than 5 STARFLEET members may submit ONE diploma for each department. Diplomas will be accepted from any campus (past, present, or future) of STARFLEET Academy.

#### **COMMON CONDITIONS**

- We Don't Have That Department: A vessel does not have to certify departments it does not have (due to lack of members or by design) in order to earn her STARFLEET Vessel Readiness Certificate. Your departments will be listed in your Vessel Profile.
- We Have A Combined Department: Combined departments may take half of their requirements from one department and the other half from the other department. (example: A combined Security-Tactical Department may choose two diplomas from the requirements for the Security Department and two diplomas from the requirements for the Tactical Department.)
- We Don't Have Enough Members In A Department: Diplomas may be submitted from members of ANY department to certify ANY department. If you only have one Medical Officer, diplomas may be used from other crewmembers to certify the Medical Department. This is a ship-wide effort, not a departmental effort.
- We Can't Earn That Many Diplomas! A required diploma may be used to fulfill more than one certification. The ship does not have to earn diplomas for any class more than once. Just re-submit the diploma for each relevant certification the ship is applying for. A good strategy is to collect all the copies of all the diplomas earned by your crew. Make about 3 copies of each. Lay them out according to department and mix

and match till you meet the requirements.

- Can I Send In Identical Diploma Packets For Two Departments? The diploma packet submitted for one department must differ by at least two classes (one class for shuttles and preshuttles) from the diploma packet in another application. For example: a ship may not apply for both the Security and the Tactical Certifications with the same four diplomas. Two diplomas for Tactical must differ from the diplomas for Security. (Shuttles and preshuttles differ by one.)
- One Or Two Officers Can Certify Most Of The Departments: Diplomas must be submitted from as many different members as possible. A Commissioned Vessel should have at least four different people working together to certify the ship. (A shuttle should have at least three and a preshuttle should have at least two.) Although some specialized departments (Medical, Security, Counselors, etc) might submit four diplomas from one person, if at all possible, diplomas should come from several members.
- What About Former Members? Diplomas must have been earned by a current member of the ship. The diploma is valid even if the member is no longer a STARFLEET International member. If you have a valuable former member, it might be advantageous to get that person back on the duty roster, even if only by correspondence.
- Is There A Time Limit On Diplomas? Diplomas may have been earned at any time in the past, by any current member of the ship, from any department. (If a current ship member earned a diploma in 1979, then it is valid, whether or not the person is a current STARFLEET member.)
- How Do We Update Our Certifications? A ship holding a STARFLEET Vessel Readiness Certification may update departmental certifications as crew rotates and new departments are formed. The ship does NOT have to start all over.

A shuttle that graduates to a commissioned Vessel may update its certifications by submitting the additional diplomas required for that department. Credit is given for any diplomas already in the Vessel's file.

• We Have Certified All Our Departments. Now What? Once all of your departments are certified, the CO or Designated Officer will submit copies of all Certifications along with the application for the Vessel Readiness Certification.

- 2. Applicant must have successfully completed, be in the process of completing, or be willing to complete (within 3 months) OTS, OCC, FOS and at least one other STARFLEET Academy course.
- 3. Applicant must have a good command of the English language.
- 4. Applicant must be at least 18 years old. (If under the age of 18, applicant must have permission of his/her parents or legal guardian).
- 5. Applicant must be able to relate, without prejudice, to all STARFLEET's members.
- 6. Applicant must be a fan of Star Trek.

As an Academy Director, duties would include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Receiving applications from potential students via postal and/or electronic mail
- 2. Recording and taking responsibility for safekeeping of income received

from students which will be sent to the Academy Commandant or his/her designated recipient.

- 3. Sending exam packets to students via postal and/or electronic mail.
- 4. Scoring exam packets which are returned to you.
- 5. Sending monthly reports (Income Director's and Reimbursement ) to the Academy Commandant or his/her designated recipient.
- 6. Fostering an overall positive attitude regarding your School and STARFLEET Academy.

# ACADEMY ACCESS CONSULTANT

I am physically challenged. I've had multiple sclerosis since 1970 and have been using a wheelchair since 1976. I went through college after becoming disabled and attended graduate school in a wheelchair. This was back in the 1970s when the world was not user friendly to the disabled. I have recently become hearing challenged, so I understand the obstacles encountered by those with hearing impairments.

I joined STARFLEET in 1993 and became the Chief Medical Officer of the USS Ari NCC-1723. Soon after joining, I started taking SFA courses. I had taken courses in several different schools, and had encountered some minor problems with some of the resource materials and requirements. In 1995 then-Academy Commandant, Bjo Trimble was looking for someone to evaluate SFA courses for accessibility to those with disabilities. In 1996 I started evaluating SFA courses as access consultant to SFA.

I have a Masters Degree in Special Education. I have lists of closedcaptioned Star Trek genre videos and Star Trek genre books that are available from the Talking Books Library in Braille or on tape. These videos and books would be appropriate sources for questions and answers on tests, for those who are hearing or visually challenged. Besides evaluating the tests for use by those who are hearing or visually challenged, I evaluate the tests for use by those who have physical or educational challenges and give the test a grade level.

When Academy Directors send me their tests, I include an evaluation of each test I receive, suggestions for improving tests or adding lower level tests, and the closed captioning & Talking Books lists in my evaluations. The tests that I evaluated in 1996 only needed minor changes. With most SFA materials available on the Internet, many tests will be more user-friendly to the disabled. 



The blood bank reported a tally of 143 units drawn over the two days, the second highest amount in the states history for a single drive and the largest ever in the city of Anchorage. And the final result? The Klingons had 6 more votes the Crystal Star - but the big winner was the Blood Bank!

# FROM USS EAGLE...

The Motto of the Office of Fleet Historian is simply "Memory is Fleeting, History is Eternal". It is the mission of this office to collect, preserves, analyze, and disseminate items and facts from our club's beginnings through today. Of the many different projects, which include the Short and Long Histories of Fleet, the Regional Genealogies, and the Communiqué' Archives, is this new project. Namely to select one chapter every other month, that has both survived and thrived throughout the tumultuous 26+ years of our club's histories. In addition, highlights and information on the newest descendant of that chapter will be included.

First of these will be the oldest continuously active chapter in STARFLEET, the USS Eagle from region 4. Her newest great great great great great great (etc) grand daughter is the USS Jaguar, the 1999 Shuttle of the Year, and the Region 5 Flagship.

The USS Eagle the Proud Grand Dame of the Fleet was launched in 1978, long before the shuttlecraft program. According to the records, the group was originally gathered together as the Outpost Sirius 9, the first California group to charter with what was then still called STARFLEET CENTRAL in 1976. This group chartered directly off the Central HQ which was at first called the USS Enterprise, which was the first chapter of STARFLEET.

The Eagle itself was commissioned on July 7th, 1978 in Fremont, California, under the command of Captain Joseph Allen. In order the following officers served as CO of the Eagle: Jack Fields, Eugene Craig, Dail Koehler, Bonnie Doran, and currently Captain Jerry Tien.

The Eagle also launched a few chapters, before and during the shuttle program.

A partial list includes the USS Defiance (pre-shuttle program), the Northern Lights, and the Onizuka.

The Defiance, as mentioned was commissioned before the shuttle program, and according to past Fleet Admiral Rob Lerman, they were already a collection of Star Trek fans in the Sacramento area, who had gathered together, and upon learning about STARFLEET from members of the USS Eagle at a local convention decided that they too HAD to be part of the greatest human adventure. Unfortunately the Defiance left fleet in 1995-6 during the McGinnis administration.

One of the most important Shuttles launched by the Defiance was the Shuttle and later full chapter the USS Simonov, still around today. The Simonov was at one time home of the Deputy Commandant of the SFMC, Brigadier General Rex Moffett, and was the ship was one of the primary sponsors of the 2000 STARFLEET West Coast Conference. The chapter has only had two CO's, 0/10/90 to 05/13/96 Vice Admiral Kim Lerman and 05/13/96 to Present Fleet Captain Pete Briggs. The Simonov has gained much notoriety as being the hunters of both the Regional Coordinator's Hat (sorry Ed) and the Regional Mascot, "Dinky" a stuffed Taco Bell Chihuahua. The USS Simonov shuttled off the Shuttle Atreides in the early 1990s. A sister ship of the Atreides was the Shuttle and later chapter USS Maud'Dib.

The Shuttle Atreides became the USS Atreides in 1992, and prospered in the Bay Area of California. One of the first shuttles to come off the Atreides was the Golden Gate, which commissioned as the USS Golden Gate, and here is where things get confusing. The Atreides under Captain Unicorn Escobedo and the Golden Gate under Captain David Nottage left Fleet in 1995 during the mass exodus of Region Four chapters following the removal of Admiral Janice Moore, by Fleet Admiral McGinnis. The then UFPI Golden Gate shuttled off the Shuttle Nexus, however it became quickly apparent that Golden Gate was unable to fulfill its responsibilities as a mother ship, and the Shuttle Nexus was passed off to the UFPI Atreides until its commissioning as the UFPI's Space Station Nexus under the command of then Captain Kurt Roithinger.

In 1996 the SS Nexus joined Starfleet

through the EFCP program, and shortly after the New Year, its CO, Kurt Roithinger was elected Regional Coordinator for Region 5. Kurt was also instrumental in drafting the current Constitution used by STARFLEET, with many checks and balances to prevent another Dictatorial Presidency.

In the spring of 1999, two members of the NEXUS, Rear Admiral Chris "Tigger" Wallace and Major General Scott A. Akers decided that northern Seattle needed a chapter that catered to the needs of their respective executive departments; the STARFLEET Starship Design Advisory Commission for Wallace, and the Office of Fleet Historian for Akers.

The crew of the Jaguar is composed of artists, animators (traditional and CG), fiction writers, storytellers, composers, researchers, technical draftsmen, layout artists, video production people, and web page designers. Their hobbies are many and varied, though we all have enough in common to make it an interesting blend of characters. Fiction writing is a major focus of the ship (and in fact, was one of the primary reasons for her creation).

The ship serves as both an International and a Regional "Think Tank," with a crew acknowledged as some of the top specialists in their fields. They have undertaken a number of projects dedicated to the betterment of STARFLEET and her members, and continue our endeavors to this day.

The Jaguar performs her "Fleet Think Tank" duties on the fictional level, as well. Home to the current Chairman of the STARFLEET Advanced Starship Design Bureau and to the Editors of Jane's Fleet Review, the Jaguar publishes a number of technical documents including Ships of the Star Fleet, STARFLEET Prototype, Dockyard Review, Jane's Fleet Review, and Ships of Earth. Many of these can be found on the publications page of ASDB.NET (http://www.asdb.net).

But technical publications are not all. Jaguar assisted in the production of the latest STARFLEET Membership Handbook, as well as the Region Five

Handbook and Region Five Uniform Guide.

Jaguar's senior officers work tirelessly for both STARFLEET and Region Five. Former Commanding Officer Chris Wallace was the current Editor of the STARFLEET Communiqué and is producing the best editions of that publication ever. And as Chairman of the ASDB, Admiral Wallace has produced dozens of technical publications. Former Executive Officer Scott A. Akers serves as the STARFLEET Historian and has worked tirelessly to document the history of the organization, as well as special projects like the Regional Chapter Lineages. Current CO and Stellar Cartographer Don Willits serve as the Ambassador for Region Five, as Director of Membership Processing.

The Jaguar travels within the Region, promoting STARFLEET and the Region itself. Officers have also traveled to events outside the Region and have provided support to other Regions and their chapters. Jaguar's dedicated to Community Service is no less. The ship sponsors a local Boy Scout's Explorer Computer Club, as well as funding local shelters and charities. Members of the Jaguar donated more than \$7,100 in 1999 to charities affiliated with fleet.

From Eagle to Jaguar, 23 years and counting and what a glorious 23 years, a History of the Giants in STARFLEET past and present, Fields, Lerman, Moore, Dyar, Roithinger, and Wallace; a Fleet Admiral, three Admirals, two Regional Coordinators, two Chiefs of Communications, one head of STARFLEET Academy, two Editors of the *Communiqué*, and even two STARFLEET Officer of the Year.

A fine tradition that is just starting.

### Captain Rahadyan Sastrowardoyo • USS Accord: "Star Trek: TNG: The Gorn Crisis" (Hardcover Graphic Novel)

In December 2000, DC/Wildstorm published *Star Trek: The Next Generation: The Gorn Crisis.* It's written by Kevin J. Anderson and Rebecca Moesta, a husband-and-wife team best known for several "Star Wars" and "X-Files" novels, and painted (not merely penciled and/or inked) by Igor Kordney.


The plot concerns what the Enterprise-E was up to during the Dominion War. Commander Riker and a Starfleet Corps of Engineers team is temporarily assigned to the crew of the Klingon vessel Gar'Tukh to enhance the defenses of a Federation outpost near Gorn territory.

Meanwhile, Picard and the Enterprise crew are at the Gorn homeworld when a coup d'etat by one faction

of Gorn warriors murders members of the Gorn Ruling Council to avenge the "defeat" of Gorns by the Federation nearly 109 years earlier in 2266 (see the TOS episode "Arena").

Picard leads an Away Team to the Gorn Council Chambers to assess the damage and the Enterprise comes under fire by a Gorn war fleet, which has been secretly constructed. Data is left in command of the Enterprise, while

Picard and the Away Team (including Dr. Crusher and Deanna Troi) are

"Arena") -- that has not been seen outside of the role playing games. Appended in the back of the novel is "The Gorn Dossier," artist Igor Kordney's

physiology (not seen since Eileen Palestine's 1977 Star Fleet Medical *Reference*, which is out of print), ethology, uniforms and government and social structures.

While, as Trek graphic novels go, I didn't like *The Gorn Crisis* as much as I did Chris Claremont's *Debt of Honor* from the early 90's or the adaptation of William Shatner's and Gar and Judith Reeves-Stevens's *The Ashes of Eden*, I thought it a worthy addition to the canon.

What might be offputting to the average Trek fan is the cost, which is \$29.95 in hardcover (though I've heard reports that you can get it on eBay and other auction sites for half the price) [You sure can. Heh Heh! - Editor]. It is hoped that a lower-priced version in trade paperback will be released by DC/Wildstorm by the end of 2001.

### FLEETCHAT: WHERE EVERY LIFEFORM KNOWS YOUR NICK!

Where in cyberspace can you meet up with STARFLEET members from around the globe? Where can you chat, swap jokes, find out STARFLEET information, and just generally have fun? Why Fleetchat of course! Fleetchat is an IRC network run by a consortium of STARFLEET members. While it is not an official arm of STARFLEET, Fleetchat provides a home to many STARFLEET related channels.

So what exactly is IRC? It stands for Internet Relay Chat and is a worldwide chat system. You can connect to an IRC network and talk to people from all over the world. All you need is a connection to the Internet and software known as a "client" to connect to IRC.

There are many freeware and shareware clients available to download. Once you have your client you select a network, connect, join a channel, and start chatting.

An IRC network consists of one of more "servers." You can join any server on a network and talk to people logged in on the same network, even if they are on different servers. However you can't chat with people on a different network. Some IRC networks are very large and very active with thousands of people logged in. It can make networks slow and difficult to connect to.

That's where Fleetchat comes in. STARFLEET has been a presence on various IRC networks for many years. About two years ago several members of STARFLEET who had been frequenting and running IRC channels on other networks recognized the need for a smaller, quieter, more permanent location. They pulled together resources, located a few computers and created Fleetchat, a permanent home for STARFLEET related chats, where members could

connect easily and not suffer the problems of more populated servers. But Fleetchat is not restricted to STARFLEET only. Non STARFLEET related channels (chat rooms) also exist, such as one devoted to discussion of the show Roswell and one for discussion of Urban Legends. A lot of diverse interests are represented on the Fleetchat network.

Now that I've gotten your attention, I'm sure you're interested in how to access Fleetchat and all the STARFLEET members (and others) who inhabit the channels. Here is a listing of the Fleetchat IRC Servers:


Set your connect time (if available) to 45-60 seconds. Then from there, just type: /join #starfleet

### LANGUAGE IN STAR TREK

As the series progressed language gained an increasing importance in the Star Trek universe. During Classic Trek the concept of language seemed to be limited to the Universal Translator, that device which would allow our heroes to easily talk to anyone, even if the species had never been known before. Klingons and Romulans spoke in perfect English (or whatever the actual language was that was conveniently being translated to English for us). It can be argued that the Federation spoke perfect 20th century English as its language, however, since Kirk, Spock, and McCoy had no problems conversing with Edith Keeler during "Guardian on the Edge of Forever" set in the 1930s in the United States. Vulcans apparently had their own language, though, and we learned a couple of words in it during the episode "Amok Time." Beyond that, Classic Trek gave us nothing from a language standpoint.

As Star Trek's Movie Era dawned, more attention was paid to languages and language differences between our characters. The first new Star Trek footage seen in years - the opening scenes of "Star Trek: The Motion Picture" - gave us our new Klingons speaking in Klingon, complete with convenient subtitles! Some minutes later we had confirmation that Vulcans indeed had their own language when we saw Spock on Vulcan speaking with the Vulcan Kolinar Masters.

The movies continued to give us a polyglot galactic culture as they went on. Paramount went so far as to hire language expert Mark Okrand to design an actual Klingon language for the race, which has been used, off and on, ever since. Evidence continued to mount, however, that 20th century English was the dominant language in the Federation. This is supported not only by the fact that the Enterprise crew had no language difficulties to speak of during "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," but Kirk and Spock also seem to be familiar with the 20th century English language writers Harold Robbins and Jacqueline Suzanne, whom they referred to as "giants" of literature.

With "Star Trek: The Next Generation" the show gave us the best treatment of language yet. While it was still obvious that the overriding language in the Federation was 20th century English, which all humans and most aliens appeared to speak, we found out that other human languages had indeed survived. This revelation came to me

for glossing over the complexities of different languages. Between the fact that the show was meant for English speaking audiences and the circuitry of the universal translator we can understand why 99% of the time all we heard was 20th century English spoken. We, as members of STARFLEET: The International Star Trek Fan Association,

in full force one episode when those of us listening closely very clearly heard Capt. Picard swear...in French! He used a word that I'd never heard uttered on American TV before or since (although I have heard it on Canadian TV), nor can I comfortably put it on the pages of our illustrious journal. To this day I marvel that the word got past the censors. I think it speaks volumes to the notion that, certainly in the United States, only English in important.

Who also can forget the TNG episode "Darmok," where Picard had to try to communicate with an alien that not only didn't speak English but had a fundamentally different idea of communication? This episode is one of the favorites of the series!

TV shows are meant for entertainment purposes, and perhaps under that reasoning we can forgive Star Trek however, may not have that luxury.

### LANGUAGE IN STARFLEET

I attended the virtual STARFLEET New Year's Eve party on December 31, 2000 as we said goodbye not only to an old century but an old STARFLEET administration as well. Never had the far-flung internationalism of STARFLEET made such an impact on me. Never had the parochialism of my own area been made more apparent, either. Here we were in a chatroom that was, by definition, nowhere, and yet wherever we were we were counting down to the start of the new century... using Eastern Standard Time. Mike Smith would step down and Les Rickard would rise up to Fleet Admiral at midnight... Eastern Standard Time. I found that profoundly silly.

STARFLEET perochiolism doesn't stop

with just its sense of time. While we bill ourselves as STARFLEET: The International Fan Association, it must be recognized that STARFLEET is very largely a United States organization. It is almost completely an English language organization. Can we change this stance? Should we?

In order for STARFLEET to become a real, true, international fan association, and in order for us to tap into the vast potential market we may have outside of English speaking countries, we need to solve what is affectionately known as "The Language Problem." Simply put, much of the planet speaks in ways that the vast majority of the planet cannot understand. This is not a new problem, of course, but because of the shrinking of the planet due to communications technologies it's a problem that's becoming more and more apparent. The walls of distances have nearly vanished. Now we have to deal with the walls of understanding.

Very little progress has realistically been made in solving the language problem because most people certainly in the United States - already believe they speak the "international language." They are wrong. One hundred years ago French was thought of as the "international language." The French, of course, understandably liked it that way and fought to keep it that way. World War II and the rise of the United States in international affairs replaced French with English as the "king of languages" and for the last fifty years it is the English language that has enjoyed this status. With the rise of the Internet and the World Wide Web many thought that English was set as "the international language." They were wrong.

In 1995 English, which was never the number one language in terms of people who spoke it, went from second place to fifth place. Today, with the economic rise of the Pacific Rim, forward looking people can see Mandarin Chinese not only locking in its place as the most used language, but also the "king of languages" in terms of economic power. So, what do we do about this besides starting to take classes in Chinese? Don't laugh. Everyone learning someone else's

language is one of the two answers I was. we realistically have available to us. The other, I think better, answer is for everyone to learn the same second language, a language that is not attached currently to any religion, any culture, or any land: an artificial or planned language.

The issue is that if we make a current ethnic language the international language than a percentage of people automatically gain a huge advantage over the rest of the world. If you're one of the lucky ones, great, but if not, well, too bad. If an artificial language is developed we have a chance to actually create a reasonable grammar that follows its own rules and create a language that puts everyone on an even playing field.

Artificial or planned languages are not unknown to science fiction and fantasy fans. JRR Tolkien developed the Elvish Quenyan language before he wrote "The Lord of the Rings." As I mentioned above, Mark Okrand developed Klingon for Paramount for Star Trek. While both languages have their fans, of course, neither of them were made to actually facilitate communication among people.

One of the best answers to the problem of actually creating a language to allow people to communicate with each other was developed in 1887. In that year Dr. L.L. Zamenhof published the language called Esperanto. Today Esperanto has over two million speakers, several orders of magnitude more than any other artificial language ever created, but, of course, several orders of magnitude less than most natural languages such as Chinese, English, or French.

#### THE ADVANTAGES OF **ESPERANTO**

I took French for three years in High School. It was my worst subject. I left High School after three years thinking I had no talent for languages. Now, twenty years after leaving French, I have an equivalent fluency in Esperanto after three weeks study. A small group of officers and friends of USS Accord are currently teaching themselves Esperanto and have moved to the point where, with the help of an online dictionary, they can converse via email with each other totally in that language.

How does Esperanto achieve this amazing success rate? One of its secrets is its amazingly regular grammar. For example, in English we have the great verb, "to be." We end up saying things with this word like:

I am. I will be.

Hmmmm. Those words are the same verb, but they're all different and none of them even look like "be." Compare that to the Esperanto word "to be" which is "esti." In this case the above sentences are:

Mi estis. Mi estas. Mi estos.

Nice pattern, huh? The suffixes of -is for past tense, -as for present tense, and -us for future tense apply for every single verb in the language with no exceptions.

While you may have to read Shakespeare in the original Klingon to appreciate it, much more than that is currently available to read in Esperanto. La Biblio (The Bible) is available online, for example. My personal goal is to be able to read "La Kunularo de l'Ringoj" (The Fellowship of the Ring) before the movie comes out this Christmas.

It doesn't stop there for us Star Trek fans. In the mid 60s a film was produced in Esperanto called "The Incubus." The Sci-Fi channel has restored it and plans to sell it soon. It stars - believe it or not - William Shatner, right before he took his role as Captain Kirk in a short-lived cult TV series called Star Trek.

Esperanto gives you the ability to read international literature in the first person. It allows you to try to understand people across the world in their own words without the need of a translator. Learning Esperanto puts you on equal ground with every other Esperanto speaker, regardless of your own language, both of you have made an equal effort to understand the other. Such overtures between people is what peace is made of.

### THE ADVANTAGE OF ESPERANTO FOR STARFLEET

Region 9 both suffers the worst of "the language problem" and could be the best helped by the addition of Esperanto to STARFLEET's arsenal. Region 9, of course, has more languages in it than any other active Fleet Region we have. Even now Region 9 is recruiting for a Chief Translator. Coincidentally, Region 9 is also where a significant percentage of Esperanto speakers currently live. It is possible we might make some inroads with regard to recruitment in that area, for example, by using Esperanto within STARFLEET.

How might we do this? First we have to make some sort of determination of the Esperanto expertise we have within the Fleet. I'd be especially interested in knowing where that expertise is in R9 for example. Then, probably working under the auspices of STARFLEET's Translation Office (yes, we do have one!) we'd want to start some translation efforts of our own. We'd probably begin by translating some promotional materials into Esperanto, eventually translating the Membership Handbook. People we gain to STARFLEET in this manner would then be able to assist in any such translations and we'd have a better idea how profitable and practical such an idea is.

I wish to state that I am not advocating making Esperanto the official language of STARFLEET. That would be silly. However, I am saying that by making overtures in this manner we stand the gain a more international audience for our international fan association while at the same time exposing the members we already have to another culture and way of thinking in our own world that may be as alien as anything we might think to find on Vulcan. Part of Star Trek was about helping the human race reach for the stars by showing that cooperation was possible between our nations. That dream gave us our first major Black TV character as well as a Russian Ensign portrayed well in the middle of the Cold War. Here may be one way for STARFLEET to build on that great dream.


Scott: For one I am a certificated Parliamentarian

I looked up at the sign that read "STARFLEET Helpdesk" and the doors hissed open. The office was aglow with light from the bank of monitors on two of the walls. Hustling in before getting caught in the doors, I noticed the very busy form of Commodore Greg Trotter, Senior Vice Chief of Communications and member of the USS Nomad, waving his hand in an arc for me to come around behind the massive datastation... I was amazed at the array of buttons, switches, EZ Bake oven, cool blinking lights and wet bar! As I settled down in one of the proffered chairs, I took out my PADD and thumbed the REC switch.

#### Gumby: Greg, thanks for the tour!

**Greg**: Welcome aboard! We've put a lot of work into this, and I think that Fleet's really going to appreciate what we do.

### Gumby: Greg, what is the Helpdesk and what does it do?

Greg: Well, the Helpdesk is one-stop shopping for any customer service need a member may have. We at the Helpdesk take questions on any Fleet topic, and if we can't answer it, we will find the people who can. And, we follow up on each and every request to make sure that questions get answered, and problems get resolved.

### Gumby: Wouldn't that detract from using the SFI Chain of Command for problem solving?

Greg: Well, we don't intend to get in the way of anyone in the chain of command that is working to resolve a problem a member may have. Indeed, we have had many COs that are using the Helpdesk to resolve problems for their crew. They seem to appreciate the ownership the Helpdesk staff takes in every problem. That's why every member certainly has the right to contact STARFLEET directly on customer service matters, and we intend to help them anyway we can.

the helpdesk is by sending an email to <helpdesk@sfi.org>. Members should be as detailed as they can be about the problem. That email address actually goes directly into our Helpdesk database, is assigned a tracking number, and the member gets a reply within minutes.

Greg: If you don't have email access, you are certainly not beyond sight of the Helpdesk! You can call (507) 299-2015 and leave a voicemail message for us. Remember to be detailed, and let us know how we can contact you! Also, you can send a fax to that same number!

### Gumby: Some may think that this is just another layer of bureaucracy, what would you say to them?

Greg: I'll just point to the results: we have been able to turn around many problems in just a few hours. We can do this because we have the buy-in from all the EC departments to utilize this system. The Helpdesk isn't just more red tape... often, it can be the scissors that help you cut through the red tape.

### Gumby: What was the first problem sent to the Helpdesk and how was it resolved?

Greg: The first problem was actually some feedback someone had posted to the sfi.org web page. The person writing was a Star Trek fan in England, and

Having worked in Comm and CompOps, I know how things can get confused when that happens.

Greg: Yes! That's the beauty of the Helpdesk system. The member has a tracking number that is unique to his or her problem. It's something that will allow us to reconstruct the correspondence, and will allow us to tell a member exactly the status of their problem! In addition to your ticket, 37 other tickets have been opened in the first three weeks of the STARFLEET Helpdesk. Over half have been closed. And most of those are new requests submitted in the last few days. The rest are longer problems that take some research... but the Helpdesk facilitates the member's involvement in the process, so they can know exactly what's been done!

### Gumby: Greg, that is fantastic! Any other notable success stories?

Greg: There is a new member in Hawaii that had not received his packet or any *Communiqués*. He mentioned his extreme displeasure to his RC. The RC worked with the Helpdesk, and within hours this new member received a phone call from a member of the Helpdesk, and everything was resolved to the satisfaction of the new member! He's excited about being in STARFLEET again, and we're proud of that!





### STARFLEET'S FIFTH BRIGADE IN ACTION!

The interest in our STARFLEET Marine Corps (SFMC) has increased tremendously in the past few years. I believe that more than six hundred members of STARFLEET now consider themselves active or reservist members of the SFMC. ### ON THE HUMANOID CONDITION

In continuing the series on the humanoid condition, I'd like to delve a little deeper into the state of humanity by discussing the role of Homo sapiens terra in the animal Order of Primates (this discussion will be based upon an evolutionary theory but in no way serves to express the opinions of the lecturer, STARFLEET, or in any way is meant to favor evolutionary versus creationist doctrine).

Primates refers to the Order Primates within the Class of Mammals (Mammalia) within the Phylum Chordata (chordate animals) that includes the monkeys, apes, and man. Primates evolved from arboreal insectivores approximately 130 million years ago (during the Cretaceous Period - it was during this Period that the mass-extinction of dinosaurs occurred). Primates are characterized by the following characteristics: - the presence of thumbs and big toes that are opposable (i.e. capable of facing and touching the other digits of the hands and feet), thus allowing for manual dexterity and manipulation of objects and forward-facing eyes which allow for binocular vision (i.e. the ability to produce a focused image of the same object simultaneously on the retinas of both eyes, thus permitting threedimensional or "stereoscopic vision" and depth perception).

The brain of Primates, particularly the cerebrum (i.e. that part of the brain responsible for the integration of sensory

and neural functions, the learning process, the maintenance of short and long term memory) is relatively large and welldeveloped, accounting for the intelligence and quick reaction of these mammals [notation: it is held in theory and in biologic evidence from tissue sample that the complexity of neural processing is proportional to the surface area of the gray matter of the neural tissue - gray matter refers to the non-myelinated areas of the brain which are the cell bodies of the neurons responsible for processing sensory inputs and motor outputs; analysis of brain tissue reveals that species known to have intelligence as we know it are characterized by significant infolding of the brain surface, thus greatly increasing the surface area and hence the number of neurons capable of complex sensori-motor processing.

Primates typically produce offspring singly and the offspring undergo a prolonged period of growth and development into the adult form. The majority of primates live in social groupings (some prosimians live in alone).

Primates in general share some common skeletal and dental characteristics as well - generally (particularly among the higher primates such as apes and man) the dental structures are organized with four classifications of teeth - molars, premolars (or bicuspids), cuspids (or canine teeth), and incisors. [Note: Homo sapiens terra is characterized to be in adult stage by having

32 teeth in the natural dentition - 12 molars (including the wisdom teeth), 8 bicuspids, 4 cuspids, and 8 incisors].

Primates can be subclassified into two forms: - anthropoids (human beings, apes, and monkeys) and prosimians (aye-ayes, galagos, lemurs, lorises, pottos, and tarsiers; some scientists classify tree shrews among primates as prosimians).

Within the anthropoid subclassification, one can include: - five major groups of apes - bonobos, chimpanzees, gibbons, gorillas, and orangutans (gibbons, the smallest apes, are referred to as lesser apes; bonobos, chimpanzees, gorillas, and orangutans are referred to as great apes) - approximately 200 species of monkeys, which can be classified into New World monkeys (Central and South American species) and Old World monkeys (African and Asian species); typically, New World monkeys have nostrils spaced widely apart, have 36 teeth, are typically arboreal (live in trees) and grasp objects with their tails, while the nostrils of Old World monkeys are close together, these monkeys have 32 teeth (similar to apes), are typically grounddwellers (although some are arboreal) and do not grasp objects with their tails. New World monkeys include marmosets and tamarins, and other species (including capuchins, douroucoulis, howlers, spider monkeys, squirrel monkeys, woolly monkeys, and woolly spider monkeys). Old World Monkeys include baboons,

colobus monkeys, guenons, langurs, and macaques.

Generally, apes and monkeys can be distinguished by several characteristics: - most monkeys have tails, while apes do not - the great apes are much larger and have longer fingers and toes - on the ground, bonobos, chimpanzees, and gorillas (and orangutans and gibbons less often) walk in a semiupright posture, supporting the front part of their bodies on their knuckles, while monkeys typically walk on all-fours and often use their tails for locomotion.

The next two articles in the series will explore (in order): - a closer look at anthropoid species (apes and monkeys) and a closer look at the prosimian species (The articles will discuss classification, physical characteristics including skeletal and dental classification, and evolutionary theory).

## **SPACE SHUTTLE CHALLENGER: 15 YEARS LATER**

If there is one special day that I will never forget in my life, that day would be JANUARY 28, 1986. It was the day before my fifth birthday and I was so happy to turn five the very next day. Thousand of miles away from my location, the Space Shuttle Challenger was about to embark on its twenty-fifth space shuttle mission in space. What's special about this mission is that for the very first, an American civilian will take her place among the stars. The civilian to make history was a New Hampshire teacher by the name of Christa McAuliffe.

The actual launch had been delayed five times due to bad weather. In fact, January 28th was the coldest day that NASA had ever launched a shuttle. The time had finally come at 11:38 AM Eastern Standard Time and the Challenger left Pad 39B at Cape Kennedy. Seventy-three seconds into the flight, the Challenger exploded right before our eyes. The cause was due to the failure of the right SRB aft joint sealing, most likely due to the extremely cold temperature on the morning of January 28, 1986. Out of the two SRBs or Solid Rocket Boosters that were used. the one that was in the extreme cold was the one that failed. O-rings when they are cold do not move as quickly as ones that are warm. Therefore if the O-rings were nearly frozen in place during ignition, the gases burnt the O-rings and produced the black smoke. Challenger left the launch pad and headed for space. During flight the O-rings continued to not seal the joint, and the gases leaked through the aft field joint. The flame grew larger and later blew Challenger up. This event that unfolded in front of our eyes will always be remembered in the space program. This is one of the most significant events of the 1980's and the 20th Century as billions of people around the world saw the accident firsthand on television and empathized with any one of the seven crewmembers killed. This special report is a dedication to the Shuttle Challenger crew who has made the journey above and beyond the call of duty.

The crew of STS-51-L was like a real life representation of the Enterprise crew of Star Trek. It was a cross-section of the American population in the ways of race, gender, geography, background, and religion. In fact, they were one of the

the history of the US Space Program.

The commander of STS-51-L was Francis R. Scobee. He was born on May 19, 1939 in Cle Elum, Washington. He enlisted in the US Air Force, training as a reciprocating engine mechanic but longing to fly. During his tenure in the Air Force, he received a B.S. degree in Aerospace Engineering from the University of Arizona in which made it possible for him to receive his officer's commission. He received his pilot wings in 1966 and began a series of flying

he worked as a test pilot for the Navy, flying 28 different types of aircraft and logging more than 4,300 hours of flying time. Smith was selected as a NASA astronaut in May 1980, and a year later, after completing further training,

he received an assignment as a Space Shuttle pilot, the position he occupied aboard Challenger. This mission was his first space flight. Judith A. Resnik was one of three on April 5, 1949 at Akron, Ohio. Brought

assignments with the Air Force. He was a test pilot who flew more than 45 types of aircraft, logging more than 6,500 hours of flight time. In 1978, Scobee entered NASA's astronaut corps and was the pilot of STS-41-C. He was married to June Kent in 1966 and had two children.

The pilot was CDR Michael J. Smith, USN. He was born on April 30, 1945 in Beaufort, South Carolina. He had been educated at the US Naval Academy, class of 1967, and received his M.S. in Aeronautical Engineering from the Naval Post Graduate School in 1968. From there he underwent aviator training at Kingsville, Texas, and

up in the Jewish religion, Resnik was educated in public schools before attending Carnegie-Mellon University, where she received a B.S. in electrical engineering in 1970, and the University of Maryland, where she took at Ph.D. in the same field in 1977. Resnik worked in a variety of professional positions with the RCA corporation in the early 1970s and as a staff fellow with the Laboratory of Neurophysiology at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, between 1974 and 1977. Selected as a NASA astronaut in January 1978, the first cadre containing women, Resnik underwent the training program for Shuttle mission specialists during the next year. Resnik was the second

very first diverse Space Shuttle crews in received his wings in May 1969. Later American woman in orbit during the flight of Discovery, STS-41-D, between August 30 and September 5, 1984. During this mission she helped to deploy three satellites into orbit; she was also involved in biomedical research during the mission. Afterward, she began intensive training for the STS-51-L mission on which she was killed.

> Ronald E. McNair was the second of three mission specialists aboard Challenger. Born on October 21, 1950 in Lake City, South Carolina. He achieved early success in the segregated public schools he attended as both a student and an athlete. Valedictorian of his high school class, he attended North Carolina A&T State University where in 1971 he received a B.S. degree in physics. He went on to study physics at MIT, where he specialized in quantum electronics and laser technology, completing his Ph.D. in 1977. As a student he performed some of the earliest work on chemical HF/DF and high pressure CO lasers, publishing path-breaking scientific papers on the subject. McNair met and married Cheryl B. Moore of Brooklyn, New York, and they later had two children. After completing his Ph.D. he began working as a physicist at the Optical Physics Department of Hughes Research Laboratories in Malibu, California, and conducted research on electro-optic laser modulation for satellite-to-satellite communications. This research brought McNair in contact with the space program, and when the opportunity presented itself he applied for astronaut training. In January 1978 NASA selected him to enter the astronaut cadre, one of the first three African Americans selected. McNair became the second African American in space between February 3 and 11, 1984, by flying on the Challenger Shuttle mission STS-41-B. During this mission McNair operated the maneuverable arm built by Canada used to move payloads in space. The 1986 mission on which he was killed was his second Shuttle flight.

> Ellison S. Onizuka, was the last of the three mission specialists. He had been born in Kealakekua, Kona, Hawaii, on June 24, 1946. He attended the University of Colorado, receiving B.S. and M.S. degrees in engineering in June and December 1969, respectively. While at the university he married Lorna Leido

Yoshida of Hawaii, and the couple eventually had two children. He also participated in the Air Force R.O.T.C. program, leading to a commission in January 1970. Onizuka served on active duty with the Air Force until January 1978 when he was selected as a NASA astronaut. With the Air Force in the early 1970s he was an aerospace flight test engineer at the Sacramento Air Logistics Center. After July 1975 he was assigned to the Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards Air Force Base, California, as squadron flight test officer and later as chief of the engineering support section. When Onizuka was selected for the astronaut corps he entered into a one-year training program and then became eligible for assignment as a mission specialist on future Space Shuttle flights. He worked on orbiter test and checkout teams and launch support crews at the Kennedy Space Center for the first two Shuttle missions. Since he was an Air Force officer on detached duty with NASA, Onizuka was a logical choice to serve on the first dedicated Department of Defense classified mission. He was a mission specialist on STS-51-C, taking place 24-27 Jan. 1985 on the Discovery orbiter. The Challenger flight was his second Shuttle mission.

The last two members of the Challenger crew were not officially Federal government employees. Gregory B. Jarvis, a payload specialist, worked for the Hughes Aircraft Corp.'s Space and Communications Group in Los Angeles, California, and had been made available for the Challenger flight by his company. Jarvis had been born on August 24, 1944, in Detroit, Michigan. He had been educated at the State University of New York at Buffalo, receiving a B.S. in electrical engineering in 1967; at Northeastern University, Boston, where he received an M.S. degree in the same field in 1969; and at West Coast University, Los Angeles, where he completed coursework for an M.S. in management science in 1973. Jarvis began work at Hughes in 1973 and served in a variety of technical positions until 1984 when he was accepted into the astronaut program under Hughes' sponsorship after competing against 600 other Hughes employees for the opportunity. Jarvis' duties on the Challenger flight had revolved around gathering new information on the design of liquidfueled rockets.

The last member of the crew was Sharon Christa McAuliffe, the first teacher to fly in space. Selected from among more than 11,000 applicants from the education profession for entrance into the astronaut ranks, McAuliffe had been born on September 2, 1948. As a youth she registered excitement over

the Apollo moon landing program, and wrote years later on her astronaut application form that "I watched the Space Age being born and I would like to participate." McAuliffe attended Framingham State College in her hometown, graduating in 1970. A few weeks later she married her longstanding boyfriend, McAuliffe. They stayed in the Washington DC area for the next eight years, she teaching and completing an M.A. from Bowie State University, in Maryland. They moved to Concord, New Hampshire where Christa took a teaching post at Concord High School in 1982, and in 1984 learned about NASA's efforts to locate an educator to fly on the Shuttle. The intent was to find a gifted teacher who could communicate with students from space. NASA selected McAuliffe for this position in the summer of 1984 and in the fall she took a year-long leave of absence from teaching, during which time NASA would pay her salary, and trained for an early 1986 Shuttle mission. She had an immediate rapport with the media, and the teacher in space program received tremendous attention as a result. It is in part because of the excitement over McAuliffe's presence on the Challenger that the accident had such a significant impact on the nation.

The legacy of space shuttle Challenger lives on today. Even though it has been fifteen years since the event occurred, the imagination of space flight fuels me even to this day. When that event occurred, I not only cried because it was so tragic but it was the day I started my journey to learn all about space exploration in general. I studied the Space Shuttle mission so much that I wanted to attend U.S. Space Camp when I was young. After years of hoping, I finally attended the ADVANCED SPACE ACADEMY at U.S. Space Camp on April 4, 1999. While there, they had a life-size replica of the Space Shuttle in Space Shuttle Park. At the end of the park, there was a big rock with a plaque on it. The park was dedicated to the crew of Challenger STS-51-L. Also, there was one souvenir I had to take home in which I had made a promise at age 11 to get while attending Space Camp. That was the Space Shuttle Challenger crew patch. To this day, I have the patch on my flight suit, forever remembering this special crew. So, whenever I go back to Space Camp; put on my ASA Flight suit to remember the times; or go back to Challenger Center; I will always remember the day of January 28, 1986 because for me it will forever be "The Day I Discovered The Final Frontier".

This is my dedication to the crew of the space shuttle Challenger and I SALUTE YOU ALL!



# STARFLEET COMMUNIQUE LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



To The Editor:

My name is Anthony Wynn (Vice Admiral Wxyn, Retired) and I would like to respectfully take a bit of exception with the following paragraph, which appears on the USS Tanagra site detailing STARFLEET History, and apparently, has been printed in other STARFLEET materials:

VADM Stillwell, though serving as the Vice Chief of Personnel, was also believed to be serving as the Chief of Communications under the name of VADM T. Wxyn. VADM Stillwell definitely had control of the STARFLEET media and his "Mandate" continually called for members to "start doing, making and requesting" and mainly to get involved! Eric Stillwell was quickly making STARFLEET a "members" organization which won him great popularity throughout the Fleet. His fight was against the "bureaucracy which had devoured efficiency and effectiveness"...

I would like to assure the USS Tanagra and STARFLEET that I certainly indeed did serve a term as STARFLEET's first Vulcan Chief of Communications following the turnover of the fleet command to Admiral Stillwell. Prior to my promotion, I served under then Commodore Eric Stillwell as First Officer on our ship based out of Eugene, Oregon.

And later, the history further reads--

...Another problem that had raised its head was Trek International. This organization, barely days old, rode on the coat tails of the ill STARFLEET. More interestingly, Trek International was being set up and run by several members of Stillwell's own Executive Committee. Their approach at getting their group started was to undermine STARFLEET and recruit members and chapters from our own ranks...

I resigned from STARFLEET to become the Commanding Admiral of the new Trek International, based in San Antonio, Texas. True enough, many of the members came from within the ranks of STARFLEET and wanted to join a viable, operating organization -- although we did recruit many members who had never before been involved in any fleet-based organizations. At it's peak, Trek International boasted some 30 ships internationally and membership of over 1000 personnel. However, after several years of operation, Trek International was disbanded and it's ships were folded back into STARFLEET.

Thanks for this opportunity to correct a little bit of history! I appreciate your help in this matter. Perhaps one day I'll be able to attend a STARFLEET gathering to socialize a bit with other fleet officers!



# NOTES ON STARFLEET RANKS & ORGANIZATION

#### **INTRODUCTION:**

This essay was originally written to provide a full historical and fictional basis for ranks and positions as used in the U.S.S. Columbia. It has been revised slightly and is offered here as a model for other chapters to follow, should they choose to do so.

The individual reader's opinion may vary, of course--this is merely one officer's interpretation of the fictional Starfleet as seen in the various Star Trek television series and feature films. Much of the material in this essay is deliberately skewed toward traditional naval terminology, as opposed to the blander modern phrasing. It is understood that many people's interpretations of Star Trek and its setting are less militaristic in tone, and may prefer wordings that shun the 'barbaric' militarism of Earth's past. Certainly there is no reason that a "gunner's mate" could not be called a "phaser specialist" -- and indeed, some examples from the Trek canon point more in that direction. On the other hand, the author is an unabashed devotee of naval history and literature, and is very much a subscriber to Nicholas Meyer's version of Star Trek (as seen in the two feature films he directed, The Wrath of Khan and The Undiscovered Country)--the ultimate extension of Gene Roddenberry's phrase "Horatio Hornblower in space."

The essay is written from the common fictional Starfleet point-of-view. In most circumstances, the term "Specialist" is understood to refer to a petty officer (enlisted) while a "Technician" refers to a warrant officer. Also note that the 'paygrades' in the higher officer ranks are given both in their traditional versions and those included in the current STARFLEET Membership Handbook--i.e., Fleet Captain as O-7.

#### I. RANKS

Rank in Starfleet is a means of determining command authority and organization.  $Unlike\ past\ military\ organizations, Starfleet$ does not insist upon rank as an indication of social status: enlisted personnel are not in any way considered socially inferior to officers. It is true that higher-ranking personnel tend to enjoy slightly greater privileges than lower-ranking ones; however, the differences are at best trivial. Any individual in Starfleet service is accorded the same basic privileges of shelter, sustenance, and clothing as well as recreational opportunities. Where no other extenuating circumstances exist, greater privileges are often extended to higherranking officers as recognition for service and responsibility. However, personal need

is an equally- (if not greater) important determining factor. It is common for a enlisted crewmember with accompanying dependents to be assigned as much living space as an admiral with no dependents (it is telling that any admiral would without hesitation agree that an enlisted man with a wife and two children be billeted to spacious multiroom quarters while he himself occupied a modest stateroom). The consistent reduction of the social importance of material gain over the last four centuries have eliminated most such boundaries. It is worth noting that higherranking officers who do receive greater privileges universally have far more pressing and long-lasting commitments than junior enlisted crew.

Starfleet is a truly meritocratic organization. Any capable Federation citizen may apply for an appointment to Starfleet Academy; the only barrier lies in the competitive nature of the entrance examinations (it has always been imperative that Starfleet's leaders be those proven most capable of the extraordinary mental and emotional demands of command at space). Promotions in rank are based on an individual's capability first, with seniority in grade as a secondary consideration. The system of service ranks and promotions within Starfleet serve primarily as an accurate and easily-understood system of measuring an individual's abilities and experience. Unlike military organizations of Earth's past, in which the legal authority to command was often acquired as much through political connections and material wealth as through proven ability and dedicated service, the legal authority of Starfleet officers is understood to be inextricably bound to an individual's suitability to wield such authority. The extraordinary power and capabilities of modern starships, with their potential to enact social and political change on an interstellar scale, demands nothing less.

Crewman Recruit (CR), Grade E-1, is the lowest rank within Starfleet. Recruits are those who have newly joined the space service and are undergoing basic training at one of several facilities throughout Federation space. Recruits are never assigned active duty in starships or stations.

Crewman Apprentice (CA), Grade E-2, is the rank held primarily by those in technical training programs prior to deep-space assignments. These programs are conducted at service schools in various locations, many of them part of the Starfleet Academy campus in San Francisco on Earth. Graduates of these schools are frequently promoted to the next grade,

although it is common for CAs to serve in training vessels on space duty prior to promotion. During the Dominion War, the need for large numbers of personnel often resulted in CAs being posted to active starship duty on front-line vessels.

Crewman (CN), Grade E-3. Crewmen-often referred to as 'able crewmen' in the old naval tradition--are fully-trained and qualified to perform basic duties in starship and stations. It is worth noting that the basic astronautic training required for advancement to the rate of Crewman exceeds in most ways that given to twentieth-century astronauts. At this level, the first degree of specialization in the ranks occurs. All crewmen are assigned to one of several major subdivisions according to their basic duties--Administration/ Logistics, Operations/Engineering, and Sciences/Medical (corresponding to the three color-codes used in Starfleet uniforms). After gaining sufficient experience in their chosen occupational field, Crewmen are usually rated as 'strikers'--petty officers in training--for a particular specialty.

Petty Officer Third Class (PO3), Grade E-4. Since the days of sail, petty officers have been the basic element in the shipboard chain-of-command. Specialists in a particular occupational field, they supervise crewmen in their duties. The highest level of specialization in Starfleet occurs at this level: all petty officers have a particular rating which indicates their field of expertise, such as boatswain's mate, medical technician, or yeoman. Any third-class petty officer is understood to have a mastery of at least the fundamental skills in his or her field.

Petty Officer Second Class (PO2), Grade E-5. Second-class petty officers are given slightly greater responsibility, and accordingly have greater abilities and experience than their third-class counterparts. They are generally assigned similar duties, but are more frequently given individual responsibility by their seniors.

Petty Officer Third Class (PO1), Grade E-6. Petty officers at this level are highly skilled and experienced, and frequently assist officers by overseeing large numbers of crewmen at their daily duties.

Chief Petty Officer (CPO), Grade E-7. Chief Petty Officers are frequently considered the backbone of Starfleet. They are masters of their trades, and possess initiative and sobriety sufficient to give them authority over major tasks requiring the effort of numerous crewmen. Where commissioned officers have broad responsibility for general areas of starship operations, CPOs coordinate and supervise day-to-day activities.

Senior Chief Petty Officer (SCPO), Grade E-8. Senior Chiefs are CPOs of greater experience and knowledge. Usually possessed of over a decade's service, Senior Chiefs can be relied upon by commissioned officers to faithfully and efficiently carry out almost any task, often supervising scores of junior petty officers and crewmen.

Master Chief Petty Officer (MCPO), Grade E-9. The Master Chief is very much that-an undisputed master of his trade, with indispensable wisdom and experience to his credit. Senior commissioned officers know that Master Chiefs can manage any important task, and value their counsel immeasurably. Junior officers know that although their commissions grant them authority over Master Chiefs, a Master Chief's advice is as close to a divine truth as can be found in the space service. The most capable Master Chiefs are assigned as Command Master Chiefs, the senior noncommissioned adviser to a captain.

Midshipman is the title held by studentofficers at Starfleet Academy. Often erroneously referred to as 'cadets', midshipmen are distinguished in holding legal command authority as junior line officers (traditional military cadets had no such authority and were not legally entitled to issue orders). Those midshipmen engaged in undergraduate studies are unofficially styled 'cadet midshipmen', which title is often given as 'cadet'. Upon completing their academic requirements, midshipmen must then complete field studies in which they serve as junior officers in starships and stations. Only upon successful completion of these assignments may they graduate the Academy and be commissioned as Ensigns.

Warrant Officer (WO), Grade W-1. It is often desirable to assign an extremely knowledgeable and experienced technical specialist to a position of greater authority. Warrant Officers are appointed from the ranks of particularly talented first-class and chief petty officers, and have limited command authority in their particular occupational fields. The grade of Warrant Officer (W-1) is frequently unused by Starfleet, as the higher-ranking Commissioned (or Chief) Warrant Officers fulfill the required duties; however, the Fleet's expansion during the Dominion War necessitated the rank's use. The primary difference between the two types is the origin of their authority--ordinary warrant officers hold warrants issued by the

Federation Commissioner of Starfleet, where as commissioned warrant officers hold commissions signed by the President of the Federation Council.

Chief Warrant Officer (CWO), Grades W-2, W-3, and W-4. Chief Warrant Officers, as mentioned above, are actually commissioned officers ranking below Ensigns. They serve to supervise noncommissioned personnel in specific technical fields but hold no authority to command outside their own departments or specialties. They are not generally in line for promotion to higher commissioned rank. Normally, the only substantive difference between the three grades of Chief Warrant Officer is length of service.

**Ensign (ENS)**, Grade O-1, is the lowest commissioned rank. Most Academy graduates are commissioned as Ensigns upon graduation. Ensigns assist more senior officers in commanding divisions on board ship or in stations.

The title of Ensign originated in European armies, in which an Ensign was the most junior subaltern in a unit. Army ensigns were so called because they carried a unit's colors into battle. The French Navy borrowed the title for its most junior commissioned officers, known as ensigns de vaisseau. In both the British and U.S. Navies, midshipmen were required to pass an examination before being commissioned as Lieutenants; however, passing the examination did not guarantee a commission (actual commissions being issued only when vacancies occurred in ships). In both services, it was common for senior midshipmen to accept a warrant as master's mates (which came with increased pay, privileges, and responsibilities). Not all master's mates had advanced in this manner, however--some had advanced from the ranks of seamen and were not eligible for promotion to commissioned rank. The 'mates in line for promotion', former midshipmen, eventually came to represent a common step in the path to higher command. In the British service, the rank of Mate became a permanent commissioned rank, ultimately to be renamed 'Sublieutenant'; the American passed midshipman likewise became a permanent rank--in this case, taking the French title of Ensign (one occasion where the American service departed from British precedent).

Starfleet Ensigns are generally promoted to the next rank after eighteen to twenty-four months of service.

Lieutenant Junior Grade (LTJG), Grade 0-2. These officers command small shipboard divisions. Staff officers are often appointed in this grade upon entering the service. The rank evolved from the naval title of Master (warrant officers responsible for safe navigation of a ship)--much as with master's mates, passed midshipmen who had not yet been commissioned as lieutenants often accepted a master's warrant. Eventually the rank became a commissioned one and a normal step on the path to the rank of lieutenant. In the British Royal Navy, Masters were considered to rank 'with but

after' lieutenants but were not generally eligible for further promotion. Later, the Royal Navy replaced Masters with 'Navigating Lieutenants' (officers considered to rank with Lieutenants of the line but not authorized for command at sea) before phasing the rank out altogether. The U.S. Navy eventually changed the title of Master to Lieutenant Junior Grade.

**Lieutenant (LT),** Grade O-3, is one of the oldest officer ranks in naval tradition. As the title suggests, lieutenants served as deputies to an officer in overall command. In Starfleet, Lieutenants command large divisions or small departments in ships and stations. They might serve as executive officers on small ships, or even command the smallest vessels.

Lieutenant Commander (LCDR), Grade O-4. Lieutenant Commanders command departments and often serve as executive officers on mid-size starships, or hold sole command of small vessels and stations. The title evolved from the U.S. Navy rank of Lieutenant; Lieutenants in command of small ships were referred to as 'lieutenants commanding' or 'lieutenants commandant'. Eventually the rank became a permanent one: thus, Lieutenant Commanders are more a sort of senior lieutenant than a junior or deputy commander. The United States, in this instance, preceded the British Navy in adopting Lieutenant Commander as a permanent rank--tellingly, when the British followed suit, the insignia of Lieutenants of eight or more years' seniority was adopted for the new rank.

A Lieutenant Commander is properly addressed by the title 'Mister' and his/her last name, as with more junior officers (in keeping with their origins as senior lieutenants). It is quite common (though less correct) for a Lieutenant Commander to be addressed as 'Commander'--much as officers of the rank of Lieutenant Colonel are addressed as 'Colonel'.

(CDR), Commander Grade Commanders have charge of major departments on large starships, serve as executive officers, and as commanding officers of small or mid-size vessels and stations. The title originated in the British Navy as 'Master and Commander' -- the commanding officer of a type of vessel known as a 'sloop of war'. Such ships were considered too small to carry both a commanding officer and a separate chief navigating officer, so the two duties were combined in one officer. By the early nineteenth century, the title was shortened to 'commander' and was a distinct rank between lieutenants and captains. Officers of this rank in the U.S. Navy of the time were known as 'masters commandant'. Eventually both services adopted the title of commander. The Royal Navy almost always had more commanders than it had sloops for them to command; eventually it became common for commanders to serve as seconds-in-command of the largest warships. One relic of this tradition was the fact that all Royal Navy commanders were addressed as 'captain' out of courtesy until the 1920s. This persists in a fashion to the present day, in that the legally assigned

commanding officer of any ship (regardless of service rank) is addressed as 'captain'. In keeping with these traditions, a full Commander is always addressed by rank and last name--as in 'Commander Smith'--and never as 'Mister'.

Note: Obviously, the Starfleet of the twenty-third century was rather relaxed in regards to this tradition, as many full Commanders (Spock, Scotty, Sulu, Chekov) were commonly addressed as 'Mister'. On the other hand, Will Riker has almost always been addressed as 'Commander'.

Captain (CAPT), Grade O-6. The naval title of captain is as old as the fighting navy itself. Originally, ships of war were merchant ships hired by a government for combat service. The officer in command of a merchant ship traditionally was known as its master. In pre-gunnery days, a merchant ship became a warship by simply sending a company of soldiers on board; as on shore, the officer commanding those troops was their 'captain'. The captain had overall military command of a ship, while the master was responsible for the ship's navigation and operations only. As naval warfare evolved and permanent, dedicated warships came into being, the distinctions were blurred, and the captain became simply the officer in overall command on a permanent basis (inheriting responsibility for all aspects of that ship); the master simply became a subordinate. Starfleet Captains command major starships and stations, and serve as staff officers with Starfleet Command.

Fleet Captain (FCAPT), Grade O-6(a) (or O-7). Fleet Captains command squadrons or other small units of starships, and serve as senior command staff officers. The title has its origins in the British Navy's 'Captain Of The Fleet'—the title given to an Admiral's chief of staff.

Commodore (COMM), Grade O-7 (O-8). The lowest flag rank--like Fleet Captains, Commodores might serve as commander of a squadron or task unit. The distinction is small, but Commodores usually have a Captain serving under them in command of their flagship (as Admirals do) whereas a Fleet Captain retains individual command of his flagship. This distinction was once seen in the Royal Navy, which in the days of sail had two classes of Commodore. A Commodore of the second class retained individual command of his ship and flew a burgee pennant as a distinguishing mark (compared to the flags flown by admirals or the commission pennants flown by captains of 'private ships'); the Commodore of the first class had a captain under him, flew a broad pennant, and was entitled to wear the undress uniform of a rear admiral.

Rear Admiral (RADM), Grade O-8 (O-9). Rear Admirals (as do all flag officers) command fleets or forces of starships. They also command major shore facilities, and serve as senior officers of Starfleet Command's major technical bureaus. The title originates in the British Navy; when the Navy assembled as a single fleet, the rear admiral commanded the aftermost division of ships in the line of battle (the foremost

division, or 'van', was commanded by a vice admiral while the center was commanded by an admiral who also commanded the entire fleet).

**Vice Admiral (VADM)**, Grade 0-9 (O-10). Vice Admirals command major fleets or forces of starships, and serve as top staff officers with Starfleet Command.

**Admiral (ADM)**, Grade O-10 (O-11). Admirals serve as Commanders-In-Chief of the major fleets (Alpha and Beta Quadrants), and in the top command positions of the space service as a whole.

Fleet Admiral (FADM), Grade O-11 (O-12). There is generally only one Fleet Admiral on active duty at any given time; his or her position is Commander, Starfleet. The most distinguished admirals are sometimes allowed to retire with the rank of Fleet Admiral. The title evolves from the British 'Admiral of the Fleet'; the U.S. Navy first appointed five-star Fleet Admirals during World War II.

#### II. SHIP ORGANIZATION

Starship crews are typically divided into several departments, each with its own particular set of duties and responsibilities. While exact organization varies from ship to ship, typically there are seven major departments common to all vessels. These are the Command Department, Operations Department, Engineering Department, Science Department, Medical Department, Communications Department, and Security Department.

#### COMMAND DEPARTMENT

Captain. Each and every ship has a single line officer legally assigned to command it. Regardless of rank, this officer holds the courtesy title of Captain and is addressed as such. A Captain is responsible for all aspects of his or her ship, especially for safe navigation and execution of assigned missions. In situations where more than one officer of captain rank is present, the phrase 'The Captain' is understood to refer to the commanding officer.

**Executive Officer**. The Executive Officer (Exec, XO, First Officer) is the line officer second in rank on a starship and acts as the Captain's executive assistant. The XO's particular responsibility is for the readiness of ship and crew. All orders issued by the Exec are considered as coming from the Captain. Executive Officers with the rank of Lieutenant Commander or Commander are addressed as 'Commander' (compare with other officers of these ranks; Lieutenant Commanders are addressed as 'Lieutenant Commander Smith' or 'Mister Jones', where as Commanders are addressed by rank and name--'Commander Brown'). Any mention of 'The Commander' is understood to be a reference to the XO. In those instances where a full captain serves as XO, he or she is referred to by rank and name--as in 'Captain Smith' - to distinguish from 'The Captain'.

**Navigator**. The Navigator is the line officer concerned with the navigation and handling

of the spacecraft. Reporting directly to the Captain, the Navigator determines the vessel's position, plots courses, and supervises the flight control crew.

Flight Controllers. Flight controllers are generally junior commissioned officers, reporting to the navigator, and are tasked with supervising flight control, guidance, and navigation duties in their absence. Flight controllers stand watch at the Flight Control (CONN) position on the Bridge. Flight controllers are typically junior line officers or officers in training, and also stand watch as Officer of the Deck or Junior Officer of the Watch.

Navigation Technicians. Navigation technicians are warrant officers advanced from the Quartermaster rating. They generally serve as senior assistants to the Navigator, and may stand watch as Junior Officer of the Watch (but seldom as Officer of the Deck, which duty is usually reserved for commissioned line officers). Traditionalists within Starfleet often refer to NavTechs as "master's mates", in the old naval fashion. NavTechs sometimes serve as navigators in small vessels; tradition styles them as 'masters'.

Quartermasters. Quartermasters are petty officers specializing in navigation, ship handling, and communications. They stand watch at the CONN in relief of commissioned Flight Controllers; one quartermaster usually serves as Quartermaster of the Watch, assisting the Navigator and Officer of the Deck. Quartermasters are also trained shuttle pilots and (like Boatswain's Mates) serve as Coxswains.

Note: The term 'CONN' is generally understood to refer to the Flight Control station on a starship's bridge. Owing to the increased automation in ship control functions since the twenty-third century, the CONN replaces the separate helm and navigation positions on the bridge. The CONN is not necessarily the same as the phrase 'the conn', which refers to the status held by whatever officer has been designated to give steering orders for the ship. Frequently the two positions coincide, as it is more efficient for a single officer or crew member to have direct control over a ship's movements (eliminating the possibility of ambiguity in decision or reaction time). On certain occasions (usually during increased states of action or particular navigational evolutions) a separate officer may have 'the conn' while not physically operating the Flight Control station. Most deck crewmen are qualified helmsmen and are capable of supervising flight control functions during non-critical operations; under such circumstances, the Officer of the Deck will hold the conn. Alert status will require a quartermaster or commissioned officer to relieve the helm and take the conn directly.

**Personnel Officer**. The Personnel Officer serves as an assistant to the Executive Officer, and is primarily concerned with supervision of crew assignments, qualifications, training, and promotions. An ensign of the line is often assigned as

Personnel Officer.

**Records Officer.** The Records Officer also assists the XO. Responsibilities include supervision of all ship's logs, records, and archives; the Records Officer frequently doubles as Ship's Secretary, supervising clerical and administrative functions for the Exec. An ensign of the line is often assigned as Records Officer.

Ship's Clerks. Ship's Clerks are warrant officers who assist the Captain, Exec, Personnel, and Records Officers with all clerical and administrative functions.

**Yeomen**. Yeomen are petty officers whose duties involve clerical and administrative functions. They operate the ship's office.

**Legal Officer**. The Legal Officer is not an attorney, but rather a commissioned officer who assists the Captain in all legal and judicial matters. Attorneys are members of the Starfleet Judge Advocate General Corps, and do not generally serve in starships.

**Legalmen**. Legalmen are petty officers who assist the ship's Legal Officer.

**Supply Officer**. The Supply Officer has charge of all ship's stores and supplies, and is responsible for providing uniform clothes and equipment for the ship's crew as well as food and beverage for the general mess. The Supply Officer further has responsibility for all ship's accounts.

**Supply Clerks**. Supply Clerks are warrant officers who assist the Supply Officer in supervising logistical and materiel support functions. Traditionally, a warrant supply clerk serving as senior supply officer in a ship or station is called a "Purser."

**Storekeepers**. Storekeepers are petty officers who assist the Supply Officer, organize hold stowage, and keep inventory of ship's stores.

Ship's Cook. Generally, the ship's cook is a trained chef serving in Starfleet and appointed to warrant rank. The cook's primary duty is the preparation of meals in the traditional manner from fresh ingredients (usually for the Captain, the wardroom officers, or for distinguished guests at diplomatic functions). On many ships (especially during peacetime), a civilian chef working as a contractor to Starfleet fulfills these duties. When not called upon to prepare meals, the cook assists the supply officer in overseeing the ship's food stores. Many smaller vessels carry no cook at all, but rely upon replicators for all food preparation.

Mess Management Specialists. Mess management specialists are petty officers who assist the cook, supervise crewmen from other departments detailed as messmen and stewards, and operate and program the ship's food replicators. The senior mess management specialist also serves as the Captain's steward.

#### **OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT**

Operations Manager. The Ops Officer

is responsible for supervising shipboard activities and resources, and for seeing that they are carried out without conflict. The Operations Manager is head of the Operations Department, and stands watch at the Operations Management (OPS) position on the Bridge.

**Ops Watch Officers**. Ops Watch Officers relieve the Operations Manager at the OPS Station, and ensure that ship's operations run smoothly at all times.

**Ops Liaison Officers**. Ops Liaison Officers assist other departments in carrying out primary and secondary mission objectives.

**Resource Allocation Officers.** Resource Allocation Officers assist the duty operations manager in supervising usage of shipboard systems and facilities.

**Operations Specialist**. Operations Specialists are petty officers who assist the Operations Manager in his or her duties.

First Lieutenant. The First Lieutenant is the officer in charge of deck astronautics, having responsibility for maintenance and appearance of internal spaces as well as all deck and emergency equipment. Primary duties include care and maintenance of airlocks, lifeboats, environmental suits, and associated equipment, as well as overall responsibility for auxiliary spacecraft operations. The First Lieutenant (in cooperation with the Personnel Officer) also supervises the assignment of living quarters to officers, crew and passengers.

Boatswain. The Boatswain or 'Bo'sun', a warrant officer, is the principal assistant to the First Lieutenant and directly supervises deck operations. The Bo'sun and his mates also serve the traditional function of 'piping the side'--welcoming distinguished visitors on board with a bo'sun's call (modern powered bo'sun's calls are issued by Starfleet, but many captains prefer the use of replicated old-style calls).

Boatswain's Mates. Boatswain's Mates are petty officers who serve as deputies to the Boatswain. One Boatswain's Mate will generally serve as Boatswain's Mate of the Watch, assisting the Officer of the Deck in all deck operations. Boatswain's Mates are often trained shuttle pilots and serve as Coxswains.

### ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

Engineer Officer. The Engineer Officer, or Chief Engineer, is responsible for operation of the ship's propulsion and power systems. He or she also shares responsibility with the First Lieutenant for spaceworthiness and airtight integrity of the hull and spaceframe. Responsibilities also include upkeep and repair of all auxiliary systems.

**Propulsion Assistant.** The Propulsion Assistant is the chief aide to the Engineer Officer, and has authority over warp, impulse, and auxiliary propulsion systems.

Power Assistant. The Power Assistant

has charge of power generation and distribution systems.

**IDF/SIF Assistant**. The IDF/SIF assistant is concerned with inertial dampening and structural integrity force field systems, which protect the ship and crew from damaging effects of acceleration.

**Shipfitting Assistant**. The Shipfitting Assistant is the officer charged with maintenance of the ship's various utilities and auxiliary systems.

**Environment Assistant**. The Environment Assistant has charge of all environmental engineering and life support functions.

**Damage Control Assistant**. The Damage Control Assistant oversees and coordinates the ship's response to damage taken in combat or through other means.

**Transporter Assistant.** The Transporter Assistant has charge of all ship's transporter systems

**Engineer's Mates**. Each of the Assistants to the Chief Engineer has a number of petty officers, or mates, who assist in executing his duties. Chief Engineer's Mates are assigned to supervise a particular area of responsibility--for example, the Propulsion Assistant has under him a Warp Propulsion Chief and an Impulse Propulsion Chief. More junior Engineer's Mates may have a particular specialty, and be assigned to supervise a particular part of the ship's engineering functions (as a transporter specialist or 'captain of the nacelle'), but many serve as general assistants to the Chiefs. A large number of crewmen are assigned as Engineer's Crew--occasionally known as the 'black gang' or 'blackhand gang', from the days of steam propulsion (when solid or liquid fossil fuels burnt to produce steam tended to leave black residue on engine room crew members).

### SCIENCES DEPARTMENT

Science Officer. The Science Officer commands the Sciences Department and supervises all ongoing scientific research projects, as well as providing scientific intelligence to the Captain. In days past, the command-intelligence function occupied much of a science officer's time; by the late 24th century, such duties are shared between the Operations and Security Officers to allow the Science Officer to devote more time to scientific investigation.

**Sensor Officer**. The Sensor Officer has charge of all remote sensing devices; the only exceptions are those dedicated sensors used for navigational, tactical, or engineering functions (which are tended by the appropriate departments).

**Computer Officer**. The Computer Officer has general responsibility of the care and operation of the ship's computer systems.

**Physical Sciences Officer.** The Physical Sciences Officer is in charge of the ship's physics lab, and supervises most ongoing

scientific investigations relating to physics and allied disciplines.

Chemistry Officer. The Chemistry Officer is in charge of the ship's chemistry lab, and supervises most ongoing scientific investigations relating to chemistry.

**Stellar Sciences Officer**. The Stellar Sciences Officer is in charge of the ship's astrosciences labs, and supervises most ongoing scientific investigations relating to astronomy, stellar cartography, astrophysics, cosmology, and allied disciplines.

Life Sciences Officer. The Life Sciences Officer is in charge of the ship's biology and botany labs, and supervises most ongoing scientific investigations relating to exobiology, zoology, botany, and allied disciplines.

Planetary Sciences Officer. The Planetary Sciences Officer is in charge of the ship's geology and geophysics labs, and supervises most ongoing scientific investigations relating to geology, geophysics, atmospheric meteorology, and allied disciplines.

Social Sciences Officer. The Social Sciences Officer is in charge of the ship's social sciences division, and supervises most ongoing scientific investigations relating to sociology, archaeology/anthropology, history, and allied disciplines.

Sciences Technicians. The various Sciences Technicians are warrant officers trained in scientific investigation; their primary responsibility is the supervision of the ship's laboratory facilities and equipment.

Sciences Specialists/Crewmen. Most starships carry a large number of crewmen and petty officers trained in scientific investigation. The most junior non-rated crew members perform basic lab work, while more senior petty officers supervise lab operations and assist officers in scientific investigations.

### MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

Medical Officer. The Medical Officer-sometimes referred to as the Chief Medical Officer, CMO, or Ship's Surgeon--is an accredited Doctor of Medicine or its equivalent (be it a Terran MD degree, a Vulcan Healer's certification, or other cultural equal) and a member of the Starfleet Medical Corps. He or she has sole responsibility for the health of all officers and crew, and for the sanitary conditions of a ship or station. As such, the CMO has broad powers--including the power to relieve the Captain of duty on medical grounds. The Medical Officer also has command of the Medical Department's officers and crew.

**Surgeons**. In addition to the CMO, most starships carry one or more additional physicians (sometimes called Assistant Surgeons). Where practical, the different medical officers will hold particular medical or surgical specializations; almost every starship of sufficient size carries at least one specialist in emergency medicine.

Ship's Counselor. The Ship's Counselor is an accredited specialist in psychology or psychiatry (required to hold at least a Master's degree in psychology or its equivalent). The Counselor has responsibility (under the CMO) for the mental and emotional health of the crew, and often serves as an advisor to the Captain. The Counselor also assists the XO in evaluation of the crew. In many cases, the Counselor has taken the role once held by Chaplains in Starfleet's predecessor services; some Counselors may have training or accreditation from religious or spiritual authorities of their homeworlds.

**Dental Officer**. Starships of sufficient size may carry a dentist on board, who has charge of dental health and oral surgery.

Chief Nurse. The Chief Nurse is a commissioned officer in the Starfleet Nursing Corps, who has charge of all nurses on board and is responsible for nursing functions.

**Pharmacist**. Large enough starships carry a Pharmacist, a warrant officer having charge of all drugs, medications, and pharmaceuticals.

**Lab Technician**. The Lab Technician is a warrant officer having charge of the ship's medical laboratory.

Medical Technician. Medical Technicians are petty officers trained to assist medical professionals; their work might include first aid and minor surgery, patient transportation and care, prescriptions and laboratory work, or clerical duties within the Medical Department.

Some small vessels carry limited medical staff--a Medical Service Corps warrant officer or non-commissioned Medical Technician in the smallest ships. Such vessels are generally of limited range only and deploy on short patrols from starbases or other shore facilities. Newer vessels have begun to make use of holographic software agents (such as the Emergency Medical Hologram) in lieu of actual medical personnel. Larger ships often include an EMH as backup to their medical staffs.

#### COMMUNICATIONS DEPARTMENT

Communications Officer. The Communications Officer heads the Communications Department, and is responsible for all transmission of messages and data both within and without the starship. Additional responsibilities within the department include linguistic studies and language translation, as well as data/message encryption and decryption.

External Communications Officer. The External Communications Officer holds responsibility for transmission and reception of messages and data to and from the starship or station. Operation and maintenance of subspace and RF communications gear are this officers main duty, as well as the storage and issue of personal communicators and other portable communications gear.

**Internal Communications Officer**. The Internal Communications Officer is responsible for maintaining uninterrupted voice and data contact between all internal spaces.

**Cryptography Officer**. The Cryptography Officer is concerned with encryption of outgoing messages for purposes of data security, as well as decryption of incoming friendly and hostile signals.

Linguistics Officer. The Linguistics Officer is charged with the study and translation of languages, and particularly with the maintenance and operation of the ship's universal translator software.

**Signalman**. Signalmen are petty officers specializing in any of the various communications fields; they assist officers in maintaining communications between and within all Starfleet activities.

#### SECURITY DEPARTMENT

**Security Officer**. The Security Officer is in charge of the Security Department, and is responsible for the maintenance of safety, security, and order of a starship and its crew. Security Officers are trained not only in combat techniques and weapons systems, but in techniques of peaceful crisis management and resolution.

Internal Security Officer. The Internal Security Officer is charged with maintaining order and discipline among the crew, as well as the general security and safety of all hands and equipment (focusing particularly on internal threats, including boarders or other intruders).

External Security Officer. The External Security Officer is concerned with safety and security of ship and crew from external threats; he is responsible for the assignment and training of security personnel to away teams, as well as the ship's landing force. The External Security Officer also supervises security personnel assigned to shore patrol detail while in port. Under the direction of the Security Officer, the External Security Officer also supervises training and qualification with personal phaser sidearms for all assigned crew.

**Intelligence Officer**. The Intelligence Officer, in conjunction with the Operations and Sciences departments, is responsible for gathering, analyzing, and disseminating information on Threat forces. The Intelligence Officer also has charge of data security and personnel security clearance.

**Armory Officer**. The Armory Officer is responsible for storage, maintenance, and issue of all small arms and field ordnance.

Master-At-Arms. Petty officers specializing in security matters hold the rating of Master-At-Arms. They assist the individual officers of the ship's security department in their particular fields of specialization.

**Tactical Officer**. The Tactical Officer is the officer in overall charge of all ship's tactical systems, including weaponry, fire control systems, and defensive shielding.

**Tactical Systems Technician**. The Tactical Systems Technician is a warrant officer specializing in the operation and maintenance of fire control systems, defensive shielding, and other non-weapon technologies relating to the ship's defense.

**Tactical Systems Specialist**. Tactical Systems Specialists are petty officers trained in defense systems technology; they generally specialize in a single field, be it fire control, deflector shield systems, or other defense-related disciplines.

**Gunnery Officer**. The Gunnery Officer has charge of all directed-energy weapons systems on board, their operation, maintenance and care.

**Gunner**. The Gunner is a warrant officer specializing in directed-energy weapons systems. Gunners assist Gunnery Officers in larger vessels, or may have sole charge of such weapons in smaller ones.

**Gunner's Mate**. Gunner's Mates are petty officers who operate and maintain all energy weapons systems, be they phasers or other less-commonly used weapons.

**Torpedo Officer**. The Torpedo Officer is responsible for all ship's deep-space explosive ordnance and associated delivery systems, including storage of torpedoes, mines, and explosive devices and operation and care of all launcher devices.

**Torpedoman**. The Torpedoman is a warrant officer who assists (or in smaller vessels, performs the duties of) the Torpedo Officer. The Torpedoman is assisted by a number of Torpedoman's Mates.

Torpedoman's Mate. Torpedoman's Mates operate and care for all deep-space explosive ordnance delivery systems; as well as photon or quantum torpedoes, they also supervise the preparation and launch of instrumented probes (usually in cooperation with the ship's Science and Operations Departments).

### OTHER DEPARTMENTS

The above departments are common to most starship types. Some highly specialized vessels may incorporate additional departments to assist in carrying out their mission operations. Shuttlecarriers will have an Aerospace Department, comprising the ship's Aerospace wing. Tenders and repair vessels would have a Repair Department to oversee repair of other vessels. Transport vessels may have a Cargo or Transport Command Department to supervise the transport of cargo.

Many starships--especially larger ones on extended exploratory missions, or those carrying large numbers of civilian family members--might also have a Special Services Department to coordinate recreational and crew support activities.

These departments would employ Starfleet petty officers (rated as Ship's Servicemen) as well as civilian contractors, whose jobs range from barber/hairstylist to restaurant/lounge staff to schoolteacher.
