


Both were attired in ST uniforms and USS Challenger ball caps. They were given ST: Voyager keychains and ST: Voyager/Phillies ball caps.


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

anniversary will have more than one meaning for me. As always, the Normandy anniversary commemorates the June 6th 1944 Normandy Invasion and those that lost their lives there. However, this the year anniversary will also remember someone who served there and returned to tell the story.

knee. When he did tell these stories he always ended them with the same thing. He would tell me "Leslie, war ain't no game to play. If you want to play a game that matters play one where there ain't no fightin', only talkin'."

He was present on the beaches of Normandy soon after they had been taken the morning of June 6th 1944. As he told it, "somehow, by the grace of God" he came out of it without a scratch. After some time in the European theater in late 1944 he was sent stateside to an Army Air Station in Florida, where he met my grandmother.

As I write this it is obvious that I am thinking about the holiday that is upon us, Memorial Day. It holds a special meaning to me because of Specialist Robert Nance US Army Air Corp., my grandfather, who passed away in early December of last year. This passing left a void in my life that will not soon be filled and that is why this time of year is special to me. I wanted to share some things about this man.

My grandfather did not speak often of his time or service during World War II. He was not a braggart or man of ego. He preferred to view his service as a necessity, a service to a country that had done so much for him and his family. However, he did tell storys to a young grandson sitting on his done. However, in early 1945 he was sent to duty in the Pacific. On his birthday, August 6th, 1945 the US dropped the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima. After the second bombing of Nagasaki and the Japanese surrender, he was part of the occupying force in Japan. He did not talk much about the time he spent in Japan and late 1945 he returned to the US with an honorable discharge.

Shortly after returning home he married my grandmother and went to work for the US Post Office. In 1980 he retired from the US Postal Service and spent the last 20 years of his life teaching. No, he did not go into another job. He was busy teaching his kids and grandkids the importance of remembering those that had paid that ultimate price during war - lest we forget.

Hi everyone! It's been an action-packed couple of months for the treasury! I even managed to squeeze in a trip to the R1 Summit where, for the first time, Les, the checkbook, and I were all in the same place at the same time! It's okay, we only wrote out the checks for the R1 Summit credit cards charges. It was amusing to point out to people that I really do exist, and people can say that they've met me in person!

Please note that voucher purchases now take place through the Treasurer's office. Vouchers are available in one-credit and five-credits certificates. We are in the process of getting a secure online site for vouchers to be purchased with credit cards. Once this has been completed, we'll announce it, but please remember that we will only accept credit cards for voucher purchases over 5 credits. Vouchers can still be purchased via mail by sending me a check or money order made payable to STARFLEET to the address below. Voucher cost is equivalent to the number of credits you want to purchase. (One credit = \$1.00, Five credits = \$5.00).

We recently learned that international

checks will cost us \$5.00 each to deposit as they cannot go through the federal reserve bank to be cashed and must go through a collection agency to be cashed. If you are an international member, please try to renew either via credit card through the secure online site, or with an international money order as these will not generate any fees.

\$51.00 ** Designates that the Credit Card Deposit \$76.00 comes from a variety of charges, such as \$30.00 membership processing, IC registrations, \$294.00 Summit registrations, and Marine Pin Orders. \$46.00 *** Designates that the deposit correction was \$418.00 done by the bank. They determined that I had \$28.00 recorded the deposit short by \$15.00. Now whether or not I actually did, or they did, \$30.00 I didn't query as they were giving us more \$331.00 money. However, I'm going to explain briefly \$55.00 how I go through the checks so that everyone \$30.00 will know that I try to be very thorough. When \$738.00 I receive the checks and money orders from \$15.00 membership processing, I go through every check and make sure that it is made payable \$797.00 to STARFLEET. I then go through and stamp every check "For Deposit Only". Then I go \$40.00 \$13.82 through each check and match the amount \$614.00 of the check to the appropriate line items \$31.00 on the membership processing worksheet. \$37.00 Once that's done I total everything to make \$156.00 sure it matches the totals on the membership \$51.00 processing worksheet. Finally, I add the checks \$767.00 individually to the deposit slips. We have \$318.00 business deposit slips and each of the slips can list up to 32 items. If I have more than 32 \$16.00 items, I use more deposit slips. I then add up \$0.19 each of the deposit slips and total them out -\$0.37 three times - using an adding machine. Now, I'm not saying that I never make mistakes. I do make mistakes, but I also do my best to be as thorough as possible.



SECOND THOUGHTS Admiral Gordon Goldberg Vice-Commander, Starfleet

Quo vadis, STARFLEET? Where are we going?

It's a question I've been asking myself for a while now, and one I want to share with the rest of you.

Blame it on the New York Times. A few months ago, I was reading a Times Op-Ed piece in which the author warned that colleges and universities risk "outsourcing" their basic values when they get caught up in the businesslike mindset of corporate America, referring to students as "customers" and treating education as a "product". As the piece went on, I began to detect discomforting parallels between the "corporatization" of our schools and the "corporatization" of STARFLEET - for which I am at least partly to blame.

Maybe it's a real epiphany, or perhaps it's just all the stuff I'm dealing with right now at work and at home, but this feeling has been building in me for quite some time now - I am so tired of the emphasis on corporate and customer service issues that have apparently become STARFLEET's obsession.

Incorporating STARFLEET may well have been the biggest mistake ever made - not in terms of the legal protections it gives us, but in terms of the mindset being a "corporation" invokes.

I know I've spent the past five years arguing for a measure of professionalism and accountability, and fighting against the "we're just a fan club" mentality. Maybe I was wrong. Maybe we've gone too far.

Fiduciary responsibility and financial accountability are essential to any organization, and incumbent upon its leadership. And I'm happy to say that I firmly believe that we've made great inroads in that regard.

Not only has this administration published regular financial reports, but that all accounting information has been meticulously transmitted by the Treasurer, as the income comes in, as the checks are being cut, and as the statements arrive, to a review committee which includes not only members of the administration, but a representative of the AB as well.

In addition, all checks require a double

signature, and the person two whom they are cut cannot be one of the signatories - as a result, the CS can't cut himself a check, or access 'Fleet funds at all without anyone knowing about it.

Finally, the treasurer's books are reviewed by the AB-appointed Internal Auditor - a position which was vacant for most of the previous two years.

We've come a long way in customer service as well.

The HelpDesk provides a central resource, with web, e-mail, fax, and voice-mail access, for members to get their questions answered or issues resolved - and has handled over 300 problem reports, address changes, and requests for information since its creation earlier this year.

The Communiqué staff has been getting the CQ out every two months, and the Chief of Communications has taken direct responsibility for getting out replacement copies to members who haven't recieved theirs, for whatever reason.

Cooperation and communication between the Admiralty Board and the Executive Committee - and communication between those bodies and the general membership - is at an all-time high.

All of this is a good thing. So what's my problem? What are we missing? What's wrong?

In my opinion, the problem is the level of our expectations. It's the way we treat the volunteers who choose to serve the organization. It's the demands we place that their "service" come first, that their behavior should be the same as those who are paid to serve us. It's "expecting" or "demanding" instead of "appreciating".

STARFLEET is a fan association. We are a social organization. We, as individuals, are members, not customers. Some members, unfortunately, are social misfits whose ability to deal with other members of the human race are negligible, and those are the ones who are most likely to demand that they be treated as customers (as in, they are always "right" no matter how wrong they are, and that others are there to "serve" them).

They are the ones who take the volunteers who actually get the "work" of the organization done for granted, who never say "please" or "thank you" or acknowledge that maybe the problem that needed to be fixed was their own fault in part - or in whole. They are the ones who are unconscionably rude to the staff volunteers who they expect to fix their problems immediately - and they are the first to take offense if the response they receive isn't the most polite and subservient in nature.

We're all members of this organization. We pay membership dues in order to defray the costs of keeping STARFLEET running. We are not customers. We do not pay for a "subscription" to the Communiqué - it is our fan club's bi-monthly newsletter, which we receive as members of the fan club.

Those who want to be members of, and take part in the STARFLEET community are in the right place. Those who want to be customers of a professional subscription service, on the other hand, should perhaps join the "Official Fan Club".

On behalf of the STARFLEET community, I'd like to extend a very large and very sincere "thank you" to my fellow EC members, their staffs (and my own), the Regional Coordinators and their regional staffs, the chapter leadership - everyone who volunteers their time, their resources, their energy, and their emotional strength to helping to make STARFLEET a better place for us all. I'm glad you're all part of my extended family and friends, and not "simply" my fellow "employees".

A simple e-mail to (**ops@sfi.org**) telling me something is on its way will give me plenty of notice to watch for it. Once your mail is recieved I will respond to itvia e-mail address that am given.

You will remember from the last CQ in which I reported the issues we have been having with the Fleet's database. Fleet's database is in Microsoft Access. Access, although a good program is like all programs -- it has issues. One of the major issues is that the program is not really capable of merging all the changes correctly.

I have been working closely with the membership database since January and have made numerous changes only to see those changes disappear after a merge. I have e-mailed and re-emailed a number of CO's and XO's asking for your dates of OTS and OCC passage, promotions and promotion dates, newsletter titles, etc. because of this. If I continue to do this, please bear with me.

Things have gotten better but there are still some issues. I would greatly appreciate it if all CO's or Reporting Officers would start putting the above information in their MSR's. If you use the online form put the info in the Comments Section if it will not allow you to change or add any info.

Speaking of MSR's: in March only seven chapters Failed to Report and

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in April only thirteen have Failed to Report. Eleven Regions had 100% reporting in March and nine Regions had 100% reporting in April with two more at 96% or better. Keep up the good work! Mark A. Vinson 1047 Cottonwood Trl. Benbrook, TX. 76126

Getting your MSR to STARFLEET Operations is easier than ever with three methods to choose from. The preferred method is to use the Online MSR Reporting form at (http://msr.sfi.org/) but you can e-mail your MSR directly to (MSRReports@sfi.org) or send it via U.S. Mail to: http://www.sfi.org/ops/msr.txt. Do Not Send Attachments. Half the time they get scrambled in the process. Just cut and paste the form into the body of an e-mail message and fill it out. If you send your report electronically I will send you an e-mail back stating that I have recieved it. If after a couple of days though, you don't get such an e-mail, please drop me a line to check. Please remember that there are no longer any DVC's so please remove any DVC e-mail address (DVCWest@sfi.org, DVCEast@sfi.org, DVCInter@sfi.org) or US Mailing addresses for Dennis Rayburn, Ken Kopacki or JD Knight from your distribution list. I will see that Dennis gets copies of those MSR's he is responsible for.

Chapters are also required to send MSR's to their respective Regional Coordinator and any other Regional Office they deem necessary. Chapters are also required to send a copy of their MSR to (correy@sfi.org) if they are a Correspondence Chapter, to (tmbrwolf@pciconnect.com) if they are an Armed Services Chapter and/or to (petelutz@gis.net) if they are taking advantage of our Chapter Assistance Program. If a chapter wants their MSR to go to the Chapter Summary Department of the STARFLEET Communiqué' it needs to be sent to (CQSummaries@sfi.org).

MSR's are due by the 5th of each month and considered late from the 6th to the 10th. After the 10th chapters are placed on the Failed to Report List.

If three reports in a row are missed your chapter may be decommissioned and/or the Commanding Officer relieved of duty. If a chapter makes a habit of missing a couple of MSRs then catching up, the chapter will be treated as if three in a row have been missed.

COMM AS YOU ARE... Lieutenant general michael malotte Chief of communication, starfleet

Welcome to CQ #105! In this issue, I'm going to focus on an ongoing project for the Communications Department - the CQ Re-mailing Process.

Since I have taken over the STARFLEET Communications Department, I've instituted a few new policies regarding the CQ. The first was that I took personal responsibility of the CQ Re-mailing process. This assured that the issue of not getting your CQ went right to the top of the chain. Since the CQ is one of the things your membership dollars pay for, consistency in receiving this became (and still is) one of my top priorities.

To help further speed up the process, we have created an e-mail address to report this to. Sending an e-mail to (**lostcq@sfi.org**) immediately puts it in the proper queue in the Helpdesk. This allows for both high visibility and tracking. Since you get a reply e-mail from the tracking software, you'll always know that your e-mail was recieved.

The second was on the CQ Re-mailing process, itself. Since I've taken over the re-mailing of non-delivered CQs, I've noticed that there are a number of folks who need them month after month. We've gotten addresses and crosschecked them with the database for accuracy but the CQs just don't seem to make it to said addresses.

In an effort to significantly reduce this occurrence, I've implemented a new policy on the re-mailing of CQs. If you need a replacement CQ mailed to you for 2 consecutive months, I will be asking that you get me a copy of an actual mailing label on a publication that actually does reach your mailbox. You can do this in one of two ways. You can either mail it to me, via the USPS or, you can scan it and e-mail me the scan.

If you mail the hard copy, please send it to:

The information I get will be shared with both CompOps and Membership Processing so that we can make sure the address is 100% US Postal Service correct by the next CQ mailing.

You see, I've learned that the US Postal Service is a picky beast.

Let's say your address is:

Joe Member 1234 CO RD 567 Anytown, State 12345-6789

Seems like a simple enough address. Unfortunately, the CQ and other similar-class mailings will not make it to that address. Change it to:

Joe Member 1234 County Road 567 Anytown, State 12345-6789

and it gets there every time. You can't abbreviate County as CO. The machines see this as Colorado. This is just one of the quirks of the USPS.

Fortunately, you can check your own address for the correct format and the +4 digits at: :

http://www.framed.usps.com/ncsc/ lookups/lookup_zip+4.html

Going with this policy should accomplish two things. First, and foremost, it will alleviate the frustration of the members who are not receiving their CQs when everyone else does. This is the primary focus for this. The EC, and especially those of us in the Communications Department, want to make sure you get what's coming to you with each and every mailing. The second thing this will accomplish is saving Fleet money. Every CQ that makes it to your mailbox with everyone else's is one less that has to go out First Class.

If you know you are one of those who repeatedly have to get the CQ re-mailed to you, you can speed up this process by getting the label (scanned or hard copy) to me at your first convenience. If your CQ gets to you but you know someone's who doesn't, pass this on to him or her.

To date, I've been able to send 2 address corrections to CompOps by utilizing this process. By working together, we can significantly increase Fleet's "customer satisfaction" rating while reducing the amount of extra money needed to accomplish this -- a win/win scenario in anyone's book!

The third change involved Address Correction Requests recieved from the US Postal Service. With our current mailing rate, we get notified of address changes submitted to the Post Office. Unlike First Class, they won't forward it on but they do notify the sender or its authorized agent. This information used to be sent to Membership Processing. While it worked well for updating database information, sometimes visibility was lost to the CQ Re-mailer. This information is now sent directly to me. The information contained on the label is also compared with what the Fleet database has, changed appropriately, and the issue is then re-mailed.

Each time I get a label or an Address Correction Request, I create two tickets in the Helpdesk. The first ticket is picked up by the CompOps team, who then make the address corrections needed. The second ticket is a "lost CQ" ticket, which I use to create the list of folks who need to get a replacement CQ.

Once the address has been changed and the CQ has been sent, the respective tickets are closed. As of the 26th of May, I've submitted 12 address changes to the CompOps Department and re-mailed many of the CQs before the member has even informed us that they did not get one!

On the down side of this process, the USPS will not deliver these notices to me until I pay the Postage Due fees. If I don't pay the fee by the date on the envelope, the notice is returned. To help alleviate problems here, I have set up an account at the Post Office to cover these charges as they come in.

You see, each one of these notices cost Fleet \$.60. Now, that may not seem like much but consider this - for this one issue, I've recieved 12 of these. That's 1/2 a membership. At this rate, it will cost Fleet 3 memberships a year in Postage Due charges for these notifications.

So, how can you help? Easy! If you are going to move, let us know! A simple e-mail to (**helpdesk@sfi.org**) with your new address will get that information to every department that needs it. It won't take long and you'll accomplish 2 things. First, you'll assure timely delivery of your CQ and anything else that Fleet is sending you. Second, you'll help save Fleet some unneeded expense.

There have been two key parts of making these processes successful. The first is the close, cooperative working relationship between CompOps and the Communications Department. This could not be accomplished without the dedication of Mark Anbinder and his team.

The second is the interface through which all of this is accomplished the STARFLEET Helpdesk. Under the watchful eye of Greg Trotter and his deputy director, Joan Pierce, this interface allows us 24/7 access to these issues and helps expedite the changes needed to assure that the affected members do get their CQ the next time it's published.

This has resulted in significantly reducing the number of "repeat customers" I get at the CQ Re-mailing Office. It has not only saved Fleet money but more importantly, has resulted in a higher level of customer satisfaction - the one true measure of performance in any volunteer organization.

Well, that about does it for me this issue... as always; if anyone is missing a CQ, please send an e-mail to (**lostcq@sfi.org**) with the following info:

THE SHUTTLE OPERATIONS, STARFLEET

Greetings, everyone! As I write this column, we're midway through the spring, but thoughts are already speeding ahead toward the summer and its activities, including the International Conference in Kansas City. ShOC is likely to be well represented, and we look forward to meeting and chatting with many 'Fleet members that weekend.

Even as we look toward the summer, the spring has been an interesting one. The last couple of months have actually been rather quiet on the chapter development front, with only one new shuttlecraft since I last wrote for these pages. However, I continue to be in touch with a number of groups getting ready to apply for shuttle status. As always, one thing I recommend is that groups feel free to get in touch with Shuttle Operations as soon as they decide they want to work toward becoming a STARFLEET chapter. What we do doesn't begin with your VRR (Vessel Registration Request). ShOC exists to help groups from the very beginning.

The ShOC staff has been busy, though, working on a number of projects: a special package to help new chapters get started, materials on CD-ROM, and new brochures for the regional shuttle ops officers are all among the projects that ShOC is working on. As they come to final fruition, I'll be announcing them in future CQ issues. I have been very pleased and proud of the active participation of not only the Shuttle Operations Command staff on the international level, but also the contributions and interest of the RDC ShOC personnel at the regional level. To all of you, my thanks.

As I said before, it's been pretty quiet lately in terms of groups entering or exiting the Shuttle program, although I look forward to seeing some more action on this front soon. Here's the latest:

We deployed one shuttle since last time. Please join me in welcoming this shuttle to the ranks:

Shuttlecraft Sol's Fury – Region 17 Colorado Springs, Colorado Charles Menter, Commanding

Welcome to the Shuttlecraft Program, folks!

Now, for our mini-discussion of the issue. I call this one "What's in a Name?" The name of a group is one of the most important choices its members will make. After all, the group's name is a central part of its identity. When one thinks of a group, it's the name that will spring first to mind. Obviously, it's a choice that should be made with some care.

STARFLEET doesn't have many rules about names for its chapters. The few we do have boil down to this: the name should be in good taste, not vulgar or inappropriate. Names cannot be those of the cast or crew of any Star Trek series or film. Names of active STARFLEET members are not accepted at this point. And the "centerpiece ships" of Star Trek (Enterprise, Defiant, Voyager, and Rio Grande) aren't available chapter name options. Beyond that, it's pretty wide open.

The Department of Technical Services does maintain a list of well over 4,000 hulls, already-established fictional ships just waiting to be used. It's not required that one use one of those ships, although it is recommended.

Assuming that one is going on one's own to choose your group's name, here are a few hints:

1. Have a couple of choices. In case one name's taken, a backup is always good to have ready.

2. Discuss the name with the crew. This is the group's identity, not a CO's pet project. The crew, or at least a healthy majority of them, should be happy with the name.

3. Don't be afraid to do research. Names mean things, and exploring the background of a potential name can introduce a level of meaning to that name you might not have been aware of.

4. Don't take six months to come up with the name "Joe". (Juuuuust kidding!)

As for the kind of names to choose, feel free to explore the possibilities. Some chapters like to name themselves after ships we've seen on Star Trek, or borrow names from the lists from the various manuals or blueprint sets out there. Others name themselves after people or places, either modern or historic, that reflect something of what the group wishes to represent. Still others name themselves for real-life military or exploration vessels. And that's not the limit, not at all. There's such a huge diversity of possibilities that sometimes it can seem a little overwhelming. Don't be daunted by that, though. Make the process of choosing names fun. Make it a game, even, with members of the group sharing ideas and playing with possibilities.

And if there are questions about a potential group's name options, don't hesitate to contact Shuttle Operations or the Department of Technical Services. I'll be happy to help answer any questions you might have.

In future columns, I'll continue to talk about different aspects of the Shuttlecraft Program. If you've got anything you'd like to see addressed, or maybe a question that you think people would enjoy reading the answer to, please don't hesitate to contact me. Those questions and suggestions might well find their way into future columns.

Switching gears for a moment, over in the staffing area, we have three items this issue. First, we have a new staff appointment. It is my pleasure to welcome Lauren Milan of the USS Avenger to the ShOC staff, serving in the position of Graphic Designer. Lauren will be reporting to Johnathan "Gumby" Simmons (in his role as ShOC Publications Director). Lauren has already contributed the ShOC logo for this administration, and is increasingly known in 'Fleet circles for her fine website work. We're quite pleased to have her as part of Team ShOC.

Second, last issue I announced a new position opening in DTS. Response has thus far been negligible, so I'm going to extend the search. We are seeking a schematics artist to aid in both the design of new ships and to flesh out designs, which we know something about, but may not have good drawings of. This artist must be able to do schematic drawings (plans and elevation views, at the least) in a reasonable period of time, working from known technologies and proposals for new designs that chapters may submit. While it's common now to see new designs rendered in various computer-modeling programs, straightforward engineering schematics seem to be in shorter supply, and DTS would like to add a staffer to help us create them.

To apply for this position, please contact me by within a month following the release of the Communiqué. Send the following:

1. A short resume with a description of

your abilities and experience that are relevant to creating schematics. Real-life and STARFLEET experience is what I'm interested in.

2. Top plan and side elevation drawings of the following four starships:

Constitution-class heavy cruiser (Original Series Enterprise) Enterprise-class heavy cruiser (refit Enterprise/Enterprise-A) Galaxy-class large exploratory cruiser (Enterprise-D) Sovereign-class heavy cruiser (Enterprise-E)

By having everyone do the same four ships, you demonstrate that you can handle tech over a span of time in the Trek Universe, and I can get an objective comparison of everyone's relative capabilities.

Drawings may be sent in electronic or hardcopy format, but if you send electronic files, please be sure that they can be printed out in black and white. In general, bmp, gif, jpg, pdf, and doc files can be accepted. Check with me if you want to use any other formats.

The MHA Road Show



Don's article goes into more details on the who and what, but I'd like to take this opportunity to thank these four folks for coming on board to assist in the never-ending (and often thankless) task of processing STARFLEET membership applications.

What else?

Don also talks a bit about our plans for a new credit card mechanism that will allow online transaction processing. The result will be that members joining STARFLEET online, or renewing memberships online, will know, before they leave the web site, whether their credit card transactions have been successful or not. One of our biggest difficulties with the online memberships has been the all-toofrequent declined card transaction. Whether this is due to an unexpected balance shift at the member's end, or a typo in the card number or expiration date on the part of the member or the CompOps staffer, a declined card means a membership that can't be processed. We want to make sure that, if your card's not going to work, you'll know about it, and you'll know the ball is in your court. The Membership Processing crew won't even get the application until the credit card transaction has been approved. You won't have to wonder when your card will be charged, and we won't have to wonder whether we'll get your money!

Also, we've been working closely with the STARFLEET Communications department, in particular Senior Vice Chief Greg Trotter and Chief Mike Malotte, both of whom have put an enormous amount of work into the STARFLEET Helpdesk this spring. They're making it easier for members to communicate with any part of STARFLEET's staff, without necessarily needing to know precisely whom to talk to. This is a great expansion of the CompOpsHELP system instituted under former CompOps Chief Jesse Smith to the Fleet as a whole, not just CompOps.

THE STARFLEET COMMUNIQUÉ ISSUE 105 — JUNE/JULY 2001

The rush and backlogs from the administration transition is for the most part over, with only faint echoes of the rumbling that so dictated the first few months of this year. With the increasing calm, we can begin to think about what directions to take Membership Processing, i.e. the reasons I volunteered for this job in the first place!

A Different Paradigm for Credit Card Processing

With the recent R1 summit, Les Rickard, Mark H. Anbinder, Chris Wallace and I sat down and had a very useful discussion about Membership Processing procedures and where we want to take matters. The first target for improving Membership Processing is processing of credit card applications recieved on-line.

We'd like to move the responsibility for ensuring a successful transaction off Membership Processing and onto a secure site that can interact with an Internet merchant and process the transaction live. Membership Processing would only be involved after a successful credit card transaction has occurred. This would greatly reduce my workload and improve response time at the same time. Currently I have to go through a labor-intensive process to validate the CC/perform the transaction/perform bookkeeping so Tammy & Howard can track my work before even thinking about shipping a packet.

The details of how we're going to do this is still being investigated, and there are issues that MHA and I will have to investigate/resolve before presenting this to the EC Finance Committee and the Admiralty Board. We've been looking at several credible/trusted online vendors (PayPal, Verisign, etc.) and are in the process of selecting the right mix of functionality vs. cost. Before anyone panics and jumps to the conclusion we're going to raise rates to do this--just remember--the cost of credit card processing is already in the membership dues. That is, we currently pay approximately already 3 1/2% of every dollar we currently bring in via online membership. There is the very real possibility we can cut the rate down a little bit in the process of eliminating MP overhead. A winwin scenario for everyone, eh?

I'm hoping in my next CQ article I'll be able to report the results of those discussions, and more importantly, the successful implementation of this change in direction(!)

Welcome Sandy Berenberg and the MPCorps!

I'm pleased to announce the addition of Sandy Berenberg to the Membership Processing team. Sandy and his

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MEMBERSHIP PROCESSING UPDATE By Captain Don Willits • Membership Processing Coordinator, STARFLEET

"Membership Processing Corps" of three able-bodied members of the Highlander will assist me with CC renewals starting in June. Sandy is a fellow data wonk, and I'm really excited by both the technical expertise and the passion he is bringing to the job. We speak the same technical language and our skills seem to complement each other nicely. I see Sandy as a key piece in enabling Computer Operations to implement the Data Center.

Les indirectly put me on the road to the data center back in January of 2000 when I took over online MSR pages. Sandy took the same road during his consideration of how to run membership processing during the election season last year. While we both developed our vision/ passion for where to take MP independently, we both share much of the same vision for where we want to take Fleet's membership processing and database operations.

As an aside: I do have to admit that vision evolved considerably after I took over the actual job of membership processing!

I mentioned Sandy and his team helping with CC applications--I see that as a shortterm gig. With luck, we can eliminate the bulk of the overhead currently required for CC applications so that when you renew online, all MP has to do is print your certificate/card, stuff your packet, and slap a mailing label on it. Then Sandy and I can both move onto bigger and better things in terms of serving the membership.

Sandy is also going to be taking over MP's response to HelpDesk tickets. So far, my passion for the HelpDesk hasn't been able to match the reality of the job, in that I really only get to attack the tickets during the bi-monthly rush to get mailing label data generated for the CQ. Sandy will be able to monitor the HelpDesk on a more regular basis and improve our responsiveness there as well.

Along with Sandy, I'd also like to welcome members of his MP Corps who will be helping with data entry on the database for CC applications: Gerri Wampler, Rick Driver, and Gerry Sylvester.

Welcome aboard to MP! I'm really excited by where together I think we'll be able to take 'Fleet!

Tis the Budget's the thing!

In May we (the Rickard administration) also started serious work on generating a budget for Fleet operations. This is different from the expense reports you've seen in Tammy Willcox's Treasurer Reports. It is difficult for us to plan for the future if we don't have a solid idea of financially where we can expect to be. Membership Processing, being the major source of revenue, and one of two major sources of expense, will play a key role in this. Deidre Rickard is driving this issue, and with luck we should start to have some numbers gel into place this summer.

Chapter Affiliation Cards and Expiration Notification

The chapter affiliation card has come and gone over the years. With some of the backlogs settling down, and more importantly, as we work to eliminate some of the overhead of Membership Processing inflicted by Credit Card processing, we're planning on bringing these back. You can look forward to some more excellent artwork by Chris Wallace.

Right now, though, we're not printing the cards right now. To be honest, it was just plain forgotten during the transition last winter by all parties concerned. We wanted to start printing them in May, but now the plan is to hopefully start printing them in June.

Along with affiliation cards, we (Sandy!) are going to be tweaking the membership database application to be restoring functionality to send e-mail notification when a member is approaching renewal time. We're also hoping to add post card notification to members who have expired, sending the cards after the expiration date. From past experience, this has been shown to be worth the cost of the postcards in fetching expired members back into 'Fleet.

Rank-lookups in the Database

I recently updated the membership database, adding ranks that were listed in the Membership Handbook but not included in the database. This did not involve my setting ranks in membership records so much as ensuring that the lookup table that lists all possible ranks was correct/complete (that is, so that all ranks listed in the Membership Handbook are actually available in the database). I was able to accomplish this thanks in part to some work/research Chris Wallace performed for me back in early January, but hadn't had time to get to for the last three months.

However, many chapters in Fleet have defined their own rank structures that go beyond what is defined in the Membership Handbook. At this time, we cannot manage or track these extra ranks, but this ability is something that may be possible with the Data Center. It is, though, compared to other more pressing issues, very low in priority.

Data Integrity Redux

Deborah Malotte recently provided me with a complete database for promotions for 2001, 2000, 1999 and 1998. I'll shortly be merging that data into the official database. Marlene Miller is in the process of collecting all of our OCC data for me, which will also be merged in soon.

MP Report Card

With the backlogs going away, MP is settling down - still not close to the 2-week turnaround time for every membership recieved every week...but we're nudging steadily closer. 6-8 weeks is the stated goal, but 2-weeks came up last year, and we're trying our best to see if we can meet it more often than not. From a purely selfish perspective, if I can keep up with every application that comes in on a weekly basis - it takes less time per application to process. If the membership backlog grows past more than a week, it seems like the time it takes to catch up goes up geometrically for each additional packet--something I want to avoid!!!

Here's MP's report card since my last report. April was a difficult month for personal reasons with the death of my grandmother.

92 Credit Card Applications recieved between April 30th and May 25th: 2-5 week est. turnaround.

43 Check Applications recieved between April 27th and May 19th: 2-5 week est. turnaround.

80 Credit Card Applications recieved between April 4th and April 30th: 2-7 week est. turnaround.

33 Check Applications recieved between April 4th and April 27th: 2-7 week est. turnaround.

42 Credit Applications recieved between March 18th and April 4th: 3-4 week est. turnaround.

59 Check applications recieved between March 18th and April 4th: 2-4 week est. turnaround.

As always, you should renew 6-8 weeks before your expiration date.

Any active STARFLEET member is eligible

for a STARFLEET Scholarship. The Scholarships are awarded in amounts of \$500. Members can be attending community colleges, four-year colleges, most technical schools, junior colleges and universities or graduate school. Members must fill out an application, write two short essays, three letters of recommendation, school transcripts and acceptance letter to college. No financial information is requested.

The application period is generally from January 1 until May 1. Those scholarships will be awarded in July for classes starting in the fall.





Courses may be taken in any order. However, prior to taking the Master Chef course, a student must have successfully completed the Chef exam and any two other components of B.U.R.P.S.


Greetings from the DOG Pound!

In May 2001, Pocket Books published Avatar, a Star Trek: Deep Space Nine novel, in two volumes. It's written by S.D. Perry, who has previously contributed two stories to The Lives of Dax and has written the novelizations of Timecop and Virus. Under the name Stella Howard, Ms. Perry has written an original novel based on the series Xena: Warrior Princess.

Avatar begins three months after DS9's finale, "What You Leave Behind," and focuses on Colonel Kira's command of the station. A surprise attack by what's left of the Dominion kills hundreds of StarFleet and Bajoran militia officers as well as civilians. As well, an ancient Bajoran text is discovered that incites religious controversy among the populace - one of its prophecies is that the birth of the son of the Emissary (Kasidy Yates' unborn child) will require the death of 10,000. What that actually means will be revealed at the end of the second volume, but several of

the more conservative elements of Bajoran religious hierarchy have their own interpretation of it.

We meet again a former Enterprise officer who becomes the station's new chief of security, and are introduced to three new characters - Commander Tiris Jast, a Bolian senior officer who commands the Defiant; Shar, the reticent Andorian science officer; and Elias Vaughn, a longtime Starfleet officer at a crossroads in his life.

I found both volumes of the novel hard to put down. In the post-TOS era, Deep Space Nine has always been my favorite and I'm glad to see the "8th season" begin with a well-considered blend of action, characterization and thoughtprovoking issues of religion, culture and society. Pocket Books is taking up the threads of themes begun in Star Trek: The Next Generation and Star Trek: Deep Space Nine quite effectively and I look forward to further adventures in this series.

More ambassadors for different races will be added as needed.

The Alien Ambassador Corps is unique to STARFLEET. The AAC deals with the fictional side of the alien races. Each ambassador has an alter ego and persona. Most ambassadors have

written a background detailing their past as the race they represent. The AAC deals with the role-playing side of STARFLEET. In STARFLEET, you see many Human officers and members. Occasionally, you find a STARFLEET member wanting to be an alien race, which you see most of the time as Klingon. The Star Trek world has had many various aliens only a few that you see people claiming to be. You will see Klingons everywhere, but when was the last time you saw someone in full blue makeup as an Andorian or Bolian? As RDC of the AAC, I have seen more people saying that they are Romulan, Vorta, Orion or Horta then I have seen before.

The AAC has grown by leaps and

bounds in the recent months. We have added Bajoran, Borg, Deltan, Dominion, Romulans, and Trill ambassadors in just the last 3 months. On our AAC list serve, the ambassadors can role-play or discuss real concerns. With the addition of our Dominion ambassador, the AAC list serve has become very active. 

UPN ANNOUNCES 2001-2002 SCHEDULE

On Thursday, May 17, 2001, UPN had its annual "Upfront" -- a presentation of its fall TV schedule for advertisers, media buyers and the press - at Madison Square Garden in New York City. The presentation was also beamed via satellite to sites in Chicago and Los Angeles.

The network had scored a coup some weeks before when Mutant Enemy, Inc., Kuzui Enterprises/Sandollar Television and 20th Century Fox Television., the producers of Buffy the Vampire Slayer, had sold the broadcast

rights for new episodes to UPN beginning with the 2001-02 season. This became a plot point in the short film that began the presentation. Two UPN executives - chief officer executive Dean Valentine and executive vice president of network sales Michael Mandelker - starred with William Shatner ("This is how I navigated on the Enterprise," Shatner says as he and Valentine play Asteroids) in a spoof of Mission: Impossible showing how UPN "stole" Buffy from the WB network.

The actual presentation was MC'd by Tom Nunan, of president UPN's division. entertainment Probably mindful of the fact that many of those present were eager for news about the fifth (sixth, if you count the animated series of 1973-74) Star Trek series, Enterprise, the schedule was presented in backwards order starting with Tuesday.

Buffy the Vampire Slayer will remain at its familiar time slot of Tuesdays at 8 p.m. Appearing on stage to accompany a clip reel of scenes from this past season (at press time, UPN had not completed negotiations to show any of the episodes that had been broadcast by the WB) were creator/executive producer Joss Whedon and executive producer Marti Noxon as well as stars Anthony Stewart Head (Giles), Emma Caulfield (Anya), James Marsters (Spike) and Michelle Trachtenberg

(Dawn).

The news of the morning (negotiations had apparently concluded only the night before) was that UPN had picked up Roswell, which was due for cancellation by the WB. Unfortunately, none of the young stars of the series, about young aliens stranded on Earth, appeared.

Monday night's lineup will consist of four comedies - The Hughleys, One on One (a new sitcom starring Flex Alexander and Kyla Pratt; it replaces to science-fiction audiences is the special Iron Chef Showdown in Las Vegas, hosted by William Shatner (whose line from the presentation "Why does everything have to be about [insert dramatic pause] Smackdown?!" should be a standard line for Shatner imitators from now on). On Iron Chef, previously a hallmark of the Food Network, four master chefs representing American, Italian, French and Asian cuisine - will face off against each other in a culinary showdown. Other specials scheduled include The Source Hip-Hop Music Awards 2001



No word on whether he will croon the shows Themesong for good measure: William Shatner (who also performed in a hilarious filmed skit with UPN chairman and CEO Dean Valentine) will be the host of "Iron Chef" competitions this fall.

Moesha), The Parkers and Girlfriends. Stars from all of the series did a brief smile-and-wave appearance on stage. Friday nights (UPN has no regular new programming on either Saturday or Sunday nights at this time) will be a continuation of The UPN Movie Night; clips were shown of theatrical films such as The Specialist, Dark City, How Stella Got Her Groove Back and The Fifth Element.

The network has quite a few specials scheduled for the 2001-02 season. Of paramount (no pun intended) interest and Mo'nique's Holiday House Party, starring the comedienne from The Parkers.

A series based on Stephen King's The Dead Zone (a film adaptation starring Christopher Walken was made in the 1980's) is scheduled as a mid-season entry. It stars Anthony Michael Hall as Johnny Smith, a man newly emerged from a six-year coma, who finds that he has the power to perceive people's past or future just by touching them. Nicole de Boer (best known as Ezri Dax on the last season of Star Trek: Deep Space 9) co-stars as Smith's former girlfriend.

Thursday nights, of course, will consist of the highly rated WWF Smackdown (cue William Shatner line here). Vince and Linda McMahon did a smile-andwave on stage to accompany the clip reel.

Then came the news I suspect most if not all of the audience was waiting for: Enterprise would lead off Wednesday nights at 8 p.m. (a slot formerly held by 7 Days, which is being

cancelled). However, as the series was only then going into production, there were no stills nor film of the sets or ships, and not even Scott Bakula (best known as Sam Beckett on Quantum Leap), who will be playing Captain Jonathan Archer, was available for appearances. A short film of the production staff - executive producers Rick Berman and Brannon Braga, production designer Herman Zimmerman talking about the Trek phenomenon and legacy was shown.

Following Enterprise will be the second season of Special Unit 2, which had its premiere this past spring. Special Unit 2 - whose stars Michael Landes and Danny Woodburn appeared on stage - is a one-hour drama about an undercover Chicago police unit tasked to deal with "links" - creatures that slipped through the evolutionary cracks to terrorize mankind.

After the presentation, the various stars and producers circulated with the press and advertisers at a reception buffet. I shook Joss Whedon's hand and told him how much I enjoyed his work and looked forward to the new season. Whedon is a friendly, affable man who gladly posed with people.

It looks like this fall on TV will be a good one for Trek fans. The summer will seem quite long as we wait.



"Having fun and getting it done" was the motto of the 2001 Region One Summit in Greensboro NC. Held April 27-29, the Summit was co-hosted by RAdms. Ron Fell and Jack Hopkins and featured the usual mix of breakout sessions, food, fun and partying. The Summit kicked off Saturday morning with the posting of the colors. The Region was lucky to have several EC and AB members attending: FAdm. Les Rickard, CompOps Head RAdm. Mark H. Anbinder, FCapt. Fleet Treasurer Tammy Willcox (also R1 Co-Treasurer), SFMC Commandant Wade Olson, R5RC Scott Akers, R2VRC Jennifer Rosbury, and Don Willits and Chris "Tigger" Wallace of Membership Processing. 

Over the past years that I have been in STARFLEET, I have heard many people talk about STARFLEET and how political it has become. This impact caused the door to cave in to the interior of the van hitting the rear seat that Margie was sitting in. Glass from the rear door shattered and sent it forward to the windshield

The impact also caused our vehicle to jump forward into the truck in front of us. The

STARFLEET continually boasts that "it's all about the friendships" we make that is the real "Fleet experience". It was proved to me this past April 19.

Neither of us is sure exactly when we first started chatting on the Fleet IRC, but in the summer of 1997 I was taking advantage of free internet access at the radio station where I worked in Florida and John "Kiwi" Kane was on the other side of the planet in New Zealand. We started chatting about all kinds of things and over time a friendship blossomed.

Fast forward a few years and Kiwi has moved to North Carolina and is once again in touch with me. We do the math and decide we are now way too close not to get together and finally meet face to face. Easy...or so you'd think. Shore Leave? No. Region 2 Summit? Can't make it. Region 1 Summit? Can't get off work.

Then, one night during a chat, I mentioned watching a shuttle launch from my back

truck gave good credit to Fords. No damage was done to that vehicle but it caused the front of our van to cave in. We now looked like an accordion. vehicle ran over to us with a first aid kit and helped bandage up her wounds. We found out that approx. 43 vehicles were involved, which closed I85 for over 4 hours.

As our vehicle stopped, I got out of the van after checking the two kids out who had been sitting in the seats behind me. I went around to the rear to see the damage and realized that Margie had been injured. I went around to the side door and went to check on Margie's injuries. When I looked at her, she was in mild shock and bleeding from the right side of her face, down her neck and her right arm. I began to treat her injuries when a woman from a near by It took an hour after the accident for an ambulance to arrive to our location to take Margie and the kids to a near by hospital. After a few more hours had passed, I too was able to get to the hospital to check on them.

After Margie was released later that night, we realized that we were stranded with almost no money and no vehicle. After trying to think what to do, I realized that just

a few weeks before at the Region 2 Summit I had met the CO of the USS Shadow Hawk; Josh Ainsworth who was located in Phenix City, AL. I called Josh on his cell phone and explained the situation. Without questions Josh said he was on the way to get us. When he did, Josh opened his home to me and my family for a much needed rest. The next day Josh had talked to another member of his crew and explained what had happened. This person was no other than Steve Gordon. Steve, a veteran of the SFMC, volunteered to take us all the way back to Florida, a 3-hour one way trip. As we prepared to leave from Josh's home, I tried to compensate him for his time, gas and food he provided. Josh looked at me and replied, "No, we are a STARFLEET family and I know you would have done the same". I thanked him and his wife and we headed home.

The trip home was fun and we got to know Steve even better. After the 3 hour drive I offered Steve compensation, once again Steve wanted nothing. He too just said, "we are all a STARFLEET Family and that any Marine would have done the same." I requested to at least give him some gas for his long journey home.

After being home, I began to ponder the idea that if it was not for these two STARFLEET members going completely out of their way, what would have I done with my family if we stayed stranded in the Atlanta area? But I am thankful I did not have to find out and I am most thankful to Josh and Steve, not only for their help in the accident, but for showing me why STARFLEET is so important and what STAFleet really means.

Hours of chatting and megabites of information back and forth were finally to turn to real flesh and blood.

We had sent pictures back and forth, so immediate identification was easy. He looked a little shorter than I figured! We made our hellos and then had a picnic lunch, as the countdown grew closer.

I had seen almost every shuttle launch from 90 miles away but I still was in no way ready for the emotional response to seeing the ship rise on a plume of fire and smoke as close as we were. e were not close enough to feel the thrust from the engines but as the sip began it's roll we could hear their rumble roll over us. Fantastic.

We headed to the Kennedy Space Center visitors Complex. One hint: if you ever want to go to the Visitor's Complex...don't go on the day of a launch. The ticket lines looked like Disney! We opted to just visit the gift shop.

While not in the tourists' guides I spotted something we just had to stop to check

out on the road headed away from KSC. In front of a lolac business was a giant boulder painted as a globe. A perfect photo opportunity! Kiwi was aghast to find that New Zealand was not represented. He vowed to return someday and paint it in himself!

The day was capped off with dinner at a nearby Chili's. The meal was laced with talk of "when we do this again...". So, it could easily be said a good time was had by all. The Captain's male Targ, Koloth, and LTCOL Bishop's female Targ, Worfie, became parents recently, much to the delight of the crew. In honor of this fact, and because we now must find homes for eight targlets, here is a Targ Owners Guide to assist anyone interested in adopting a Targ:

TARG OWNERS GUIDE

Owning a Klingon Targ as a pet presents unique challenges. First of all, targs are NOT domesticated; they are wild animals. They are, however, very intelligent, and are capable of forming strong bonds with other sentient species. Klingons in particular seem to have an affinity for the beasts. Perhaps the fact that both Klingons and Targs are hunters strengthens the bond.

Targs can weigh from a birth weight of six KG to a full 200 KG at maturity. They are usually only 10 CM tall at birth, but can grow to 1.5 M in height at maturity. Caring for them will require extra effort and awareness.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

A targ should not be treated gently. This does not mean that the animal should be abused, simply that in dealing with a targ, like dealing with Klingons, aggressiveness and strength are the most useful methods.

Targs will eat just about anything, but a balance of roots, tubers, grubs, and the

rotate between all available blankets.

TRAINING

A targ is a very intelligent beast, and will respond well with training. As with other pets, targs can be trained with what is commonly called the "Carrot and Stick" method. However, remember always to speak boldly to the targ. Do not use soft gentle tones or any sort of "baby talk". The beast will ignore this tone completely.

Klingons use a variety of speech called "clipped Klingon" in addressing pets. For a more detailed explanation, refer to the most excellent linguistic learning tape "Power Klingon" by Marc Okrand. Here are a few useful phrases. Note that when speaking to a pet, the commands are prefaced with the word 'Shhh'.

SIT - ba'! (or, shhhh ba'!)

STAND - Qam! (pronounced kkaahhmmm!)

COME - naDev ghoS! (pronounced nah dev gohhssshh!)

> ATTACK - Hiv (pronounced kkkkhhhiv!)

DO NOT DO THAT - mev! (pronounced mehvv!)

STAY - yIratlh! (pronounced yeeerahttllhhh!) NO - ghobe'! (pronounced go bay!)

Reward the targ with small treats, such as grubs or beetles, after successful completion of a command.

Finally, a targ can be an excellent companion. Targs will actually play with their owners. They are fond of running in open fields, hunting together, or playing "tug of war" with a rope or belt. Targs enjoy being scratched all over, particularly the ears and belly. Do not be gentle in this, but forceful, especially on the belly. The targ will often lie on its back and grunt enthusiastically, wiggling its legs while the belly is being rubbed.

As the bond with a targ grows, the animal will become fiercely protective, and will display aggression towards unknown persons who approach them. The targ will need to be introduced to new beings, as well as any other animal that is to be preserved alive and not eaten. A simple nose to nose position, with some direct "STAY" and "NO" commands, coupled with a downward push on the targ's neck or snout will convey the meaning to the targ that the animal in front of it is not to be harmed.

Targ ownership is not for all sentients, but those who choose a targ and train it properly will find it to be an excellent companion and guard, as well as a dedicated, life long friend. It is an Honorable Endeavor!

ON THE COMING OF ARAGORN

The Hitchhikers Guide to Middle Earth, Part Two

Aragorn is for those of us familiar with *Lord of the Rings* one of the central characters in the saga, and having taken a particular interest in his development as a character, I thought I would share with you what I have discovered about him and his lineage and his role in the history of Middle Earth, but in order to do that I have to take you back on a journey through time into the history of Middle Earth as it is described in detail in *The Silmarillion* (if you have not read this book, it is in itself a historical account of the First Age and part of the Second Age of Middle Earth).

The First Age

Mythologically speaking, the First Age of Middle Earth is not unlike much of Greek mythology, and begins with a "beginning of the world" at the hands of some deific beings (which I described previously). I want to carry you a bit further forward and begin with the Quenya, or Elves, and remind you of the several families of elves, some of whom journeyed and some who did not journey from their birthplace in Cuivienien in Middle Earth.

Recall that those elves that do remain in Cuivienien came to be known as the Dark Elves or Moriquendi (and these also include those elves, the Sindar and Nandor and Laiquendi that left Cuivienien but never came to the Undying Lands of Aman to see the light of the two trees), and the Calaquendi, those elves that DID cross over the sea to Aman and witnessed the light of the two trees in Valinor.

These Calaquendi or "Elves of Light" are of the most interest, being of three groups - the Vanyar (who were the first to arrive in Aman and dwelled near the two trees in Valinor), the Noldor (who later were for the most part exiled from Aman), and the Teleri (who came to Aman but lived by the sea, viewing the trees in Valinor from their homes on the shores of the sea).

The Vanyar are of little consequence to Aragorn's lineage, as are the Teleri - it is the Noldor who returned to Middle Earth that play a major role in his

lineage...

Melkor, one of the Valar (deities) came to be a voice of dissention and evil and was ultimately chained for three long ages and eventually came to Middle Earth after destroying the two trees in Valinor and stealing the three *silmarils* fashioned by the Noldor elf, Feanor. So let's take a look at the Noldor and how they came to Middle Earth.

Their high king Finwe who took two wives ruled the Noldor. His first wife was Miriel, and they had a son Feanor (who later had seven sons - Maedhros, Maglor, Celegorm, Caranthir, Curufin, Amros, and Amras). His second wife was Indis of the Vanyar, and they had two sons - Fingolfin and Finarfin. Fingolfin had two sons (Fingon and Turgon) and a daughter (Aredhel) and Finarfin had four sons (Finrod, Orodreth, Angrod, and Aegnor) and a daughter (Galadriel).

Now Feanor, perhaps knowing of the evil being brewed by Melkor and perhaps by his own vanity, fashioned from the light of the two trees in Valinor three stones, the *silmarils* which were ultimately stolen by Melkor during which time he destroyed the two trees and fled. In the process he killed Finwe, thus passing kingship of the Noldor to Finwe's son Feanor.

Feanor, not to be deprived of his creation, swore a terrible oath against the Valar and sought to retrieve the silmarils from Melkor (now called Morgoth) in Middle Earth. For this oath, the sons of Finwe were banished from Valinor and began an exile to Middle Earth. On the way, Feanor ordered an attack on the Teleri elves at the shores of the sea and their ships were stolen and many Teleri were killed in what came to be known as "the kinslaying" - the Noldor under Finarfin chose to repent and Finarfin's host remained in Aman, forgiven by the Valar. However, the bulk of the Noldor began their exile to Middle Earth:

• Feanor and his sons (Maedhros, Maglor, Celegorm, Caranthir, Curufin, Amrod, Amras)

• Fingolfin and his children (Aredhel, Fingon, Turgon)

• Finarfin's children (Finrod, Orodreth, Angrod, Aegnor, Galadriel)

Feanor, in some measure of cruelty, abandoned Fingolfin and his children who thus came to Middle Earth from the far north across a land bridge called the Helcaraxe, while Feanor and his host and the sons of Finarfin crossed the sea.

And so the Noldor crossed to Middle Earth.

Middle Earth meanwhile was populated by the elves that did not cross to Aman. These elves were ruled by Elwe (who had in fact been to Aman but had returned to Middle Earth) who was the king of the Sindar known as "Thingol" and who was married to one of the Maiar (vassals of the Valar) known as Melian. In addition, a number of elves lived to the south and along the borders of the sea in Middle Earth - Lenwe and his son Denethor ruled those in the south, and more importantly those by the sea were ruled by Cirdan (who would later play in important part in the War for the One Ring).

So the Noldor, the Sindar, and the other elves were in Middle Earth. And then came the Atani, the mortal men, from the east across into the land known as Beleriand which was occupied by the elves. And it's here that the story starts, particularly that of Aragorn's lineage.

Men and Elves

Remember that elves are in the lore undying, immortal, and it is men that grow old and die. However, through the First Age, elves and men on rare occasions come to marry and it's through these marriages that the line of Aragorn is born.

Let's trace the children of Turgon (Noldor elf) and Galadriel (Noldor elf) and their marriages to mortal men and see how this gets us to Elrond and Elros and then we'll talk about some of the history (probably in a Part 3).

Of the mortal men, three houses come into play - that of a man named Haldad, that of a man named Marach, and that of Beor... • Haldad has two sons, Haleth and Haldar, and Haldar's line of children comes to Halmir who has two sons (Hareth and Haldir)

• Marach has a lineage of sons and grandsons and so forth that comes to a man named Hador Lorindol who has three children (Glorhedel a daughter and two sons Gundor and Galdor)

• Beor has a long line that comes to a man named Bregor, who has two sons (Bregolas and Barahir).

Okay... here's where it gets confusing, but try to follow me and I think it will make sense:

Hareth (from Haldad's line) marries Galdor (from Marach's line) and they have two sons (Hurin and Huor) Bregolas (from Beor's line) has two sons (Baragund and Belegund). Baragund has a daughter (Morwen) who marries Hurin (Huor's brother) More importantly, Huor marries Rian (Belegund's daughter) and they have a son Tuor.

So The Lines Of Haldad And Marach And Beor All Come Together With Tuor

Tuor, believe it or not, marries Turgon's daughter Idril (and so a man and elf are married) and their son is Earendil the Half-Elven who ends up being the father to Elrond and Elros.

Now for Elrond and Elros' mother...

Elwe (Thingol) the elf king of the Sindar and his wife Melian the Maiar have one child Luthien. Luthien ends up marrying Barahir's son Beren (go back to Beor's line with Bregolas and Barahir mentioned above).

Beren (who's a mortal man) and Luthien (who's actually part Maiar and part elf) have a son, Dior (who's got elf, man, and Maiar in him). Dior marries an elf, Nimloth and they have three children (Elwing a daughter and two sons Elured and Elurin). Elwing is the mother of Elrond and Elros.

So we basicall have two big marriages of elf and man - Tuor and Idril, and Beren and Luthien that eventually give us Elrond and Elros.

Now we return to the Noldor and their



exile and their curse.

On the curse of the Noldor

The Noldor, upon being banished to Middle Earth, carried with them a curse surrounding the silmarils made by their high king Feanor. The curse basically leads up to the death of about all the Noldor and the destruction of Beleriand in an apocalyptic flood.

Here's how it goes (as briefly as I can make it)...

Through the first age, there are a number of battles between Morgoth who dwells far in the north in a fortress known as Angband and the elves who dwell in Beleriand (if you want maps you gotta go read the books). There are actually 6 big battles in the first age known as the Wars of Beleriand...

• An unnamed battle where Morgoth is defeated by Thingol and Denethor (this is even before the Noldor really get involved). It is only after this that Feanor and the Noldor land in Middle Earth.

• Dagor-nuin-Giliath, the Second Battle, where the Noldor defeat Morgoth but Feanor is slain (and Fingolfin becomes the king of the Noldor in Middle Earth).

• Dagor Aglareb, where Morgoth attacks Beleriand but Fingolfin and Maedhros defeat Morgoth's armies of orcs.

From here it goes downhill for the elves...

• The Noldor seige Angband to get the silmarils (unsuccessfully) but they hold off Morgoth and his young dragons (Glauring is the first dragon). There is a long peace that is followed by:

• Dagor Bragollach, the Fourth Battle • lots of elves and men alike are killed including Fingolfin (he's slain attacking Angband) as well as Angrod and Aegnor and a lot of the elves have to retreat southward near the kingdom of Thingol.

• Nirnaeth Arnoediad - this is a biggie, where most of the Noldor and most of the leaders of the Edain (men) are killed. Sauron (Morgoth's vassal) takes control of a Noldor stronghold. A number of elves and men are killed including Fingon (Morgoth's balrogs get him), Amrod, and Amras

From here it goes even further downhill as the elves, both the Noldor and Thingol, become obsessed with obtaining the silmarils...

• Celegorm and Curufin are slain by Dior where they try to steal the one

silmaril held by Thingol (he gets it from Beren as a dowery to marry his daughter Luthien, and he loses a hand, dies, and comes back to life just to get that far).

• Aredhel is slain by another elf (her husband in fact) in Turgon's hidden kingdom of Gondolin (her husband tries to kill his son for choosing Turgon over him but Aredhel steps in the way of the poison arrow) and of course Aredhel's husband buys the big one for that.

• Maeglin, who is Aredhel's son, gets slain by Tuor (Earendil's father) when he tries to take power from Turgon (turns out Maeglin is in league with Morgoth but Tuor is loyal to Turgon who rules Gondolin)

• Finrod gets captured and slain by one of Morgoth's wolves

• Orodreth gets slain by the dragon Glaurung

By this time, the Noldor have gotten their asses kicked trying to get a hold of the silmarils. Only the following are left (and their deaths are juicy):

• Maedhros and Maglor end up stealing two silmarils but Maedhros is driven mad by his silmaril and throws himself into a fiery pit (strike Maedhros and one silmaril from the history books) and Maglor casts his into the sea and wanders as a madman (strike the second silmaril from the history books).

• Celegorm and Curufin as noted were scragged by Dior trying to steal Thingol's silmaril (he's wearing it on a necklace fashioned by the dwarves... just wait, it gets really juicy for Thingol)

• Turgon gets killed in his hidden fortress when Maeglor gives away its location to Morgoth's armies.

• Finally dwarves who steal the only remaining silmaril on Thingol's necklace kill Thingol but the necklace gets stolen back by Beren and Luthien.

By the time all this is finished, almost no one is left alive...

• Cirdan is hiding on an island far to the south along with a lot of the Noldor and Sindar elves who survived (and we know he makes it to the Third Age)

• Maglor actually fosters Elrond and Elros before he gets involved and Elrond and Elros wind up hiding with their parents Earendil and Elwing in Cirdan's havens (although we know Maglor goes nuts and wanders off)

• Celebrimbor, who is Curufin's son, actually survives but he ends up forging the three elven rings of power that Sauron kills him for in the Second Age (and Sauron goes on to make the One Rig)

• Gil-Galad, who is Fingon's son, lives in hiding with Cirdan after all

this business (and he buys the big one attacking Sauron's fortress in the Second Age)

- Idril, you remember her (Tuor's wife, Earendil's mother) - she tried to sail across the sea to Aman and is never heard from again

• Earendil and Elwing are lucky... thanks to Beren and Luthien who steal back the last silmaril and give it to their son Dior and pass it to Elwing... Earendil and Elwing are admitted to Aman because they have the silmaril, and Earendil becomes the only mortal man to go to Aman - Earendil is set in the sky with the silmaril and captains his boat across the skies as a beacon for men for the rest of time and Elwing gets to stay in Aman

• Galadriel is the only one of the Noldor who survives - she hides with Cirdan and we know she makes it to the third age (although she remains banished in Middle Earth until after Sauron is defeated)

• Beren and Luthien? Well, Beren dies once, comes back to life, Luthien accepts a mortal fate for his love and they grow old and die together

And after **all** this, there's a huge final battle (the Great Battle, the Sixth Battle) where Earendil and Elwing persuade the Valar, Vanyar, and the rest of the elves in Aman to come to Middle Earth.

Morgoth is defeated and banished to a nether region, and Beleriand is swallowed by the sea leaving only some elves and men alive in a number of havens (a small piece of Beleriand becomes the new coastline called Lindon as seen in the maps in *The Hobbit* and *Lord of the Rings*.

That leaves Elrond and Elros. They are, as half-elven, given the choice to choose the immortal life as an elf or the mortal life of a man. Elrond chooses elfdom, Elros choosed manhood but is given a 500-year life span.

How this comes to Aragorn

In the Second Age, a few things happen:

1. Elros forms the Kingdom of Numenor on an island near to the Undying Lands of Aman (as a reward for their valor) but the Numenorenas are forbidden to go to Aman to seek immortality (and they of course get stupid and do it anyway and their island is wiped out and only a few people survive and these survivors become Aragorn's ancestors - that's for part 3 of my little summary though).

2. Elrond forms the haven of Imadris (Rivendell) where he helps whoever is left, including Aragorn, right up to

the end of the Third Age when the one ring is destroyed.

3. Celebrimbor gets tricked by Sauron into making the three elven rings of power (and then Sauron forges the One Ring, Celebrimbor gets killed, and we know what happens from there).

4. Cirdan remains near the sea, making ships to ferry elves back across the sea as the ages pass (eventually he goes across as well)

5. Gil-Galad fights with and is killed with Elendil (one of Elros' descndants and a forefather of Aragorn's line) when they attack Sauron's fortess in the Second Age (it's during this battle that the ring and Sauron's finger get cut off)

6. Galadriel establishes the haven in Lorien that features in *Lord of the RIngs* (and she finally gets to return across the sea at the end)

Thanks to the Numenoreans trying to obtain immortaility, Iluvatar (that supreme deity) wipes out their island during the second age and also makes the world round (where it was once flat) and therefore almost no one can even get to the Undying Lands of Aman (except for a few worthy people like Elrond, Gandalf, Galadriel and so forth who are granted this reward for helping to save the world).

Thoughts...

Basically the First Age is characterized by the Noldor and a lot of the elves having a really bad time for being overly prideful in trying to make and recover the silmarils - two of the silmarils are lost, one ends up travelling across the sky, most of the Noldor and elven kings of Middle Earth are killed, Morgoth almost takes over but gets banished outside the world, Beleriand is wiped out, and only a few elves and brave leaders of men carry forth into the Second Age, where things become a mess over the rings and the One Ring and Sauron, Morgoth's vassal, makes a mess of elves and men alike.

But that's another story and it all leads up to Aragorn...





With their help and inspiration

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In this final article dealing with human development (and yes, a little evolutionary theory) we'll cover the last branch of the Primate tree and talk about some of the periods of geologic time leading up to the present.

First, let's review some basic taxonomy and recall that the terms kingdom, phylum, class, order (and suborder and infraorder), superfamily, family (and subfamily), genus, and species help define increasingly specific levels of classification (for example, modern man can be classified as Kingdom Animalia, Phylum Chordata, Class Mammalia, Order Primates (Suborder Anthropoidea, Infraorder Catarrhini), Superfamily Hominoidea, Family Hominidae, Genus/Species Homo sapiens sapiens.

Next, let's get our bearings in the geologic record. Currently we exist in the Holocene (or Recent) Epoch (about the last 10,000 years that follows the last major glaciation of the Pleistocene Epoch (2 million - 10,000 years ago). Prior to that, the geologic period is divided into the following Epochs:

- Pliocene (5M-2M years ago)
- Miocene (24M-5M years ago)
- Oligocene (38M-24M years ago)
- Eocene (54M-38M years ago)
- Palaeocene (65M-54M years ago) which followed the mass extinction of the Cretaceous

Generally speaking, the Order Primates (which includes modern man, apes, monkeys, and prosimians that we will talk about a bit today) split into its modern precursors during the late Eocene and Oligocene Epochs). Let's start with the prosimians, which include modern tarsiers, lorises, pottos, bush babies, ave-aves, indrids, sifakas, and lemurs. The Suborder Prosimii (prosimians) can be divided into the Infraorders Adapiformes (fossils found during the Eocene), Lemuriformes (modern prosimians), and Tarsiiformes (modern tarsiers of the family Tarsiidae and Genus Tarsius). The Lemuriformes are made of the superfamilies Lemuroidae and Loroidea - Lemuroidae includes the families Lemuridae (lemurs of the Genus Varecia, Petterus, Hapalemur, Lemur, and Eulemur), Daubentonia (aye-ayes), Indridae (lemurs, indrids, and sifakas), Magalapidae (lemurs), and Cheirogalidae (lemurs), and Loroidea includes the families Loridae (lorises and pottos) and Galagonidae (bush babies). Collectively, these make up the primates we know as modern prosimians that are characterized by the following general characteristics:

generally nocturnal behavior (although some are diurnal)generally they are insectivores and bark

and fruit-eaters

- digits that allow for grasping and holding
- of branches (generally, they are arboreal) - generally quadrupedal motion (although some lemurs will walk intermittently on

their hind legs) - generally prosimians have 36 teeth in a V-shaped jaw and a 'tooth comb' used for grooming

- other primate characteristics (forwardfacing eyes, binocular vision) are also present and their brain cavities are larger than non-primate insectivores such as tree shrews

Prosimians are found in parts of Africa, Asia, Sri Lanka, Madagascar, and the East Indies an due primarily to shrinking habitats and the encroachment of human settlements, most are considered endangered species.

Comparatively, the Suborder Anthropoidea which also seems to have developed during the late Eocene and early Oligocene is the portion of the primate Order that includes modern man, apes, and monkeys and is divided into the Infraorders Platyrrhini (New World monkeys) and Catarrhini (Old World monkeys, great apes, and modern man).

Within Catarrhini are the superfamilies:

• Ceboidea (extinct forms)

· Cercopithecoidea (which has modern representatives in the family Cercopithecidae subfamily and Cercopithicinae that include Old World macaques of the genus Macaca, Old World monkeys of the genus Cercopithecus, mangabeys of the genus Cercocebus, and geladas of the genus Theropithecus and the family Cercopithecidae and subfamily Colobinae that includes langurs of the genus Rhinopithecus, and also includes a number of extinct forms from the family Victoriapithecidae)

• Hominoidea, which includes modern representatives of the family Hylobatidae (which includes gibbons of the genus Hylobates), the family Pongidae (which includes the orangutan, genus Pongo; chimpanzees, genus Pan; and gorillas, genus Gorilla), the family Hominidae (the Australopithecus and Homo genera that includes modern man), and extinct forms (Oreopithecidae, Pliopithecidae, Proconsulidae, and incertae sedis whose forms were found in the Oligocene and Miocene)

As a student and researcher into humanoid characteristics and physiology, I find the family Hominidae the most intriguing, and offer the following trace of Australopithecine and Homo genera through the Pliocene and Holocene epochs:

- Australopithecus (Ardepithecus) ramidus, 4.4M years ago
- Australopithecus anamemsis, 4.2-3.9M years ago

• Australopithecus afarensis, 3.9-3.0M years ago

• Australopithecus africanus, 3.0-2.0M years ago

• Australopithecus aethiopicus/garhi, 2.6-2.3M years ago

• Australopithecus boisei, 2.8-1.4M years ago

• Australopithecus robustus, 2.0-1.5M years ago

• Homo habilis, 2.4-1.5M years ago

• Homo erectus, 1.8-0.3M years ago

• Homo sapiens species, appeared about 500K years ago

• Homo sapiens soloensis, 400K-100K years ago

•Homo sapiens rhodesiensis, 400K-100K years ago

• Homo sapiens neanderthalensis, 135K-29K years ago

• Homo sapiens sapiens, 100K years ago - now

The matter is of course further complicated by the fact that there are now multiple humanoid species of which we are aware, ranging from Humans of various planets to Vulcans and Romulans to Klingons to Cardassians and even including some genetically engineered species and some species that may still be classified as humanoid even though their biology may appear reptilian, amphibian, or based on other mammalian life forms.

We could propose a number of classification schemes, but in order to maintain some level of consistency, the following guidelines are suggested:

1. any sentient race should be recognized by the speciation identifier sapiens

2. any humanoid species should be characterized by the identifier Homo to identify them as humanoids (with some exceptions)

3. the species planet of origin or origin race should be included in the identification (such as vulcanis for Vulcans or rihannsu for Romulans)

4. for species like the Jem'Hadar that have 'geographic' subspeciation, the terms alphaii, betaii, deltai, and gammai are suggested

Humanoids that are clearly of reptilian, amphibian, or non-primate or even nonanimal origin require some additional identifiers. Previous classification has suggested some unusual identifiers, including:

• Recombisaurien sapiens jemhadar alphaii/gammaii (Jem'Hadar)

• Hadrosaurien sapiens vothii (Voth)

• Cyber sapiens soong (Soong Android) Hologram sapiens medicalis (EMH)

This can get rather complex given the number of alien species and forms we may encounter, so the following major genera are proposed:

• Recombi- (for genetically engineered species)

• Cyber- (for artificial life forms or cybernetic life forms)

• Hologram- (for holographic or photonic life forms)

• Homo (for exclusively core 'humanoid' species)

• Homoallasomorphien (for shapeshifters not including changelings which are not considered humanoid)

• Homosaurien/Homoreptilien (for reptilian humanoids) or the specific reptilian line (like Hadrosaurien or Tyrannosaurien can be used)

• Homoamphibien (for amphibian humanoids)

• Homoagnathien (for humanoids descended from jawless fish)

• Homoichthien (for humanoids descended from jawed fishes)

• Homoavien (for birdlike humanoids)

• Homoprototherien (for monotreme/egg laying mammalian humanoids)

• Homometatherien (for marsupial-like humanoids)

• Homoeutherien (for placental humanoids based on various animal forms)

A subgenera classification system for humanoids is proposed for a number of forms (which we will not go into detail here due to the sheer complexity). Examples of some classification of the more common 'humanoid' species would include:

- Cardassian, Homo sapiens cardassiensis
- Deltan, Homo sapiens deltis
- El-Aurian, Homo sapiens al-auris
- Ferengi, Homo sapiens ferengis
- Hirogen, Homosaurien sapiens hirogis
- Human (Earth), Homo sapiens terra
- Human (Mars), Homo sapiens ares
- Klingon, Homo sapiens thlIngan
- Lurian, Homo sapiens luriis
- Tellarite, Homo sapiens tellaris
- Vulcan, Homo sapiens vulcanis/t'khasi

And that's about it for this issue of The Mad Scientist - our next few columns will deal with human(oid) physiology (we'll examine three systems: cardiovascular, musculoskeletal, and neuroendrocrine).



THE KLINGON—STARFLEET BLOODFEUD 2001: A BLOOD DRIVE FOR THE AMERICAN RED CROSS Words and Pictures courtesy of Captain John Winsley and With Vice Admiral Stephen Thomas (Ret.) • USS Jamestown, STARFLEET Region 1

It happened Saturday, April 21, 2001, at the Virginia Air and Space Center (VASC) in Hampton, Virginia. With the captains of the classic and current starships Enterprise, Voyager and Deep Space Nine in the Star Trek Federation Science exhibit looking upon the proceedings; and J.G. Hertzler, "Chancellor Martok" of the Klingon Empire, officiating, the "feud" began.

To benefit the American Red Cross, the Imperial Klingon Vessel Bat'Leth challenged the STARFLEET Starship USS Jamestown to a "blood feud"--the side collecting the most in blood donations winning the feud. Katrina Stevens and Ydalmi (ee-DOLL-mee) Noriega of the American Red Cross loved the idea! Kristina Anderson of the VASC also liked the idea of hosting the event and Tracy Phelps (IKV Bat'Leth) jumped on the idea right away.

With only two months planning, preparation, and blessings from above, the day of the "blood feud" finally arrived. How would the public respond?

When we all arrived at 9am, there were already people lined up outside to come in and donate blood! We came in early so that we could donate our own blood and so

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the Klingons would have time to hydrate and rest before suiting up for the feud.

Special guest was John "JG" Hertzler, "General/Chancellor Martok" of Star Trek Deep Space Nine, sponsored by the VASC. He was very easygoing and entertaining. He performed a "Klingon rap" (think of "Vanilla Ice" as a Klingon!) that he and Robert O'Reilly will perform at Star Trek: The Experience; and he performed with the very funny sci-fi sketch comedy troupe "Luna-C." Not only did he bring some great items as giveaways - he also donated blood!

Additionally, the VASC was celebrating "Earth Day," that also happens to be a concern of Mr. Hertzler's. He gave a talk about the importance of the environment and how we should protect it.

There were giveaways of Trek items throughout the afternoon. Thanks to Paramount Pictures and to Mr. Hertzler, some folks walked off with great collectibles, including bottles of "Star Trek Altair Water," and a copy of Peter David's "Requiem" and more!

And of course, the event was a great opportunity to

promote the USS Jamestown and STARFLEET. The event garnered nice newspaper coverage and Steve managed to get a TV spot done at the last minute, featuring myself being challenged by Fleet Captain Kai!

As the steady stream of blood donors came in, they stated the side of their allegiance. The first tally found STARFLEET leading the Klingons 35 to 20. The second tally 81 to 55. At the end of the day, it was STARFLEET who beat the Klingons 102 to 77! These numbers combined are the number of all the people who came to give blood, but 156 pints were actually collected. The blood donations raised surpassed the expectations of the Red Cross by half!

At the end of the event, with Fleet Captain Kai scowling nearby, JG Hertzler presented the "Blood Feud" trophy (created by Tracy Phelps the night before) to me, and I proudly accepted on behalf of the victorious USS Jamestown crew and STARFLEET!

We are now looking ahead to the "KLINGON-STARFLEET Blood Feud 2002: Revenge of the Klingons!" Hopefully, hope our sister ships will come and help us keep the blood feud trophy on the STARFLEET side.
