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DON'T CALL ME EDWIN! Fleet Admiral Les Rickard Commander, Starfleet

Hello again from STARFLEET Headquarters! As I started writing this article, I realized that it's been almost a year since I stepped into this role. My, how time flies! Looking back, it's been quite a year. We've had both good times and bad but I'm happy to report that, Fleet-wise, the positives outdo the negatives by a large margin. Let's look back at the last 12 months...

We started out the year in grand fashion with an inaugural bash, where outgoing Commander, STARFLEET Fleet Admiral Michael D. Smith personally handed the reins of STARFLEET over to the new administration. Attended by dignitaries such as the Commandant of the STARFLEET Marine Corps Major General Wade Olsen and incoming ShOC Chief Admiral Alex Rosenzweig, a great time was had by all.

Not long after that, we hit one of the few bad spots of the year - the IRS jumped back into the picture, stating that they never received the 1998 and 1999 Form 990s filed by STARFLEET. After seeking advice from former Vice Commander, STARFLEET and current counsel to Fleet, Admiral Chuck Freas, we filed late returns. Not long after

that, we received a Failure To File penalty for \$1,647. We paid that and, along with a signed affidavit from former Commander, STARFLEET Fleet Admiral Michael D. Smith stating that the proper returns were filed, sent in a request for abatement. To date, we've received an abatement of the 1999 penalty (and a refund check for \$1,683.78) and are awaiting word on the 1998 penalty. Having paid the Failure To File penalty of \$1,694 for 1998, we are confident that we will receive an abatement and refund for 1998 and that this will finally be resolved for good.

I transported into Mobile, Alabama and Region 2 for its Summit. Region Coordinator Commodore Pete Mohney and the Summit staff did an outstanding job and made me feel at home. The next month, in April, I traveled the short distance down the road to the Region 1 Summit in Greensboro, North Carolina. Region Coordinator Admiral Carolyn Donner HQ in Kansas City, Missouri for the International Conference 2001. It was fun getting reacquainted with all my Region 12 friends, as well as seeing folks from all across Fleet. This was the first chance I had to work closely with both the Executive Committee and the Admiralty Board as Commander, STARFLEET and it was a most positive experience. You could tell that once again, to see the Fleet family take care of not just it's own but also their fellows citizens, whether they knew them or not. This was the second time in as many months that my faith in this organization was validated. I am proud to be associated with all of you! On another sad note, September also saw the resignation of Admiral Gordon Goldberg from the office of Vice Commander, STARFLEET. After almost 5 continuous years of service on the Executive Committee, a combination of circumstances in his life and the needs of STARFLEET made this a hard but necessary decision. While still one of my trusted counsels, we have missed him on the EC and continue to wish him success in his future endeavors.

THE MYSTERY OF SCIENCE By Fleet Captain Richard Heim • Fleet Division Chief, Sciences

You are sitting in front of your television passively listening to a news program, or better yet, you are actively surfing the Web looking for the answer to a problem. You come across someone who has an answer and who claims it's "the" answer because it's scientific. And you wonder, just what is he (or she) talking about? Why is it the right answer? What do they mean by "scientific"?

Science is, perhaps, one of the most powerful "forces" in the world today, but it is also, maybe, one of the least understood things the average Joe is confronted with. Science has laid the foundation for technology, and our technological innovations have brought us that television and that PC we've come to rely on so much. Science is bringing us closer to the stars. But just what exactly are we talking about when we talk about "science"?

The Latin word scientia, from which science is derived, means "knowledge." The Latin word scientific means "knowledge-making." At its most basic level, science is the creation, or discovery, of knowledge, which has become more nearly equated with "research." The modern usage of the term covers only certain kinds of knowledge whose area, however, is now so vast and topics so diverse that no one person can grasp more than a fraction of them. Scientific specialization is necessary (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1972, Vol. 20).

The subject is too big to cover in one Communiqué. As STARFLEET's FDC Sciences, and as a scientist by profession, I'd like to help improve our understanding of science. This introduction serves to launch an exploration of the subject, both in my old newsletter, The Alaric Heim Page (which is where this series of articles first appeared), and here in the STARFLEET Communiqué. Science has a definite history of development. It has a well-defined methodology. In the coming months, I'll be reviewing its history and methodology, and some of the people who played pivotal roles in its development, in the hope of taking some of the mystery out of science.

Since I've taken over the office of VCS, I've received a lot of questions about the Fleet Division Chiefs (FDC) program. Most of them have been questions such as what do they do and why do we have them. Since it's been pretty confusing in the past, I thought I'd take a minute and explain about the FDC.

In the past, the FDC has been a program with no discernable direction or purpose. Each director seemed to take it in it's own path with little or no continuity or common purpose between the respective divisions, even within it's own department. Representatives have been appointed to oversee programs in Regions where programs may not even have existed. This has been a major downfall to the success of this program and many RCs (me being one of them at the time) have refused to work with the FDC program for that reason and more.

At the time I took over, the whole program seemed to be a bunch of people with titles who do nothing, appoint assistants for no reason (thereby adding more titles with no responsibilities), and generally existing with no real clear purpose.

All of this has changed.

First off, no member of a Region will be "appointed" to serve a Region function for the FDC without the RC being involved ever again. As RC, I didn't feel it was right and as the person overseeing the program, I still don't think it's right.

Second, this will not be a department full of empty titles held by folks who just want the position and not the job.

Third, effective imediately, the the FDC program is to be renamed as the Fleet Division Program (FDP).

And, finally, this program will not be implemented in any Region without the full knowledge, cooperation, and blessings of the respective RC.

The New FDP

Most large organizations such as ours, with diverse populations, have groups of individuals with common interests. They specialize, if you will, in that interest. In many instances, these groups have formed communities designed to cater to that specific interest within the framework of our larger organization. The SFMC is the best-known example of this in STARFLEET. It is largely composed of members who want to explore the military side of Star Trek. In fact, the SFMC was an FDC program for several years. Other groups of this type have included the Executive Officers Club and the Corps of Engineers. Now, I'm not suggesting that any of the FDP Divisions become the next SFMC but there are things they can do for the members of Fleet. A couple of examples are:

• **Rick Driver as FDC Science** - he maintained a wonderful web page with information about the latest advances in science, as well as the science fiction world. He had a large following of folks who looked forward to his posts on the mailing lists about science-related topics. He literally created a community of interested members.

• David Miller as FDC Medical - His office published a quarterly newsletter on real-life and Star Trek medical topics, which was widely read throughout Fleet.

In both cases, the FDC created a community of like-minded members of STARFLEET. In doing so, the FDC added value to participating members' STARFLEET experience by giving them a place where they could pursue the interests that made them a fan in the first place. The creation of these member communities benefits SFI directly because it gives a member one more reason to want to be a member, rather than someone who just shows up to chapter meetings and hangs around local events. It also gives people another reason to renew in SFI -the chance to meet and network with other folks who have similar Trek or real-life interests. Got a chapter with a membership problem? Want to bolster the Region membership numbers? Finding something to keep the members interested may just be what is needed and the FDP may be able to provide that.

The FDP will also not be limited to just creating a fictional community but will be used as a way of sharing information between those interested in the individual programs and the subject matter they represent. Using these resources within a Region can spread this interest and information to all who are interested.

The FDP can be *the* source for information on a multitude of subjects. Stuck on a tough problem on your Academy Medical exam? Try the FDP Medical - they may be able to provide you with a link to find that information. Drawing a blank on how to reformat your newsletter? Try FDP Comm - they could have a ton of ideas to make the old look new. This will not be a resource just for RCs or COs. By building communities of folks interested in particular aspects of Fleet, fandom, Trek or the real world, they will become resources available to everyone in Fleet.

This is the New Direction for the FDP Right now, most of the FDP programs are invisible. Very few people know they exist, and even fewer understand what they do. You'll see this change. The membership will know what they do and what is available to them. In fact, you'll see some of their articles in this CQ.

There will be an FDP Operations Manual that will outline the required duties and responsibilities of the Director and each Division Chief. This is being worked right now by the new Director of the FDP and will be made available to anyone who wants it and a copy will be provided to each RC. The Director is responsible for building new programs as the need or desire rises. Many of the current FDP projects are a result of membership input - a member had an idea and put it into practice. It will be his/her job to give those folks all the resources and assistance possible in bringing it to fruition. We will also keep our thumbs on the pulse of the membership and anticipate new projects that might be of use.

This is the new FDP. A visible, viable program. Not a replacement for a Region Department, not a group of people who hold a title but not a job, and not a department you never hear from. It is a department staffed with people who want to share information and resources with the rest of Fleet. It is not Region-intrusive. In fact, most divisions will have no need for "Region representatives". Rather, they will strive to work with the actual Region officers already in place. In cases where there are no specific Region reps, the Division Directors will work with the RCs should the need arise and only if asked. This is a "request" program only. The information in each division will be available to all who need it - you'll only need to ask.

The Fleet Division program serves two primary functions. The first is to serve as a community for members with similar interests, whether they are fictional or reallife. The second is to serve as a resource for chapters and Regions interested in developing their own programs for building member communities.

Our program consists of Divisions that broadly match those that might be found in the fictional STARFLEET. Each Division is charged with gathering information about their Division, both fictional and real, and to disseminate it to the membership through the Communiqué, the web, e-mail, newsletters and other publications. In addition, members, chapters or Regional officers who have specific questions can contact the Divisions directly and get an answer.

Each Division is headed up by a Chief. This chief is an experienced fan with proven knowledge in the field he represents. For example, our Chaplains and Counselors program is overseen by an ordained minister who also serves as the Chief Chaplain of the SFMC and has actually performed Fleet-style weddings. Our Engineering Chief is a diehard modeler, and our Fleet Division Chief -Sciences is a published researcher.

Many of our Chiefs also serve as chapter Commanding Officers, faced with the monthly (or more often) task of developing interesting and exciting programs to bring active members to meetings. Over the next few months, they will be using that experience to develop a body of resources for

Greetings Fellow Trekkers!

MSR's are due by the 5th of each month and considered late from the 6th to the 10th. If, after the 10th, a chapter fails to report they may be placed on the Failed to Report List. If three reports in a row are missed your chapter may be decommissioned and/or the Commanding Officer relieved of duty. If a chapter makes a habit of missing a couple of MSRs then catching up, the chapter will be treated as if three in a row have been missed.

Getting your MSR to STARFLEET Operations is easier than ever with three methods to choose from. You can use the Online MSR Reporting form at http://www.sfi.org/ops/msr.html, email it directly to MSRReports@ sfi.org or send it via U.S. Mail to:

DO NOT SEND ATTACHMENTS. Just cut and paste the form into the body of an email message and fill it out.

Chapters are also required to send MSR's to their respective Regional Coordinator and any other Regional Office the RC deems necessary. Chapters are also required to send a copy of their MSR to **correy@sfi.org** if they are a Correspondence Chapter and/or to **tmbrwolf@pciconnect.com** if they are an Armed Services Chapter. TREASURY NOTES By Commodore Tammy Willcox

Hi everyone! Since I'm started back to school in September, I've found that it takes up a whole lot more time when you actually do your homework and study for tests. In addition, the treasury department is now processing the financial end of the on-line membership applications. So, after talking with Les, I've appointed a Special Assistant to the Treasury department. The lucky person (note the sarcasm) is my oldest daughter Jessica. Since proximity was one of the most important qualifications for the position, selecting Jessica was a no brainer. Jessica takes the deposits to the bank and assists with verifying the checks and with the credit card processing. (She has For Deposit Only stamped in brain now!) So I hope everyone will say a big thank you to Jessica, because without her assistance I would have had to turn in my resignation as Treasurer in order to focus on real life.

INTERNATIONAL MEMBERS:

As I reported in the previous couple of CQs, some international checks will be returned to us unable to be deposited, or they cost us \$5.00 each to deposit as they cannot go through the federal reserve bank to be cashed and must go through a collection agency to be cashed. If you are an international member, please try to renew either via credit card through the secure online site, or with an international money order as these will not generate any fees. If you are unsure as to whether or not your check or money order can be deposited, please contact me and give me the info about your check or money order and I will contact our bank and we'll determine how to proceed.

RETURNED/BOUNCED CHECKS:

We are having several checks returned either for insufficient funds or due to the check or money order unable to be deposited. For this, we are charged \$5.00 each time. If you have a returned or bounced check, your membership will be placed on hold until you have repaid the original check/money order amount and the \$5.00 fee. You will no longer receive the CQ, be eligible to attend the Academy, or be promoted until the issue has been resolved. In addition, if you are a chapter CO or XO, this places your chapter in jeopardy, as it is a requirement that these officers have ACTIVE memberships. Please make sure that when you send in money that you make sure that you have that money in your account until it clears.

VOUCHERS:

Please note that voucher purchases now take place through the Treasurer's office. Vouchers are available in one-credit certificates and five-credit certificates. We are in the process of getting a secure online site for vouchers to be purchased with credit cards. Once this has been completed, we'll announce it, but please remember that we will only accept credit cards for voucher purchases over 5 credits. Vouchers can still be purchased via mail by sending me a check or money order made payable to STARFLEET to the address below. Voucher cost is equivalent to the number of credits you want to purchase.

THE SHUTTLE OPERATIONS, STARFLEET

Greetings, all! It's getting close to the end of 2001 as I write this, and it's time to look back at the events of 2001. I'll save a full-year wrap-up 'til next issue, but right now, I can say with some degree of confidence that we have come a long way. Thanks to a lot of work and a great staff, we've gotten upgraded forms, flyers and brochure for regional use. We are working on a PowerPoint presentation and a CD-Rom with all sorts of neat stuff, and then we'll be looking at updating the START (Shuttlecraft Training And Recruitment Techniques) and MOM (Mothership Operations Manual) manuals.

Perhaps more importantly, the year 2001 was a team-building operation, forging an integrated team of people on both the international and regional levels to be able to respond to and support the needs of groups in both the START (Shuttle) Program and EFCP (Existing Fan Club Program). There's still more to do, of course, but the goal of getting folks on multiple levels of the organization to talk to each other in support of the groups and members of STARFLEET has largely been met, and I'm pleased by that and proud to have been able to lead the team that's done it.

Now, for this issue's topic (and thanks to LCDR Lauren Milan for the idea that led to this discussion), I'd like to stop for a moment and get any of you who are thinking about creating a chapter (or are in the process of doing so) to think about one of the more basic questions that your group would have to grapple with: what's the club going to be about? After all, it's easy to say, "Let's start a club!" It's harder to say, "What should we do as a club?" Some refer to this as the club's "theme".

Others might consider it developing the "mission statement". Whatever terms you use, it's important to decide that, because it can affect everything you do from that point forward. It'll affect whether the group might be a meeting or correspondence chapter. It will affect how the group markets itself. It'll affect how the group interacts with other STARFLEET chapters, especially if it's forming in an area where one or more chapters may already be

operating.

There's no textbook path to those decisions. But there is one very important concept that lies at the heart of them. It's so important that I'm gonna put it in big bold letters here:

Communication

The group must decide, together, what it wants to do. If one person tries to just impose an idea, it often won't work. But if everyone sits down together, whether in one room or on a mailing list or by whatever the preferred medium of communication might be, and starts playing with ideas, you'll be able to build a consensus.

What each member needs to bring to the table is what he or he is hoping to get out of the group. What is going to make the STARFLEET chapter experience positive and exciting for that member? If you've ever been in a chapter that just wouldn't do anything in which you were interested, you might know what I mean. After a while, it just gets frustrating, and you start losing interest. Well, y'don't want that happening right at the beginning, during the Shuttle Program, 'cause there's no surer way to kill it aborning than to have the core, founding members frustrated and unhappy right from the start. So, there are questions to answer. The following are just a few questions that might come up in those discussions:

• Will the group be formal or casual?

• Are the members interested in just socializing, or is community service important to them, as well?

• Are the members interested in just one part of Star Trek, or is it the whole Trek Universe that draws them in? (Believe it or not, as time goes on, we're seeing that it is possible to have whole segments of fandom jazzed by only one part of Star Trek.)

• Do the members want to give the group a lot of time and energy, or is it just something to be involved in when looking for a way to kick back and relax?

• Will the group be designed to cater to

some particular interest (e.g., gaming, Renaissance Faires, real-world science, modeling, etc.), or is it intended to be open to a mix of ideas and interests?

• Is the group intended to be a small, close-knit operation, or does it aspire to be a larger, more broad-based entity that will hope to appeal to many different kinds of people?

There's no "right answer" to these questions. No one group is "doing it right" while all the others aren't. Each group must find its own path. But making sure there's a consensus among the members as to what the chapter is there to do is not just important, it's critical. The process is clear, and the following are its key elements:

- Communication
- Discussion
- Sharing of Ideas
- Developing Consensus

The process of figuring out the group's identity is itself an important part of the path to chapter status. After all, if no one can come to agreement on what the group will do, perhaps it's time to rethink whether the group should be, at all.

Once the group has decided, though, on what it will do and be, the task of marketing the group to prospective members (and the general public) will begin. But that will be a tale for another time.

Meanwhile, we do have a bit of business to cover before I wrap this column up. So, let's get to it.

Reminders, Reminders...

Right about now, Sandy's muttering under his breath about a sudden influx of new membership renewals. He's actually glad to see them, because they may push us past the 4,000-member mark again. (As I write this, we're about 25 members shy of that level.) Why the influx, you ask? Many of the renewal applications are a direct result of e-mailed renewal reminders that went out in late November. This is something we've experimented with in the past, but it's been some time since we've been able to do it.

Of course, it's important for all Fleet members to keep track of their own expiration dates (which are printed on your newsletter labels and membership card) and renew in a timely manner, but a reminder never hurts.

Because it had been a while, we also sent out "please come back!" e-mails to members who'd expired since January 1st, in addition to reminders to recent expirees and those soon to expire. Several of these have resulted in renewals, too, so the effort was clearly worthwhile.

Not as easy to do, but something we may try again nonetheless, are reminder postcards for members we can't reach by e-mail. This costs money for printing and postage, so it's something we'd rather minimize. If you renew in a timely manner, it will help us save any such costs that might otherwise be expended on your behalf! Remember that membership processing turnaround time is six to eight weeks, so renewal applications ideally should be submitted about two months before the member's expiration date.

Can We Reach You?

One of the inevitable results of sending hundreds of e-mail messages was receiving dozens of bounces. As someone who's had the same primary e-mail address since 1995, I'm always amazed to watch folks change their addresses as often as — well, Internet providers. There's nothing wrong with changing your e-mail address every couple of years, months, or even weeks — as long as you keep your member records up to date!

Please make sure you tell **Membership @sfi.org** or **CompOpsHELP@sfi.org** whenever you have a change of e-mail address. Sharing your address changes with a mailing list can be helpful, too, but please do not assume that any such notices will find their way into your member records.

Topping 4,000

Obviously I'm preaching to the choir here (if you're getting this, you're already counted in the member totals), so I'll suggest that, if you know someone whose STARFLEET membership expired this year, you encourage them to renew. Sandy's very excited about passing the 4,000 mark once again, and it would be neat to fulfill his wish!

Needless to say, you shouldn't be too pushy. In addition to the dozens of bounces, we've gotten a few thoughtful responses from folks who won't be renewing, and wanted to explain why. I very much appreciated those notes, and I respect those expiring or expired members' decisions.

We're also hard at work (with help from some very talented Fleeters) on new membership certificates and cards, and we look forward to rolling those out into your packets in the coming weeks.

Region 01

The Region 01 Nomination Process began officially on October 15, 2001 with a hardcopy mailing to all eligible COs with VOC form included. Unfortunately, due to mailing delays at my local post office, the forms were not sent timely. Therefore the deadline of November 19 was extended to December 1st. By the time this reaches the presses, a Regional Coordinator should have been chosen.

DUTIES OF THE IG: Conducing Commander, STARFLEET Elections

STARFLEET Constitution Article 7, Section 7:

"If only one person shall qualify as an eligible candidate for President, a vote of confidence for that candidate shall be held by the general membership. Ballots shall be distributed according to the election schedule as defined in the current Membership Handbook. Should the sole candidate fail to obtain a majority of the votes cast in the election, the candidate shall not assume office. The Admiralty Board shall then elect from its membership an Acting Commander, STARFLEET, who shall discharge the duties of President until the next regularly scheduled STARFLEET general election.

In the event that a sitting Commander, STARFLEET has no rival candidate's at the time of the annual election, has only served one term, and chooses to run for a second term, then a Vote of Confidence by the general membership is held in place of the general election.

Ballots shall be sent out to the members in the same way that they are in a general election, by the Chief of Communications, STARFLEET. At the CCS's discretion, the ballots may be tabulated by either a CPA or the Inspector General's Office. If a CPA is chosen, then the choice of CPAs must be made under the same provisions governing their choice in the general election.

If there are no candidates for the office of Commander, STARFLEET, then the AB elects from its membership an Acting Commander, STARFLEET to serve until the next scheduled election. This would occur if the sitting CS either chose not to, or could not, run for anther term in office and no other person had been nominated by the general membership for the position.

The final tally of votes is sent to the Chief of Communications, STARFLEET, either by the CPA or the Inspector General. The results of this VoC are released by the Office of the Chief of Communications, STARFLEET. "

Article 5, Section 10: Commander, STARFLEET

"The Commander, STARFLEET (or President) shall be elected by the members of STARFLEET and shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee and corporate Board of Directors, the Admiralty Board. The Commander, STARFLEET shall coordinate the activities of the entire organization, as provided in the current Membership Handbook, and shall be fiduciarily bonded in the sum of at least U.S. \$25,000.00 before taking office, using funds provided by the organization. Should the Commander-elect fail to obtain a bond commitment before January 1st, despite the general availability of organization funds to do so with, the Admiralty Board may by a twothirds (2/3) vote of the sitting members of the Admiralty Board forbid the Commander-elect's assumption to office until such time as the Commander-elect fully complies with said bond requirement. Should such a vote be carried, the Admiralty Board may then appoint a temporary Commander, STARFLEET to serve only until such time as the Commander-elect's bond has been obtained.

The Commander, STARFLEET shall be at least 25 years of age and meet all other qualifications for office as set forth in the current Membership Handbook. Decisions of the Commander, STARFLEET are considered final unless overturned by a two-thirds majority vote of the Admiralty Board. If for any reason a vacancy shall occur in the office of Commander, STARFLEET, the Vice-Commander, STARFLEET shall immediately assume the office and responsibilities of Commander, STARFLEET. A replacement VCS shall be put into office in accordance with the guidelines set forth in Article 5, Section 2. The election for the CS is held every two years in even-numbered years. The conduction of the election is the responsibility of the CCS, unless he or she is a candidate. In which case, the EC member next in order of succession - who is not a candidate - will conduct the election."

The role of the IG in the election is limited. The IG's responsibilities are constitutionally limited to securing the services of a CPA to receive and tally the ballots for the election. The chosen CPA should have no affiliation with STARFLEET or any of its members.

Next issue, I'll discuss additional duties of the IG's Office in regards to local assistance. As always, if you have any questions, please feel free to ask.

The "Query" section of the Official STARFLEET History Website (http:// www.ussblackhawk.com/SFIHistory) was designed to answer questions that the general membership has consistently come up with or even spark controversy. It also designed to answer those questions in the most expedient or simplistic way possible. From time to time I will share with the readers of the CQ answers to these questions.

Recently there seems to be a lot of infighting about the STARFLEET Marine Corps, their place in STARFLEET and their place in Fandom? Are they trying to take over STARFLEET? What is the scoop?

The STARFLEET Marine Corps (SFMC) has certainly had its share of space on the STARFLEET Listserv! This question is based upon a series of questions, arguments and responses on a question on both the SFMC and the STARFLEET Rangers. Some of the rhetoric was getting down right nasty, to say the least. However this is the scoop on the SFMC...

The STARFLEET Marine Corps was created by a group within STARFLEET to address the possibility of a ground force within the Federation STARFLEET. As the contemporary United States Marine Corps are part of the United States Navy the SFMC was always meant to be part of STARFLEET. This also allowed those 'fleeters who disliked Naval

rank to wear "Marine" or a "Ground Forces" rank.

According to their "History of the SFMC" (http://supcom.sfi-sfmc.org/html/history.html), Brigadier General Robb Jackson, SFMC Historian, the idea for the SFMC was discovered in the book "Best of Trek #3", under "STARFLEET Support Units" in 1982. It started with one unit aboard the USS Pontiac, NCC-532, Columbia, Indiana, and expanded to include several units throughout the United States. It would not be until 1988 that it would be "better" (the word used in the history) recognized by STARFLEET. For the history of the SFMC, go to the Region section of our History Website or to the SFMC Website itself (http://www.sfi-sfmc.org).

References to a possible SFMC within Star Trek can be established in two areas. The first is within the novels and the second is within the movie *Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country.* Since most novels are thought of being outside the cannon of *Star Trek* (and there are a few *Voyager* novels that are considered cannon) they are not considered cannon by those *Star Trek* truest.

The reference to a Colonel West, in Star Trek

VI, indicates that there is indeed a ground forces aspect to STARFLEET within the *Star Trek* universe. Later, during the Dominion War time period on *Star Trek*: *Deep Space Nine*, the Starfleet Infantry was mentioned once. Whether or not this entity was in fact the SFMC within the Star Trek cannon was not established however it did establish that there was some sort of ground forces with Star Trek.

The main focus of the SFMC within STARFLEET is to give the members another outlet to express their zeal for Star Trek and to have fun in the process. The SFMC is part of and not separate from STARFLEET.

Even though the SFMC has their own Command Structure, Academy and Events, each member is also a SFI member and usually shares in their chapter's activities on top of their activities within SFMC. They have to take the Officer's Training School from the Academy to be commissioned as an officer and must take Officer's Command College to be eligible to command a chapter.

Are they trying to take over STARFLEET? The answer is definitely **NO**! That is because they are part of STARFLEET. Every member of the SFMC has the same rights and privileges as every other member of STARFLEET. If they are qualified they may become XOs, COs, RCs and even, yes, Commanders, STARFLEET. But to note that if a member of the SFMC is elected as CS, like long-time SFMC member Les Rickard was, then he or she must revert to the naval sounding rank of "Fleet Admiral" as it is the only rank authorized for the CS to wear by the STARFLEET Constitution! Usually the CS will revert to the reserve rank of "General" when addressed within a Marine structure, however as indicated it is not authorized but it is allowed.

It is a fact that there are not SFMC units in every chapter of STARFLEET. There are several reasons for this such as:

• There is no interest in SFMC being established within a said chapter;

• Some chapter members may have a problem of having an SFMC unit within a said chapter because the SFMC is not firmly established in *Star Trek* canon;

• Or the preference of a select few not to have SFMC members within their own chapters, whether it is political conflict or just their dislike of the SFMC.

There are chapters that are made up entirely of SFMC members, like starships are made up of entirely on species, such as the Vulcans, in *Star Trek* cannon.



FROM THE USS DISCOVERY....

...TO THE USS NORMANDY

Our next chapter in the distinguished history of STARFLEET will be the USS DISCOVERY from Region 12. One of her newest descendants is the USS NORMANDY from Region 1, which just celebrated its Second Anniversary this past June on the 57th anniversary of the D-Day Invasion.

When the Alpha Chapter - the USS Enterprise - evolved into STARFLEET Central, it spun off new chapters throughout the country, but later it became apparent that having probationary groups that could grow into full chapters/starships were needed. Today we have the Shuttle Program, but back in the late 1970's early 1980's STARFLEET had the Outpost program. A new group could petition STARFLEET Central to be a local outpost, and later with enough membership they would become a full Starship level chapter. One of these groups, the Outpost Canopus II was one of the first SFI group in the Mid-West, launching in late 1978, and eventually commissioning as the USS Krieger, in 1982.

The USS Krieger, lost in antiquity, has left little to track and research, though many members of SFI in Missouri can remember somebody who was on or associated with the Krieger. Nevertheless, the most important action of the Krieger was their participation in the founding of the USS Discovery. How significant their impact was is not definitely known, but they were the local chapter that brought STARFLEET to the St. Louis area, and when they brought the ball in, the USS Discovery ran with that ball for a touchdown.

The USS Discovery, still active today is The Grand Matriarch of Region 12. Named after the space shuttle Discovery that was launched in the same year, the chapter has been around seventeen years, and has been very involved in both the community and all aspects of STARFLEET. The chapter is also very involved in the fictional aspect, ship design, and future history writing. Their present class, the Chang Ho class, is named after a Fleet Admiral /Commander-in-Chief of the Chinese Imperial Navy, who was born in 1337 and died in 1420. The Chang Ho Class is designed to be a Tactical Cruiser, with some upgrades to match the USS Dragonfire's combined ability to be both a Tactical and an Explorer Cruiser.

The chapter prides itself on being assigned to STARFLEET's First Contact Department for the primary mission of exploring new worlds and new civilizations, and a secondary mission to follow up on the whereabouts and the recordings of previous deep space probes. They also onboard two of the new Danube Class Runabouts (USS Missouri NCC-73000 and USS Merrimac NCC-73001), three of the Type 7 Shuttles (Admiral Robert E Peary, Carl Sagan and Edwin P. Hubble) and four of the type 15 Shuttlepods (Cahokia, Rene Auguste Chateau, Pierre Laclede and Charles Lindbergh). You can see from their choice of names they are lively in both their role-playing and their history of exploration.

On of the chapters that shuttled off the Discovery was the USS Horizon, initially under the command of then Captain Clarence Kamper. Launching off the Discovery as the Shuttle Joseph P. Allen, 1308/02 on December 28th, of 1986, they commissioned as the USS Horizon, NCC 1000-A on December 4th of the following year as an Enterprise Class Cruiser. They borrowed their name from the 'original' USS Horizon, NCC-1000 from the TOS episode: Piece of the Action. Other officers that have sat in the center seat of the Horizon were Fleet Captain (later Rear Admiral and acting Commander STARFLEET James Herring), Captain Randy Bisig, Fleet Captain Eddie Allen, and Captain Khane Williams. During the history of the Horizon, the chapter won the 12th Fleet Humanitarian Unit Award in April of 1998 and the WEWTCI Contest in 1992. Between November 15th and the End of the year of 1996, Horizon also served as the SFI Flag Ship, when RAdm. James Herring stepped forward as Acting CS following the resignation of Dan McGinnis and his VCS.

The Horizon was pretty much a shuttle factory, launching 11 Shuttles between 1988 and 1995. One of the more important of those shuttles was the Shuttle Gallifrey, which commissioned as the USS Krazny Oktyabr and changed its name December of 1999 to the USS Royal Sovereign. This chapter is now the flagship of Region 12, under the command of Vice Admiral Robert Westfall, the Regional Coordinator for Region 12.

In addition, the Shuttle Pegasus 1000-A/01 being the first shuttle launched from the Horizon, was commissioned as the USS Stargazer, and like the Horizon the Stargazer was a shuttle factory, eventually launching ten shuttles of its own. The Stargazer, under the command of now Rear Admiral Paula "Coyote" Schaff, served as the flagship of Region 12 for all of 1995 and 1996, and as the flagship of the Deputy Commander STARFLEET, briefly in mid 1996. In addition to positions of responsibility within fleet, the crew of the Stargazer was instrumental in putting on two of the International Conferences, specifically Delacon I in 1990 and Delacon II in 1992. The crew also racked up STARFLEET Newsletter awards in 1990, 1992, and 1993, as well as 12th Fleet Shuttle of the year in 1990 and 12th Fleet Chapter of the year in 1993, and two 12th Fleet Humanitarian Awards in 1996 and in 1998.

The Stargazer's third shuttle 2893/01, the Shuttle Nomad, was launched on September 8th, 1992, the anniversary of Star Trek's first broadcast. Initially commissioned NCC-1805 as a Constitution Class cruiser, later they converted to a Nomad Class Exploration cruiser in March of 1997, NCC-78500. The Nomad was the home of "The Compound" in Leavenworth, Kansas, where there were several crewmembers shared living arrangements together. From that March of 1997 to the end of 1998, the Nomad was also the Flagship of Region 12, with commanding officer Rear Admiral Mike Malotte also serving double duty as Regional Coordinator. From 12th Fleet Shuttle of the year in 1992 to 12th Fleet Flagship in 1997, and five Regional Awards in between. The Nomad sought out perfection and made it its own. Slower then her mothership, the Nomad also was able to put out eight shuttles of it own, including on July 4th of 1998 the Shuttle Normandy, under command of LGen. Les Rickard and his new XO MGen. Mike Malotte.

The USS Normandy was commissioned on the 55th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy on Omaha Beach



- June 6th, 1999. Shortly thereafter, the Normandy became the flagship of STARFLEET as its CO, newly minted General Les Rickard, shed his Marine Rank and became Commander STARFLEET - Fleet Admiral Les Rickard. The Normandy is an active correspondence ship in Region One, whose fictional design and internal history is that of a Movie Era Marine Landing Ship. A Huge Ship. Made up of a combination of the Kirov Class Battlecruiser and the Ariel Shuttle Carrier, the Normandy can fictionally handle anything the enemies of the Federation would throw at her. The Normandy is in the process of launching the Shuttle Francis Marion made up of several of its South Carolina and English members.

From Discovery to Normandy and beyond - 23 years and counting and from the heart of Region 12 to the near center of Region 1, the wide reach of SFI and the friendships it has created will be felt for some time to come. And, as the torch of leadership is passed on, the Normandy stands tall in remembering the sacrifices of those who have defended our liberty, as the Discovers stands tall in memory of those who left their shelter and discovered a new world. Together a fine testimony of all that is good about STARFLEET, Star Trek, and what we consider a part of Gene Roddenberry's dream.

Science in STARFLEET's Regions Back in 1998, a few months before I became the Science RDC of Region One, I emailed the other regions of 'Fleet to establish contact with their Science RDC's and to find out what they were doing.

I was encouraged by the response and learned that inter-region communication is extremely important for 'Fleet activities. And so, when I was appointed the new Science FDP two weeks ago, the first thing I did was seek out the regional Science RDC's. Based on the responses I have received as of November 11, here is where Sciences stands across STARFLEET:

Region 1

Fleet Science Division Plans

The focus of my Science FDC efforts will be to serve as an informational and communications resource for the Science RDC's and RC's throughout STARFLEET. In furtherance of this goal, there are many things I hope to accomplish in the months ahead.

Put together an FDP Science web page

This will serve as an online hub of information, with links to: real-science web pages worldwide; science museums, facilities, and other sites across the country, which the public may attend; and STARFLEET Science RDC and other regional science resources.

Publish a SFI Science newsletter

This online newsletter will contain the latest science news and contact information from the Science FDP and RDC's across the Fleet. RDC's and ship CSO's may contribute information, reports, and science articles to the extent that they desire. Paper copies of the newsletter can be printed and distributed to those who do not have online access. The newsletter will need an editor in order to become a reality.

Develop a SFI Science Handbook

Region One Sciences has a handbook for ship CSO's which could serve as a template for Science RDC's of other regions (check it out online at http:// alaricrh.home.sprynet.com/science/ R1Science.htm). The STARFLEET Science Handbook will also contain information to help Science RDC's in their efforts to promote science within their regions.

Implement a Fleet-wide Sciences Awards Program

In Region One Sciences, we have a recognition program that awards CSO's in three categories. The awards are: The Steven R. Hawking Award for Original Article, The Albert Einstein Award for Regular Article Submission, and The Galileo Award for Chief Science Officer of the Year. I'd like to initiate a similar sciences awards program on a Fleetwide basis.

Have a presence in the Communiqué

Science has an exciting history. In order to understand what science really is and how it developed, I'd like to explore this history through a series of articles for the Communiqué and for the web page. One of the things about our times that I find most fascinating is seeing how Star Trek's science fiction is becoming science reality before our very eyes! Dave Klingman and others have done, and continue to do, an excellent job exploring various aspects of science in the Communiqué, and the Science FDC will utilize this medium to share the excitement of science, too.

Vulcan Academy of Science

One of the more popular schools in the Academy is VAS. Here the student can learn about real science and how science is portrayed in the Trek shows, and earn valuable promotion points to boot!

With this in mind, I am pleased to announce that in this last quarter of 2001, TRACOM will open its newest series of courses--the Advanced Studies. In these three new courses, the Star Fleet Marine will be able to move on to the next level of Military education, the Masters level. The first of the three new courses is the Combined Arms School. In this series of courses, the Student will be able to take what they have learned in the Basic Branches and apply it to the advanced studies area of Combined Arms Operations. John Roberts is the Point of Contact for this course and will be able to answer any and all questions when it is released before the end of the year.

The second course in the new Masters series is the Studies in Military History. In this course, the Marine will look at Military History through the eyes of a Military Historian and analyze the writing, events and philosophy of Military history. The point of contact for this course is COL James W Monroe.

Beginning the week of November 4th, a new animated series, "Justice League," premieres on the Cartoon Network. It is based on the long-running DC Comic book series that debuted in 1960.

Looking at it from the viewpoint of someone who's been a big Justice League fan since the 1970's (I think the first issue I ever bought with my own money was #88 of the first series, so about 30 years ago --yikes!), I think it's a good adaptation of the comics.

In comparison, the 1967 Justice League of America cartoon shorts (10-12 minutes in length) made you realize that many superheroes had too similar jobs in their civilian identities (Flash, Atom and Hawkman were all scientists in the cartoon), the animation was fairly crude (not as bad as the Marvel stuff of the time, but pretty bad) and there were no women characters.

While Super Friends (which premiered in 1973) had a certain charm and filled a thirst for those of who missed seeing an animated Justice League in any form, it was just plain silly and wore out its welcome for me in fairly short order (hey, I was pretty demanding for a ten year old!). I forget which sidekicks were first --Wendy and Marvin, or Zan and Jayna and Gleek -- but having very obvious devices and thanking his producer and art director for convincing HIM to convince the studio to let him re-work the picture the way they wanted to back in 1979!

"ST:TMP-TDC" gosh, that's a lot of initials! Anyway, the film itself was still pretty tedious, only about 2 minutes of sloooowwww fly-by had been excised, but the matte lines were gone and the backgrounds and model work all prettied up. REVIEW: "JUSTICE LEAGUE" ON CARTOON NETWORK By Captain Rahadyan T. Sastrowardovo • USS Accord

so kids would have someone to identify with was pretty lame. I know that way back in the days when my friends and I used to play superheroes, we wanted to be the superheroes not their sidekicks.

The Justice League (no "of America," so to emphasize its global focus) of this new Cartoon Network series has the following members: Superman, Batman, Green Lantern (a.k.a. John Stewart), Hawkgirl, Flash, J'onn J'onzz and Wonder Woman.

Superman and Batman are portrayed much as they had in their own Paul Dini-produced animated series of the 1990's -- Superman is the ideal man, while Batman is the loner -except that Batman's costume was altered slightly. The latter is, however, not dumbed down for his team appearances as he was for Super Friends, though there is they play up more his wealth as Bruce Wayne and how it helps (eventually) fund the League.

I have no fault with using John Stewart (the black alternate Green Lantern first introduced in an 1970 Green Lantern/ Green Arrow tale drawn by Neal Adams) to make the League less uniracial. He's portrayed as very military, very strategic oriented (different from the angry black man he was in the 70's and the more down to earth architect who married Katma Tui in the 80's), kind of like Jim Rhodes (aka War Machine) in Iron Man some years back. We're made aware of the fact that this GL has a broader patrol base than just Earth, as he mentions a rebellion "near Rigel IX."

As for the Flash, I'm not sure which one he is, except that he's portrayed much like Wally West -- the former Kid Flash who took up the red costume after the death of his mentor -- an irreverent ladies' man with super speed; pretty similar to how he was portrayed in the Superman animated episode of a few years ago.

Wonder Woman is portrayed as a female warrior type, naive to some of the "outer world" 's ways -- she is actually not called Wonder Woman in the three-part pilot, but Princess Diana. Hippolyta actually forbade her to help mankind against the alien invasion that brings the league together, so Diana makes off with the garments, tiara, golden lasso, etc. Perhaps we will see in future episodes how this rebellion will affect her relationship with her mother and the other Amazons of Themyscira (never I don't think that either Hawkgirl or J'onn J'onzz (who is not referred to as Martian Manhunter, and the "J" is pronounced more as a "Zh" to distinguish it from sounding like John Jones) has ever been portrayed in an animated series before. The 60's Hawkman was a solo act, except for his hawk, Skreeel. J'onn J'onzz is established as the last of his kind, though his origin is different from that established in the comics. Rather than being drawn by a Earth scientist's experimental teleporter in the 50's, J'onn comes to Earth himself in order to warn the planet about the amorphous invaders who first enslaved Martians a thousand years ago. Not much is revealed about Hawkgirl, except that it is mentioned that she is from Thanagar, a planet of warriors -- she and Diana seem to team up well during the pilot -- and she uses a weapon resembling a large mace in battle.

The League's headquarters is known as the Watchtower, though it is not the lunar base established in the comic books currently, but a satellite built by Wayne Technologies.

I think the new animated series will be well received by both long time fans of the comic book as well as viewers new to the characters.

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In the fall of 2001, DC/Wildstorm published "Star Trek: The Next Generation: Forgiveness". It's written by David Brin, the science fiction novelist best known for his Uplift War series, Earth and The Postman. Most recently, Brin has written novels in the Foundation universe created by Isaac Asimov. The artwork is painted by Scott Hampton, known for his work on "Batman: Night Cries," "Black Widow: Breakdown" as well as the acclaimed DC/Vertigo series "Books of Magic."

The plot concerns early experiments in transporter technology in the 2050's by Colin Blakeney. While there are ethical concerns about the use of the device, there are also corporate concerns who do not want the device to succeed, particularly minions of the Global Transportation Consortium, a monopoly comprised of various land, sea and air transport companies. A monkey has been successfully transported, and Blakeney decides that the only human he can possibly test the device on is himself. However, an attack by an unknown assailant results in the inventor and another person beamed at maximum power into deep space.

More than 300 years later, the Enterprise-E intercepts the attenuating transporter beam and Blakeney is successfully recovered, though he has some traumatic memory loss in part due to the deaths of his wife and child prior to his self-experiment. While

Pocket Books published Star Trek: Starship Spotter in November of 2001. The computer graphics are by Adam "Mojo" Lebowitz and Robert Bonchune, while the text of the data sheets are by Jonathan Lane and Alex Rosenzweig. *Starship Spotter* is a trade paperback similar to the "spotter" books used during World War II, books of silhouettes of Allied and enemy planes.

A recent New York Times article described how sales of books have dropped dramatically in the past year, and I was aware from an online article interviewing Pocket Books' John Ordover and Margaret Clark that technical Trek books sell far less well than fiction.

So, updates on the Star Trek Encyclopedia and Star Trek Chronology won't be published at any time soon and a technical manual on the USS Voyager has not yet been scheduled for publication.

Starship Spotter contains data accompanied by color CGI images and wireframes of such familiar Star Trek vessels as the Constitution-, Miranda-, Galaxy-, Intrepid-, Defiantand Sovereign-class starships - as well as less familiar ones such as the Nebula- and Akira-class starships.

While Scott Hampton's artistic style works for some other genre heroes as DC's Batman and Marvel's Black Widow, I didn't care for it on Picard, Crusher and the other ST:TNG characters (then again, ST:TNG is my least favorite of the post-TOS Trek series, so my bias may be at work). I was a little put out by the fact that the San Diego of 2052 didn't look all that different from a San Diego of 2002 or even 1992. I hate to sound like a TV commercial, but where are the flying cars (mentioned as existing by the 2030's in a "Voyager" episode)?

One geeky footnote is that the invention of even primitive transporter technology by 2052 may explain how the Terratins (descendants of a Earth generation ship, Terra Ten, launched circa 2070) could have developed a transporter technology on par with the Federation's in the late 2260's, as shown in the animated episode "The Terratin Incident."

As was the case with "The Gorn Crisis," published in 2000, I didn't like Forgiveness as much as I did other Trek graphic novels such as Debt of Honor or Ashes of Eden. I would much rather see David Brin try his hand at a prose Trek novel.

The price of "Forgiveness" is \$24.95 in the United States and \$40.95 in Canada.

I must admit I felt a vicarious pleasure at hearing of this book's publication, since I have known Mojo for 11 years (he was one of my predecessors as chief of communications on the old USS Tai Shan, based in New York City).

As well, I have known both Jon and Alex for about 12-13 years. Alex commanded the USS Avenger, based in North Brunswick, NJ, for 14 years and is practically a household name in STARFLEET circles.

Jon Lane was Alex's chief science officer and executive officer on Avenger in the late 80's and early 90's; he is currently based on the USS Angeles.

I look forward to a sequel to this book. Hopefully sales will inspire Pocket Books to publish one in 2002 or 2003.

Starship Spotter costs \$16.00 in the United States, \$24.50 in Canada and £ 9.99 in the United Kingdom.

As Voyager entered its final year, UPN got nervous; they needed a new Trek show. They'd built the entire network around the Star Trek enterprise and they weren't sure they could survive without one. They won't say that, of course, but we all know that's what's going on. So exit Voyager and enter Enterprise.

Enterprise is the fifth Star Trek series (sixth if you count the animated series). Berman and company has entered bold new territory (note sarcasm) by developing a prequel to the original series. They've alternated between annoying and thrilling fans with their various marketing tactics. Fans were not amused to note that they had removed Star Trek from the title of the new show. Promos that left out Captain Sisko garnered so much negative attention that UPN reworked them to include him.

Even so, teasers premiering over the summer brought an eager anticipation to the fans. The first episode, entitled Broken Bow, was two hours long and brought in UPN's highest ratings ever. As for Charles 'Trip' Tucker, played by Conner Trinneer, I love this character! He's such a smartass. Obviously, Berman and Gang are touting Trip, Archer and T'Pol as the trinity for the show, with Trip picking up McCoy's comic foil lines. I got a real kick

Taylor's son - need we say more?), and is poorly tied to The Undiscovered Country's Valeris.

Moving along to Linda Park's character, Hoshi. So far, she's shown herself to be weak, whining, childish, and just downright ready to be kicked out of the nearest airlock. Hopefully, they did this just to show her 'growing' as a member of the crew, and to point out just how 'new' being out in space is for the crew.

Frankly, I would have found this far more effective if one of the guys were having the problem, instead of foisting it off on the only

out of him getting knocked up by playing the equivalent of footsies in the sand with the alien. They copped out though; it would have been more fun to see him go through an entire pregnancy, give birth, and have to tote a little alien critter around the engine room. I look forward to watching more of Trip, as he has already become one of my favorites on the show.

Dominic Keating's Malcolm Reed. I want more! I love to hear this guy talk. He blows things up and he's gorgeous. Give him more to do, give him his own episode!

John Billingsley's Dr. Phlox is a bad cross

between Neelix and the holographic doctor. I wish they would have done something more original here. He has Neelix's fascination with humans, as well as his happy, happy, joy, joy attitude. Unfortunately, he also has the holographic doctor's sanctimonious bedside manner. I hope he develops his own character, instead of playing off previous ones.

Anthony Montgomery's Travis Mayweather, is in my opinion, Enterprise's version of Wesley. So far, I can't stand him. I want him to go to a galaxy far, far away. If they're counting on Mayweather to bring in the young female audience, they had better go back and get another guy, because he doesn't cut the mustard. He's more like French's than Grey Poupon.

The Aliens. I hate the way they portray the Vulcans. They show them as paranoid, antagonistic, secretive and overly emotional. Obviously, the writers have been watching several different series from the rest of us. I liked the new Andorians though, (wiggling antennae and all), and the Klingons were par for the course. I don't quite know what to make of the new 'super' race featured in the Broken Bow episode, but I'm looking forward to finding out who is trying to rearrange the time line from the future.

The 'decontamination scene', I mean, puhlease! This was supposed to be pushing the sexual envelope on TV? They need to watch Farscape to take lessons if they want to do that. The only thing that was pushed by this scene was our patience. If you have to rub a goopy gel on yourself to get rid of possible bacterium, don't you think that you would have to rub it everywhere... like in your hair, the soles of your feet, or, surprise, surprise, under the clothes? I'd love to be able to chapter hop and go to different events. I've enjoyed the ones I've done, and I'd love to do more. When you go to a Fleet event, it's like reunioning with friends you weren't sure were friends. Whether it's hiking up some slippery trail in Ithaca NY, or bouncing across a lake on the way home from an IC and watching water splashing all over the cars. That feeling of camaraderie is great! Actually, I would like to tout a couple of things. Like looking beyond the fun in your local chapter(s) to regional and international events. And not being able to indulge it more is ... Peevish! I'm looking forward to heading west for IC in 2002. I've met some of the Western IC folks, and I want to meet more

REGION 2 SCIENCE NEWS: CAVES AND CAVE LIFE By Members of the USS Spiritwalker, USS Dräkenfire and USS Wernher von Braun

The weekend of September 21-23 was the Spiritwalker/Dräkenfire meeting in Decatur, Alabama. After the meeting, some members of both groups ate supper outdoors and later had a candlelight service to welcome in the fall season. On Saturday, September 22, members of both groups went to see Cathedral Caverns for their Region 2 Science Project. After going through the Cathedral Caverns, the group had a picnic on the grounds of the Cathedral Caverns Park. On the way back to Decatur, after leaving the Cathedral Caverns Park, the group stopped and had fun working their way through a cornfield shaped like a maze.

To get through the cornfield maze one had to find the little numbered squares, then answer the question to determine which way to turn. It was an interesting way to go through a maze. The Spiritwalker/Dräkenfire did not stop there. When back in the Huntsville area, the ships stopped and browsed though some small unique gift shops. When finally returning to Decatur, before breaking up, the group stopped and ate Chinese food. By the time the members of the two ships had gone their separate ways, everyone was tired and worn out.

Four crewmembers of the U.S.S. Wernher von Braun (NCC-72069) recently participated in an Away Mission to scenic Cathedral Caverns near Woodville, AL. The Away Team consisted of Ron Zuckerman (crewmember), Rich Trulson (CO), Joanie Daniel (CMO), and Don Daniel (Chief of Sciences) who also served as shuttle pilot for this mission.

After obtaining inexpensive sustenance (fast food), the crew departed Huntsville in an Earth-bound shuttle for the cavern at about 1340 hours. The team arrived safely at their destination at 1415 hours and encountered a brief delay as the cavern manpower (read g-u-i-d-e) shortage. The entourage entered the cavern to begin the roughly 90-minute tour at 1515.

The team heard some amusing anecdotes and learned several interesting facts from their informative and entertaining guide. Cathedral Cavern was once privately owned and possesses the world's largest natural (not-man-made) entrance or opening. There was also evidence near the entrance to the cave of two distinct human occupations -- one by Native Americans and one by prehistoric humans -- that was uncovered by university archaeological digs. We also learned of some other features of the cave including: a huge formation named 'Goliath' thought to be as old as the earth itself, a 'frozen waterfall', a stalagmite forest, a expansive opening taller than 7 stories in height, and evidence of present of (bat) and past (shark tooth embedded in the roof of cave) animal habitation.

The team emerged from the cave, completing that part of the mission at approximately 1710 hours (the hike out of the cave was more of a workout that the trek into the cave). All members of the team agreed that the tour had been interesting, entertaining, and educational (fun). For those who haven't visited this cavern, we would recommend it. The team headed back to Huntsville at 1715 hours and arrived back at about 1750 hours.

Tired of the same old humdrum fundraisers? Sick of selling donuts, washing cars, or yard sales? Well, the members of the USS Maat were too. So this year, we decided to try something new, different, and challenging.

Our amphitheater, the Virginia Beach Verizon Wireless Ampitheater, runs all of its concessions with paid volunteers. We had to obtain an EIN (Employer Identification Number) from the IRS. Chapters can obtain an EIN by filling out the form SS-4 Application for Employer Identification number at http://www.irs.gov/forms_pubs/ forms.html.

While we were not paid hourly, like the general amphitheater staff, we received \$30 per show, per requested worker. We had to pay an upfront insurance liability fee of \$135.00, and attend two general meetings. In addition, each member who sold

beer had to attend a TIPS training meeting for which we were paid \$15.00 each. TIPS training assists the volunteers with learning how to responsibly sell beer.

Once everyone was trained, we were ready to work. We showed up for each event at the appointed time (3 hours before the show's start time, as the doors opened 2 hours before the shows). We'd go collect our bank, get our stands set up, and then we were ready to rock and roll. We sold lemonade, soda, and beer, and of course, got to listen to the music for free!

We worked ten shows, which included the following acts: Dave Matthews Band, Tim McGraw, Jazz Festival, Matchbox 20, Crosby, Stills & Nash, Stevie Nicks, Godsmack, Earth, Wind & Fire, Concert for America, and Tool. During a ten-week period, we worked ten shows and earned \$1,401.50. We worked these shows with only 14 different members, so it doesn't take a really large chapter to be able to reap the same rewards. All total, with our TIPS training checks and our show earnings, we earned \$1,581.50.

Now, I don't know about your chapter, but that's more money than the Maat generally earns in three years from our typical fundraisers. Not only did we earn more money, but also we physically did less work, and it was a whole lot more fun than washing cars! With out profits, we were able to donate \$800.00 to the Norfolk SPCA, \$600 to the Senior Services of Southeastern Virginia Food Bank, \$100.00 to the Red Cross, and we still have enough money to make new crew manuals for everyone! We've already set aside the insurance fee for next year, and we're planning on ordering new chapter shirts with part of our profits!

So next time you drag out the sponges and hoses, and think, I wish there was a better way to raise money, take a Maati tip, call your local amphitheater, concert stadium, sports stadium, etc., and see if they run the same type of program. There are Verizon Wireless Amphitheaters in Los Angeles, San Antonio, Charlotte and Indianapolis, so the chapters in those areas may want to start discussing the possibility!

DO YOU HAVE WHAT IT TAKES TO BE A CO? By Fleet Captain C. Bud Cullum • USS Matrix

Recently, the USS Matrix held elections for Commanding Officer. As a former CO, I would like to shed some light on the real life responsibilities of the job of CO that you do not see in any documents. So, before you decide to run for the position of CO or decide you want to start your own shuttle, I recommend reading the following questions and paragraphs.

Let me start off with the simplest question to ask yourself, only you can be honest enough to answer this question.

Do You Have The Time To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

I will tell you from my experience that it is just like having a daily part-time job. To be effective, you must be able to check and answer your e-mail on a daily basis. Often, I had to check it twice a day to just to keep up with it.

When I was Commanding Officer, I can honestly admit that my computer time tripled due to the amount of e-mails that I received not only from crewmembers and SFI management, but also from individuals that just wanted to know about our ship/club. Thankfully, my wife was very understanding and humored me when I did not have time to watch TV or spend a lot of time with her to participate in some of the family activities. Time requirements are not only on the computer. You may have to participate in telephone discussions and meetings.

Many STARFLEET Regional Coordinators conduct meetings, either at designated meeting places or at Star Trek conventions. Going to these is a responsibility that often falls on the shoulders of the CO and/or XO and can be a lot of fun, however they will cost you some time and money to attend these functions. And when you go, you also may be asked to assist with some special activities or jobs. Many times I have been asked to take a turn at the SFI recruitment table and enjoy the time spent there chatting with possible members.

Do You Have The Organizational Skills To Be The CO Of Your Ship? The two most important reports that

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you will be required to do are: SFI's Monthly Status Report (MSR) and your Ship's Monthly Newsletter. First, the STARFLEET MSR is required before the end of each month and if you are late, this is a negative mark against your chapter. Also if you miss two or three of these reports, SFI can list your ship as being IN-ACTIVE, this is not a good thing as it could lead to full decommissioning.

Second, your Ship's Monthly Newsletter is how the members learn what is going on the ship. It provides them with information that they would not normally hear if the CO did not put it together. Some people can get quite testy if they are expecting an award or promotion and you forget to put it into the Report. So, the CO must be prepared to have these documents ready or life could definitely become complicated.

Do You Have The Computer Resources To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

If your chapter relies heavily on e-mail and the Internet, let's start with the simplest part of this question to answer. Do you have a stable computer and Internet Service Provider (ISP) that will be available at all times? If your ISP is up or down like a yo-yo, if it is not stable you're in trouble. Things will backup on you and then you will be playing catch-up all of the time. Do you change ISPs from time to time? If you do you will be making tons of work for yourself.

As an SFI CO your name, address and e-mail address are associated with the ship and you are added into several databases, mail-list and links. Every time you change your e-mail address you must make the effort to get all of these links and databases corrected.

If you do not, chances are that you will miss some important information that SFI sends via the Internet. While Postal Service communication is always available, more and more information is passed on (and replied to) via the Internet. It is not required for a CO to have a computer and Internet access, but it sure comes in handy!

Do You Have The Money To Spare

"If Needed" To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

I can honestly state that the last three CO's of our ship have had to dip in their own pocketbooks to cover ship expenses, usually because of ISP expenses and other operating issues. Even for chapters that charge dues, sometimes an outlay of cash must be made before a given activity can succeed.

Do You Have The Patience To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

Folks, the job of CO will make you earn your fourth pip. This job is not a walk in the park and no matter what you try to do to improve ship activities, somebody will not like what you are about to do or have done. It can be a thankless job!!! Somebody will always have a better way of doing things; however, it may not be the best answer for the ship. Be prepared to justify your actions; somebody will always want to know why you have done what you have done.

Do You Have A High Enough Frustration Level To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

Things do not go the way that you have planned all of the time. Remember, 25% of the members do 75% of the work on the ship. Many of members do not even take the time to put in a Monthly Status Report to their Department Chiefs.

Lack of participation can be quite frustrating when you are trying to put together a report to SFI and you have not activities to be included. I have heard several people say "I would just order them to do it!" Believe me it is not that easy! Due to SFI regulations you cannot technically punish folks (demotions, etc) for not doing their jobs, unless it is a continuously documented problem. You must remember this is a club and if things get too busy, boring or complicated for folks, they can just turn off their computer or leave the ship.

Do You Think Before You Type?

One of the reasons that I feel that I am not an effective CO is that I type what I am thinking from time to time. I have been known to make decisions on my own. And truthfully unless you like hearing a lot of complaints, you will need to bite your tongue from time to time. Many people have very thin skins and do not take kindly to hearing the truth. And as the CO, you are the prime target, even if you had nothing to do with it.

Do You Have The People Skills Required To Be The CO Of Your Ship?

Even with a great deal of practice, you will not be able to read the minds of your crewmembers and many people feel that you should know what they are feeling. God forbid that you should ask them to tell you what is bothering them; two-thirds of the people will clam up or say that nothing is wrong.

However, they will complain to their friends in private e-mails behind your back instead of telling you outright. Several concerns that I faced as CO I learned of because I got wind of it from their friends or other sources. I am convinced that this is human nature and is common in business as well as our ship.

Don't get me wrong even with all of these commitments and requirements on you--the job of CO can be fun and a great learning experience. Heck the study of human nature alone could be turned into a master's thesis. But please be warned that if you think that you are going to take the CO position and not have to work, you are mistaken. To be an effective CO/manager requires a lot of time and devotion. And please remember one person cannot do it all and that is why we have a crew to support the Commanding Officer.

However, unlike the military in some cases, our rank does not automatically earn you the respect of others - it must be earned through your actions and support to the ship. Please remember that you should praise in public and critique in private. Displaying dirty laundry in public does not often get the support you may wish to have.

I hope this has been helpful to folks in their future pursuits. This may all be a game/hobby, however every game has rules to play by; even real life is no exception.



Is it cultural? Is it Economic? Is it Strategic? Why does the Klingon Empire, a powerfully warlike race, use as its primary combat vessel, ships that are ship for ship weaker than any of the primary combat vessels of their neighbors and/or potential enemies? From the D7 of the 2270's to the Bird of Prey of 2370's, the Klingons have consistently used underpowered, low endurance vessels, whose weapons suites are impressive for their size, but their overall combat effectiveness is generally 1/2 to 1/5 that of the standard Federation Line Cruiser.

From the D-7 to the Bird of Prey to even the modern Vor'cha Attack Cruisers, Klingon ships are class by class under-gunned, have lower endurance, and fewer multi mission capabilities than their counterparts in the Federation, the Romulan Empire, or even the Breen and Cardassian fleets. Do the Klingons choose these smaller ships for cultural reasons? Or to prove they have honor and are ready to go to Sto-Vo-Kor? Does the Klingon economy mandate smaller and leaner ships as a necessity? Or is the decision based on a strategic vision of a larger fleet with smaller ships allowing more flexibility on the fleet level? In this paper we will look at each of these reasons for the smaller Klingon ship and then the Klingon Swarm tactics. For each in its own way is a valid reason for the pattern of Klingon ship design and each is a puzzle part of the whole picture. In considering each of the 'causes' - cultural, economic and strategic - we will look at the answer based historical uses of the D-7 / K'tinga Classes, the recent usages of Birds of Prey classes, and the future uses of the Vor'cha, and other smaller Klingon ship designs.

The historical D-7 Class was only a slightly under-gunned relative the Federation's Constitution Class, but its engine power and long range endurance was only a fraction of their counterparts. However while patrolling in packs of three, the D7 gave the Klingon commanders more opportunity for combat, and thus honor. Also with smaller ships working teams meant there was the position of pack leader that could be reached for. These two factors led to more aggressive ship commanders, with a slightly weaker ship. This was a trait that was to be encouraged and rewarded. The cultural legacy of this led to a large officer corps of commanders and junior officers prepared for the Post D-7 / K'tinga era of ships.

Later the Klingon Defense Force developed the Bird of Prey classes, both smaller then the D-7, they were more powerfully gunned for their size, and were used in packs of three to five ships with much more success. In addition, the cloaking device technology gained from the Romulans was more easily utilized in these smaller ships. More ships with smaller crews led to more opportunities for command, for combat honors, and for advancement. Klingon commanders who do not succeed are replaced; those who will not fight are replaced - violently. The legacy this provided the KDF was of a officer cadre of thousands of combat capable officers and

commanders, willing to use their smaller ships more aggressively then their counterparts in the Federation and Romulan Empire.

Where does the KDF go from here when taking cultural necessity into account? Along with the larger Vor'cha cruisers and the Negh'Var Battle Čruisers, the Klingons must continue to develop either improved Bird of Prey vessels, or an entirely new craft that takes into account lessons learned during the Dominion War. One such development is the Bat'leth Class Patrol Combatant (1), developed in cooperation with the Federation and as an extension of the Federation's Defiant Class Escort program. Intentionally designed for Patrol duty, these small combatants are meant to operate in units of 3-5 vessels and with highly refined tactics that will fully utilize their heavy weaponry and nimble handling. For the Empire this will provide continued development of new officers who may achieve independent command experience while serving with honor to the Empire.

We have explored that while culturally the Klingon Empire would want smaller vessels than their neighbors, but is there also an economic reason? From the time of the D-7 to the current Bird of Preys to the future Bat'leth class ships, is there a resource-motivated reason to have three small ships instead of one large one? Of course there is and we will look at the comparative "costs" in each era.

The D7 was, compared to the cost of the Federation Constitution class, much less resource demanding. To use an arbitrary standard, the Constitution class would fetch 13 billion (with a B) Ferengi Bars of Gold Pressed Latinum. This is using today's rate of exchange. The D7 though required only 5.2 billion bars. In addition with the smaller, more focused, smaller mission crew, annual upkeep and supply of the crew was only 23 million Bars versus the 100 million bars for the Constitution. Finally the maintenance of the D7 was also cheaper than the Constitution, but not by much, 25 million bars versus 35 million per year.

In addition due to the large numbers of same hull design craft, the D7 and later K'tinga class programs, experienced added savings in design, yard building, and training of yard personnel. The program proved much less expensive in the long run for the Empire, than the multitude of ship classes for the Federation, especially when variants were taken into account. Every time the Empire needed a variant ship class of the cruiser, they modified an existing D7 Hull, while the Federation built a whole new ship design / class type.

Following the great success of the D7 and K'Tinga classes, the KDF followed up with the K'vort and the smaller B'rel classes. Outwardly the two classes were exactly alike; accepting the K'vort was larger in scale with equally larger scaled weaponry. These two "Bird of Prey" classes with their variable geometry wing structures were excellent

craft that were equally at home in deep space and within a planetary atmosphere. Hugely cheaper then the Federation, Excelsior, Ambassador, and Galaxy classes, they were also much less capable. However in combat, they excelled especially when flown in packs of three or more. Dahar masters developed excellent tactics for these craft that made use of their size and agility, while saving the Empire trillions in Construction costs, and billions more in maintenance and crew costs. In addition having the K'vort class with the same warp and maneuvering dynamics as the smaller B'rel made it easier to transfer successful captains from the B'rel to the K'vort classes.

The B'rel was also used as a test and variant platform for KDF research and intelligence operations. The B'rel craft used by General Chang when he used a Cloaked and Firing capable craft to attempt to disrupt the Khitomer Conference was a prime example.

The future of Klingon small vessels can be seen in the proposed Bat'leth class, and even here the Economic reasoning for the Empire holds true. Each Bat'leth, like the Defiant class that inspired it, has more fire power than a K'vort, and nearly the firepower of the Federation Intrepid class. With research and development costs shared with the Federation, this class will, vessel by vessel, be the most cost effective ever developed by the Empire, and because of the large run of vessels proposed, the over all cost of tooling for the construction would again be even greater. Finally the Bat'leth class is intended to have many different variants, from covert operations, to being a missile boat, to mine laying or system defense, to escort duties for unarmed starships. Every variant so far imagined has been planned for with the modular make up of the Bat'leth major sections.

Finally, we can present a strategic necessity for the use of smaller vessels and swarm tactics it works! That in itself is a reason for the Empire to pursue any specific tactical and or strategic course of action. But explaining why it works is even more fundamental to our thesis. Taking the D-7 into account, the Empire could not match the Federation's R&D budgets or their multipurpose platforms like the Constitution Class, or Enterprise Class Heavy Cruisers. But what the Empire could do was build three D-7s for the resource cost of one Enterprise, and then have each ship specialize as a Science Boat, a Beam Weapon Boat, or a Missile Boat. In addition even the famed Captain James T. Kirk was unable to match the firepower and flexibility of three D-7's. Even the hated Romulans were able to use the three to one advantage to nearly capture Kirk and the Enterprise, by being able to box in the Federation's most famous ship, and being able to take away escape in any of the three dimensions, the Romulans were able to use swarm tactics to remove the Federation's vessel-to-vessel technical superiority.

This success continued on into the Bird of Prey program, and even more so when the swarm

tactics are considered. One on one neither the B'rel nor the K'vort can stand up to any of the Federation, Romulan or Cardassian light cruisers, much less the powerful Heavy Cruiser / Large Exploration Cruisers. But three of these Bird of Preys which still require less resources in total (Building, Manpower, Replenishment and Support) and yet on occaision have torn apart their opponents in a matter of seconds. The multi-mission flexibility provided also allows each of these ships to fulfill a separate primary and/or secondary mission. The same strengths of multiple numbers and swarming tactics that applied for the D-7's apply even more so for the Bird's of Prey, In addition, because the ratio has grown from the 3-1 of the earlier era to 5-1 or even 7-1, the maneuverability, and the more weaponry, balances against or exceeds the Federation or Romulan advances in multi-nodal phaser banks.

In the foreseeable future this success is expected to repeat with the Bat'leth Patrol Combatant Ship program. The research and development stage is completed and the construction/prototype stage is beginning. A whole new technological and design concept from the Bird of Prey series, the Bat'leth will retain the numerical superiority due to its smaller size - smaller than even the B'rels. Resource cost will be about eighty percent that of a B'rel and twenty percent that of the Federation Intrepid class. And with five Bat'leth Class ships, any flotilla commander will be more than a match for anything up to a Negh'Var or even Sovereign class ship. This tactical flexibility also leads to operational and strategic flexibility as well. If a flotilla commander can break off two ships to act as escorts, one as a long ranged and cloaked patrol, and the last two has a cloaked hunter detail, he can patrol and control a much larger area of space than one or two ships before. Finally swarm tactics are even more exacting with multiple small, agile, and powerful weapons platforms, as witnessed by the Jem'Hadar's Scarab ships during the Dominion War.

In conclusion, it has become apparent that the Klingon Defense Force uses the smaller craft and their Swarm tactics for a myriad of reason. Cultural: because they are warriors, ready to seek Honor in battle and Honor in leadership. Economic: because of their smaller industrial base, especially post-Praxis, they must use their resources with more care and stewardship. And finally Strategic: for the best reason to use a particular tactic or strategy like the swarm tactic is that it works. The Empire, has withstood encroachment from the Federation, hostility with the Romulans, attacks from the Borg, Cardassians and the Dominion, and has come out the victor time and time again.

In the end, the Klingons use these tactics, because they are Klingons: the hunt, the pack, and the thrill of the kill. It is inherent in every Klingon warrior, the Blood of Warriors, it calls to them, and they answer it: One Warrior, One Ship, One Empire.



ON THE HUMANOID CONDITION Py FCont David Klingman • Vanabiologist USS Hawkova

This will be the last installment in the three part series dealing with humanoid physiology, a follow-up article will discuss advances in medicine and surgery through the 21st-24th century as they relate to cardiovascular, musculoskeletal, and neuroendocrine physiology. In this issue we'll talk about the control of body systems through the nervous system and various hormones.

The nervous system, like muscle tissue, is made of electrically excitable cells called **neurons** and is organized into a CENTRAL and PERIPHERAL nervous system. The central nervous system, the brain and spinal cord, is the control center, and the peripheral nervous system , made of peripheral nervous system , made of peripheral nerves and autonomic nerves, connects the brain and spinal cord to the rest of the body. This allows for sensory inputs to reach the brain and muscular and autonomic outputs to reach the peripheral tissues.

So how does a nerve cell work, how does it transmit signals? To understand this, we need to understand a little about electrochemistry. Nerve cells function by the differential distribution of ions (largely sodium, potassium, and calcium) across the cell membrane. At rest, a nerve cell has a high concentration of sodium (and some potassium) outside the cell, and a smaller concentration of both sodium and potassium inside the cell. This gives the cell a **resting** potential which is an electrical potential for ions to move across the cell. In most nerve cells the resting potential is about -70mV. A stimulus, such as a temperature change, physical pressure, or chemical stimulus, triggers the movement of sodium into the cell. When the potential inside the cell reaches about -40mV, an action potential is propagated. There is a massive influx of sodium into the cell (mediated by cell membrane proteins which form channels) and the inside of the cell suddenly becomes positive in relation to the external environment. The cluster of positive charges propagates along the nerve in one of two ways:

- in **myelinated nerve** (myelin is a fatty sheath that forms around rapidly conducting nerves and nerve axons), the propagation is rapid, "hopping" between areas of myelination (like a fast skip over a pond)

- in **nonmyelinated nerve** (nerve vells without the myelin sheath) conduction is continuous and slower and conductive power is diminished along the way.

In the central nervous system myelinated nerve is often called **white matter** as the myelin imparts whitish color to the tissue. Nonmyelinated nerve is called **gray matter** as bare nerve tissue is more grayish in color. In the central nervous system, gray matter is made of cell bodies and white matter is made of the nerve axons (trunks), which conduct messages rapidly.

Nerve cells communicate with one another by propagating the sodiummediated signal along the nerve axons until a nerve end is reached. The rapid accumulation of sodium triggers the calcium-mediated release of neurotransmitters from the nerve endings. One nerve ending communicates with another nerve across a very narrow gap, and the release and binding of neurotransmitters to the next series of nerve cells continues the process. In this case, the neurotransmitter is the chemical stimulus that causes the propagation of another action potential in the next cell or series of cells.

While there are many neurotransmitters, common ones include *acetylcholine*, *epinephrine*, *norepinephrine*, *serotonin*, *GABA* [gamma-aminobenzoinc acid], and *dopamine*. Research suggests and has shown that many psychological disorders are in fact imbalances of these neurotransmitters serotonin has had the greatest amount of press in the last decade as the neurotransmitter most responsible for psychological defects, and a class of medicines based on modifying serotonin uptake into the nerve cell has provided many patients with relief of symptoms.

Physically, the central nervous system consists of the cerebrum, cerebellum, brainstem, midbrain and pons, medulla oblongata and the spinal cord. The cerebrum, or higher brain center, is composed of two occipital lobes, two parietal lobes, two temporal lobes and two frontal lobes. The cerebrum controls and processes what we see, hear, touch and smell. The cerebellum mediates fine muscle control and balance. The brainstem, composed of the thalamus and hypothalamus, mediates autonomic and hormonal function and interaction in the brain. The midbrain and pons act as processing centers for signals going to and from the brain. The medulla oblongata is the connector between the brain and spinal cord. It also processes

signals travelling back and forth and controls base functions such as breathing and heart rate. The spinal cord connects the peripheral nervous system to the brain and central nervous system.

In what other ways is the peripheral nervous system and body 'controlled'?

Besides the nervous system, the body has a series of hormonal controls that help regulate physiologic function. There are numerous hormones produced in the body, so instead of talking about all of them, we are going to focus on the general types of hormones.

Hormonal production and control falls into two categories: **endocrine** control and **exocrine** control. Endocrine hormones are those chemicals (some proteins and other molecules) that are produced by specific glands and dispersed through the body via the bloodstream. Exocrine hormones are those hormones that are produced by glandular tissues and dispersed as 'excreted molecules' into various chambers and ducts such as within the digestive system, mammary glands, in the urine and saliva, etc.

Hormones work in general though hormone-receptor interactions. A hormone will bind to a cell surface receptor and initiate some change in the cell. The change is either a physical change in form or fluidity that allows other materials to pass through or be blocked or a release of chemicals inside the cell that trigger physical or genetic change. The most commonly known hormone in terms of population knowledge is **insulin**.

It is a short-chain protein endocrine hormone that is responsible for the regulation of blood sugar in the body. Insulin, which is produced by cells in the pancreas, binds to insulin-respondent cells such as muscle and fat and triggers the uptake of glucose into the cells, thus keeping blood sugar at specific levels. Individuals with **diabetes mellitus** either cannot produce enough insulin (type 1 or insulin-dependent diabetes) or have faulty receptors that cannot bind insulin properly or sufficiently (type 2 or non-insulin dependent diabetes) and blood sugars thus remain high. In type 1 diabetics (typically diagnosed in childhood) the long-term effects are kidney failure and "microvascular disease" (small blood vessel disease) leading to blindness, kidney falilure, and peripheral tissue damage. In type 2 diabetes (typically diagnosed in adults and the obese) there is "macrovascular disease" (or large blood vessels) and individuals suffer from heart damage and hart attacks and atherosclerosis among other problems.

IN MEMORIEM: USS PREVAILING WIND MEMBER HONORED AND REMEMBERED By Fleet Captain David Pfeifer and the Crews of the USS Prevailing Wind and USS Challenger • STARFLEET Region 7

Recently Fleet Captain Betty Flyzik, a dear and honorable member of STARFLEET International and the USS Prevailing Wind has passed away. Betty was a kind and gentle woman yet steadfast when striving to achieve her goals, and a woman who earned a remarkable amount of respect from anyone who knew her.

She had a stable of horses which she truly adored and kept after as though an extension of her family. She truly represented the best of what STARFLEET and fandom is all about, always looking to help people, and looking to understand and make better any situation that would come up. She enjoyed having people come together and never forgot just how special each individual is; she genuinely loved her crew(s).

Her STARFLEET history included service with the USS Ascension, helping to organize and build the Harrisburg Area Landing Party (HALPAT) and, after tenaciously surviving two membership splits due to heated differences, helped put together the USS Prevailing Wind which launched on January 10, 1996. In February of 1996 Betty was named the CO for the newly founded ship and maintained that position until February 1997. A short time later, November 1997 the USS Prevailing Wind split (this is the third split Betty would have to face) and she returned once again to the center chair as CO.

In January 1999, Betty turned the ship over to the Command of then Captain David Peifer so that she could head out to Brigantine, New Jersey to live with her daughter, granddaughter, and great grandson. This was her home up until quite recently. She would be happy to know that the USS Prevailing Wind is still standing strong today, now under the Command of Captain Mort Smith. Her (The Ship) Motto still echoes through it's walls: "We shall overcome- Upward and Onward" And with this in mind, it is my understanding that Betty was put to rest with her pips; she had said I earned them, I'm taking them with me.

The following was read at Betty's funeral

service at her request:

Do not stand by my grave and weep, I am not there, I do not sleep. I am a thousand winds that blow; I am the diamond glints on snow. I am the sunlight on ripened grain; I am the gentle autumn's rain.

When you awaken in the morning's hush I am the swift uplifting rush Of quiet birds in circled flight I am the soft star that shines at night Do not stand at my grave and cry. I am not there; I did not die.

Here are some thoughts of remembrance from those who knew Betty:

"...Betty was a kind, warm and gentle person. She was loyal to her friends and to STARFLEET and Challenger was her second home. Her first of course was the USS Prevailing Wind, the chapter she led for several years." Vice Admiral Bob Vosseller, CO USS Challenger

"Before meeting Betty I would never have imagined meeting a fraction of the science fiction people that I have met. Betty was a warm and loving person, I truly believe the leadership skills she cultivated in me have helped with my work experience. She always made things fun and kept everyone involved. Fleet Captain David Peifer, SFA: CAHC Director

Betty was born March 22, 1924 in Indianapolis, Indiana. She was married three times and had 6 kids, with 11 grandchildren, 4 great grandchildren, and 1 great-great greandson.

She finally entered into rest October 20, 2001 in Lewisbury, Pennsylvania. Funeral Services were held at Zimmerman - Auer Funeral Home October 23, 2001 at 8:00PM. Her interment is located at Blue Ridge Memorial Gardens, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The officiant was Reverend William C. Butts.

In closing I would like to use the words of Bob Vosseller; "She was a very special lady and she will be missed. We wish her peace as she ascends to the undiscovered country."
