With all the rumors swirling about the uncertain future of Star Trek: Enterprise as well as the upcoming U.S. Presidential elections in November, it's a good time to talk about how we can make the internet work for us in getting our issues heard by "The Powers That Be". Like everything else, there are good ways to put the Internet to use, as well as not-so-good ways. By avoiding a few common pitfalls, you'll increase your chances to bring about the changes you want.

Let's start with the biggest pitfall: online petitions. Online petitions are useful for a few things, but, as a tool to demonstrate to a network that there are thousands of fans that enjoy the show they are trying to kill, they are worthless. I'll repeat that: online petitions are worthless when trying to catch the attention of a network. Why? They're easy to skew.

The online petition site I'm most familiar with, www.thepetitionsite.com, tracks email addresses to determine if a new signer has signed previously. Sure, it takes your other demographic information as well, and even has an option to for you to be displayed anonymously on the website, but it only tracks emails. I currently have six different email addresses, so I could add myself on there six different times. I can even make up different contact

information for each new "me" that signs. How is that a fair representation of the demographic? It's not. And there's no way you can force it to be.

E-mail petitions are even worse, because now the quality control of your petition is completely out of your hands. Some email petitions have been floating around cyberspace for years, long past their effective time period. They clog up email boxes, especially when people just hit "reply to all" and spam it back to 10 or 20 people they don't even know. And they have all the same inherent problems as the online petitions I described in the previous paragraph.

Hands down, the best way to get yourself heard is by directly writing to the official person in question, whether that's the CEO of Viacom or one of your elected government officials. Depending on the person, you may be able to use e-mail. I routinely e-mail or fax my elected officials. I know that someone in their office is reading these letters, because they've sent me responses (one of my U.S. Senators is now sending her responses back via e-mail). However, if the person you're trying to contact receives a lot of email, chances are they'll never see your note, especially if people have been publicizing the email address all over the 'net. That leaves you with the "old

standby": sending a letter through the mail.

Now, I know my article is about the effective use of the Internet in getting your voice heard, but it's easy for a network executive to ignore an email. A junior staffer deletes them, or sets up a bounce-back filter, and no one ever has to worry with them. Piles of paper letters, on the other hand, have to be dealt with, if only to toss them out.

I actually prefer postcards to letters, for a few reasons. You have to be to the point with a postcard, because there isn't a lot of space. It's also easy for the network to get an idea of where the viewers are if you pick a postcard with a scene from your hometown on it. With today's "heightened sense of security" in the US, a postcard doesn't need extensive screening for anthrax or other nasty things. And, generally speaking, the postage is cheaper than a letter. A coordinated effort to send hundreds of postcards to a network is at least going to show the executives that people are watching.

So go grab a few postcards and make your voice heard! If you really love the show, it's worth a few dollars in postage, right?

In recent months there have been continued epithets hurled from the fandom community at the admittedly uneven-in-quality Star Trek: Enterprise, and new (and wholly unrealistic) demands are being laid on Paramount's doorstep to "bring back Kirk" (<http://www.bringbackkirk.com/>), along with suggestions that they otherwise continue to mine The Original Series for new shows or movies.

There are a few interesting concepts here, like following the TOS Big Three through Starfleet Academy, but they would violate fandom's beloved canon. In this example, not only did they not go through the Academy together but I believe it's been established (possibly not canonically) that McCoy didn't even go to Starfleet Academy!

Like it or not, the time for The Original Series is over. Even setting a new series in the TOS era following a new ship and a new crew is unlikely, since – and let's not let sentimentality get in the way here – trying to recreate the look of TOS with modern technology would look ridiculous to

the masses, to whom another series would have to be marketed. Fandom's not a big enough audience to support such a television series, even with UPN's low ratings standards.

That being said, one possibility – and I don't think it's a good possibility given the ages of the regulars who would likely be involved (64-74... and surprising me, Grace Lee Whitney's the oldest!) – could be a "Star Trek: Excelsior," with Capt. Sulu, Cmdr. Rand, and possibly Cmdrs. (Capts.?) Chekov and Uhura.

But, with an aging central cast, it would be a gamble that they would even all live through the series. I hate to say it, but these are the considerations made by studio executives. It's one thing to make a movie with them, but it's another to subject them to the rigors of television series production.

One possibility, and I think this could be a good idea depending on how they were written, would be to make a few Excelsior TV-movies, if for no other reason than to keep the franchise alive while trying to find a new series – should Enterprise go off the air without a viable substitute in the pipeline. (An important side-point here: I think it's critical to have some sort of Trek in production when Enterprise flies off into the sunset, otherwise – given the nature of the entertainment industry – the chances of future Treks happening are rather slim.)

It would be interesting to use such movies as a "passing of the baton" to a series covering what some call the Interregnum (the period from the end of Star Trek VI to the start of The Next Generation). There's a lot of interesting stories one could work with during this period, including the Breen War and

the long-term conflict between the Klingons and the Romulans, in one of whose battles the Enterprise-C was lost.

Another possibility could be a series following the missions of the Enterprise-B. I know, I know, most fans didn't like Captain Harriman... but let's be perfectly honest. This guy was given the biggest responsibility of his life, and before he's had a chance to adjust to it, not only does the media arrive in force, but three legends appear on his bridge – people whose boot steps one would probably feel unworthy of walking in, no matter how good an officer one is.

In my opinion, Harriman deserves a second chance... and now that Spin City is over, Alan Ruck is available! Seriously, though, all the main character captains so far have been relatively sure of their abilities. A captain having to grow into the job would be interesting to watch.

On the other hand, Paramount could play the hand it has dealt itself with (*cont. on p. 4*)

Enterprise and simply try to turn it into a show people will be interested in. How does it do that? I've heard two possibilities after tying off the current "weapon of mass destruction" storyline:

1) Continue on with exploration and begin meeting the rest of the races that formed the United Federation of Planets and start forging relationships with them, or

2) Start the Romulan War.

Both of these storylines have very good points to them, so I would recommend they do both: continue on with exploration, begin meeting the future Federation races, and then, as those who explore further and further have historically done, bump into hostile foreigners (in this case, the Romulans).

Have the war develop naturally out of the continued outward push, over a couple of seasons, and then do two seasons of escalating war – which could lead easily to Enterprise movies (feature or TV) involving the war.

Other possibilities include:

• Starfleet Academy: The Series

No, I'm not talking about following our TOS heroes through the Academy, but a show – probably set post-Voyager – about cadets at our favorite fictional institute of higher learning. Although this concept has long been scorned as "Trek 90210" or "Dawson's Creek in Space," it could just as easily follow in the footsteps of serious college-related films and books like "The Lords of Discipline" and the short-lived "Class of '96," and also have elements of the earlier episodes of "Space: Above & Beyond."

• Captain Riker & the Titan

Yes, the Titan's first mission was to begin to lay the groundwork for a formalized treaty with Romulus, but I can't see Starfleet keeping Riker's command in that job for very long. It would be a waste of his skills. Riker's experiences as First Officer of two successive starships Enterprise make him the obvious choice to command a mission of exploration in heretofore uncharted space. This would be an ideal show to put Trek back on its original premise: "wagon train to the stars," exploring the furthest galaxies, far away from the politics of the

Federation, the Klingon and Romulan Empires, etc.

This also has the same sort of attraction of the "Captain Sulu & the Excelsior" concept (beloved character gets his own command and brings some other beloved characters with him), with a much younger cross-over cast. Of course, they've played these roles on and off for almost twenty years. They may not want to return to playing them on a weekly schedule.

• MACO: The Series

Before you scoff, stop to consider it a minute: the U.S. is in a war; there's been a rebirth of viewing soldiers as heroes. This show would have a great deal of appeal outside of Trek's normal viewing audience, and therefore could keep the franchise humming while a new Trek more in line with "exploring strange new worlds, seeking out new life and new civilizations, boldly going where none have gone before" could be arranged.

And there are many, many more such possibilities. If Star Trek has created a fictional universe that we enjoy viewing, these and many other permutations of the concept are viable series. Of course, maybe a new TV series is the wrong way to go. Maybe Trek needs some time off to rebuild its

fan base, like it did between TOS and Star Trek: The Motion Picture.

But, either way, I believe it's a mistake for many reasons to look back to The Original Series as a way to save the Star Trek franchise, both with regard to frank issues of business and age and for reasons of story.

And as for Kirk's death not being grand and glorious enough for people... He died saving lives, making a difference. If fandom demands the character be resurrected to satisfy their desires for one more trip down memory lane, you've devalued the good captain's sacrifice and made his death mean virtually nothing.

So, as Sean Connery said in a film from another one of Paramount's franchises, "Let it go, Indiana." While Trek certainly needs to recapture the spirit of The Original Series, it needs to do so with new characters, new situations, and new frontiers.

On 17 April 2004 five members of the USS Europe met in the Belgian city of Antwerp. It was the first gathering of what will hopefully become a quarterly opportunity for local members to learn about those who are hiding behind their names in the digital world.

Three Belgian and two Dutch members met at the Central Train Station in Antwerp - this was a logical choice, since the majority of the members would arrive by train. People arrived between eleven and one o'clock at the station, and there was some time left in between to get to know each other better.

Most of the Belgian members had met each other before, as had the two from the Netherlands, and discussion varied from working together at the USS Europe to the higher grammar of the European languages.

After a short stop at the restaurant for refreshments and learning each other better, the whole group went to a cinema in the outskirts of the city to watch a movie together. The movie, called "Timeline," sparked some

Region 2's March, 2004 Summit charitable donation of \$1,500 to the Gulfport, MS, chapter of the American Cancer Society (pictured on the front page of CQ #122) has really opened some doors! It merited a glowing thank you letter from John Fitzhugh, Co-chair, American Cancer Society Relay For Life in Gulfport, part of which read, "Starfleet International Region 2 will be honored at the Gulfport Relay For Life as a Lane Sponsor."

This sounded good; but beyond recognition on the Gulfport Relay's banner as a corporate sponsor, we wondered what else we might be entitled to as a Lane Sponsor. So we presented this question to Janie Kuperstock, the South Mississippi Director of Communications for the American Cancer Society: If several members of the USS Dark Phoenix, on behalf of Region 2, did accept Mr. Fitzhugh's invitation to attend the Gulfport Relay For Life and offered assistance in whatever way was needed, would they be permitted to do some "Recruiting by Attraction" in uniform? She responded by not only welcoming us to attend the Gulfport Relay, but also by informing us of the Relays For Life schedule for other communities in south Mississippi this spring.

That was all we needed to hear. The

CO and XO of USS Dark Phoenix, the SFMC husband and wife team of COL Larry K. Morris and COL Mary Ann Morris, arrived early on May 1st to help set up the event site. More than once during setup Mr. Fitzhugh was heard to shout, "STARFLEET!" when he needed help, and the USS Dark Phoenix responded every time.

Torrential rain pelted the Gulf Coast that weekend. In Milton, FL's, Relay For Life on Friday night it never let up on the CO and XO of the USS Continuum, the husband and wife team of FCAPT Bruce Dolan and CAPT Sandy Dolan, who this year were walking as members of a team fielded by Sandy's employer, First National Bank of Florida. It was so bad that it caused the Dolans to cancel their original plan to drive to Gulfport to assist the USS Dark Phoenix in recruiting at Saturday night's Relay. It was probably just as well, since Saturday night's weather was a rerun of Friday night's, and the Gulfport Relay was called off at about 10:15 p.m. due to the rain.

Meanwhile, another USS Dark Phoenix husband and wife team, COMM Sunnie Planthold, the Region 2 VRC, and, FCAPT Ralph Planthold, the Mississippi Zone Coordinator, together with the USS Jubilee XO, CDR Henry Terry, Jr., were *(cont. on p. 6)*

splitting their 24-hour day between two other events. The threesome departed at 7 a.m. for Jackson, MS, to assist the USS Haise CO; RADM Bethany Theilman, Chief of Communications CDR Lucy Ferron, and Chief of Engineering LT Kaith Rush with their ship's annual appearance at Space Day, hosted by the Russell C. Davis Planetarium. After "showing the flag" for 4 hours (and enduring a 3-hour drive each way), the Dark Phoenix and Jubilee threesome arrived in Mobile, AL.

They were in Mobile to walk (and walk, and walk) in its Relay For Life as members of a team fielded by Henry's employer, S&S Sprinkler Co., LLC. Fortunately for all concerned, as of Friday morning the Mobile Relay had been moved indoors. In the wee hours of Sunday morning, Ralph and Henry talked to Lindsey Campbell, the South Alabama Director of Communications for the American Cancer Society, and using the same approach as with the South Mississippi ACS Communication Director, asked permission to do some "Recruiting by Attraction", in uniform, at future south Alabama Relays this spring.

As a result, the Lucedale, MS Relay For Life chairperson contacted us to request our assistance at their Relay on May 28th in exchange for a booth with electricity and permission to recruit. We immediately accepted, and when the event arrived, we were blessed with weather much more to our liking than we experienced in our previous efforts, as the skies were warm, sunny, and windy in the afternoon and cool and breezy overnight.

The turnout from STARFLEET Gulf Quadrant was all you could ask for as representatives from four sister ships converged on the George County High School stadium to help recruit. Included were the USS Haise CO; Bethany Theilman; and son Evan, the USS Okatoma CO; COMM James Brunton, and three prospective members of the Dark Phoenix.

We couldn't have asked for a better reception. We met and talked at some length with Lucedale Relay chairperson DeWanda Platt. She

provided valuable advice on how RADM Theilman might contact the chairperson for the Meridian, MS Relay, which is scheduled to follow the Lucedale Relay in just two weeks. We were also interviewed and photographed by a reporter from the Mississippi Press for a follow up article on the Relay. The fireworks display after dark at the Lucedale Relay was not to be believed, and we were very satisfied with the results of our recruiting efforts. We handed out business cards and STARFLEET applications to a scoutmaster, a shipyard worker, and a deputy sheriff among many others. We recommend that you try the method which we have used. Listed below for your possible use is a copy of the text of the letter we have used to approach the directors of these events:

"We are members of STARFLEET, the International Star Trek Fan Association, Inc., a not-for-profit organization with chapters around the world. Our local chapter would like to field its own team to walk in next year's Relay For Life, but right now we don't have enough members to accomplish that. What we would like to do for this year is 'Recruiting by Attraction': Set up a table; display photos, memorabilia, and brochures about the organization; and answer questions of anyone who comes to talk with us. We are not a political organization, and we are not a cult. We will not accost passersby in an effort to entice them to join our organization. We will sell nothing during the Relay; we will not even accept membership dues during the Relay from anyone who wishes to join. We will arrive early to help with setup and stay late to help with cleanup. May we have permission to set up a table somewhere at this event?"

You might consider trying this yourself. It works for us

A STAR TREK GUARDIAN LOST

A few months ago, Star Trek lost one of its guardians when Shirley Maiewski of Hatfield, MA passed away on April 13th 2004.

Star Trek fans around the world have much to thank Shirley for – she answered the call from Star Trek's creator, Gene Roddenberry, in 1968 when Desilu Studios wanted to pull the plug on Star Trek, and she was part of one of the biggest letter-writing campaigns by fans of the show to those then in power at the studio.

Over a million letters flooded in from ordinary fans from across the world; the result was that Star Trek was saved, if only for a season more. But the bigger message of that successful campaign was not lost, as fans near and far now knew that there were many who shared a fondness for Mr. Roddenberry's vision. From that fan support came ten movies, four additional TV series, and countless books still being published every month.

As a nine-year-old boy, I too wrote a letter to the studio asking them to save Star Trek, because it did make a difference in my life. It gave me hope and a vision that life could be better, something I had wished for daily as a child born with cerebral palsy. Over the next couple of years I wrote several more letters in support of the show, and one of the letters I received back pointed me the direction of the Star Trek Welcommittee (STW), of which Shirley was Chairman.

The Star Trek Welcommittee was a central information service which would answer questions about Star Trek. The Welcommittee was not a club to join, nor a social group, but rather a collection of fans scattered throughout the world who were willing, ready and able to answer all sorts of questions about Star Trek – from trivia to information on clubs, fanzines, conventions, how to make your own costumes and so forth.

I became a member of the Welcommittee team, in the early 90's, answering Star Trek questions from fans all over the world. Every couple of months Shirley would send me a packet of letters from fans that needed to be answered, and I would delve into my extensive Star Trek collection to seek the answers to the questions asked. The information age and the Internet took its toll on the Welcommittee in the late 90's, and it closed up shop.

As always happens, life moved on. In 2001 I rejoined Starfleet International, and in 2003 started my own chapter/ship in Northampton, MA called the U.S.S. Nelson. One of my crew had heard through the grapevine that Shirley had not been feeling well lately, and a call had gone out for fans of Star Trek to write to Shirley to help bolster her spirits. I wrote to Shirley that same day and told her that

I remembered the work she did to keep Star Trek alive, until other fans picked up the torch that she had lit those many years ago. She wrote back to me asking questions about the Nelson, and spoke about the fun we had at the Welcommittee.

She said in the letter, "I think we [the Welcommittee] were responsible for keeping Star Trek alive for a long time!" When I wrote her back, I said most assuredly that the Welcommittee played a large part in saving Star Trek and keeping it alive for future fans.

On April 6th the Nelson crew unanimously voted to make Shirley an honorary crewmember of the Nelson, and I sent out a certificate signifying that vote. I was awaiting Shirley response when I read in the newspaper of her untimely death.

Immediately, I had two thoughts. One was of a grateful nine-year-old boy so many years ago who learned that he was not alone; the other was the thought she conveyed to me in her last letter to me, that the Welcommittee had made a difference. Of that I have no doubt.

May thoughts of what Shirley accomplished "live long and prosper."

EC/AB NEWS

Greetings, STARFLEET. It is time once again for the AB round-up; this is your summary of all AB activities that have occurred in the last two months and your chance to see how your leaders acted on your behalf. This period has been a busy one indeed.

Item one was a proposal by the EC to modify an already awarded honor to a member when the EC believed one aspect of the honor to be in error. The AB discussed the request of the EC and came to the conclusion that no modification was needed.

The AB implemented a system by which the Membership Handbook could automatically undergo updates when the updates were mandated by changes to the STARFLEET constitution, and to increase the speed of changes to the MHB when such changes were required by state or federal law. At the same time, they also noted that the CS could change the Welcome from the CS as the CS sees fit and Appendix F (vital URLs / emails) could change as needed. The AB took steps to modify the original proposal to ensure that their roles in regards to oversight was not diminished, and passed the motion to allow such changes.

The AB began discussion, at the CS's urging, of what would happen if an RC election process began and no one ran for office. While this should not be a common occurrence, it is a possibility. Discussion has not moved forward on this matter as much as it might have, due to other issues of import arising.

Two FLEET staffers also made requests of the AB. The OCC director asked the AB to beta test the new OCC. Those AB members that did so were also invited to offer up suggestions for alterations; your new OCC is a group effort. Additionally, the Awards director has been taking steps in the form of email reminders for the RCs to submit the regional awards to her for judgment on the various annual awards for FLEET.

The AB was also informed, and in returned advised and took action, regarding the MP changeover. As some of you on STARFLEET-L already know, the Membership Processing changeover was not the smoothest process possible. In order to ensure that STARFLEET was acting properly with regards to the transfer of material, the EC, especially the CS and CompOps, kept the AB informed on

every development in the sequence of events. The AB also discussed what would happen if material transfer did not occur. Regrettably, the issue of leaks from the EC/AB mailing list also had to be discussed; while the EC/AB makes an effort to be transparent in their deliberations through such things as this article every CQ, it is important for many reasons, including each and every member's right to privacy, that certain discussions or aspects of discussion remain private. The issue of membership processing has been for the most part resolved, though there are one or two issues that are still open.

The AB welcomed Adrian John Jones as the new RC of Region 20.

As always, if you want to discuss any matter before the AB, you should talk with your representative on the AB, your duly elected Regional Coordinator. A listing of RCs can be found in the back of this and every issue of the CQ.



ILS REVAMP

As discussed earlier, we have been hard at work updating the Academy, and focusing first on the Institute of Leadership Studies. Officer Training School, and Officer Command College, are the two courses required to be Chapter Officers or higher in this organization. What we have done then, is to gear the questions to reflect those requirements. Starting in January of 2003, OTS has been updated to reflect changes in the Membership Handbook and Constitution that had occurred over the previous six years, and is now fills the role as an Introduction to Starfleet.

We now include an OTS exam in every membership packet, it is available free for download, or can be ordered from the OTS Director, Sergeant Major of the SFMC Scott Grant. Our goal is to get every member who is interested to take the test, and to have the basic and rudimentary knowledge of what STARFLEET is and their role therein.

OCC then is our Commanding Officer / Executive Officer training Course. This test will cover more chapter leadership/management matters, AND have the student answer Essay type questions showing they understand the material covered in the MHB and Constitution. Questions will be updated on an ongoing basis reflecting real world situations that have come up.

Flag Officer School has for the first time since its creation by Helen Pawlowski back during the McGinnis administration has been immensely updated. It is now designed to help guide 'Fleet Leadership above the Chapter level in understanding their roles, and responsibilities. Dave Klingman is passing on lessons he has recently learned both via book knowledge and real world applications while assigned overseas with the United States Air Force.

No longer is FOS a course that will tell you that if you don't own a Trek Costume you are ineligible for command, but rather focuses on how to deal with conflict between chapters using the CURRENT Handbook and Constitution.

Our first non-OCC 200 level course to support the Chapters is the Recruiting Course, developed by Bob Vosseller. It is a basic introduction on chapter and fandom recruiting techniques. This is followed up by the recently announced Accessibility Course, another 200 level course to help the Chapter thrive and become open for all members of fandom, even those with disabilities.

Officer's Leadership Thesis is a yet underutilized tool that allows the OCC graduate to write an essay about ANY, yes ANY aspect of Fleet, they feel is insufficient, AND provide a solution to this problem. Got a problem with the Academy's handling of Database input, and you know a better way? Then tell us, you'll get credit, and will help fleet be better for all concerned.

Finally I want to thank the Dean of the Institute of Leadership Studies, Fleet Admiral Les Rickard. Les has put in many hours coordinating a bunch of type-A personalities, and doing a great job keeping them on task, and being able to get the entire ILS ready for its new unavailing by the IC. If you see Les in person or online, please thank him for the work he has done, and continues to do, to make 'fleet easier on the membership, and more fun for them too.

IMS REVAMP

Our next update will be to the Institute of Military Studies. Now that we have a new Dean, and a plethora of new Directors, it is the right time to make effective changes in organizing and streamlining that institute to make it more fun for the students, more efficient for both the membership and the directors, and to follow the example of the ILS in becoming an even more "Academic" portion of the Starfleet Academy. More details on the specifics will be available at the International Conference as well as in the next issue of the Communiqué.

THE INTERDISCIPLINARY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Unfortunately this program has been delayed time and time again. Thus I am asking if any member who is not currently a director who is both interested in getting this set up, AND has a wide experience with many different schools at the Academy, to please contact me.



If you have any questions about the MP changes and the status of your membership, please contact helpdesk@sfi.org or membership@sfi.org. There is a forwarding order in place from the old box to the new one in Lima, OH. So, mail should continue to flow smoothly at this point forward to the new Membership Processing Team.

At this point, I am becoming more and more convinced that STARFLEET

needs a stable PO Box for membership processing. Due to this, after discussion with the rest of the EC and several AB members, we are initiating plans to pursue outsourcing of part or all of STARFLEET's Membership Processing. We are looking at several options at outsourcing currently. These include outsourcing the initial receipt of the application and data entry (allowing for a customer service hotline for inquiries), outsourcing the packet fulfillment, the whole process. Several members, including former CS Les Rickard, are working on this along with us.

As Chief of Computer Operations, I am constitutionally tasked in making sure membership processing operates efficiently, effectively, and at the best cost available. This process of looking at all our outsourcing options will not occur overnight. It could take some time to make sure the best (*cont. on p. 17*).

option is selected at the best price. Or, it may turn out that keeping the current system is the best option. But, we will make sure that in the end, what is best for STARFLEET is done.

The CompOps department website at <http://compops.sfi.org> is currently undergoing a facelift thanks to the CompOps webguy Mike Dugas. So, at this time, several features may be under construction. Please be patient during this time. If you need assistance with a document that was on that page currently, please let me know at compops@sfi.org. I like the new feel to the page and look forward to seeing it completed soon.

Also, we're implementing a new program in CompOps on the Recruitment side of the house. The flip side of recruitment is membership retention. It is important that we focus our efforts there as well. Due

to the change-over in membership processing and the time it took to accomplish and coordinate the transfer of MP supplies, these programs had to wait about a month before getting announced and rolling out.

The first one is an idea that was brought to me by Michael Vermoesen of Region 9. It is a New Member Orientation office. We've worked out several of the details, and I'm really looking forward to seeing this office do great things. We've had a good number of new members express that they feel "lost" when they first join SFI. They aren't sure who does what, who to contact, where to find the online social areas, how to find a chapter, etc. So, Michael will be putting together a small team to help with the transition into STARFLEET. Through inquiries into those who chose not to renew after the first year, it has been discovered that many people felt lost in the crowd.

So, we hope this new office will in

this area. If you are a new member and have questions, you can email Welcome@sfi.org and someone from the New Member Orientation office will contact you. Ask anything you'd like.

We were all new once to fleet, so we understand that it can be a bit intimidating at times. Also, if you are new, don't be surprised if someone contacts you to make sure you've settled in comfortably for what could be the ride of your life - STARFLEET style!

We're also looking at implementing an oldie-but-goodie in CompOps. Currently, the membership database sends out renewal reminders by e-mail. These e-mails are generated and sent to the e-mail address on file in the database.

However, some people don't always keep a current address on file. Others don't have email at all. I feel that anything we can do to help

with membership retention is worth it. We may start sending out post card renewal reminders in the near future. We're working on a system that will be effective and efficient.

In closing, I had a great time at R1 Summit, and I enjoyed seeing old friends and making new ones. I'm hoping to make a couple other summits around the fleet, but if not, I will definitely see you at the IC in Birmingham, Alabama! See you around the net and in the next CQ!

Printable membership applications, in several formats, are available from the online STARFLEET Document Archive, located at <http://documents.sfi.org/>.

Q: What kinds of payment does STARFLEET accept for my membership application/renewal?

A: STARFLEET accepts several payment methods.

Online applications can be paid via Debit/Credit Card (Visa/MasterCard/Discover) or Paypal.

If using Paypal, please be sure to fully complete the Paypal transaction, as your membership may be put on hold if the CFO's office has no record of your Paypal payment.

Also, in the notes section of the Paypal transaction, please include the member name and/or SCC# of the applicant. This is extremely helpful to the CFO's office in the case of CO's handling crewmember renewals through a chapter and/or personal Paypal account.

When using a credit card, if the name and address on the credit card is different from the member's name and address (for example, a CO handling crewmember renewals on a personal Credit Card) then the cardholder must send a message to Membership@sfi.org within 24 hours

of the time of submission from the online application web page stating:

- 1) their name as it appears on the credit card,
- 2) their correct current credit card billing address,
- 3) the last four digits of the card number, and

- 4) a statement declaring that (s)he authorizes the transaction, granting permission for STARFLEET to charge the credit card in the full amount of the submitted transaction, and agreeing to be responsible for the charge according to all of the terms of their credit agreement with the issuer of the credit card used.

Applications sent through the mail system to the PO Box can be paid with check, money order, or credit card. We ask that you not send cash through the mail system.

The 2004 Recruiting Contest is coming along well, with eleven regions showing growth since January 1. That shows some good work on the part of the members and chapters of the regions. Congratulations! Remember, the regions with the largest growth will receive prizes of STARFLEET Quartermaster Gift Certificates, to be presented at the International Conference.

In this last article in my four-article series about recruiting, I am going to discuss a subject that has become more and more commonly discussed around STARFLEET – the changing nature of science fiction and fandom. A very famous and successful book came out a few years ago, called “Who Moved My Cheese?” The title is from a parable that takes place in a maze. Four beings live in that maze: Sniff and Scurry are mice - non-analytical and nonjudgmental, they just want cheese and are willing to do whatever it takes to get it. Hem and Haw are “little people,” mouse-size humans who have an entirely different relationship with cheese. It’s not just sustenance to them; it’s their self-image. Their lives and belief systems are built around the cheese they’ve found. Most of us reading the story will see the cheese as something related to our livelihoods - our jobs, our career paths, the industries we work in - although it can stand for anything, from health to relationships. The point of the story is that we have to be alert to changes in the cheese, and be prepared to go running off in search of new sources of cheese when the cheese we have runs out.

For many of us in STARFLEET, the organization and the way we learned to operate within it can be our “cheese” – maybe not such a big part of our self-image, but certainly a part of it that we find important. After years of being part of STARFLEET, and perhaps even working our way up into the leadership of some part of the organization, we have gotten comfortable with how to run our chapters, how to write our newsletters, how to author our web pages, and how to recruit new members.

However, just like in all other aspects of our lives, things have changed! There aren’t just one or two science fiction shows on television now – there are many, especially if you count the various fantasy shows, mini series, and so on. Star Trek had a virtual stranglehold on science fiction television for many

years, but that’s simply not true any more. There was once a day when there were few options in fan clubs for science fiction fans, and STARFLEET could count on gaining members by its mere existence. Even in the early days of the Internet, STARFLEET had a dominating presence as one of the first science fiction clubs to take advantage of e-mail lists, groups, web pages, and so on.

Our “cheese” has moved, and we must move with it – or fall by the wayside, to join other small and dying fandom groups that could no adapt to the increasingly fast pace of change in the science fiction fan world.

How do we do this? First, we must figure out just what is different. Two items stand out immediately about the nature of fandom in the twenty-first century, compared to ten or more years ago. First, it’s the Information Age! The Internet has revolutionized everything, and while STARFLEET has taken advantage of that fact, we haven’t always adjusted to it completely. Years ago, our monthly and bimonthly newsletters could print news about Star Trek and have us all waiting eagerly to read it – because for most of us, it was our only source of such information. We could keep pace with the best sources of science fiction information, because they were all monthly at best. Today, most of our audience is able to access the internet and specialized cable television channels (like the SciFi channel) and get all of the fandom news while it’s hot – and that can make our newsletters horribly dated by the time they reach our mailboxes.

How do we adjust to this? Our “cheese” is gone! We have to look for something else to put in our newsletters in order to get the interest of our readers back up high again. If you read your Communiqué, you can see some of this being done, and being done well. The emphasis over the past few years has shifted away from science fiction news back to STARFLEET news. The chapter reports are back, and every issue has convention reports, photographs, reports about chapter events, and articles about future events. There is an illustrated story, classified ad section, and critical information from the various members of the Executive Committee. This is

stuff that is important to the members of STARFLEET, that may not be available on the Internet, and it makes the Communiqué a much more viable read than it would be if it concentrated on what would be stale news stories about Star Trek and other science fiction.

The second thing we have to adjust to has already been touched on in this article – that Star Trek is no longer the dominant force in television science fiction. No matter how good the show may become, it will never again be the only game in town for fans. If STARFLEET were to continue to have Star Trek as its sole focus of fandom, it would only be cutting out the majority of fans from its recruiting base. You may have noticed this already happening in the Communiqué, at STARFLEET conventions, and in some chapters. It can be a subtle thing – such as discussing other science fiction at chapter meetings or publishing news from other science fiction in newsletters – or it can be a larger thing, like listing your club as the USS Grand Moff Tarkin, Louisiana’s Premiere Science Fiction and Fantasy Fan Club. Star Trek can be the frame around which your chapter and its activities are structured, allowing you to bring in fans of everything from Star Wars to Lord of the Rings. Nearly every science fiction or fantasy fan group has some sort of organization in the stories, from the Jedi and Storm Troopers of Star Wars, the Queen’s Own of Mercedes Lackey’s books, Hogwarts School for Harry Potter fans, the Army of Gondor in the Lord of the Rings – and on and on. Several of STARFLEET’s most successful chapters have divisions for other branches of fandom, allowing their members to explore the aspect of fiction they most enjoy, inside of STARFLEET’s organization.

There are more ways we can adjust to the changing nature of fandom beyond those two. Our conventions, regional and international, in the past focused on STARFLEET business. They were the one time in the year when our leaders could assemble as a group and take care of items that simply couldn’t be handled easily by phone calls or emails. The necessity of this focus has all but disappeared, as online meeting rooms can serve the same function at a tiny fraction of the cost of meeting in person. So, what purpose can our conventions serve now? They can still

allow the most important business decisions to be made in person, but they can shift their focus to more of a social gathering, with much more varied schedules of events than was possible years ago. Look at the schedules for regional summits and the International Convention over the past years (and in the near future), and you will see this happening. There are many more social events, panels on subjects not strictly about running a chapter, and items that are of interest to the more casual fan, and even for their spouses and children who may have just tagged along. If your event appeals to a broader audience, then a broader audience is exactly what you will get.

The final adjustment we must make, as an organization, is that our demographic has changed. Since Star Trek has lost its virtual stranglehold on science fiction television, the average age of our membership has gradually risen, and the number of family groups has increased. The membership has changed from being largely younger members, with a predominance of single males, to a large percentage of our members being thirty or older, married, with children. STARFLEET must adjust to this, by having programs and traits which are appealing to the spouses and children of our devoted fan base. Our events and publications need to interest all the members of the family, and people of more varying levels of interest in STARFLEET.

Our “cheese” has moved! It’s no longer one big, bright hunk, dominating our fandom maze. It’s a hundred flavors, hidden, everywhere, with pieces appearing and disappearing. As an organization, and as chapters, we must pursue a variety of ways of gaining and keeping members. The mission of the Enterprise was, “Its continuing mission: to explore strange new worlds; to seek out new life and new civilizations... to boldly go where no one has gone before.” We have an opportunity to seek out some new life by extending our reach into other fandom; we have the chance to explore the strange new worlds of Star Wars, Lord of the Rings, and everything in between – and we will boldly go where we have not gone before, bringing new members into STARFLEET in ways we never imagined!

Since Pete Mohney is quite busy with IC, I was asked to fill in by writing an article about some aspect of recruiting. Since I have had many questions about how to retain members in the group, I am going to write about that.

How DO we keep members once we get them in the group? Well, you know that saying that "idle hands cause mischief?" It actually fits here. What you want to do is keep the members of your organization busy and happy with being there by including them in what is going on, and having activities they want to see. Some ways you can do that include:

- **Never ignore your members.**

Get their input on what they want to get out of the group. Ask them for suggestions on programs and activities they would like to see. Make sure you stay in communication with them whether it be newsletter, email, or plain old talking to them face to face at the meetings.

- **Programs at your meetings.**

Who wants to just attend a business meeting then go home? Not anyone I know of. Have a program along with the business meeting. Especially

something most of the group is interested in, like how to make a model rocket. Advertise these programs along with advertising the meetings. This can serve two purposes, it keeps your present members interested in the group, and it can attract new recruits in the process.

- **Programs outside of your meetings.**

On the other hand, who wants to be in an organization that just has meetings?? Plan picnics, role playing game sessions, and outings to promote pleasurable and social situations. In the chapter I am on (USS Renegade) at one time we had our own softball team. We were not very good as a team, but who cares?? It was loads of fun, and the members that didn't play got a kick out of seeing the "Bad News Renegaders".

- **Charitable Events.**

Remember, along with being a Fan Association, we are also a Service

Organization. This means we go out and do things for charity and help others in the community. Besides the Trek aspect of STARFLEET, this is the other thing that makes being in this organization fun for me. One year, we actually made food baskets for those less fortunate at the December Holiday Season.

It wasn't just gratifying to me to make the baskets and know they were being distributed, but to actually go to these folks' homes and present them to the families we were helping. Charitable events are also good for Public Relations, and sometimes can get you on television so you get the word out that you exist.

Getting the word out there by use of charities accomplishes two things: Shows that you are a viable resource in your community, and can be another way of recruiting new members.

Finally, don't stress over much if you find someone who is leaving the group over reasons you can not control.

This may include a new job changing their schedule, they are moving to take another job, or even work keeps them from attending events. If they are moving, suggest a chapter near them or even that they become a correspondence member of your chapter or a correy chapter. If you can't keep them on your ship for one reason or another, then at minimum, try to keep them a member of STARFLEET.

Even retaining members in a chapter can be a good way to recruit new members just by doing the very things that we do that makes STARFLEET what it is. Our events get us out in the open and accessible to others who are like-minded seeing us.

Remember that when you plan your next charity event or baseball outing, and don't forget to take some recruiting materials with you, or even passively recruit by wearing your chapter's T-shirt or even a STARFLEET shirt or hat. One never knows when that next new member is going to walk around the bend.

One last thing pertaining to PayPal: I can't stress enough how important it is that you use the Note Section of PayPal to list the name and SCC number of the person you are renewing, even if it is yourself. Several chapters use the same account to renew multiple memberships, which is fine, but I often have no idea who

those memberships are for.

By including the Name and SCC number of the person being renewed, I can quickly process the membership.



CADET PROGRAMS VS. YOUTH PROGRAMS: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Many people have asked me, "Robin, why do you sign the end of your emails and other correspondence with Cadet/Youth Services?" The answer is simple. Not every chapter calls the programs for their kids the same thing. Some prefer to use Cadet Corps, keeping in line with Star Trek and the feel of Star Trek that STARFLEET tries to embody. Other prefer a more PC term of Youth Program. Some of the reasons include not wanting to sound paramilitaristic and it can involve less explanation when recruiting.

So, to not leave anyone out, I use both. The choice is to each individual group, but most importantly it's up to the kids participating in the program how they would like to be referred to. Services is appropriate for both. I am here to be a service to you, your chapter, STARFLEET, but most importantly I am here to serve the Cadets, Youths, and children of STARFLEET.

If you have any questions on how I can serve you better, or even comments - I gladly welcome them and answer your emails as quickly as possible.

One of the more fascinating aspects of how the Star Trek universe is organized is that of its 'geography' or 'topography' (depending on whether one is looking at the 'universe' in 2 or 3 dimensions.) Certainly, we are all familiar with the 'quadrant' system utilized in the Star Trek fictional universe (i.e. the Alpha and Beta Quadrants being the home to the Federation, Klingons, and Romulans, the Delta Quadrant being the home to the Borg, and the Gamma Quadrant being the home to the Dominion.) As I have written and have read the plethora of fan fiction and novelizations set in the Star Trek universe, I have come to wonder if it is possible to relate the geographic delineations of the regions of STARFLEET to the fictional quadrants, and so I have come up with a representation that I believe does this justice. I've done this once before in a cursory fashion, and now I have made a more detailed attempt at representing the Earth as the Milky Way galaxy.

I first began with the notion that North America, particularly the United States, based on the majority 'role' it plays in membership numbers in STARFLEET, would represent the United Federation of Planets and closely associated territories. From this, I have determined that:

- The Alpha Quadrant is composed of North, Central, and South America, excluding Quebec, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland (the territories of R14) and also excluding Baffin Bay and the islands of the Arctic Circle (including Greenland.)

- The Beta Quadrant is composed of those islands excluded (as mentioned above,) Greenland, and the territories of R14. Also included in the Beta Quadrant are Iceland, the United Kingdom, the territories of Scandinavia, all of Europe, Africa, and Madagascar.

The separation line between the Alpha and Beta Quadrants runs along the northern border of Alaska, Baffin Bay, between Ontario and Quebec, along the border between Canada and New England, along the southern coasts of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, and then east and south along the mid-Atlantic ridge.

- The Delta Quadrant is composed of the Arabian Peninsula, the Middle East, through Pakistan and Afghanistan into India, China, Korea, Mongolia, and through Southeast Asia into the Philippines, Indonesia, Australia, and New Zealand. Also included are Taiwan and Japan.

The separation line between the Beta and Delta Quadrants runs,

therefore, from the Arctic Circle, across the northern Atlantic, down the eastern border of Scandinavia (Finland,) the border between Europe and Russia, along the western and southern coasts of Turkey and the eastern Mediterranean Sea, the Arabian peninsula (western and southern borders,) then east along the coast of India to its tip, then more or less 'south' through the approximate center of the Indian Ocean (Ceylon, along with India, is included in the Delta Quadrant.)

- Finally, the Gamma Quadrant includes all of the former Soviet Union and more or less all of the Arctic Circle. The separation line between the Delta and Gamma Quadrants is represented by the southern coasts of the Black Sea and Caspian Sea (and the borders between the former Soviet Union and Turkey, Iran, and Afghanistan,) and the border between the former Soviet Union and Pakistan, China, and Mongolia. The separation line between the Gamma and Alpha Quadrants would be the northern coast of Alaska, through the Bering Straits, and approximately south from here (the Pacific Ocean therefore would contain regions of 'space' that include the Alpha Quadrant [eastern Pacific], Gamma Quadrant [Northwest Pacific Basin] and Delta Quadrant [southern Pacific and Micronesia.]) The Antarctic is not included in this representation, but could in fact be considered to represent the 'southern' aspect of the center of the galaxy (granted, based on this 'top view' of Earth, the center of the galaxy is somewhere in the Arctic Circle.) With these boundaries set, it is relatively easy to locate the various races of the Star Trek universe in the scope of Earth, STARFLEET, and its regions:

- The United Federation of Planets is contained within the continental United States and includes Regions 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,12,13,15, and 17. The Bajoran wormhole, Deep Space Nine, and Cardassian Space would be represented by the area off the Pacific coasts of R4 and R5.

- Klingon Space runs along the border between the United States and western Canada and runs north through Baffin Bay and the islands of the Arctic Circle (and therefore includes both Alpha and Beta Quadrants.)

- Romulan Space includes northern Quebec, Greenland, and the waters of Hudson Straight and Labrador Sea (the northern border of R14) - R14

is therefore located within the Beta Quadrant.

- The Tholians and Breen and all the other aggressor species we have seen throughout Star Trek's long history would be clustered around the Great Lakes or somewhere within North America.

- The Slobodan Hegemony, a fictional race featured in several STARFLEET fan fiction pieces, would be represented by Vancouver Island, off the Pacific coastline

- R10, though contained in the Alpha Quadrant, would represent a 'frontier' area of space (which is consistent with some fan fiction that has included the 10th Fleet).

- Regions 9 and 20 (Europe and UK) are located within the Beta Quadrant; presumably these are also 'frontier' territories.

- Regions 18 (Central and South America) and 8 (the African Portion) are presumed to be 'frontier' territories within the Alpha and Beta Quadrants, respectively.

- The Middle East, though also part of R8, is contained within the Delta Quadrant (presumably its closest approximation to the Federation.)

- The Delta Quadrant is perhaps the busiest and most interesting location as we relate the map of the Earth to the 'quadrant' system: USS Voyager would have begun its voyage home somewhere in northern Japan (it's about as far away as we can get on this particular topographic representation of the Earth.) The Kazon and Vidiians would have terrorized USS Voyager through a voyage 'south' through Japan until the ship crossed the Nekrit Expanse (the Japan Sea.) Along the way, Voyager would have encountered the Voth (north and west from the Korean Peninsula) before the ship entered the vast expanse of Borg Space (China and Mongolia.) A brief period of relief, if you could call it that, would have come along the 'Northwest Passage' (the Great Wall of China) as the Borg were themselves decimated by Species 8472. Voyager would have encountered the Hirogen somewhere in Tibet or along the Himalayas ('the 'Hirogen Array') and would have run across the Borg on and off throughout the rest of their journey until they approached the Delta/Beta Quadrant border (the Middle

East) and utilized the transwarp hub (one could suggest that Baghdad is the location of the Borg transwarp hub) before returning to the Alpha Quadrant. Based on this scheme, Regions 16 and 11 are located in the Delta Quadrant (and given Chris Wallace's own theories on quantum slipstream, the USS Bright Star, and his obsession with the Orient, this seems to make some sense.) As for R11, I can only offer my apologies... you're just so far out there, I didn't know what else to do with you.

- This leaves, finally, R19 and the Gamma Quadrant. I am supposing that the Gamma Quadrant terminus of the Bajoran wormhole ends somewhere in the southern tip of the Kamchatka Peninsula, and that Siberia is the domain of the Dominion.

Certainly, there are going to be flaws with this representation of the Earth and its organization into quadrants - there really is no 'center of the galaxy' though one can suppose that it is located somewhere in the Arctic (it was the reason I chose a 'top down' view of the Earth.) The other major flaw is the difficulty in relating a 'flat' map of a 'spherical' earth presented in 2 dimensions to a 3-dimensional galaxy that is itself portrayed in most references as a flat circle cut into quadrants. It does not accurately take into account the fact that the Milky Way is a 3-dimensional place. Why am I doing all this? Well, as more and more of us get prolific writing fan fiction, I thought it would be a nice idea to have a fictional representation of the Earth so that we could relate our own fan organization to the universe of Star Trek in which we like to play. The purpose is therefore that of a 'guide' for the writer, and this supplements the other guides, which include:

Let me start this by saying that Ann and I are handicapped. We were used to working within the system. As problems developed, we learned how to get help when we needed it. But we did not expect what was about to happen to us, both the good and the bad. Ann and I had been sharing a house in Houston TX with a friend for nearly 5 years. It was a situation that helped save our lives. When we faced homelessness in Pennsylvania this internet friend in Houston offered to let us share his house. Five years later, in the middle of December 2003, as much of the world was preparing to celebrate Christmas, our friend informed us that we had to move sooner rather than later. He was in danger of losing the house due to financial problems. Immediately, Ann Redding and I got started trying to find affordable housing in Houston. Over the weeks we learned that there was no housing we could afford, much less, immediately move into. As a friend said, it sounds a bit like the Christmas story, no room at the inn.

Rents were higher than we could afford and special housing for the handicapped had waiting lists of over 4 years. The only help the social service system offered was to inform us that we could be put up in shelters, space available, but we would have to give up our cat. That was not an option. The social service system in Houston, Harris County, and Texas did not work. Even private organizations like the Center for Independent Living, that claimed to help the handicapped find housing, were no help. During a somewhat routine communication with our department head, Commodore Margaret Grunwell, on the USS Appomattox we reported our dilemma. We were considered by our ship as the Texas Away Team.

At the darkest point in this situation we feared we were really going to be homeless and hopeless. Suddenly the phone rang and it was Commodore Grunwell. She was calling to tell us that she found us a wonderful apartment in a wonderful complex in Lynchburg VA. It was like a great weight was off of us. We had renewed hope. Margaret hurriedly formed a rescue away team of 4 of our shipmates, rented a van, and headed to Houston. Alan Provo, Chris Johanson, John Sprouse and Margaret Grunwell left Lynchburg, VA around 10:30 P.M. on a Thursday night. They arrived less than 22 hours later having driven straight through. Their idea was to rent a truck in Houston, load our belongings into it, and get us all back up to Lynchburg.

This became a serious matter, as weather reports for the Lynchburg VA area were for ice and heavy snow. By this point, Houston was getting ready for the Super Bowl. Not a single truck rental was available for out of state, one way moves, unless we were willing to pay \$1000. An assurance I had gotten that a truck would be available by a local truck rental agency proved to have been a lie. In the end, all the rescue team could rent was a Cadillac that appeared to have all the amenities.

We grabbed what we needed and

could find, threw it all into the two vehicles and set off from Houston. Sadly, most of the papers Ann needs were not found when we got to Lynchburg. Ann also forgot her crutches. She can walk SHORT distances without them, but how this happened, during the chaos of packing, is beyond any understanding. Luckily our friend shipped them up to us. Our cat was put into her carrier for the trip. Luckily she slept through most of the trip, a trip of well over 24 hours. When she did come out of the carrier she refused to eat, drink, or use her litter box. This had us concerned but luckily she adjusted to her new surroundings and is just fine according to her new vet.

Around Tennessee we ran into the beginning of the storm. It was raining heavily and the roads were getting slicker by the minute. The farther north we got the more the precipitation turned into ice and then snow. It also became heavier and heavier. In the best tradition of STARFLEET, this away team worked to drive safely and get us all to safety. We arrived in the middle of a blizzard. Ann and I had not been in snow for over 5 years. Margaret made sure to have warm jackets for us. We had hoped we would never see ice or snow again. We hoped that we had finally found a safe and good place for us to call home in the Houston area. But it was not to be. It looks like Lynchburg

is going to have to be that place.

Chris Johanson and his wife Sue, also a ship member, offered to let us stay in their home. This proved to be a true blessing. Once we were settled into their home contact, was made with the agent for the apartment complex we were to move into. He assured us that everything was in order. He needed us to sign one more form. He further assured us that we were going to be moving into an apartment the next morning. That morning we learned that it was not to be. This agent was told by the apartment manager that the paperwork was not acceptable until the week of the move.

Luckily, there was an opening two doors down from our hosts. They contacted their landlord, who was kind enough to allow us to rent this apartment. Our shipmates and their family members have worked hard to help us make this apartment our home. Plans remain to make a trip back to Texas to get the rest of our belongings out of storage and up here where we need them.

There are problems here, but we have found a social service system that works. People are as friendly and helpful as they were in Texas. I am told this is a southern thing, not just a Texas thing. The only problem is that we are on the wrong side of a county border to get public transportation. This means that we have to rely on our shipmates for anything like shopping. They have been wonderful about helping us this way. Many people in the ship and some from the area have helped donate furniture and household items so that we could have our own home.

It is good to belong to an organization and a ship with such caring, kind, loving, supportive people.





Whether you love it or hate it, the Internet is here to stay. People are turning to the 'net with increasing frequency for their every need, from buying a car to finding a neighborhood church. In this "information age", a well-managed website may be your chapter's best recruiting tool.

A good website doesn't need to be flashy, with a lot of slick graphics and music. True, those things do draw your attention, but the skills needed to produce such a site are beyond your average Internet user. Besides, too much of a good thing ends up being annoying, especially to people who have slow modems or who are new to computers. The best websites are easy to navigate, with a high ratio of content to eye candy.

So you don't need to have a website with a fly-by of the Enterprise-C on

your index page. However, you do need to show that you put effort into keeping your web presence current. If the last item on your calendar of events is from three years ago, and your list of chapter officers is even older, what impression does that give a potential chapter member? At best, it tells them that your chapter isn't all that dedicated at projects. At worst, it makes them think that the chapter is defunct.

Keep things current. I can't stress that enough. A chapter website with a few basic pages of frequently updated information will draw more people in than a website that's really pretty. New members want to know how and

where they can find you. They want to see the sorts of activities you're doing. A calendar of upcoming events, a contact info page, and photos of your group having fun will do more to recruit new members than just about anything else.

There are lots of other good things you can include on a simple chapter website. Links to other chapter, your regional site, the main SFI site, etc., are an easy way to make your site a resource for the local fandom. Just be sure to check the links periodically to make sure they're still live. You can also include downloadable membership packets with forms and flyers and

other materials. Be sure to keep the file sizes as small as possible for those with slower modems. Consider adding a message board to the site, so your crew can interact with new folks.

Cyberspace is always open. A good website will allow your group to recruit 24/7 and reach countless numbers of more folks than you'll ever bump into at a convention. Don't let the opportunity pass you by, when maintaining a good website is actually pretty simple.

It has been said that one of the greatest traits of STARFLEET is our willingness to step forward and volunteer. The willingness to work hard for any given cause, whether in time or finances, has been a staple of Starfleet members now for many years. This was certainly the case with Region 15 as we came to the aid of friends who, for many years, had given so much to our organization and overall science fiction fandom.

For the past 14 years United Fan Con, a mainstay in the New England area for sci-fi conventions and entertainment, has provided us with some of the fondest memories that we as a region have had. FROM THE 'DANT

Well, my report is kinda short and sweet this time.

I really enjoyed myself at the Region One Summit and am really looking forward to the International Conference.

No awards were issued since the last CQ as I had computer problems and my mail went AWOL. It took me quite some time to restore the e-mails to my computer and I am just now catching up on those.

Recently the General Staff approved five proposals sent in by Marines for consideration.

Naval Unit Citation, is an award given to STARFLEET Chapters, Region Staff or other non-Marine units which give exemplary support to SFMC Units, Battalions, Brigades and/or the General Staff.

20 Year Service Ribbon. A little while back we approved a separate ribbon to recognize 20 years of service to the SFMC. It was named the Ueffing Ribbon. A suggestion sent in recently suggested that we simply change that by adding a Good Conduct Knot to the already existing Good Conduct Medal and the discontinue adding devices. So the decision was made to allow up to 5 Good Conduct Medals, equaling 15 years, then add the Knot after 20 years with no more devices beyond that.

The Sword of Honor/Valor was changed to represent the "Officer" of the year. This was suggested due to there already being a "Marine of the Year", the Cross of Honor/Valor and there being an "NCO of the year". The original wording by nature included the NCOs when they already had a ribbon of their own.

It was decided that a standardized Certificate system be put in place for all levels above the Brigade level. Eventually we expect this to extend to the lower levels.

Due to extreme delays in requests for awards a time limit was put in place for nominations. This statute of limitations is set at no later than six months after the action/event. Honor and Valor awards will not apply to this criteria as they are for ALL actions within the 12 months preceding the award.

If you have any proposals you would like considered please send them up the Chain of Command to the General Staff and they will be put on our list of items to discuss.

Since the last CQ we have had two financial reports released:

March

We started the month of March with \$1353.24. There were two deposits made during the month. The first one was for merchandise sold at the Region Two Summit in the amount of \$239.50. The second was for merchandise received in the mail in the amount of \$8.10. There was one check cashed on the account during the month on 3/3/04 in the amount of \$114.00 for a ribbon order. The Service Charge on the account for the month totaled \$0.79. This leaves a total in the checking account at month's end of \$1478.74.

We started the month with Petty Cash in the amount of \$14.81. We had two expenditures for postage, one on 3/23/04 in the amount of \$0.60 and another on 3/26/04 in the amount of \$0.49. This leaves a total in petty cash at the close of the month in the amount of \$13.72.

We have funds earmarked for donation in the amount of \$80.17. A new recipient is being discussed for these funds.

This leaves a grand total of SFMC funds at the end of the month in the amount of \$1492.46.

April

We started the month of April with \$1478.74. There was one deposit made during the month for merchandise sold in the amount of \$81.30. There was no Service Charge on the account for the month. This leaves a total in the checking account at month's end of \$1567.35.

We started the month with Petty Cash in the amount of \$13.72. We had one expenditure during the month totaling \$1.66. This leaves a total in petty cash at the close of the month in the amount of \$12.06.

Due to the deposit of a CafePress check during the month of May, we have funds earmarked for donation in the amount of \$96.55. We'll be issuing this as soon as the GS discusses the charities we have been submitted.

This leaves a grand total of SFMC funds at the end of April in the amount of \$1579.41.

FROM THE DEPDANT

Greetings Marines,

First of all, there were several proposals, received from Marines in the field, which were debated and approved by the General Staff. These proposals were posted to the SFMC Mailing List on 07 May 04.

1. Naval Unit Citation

In reviewing the awards issued by the SFMC, there are none authorized to recognize an SFI chapter or other non-marine group that has contributed significant effort in an SFMC-sponsored activity.

Issuing Authority: Brigade OIC (for BN and below) COFORCECOM (for BDE or above)

Frequency: As needed (one award per unit per year maximum)

SFMC Ribbon Name: None

This award is given to an STARFLEET Chapter, a Regional staff, or other non-marine unit which exemplifies meritorious service either by demonstrating consistently outstanding performance over time, or by performing a particular task or service to a high standard of excellence, while in support of an SFMC unit.

2. 20 Year Service Ribbon

Previously, it was announced that the Corps would instate a ribbon to recognize 20 years of service in the STARFLEET Marine Corps. This was to be a separate ribbon. However, an alternative has been suggested that seems to make a lot more sense than adding an additional ribbon to the ribbon bar.

Due to the similarity between this award and the current Good Conduct Medal, we have decided to merge the two awards. These regulations will supersede the regulations for multiple awards of a ribbon given on p. 29 of the MFM.

For the first 5 issuances of the Good Conduct Medal (yrs. 3, 6, 9, 12, and 15), standard regs will apply. After the 15th year, no further GCMS will be awarded until the Marine reaches the 20th year of service. At this point, rather than adding a gold star, a Good Conduct Knot device

will replace the stars on the ribbon. Once this is done, no further devices will be added to the ribbon.

3. Change to the Sword of Honor/Valor

Changed to Brigade/SFMC Officer of the year. This award is given to the Marine Officer...

This change in wording will take effect after IC 2004 in order to keep the current awards under the same guidelines.

Also, in the Sword of Honor, "Steering Committee" is changed to "General Staff."

4. Standardized Award Certificate

The General Staff has decided to use a standardized award certificates for all GS issues awards meriting a ribbon and certificate. As time allows, these certificates can also be created for BDE staff and below. This is assuming that enough notice is give for the certificates to be created. Until the demand for these certificates is gauged, appropriate lead-time estimates can not be given. For more information, please contact BDR Aaron Murphy at depdant@sfi-sfmc.org.

5. Policy on Award Nominations

We have had instances throughout the SFMC on award nominations for actions one year or more previous. To keep this from happening, all award nominations must be submitted no more than six months after the qualifying events. The only awards not affected by this are the Valor and Honor awards, which cover the previous 12 months.

Now, policy number 5 segues into my next announcement. As I announced in my last post, the deadline for the 2004 Honor awards is 2359 hrs on 15 Jul 04. Any awards received after this date will NOT be considered. I wish all the 2004 Valor award recipients the best of luck. See you again in 60.

SENDING PROPOSALS TO THE GS

Recently, the General Staff has had several proposals brought to its attention. We've had them sent in via phone conversations, e-mails, unit reports, just about everything except a restaurant napkin (watch, that will probably come in next week). I thought it would be a good time to touch on proposals and ways to help them get through the Chain of Command as quickly as possible.

It is always good for us to hear from the Marines in the field. The GS is always looking to see who is doing what and getting new ideas from active units. Passing your ideas up in your unit reports helps us to see what the common interests are and possibly to spread them to others in the Corps who might be struggling for ideas.

However, sometimes good ideas or proposed policy additions/changes get lost in the mass of information. To help make sure that your ideas get to the right people in a clear, concise fashion, we recommend that you write up an official proposal and send it up the CoC. It doesn't have to be long or in legalese, but it should be clear, complete, and concise.

I would recommend the following format: Title, Issue, and Proposed Solution. The title can be short. Three to five words should do. The issue should explain, factually, the issue that you see. We do not need specific names or events, but examples, even fictionalized, would be helpful, if it assists in illustrating or clarifying the issue. Finally, the proposed solution is the most important part. This should provide a detailed and realistic solution to the issue presented.

Here is an example:

Title: Naval Unit Citation

Issue: Within the SFMC Awards structure, there is no award available to recognize non-Marines who have gone above and beyond the call of duty to assist SFMC personnel or units in projects to benefit the Marines or one of their causes.

Solution: Establish an award similar to the Meritorious Unit Citation for non-Marine units in support of SFMC personnel. This award would not need to be accompanied by a ribbon, since the ribbon system is not commonly used among non-Marine personnel. A certificate should suffice. The same description and requirements in the MUC should apply to the NUC.

Now, once you are done with your proposal, be sure you put your contact information at the bottom of the proposal (or, if you use the standard memo format, this could also be in the header) and send it up the CoC. Contact info should, at the least, include your name, rank, unit, and e-mail address. Any SFMC titles held can be added, but are not required.

The reason for the contact information is simple; sometimes proposals get separated from the original e-mails, especially if they are forwarded multiple times. This allows us to contact you with the status of your proposal and gives us the ability to ask questions if clarifications are necessary.

When writing your proposal, try to keep a few things in mind:

1) It doesn't need to be a novel. Make sure your proposal is long enough to get your point across without going through multiple reams of paper. Most proposals can usually be done in 3-4 paragraphs, at most.

2) Stick to the facts. There are times when issues, especially if they've gone on for a while, can get extremely frustrating. Try to keep a neutral tone to your post. If your reader starts through a proposal and it has more venting than substance, it is likely that the person responsible for the policy is going to send it back to you for a re-write. Try to put yourself in their shoes. If you don't think you'd like to be talked to that way, don't do it to them.

3) Try to write one proposal per submission. When you write up idea, after idea, after idea, it's sometimes hard to tell where one ends and the next begin. There are also cases where you might have multiple ideas and they chain off on another. In this case, if one idea is denied, it becomes necessary to deny the entire thing.

Thank you for your patience in reading through this article. I hope it provides some insight into the process and gives you some ideas on ways to help ensure that your ideas get seen and discussed in a timely manner. 

Another chef who became our instructor was Chef Gary Bullock. He was the Executive Chef for Fresh Start Catering, and is now a chef instructor for DC Central Kitchen. Both he and Chef Karen are also a part of Contract Foods, which is another affiliate of DC Central Kitchen. While taking classes every Monday-Friday, Chef Gary taught an afternoon class, which dealt with filleting fish and salmon. One time, he brought in a huge female snapper, and showed us how to properly filet it.

During our 12 weeks at DCCK, our classes would be in the mornings from 8:30 A.M. to 9:00 A.M. or later. Afterwards, we would head into the kitchen and begin our tasks of making various meals for different shelters in DC. Most of the time, we would have a Life Skills course, which would help the trainees to succeed throughout the program, and thereafter. Part of the program also, would be to travel to different areas involving food service.

One of several trips we went on was to Georgetown University/Hotel

and Conference Center. We met one of the Sous Chefs there, and another graduate from DCCK, Tamioka, while exploring the food service section. All of us toured the kitchen, and saw how the chefs worked and the meals they prepared.

Another field trip was to Stratford University. This one was very interesting because there we had a meal during our trip. The kitchen there is fascinating, and the chefs there are very disciplined and organized in preparing meals. Our meals came from the menus on campus, and they were absolutely wonderful. Dessert included cheesecake and pies. After several pictures, laughter, and a few smoke breaks, we headed back to DC. Other trips included Kitchen Match and Food Team, which are temporary agencies.

Our afternoon classes included practice exercises for a major exam at the end of our 12 weeks. Our entire class passed and graduated, despite the numbers being small. Our class

started out with 25 people, then it dwindled to 16, then 8. A few were dismissed, and one or two decided to drop out. As graduation day came on the horizon, I had several objectives to fulfill while job hunting. I received a Training Staff Award for my efforts in finding a job, and being the first one hired in my class, while still holding a job with Target. During the final two weeks before graduation, I went out to eight different places with resumes, and dropped them off, while visiting those places. The last stop was TGI Fridays in downtown DC.

After showing my resume to the head chef, I was told to come back during the 4th of July weekend. When I arrived, it was very, very, very, busy, and I officially started the next day for two months, until they closed down on Labor Day 2003. On Stardate: 0318.7, we, the 52nd class of DC Central Kitchen, held our graduation ceremony at the Hyatt Regency of Washington, DC. We received our certificates of completion and food handler's cards. Our class, out of all others, was the most memorable ever. DCCK gave me a chance in food service that other places would not, and I hope to perfect my culinary skills in other places for a rewarding career.

The other day I happened to be researching the history of our chapter's namesake O'Bannon and stumbled across this report by a crewman from the USS O'Bannon, dd-450 that served in WWII. It struck my interest because the O'BANNON NCC-5372's mascot is a potato, He is named Lt. Spuds. When it was first explained to me why, I found it quite funny. Enjoy.

On 5 April 1943, DESRON 21 was returning from a night of shelling Japanese shore installations deep in the New Georgia area of the Solomon Islands. Our destroyer, the O'Bannon, as part of this force, picked up a radar contact that turned out to be a large Japanese submarine cruising on the surface and apparently unaware of our presence. The Japanese lookouts undoubtedly were fast asleep.

We approached rapidly and were preparing to ram the sub. Our captain and other officers on the bridge were trying to identify the type of sub, and decided, at the last minute, that it could be a mine layer.

THE MAINE POTATO INCIDENT

Not wanting to blow up ourselves along with the sub, the decision was made that ramming was not a wise move. At the last moment, the rudder was swung hard to avoid a collision and we found ourselves in a rather embarrassing situation as we sailed along side of the Japanese submarine.

On board the sub, Japanese sailors, wearing dark shorts and dinky blue hats, were sleeping out on deck. This kept them very busy as they try to get rid of them by throwing them back at the O'Bannon or over the side of the sub. Thus occupied, they were too busy to man their deck gun, which gave us sufficient time to put a little distance between our ship and the sub.

Finally, we were far enough away to bring our guns to bear and firing commenced. One of our shells managed to hit the sub's conning tower, but the sub managed to submerge anyway. At that time our

ship was able to pass directly over the sub for a depth charge attack. Later information showed that the sub did sink. When the Association of Potato Growers of Maine heard of this strange episode, they sent a plaque to commemorate the event. The plaque was mounted in an appropriate place near the crew's mess hall for the crew to see. Well, it was the crew's battle.

That plaque is now located on the current O'Bannon's quarterdeck, commemorating the event. It reads:

A tribute to the Officers and Men of the USS O'Bannon. for their ingenuity in using our now proud potato to sink a Japanese submarine in the spring of 1943.

Presented by POTATO GROWERS of the State of Maine. June 14, 1945.




DULLES ANNEX AWAY MISSION

On March 6, 2004, the away team from the USS Appomatox comprised of John Sprouse, Alan Provo, Meg Roach, Chris and Sue Johanson, Margaret Grunwell, and our camera shy guests, Stuart Porter and Matt McDaniel, left Lynchburg, Virginia for the rendezvous with the USS Athena and anyone else who wanted to make the journey.

The group arrived at the Dulles Annex, or the National Air and Space Museum Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center, around 9:30 A.M., and joined the line for entrance. The weekend before our trip, the center reached the half-million visitor mark. From the outer area, even before gaining entry, we could see the space shuttle straight inside. After being checked through by security, the group divided, leaving Margaret to watch for any others from STARFLEET to come, and notify her team via walkie-talkies.

The USS Athena was represented by Lisa Berkenbilt, Pete Dowty, Martin Bonica, and Tom & Karen Donnelly. Later Karen "Terpette" Mitchell from the USS Highlander and her guest, Chris Caruthers joined us. We mixed and matched groupings looking at different exhibits and displays. As expected, one of the first stops for us all was the Space Shuttle Enterprise, which definitely gave us photo opportunities.

Here is a brief description of the facilities. As you enter the building, the first section runs from left to right. Starting at the right is the IMAX Theater, the tower, the information areas, tickets, and bathrooms. In the middle were the entrance, the museum store, and future food

court. Then came offices and other official areas, entry to a perpendicular hanging ramp crossing the hanger and more bathrooms. From the entrance, continuing straight, is an entry hall with access via the stairs to the lower level and a few displays. At the end of the hall is the second floor overlooking into a vast hanger that runs almost parallel to the first. This is where the majority of planes, etc. are displayed. From the overlook and to the right is a downward ramp approximately forty to fifty feet long. Then it turns outward towards the hanger and continues down to the base level, running parallel to the first section of ramp. Straight across, on the other side of the hanger, is an elevator that will take you up to the second and third floors, which are also connected to each other by a similar ramp. There are bathrooms here too. The upper ramp runs almost the whole length of the hanger and has another elevator at the end, furthest from the entrance. There are also stairs for the more ambulatory. Last, but not least, is the hall going from the hanger to the section of building that houses the space shuttle.

There are many exhibits to check, four IMAX shows, at least fifty types of air locomotion; from hang gliders to gliders, from jets to the space shuttle. A whole variety of aircraft on display includes vessels from America, Germany, Japan, and Russia. A guide even told us there were one hundred twenty more planes to come. There is a seven story tower for observation of

planes taking off and landing at the nearby Washington Dulles International Airport and the sixth floor houses a mock-up of a control tower and what controllers look at all day.

There was a Subway restaurant in the main part of the building/hanger, but it most likely will be moved upstairs to the, soon to be completed, Food Court next to the Museum Store. This will free that area up for future displays. There are to be two more buildings constructed in conjunction with this facility; a Future Restoration Hanger and a Future Archives Center and Conservation Lab with Artifact Storage. Additional planes and the restoration equipment will continue to arrive from the Suitland, MD facility.

From the ceiling, the first plane display you see, a Pitts S-1C, was flown by the first woman acrobat pilot, Betty Skelton, and was restored by a completely female team. Next displayed from the ceiling were the Tomahawk P-40 and the F4 Corsair, both World War II vintage planes. The Tomahawks were used in China before the United States entered into World War II. The group, known as the Flying Tigers, was from the American Volunteer Group, independent pilots that had been recruited for the Chinese Air Force. Downstairs, in one of the display cases, was one of the former pilot's flight jackets that had a Chinese flag on it and Chinese writing to identify the pilot as a friend to civilians if he were ever shot down and in need of

help. The Vought F4U-1D Corsair was well used in the Pacific Theater. It was a land-based plane that could also land and take off from a carrier. It is the plane that the VMF-214 Squadron used to score the highest kill ratio in the Pacific Theater. The Commander of the Squadron was Major Gregory "Pappy" Boyington. He flew with the Flying Tigers before the United States entered into the Second World War, then signed up with the United States and with a squadron of pilots flying F4 Corsairs, and the Black Sheep Squadron was born.

Going slightly further into the museum, you can see the hanger open up with the Lockheed SR-71 Blackbird in front and below you on the hanger floor. This is the world's faster jet. It cruises about 75,000 feet at Mach 3.3. To the right of the Blackbird, they have an exhibit of jet fighters from the Korean and Vietnam wars. The Bell UH-1H Iroquois Huey helicopter is also exhibited in this area. One of the jets is a MIG-15, which was considered one of the first sonic jets. Beside it is an American F-86 Saber, the MIG's counterpart. Across from these two jets is the MIG-21 and a Douglas A-4C Skyhawk and, the newest jet to soon be in production, the F-23 Raptor. Other weapons were on display from this time period that went with these planes and jets.

On the other side of the Blackbird there is an assortment of vintage aircraft, from all time periods of flight, including the Boeing B-29-45-MO Superfortress Enola Gay. The walkways even enable one to see right into the cockpit. This is the first time the *(cont. on p. 35)*

historic aircraft has been seen in its entirety. Prior to the opening of the museum, the aircraft could be seen in pieces in different buildings of the Paul E. Garber Preservation, Restoration, and Storage Facility in Suitland, MD. Tucked back towards the entrance side of the hanger on the ground floor are simulators and flight wear, including one worn by Amelia Earhart. These planes include, but are not limited to, the Lansing, the Boeing 307 Stratoliner, the Concorde and the prototype Boeing 707 known as the Boeing 367-80, which is the only passenger jet to do a complete roll. An impressive assortment of gliders and small engine planes are represented. A section at the furthest end of the hanger included items from the space program and even a model of the mother ship from *Close Encounters of the Third Kind*.

This model showed how the team that made it was creative in the way they included modern bits and pieces into making something

extraterrestrial. Some of the items to look for are R2D2, a tie-fighter, a submarine, the Alvin, a cemetery plot, a VW minivan, jet fighters, assorted street signals, hair curlers, a mailbox, a machine gun, three or four 55-gallon drums, and three propellers from a Titanic model. The model is a reminder that through creativity dreams can be made into reality. The furthest section of the building, the James S. McDonnell Space Hanger, is the home of the Space Shuttle Enterprise, the Mercury capsule 15B Freedom 7II, and the Gemini VII capsule, from which the United States had its first space walk mission.

This, of course, is just a brief description and some history of what the newest Smithsonian facility has to offer. More visits will be planned, not only to this facility, but to others in Washington, D.C., and possibly Maryland, too. TREK NOVEL REVIEW:

"Requiem" by Michael Jan Friedman and Kevin Ryan

While commanding the *Stargazer*, Capt. Picard is sent on a mission to the Gorn home world to answer a request from the Gorn. A reluctant crew tries to persuade Picard not to proceed with this mission, they feel it too dangerous. Little is known of the Gorn civilization. They had only the reports from the original encounter that had taken place 75 years earlier, when Capt. James T. Kirk and the *Enterprise* battled the Gorn. However, those records had been sealed and classified.

Upon reaching the rendezvous point with the Gorn vessel, the *Stargazer* receives a hail requesting that Capt. Picard transport to the Gorn vessel. They inform the *Stargazer* that they will proceed to the Gorn home world, with the *Stargazer* is given orders to stay where it is and hold position. The unwilling crew obeys the orders and watches as the Gorn vessel and Capt. Picard leaves the *Stargazer* behind.

Upon reaching their destination, Picard is led to the leader of the Gorn. He hands Picard a small device and is told to return to STARFLEET and give it to his leaders. The Gorn explains to Picard that they are declaring war against STARFLEET. Picard refuses to be the bearer of such bad news and insists on negotiating with the Gorn leader.

Twenty-five years later Picard, commanding the *Starship Enterprise*, once again finds himself on his way to the Gorn home world for treaty negotiations. Before the *Enterprise* reaches its destination of the Gorn home world, they find an abandoned space station. While Data, Geordi, and Riker all show interest in the station, Picard's interest in archeology convinces him to stop to investigate the station. The first inspection shows no life signs and minimal power. Riker takes an away team over to the station to determine if it is safe for Capt. Picard to make a personal visit to the station.

Due to power buildups in the station, Picard gets transported through time to Cestus III; hours before the Gorn attack the outpost. Picard finds himself torn between trying to escape without letting the people know of their impending death or telling them the facts and changing the history of the Federation, and possibly losing all

chances of returning to his own time.

Meanwhile, back in his time, Riker takes command of the *Enterprise* and appoints Ensign Ro Laren as Acting First Officer. With his own dilemma of trying to locate Capt. Picard, Riker has everyone doubling his or her efforts to locate the Captain.

With pressure mounting from the away team, having potential problems of being transported off the station, the pressure mounts further as Riker is given orders from a STARFLEET admiral that he has 36 hours to complete his search for Picard. Whether Picard is found or not, Riker has to abandon the search and continue on Cestus III. As tensions are rising on Cestus III and time is running out for the *Enterprise* crew to find their Captain, Ensign Ro brings an option to Riker that tests his loyalties to both Picard and STARFLEET. Riker makes a choice that could get him court-martialed.

Riker accepts Ensign Ro's plan to contact the Bon Amar, a Bajoran group of outlaws that STARFLEET has ordered to be arrested on sight and their ship seized in an attempt to get their help to search for Captain Picard.

While the *Enterprise* is jumping from planet to planet scanning for Picard, the away team, still back on the station, finally figures out how to work the transporter systems. However the memory banks had gotten erased due to a power-surge, so they are handed another setback in locating Picard.

With only a couple hours left Ensign Ro explodes onto the bridge and tells Riker, "They found him, they found the Captain. His communicator was found on Cestus III."

I really enjoyed the story and feel the story was written well. The story bounces back and forth in just the right spots to give you the feeling you are watching a new TV episode. I started reading this book and couldn't put it down. I recommend this novel to all Star Trek fans. Enjoy.

Whether you are a Star Trek fan who wants to make a model of your favourite subject or a modeller who has an interest in Treknology, your options for commercial model kits are not as broad as they used to be.

I for example have a burning desire to model a Klingon Bird of Prey, but my only chance of getting such a model has been to watch the eBay listings to pick up a model offered for sale by a collector. One option you might not be aware of that is fast gaining popularity is paper modelling.

Why paper?

Paper models have been around as long as there has been paper, I suppose. The Japanese art of paper folding, Origami, was first heard of in the Muromachi era (1333-1573), albeit in an entirely different form. Paper models enjoyed a particular vogue in the years during and following WWII when the resources for more traditional models were rationed. It was the advent of the plastic model that seemed to toll the death knell for them, when cheap, mass produced models became available that offered accuracy with ease of construction.

Strangely enough, it has been new technology that has turned out to be the saviour of paper modelling. The development of the Internet, coupled with the availability of colour printers, has fuelled a revival of interest in paper as a construction medium. Just as the Internet has generated a surprising revival in writing skills, websites are springing up all over the world where amateurs are offering paper models of an amazing variety of subjects for free!

Whilst no one is suggesting that they will take the place of plastic models, they are fast carving out a niche in the hobby of scale modelling. They are very much a craft item that depends upon the skill of the designer and the skill of the modeller, but because of this there is immense satisfaction in your completed model.

After saying that it's not hard to do: cut it out, fold it and glue it together! Painting isn't an issue since surface details and textures are pre-printed and the accuracy of the finish depends upon the quality and calibration of your printer. Haven't

TREKNOLOGY IN PAPER

got a printer? No sweat! You should have no problems getting it done at a local printer or office supplies store like Ginko's.

Still not sold? Ever had a model you have slaved for months over trashed by a visiting kid? Lost a vital part and the makers have discontinued that model? Can't afford a model of the ISS or want to model all the variants of the Delta launch vehicle? For the cost of printing you have replacements of individual parts or whole models. By developing a few computer skills, you can do "repaints" of existing models. You like the model but it is in 1/100 and you want it to fit in your 1/72 scale collection? With a little trial and error you can scale models up or down and then print them out!

What is available?

The range of subjects available for download on the Internet is nothing short of staggering! From spacecraft right out of the news (a MER rover has been available for nearly six months) to the wonders of the ancient world; from the ridiculous, such as a vacuum cleaner and a soapbox, to the intricately sublime, like cathedrals, castles, ships, animals. The variety of subject matter is huge!

Ah! But what, I hear you say, is available in the way of Star Trek models? Whilst the range is not comprehensive, it is sufficiently varied as to offer something to cover most tastes and range of abilities. This is a summary of what is available in roughly chronological order...

As you would expect there are a large range of examples of the Enterprise. Christian "Chippy" Chua has a good model of the early NCC 1701 from TOS at his web site, as has Ron Caudillo. There is even a tiny Japanese example with the name in Kanji! The NCC 1701-A, the refit of the later seasons and movies, is a particular favourite having a version designed by Diego Cortes of Spain, and another by Shunichi Makino of Japan. Shunichi's "Shun Pop" web site has it in two scales: a small but novel model for beginners/kids, and a detailed master-build!

Perhaps the second most easily recognised ship from TOS would have

to be the Miranda class and once again Shunichi has the USS Reliant, famous for its battle with Enterprise in "The Wrath of Khan". Diego Cortes has the USS Majestic and USS Lantree.

Feel like something different, a challenge? How about the Starbase Ournal, from which Kirk and his crew hijacked the Enterprise in Star Trek III? Jan Růkr, a prolific Czech model designer, has a beautiful design available on his web site, which also includes designs from "The Planet of the Apes" and "Alien." Other models to fill out your Federation fleet include the SS Botany Bay (Khan Noonien Singh's 20th century sub-light space ship) and the SS Aurora.

There are also USS Essex, Xerxes, Grissom and Stargazer, the Hermes class destroyer, Saladin class scout, Ptolemy class tug and shuttle Galileo. Non-human ships include the Vulcan Science Institute Shuttle Surak, the Tholian Webspinner, and from the Romulan Empire the original Bird of Prey and a scout ship. There is even a new model of the Nomad probe from "The Changeling."

Star Trek: The Next Generation is not so well represented. No one has yet attempted to recreate Picard's NCC 1701-E, the Sovereign class starship, perhaps because of the complex curves involved. There is a model of the shuttlepod El Baz though, and the Type 6 shuttle, Magellan. An absolutely excellent Nebula class cruiser, the Sutherland, is available from a Taiwanese designer known only as Edward. The only non human craft is the Borg Cube, of which there are two versions, and yes, this would have to be one of the easiest models!

From Deep Space Nine there are the USS Defiant, its Shuttle Chaffee and the Danube class runabout. The Voyager series is represented by a great model of the Intrepid Class starship itself from Chippy Chua, plus her AeroShuttle and Delta Flyer as well as the Prometheus from "Message in a Bottle."

Phew! Let's see, what else is there? How about a full sized prop – looking for something to finish off your uniform for the IC, Doctor? How about a hypospray? Perhaps some

of the cadets out there (young and not so young) might like a Type I or II phaser from TOS or the Type II "Cobra" phaser from TNG to VOY.

See something missing that you would like to take a crack at? Paper model designing is pretty accessible. You can do it the traditional way with pen and paper but with a computer you can use a draughting program or one of the specialised 3D programs such as Pepakura.

Render them in a graphics package like Photoshop or CorelDraw, reduce them to Adobe Acrobat or zip files, upload them to the Internet and watch the web site stats click over into overdrive. Yes, there are commercially available models on the Internet, although none for Star Trek subjects – copyright holders don't mind amateurs offering models of their ships for free but would be quick to pounce on anyone trying to make a profit.

There are a few designers who have set up home businesses supplying paper models but I don't think there is a market out there to make a million just yet! One interesting concept is the Lower Hudson Valley Challenger Center website run by Jon Leslie. His web site is packed with paper models of space subjects which are "charity-ware" – free for download, but you should donate to the centre if you're satisfied.
