However, as Fleet Historian I will not be going gently, especially if I am to see the time come when I must write the last chapter of STARFLEET's History.

STARFLEET is in a battle for its very existence, not due to the outside influences that oppose Science Fiction fans, not due to the boogey-man of apathy, nor even to evil designs by members internally. Our battle is brought on, to quote Fleet Admiral Malotte, by the absence of Dragons to slay. We have no enemies left to fight who will unite us all under one banner. The dragons are dead, and 'Fleet is adrift. But this does NOT HAVE TO BE.

Fandom outside of STARFLEET is still growing and growing; television and cinema productions in our chosen genre multiply every year. Attendance at conventions increases five to ten percent a year, but yet STARFLEET shrinks. We bring in hundreds of new members every year, and yet we lose even more due to lack of interest. And that is the crux of our dilemma

We have little left to offer.

And yet this can be fixed. This is the one thing that every member in STARFLEET can do, can support, can strive, for that

will be the salvation of our organization. Nearly four thousand members can strive to reach a goal, that if sufficiently large enough, can inspire all of us, can inspire former members to return, can inspire new members to stay, and inspire nonmembers to join.

What should this goal be? It is my belief after talking to hundreds of 'Fleet members that no one goal can be enough, we are such a diverse group, and we, like Trek, appeal to such a large diverse population, that one goal cannot be enough. However, if we choose a Palette of Goals, at least four different New Frontiers to reach for, we can aspire to such heights for ourselves, for fandom, for our communities, for our world, that STARFLEET will be THE VISION FOR THE FUTURE. It is my belief that these four frontiers should be one each in the fields of Charity, Community Service, Space Exploration, and Star Trek itself.

These cannot be simply accomplished goals, annual campaigns, or simple programs. There are vital to 'Fleet's daily existence, but they are not enough. Instead, they must be difficult long-range pinnacles of achievements that will bring 'Fleet into the Future.

More than forty years ago President Kennedy challenged us to go to the Moon, BUT he challenged more, to go to the edge of our Solar System. [This gives promise of some day providing a means for even more exciting and ambitious exploration of space, perhaps beyond the moon, perhaps to the very end of the solar system itself.] We are Star Trek fans, and reaching for the Stars is our most basic belief. I cannot and will not be able to choose the specifics of each Frontier, but I believe that the underlying strength of 'Fleet can help me do so, because Fleet Matters.

It matters to the young couples who met only because of Fleet, and the experienced couples who met only because of Fleet, twenty years ago. It matters to the parents of Julian and Crystal, and the spouses of Don and Rick and others. It matters to the nearly hundred recipients of Fleet scholarships over the years. It matters to every member who has made a new friend, spent a night in a strange city with a friendly face, who share a book, a video, a chat, a cola. The relationships we have built in our first thirty years our just a bedrock of those we can build in the next thirty. Because Fleet Matters.

What we need are ten year goals, twenty year goals and even thirty year goals.

As I asked individuals and groups and the closing ceremonies at the 2004 International Conference, I invite every member of STARFLEET to give me their input, their ideas, their visions and dreams and hopes, and together we will make this work. We can do these things, and in the doing we can save not only Fleet, we can make Fleet Grow, and Make Fleet Matter to more than just ourselves.

To paraphrase President Kennedy: We need to do these things, not because they are easy, but because they are difficult, and in the doing we will Matter*.

We choose to go to the moon. On Sunday, June 20th, while returning to their home in Georgetown, TX after attending a family wedding in Wisconsin, Larry, his wife Shelley, their oldest son Ryan, age 8, and Quark, the family dog (a Sheltie), were involved in a solitary car accident on Interstate 35 near Cameron, Missouri. For Larry and Shelley, this was a fatal accident, killing both of them. Ryan was hospitalized with minor injuries and has since returned to Georgetown, along with his younger brother Eric, age 6 (at the time) and their grandmother.

On June 24th, after being lost in Cameron following the accident, Quark was found playing with other dogs in the area by Amber, a 14 year-old Cameron High School student. Amber looked at his collar and brought him back to her family's home. She and her stepfather made a call to the veterinary clinic listed on Quark's tag and helped reunite Quark with his owner Ryan.

For over five years, Larry, Shelley and their children have been active members of the USS Rhyanna in Austin. Larry, who joined in 1997 as a member of the Freedom III, served as Chief Engineer and as XO for a two-year term prior to that. Larry had stepped down as XO two years ago to concentrate on his leadership position in Ryan's Boy Scout activities. During his time with STARFLEET, Larry took, and passed with honors or distinction, 30 of

Shelley was a quieter influence. She refused to take OTS or OTC, citing work pressure. She liked being a "grunt." She was a labor and delivery nurse at Georgetown Hospital but mostly she was a mom. When she wasn't at the hospital, she was busy with the boys. Ryan turns 9 on October 29, and Eric turned 7 on June 29th. They were both involved with scouting, karate, t-ball, soccer and basketball. They were the pride and joy of both their parents.

Larry and Shelley were two of the nicest people anyone could have had the privilege of knowing. They touched our lives in many ways and will be sorely missed. If you would like to acknowledge their passing, Shelley's parents have asked for donations to your own churches for future works, in their names. Their faith was strong and Shelley's mother reports that the boys' faith is just as strong. They are comforted with thoughts that their parents are watching over them.

More than 30 people enjoyed the good food and friendship.

There was not a dry eye in the place as Laurie MacFarlane sang "God Bless America" in tribute to the Armed Forces stationed overseas. After the colors were posted, Regional Coordinator Gary Halverson led the assembly in a moment of silence for Shirley Maiewski, a pioneer in the "Save Star Trek" movement of 1970s.

To set the tone of friendship that would be prevalent throughout the Summit, the USS Kasimar, a Trek club that left STARFLEET more than 10 years ago, returned to the fold




So why are we having such a problem? Maybe I can explain this by the use of a parable.

One of the things the International Charities Coordinator does, to the extent possible, is collect chapter reports of money raised/donated or volunteer hours worked, to summarize into a Fleetwide total such as "Last year, STARFLEET members



did 422,000 collective hours of volunteer work!" or "In the 1990s, STARFLEET chapters collected a total of \$4,000,000 for charities!" (Yes, I just made those numbers up!)

The International Charities Coordinator also organizes a small staff who keep track of, or support, specific charities that have been "adopted" on a wider level, i.e. charities that many chapters support together. For example, the Ronald McDonald House Charities, the STARFLEET Stampede Program, and the Overseas Coupon Project are all handled on a Fleetwide level, with information and other resources available thanks to volunteers who help out the International Charities Coordinator.

My own chapter has been getting more and more involved in STARFLEET's Overseas Coupon Project, thanks to the efforts of Jenna Duerr. That's just one of many ways that many STARFLEET chapters participate in charitable and community service activities, and I hope you'll all share what you're up to, so the rest of us can benefit from your ideas.

Staff Updates

Claire Halber, Director of STARFLEET's Office of Accessibility Resources, reports that over fifty members have signed up to take her brand new course in STARFLEET Academy's School of Accessibility, under the Academy's Institute of Leadership. Claire and I are both hoping the course will make as many STARFLEET members as possible aware of how they can make their publications, projects, and events accessible to those with handicaps or disabilities.

Meantime, Claire is working on getting STARFLEET's Membership Handbook into large print and audio formats for the visually impaired, so the most basic information about the organization will be accessible to a wider range of members.

Where to next?

By the time you read this, I'll probably be in the middle of a series of September wedding trips, after which I think I'll mostly be sticking to Ithaca for most of October (especially considering Watkins Glen Weekend starts off the month right here) before getting back into the hockey travel swing.

The past few months have been very busy in this office. Over 50 people have registered for the Basic Disabilities Course at SFA. We also have a Cadet Corps version of the course. There has been a positive response to the material in the course. The Cadet Course is open to cadets over 10 years of age. We sincerely hope to see more cadets enroll

We are currently preparing the Membership Handbook in a variety of formats for visually impaired members. Large print and electronic versions will be available soon. For those members who will need adaptations to SFA courses, when you register for a course, please indicate the type of adaptation that you prefer, so that we can prepare the materials for you. This will be done on an individual basis. We hope to have all the Leadership materials prepared in advance, as they will probably be the most in demand.

After the Handbook is recorded, we plan to broadcast it on RadioStarfleet (RSF) at scheduled times, thanks to the approval of Da Boss, Larry Barnes. Other RSF programs are in development. I would like to thank the following people for their time, support and ideas. Mark H. Anbinder has shown great leadership and provided me with direction. This is a new position that has been evolving, and he has kept me on track. Jamie Delantonas, my assistant and idea man, has been keeping me busy with his brainstorms. He is responsible for proposing the Accessibility Course and creating the Cadet Course. Thanks, son. His positive attitude is an inspiration.

At IC, I had an opportunity to discuss the future of this office with the candidates. They were all very positive and had great ideas on how to make STARFLEET more accessible to the members. I also met many members who made excellent suggestions. Thanks to you all.

When I joined this organization last summer, I had no idea that I would get this involved so quickly. Obviously, with the IC happening within the time-frame of this AB summary, much work was done by the AB, hence a longer article than normal.

Before the IC, the AB continued deliberations on various matters, such as the membership processing change-over and taking steps to insure that future turnovers of all jobs in 'FLEET can go more smoothly.

One of the international RCs brought up ideas that could help raise international numbers, such as modular memberships. The AB discussed the merits and problems with these ideas. STARFLEET Communications and the international AB members also worked together to find out why CQs are taking a long time to reach international members.

The AB discussed a proposal to allow for methods other then USPS to be used in future elections. Note that they did not specify any specific method at this time, only created new verbiage to allow for the possibility that, in the future, a method of electronic voting may come to be acceptable in terms of reliability and security, and if that happens, STARFLEET will be able to take advantage of it.

EC/AB NEWS

The AB discussed and voted on a resolution to extend Sam Black's term as JAG until the IC, where the AB then voted on an Amendment (which now goes to the members) to alter the terms of the JAG's office to match the new three-year term of all other offices in FLEET. An amendment is also being offered to alter the IG's term of office in the same way. Sam Black was also, at the IC, reaffirmed for another term as JAG.

The AB discussed whether there is a need to modify the rules by which RCs are elected, noting recent elections in R1 and R12 and complaints generated by those proceedings. It was noted that the process is in the IG's manual and that it is the EC's responsibility to alter it, but that the EC welcomes AB input in to smoothing out the process. The possibility of future use of Instant Run-off Voting was raised, and a presentation was made to the AB about IRV at the IC. To find out more about IRV, go to http://www.instantrunoff.com.

At the IC, routine procedures such as discussing the format of the meeting and

approval of the previous years' minutes were quickly dealt with.

The AB was informed that our articles of incorporation incorrectly state we are a 501c3 organization, when we are in fact a 501c7 organization. This is being corrected. STARFLEET is in no danger from this error, as the IRS had us listed correctly, but it should not remain in error.

The AB approved STARFLEET joining the Association of Collecting Clubs for a nominal fee. We are going to explore what options this organization could give us as new opportunities for our members, or new recruiting venues.

Committees were formed at the IC. One committee is going to deal with the RC election issues, including such questions as "What happens if no one runs for RC?" and "Do we need a campaigning period for RC, similar to that for CS?" Another Committee is investigating the legalities surrounding possible pitfalls in our membership policies, most specifically giving memberships to convicted sexual predators (as membership

is currently open to all) compared to STARFLEET's legitimate need to have members, including younger family members, feel safe as part of the organization.

The EC presented their candidates for Honorary and Lifetime member - Robin Smith and David Ryan, respectively. These were quickly approved by the AB.

The AB also bid over recent months a fond farewell to Alex Rosenzweig, and greeted the new RCR7 Mike Smith, as that transfer of power occurred, and welcomed Region 12's new RC Wade Hoover after the election occurred in R12. The AB thanks R12's VRC for their service as interim RC during the transition.

As always, if you have concerns about these or any issues, you should talk to your AB member, your Regional Coordinator. A list of each and every RC can be found in the back of this and every CQ.

Just to review Ops policy on reporting: reports are due by the 5th of the next month for the month you're reporting for (April MSRs are due May 5th for instance) and late MSRs are considered between the 6th and 10th of that month (April MSRs are late between May 6th and May 10th for instance). Four FTRs (failure to report) or eight late reports in one year will result in a contact from me. Another FTR or two more late reports will be cause to put the chapter on 60-day standby.

A note on the DB: for those of you that submit via normal e-mail, you may notice another e-mail come to you that looks like a MSR from the DB, this would be the staff of Operations inputting the MSR into the DB and the DB spitting out a "record" for Ops, your RC, and you. So if the submitter has listed as someone other than the CO or designate, no worries. Any questions about this are welcome, but hopefully this will clear up some confusion.

Reminders

Please remember that when you use the Change of Command tool on the DB to make sure your passwords are as correct as you can get them. If there is a wrong p/w I will reject the CoC and ask you to resubmit.

Please also remember that Operations does not recognize temporary changes in command for chapters. If you chapter has lost its CO and you expect the interim CO to be in charge for more than a month than it is best that the chapter submit a change of command to make the temp CO the permanent CO until such time as a new CO is chosen. This is especially important for any RC elections or the upcoming election for CS/VCS because Operations will use the data it currently has on hand for mailing and voting purposes.


As we go into a new fiscal year, some of the most recent activities include the following launches and commissionings:

Shuttle Victorious (R2) USS Hathor (R1) ISS Kerberos (R7) USS Pride of Scotland (R1)


These all happened within about a month - great way to kick off a new year. Several other new shuttles are also in the works. I'll let you know once they are officially launched.

NEW OCC & FOS

Yes, the long awaited final revamping of the Institute of Leadership Studies is here. Officer Command College, required if you want to be the CO or XO of a STARFLEET Chapter, is ready. It has more in-depth course work that requires students to look at the governing documents of STARFLEET and figure out how to address many different situations that they might encounter while serving as the head of a chapter. While FOS is not required for positions above the chapter level, it will help members looking at those spots and will benefit them and all of Fleet.

SCHOOL OF CRYPTOGRAPHY

The School of Cryptography offers another level:

"Open your mind to the past, art, history, philosophy, and all of this may mean something." – Captain Jean-Luc Picard, USS Enterprise NCC-1701-D

Since the school open almost a year ago we have had many students bold enough to enroll in it and successfully complete the different levels the school had to offer. While a great number of the students have been Commanding Officers, we have had many bright Ensigns do exceptionally well. Some of the students breezed through the tests while others felt challenged by the course material; several of the students wanted more, and we are happy to oblige them.

One of the earliest students, FCAPT Maxim Khaytsus of USS Omega Glory, said that he had wanted to design a cryptography course for the Academy, and helped refine the one I had created as well as sending me his material. Combining this with the stuff I had compiled back in the early 80's, I developed the Advanced Cryptography II course. This course combines the material from the first three courses, and adds another level, as well as coming with a great STARFLEET Cryptography reference guide.

There is course which tests your knowledge of the historical documentation of the uses of cryptography from the 17th to 24th centuries, as well as those cryptographic exercises more specific to the era of Starfleet Academy. We have made them more challenging for students, so we can thoroughly examine the cadet's comprehension of the material.

Those students who have successfully complete courses at this school have

gone on to greater things; in fact, one Lieutenant was able to decipher an alien language in the ancient ruins of Callufrax IV, and contributed his success to his studies at the school.

The Academy Commandant successfully completed the Advanced II course and remarked "Dang... I hate to see the next one". Therefore, if you feel you're up to being challenged mentally, the cryptography course is just for you.

STARFLEET ACADEMY 2004 SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDEES

Greetings! The first thing I need to get out of the way is the list of thank you's. Thank you to all of the members of STARFLEET who applied for a scholarship this year. You were all deserving, and I only wish I could have awarded one to each and every one of you. Thank you to Scott Akers for allowing me to serve in this position and for serving with me and Mike Mallotte as the scholarship committee. Finally, my thanks to last year's International Conference and the STARFLEET membership as a whole. Together you donated enough money to fund three more scholarships this year, making it possible to award eight \$500 scholarships as opposed to the five originally promised. By the way, this is actually one more scholarship than we awarded last year. We were able to award them to STARFLEET members ranging in age from 18 to 51 (no, I won't tell who's who). They are attending all kinds of institutions of higher learning, from adult on-line schools to community colleges, state universities, and technical universities. I'm thrilled to have been able to assist such a large variety of higher Congratulations, education needs. STARFLEET, on a job well done!

To briefly explain how this worked, I'd like to remind you all of the process. First, all interested STARFLEET members had to do two things to apply for a scholarship: fill out and submit an application with all three essay questions answered and get three folks to send in a reference. All of this had to either be post-marked by July 1, 2004, or e-mailed and/or FAXed to me by that following Monday morning, July 5th.

Next, all three essays were read and assigned a score, with each essay having a potential maximum score of 20 points. All three references were also read and received as many as 10 points each. In the essays, scoring was based mostly on content, with a little bit of grammar, spelling, and punctuation taken into consideration. The references were scored on things such as how much community service was credited to the applicant and the description of their moral characteristics, such as work ethic, compassion, and reliability.

Lastly, their transcripts were factored in for tie-breaking purposes. They are no longer required, but would be used if two applicants were tied for the same scholarship. For example, a 4.0 gpa would then be ahead of the 3.0 gpa.

The scores were tallied, the voting is over, and our list is in alphabetical order, so without further delay let's move on to announcing the 2004 STARFLEET Academy Scholarship awardees!

1. Our first recipient says of himself "I love to help." Once you hear his name, I'm sure you'll recognize this as an understatement. His references said things like "I have yet to see (some)one that is as dedicated to bringing STARFLEET into a technological age through his work." "I can state without reservation, that (he) is one of the highest potential and highest-achieving students I have had the pleasure of encountering." Chapters, RCs, Recruiters, Everyone, please make sure this happens. This will ensure faster processing time and more accurate delivery of mail going to the MP offices. Certainly, we have forwarding orders from the old PO Box, but forwarding does take time and can slow down the MP process while we wait for the US Postal Service to do their job. This experience shows why retaining current members is so vital to STARFLEET. Our greatest resource isn't our fancy



Now you can also use the epayments@sfi.org address to PayPal for Quartermaster merchandise. One last thing pertaining to PayPal: I can't stress enough how important it is that you use the Note Section of PayPal to list the name and SCC number of the person you are renewing, even if it is yourself. Several chapters use the same account to renew multiple memberships, which is fine, but I often have no idea who those memberships are for. By including the Name and SCC number of the person being renewed, I can quickly process the membership.

Last item of news: we are moving the financial aspects of Fleet into the 21st Century with the implementation of an eCommerce system. The completion of this project will mean instant notification of payment approval and authorization for electronic transactions. PayPal payments, however, will remain as they are today. The completion of this project is expected to be sometime towards the end of September or middle of October. We are still in the preliminary stages with this so the timeframe may shift a bit, so please be patient with us as I know you will be.

Whether you love it or hate it, the Internet is here to stay. People are turning to the 'net with increasing frequency for their every need, from buying a car to finding a neighborhood church. In this "information age", a well-managed website may be your chapter's best recruiting tool.

A good website doesn't need to be flashy, with a lot of slick graphics and music. True, those things do draw your attention, but the skills needed to produce such a site are beyond your average Internet user. Besides, too much of a good thing ends up being annoying, especially to people who have slow modems or who are new to computers. The best websites are easy to navigate, with a high ratio of content to eye candy.

So you don't need to have a website with a fly-by of the Enterprise-C on

your index page. However, you do need to show that you put effort into keeping your web presence current. If the last item on your calendar of events is from three years ago, and your list of chapter officers is even older, what impression does that give a potential chapter member? At best, it tells them that your chapter isn't all that dedicated at projects. At worst, it makes them think that the chapter is defunct.

Keep things current. I can't stress that enough. A chapter website with a few basic pages of frequently updated information will draw more people in than a website that's really pretty. New members want to know how and

where they can find you. They want to see the sorts of activities you're doing. A calendar of upcoming events, a contact info page, and photos of your group having fun will do more to recruit new members than just about anything else

There are lots of other good things you can include on a simple chapter website. Links to other chapter, your regional site, the main SFI site, etc., are an easy way to make your site a resource for the local fandom. Just be sure to check the links periodically to make sure they're still live. You can also include downloadable membership packets with forms and flyers and

other materials. Be sure to keep the file sizes as small as possible for those with slower modems. Consider adding a message board to the site, so your crew can interact with new folks.

Cyberspace is always open. A good website will allow your group to recruit 24/7 and reach countless numbers of more folks than you'll ever bump into at a convention. Don't let the opportunity pass you by, when maintaining a good website is actually pretty simple.

It has been said that one of the greatest traits of STARFLEET is our willingness to step forward and volunteer. The willingness to work hard for any given cause, whether in time or finances, has been a staple of Starfleet members now for many years. This was certainly the case with Region 15 as we came to the aid of friends who, for many years, had given so much to our organization and overall science fiction fandom.

For the past 14 years United Fan Con, a mainstay in the New England area for sci-fi conventions and entertainment, has provided us with some of the fondest memories that we as a region have had. 

So, you want to lose weight? Why? Simple question really, but it may be a question that makes you do some soul searching.

Well? Why do you want to lose weight? Is it because in a couple of months you are going on a cruise? Okay, but what happens after the cruise? Are you going to go back to old habits? If you are, plan to pack back on all the weight you were planning to loose on your diet. In fact, plan to put that back on, and some extra weight too. I'm not saying don't try to fit into a smaller bathing suit for that cruise. If you're going to take off those extra pounds, plan to keep them off afterwards.

How do I begin?

First, check any medications you are taking. You can either go online or talk to your pharmacist. Why would medications be important? Some medications can have side affects. They may cause some problems with weight loss, or may cause you to retain water. This isn't going to be a serious problem, but may cause you to loose weight more slowly. It is better to know this before you start, than to struggle and not know why you are having a problem. Some medications may even prevent you from loosing weight, so you should talk to your doctor. There may be other medications that can be prescribed that will not prevent you from loosing the weight.

Choose a diet.

This is not easy. Remember, just because someone wrote a book about a type of diet doesn't mean that it is a good diet. The diet industry is a multi-billion dollar business and everyone is more than willing to take your money.

What should I be looking for in a diet plan?

According to the Mayo Clinic, you should evaluate your new diet plan to see how the program holds up. If one or more of these apply, it should raise a red flag.

- •Promises of a quick fix
- •Dire warnings from a single product or regimen
- •Claims that sound too good to be true
 •Simplistic conclusions drawn from a
- complex study

 •Recommendations based on a single
- study
- •Dramatic statements that are refuted by reputable scientific organizations
- •Lists of "good" and "bad" foods
- •Advice given to help sell a product
- •Opinions based on studies published without peer review
- •Recommendations from studies that ignore differences among individuals or groups

Make a commitment

Making the decision to loose weight is a lifelong commitment. It will take work to achieve and maintain your new healthy weight. It requires concentration, time, and effort. Make sure that you're ready to make the necessary permanent changes and that you do so for the right reasons. Loosing weight is a personal decision; no one can make you lose weight. It should be your decision to loose weight, not a doctor's opinion or the result of a loved one badgering you. It should be a decision YOU want to make. A doctor's opinion may help you to decide to loose weight, but it is up to YOU.

As you are planning to start a new weight-related lifestyle change, try to resolve any other problems that you may have in your life. It takes considerable mental and physical energy to change your habits. So make sure other major issues don't distract you such as marital or financial problems. Timing is the key to success. You need to be at a point in your life where you're ready to take on the challenges of serious weight loss.

"Keep in mind that no matter how prepared you may be, you'll occasionally overeat or eat foods that you should avoid. Rather than let a setback derail your efforts, accept that it happened and get back on track. Don't expect to be perfect — and never give up."

If you treat each day as a fresh new day of your diet, it makes it easier to realize, that yesterday I overate, but today I will do better. Also, I have found that there are foods that I do love, and to tell myself that I can't have them is only going to defeat me in the end. Each person has comfort foods. Recognizing this helps. You know that you can have these foods, and you have to take that into account in your diet. Planning helps you in the end, and allows you to treat yourself to those foods that you love. I have always thought that I can have all the foods I love, just not all at one meal, or all in one day. Portion control is a key to those foods that are high in fats or carbohydrates.

Keep yourself motivated by focusing on all of the benefits of losing weight, such as having more energy and improving your health. Then look at the negatives, such as finding the time to exercise, and come up with creative solutions to overcome the negatives.

Draw on support from others.

As you plan to loose weight, set up a support system. There will be days when you will need to have someone to talk to,

or to get encouragement from. We here in SFI have a wonderful email list, thanks to Gary Hollifield, and anyone wanting to join, can, the more the merrier. To find us, just go to yahoo.com and go to groups and do a search for SFI-GFFD. Just join, and we will be there for you. If you are considering us as a possible group to join, we don't condone just one diet. It is pretty much whatever each person decides upon. We have people doing Weight Watchers, Atkins, South Beach, and some that don't have a diet plan other than watching what they do eat.

When you are choosing a diet plan, pick people who you know want only the best for you and who will encourage you. Your support person or persons should be available to listen to your thoughts and feelings and encourage you, perhaps spend time exercising with you, and share the priority you've placed on developing a healthier lifestyle.

Some people fare better with professional support, such as a dietitian or personal trainer. Others benefit from the group support they receive from organizations such as Weight Watchers or Overeaters Anonymous.

If you do join a group, keep in mind that what you get out of it will be in proportion to what you put into it. If you sit in a corner and just listen, you may hear some good suggestions. But, if you actively participate, you're more likely to reap the potential rewards of the group, such as, support, encouragement, feeling that you're not alone, and helpful suggestions specific to your concerns.

Set a Realistic Goal

"When you're thinking about what you expect from your new eating and exercise plan, be realistic. Healthy weight loss occurs slowly and steadily. Aim to lose one to two pounds a week. To do this, you need to burn 500 to 1,000 calories a day through a low-calorie diet and regular exercise. Losing weight more rapidly means losing water weight or muscle tissue, rather than fat

Set weekly or monthly goals and track your progress. Remember that you're in this for the long haul. Anything you undertake too intensely or too vigorously quickly becomes too onerous, so you're more likely to give up.

In addition, make your goals "process goals," such as eating judiciously and exercising regularly, rather than "outcome goals," such as losing 50 pounds. Changing your process, your habits, is the key to weight loss. Make sure that your process goals are realistic, specific and measurable, such as; you'll walk for 30 minutes a day, five days a week.

Work out a strategy that gradually

changes the habits and attitudes that may have undermined your past efforts to lose weight. Choose a definite start date. Consider where, how often, and how long you'll exercise. Determine a realistic eating plan that factors in plenty of water, fruits and vegetables. Write everything down. Find the potential roadblocks, and make plans to deal with them.

Ask your doctor how much weight you can safely lose. Your doctor may refer you to a dietitian or someone else who specializes in weight loss."

Learn to Enjoy Healthier Foods

"Liquid meals, diet pills, and unusual combinations of foods aren't the key to long-term weight control and better health. Instead, learn how to eat a variety of healthy foods."

Lowering your total caloric intake and increasing your exercise will help you to obtain your new healthier lifestyle. Depending on how overweight you are determines how much you will burn. Understand that if you are severely overweight, doing something, will probably burn more calories than person who is in shape and works out regularly. The difference between the two is that the one in better shape burns calories more efficiently. Getting up and walking more than you did before will cause your metabolic engine to kick in and it will you will start burning more calories.

I encourage people that are extremely overweight not to cut down their intake so drastically that they are constantly hungry. That causes your body to go into starvation mode and it only defeats you. Decrease the size of your portions. Eat meals at the same time each day. Don't try to eat only one meal a day. If you were to leave your car running all night and then come out in the morning and expect it to just take you to work, you may find that your car is out of gas. The same is true with your body. It has been running all night and needs to have fuel so that it can function. Also, plan for low calorie, between meal snacks to keep your energy level up. Low calorie snacks include carrots, or any vegetable, a small apple or orange, or cheese sticks. Try to eat high protein snacks. When you combine a carbohydrate with a protein, they work together to help keep your blood sugar levels regulated until your next meal.

Don't watch television or work at the computer while you are eating. You will find that if you take the time to enjoy your meals and savor the tastes of your food, you will get fuller on less food. By eating more slowly, your body will realize that it is full. Often we eat so quickly that the body does not register that it is full. There is also the tendency to clean your plate. Eat what you can until you are full. If there is enough food left on your plate for a snack or for another meal, refrigerate it.

Change Your Lifestyle

"It's not enough to eat healthy foods and exercise for only a few weeks or even several months. You have to incorporate these behaviors into your life. To do that, you have to change *(cont. on p. 27)*

the behaviors that helped make you overweight in the first place. Lifestyle changes start with taking an honest look at your eating habits and daily

To assess your eating behaviors, ask yourself if you tend to eat when you're bored, angry, tired, anxious, depressed or socially pressured. Look at your eating style and shopping and cooking techniques. Were you taught to clean your plate? Do you eat too fast? Do you eat while watching TV? See if any patterns emerge to identify possible triggers for overeating."

Keeping a journal of what you eat, why, where and the reason for your eating, will help you to understand the habits that you have and will aid you in setting forth a plan to make changes in your habits.

"After assessing your personal challenges to weight loss, try working out a strategy to gradually change habits and attitudes that have sabotaged your past efforts. Simply admitting your own challenges won't get you past them entirely. But it helps in planning how you'll deal with them and whether you're going to succeed in losing weight once and for all.

You'll likely have an occasional setback. But instead of giving up entirely, simply start fresh the next day. Remember that you're planning to change your life. It won't happen all at once, but stick to your healthy lifestyle and the results will be worth it."

So, you want to lose weight?

I hope that if you are planning to lose weight for that cruise, that you keep it off afterwards. I hope that you will join SFI-GFFD and let us be a part of your support group, to help you to become a healthier person.

It is currently 9:15AM on nothing less than Friday the 13th of August 2004. The Muench and Planthold families are holed up at the latter's home in far South Tampa, FL. A few moments have passed. Somehow I knew that it wouldn't be long until Ralph was awake; we seem to have rather similar sleeping patterns. At any rate, it makes it nice to sit here watching the news with another person for company.

Upon stepping outside to partake in my addiction of the tobacco weed, it was immediately obvious that something strange was in the air. Looking into the sky, I could already see the cloud bands in definition, even though the air was dead calm and humid.

The news is telling us that we should start feeling the effects of the storm around noon today, but the animal life around here - especially the birds - are apparently already feeling the changes in the weather. It is one thing to watch water birds walking along the banks to feed but entirely another to watch an entire flock running along the road rather than taking flight. Once inside, the strangeness of our collective human situation was evident. While walking through the store I came across many people - both very elderly as well as more middle-aged - who were simply standing around with completely dazed looks on their faces. Within a few

moments of this realization, I saw the various Wal-Mart reps calmly walking up to people, quietly bringing them out of their bewilderment by asking if they needed any assistance, and making certain that they had somewhere safe to go.

Just prior to all of this, I'd witnessed an elderly woman quietly sobbing in an aisle. Of course, simple human compassion impelled me to ask her if she was okay. After an affirmative reply, I asked if she needed any help or someone to drive her home. No, she was just awaiting her husband who had run over to another department. After a shared joke about "relaxing and relieving a little stress in relative privacy" (away from the spouse), I moved along with my shopping. The next thing I saw nearly brought me to tears but, at the same time, was so incredibly uplifting.

As I neared the end of the aisle, the husband in question returned; he looked to be at least 85 years old. He saw the tears that his wife is quickly trying to wipe away and rushed over to her, reassuring her that everything will be fine and he won't let anything bad happen to either of them. She motioned to me and after being reassured that I couldn't assist them in any way, I bid them luck and gave them my phone number to call me if they needed anything after the storm had passed. It took nearly everything I had not to be the one in tears as I moved on to the next aisle; it really brought home the fact that we were all in this together. I guess you could say it brought me much closer to understanding the impulses that pulled the population of New York together after 9/11. It certainly made the morning trip much more interesting and caused me to be sure to give James a big kiss when I returned!

At 3:15PM, we were watching the news after another tobacco break where it became apparent that we were in the very beginning of feeling the effects of Charley. Light gusting winds and a good steady rain brought me back inside commenting that we might want to check the news. Here we found that Charley is still a category 4 - not the 2 or 3 that had been initially expected just like it was a couple of hours ago when it was still well away from land. Currently bearing down on Captiva Island, which is situated just near Ft. Myers, expected landfall was expected to occur around 3: 37PM at Charlotte Harbor, just South of Bradenton. XENOARCHAEOLOGY: MAKING SENSE OF THE SCIENCE OF SENTIENT SPECIES

We've seen numerous species during the voyages and missions of STARFLEET. In almost 250 years of visiting the worlds and the galaxy that have become a home away from home for us, we've encountered and catalogued more than 800 species, some appearing very human with nothing more than a different skin pigmentation or a random "forehead of the week" to species (like Species 8472 and the Caretaker from Star Trek: Voyager). Others, however, appear so alien that it makes us wonder how so many species can appear so much alike or so much different.

We often consider the "sentient" races to be the ones that speak the same language, appear more or less humanoid, and can identify with characteristic that seems derived from our own internal personality, our dreams and our flaws. But the truth is that, with countless number of stars in the universe, the likely percentage of those with habitable planets, and the percentage of those with sentient life to which we can relate, we have enough "raw data" to create an entire science of the study of sentient alien species.

In this article, you will be introduced to the "xenological sciences" and perhaps be sparked to further study alien species in ways to which you're not accustomed. But first, let's define some terms that describe the science behind the study of sentient life:

- Xenology describes the general science of the study of something alien
- Xenobiology describes the study of alien life forms
- Anthropology describes "the science of human beings and especially of their physical characteristics, their origin and the distribution of races, their environment and social relations, and their culture" (from the Merriam-Webster Dictionary)
- Xenoanthropology (a term used in STARFLEET's Academy, among other places) describes "the science of alien beings and especially of their physical characteristics, origin, and distribution of races, etc." (Merriam-Webster)
- Xenoarchaeology includes the physical, biological, and anthropological studies described and the historical and archaeological relationships within and between species and the taxonomy (classification according to natural

relationship) of the species described

Xenoarchaeology and, to a lesser extent, xenoanthropology are of interest because they include in their definitions both the physical study and what we can envision as the cultural, social, psychological and philosophical study of the aliens catalogued. These disciplines attempt to make some connection between the modern species and their ancestors. These sciences use "modern" tools (referring to 24th-century devices such as scanners and advanced computing machines) and "contemporary" tools (such as old-fashioned picks and shovels), as well as a lot of deductive reasoning and solid scientific hypothesis, to determine how the modern species developed and how — or if — they relate to each other.

We've seen hints of these sciences, of course, in the missions undertaken by the crews of various starships. The ones that come most rapidly to mind are:

- Stardate 46731.5 (Star Trek: The Next Generation episode "The Chase"), which introduces the concept of a common origin/ seeding of humanoid genetic material by a protohumanoid species
- Stardate 42609.1 (Star Trek: The Next Generation episode "Contagion"), which introduces the concept of commonality between a variety of languages spoken across several worlds that bear resemblance to the ancient Iconians
- USS Voyager's encounter with the Voth and the introduction of the Distant Origin Theory (Star Trek: Voyager episode "Distant Origin")

These are unique glimpses into the nature, origins, and connections between species that are quite different from the daily interactions we see in the "modern" day because they deal with the past and the present. The fascination for the xenoarchaeologist or xenoanthropologist lies in making these connections and asking questions such as:

- Is there a reason why so many humanoids from distant worlds look so strikingly similar?
- Is there a reason that we see the random similarity in forehead anatomy as we encounter each species?
- Is there a biological or an environmental element to the way modern Vulcans and Romulans differ?
- Is there a relationship between the

Voth and other reptilian species that may have developed according to the guidelines of Distant Origin Theory?

• Is there some common physiology to species that aren't humanoid?

The reward comes, of course, from answering these questions. Generally, this involves a great deal of research. Just as the archaeologist on Earth digs through the layers of sediment to uncover the skeletal remains of dinosaurs, for example, the xenoarchaeologist/xenoanthropologist digs through the physical layers on countless worlds and the layers of those characteristics common to many species. The scientist looks at the humanoid species, including the "topography" of their faces; the similarities in physical form, language, culture and technology; and their culture and history. Then he or she catalogues similarities using the characteristics of the modern species to describe how physiology (that is, biological and physical form and function) translates to the ridges, bumps, depressions, gills, membranes and other "body parts" that we see from encounter to encounter.

The xenoarchaeologist also recognizes the advantage of using modern tools and the countless volumes of information that describe the many sentient species. Creating a library for future use and study is as important as the study itself. The hope, then, is that this article will introduce the reader to, and spark interest in, the sources of information that pertain to the science of xenology.

Recommended sources include STARFLEET Academy's courses in XenoAnthropology and Delta Quadrant Studies and STARFLEET Marine Corps' courses in Xeno Studies.

- 3. What similarity exists between the Shar'NN [(c) 2000 by David Klingman] and the Idjalich [(c) 2000 by David Klingman]?
- 4. What is the glabella, and how does it relate to physiology of species like the Klingons versus Bajorans?
- 5. Is there a biological reason/ similarity between Ferengi and Dopterians that makes them "immune" to the telepathic and empathic skills of Vulcans and Betazoids?

Today, the CQ is pleased to introduce Pete Mohney, the man behind our latest, greatest IC!

STEPHEN: Good afternoon Pete, let's get this show on the road. First, what is your rank and current assignment in STARFLEET?

PETE: Rear Admiral Pete Mohney, Commanding Officer, USS Hephaestus. I also work in SFHQ Computer Operations as Recruiting Officer. Up until about a month ago I was also the Region 2 Auctioneer.

STEPHEN: Ah. Well, I'm very glad to be interviewing you today. How long have you been in STARFLEET?

PETE: I joined STARFLEET in 1989. The ship at that time was a newly launched shuttle, the Wernher Von Braun. I was appointed Chief of Security after just a couple of months. After a few more months, I was made second officer, and then first officer. Less than a year after that, when the founding CO left STARFLEET, I was elected chapter CO.

STEPHEN: Wow, that's quite impressive! Did you enjoy being a chapter CO?

PETE: Yes, very much! I was chapter CO for about 7 years, until about 1998. We launched a couple of shuttles during that time, and I became much more involved with regional STARFLEET. I worked on staff for then-RC Kelly Hilliard, as the Alabama 'Zone Coordinator', and also worked for SFHQ as Region 2 Public Relations Officer. In 1998, I ran for Regional Coordinator, won that election, and held that job for two terms, until March 2002. When I retired as RC, my chapter CO was elected to the job, and I was re-elected as chapter CO; essentially, I switched jobs with Danny Potts at that time!

STEPHEN: Looks like you've got a lot of experience under your belt, but how have those experiences affected you?

PETE: They have taught me a lot about STARFLEET that I didn't know when I was just a regular member - how complicated this organization really is, and how many hundreds of hours a month are spent running it at the highest levels. It's taught me a lot about dealing with people, different personalities, and how to work out problems without raising the level of stress that may be involved in a situation. Not to mention, I've learned a lot about a bunch of computer subjects like IRC, Publisher, Excel, Powerpoint, and lots more!

STEPHEN: Ah, I see! The many benefits of joining STARFLEET...

STEPHEN: So, what exactly are your duties as Recruiting Officer for SFHQ? What does this involve?

PETE: The details are not tightly defined, as the position is a relatively new one. In general, I'm expected to do whatever highlevel things I can to help and encourage STARFLEET chapters to recruit new members - make sure they know where the recruiting resources are, write articles on recruiting for the CQ, and running recruiting contests are some duties. I also talk over ideas with Mandi, things that

INTERVIEW WITH PETE MOHNEY

worked particularly well while I was RC of region 2.

STEPHEN: I see- sounds like it would be hard; we have an awful lot of chapters.

PETE: During that time, regional membership went from about 325 to nearly 600, so SFHQ was very interested in what ideas and methods I had.

STEPHEN: Really? Well, I can see why they gave you the job!

PETE: It can be a lot of work, and some of the things I did manually are not being done by the SFHQ computer system. For instance, I would get the chapter membership counts each month, compare them to the last twelve months or so, and see which chapters seemed to be losing members. While it's critical to work with the chapters that are under ten members (which puts their SFI status in danger), it's also very important to touch base with a chapter that is on a downward trend - even if they are still comfortably large. If you can catch problems like this, make the CO aware - which they might not be, if they don't check their chapter roster on the database - you can turn them around before they become a problem. Another practice that has moved up from R2 to SFI is an aggressive program to contact unassigned members. This group can represent a couple of hundred people, who aren't in chapters, and therefore really aren't getting much for their membership. Obviously I think the Communiqué and membership materials are great, but if you aren't in a chapter, and aren't aware of the fun to be had in a chapter, you might not renew - and lose out on much of what makes being in

STARFLEET the most enjoyable.

STEPHEN: It certainly seems that you're doing a lot of work to help keep STARFLEET up and running. I can't think of a better person to have doing it though!

PETE: Why, thanks! It's far from being a one person show, though - Computer Operations is a very large department, and much of what worked well at the R2 level had to be changed a lot to work at the SFI level.

STEPHEN: Well, we've gotten a lot of information about the SFHQ Recruiting Department. How about some more personal things?

PETE: Sure.

STEPHEN: What is your biggest pet peeve?

PETE: Wow, that's a tough question! I'll have to consider that for a moment. If I had to pick one thing, it would be that there doesn't seem to be a way to reconcile one of STARFLEET's greatest strengths with one of STARFLEET's biggest weaknesses.

STEPHEN: What do you mean?

PETE: What I feel is one of STARFLEET's greatest strengths is that thing that is referred to, rather vaguely, as Chapter Autonomy. This means that chapters, as long as they follow a mere handful of rules handed down from SFHQ (like having ten members, reporting monthly, and so on) can run themselves just about however they want. This is wonderful for the diversity of STARFLEET - we have groups that are organized as full democracies, and groups that are run almost in a purely military fashion (where the CO makes all the decisions), and everything in between. We have chapters were

promotions are handed out on a strict point system, chapters where promotions are handed out at the whim of the CO, and everything in between.

STEPHEN: *Nods*

STEPHEN: You know, I've always been pretty concerned with giving promotions for no reason... But hey, we'll save that for another day!

PETE: We have chapters with two or three dozen heavily involved members, most of whom attend regional events, local events, contribute to the region and to SFI - and we have chapters that are almost completely made up of 'paper members', who have no significant involved in STARFLEET.

STEPHEN: <<< Paper member! He he!

PETE: The freedom of chapters to operate as they will brings in a lot of people who would not otherwise join STARFLEET, but it also can cause a lot of problems when people discover just how different it is on the 'other side of the fence'.

STEPHEN: How so?

PETE: I saw this sort of thing many times while I was RC, and I continue to see it. There's really no way to 'balance out' how chapters are run, without taking away 'chapter autonomy'. SFI is stronger in some ways because of those freedoms, but weaker in others.

STEPHEN: True.

PETE: For instance, a member of one of those 'point systems promotions' chapter may have to slave and struggle to be promoted to Lieutenant J.G. - while a member from a less strictly organized chapter may get kicked up to the same rank just for 'showing up', for instance.

STEPHEN: True.

PETE: This can cause strife between the members of those chapters, all of whom feel their way is better - and for their chapter, it may BE better. It's a pet peeve, and one I have never figured out a way to reconcile.

STEPHEN: Well, I can certainly see your point. I think that's one of the things the next administration should think about.

PETE: There may be ways to improve the situation, but it's a very complex question, to be sure.

STEPHEN: So, as you know, Paramount has approved a new season of Enterprise. What do you think the show's future is, and what do you like/dislike about it?

PETE: I think that they will continue to struggle to hold an audience. I enjoy the show, but I think that they would have gained a much stronger audience had they looked forward from Voyager instead of back. There is certainly some excitement about storylines, but since we already know what's going on a century later, they can only do so much - and the tech is more primitive, the 'globe of exploration' smaller, and so on. I hope that Enterprise will run 7 years, but I doubt it will, and (cont. on p. 36)

I think there will be a longer hiatus between shows this time, when it ends.

STEPHEN: What do you like/dislike about the show?

PETE: I dislike the time setting - I would have much preferred they move forward from Voyager by maybe 50 years or more, so the future would have been entirely unknown. That would have given the writers a much bigger plot pool to draw from. I like watching them move closer to the Original Series plotlines and technology - having warp drive itself as an exciting new innovation, for instance.

STEPHEN: Well, I agree with you on just about all of that! Perhaps we should get together and start writing stories for a new series! He he!

STEPHEN: Now, for the real reason we wanted to interview you... *drum roll* Could you tell us about your duties at this year's International Conference?

PETE: I'll be happy to! As chairman, my duties were to coordinate the departmental chairs, act as liaison between the EC and AB to the IC, to promote the IC in every way, to manage our overall goals and plans, and to do the things that we either overlooked or that none of the chairs had been assigned to do.

STEPHEN: Wow, quite a lot.

PETE: I was fortunate to have a talented and experienced group of people as my department chairs, so I wasn't 'run ragged' during the IC like can happen if things don't work out real well.

STEPHEN: What were some of the things you had to organize?

PETE: For the most part, actually during the IC, I coordinated starting of various events, acted as our contact with the hotel staff, and spent a lot of time walking about making sure that the 'little stuff' got done. For instance, I talked to the EC/AB at the start of their session, and gave them an overview of what the General Session would be like. The GS was one area where I had to learn something new, as we were unable to find a copy of last year's Power Point presentation, so I made a new one from scratch. Then, when the GS actually ran, I kind of shuttled back and forth from the podium to the hallway where the EC/AB people were waiting, making sure that the music, visual presentation, and dignitaries were all in synch - then got things started, and we ran from a script from that point forward.

STEPHEN: Could you give us an overview of an average day for you at the IC?

PETE: A typical day is hard to describe, as each day was quite different from the other! I'll give you a short overview of each day.

STEPHEN: Ok.

PETE: Thursday, I spent much of the day shuttling people from the airport to the

hotel, and in between, I helped set up the Quartermaster / Dealer room (about 25 tables which were used be the STARFLEET QM, the Region 2 QM, the IC QM, four dealers, and the IC auction). Thursday was actually a pretty slow day, as except for getting the various events set up (such as cadets, quartermaster, and registration), and shuttling in all the people flying, I didn't have much to do. Unfortunately, the weather conspired against us, and quite a few of the flyers were delayed, so I didn't bring in the last one until about 1:30 in the morning!

On Friday, there were more people to shuttle in (and guite a few of them were driven in by staff members, in addition to those I drove in), more events to set up, and the EC/AB meeting to coordinate. There was a luncheon for the EC/AB, which required two trips to the grocery store (one on Tuesday, where I had bought all of the non-perishable items, and one on Friday morning, where all of the perishables were bought), then I had to run across town to pick up some audiovisual equipment we were borrowing. Opening ceremonies began at 6, lasted about an hour, and then I started up a card game tournament for the unofficial R2 game, The Great Dalmuti. My last job before bed was to put up the room schedule signs for Saturday.

On Saturday, we had the General Session at 8 a.m., which lasted until nearly lunchtime, then we began panels after lunch. I helped set up some panel items like the projector system, stuck my head in the door of some others, and did two television interviews and an interview for Radio STARFLEET. After the panels, we got dressed for dinner, went to the banquet - which was a huge success then had the charity auction, which raised almost \$3800 for Ronald McDonald House Charities - and followed this with the dance and the final round of The Great Dalmuti. I put up schedule signs for Sunday and went to bed.

On Sunday I was actually able to sleep in a little, then got up and checked around the panels to make sure all was well. The closing ceremonies were after lunch; this mostly involved thanks to various individuals and groups, the presentation of the charity check, and announcements about upcoming events. Several shuttle runs to the airport were done by staff members, and we began to clean up and pack up. We sold nearly everything from the charity auction, so that IC 2005 didn't have much of that to haul home, but they did have several boxes full of flags and flag equipment.

On Monday, we took four more groups to the airport, and the IC was history!

STEPHEN: Well, you certainly did a great job with your first IC, thanks from all of us in STARFLEET, and especially us at the CQ for doing this interview! Hope to do it again sometime!

PETE: Me too, thanks for interviewing me.

STEPHEN: There it is, folks! Tune in next time, for another interview!

ENDEAVOR XO GOES ON A TREKKIE RIDE OF A LIFETIME



C: David, you are a forensic technician for the City of Philadelphia. Will you please explain to us exactly what you do?

D: My primary function is to assist the pathologists during autopsies. I do the dissection portion of the autopsy. I cut the body open, remove the organs, take samples of bodily fluids for toxicology, then weigh the organs and record the weights for the pathologists. The pathologist is the one who decides the cause of death. I also X-Ray bodies from time to time and help the doctors retrieve bullets from homicide victims and people who have committed suicide using a gun.

One of my other responsibilities is to take forensic photographs for evidence and also to take I.D. photos so investigators can show them to potential family and friends of the unidentified person in the hopes that the person will be identified. Forensic basically means "medical-legal."

I have a few other responsibilities too, but the last one I'd like to mention is that I pick up bodies from scenes and from hospitals. I have removed accident victims from their cars on busy highways, people on railroad tracks, homicide scenes, you name it! Probably the most unpleasant part of my job is removing decomposed bodies from where they were found.

C: How did you become interested in this type of work?

D: When I was around eight years old, my grandfather died. I noticed how kind the funeral director was to my family and myself and I noticed how much better my grandmother seemed after she spoke with him. The funeral director was professional and very knowledgeable and the service he provided my family was outstanding. I had never gone to a viewing before and I was scared what to expect. When I walked in, I couldn't believe how good my grandfather looked. It wasn't scary at all! He looked like he was peacefully sleeping. I was glad I decided to go into the viewing chapel to see my grandfather. I was able to say goodbye.

I became interested in the business when I was in high school and decided to study it when I applied for colleges. I became a PA licensed funeral director/embalmer in 1995. Around 1997, I realized that I wanted to do more. I remember visiting various coroner's and medical examiner's offices and really wanted to enter the field of forensics. After 2 years on the waiting list, I finally was able to take the test for forensic technician at the Philadelphia Medical Examiner's Office. I did well in the test and passed the interview. In late 1999, I finally became a forensic technician. In January of 2002, I was promoted to forensic technician II.

C: What training did you have?

D: Well, I have an Associate of Applied Science degree in Funeral Service Education. My experience as a funeral director/embalmer helped me to be eligible

for my position at the City Morgue. Also, my classes in Anatomy and Physiology were very important because about 70% of the Civil Service exam was anatomy. When the city hired me, I was trained for 6 months on-the-job. I have attended lectures at The Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, PCOM, and had classes at the office, taught by the Chief Medical Examiner, Haresh Merchandani. I had OSHA training and safety and awareness classes too, such as T.B. awareness and how to prevent contracting it. I recently attended the annual training weekend for DMORT, Disaster Mortuary Operations Response Team. It was a three-day weekend course, which taught me the importance of retrieving all pieces of evidence and what to look for after a disaster. While there, I attended a forensic dentistry class, which was very interesting. I worked in a makeshift portable morgue with a fictional disaster to handle and I learned a new computer program, which DMORT uses to input valuable information about the deceased victims and the personal items that belonged to

C: What was the most interesting or unusual experience that you had working in the city morgue?

D: Well, I am not permitted to mention any specific case, but I must say that during the time period when I was a new employee, there was an investigation going on for theft that was very scary. Many of the people whom I'd worked with were fired and arrested for stealing from the dead. It was very intense, and after it was all over, the few of us who were innocent had to run the morgue with a minimum staff for over a year. It was horrible! I hardly had any days off and I was working so many long hours, I hardly had any personal/social time for myself

The other interesting experience that I wanted to briefly mention was the fact that I had the honor to volunteer at the NY Office of the Chief Medical Examiner shortly after 9-11, from November 25th to December 9th. It was a very sad two weeks that I'll never forget. I even briefly met the Mayor of NY, Rudy Giuliani and shook his hand.

C: In your spare time, you have had walk on roles in movies and T.V. series. How did you become involved in show business?

D: During the first Season of Hack, a TV drama filmed here in Philly, the crew contacted the Philadelphia Medical Examiner's Office to see if they could film there. The answer was, "Absolutely not!" There is a lot of evidence held there and we store people's loved ones until the

funeral directors can pick them up. After some negotiating, the crew was allowed to come in to take still photographs of only certain parts of the morgue, which were open to them. This was so they could use the pictures to recreate the morgue on a set for the show.

The day before they came, we cleaned the morgue really well and made sure everything looked as perfect as possible for them. I started work 4 P.M. the day they photographed the morgue and missed the entire crew. I asked if anyone had left any business cards and the techs said, "No." I always wanted to have a small part in a movie or TV show and saw this as my best opportunity. I found some Hack related e-mail addresses and e-mailed all of them. One person replied and got me on as a background character playing



the medical examiner's office assistant in the recreated morgue they built on the set. It was the Thanksgiving episode, # 8, Songs of the Night.

C: What movies and shows have you appeared in?

D: I have appeared on the show Hack, five times as various background characters. The casting agencies usually tried to place me in scenes related to death, considering my unusual occupation. The last time I was on the show, I actually got to play what I do in real life, a forensic technician removing a homicide victim from a nightclub. This scene was filmed on location at Club Shampoo, here in Philly.

My first speaking role was in the movie, Suburban Sasquatch, by Troubled Moon Films. I played Jackson, who was a real estate agent in a growing PA suburban town. Suburban Sasquatch should be available on VHS and DVD within a few short months. For more info you can visit http://www.troubledmoonfilms.com.

My next speaking role is in the movie Internet Fear, which is being filmed this summer. I will be playing Mr. Bowman, a teacher who tries to help a dyslexic student. But Mr. Bowman ends up getting murdered by the student in a very brutal way. The role requires a lot of make-up and fake blood, so it sounds like it's going to be really fun to do! Internet Fear is by Diamond State Films/Regal Studios.

I am also looking forward to being part of the Star Trek fan film that some of the members of the members of the USS Sovereign are putting together. I can't wait!

C: Do you plan to change jobs?

D: Well, it would be fun to become a fulltime actor, but realistically, it would be very hard for me to make a living doing that. I do, however, intend one day to move out of the city and hopefully work somewhere else as a deputy coroner.

C: When did you become interested in StarTrek?

D: I became interested in Star Trek when I started watching The Next Generation. I thought the acting and stories lines were amazing and the special effects were better than many big budget space movies. I then started renting all the older Star Trek movies and episodes, and became fond of the old show as well. To this day, The Next Generation is by far my favorite compared to all the other Star Treks, even though I realize none of it would exist if it weren't for the original series.

C: How did you find out about the organization?

D: By accident. My wife and I went to participate in a TV poll down near the Philadelphia International Airport. As we were waiting to go inside the conference room, we noticed a lot of people in STARFLEET uniforms. We approached them and they kindly explained about the organization. I was amazed and shortly after joined with my wife. About a month after that, we found the U.S.S. Sovereign, and I just love it. I don't have a normal schedule and I really appreciate that the crew of the Sovereign understands that. Their message board helps me "stay in the loop" when I cannot attend meetings, which happens a lot with my line of

C: Is there anything you would like to add?

D: Yes, I just wanted to add that the years-old argument of being called a Trekkie or a Trekker is stupid. Why do people get so upset about it? I don't get insulted if I get called a Trekkie or a Trekker. What's the difference? Star Trek is all about forming a better future, to get along with others. A real Trekkie/ Trekker would realize this and not get in such a huff over something so silly!

In the early 2270s, increased tensions along the Romulan Neutral Zone were punctuated by repeated Romulan incursions into the Zone. This raised considerable alarm among those Star Fleet personnel operating in that area, particularly various starbases and space stations who felt that they were vulnerable. In response, Star Fleet in 2274 proposed the design and construction of a new class of light attack cruiser, designed to be faster and more capable than existing classes, which would be tasked to provide a deterrent role by being able to match aggressive moves by the Romulans with an equivalent response by Star Fleet forces. Additionally, the design would be able to serve in escort and rapidsupport roles in other areas.

The project went into design-anddevelopment in 2274, and by 2276, a preferred design was submitted to the Federation Council for funding. Authorizations were complete within a year, and in early 2277, actual construction commenced. The class vessel, U.S.S. Niven (NCC-4825) was completed on 4 January 2278 and commissioned later that year after completing acceptance trials.

In order to maximize production efficiency, as many modular and prefabricated components as possible were utilized in the Niven-class' construction process. One of the most visible examples was the 80% "standard" primary hull design, coupled with a newly-designed, mass-produced, and operationally self-sufficient "clip-on" hangar bay/engineering hull.

The assembly process was also optimized for efficiency. Vessel components were constructed at the various contractors' assembly facilities, and then transported by the Cliché Warp Courier Service to the Gauthier-Essiembre Shipyards orbiting Nouveau St-Denis in the Q-AMPSF System. This process worked so effectively that, added to the final assembly teams working in round-the-clock shifts, it resulted in 8 ships being constructed per year at the Gauthier-Essiembre Shipyards. By mid-2282, all 36 vessels in the production order had been completed, on-time and on-budget.

While some critics of the design have claimed that the Niven-class, with its wedge-shaped hangar/engineering hull, bore a significant resemblance to the Avenger-class heavy frigate, the Niven's impressive velocity and maneuverability profile place it into the Light Attack Cruiser classification. The vessel's capabilities are further enhanced by the ten embarked duobee assault pods and their weapons add-ons. In more recent years, some ships of the Niven-class have been reassigned to a greater exploratory posture. This involved a reconfiguration of their sensor suites, enhancement of computer and analysis equipment on board, and the replacement of the duobees with other small craft more suited for exploratory activities.







and started to head to his final objective, but was unexpectedly bowled over by the rush of a targ that Intel had neglected to include in their report. Hastily switching the phaser to kill, he fired, hitting the animal before it could attack again. Rising slowly to his feet and scanning for any more surprises, Marcus re-entered the building and finally approached his target, a comm relay. Knowing he would be able to replace it upon returning from this mission, Marcus took the phaser, made a few setting changes on it and placed it inside the maintenance compartment of the relay. The screech that immediately started and quickly rose in pitch and volume was warning enough to clear the area, after all, no one wanted to be anywhere near a phaser set on overload. Marcus retreated to a safe distance, well away from the camp and watched as the building went up like a series of fireworks, then returned to his extraction point, mission accomplished."

Greetings, fellow Fleeters! Have you been looking for that perfect prop, that piece to embellish your uniform, or perhaps you just like to collect weaponry? If so, I recommend you check out the Art Asylum Original Series Phaser Pistol. This item is a very highly detailed version of the phaser pistol (much better than the one Playmates put out).

It comes with a removable phaser type-1 unit, which holds the batteries - it takes 3

LR44's (hearing aid batteries). The hand unit has a red LED, a small simulated flip-up targeting scanner and, as mentioned in the bit o' fiction above, has stun, kill and disrupt settings, each with its own distinct sound. Also, when locked into place in the pistol handset, by twisting the rear power knob to the right and hitting the trigger you can use an overload setting - complete with, as in the show, a rising whine followed by an explosion sound. All in all, this is in my opinion an item well worth getting for any true collector or for costuming purposes. Now for what is possibly its only drawback: it is virtually impossible to find in stores, so you will have to go to the Art Asylum website (www.artasylum.com) and check their list of online sources. I ordered mine through KBToys online and got a pretty fast response on the order confirmation and shipping notification. I had the item in hand in less than 5 days. All told, I am very highly impressed with the quality and styling on this item and do recommend it for those interested.

THE MODERN DAY TREASURE HUNT

The Darwin, a chapter of STARFLEET'S Region 15, started Geocaching last summer.

The first Darwin expedition headed to Waltham to find 'Spring Fling.' After walking past the area of the cache twice on their way to finally finding the coordinates, they pulled out the clue and found the cache, full of really cool little toys. They signed the logbook and took a few pictures, and decided to try to find another cache on the other side of town.

Finding the second cache was a bit harder. It turned out to be at the top of a very steep hill. By the time they got to the top, they were all winded, but rewarded with an amazing view. After resting for a bit, they started searching.

At the top of the hill was an old WWII radar station, long abandoned, but still having a bit of an influence on the area. The GPS units started going crazy. At one point, with two of them side by side, standing still, the readouts indicated that they were walking in opposite directions. After an hour of searching, they found the cache and, as a small clue to help others, put a little pile of rocks near by.

On another expedition, on November 29th, the Darwin put out its first cache in Easton at Wheaton Farm. The next day three people had stopped and signed the logbook. The Darwin also has two travel bugs out. Bounce Tigger, Bounce has made it more then 4000 miles to Germany. The Romulan War Bug has only gotten about 80 miles and is in RI.

Since that first trip, members have purchased three more GPS units and have dragged four or five more people into the game.

Also in Region 15, the Ares crew plans to go on its first Geocache trip in April. They will be going to the site of the Great Molasses Flood of 1919, in the North End of Boston.

Geocaching is an entertaining adventure game for GPS users. Participating in a cache hunt is a good way to take advantage of the wonderful features and capability of a GPS unit. The basic idea is to have individuals and organizations set up caches all over the world and share the locations of these caches on the Internet. GPS users can then use the location coordinates to find the caches.

A GPS unit is an electronic device that can determine your approximate location, within 6-20 feet, on the planet. Coordinates are normally given in Longitude and Latitude. You can use the unit to navigate from your current location to another location. Some units have their own maps, built-in electronic compasses, and voice



* A Travel Bug is a trackable tag that you attach to an item. This allows you to track your item on Geocaching.com. The item becomes a hitchhiker that is carried from cache to cache (or person to person) in the real world and you can follow its progress online.

navigation, depending on the complexity of the device.

You don't need to know all the technical mumbo iumbo about GPS units to go Geocaching. All you need to do is be able to enter what is called a waypoint, where the geocache is hidden.

A cache can come in many forms, but the first item should always be the logbook. In its simplest form a cache can be just a logbook and nothing else. The logbook contains information from the founder of the cache and notes from the cache's visitors. The logbook can contain much valuable, rewarding, and entertaining information. A logbook might contain information about nearby attractions, coordinates to other unpublished caches, and even jokes written by visitors. If you get some information from a logbook you should give some back. At the very least, you can leave the date and time you visited the cache.

Larger caches may consist of a waterproof plastic bucket placed tastefully within the local terrain. The bucket will contain the logbook and any number of more or less valuable items. These items turn the cache into a true treasure hunt. You never know what the founder or other visitors to the cache may have left there for you to enjoy. Remember, if you take something, its only fair for you to leave something in return. Items in a bucket cache could include maps, books, software, hardware, CD's, videos, pictures, money, jewelry, tickets, antiques, tools, games, etc. It is recommended that items in a bucket cache be individually packaged in a clear zipped plastic bag to protect them.

Once found, a cache may provide the visitor with a wide variety of rewards. All the visitor is asked to do is to leave something for the cache, thereby increasing the size of the cache with each find. However, unless there's a note in the cache containing instructions on moving it to a new location, you don't move or take the cache! Responsible cache owners check on their caches occasionally and would be alarmed to find them missing. An alternative would be to have a hitchhiker, which is an item that you can move from cache to cache. An example of this is a candle that has traveled from Australia to Arizona, or a Mr. Potato Head that leaps from cache to cache. All you need to do to create a hitchhiker is to attach a note to it for folks to move it to a new place.
