Not all news is good news as I announce the following decommissioned chapters:

USS White Eagle NCC-2302 City of Charter Jacksonville, NC Region

USS Endeavor NCC-1716 City of Charter Baltic, CT Region 15 The Office of Chapter Care is now being headed by Fleet Captain Steven Bowers, This office will be a helping hand to chapters working to keep everyone at their minimum requirements with Fleet when it comes to monthly reporting and crew compliments. Chapter Care is a conduit of information and referrals for chapters which may, from time to time be having problems in these areas. Decommissioning is a dirty word in Ops and we will be working to do everything possible to keep as many chapters active and vigorous members of Fleet.

Basically, here's how it works. After a three month period of non-reporting or being under strength a chapter will enter CCP under the following schedule as set forth in Section 04.04 of the SFI Handbook:

Stand-by – Chapters will have sixty days to correct the problem or they shall be moved to Dry-Docked.

Dry-Docked - Chapters will have sixty days to correct the problem or they shall be decommissioned.

In regards to being under strength, at the discretion of the Chief of Operations a chapter may be moved up a level (ie from STAND-BY to ACTIVE or DRY-DOCK to STAND BY) as long a documentable effort

towards recruitment has been shown by said chapter.

If a chapter is returned to active status and falls behind in crew complement after another three month period it shall return to CCP. A chapter may go back and forth between CCP and ACTIVE status a total of four consecutive periods before other status options would be considered.

We hope that this will give a chapter every chance possible to fix whatever problem they are having and keep as many chapters active as poissible.

The Vessel Registry is ready for downloading. The first few weeks of 2005 will only be in black and white, but this may very well be rectified as you read this. Any changes of chapter information can be sent to chapterinfochange@sfi.org or to ops@sfi.org directly. The document itself can be downloaded directly at <u>http:</u>//documents.sfi.org/downloads/vr.pdf. As a reminder, if anyone wishes a printed copy sent to them, please contact me with your name and address.

My next venture out into the world as a member of the EC is going to be my first IC in San Antonio in July. I have promised not to injure the Fleet Admiral this time around.

We'll see.....

You'll note that other than Captain/Colonel all increases are based on minimum TIG. In recognition of Extraordinary Service to STARFLEET or Outstanding Performance of Duty, 6 months can be dropped from the minimum TIG requirements.

Promotion Nomination Submission Tips:

Submit promotion nominations early.

With "Summit Season" upon us, the SFI Promotions Department has received many nominations for promotions. Please try to plan ahead when nominating someone for a promotion to be awarded at events. You need to allow enough time for processing, and EC deliberation in order to receive a promotion certificate in time for an event. Submit promotion nominations as early as possible to ensure the certificate is received in time. If you submit your nomination 4 weeks (or earlier) prior to the event, you will have a better chance of receiving an answer to your request in time for the Summit, Conference, or other event.

It is also a good idea to send a separate email to promotions@sfi.org to let me know if you have a deadline

From the Desk of the Commandant

Summary for the Months of January and February. Several issues have cropped up in the early months of my term which have prompted me to focus attention on the Cadet Academy. My staff and I are diligently working to resolve communications and delay-related issues in the Cadet areas. There have been several recent closures in the Academy. Some are related to staffing changes, others are due to temporary intervention of that "Real Life" thing muscling in on my directors' time. At the time of this report, my executive staff and I are reaching final decisions for new directors for the School of Security, STARFLEET in Cyberspace, and the College of Survival Studies. The Institute of Science Fiction has opened and has been seeing a significant amount of traffic since its courses were again made available to the Fleet. The Paypal online payment system for requesting voucher codes is once again available for use. This program will also be utilized for making donations toward the STARFLEET Scholarship funds.

Another matter I wish to address at this time concerns turnaround time for course requests and grading, and how a student ideally should go about raising a concern with the Academy staff. Lastly, the office of the Commandant is available to you when it seems you just can't get anywhere with anyone else you've spoken with. Contact information for each of these persons is available via the Academy website.

He has proven himself a genuine asset to this administration. # **New Chairman Sought for ASDB!**

CAPT David Lynch has stepped down as Chairman of the Advanced Starship Design Bureau, citing personal reasons. We thank him for his service to STARFLEET, and wish him well in his future endeavors.

This reopens this position, and gives me the opportunity to invite members interested in the technical side of Trek to join in a fun part of the FLEET. With that in mind.

The Department of Technical Services is seeking applicants to fill the position of Chairman, Advanced Starship Design Bureau. We're looking for qualified members who love starship and space station design, and would like to share that love with fellow members.

What follows is the job description. If this sounds like you, why not apply?

The Chairman of the Advanced Starship Design Bureau (ASDB) will be charged with assisting STARFLEET members/ shuttles/chapters in the creation of new starship designs and/or the upgrade/ modification of existing designs within the framework of a coherent, established Star Trek Universe

New design proposals are reviewed by the ASDB, which helps groups iron out any possible engineering/design issues and then submits a recommendation to the Director, DTS for approval or disapproval of the design, based on the results of the design review.

The successful candidate will:

1] Be comfortable with and possess full understanding of Star Trek technology and engineering in all Star Trek eras (from the 22nd Century of "Enterprise" to the 24th Century of TNG/DS9/VOY).

2] Be comfortable with Star Trek engineering and starship design as explicated in fantech (e.g., Star Fleet Printing Office, Star Station Aurora, Mastercom Data Center), as well as Paramount-tech, as the former has played a very important role in the proper development of the Trek Universe.

3] Be willing to guide groups designing starships to develop their projects to fit realistically within the existing framework. (e.g., if we already have 2 extant shuttlecarrier designs {and "actually", we have about 8 right now}, a group creating a third should show that the new design does something that the others do not.) New designs created simply for the purpose of being new will not necessarily be accepted, but the ASDB Chairman can assist groups in giving the new design a fresh characteristic that would aid in its acceptance. Alternatively, the ASDB Chairman will show the group the existing designs and see if one of those might not suit the purpose.

Why I Stopped Watching Star Trek: Confessions of an Original Trekker

Paramount is canceling Enterprise after only four seasons. What a surprise. I stopped watching it a year ago.

Let me be clear up front; I love Star Trek. Passionately. I always have. From the very first moment I saw it, something just... clicked. I am extremely proud of the fact that I'm part of the generation that made Star Trek the phenomenon it became.

I was too young to have seen the show in its original first run on NBC. It wasn't until a few years later, while visiting my brother in college, that I discovered this amazing show in syndication. I was eleven at the time.

I remember it vividly; my family was in a hotel in Indiana and I was bored out of my mind. This was in 1972 B.C. (before cable), and there was all of three television channels to choose from. Fortunately, Star Trek was on one of them.

The episode was Arena, and I'd missed the first half. I was already into science fiction & fantasy, so the second I saw a lizard-man fighting hand-to-hand with a guy in a green shirt, I was glued to the screen. I learned how to make a cannon that day, using stuff lying around on a deserted planet.

After that, everything changed for me. I watched it every day after school. I made a checklist of episodes, and kept track of how many times I'd seen each one (I called it my "Trek-list"). I made models of the Enterprise and a Klingon Battle Cruiser and hung them from my ceiling. I read the books; went to the conventions; bought the merchandise... I was hardcore.

But it wasn't enough. We (the fans) wanted more. Oh sure, they tried to placate us with the Saturday morning cartoon version, but let's face it, that was pretty lame. No, we wanted Kirk and Spock in the flesh.

### And then came Star Wars.

All of a sudden, sci-fi was cool. Rip-off space movies and short-lived TV shows were cropping up everywhere. For Paramount, it was a no-brainer. They were going to revive the TV show anyway (Star Trek: Phase Two); why not just up the ante and turn it into a big-budget theatrical movie instead?

And so they did. Star Trek: The Motion Picture was the most expensive movie ever produced in Hollywood's history (at that time), clocking in at over \$40 million.

### Too bad it sucked.

Ok, maybe that's a bit too harsh. The director's cut is most definitely an improvement. Thank you Paramount, for allowing Robert Wise to finally finish his

film the way he originally envisioned it. And since this is a confession, I admit to seeing it twice on opening night; once at the 8 o'clock show, and then again at midnight.

Even though it wasn't exactly what we had hoped for, it was Star Trek, and fans flocked to it. The film ultimately grossed over \$120 million at the box office. That's 1979 dollars, when movie tickets were averaging a third of what they sell for today. The future of Star Trek looked very promising.

The following year, Star Wars: The Empire Strikes Back was released, further fueling the public's appetite for quality science fiction. When Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan was released in 1982, it was an instant blockbuster.

This was Star Trek! This is what we were waiting for! Kirk battling an old nemesis from the TV show! Fans lined up around the block to watch Kirk defeat Khan, and witness the death of Spock, one of the most beloved characters in sci-fi history.

But you can't keep a good character down, especially in science fiction, and so Spock was reborn, in the highly under-rated sequel Star Trek III: The Search For Spock, followed by Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home, neatly wrapping up the trilogy started by Khan.

In 1987, Star Trek: The Next Generation, set one hundred years after the original series, premiered on television. After a some-what shaky start, it ended up far surpassing the original, in both storytelling and popularity (personally, I never missed a new episode in its entire run).

And then, in 1991, Gene Roddenberry, the creator of the series, died.

After that, things changed. Now that the old man was dead, Rick Berman, Roddenberry's hand-picked successor, decided to take the series in a new direction. The direction he took it was into deep space.

Star Trek: Deep Space Nine premiered to one of the largest television audiences in history, but to mixed reviews. For the first time, Star Trek didn't... trek anywhere. Still, fans were willing to give it a chance to get its "space legs."

Eventually it did, and proved to be an excellent show, especially after adding Michael Dorn to the cast as Worf. It not only added new vigor to the show, it gave it that crucial link it needed to tie-in with Next Generation. When Worf turned up in the film First Contact commanding Deep Space Nine's ship, Defiant, the circle was complete. But my interest was starting to wane. For the first time I missed episodes. Sometimes whole blocks of them. It just wasn't the same.

And then came Voyager.

Gene Roddenberry's golden rule was "No conflict among Starfleet officers." Humans of the future will have overcome any such petty differences. This posed a conundrum for the writers, for without conflict, there is no drama. All conflict would have to come from outside.

The way around this problem? Put a crew of half-Starfleet and half-pirates on the same ship and throw them into another quadrant of the galaxy, so far away it'll take them seventy years to get home. Yeah baby, now that's what I call CONFLICT!

I watched the premier. Let's just say I was under whelmed. But, it was Star Trek, so I gave it a chance, and I watched the entire first two seasons religiously. But somehow, it just wasn't Star Trek. Oh sure, it was on a starship, and they went places, but there was always too much underlying tension everywhere.

There was a reason the original Star Trek and Next Generation worked so well. That reason was Gene Roddenberry. By circumventing his Prime Directive of no conflict among the crew members, Rick Berman and company put Star Trek on a path towards self-destruction.

To make matters worse, it started to get boring. Same plot, different show. Tweak a storyline here, give the alien a new forehead there, maybe throw in the Borg... been there done that. Once in a while a really creative and original episode would crop up, but mostly it was the same old rehashed stuff.

By this time, even the movies were slowing down. Insurrection, while well written and satisfying, was little more than a glorified episode with a big movie star as the guest villain (an unrecognizable F. Murray Abraham under layers of prosthetic makeup). What is it about odd numbered Star Trek movies?

I intermittently watched Voyager when I remembered it was on, but it wasn't like the old days when I would arrange my schedule around Star Trek. I think I missed an entire half season towards the end. Then, after seven years, Voyager found her way back home, just as we always knew she would. Yawn.

On to Enterprise. It could have been something really, really special, but instead they opted for more of the same. To be completely honest, they lost me from day one.

First of all, they completely screwed up the ship design. What is a 24th century design doing in the 22nd century? They got it right in First Contact with the Phoenix; they got it right for the Deep

Space Nine episode, Trials and Tribbleations, when they recreated the original Enterprise; why couldn't they get this right too?

The blue glow on the sides of the nacelles were never on Kirk's Enterprise in any of the films, ergo it was a 24th century innovation. I once heard Rick Berman make the excuse that audiences were used to the ships of the movies and series, so they designed it in a familiar way. I call that a cop-out. Just admit that you screwed up.

I also would have really liked to have heard the old chirps and whistles from the bridge of Kirk's Enterprise, on this Enterprise. It would have been a great homage to the old series, and added so much more to the feel of Star Trek.

Speaking of sound effects, would it have been so terrible to use some other sound effects from the original series? Phasers maybe? Or the transporter? How about the turbo-lift? It just strikes me as very odd that the 22nd century is more advanced than the 23rd century.

Even so, I gave it the old Star Trek try. I watched the first two seasons, pretty consistently. It wasn't bad, but it wasn't great either. There were a few stand-outs. It almost seemed like it wanted to be like the old series, but didn't want to give up all its new toys.

And then at the end of the second season, they threw away over three decades of established Star Trek lore, and completely re-wrote the timeline of events, when an alien force destroyed a good chunk of North America, just for the sake of ratings. I thought that was in poor taste after 9/11.

But that's not why I stopped watching. I stopped watching Enterprise because, where I live, they moved the third season to the same day and time as Smallville. I'm sorry, but I don't have TiVo. When they forced me to make a choice, I chose the better show.

If they had aired it one hour later, instead of putting it up against a rival show, I'd have tuned in. I will never understand why networks put similar shows (in this case science fiction) up against each other in

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# AN OPEN LETTER TO STARFLEET: THE INTERNATIONAL STAR TREK FAN ASSOCIATION

I love time travel. And I owe it all to Star Trek.

We've all experienced pivot points in history, those moments when something happens, something so huge that it changes everything that comes after. Some are good, some bad. The first time you look into the eyes of your soul mate. The loss of a parent. These are events that send ripples through our lives, shaping us.

Apparently, I was shaped by Harlan Ellison and Gene Roddenberry. I remember it very clearly. I was five, sitting in front of my parent's tiny black and white television watching The City on the Edge of Forever, mouth in the shape of an "O" as ideas the size of worlds dropped like boulders into the lake of my young mind. Time travel. Alternate histories. Changing the past.

It was the idea that everything we were and knew might be swept away and replaced with something familiar, yet alien, that particularly fascinated me. It sunk into my subconscious and stayed there for years, fermenting away in the background as I read authors like Isaac Asimov. Robert Heinlein, Paul Anderson, Jack Chalker, Robert Silverberg, Ray Bradbury and others. Another classic Trek episode. Mirror Mirror, added another element to the mix, the concept of parallel universes. Somewhere in my mind, the two concepts collided, and the germ of the idea that would grow to become TIME WAR: Adventures in Eternity was born.

Many years later, I became interested in role-playing games. The idea of being able to assume the role of a heroic character in a world of the imagination and live his or her adventures seemed like a natural creative outlet for me, and my campaigns became popular for their depth of ingenuity and characterization. Sadly, there was no published setting that – to my mind – dealt with the concepts of parallel worlds and time travel in a satisfactory way. My imagination fired by yet another Trek story, in this case the superb TNG story Yesterday's Enterprise, I resolved to write my own.

As anyone who writes for a living will tell you, writing is a hard and lonely job. Writing for games is worse, because not only do you have to build a convincing world from scratch, but you have to build the rules that world works on as well TIME WAR was hard to write simply because of its immense scale. It's a game of action, adventure and intrigue, where the players can take on the role of beings from any one of billions of different parallel worlds, banded together to maintain the integrity of hundreds of billions of years of history. Characters can be transhuman, protohuman, or completely inhuman. They can use magic, psionics, or even technology made out of auras. Their enemies range from transdimensional death cults to transcendent Als and creatures made of folded space, with the continued existence of everything that is, was or ever will be at stake. All this is complemented by an incredibly fast and flexible game system, and wrapped in a simple, internally consistent set of time travel rules capable of handling any situation the characters might encounter. TIME WAR takes one of the oldest ideas in science fiction - the concept of a "time patrol" defending history - and rebuilds it from the ground up, re-imagining it in a way that's never been done before. It's eye-popping stuff, and is, in my opinion, the best SF game to come down the track in years. But of course, as the proud father, I would say that.

In 1997, shortly after I moved to the US from the UK, I decided to publish online a small sample of the TIME WAR background, in order to gauge interest in a potential role-playing game. Being a cautious fellow, I liberally marked the pages with copyright notices, though by 1997 the law had changed so that they were no longer strictly necessary.

The public reaction was both immediate and surprising. I started to receive fan emails on an almost daily basis, including an extremely encouraging message from Dr. Richard Hanley, author of The Metaphysics of Star Trek. One gentleman referred to TIME WAR as "the best game background on the net,' while another called it "the finest unpublished RPG ever". The popular Bureau 13 RPG web site published, with permission and proper accreditation, a series of crossover adventures involving elements of the TIME WAR setting spilling over into the modern world. I'm proud to say that the background has even garnered press attention abroad, with one Italian gaming magazine calling TIME WAR "everything you need to know about Time Travel.

Thus encouraged, I began work on the game proper, only to discover over the years that writing rules systems from scratch is incredibly hard work. Eventually I decided to license a game system and modify it for TIME WAR, first pursuing Last Unicorn Game's ICON system (used in their excellent Star Trek RPG), before settling on the award-winning Tri-Stat system, published by Canadian company Guardians of Order and used in their Big Eyes, Small Mouth animé RPG, and the highly popular superhero RPG, Silver Age Sentinels.

In 2001, shortly after I had purchased a license to use the Tri-Stat system for TIME WAR, I received an email complimenting me on the sample pages I had put up on my web site, and asking me if there were any more. Some time before, when I had intended to publish the game through my friend Matt Goodman at Heliograph, Inc.,

I had made the decision not to make any more of the background available before the book was published, so I declined this request, explaining my intention to publish the work professionally. I heard no more from this individual, though I noted he joined the Yahoo mailing list I used for keeping fans of the game informed.

Flash forward a few years. In between getting a new day job and setting up my company, Argent Games, I'd had little time to work on TIME WAR, but by January of 2005 a glimmer of light was appearing at the end of the tunnel. The amended rules were largely complete, the background tweaked and polished, and the manuscript close to being sent to the editor. After more years than I really want to think about, my baby was ready to be born. I was happy, excited and proud.

You may, then, have some idea of my shock and surprise when a fan contacted me to tell me that someone had published my material without my permission, and had attached their name to it as author. In many ways, it's a writer's worst nightmare. We spend so much time in our own heads that the fruit of our creativity is more real to us than anything physical. I followed the link supplied, and was intrigued to find archives of a series of articles published in Starfleet Communiqué issues 111, 112, 113, 114, 117, and 118. The articles dealt with the subject of time travel and related temporal phenomena, ostensibly in the Star Trek universe, though little reference was made to any of the trappings of the Star Trek background. The articles were spread over a number of issues. and while the first installment seemed harmless enough, reading the others made my blood run cold.

These were my words. The purported author of these articles hadn't just used my ideas or concepts; he had cut and pasted entire pages of my work, an act of plagiarism so blatant that I kept having to go back and check to make sure it had actually happened. That's when I remembered that I'd seen the name on the articles before. It was the individual who'd been so complimentary about my writing years before, the one that I had told of my intention to publish the work professionally.

I'm a methodical man, and I keep everything that anyone sends me about TIME WAR, mainly for encouragement on those lonely days when it seems like the project will never be finished. So I dug through my records and found the email from 2001. Then I went through the moderator logs on the TIME WAR mailing list and tracked the times the writer had changed his email address, printing them out along the way. Then I spoke to my lawyers. It seems that plagiarism, especially electronic plagiarism, is a very serious business these days. In 1997 President Clinton signed the No Electronic Theft Act into law, making it a federal crime to plagiarize anything that exists in electronic format. The law was designed to deal with illegal music downloads, video pirates and hackers, but applies equally in this situation. Violators of this law face up to three years in jail and fines of up to \$250,000. The principle of Vicarious Liability means that, because the offense had taken place in the pages Starfleet Communiqué, of Starfleet International could be held liable. In court I could ask for statutory damages, which run to approximately \$150,000.

After taking the time to calm myself, I decided to approach Starfleet International personally, rather than through my lawyers. Legally, I was obligated to act or run the risk of losing control of my copyrighted material, but I also had no desire to financially cripple a fan organization that I was certain were just as much victims in this matter as I was. I emailed the Fleet Admiral and the Editor of Starfleet Communiqué, and informed them of the situation. Less than an hour later, I got a telephone call from Chief of Staff Dennis Rayburn, to inform me that Starfleet was looking into the issue and to let me know they were taking it very seriously.

Looking back, it's now obvious to me that this gratifyingly swift and direct response is typical of the way Fleet Admiral Livingston deals with things. She and Dennis acted quickly to assure me they were aware of just how I must feel, and never once sought to minimize the issue or dodge responsibility. If there's been an upside to this series of events, it has been the pleasure of dealing with people as polite, decent and competent as Admiral Livingston and Dennis Rayburn. At every step, they have been far more interested in doing what's right and being fair to all concerned than in protecting themselves or avoiding responsibility, something we could all do with a little more of today. They are, in my opinion, a credit to their organization and the principles upon which it was founded.

I'd been informed by Starfleet that there was a slight problem with their investigation of the plagiarism, due to the accused individual's position in the organization. To help Starfleet. I sent a number of documents to Fleet Admiral Livingston, including; a preview of the TIME WAR background I'd prepared for the GenCon gaming convention in 2001; printouts of the articles from Starfleet Communiqué with pointers to their corresponding pages in the GenCon preview and with the plagiarized material highlighted (though so much had been taken that it would have been easier to highlight the material that wasn't mine); copies of the email from 2001 and my

response; and copies of the moderator logs from the TIME WAR mailing list, showing the culprit joining the list, changing his email address a number of times, and eventually leaving the list the Friday after I first contacted Starfleet.

In reviewing the articles, I realized that the culprit had to have deleted the copyright notices that were on every page, and that certain references within the documents would have to have been changed. Every mention of the Time Corps (now the Time Guard in the current version of the TIME WAR background) had been replaced with the phrase "<DELETED>". However. many references peculiarly specific to my work had not been changed, presumably because their significance was not obvious to anyone who didn't know the material well. The two most obvious ones were a reference to the date and hour of my birth, and a scientist named after my wife. I'm told the culprit tried to explain those away, before being confronted with the truth and confessing. That's something I would have liked to have seen.

Shortly after the Fleet Admiral's office got those materials, I was informed that the culprit had confessed when confronted with the proof and had stepped down from his post. Personally, I felt - and still feel -this was getting off lightly. Recent plagiarists in the press have lost their jobs for less. This individual risked throwing the reputation of the organization into disrepute and, as a high ranking officer and board member, had a higher ethical standard to adhere to. That this crime was committed by someone in such a trusted position still amazes me. It is, after all, an incredible betraval of his responsibility and the trust Starfleet International put in him, hopefully the only one. One would hope he's never given the opportunity to do something like this again, and that there are no further such surprises in the future.

Several weeks after confessing, the plagiarist submitted an apology to STARFLEET International and myself. To

call it an insult is putting it mildly. In it, he says "I [...] apologize specifically to Chris Halliday for using materials he believes are uniquely his own. While the idea of a 'time cop' organization is nearly universal in the sci-fi community, there is the occasional phrasing of material that is not 'universal' and is, in fact, original." (My emphasis)

It is a remarkably backhanded apology, in which the plagiarist questions the originality of my work, while ignoring the fact that he used entire pages of my material, without my permission and with full knowledge that lintended to publish it professionally. I leave you to draw your own conclusions about the trustworthiness of such an individual. About the only thing I agree with in the "apology" is when the plagiarist called his behavior a mistake. He's right; it is a mistake to commit a crime, publish the evidence, and somehow think you won't get caught.

Starfleet International has been amazingly cooperative, for which I am duly grateful. They have prominently placed explanatory notices in all electronic archives of the issues of Starfleet Communiqué in which the plagiarized material appeared, and have run a full statement of apology, acknowledging my copyright, which appeared in the previous issue to this one. They also asked me to write this account of my side of these events, to help explain them to the membership; an opportunity I'm happy to take.

All I ever wanted to do was publish a roleplaying game, the very best one I could make. With good luck and a fair wind, TIME WAR: Adventures in Eternity will hit the stores this year. You'll be able to buy it online through Amazon.Com and http: //www.guardiansorder.com, or from your favorite local game store. If you're interested in learning more about the game, check out the official Argent Games web site at http:// www.argentgames.com. Let me know what you think. And if you like what you see, why not pick up a copy? It's good enough to steal, after all...

Star Trek has pretty much run its course. Paramount has milked their cash-cow dry. Too bad. It was truly great once. And so it is, that I say goodbye to Star

Trek with a heavy heart.

It is obvious, then, that from infinite diversity, information, infinite combinations can be made, far bevond all that we can imagine. Infinite diversity. Star Trek is an endless world of diversity: so many different worlds, so many places, so many dishes, so many cultures. Let us not forget the diversity of the composition of the first Star Trek crew. Imagine what it meant in 1966: on the bridge, there was a black woman, a Russian, an Asiatic and a Vulcan (who may have represented, for the unconscious of many people, the devil, because of the shape of his ears). This kind of diversity was an open door to various situations and questions. It is the same thing about all the different species of Star Trek. The first example I think of is the one of Tamarans, who use a language based on metaphor, a narrative imagery using reference to the people and places of their mythic history There are also silicon based-life forms. or artificial intelligence life forms. And as it is sadly showed in Star Trek with the Borg, infinite diversity of knowledge is a precious asset. The Borg even think that it is a way to reach perfection. But their way of gathering information is unacceptable. Happily, the members of the Federation have a different one, to "seek out new life and new civilizations"...

Of course, these infinite diversitv and the combinations linked creates difficulties Infinite diversity. infinite difficulties. Indeed, each time one is to the "different", confronted manv problems emerge: to communicate, to avoid misunderstanding, to accept this other and have mutual respect. All this sometimes demands the creation of new rules. For example, the code of sentience of the Betazoid, which define the use of telepathy with other species. Sometimes, these rules stay incomprehensible: think of Jonathan Archer, meeting the Kreetassans, and making more and more cultural errors. Sometimes, one can be very shocked by the way the others live: what a strange idea is the nudity in Betazoid weddings, isn't it? Infinite combinations, infinite answers to infinite problems. Facing numerous problems, the questions are always the same: which solution is the good one? How much time will be necessary to find it? Are all the combinations accessible to us? Sometimes, we cannot find the answer. Like for temporal paradoxes that Kathryn Janeway renounced to understand. But she accepts their existence. Infinite combinations also mean infinite rcomplexity, a challenge for the mind. A very pleasant one for explorers. A way to break the walls of our way of thinking. And, one more time, it is not always easy because we are limited by some of our intellectual processes. Let's take the example of the cognitive dissonance. It is a concept created by a great American psychologist, Leon Festinger, in the middle of the 20th century. Festinger assumed that when a person is confronted with information that is not consistent, he/she will be invaded by cognitive dissonance he/she will try to reduce, because this dissonance is not comfortable. Example: I don't like Katarian chocolate puffs but I eat them. What a funny idea! Why would you eat something you don't like? Because you find a rational reason to: I eat this puff to please Counselor Troi, who offered it to me This rational reason to my behavior is a simply way to suppress dissonance. But sometimes, it is much more difficult. How about when you make a decision you cannot justify, for which there is no rational reason? Think of the Doctor, in Voyager, when he chose to save Ensign Kim instead of Ensign Jetral. As he was not able to find a rational reason for his choice, he went in a loop (cognitive conflict for humans) and went so mad that Janeway had to erase his memory. But that was not the solution. You can't flee dissonance: it would be fleeing the reality. You just can try to reduce it. That's what Janeway finally understood, and she allowed him to keep his memories and to take the necessary time to resolve the conflict. When there is infinite information, there are infinite sources of dissonance, and so infinite sources of problems. Infinite horrors. In 2005, humans remember the liberation of Auschwitz, the extermination camp. Our story has been filled with indescribable horrors. Things we cannot even imagine. And so are the history of others people, even in Star Trek: eugenics wars for humans, assimilation committed by the Borg, and so many weapons of massive destruction: metreon cascade, the planet killer, Tox uthat, metagenic weapons, harvesters, trilithium, thalaron radiations Xindi weapons etc. (http: //www.startrek.com/startrek/view/features/

specials/article/1672.html). But near these dark sides of the infinity, there are infinite combinations of meaning and beauty...

Infinite intellectual and spiritual nourishment. We are made of flesh and blood, but we are also intellectual and spiritual beings. Even if there many marvelous things on this Earth, someday, it certainly won't be enough. And for some of us, it is already not enough. So, we look at the stars, and we dream of all the nourishment our minds could find in this universe. In a universe of infinite diversity and of infinite combinations, we can much so learn, we can grow up, and find new fascinating things during our whole life. Most of all, we can find more and more questions, which get us to think always beyond, to surpass ourselves, to learn, and so to change. And this is a never ending story, as long as we live. And after, may be. Infinite hope. New difficulties, but also new solutions for old problems and new challenges. The first contact between humans and Vulcan brought many changes: new technologies, new cures, new solutions for old and future problems. And most of all, IDIC means the existence of an infinite number of life forms And as long as there is life, there is hope: there is a way for consciousness to still be transmitted, even if someday, the support of this transmission could be very different from us. And finally, infinite frontiers. We know now that the last frontier is not only space, but also time. Time is our last frontier, because we absolutely need more of it to prepare a better future and a better life for our descendants, to allow them to boldly go when no one has gone before. And what will be the final frontiers for them? I cannot imagine them, being only a human of the 21st century, but I hope that they will be as interesting and fascinating as space and time were for us.

Why did I write so many lines about negatives infinites and only a few for positives ones? The answer is logical: because, in this universe, we are a very young species, still in the kindergarten of the solar system. And the infinite joys of the future mainly belong to the humans to come. Remember what Picard said to Lily, at the end of First contact: "I envy you." I also envy them and I hope they will write the most beautiful pages of human history.

And to conclude this essay, I send to Gene Roddenberry, my infinite thanks.

### Medical Meanderings

Greetings from the Fleet Medical office! I'm getting used to my new desk chair here and like it pretty well. This office even has a spot for me to set up a knitting corner. My offering for this issue of the CQ is an interesting meander into the history of something we're all familiar with. Many of us have seen it often enough - if only on television shows - that we feel we could do it in our sleep. That familiar sight of someone doing chest compressions on an unconscious victim. It's that amazing "invention" of CPR cardiopulmonary resuscitation, which uses chest compressions on a clinically "dead" or lifeless person, to force blood to circulate out of the heart, and rescue breaths to put oxygen into the lungs and thus into the circulating blood. This keeps oxygen-containing blood going to the brain and other vital organs, to temporarily keep them alive until definitive help arrives. Many people have taken CPR training and some have even used it.

CPR isn't hard to learn. It's something you hope you'll never need, but something good to have, just in case. Like that extra set of batteries and flashlight, a storm shelter, or an emergency stash of disaster supplies and water in the basement. But it's surprising how long it took for this technique to be invented, and amazing how many other "rescue remedies" were employed to revive people before we had CPR.

When was CPR invented? Does it really work that well? What if you do it wrong? What can we do to make it work even better?

A stroll with me down history's lane will take you way back to about 800 BC, where the account of Elijah's resuscitation of a lifeless child in the Bible could be interpreted as

mouth to mouth breathing. From then to medieval times, to the 1700s, to as recently as the 1900s, many different methods were used to try to restore breath to a lifeless person.

The most frequent reason these methods were employed, apparently, was drowning. Some things were seemingly sensible, like rolling the person back and forth over a barrel, hanging them upside down, warming the cold body by placing it in warm sand, a warm bath, or lighting a fire nearby, forcing air into the mouth with a fireplace bellows, or trotting them around laid across the back of a horse.

Then there were the somewhat less intuitive methods such as rhythmic tongue stretching, tickling the throat with a feather, packing the victim in ice or snow, whipping to stimulate a response, blowing tobacco smoke into <ahem> a body orifice, or bloodletting.

It seems the components of CPR were employed separately at first, and only relatively recently were combined into CPR. Chest compressions are reported as being first used (according to different sources) in 1891, 1903, and 1950's to 1960's. Mouth to mouth, or rescue, breathing was first used, according to one source, by the French in 1740, while another source dates the first mouth to mouth usage as after the 1950s. That is, I suppose, if you don't count Elijah breathing into that child and waking him way back BC. By the 1950s it was deduced that mouth to mouth worked because the rescuer's expired air still has enough oxygen in it to benefit the victim. Finally in the 1960s, chest compressions and breaths were combined into CPR and this was developed for use in the healthcare and military fields, and less than a decade later various agencies (such as the American Red Cross and the American Heart Association in the US) began a campaign of educating the public about the lifesaving benefits of CPR and making training available. According to www.americanheart.org, the first mass citizen training in CPR in the world was held in Seattle, Washington in 1972, The AHA and the ARC by this time had developed committees and training standards for CPR for the public and had begun to implement them. These standards are periodically updated and - uhh, standardized - across all agencies within the US and much of the rest of the world.

By this time, of course, a major cause of sudden death in adults was no longer drowning, but heart disease. Survival rates for cardiac arrest (no pulse, no breathing) and subsequent CPR depended largely (and still do) on the rest of a chain of events that only begins with CPR. Nowadays we call this the "Cardiac Chain of Survival". More on this in a little.

In the 70s we had few citizens trained in CPR. It might not be started until trained ambulance or firefighting crews arrived the forerunners of our current EMS system. Remember that show "Emergency!"? It was at a time when training firefighters to perform emergency field medicine was a very new idea and not without opposition, in real life as well as in the show.

There were also few protocols and drugs in place in the early 70s for prehospital and even hospital care of cardiac arrest victims. We did have defibrillators - machines that shock the fibrillating, or quivering, heart. This "resets" the chaotic and nonproductive rhythm and restores a normal one. But time from collapse to when defibrillation was done was often many minutes, with these early, large, manually-applied machines. Survival rates were as low as 2 percent if defibrillation was delayed by 8-12 minutes from time of collapse. However, CPR (and subsequent advanced care) was still a remarkable tool to revive someone who, before CPR, had no chance at all. And the late 1970s brought about rapid development of the beginning of today's Emergency Medical Services system.

We know that the vital organs, such as the brain, begin to suffer irreversible cell damage after 4 to 6 minutes without oxygen. The sooner CPR is started, and the sooner advanced care is received, the better the chances of survival. Today we have the addition of automated external defibrillators. These AEDs are small, portable, and largely run themselves. They analyze a heart rhythm when a trained layperson -yeah, that's you - follows the pictured directions and applies the pads to the victim's chest. They have voice and visual prompts to tell you what to do, and they tell you when to push the button to administer a shock if the AED detects the need for it. They basically have two main buttons. One that says "ON", and a red or orange one with a lightning bolt or "SHOCK" on it. If you can read those two buttons, the prompts will tell you everything else and you can learn to use an AED in just a few hours

The great thing about AEDs, and putting them in all the places where groups of people congregate, is that they can double someone's chances of survival. Today, in the US alone, 225,000 people a year die from sudden cardiac arrest, half of them before reaching a hospital. When cardiac arrest happens, it's often from heart disease, and often it's an ineffective quivering of the bottom chambers or ventricles of the heart. This ventricular fibrillation, as I mentioned before, can quickly be shocked with a defibrillator back into a normal rhythm that effectively pumps blood. From hospitals where defibrillators are used within a couple minutes and survival rates from ventricular fibrillation are as high as 90 percent, this can drop with "average" usage in the community down to 10-20 percent survival. But there's no reason why we can't make survival rates in the community much higher.

This brings me back to the Cardiac Chain of Survival. According to the American Red Cross at www.redcross.org, it has four steps:

1. Early recognition and early access - the sooner someone calls 911, the better.

2. Early CPR - the more people in the community that are trained, the better.

3. Early defibrillation - the more AEDs in the community, and folks trained to use them, the better.

4. Early advanced life support - the sooner the EMTs and paramedics get there with drugs and IVs and such, the better.

For every minute defibrillation is delayed, survival drops by ten percent. So even when all the steps aren't done exactly right, recognizing that someone needs 911 and calling it is critical to getting the chain going. Chances are good that someone in shouting distance is going to be trained in CPR. You definitely want to be trained, so as not to over-reach yourself. That's how the Good Samaritan Law will protect you. It's active in all 50 US states. And ves. even if you don't do compressions or breaths exactly right, you're still helping the victim. Look at the alternative, after all!

But every link in the chain is important, and in sudden cardiac death the AED makes the biggest difference of all. Several things can contribute to delays in EMS response (that's that fourth link), such as resources stretched too thin, distance in rural areas, traffic congestion in urban areas, and confusion as to victim's location in a building. So it's that AED, and going to get trained, that makes a dramatic difference. So in the US, contact your local Red Cross or American Heart Association office and find out when the next course is being offered in your community.

This weekend I'll be participating in a "CPR Saturday", part of a national event where, like that first one in 1972, we train a large number of people in basic adult CPR. It's a free training where I'll be working with over a dozen other instructors, helping scores of people learn this lifesaving skill. (The volunteer instructors get free doughnuts and a T-shirt. I gotta admit that's a good reason to get up early on a Saturday.) Join us - keep your certification current!

We were deep into the science of Apollo while being entertained by the science-fiction of Star Trek. This synergism brought an energy to science that we could identify with. It provided a link between our intellect and our emotions:

You're a Vulcan science officer Your ship, the USS Explorer, has just entered the proximity of a newly-discovered solar system. The science station monitors are displaying a plethora of information as the long-range sensors focus on an unusual planet. With the ship entering orbit, your attention is riveted as the short-range scanners pour their data onto the monitors. Your razor-sharp mind digests the statistics on the atmosphere, geology, and radiative properties: Class-M, just barely! But odd discoveries are made, puzzling mysteries rise to the surface. The awe and wonder of this new world force you to employ your full range of Vulcan training to keep your excitement in check!

Or, you are an android science officer aboard the USS Clarke. The Clarke is

emanating from a quasi-stellar object dead ahead. Your positronic brain is processing at lightning speed data from the ship's sensors, working and reworking astrophysical formulae to see which set of equations best explain this unique wrinkling of spacetime. You were made for this: analyzing data, sleuthing the facts, drawing the only logical conclusions that will explain it all. And you're reveling in it!

We are inviting all Regional Science Officers, or the equivalent representative within the region, to nominate two members from their Region - an adult and a cadet - who they think have made an outstanding contribution to bringing Science to the membership within their Region during the calendar year 2004.

Contributions

Contributions could take one of many forms:

Science reportina in а Newsletter. Criteria taken into account in this category would include the originality, quality of writing, consistency and quantity of reports.

Organization of science events or "Away Teams." Judging criteria here would include originality, consistency & quantity of events, popularity of events.

Science reporting on a website. Consideration would be given here to originality, impact of website, consistency and quantity of material.

Science achievements of Cadets. A special award category will be considered to encourage the achievements of our junior members. Science achievements could include:

Science Fair Science 1 Competition involvement

School / Academic recognition Personal projects / experiments including kit building, models, animal husbandry, environmental involvement, etc

Details on Cadet Nominations

(The following suggestions are taken from the Region 14 proposal.) The cadet award should be seen as an encouragement award and as such a much wider definition of what is acceptable as "contributions to science" should be applied than in the adult award. It is to be hoped that this award will encourage Cadets to involve themselves more in SFI and Science activities in future International Judging Process years. Suggested activities that could count towards the Cadet award might include:

Written work or artwork, ideally submitted to SFI publications but, in its absence, schoolwork or amateur hobby work is welcome. The entrant's contribution could be one outstanding essay, or it could be a consistent body of work including their own work or teamwork such as classwork.

Hands-on work, for example taking part in "Away Missions" or other SFI science presentations or their own work, for example a science project, a science related hobby such as model aircraft making, chemistry or the environment.

Courses done to improve the entrant's knowledge on real world science subjects in Starfleet Cadet Academy and second to this academic recognition in the real world.

Contributions within SFI must be the main focus of the award; however, fostering an interest in science in the "Real World" is one of the goals of this award, so examples of excellence in any science related studies such as school awards or science fair prizes would be great. It need not be previously award recognized; it could be original amateur or hobby projects such as model making or photography.

The Regional Nomination Process

The regional nomination process is being left up to each individual region. How the Science RDC or regional science representative gets nominations will depend upon the regional situation; but we suggest that, working with the RC, you inform the Region's COs and ask if they had any chapter nominations.

A typical process which the RDC may wish to follow is listed below:

A. Approach the RC, giving him/her information about the awards, laying out a first draft proposal for his/her approval.

B. Upon agreement with the RC contact ships' COs with the second draft for their discussion.

C. Upon agreement with COs, the regional award program can be advertised.

D. Ships decide in their own fashion whom they want to nominate for the Adult and Cadet awards.

E. The entrants put together a nomination F. The Region decides upon a judge or judging panel

G. Give at least 2 months for nominations before judging begins

H. Give at least one month, maybe 2, for judging; when judging is completed the RC is told of decision.

I. RC announces winner, winner receives award. J. FRC Science told of regional result,

the regional winner is entered into the international judging process.

K. The nomination and judging schedule for the regions will need to be coordinated so that the international judging can be done at the same time.

The regional nomination and judging period will run over a 2 to 4 month period: the international judging will be done the following month, and the international winner will be announced on first of the next month. The international judging panel consists of Lt. Alan Anderton (judging topical impact), the FRC Science Director. Comm. Richard Heim (judging scientific content), and the Assistant Director, Cmdr. Nick Greene (judging stylistic content). Nominations should take the form of examples of work in MS Word, PDF format or HTML including links to online exhibits.

A. The only thing I bought was hiring Katie Kettelhut's talent of drawing. I wanted an anime style portrait of Chris, Sean, and me. I bid on many items, mostly for the sake of giving money to our charity cause. I did pick up a couple of cool items, like a neat Pirate role-playing game.

Q. How would you improve the whole weekend event?

A. I'd like to get a chance to run my own game. Better food on Friday night (the pizza at Austin's Park & Pizza sucked...).

Q. What did you like most about CoC/Fall Muster?

A. Meeting bunches of new people. Being with my friends!

Q. What did you like least about the CoC/ Fall Muster? A. Nothing.

worked on the Wall of Honor and the book that accompanies it have done an outstanding job. To stand in front of it and consider all the names, particularly those who are no longer with us, and think about their service, is truly inspirational. Now, on to TRACOM business. I had many fine applicants for the position of DCO-Academy, and it was a hard decision. Any of the applicants would have made a fine addition, but after much thought, I am pleased to announce that the position has been given to Greg Franklin. I believe his experience in SFA and the SFMCA and in other positions within the Corps make him the right candidate for this opening. For the time being, he will also be staying on as branch director for both Special Operations and Xeno-studies Jem'Hadar. If that changes, the openings will be announced and applications accepted at that time.

Lalso have the unfortunate duty to announce that Kyle Wolf has stepped down as Xenostudies Borg director. Real life is demanding more of his time, something to which I believe we can all relate. We are sorry to see him go, and wish him luck. I am now accepting applications to fill this vacancy, and will do so until May 6th. The requirements for this position are:

1) Be a current member in good standing of STARFLEET.

2) Be a member of the SFMC (active or reserve) while serving in this post.

3) Have taken OTS (but need not be an officer); OCC is recommended.but not required.

Have taken PD-10: PD-20 is recommended but not required; have taken XB-10 and XB-20 and be willing to complete XB-30 within 60 days of appointment.

In addition to administrating exams, this person will be expected to begin work on a new manual to accompany the courses, and expanding the number of XB courses offered. If you would like to apply, please send both a reallife and a Fleet/Corps resume to one of the addresses at the end of this column. With that, please also send ideas you may have for the manual and new courses.

Course traffic has picked up in the last two months, and we are very glad to see that. In January 36 separate students passed a total of 75 courses, and in February 58 separate students passed a total of 127 courses. In January 19 courses were passed with distinction and 25 with honors,



and in February 27 courses were passed with distinction and 37 with honors.

The Student of the Month for January, with a total of 7 courses passed was Christopher Bayonet. For February, the Student of the Month was Joe Butts, with a total of 17 courses passed. Congrats, Marines! I also want to congratulate the students who passed either a 30 or a 60 level course with honors or distinction, thus earning an Academic Excellence Award: Rey Cordero, Joost Ueffing (2), Jeff Schnoor, Greg Franklin, Sofyan Sahrom, and Patrick McAndrew.

In March, we rolled out one new course, MO-22, Basic Signals, Encryptions, and Codes and one revised course, MO-23, Basic Navigation and Seafaring. We now also offer a MO-23 re-certification course. specifically for those students who have previously taken MO-23 but would like to re-certify by answering only the newly added questions. If you are interested in these courses, please check the Maritime Operations section on the TRACOM page at www.sfi-sfmc.org. Currently, new courses are being written for Armor, Special Operations, and Xeno-studies. I hope to announce more courses in the next AOD.

Please, if you have an idea for a new course, we would be honored to hear from you. Contact the branch director for the branch in which the course would be, and he will be happy to discuss your idea. Not all proposals will be accepted, but all will be examined, and it is possible that if the proposal you submit is not quite right, it may lead to an idea for a different proposal.

Doctrine is also busy. Work is progressing on manual revisions in our College of Marine Development and in Special Operations. Also, we are continuing to work on the MOS Manual, and should have no problems meeting our goal of having that ready no later than IC. Here again, if vou have ideas for additions to manuals. contact a branch director. Many directors will be looking for a small team of people to assist with manual revisions, and this may be a way for more people to get involved with and assist TRACOM.

Look for TRACOM to have a presence at upcoming regional summits and conferences, including R1, R12, R13, and R15. Brigade Training Officers and other TRACOM staffers will be on hand to offer onsite testing. I encourage anyone attending these events to consider taking a course or two, especially if you are new and needing to take PD-10. # USS JURASSIC Away team mission

### (Or Field Day 2004)

### Captain's Log: Stardate: 06.26.04

[NOTE: For those our Radio. Field Day weekend is an international (North and South America) test of emergency Clubs and individuals preparedness. are challenged to pick a public spot, set up a radio station and make as many contacts as possible in a 24-hour period. The groups and individuals are graded on a point system and the results are published in the QST magazine (American Radio Relay League's magazine). The USS JURASSIC participates in this event every year. Besides being exhausting and serious, it's a lot of fun. Below is the report for 2004.]

As the Mighty Gorn (RADM Gary Donner) K8BE and I (ADM Carolyn Donner) N8ST prepared to lead the Away Team mission to Ash Ridge, OH, we made sure the shuttle was loaded with the equipment we would need. Other members of the USS JURASSIC would meet us at the landing point throughout the day. This would be a 2-day mission and much preparation had already gone into getting ready for it. Engineer Jerry Silman KB8PVY had secured the site for us, and even managed to find a local civilian who could climb the unused tower to place a pulley system and rope on it. This would be a big help when it was time to setup the antenna we would be using.

I had already secured the needed publicity by having our announcement placed in three local newspapers. These printed newspapers would serve to help us document our mission and let the locals know they were invited to attend any time during the weekend and participate if they choose to. In addition, the Mighty Gorn and I listened to and copied the special Field Day announcement from ARRL HQ from the W1AW station in Newington, CT. The publicity and the special announcement were each worth 100 bonus points to us.

The shuttle was loaded ...generator for power, radios, antennas, chairs, sleeping bags, food. It looked like we had remembered everything. I'm happy to say, unlike previous years, we DID remember everything we were supposed to bring as did everyone else. Things were going smoothly so far, but we hadn't left shuttle bay yet. Chief of Ops Steve Mirick arrived to board his shuttle just as we were getting ready to embark. We boarded our shuttle and headed east to our destination with Steve following close behind.

Upon arrival, Engineer Jerry and Medical officer Dot Silman KB8TQU who were working on setting up beautiful flowers for the botanical display and sale she was handling greeted us. We helped her move the final flowers to their designated spots towards the front of the building.

Soon other members arrived in their designated shuttles: Mike Lewallen KD8Q ran into a snag along the route and had to radio for new directions. It seems a semi tried to tackle a forest the night before and met with terrible consequences, causing a no fly zone to be placed over the site of the accident. Fortunately, Jerry knew the area well and talked Mike through a new route. Mike then did the same for several other members who were traveling the same route he had just taken.

Dennis Schwendemann (who lives in Bellevue, KY, but was actually returning from a trip to Huntington, WV), and AI Norris W8UJM arrived shortly afterwards. A brief meeting gave everyone time to have a donut and coffee before taking on their assignments. Dave Jones KC8YOY and Joy Jones KC8YOZ arrived in time to setup the food and cooking areas. In addition, if I might be so bold, I'd like to say, "WOW, can that guy cook!" Joy of course helped, but Dave handled the actual outdoor cooking over two camp stoves and a Dutch oven. My appreciation goes out to Dave and Joy for not only planning great meals, but also having them cooked on time, even dessert! YUMMY!!! [Captain's additional note: Dot and I had formulated a plan to distract Joy and steal Dave, but Joy got wind of it and explained that Dave has a self-destruct mechanism that goes off if he's ever stolen. We decided for the good of the mission and the ship to cancel our devious plans. <arin>1

The antenna crew got the antenna up in good time, despite one break in the antenna wire. We used an extremely long wire that stretched from the top of the 80 ft tower across about 160 feet to a tree on the other side of the parking lot and matched with a homemade balun. The antenna was good, but the chief engineer said, the balun didn't work right, so this is one area he wants to improve before next year. He already has some new ideas to try. Engineers are always looking for ways to make things better.

The tables were placed beside the building. Once the antenna was up, and we were sure the coax would reach the tables the radios and computers were brought out and setup. The HF radio and computers were ready to go on time so the Mighty Gorn asked the CO for the go ahead to turn them on. She of course said, "Make it so!" and they did. Almost as soon as things were running, the generator started acting up. Al was quick to the rescue and jumped in his shuttle. He returned a short time later with another generator that was quickly hooked up and we were on the air. Twenty meters tuned up the best so we started with that band I was on the microphone and Steve was on the computer logging. It was quickly obvious that we weren't going to find a free frequency to call CQ's, so we spent the rest of the day moving up and down the band answering other stations who were calling CQ. (CQ is amateur radio speak for "come quickly", or more loosely translated as "Is anyone out there who would like to talk to me?"). We started out slowly making contact after contact with other stations.

Another way of making some bonus points was to send out traffic messages over the air. I had set up an appointment on the 2-meter repeater with a friend to get our messages out. At 3:15 pm local time, I remembered the appointment that was for 3 pm. Unfortunately, the generator problems had forced the engineers' attention away from setting up the 2-meter radio, so I picked up my handheld 2-meter radio hoping it still had enough charge in the battery to get all the messages out. I gave a quick call to my friend Greg WG8Z (who was working Field Day from his home in Kentucky), hoping he was still listening for me. He was, so we proceeded to send him the very formal messages. One message

to our ARRL Section Manager Joe Phillips was worth 100 points. That went out first. Then 10 additional messages were went out to JURASSIC crew members and friends who couldn't make the trip to Brown County, OH (After all somebody has to keep the ship running while the rest of us are on the away team mission!) The 10 messages were worth 10 points each, giving us another 100 points, and helping Greg out because he would also get 100 points for sending the messages on over the local net during the evening. My handheld radio worked fine for this, except doing a lot of transmitting with a handheld radio causes the battery to get hot.

After a couple of messages sent out, I realized I was going to need help with this, so I yelled to Jerry to bring me his handheld radio so I could switch off from one to the other as the batteries heated up during transmission. This worked well.

Now we were back to the HF radio making more contacts on 20 meters. Joy had joined me to log during the traffic message sending, so stayed on to continue to log. Joy and I stayed at our posts for a couple more hours. Many visitors stopped by to see the operation, buy flowers from Dot, and help out with things. One visitor in particular came from the local newspaper (Brown County Press) to interview us and take some photos. He was very knowledgeable about both Star Trek and Amateur Radio (we're still trying to recruit him <grin>). Too soon, it was time for him to leave, but not before we gathered all the JURASSIC members and visitors behind the radios for a photo. He was nice enough to take one shot with my camera as well so we could have a copy.

[Captain's log addition: Two weeks later we were pleased to open the Brown County Press to the second page and find not only the photo of ourselves, but a full page (minus the ads) story about our weekend activities!]

After a while, we started taking turns at the microphone and logging. Jerry took the

microphone duties during the early evening and Steve helped with the Dave and Joy headed off logging. to their tent on the other side of the building about 10 pm so they could get up early to fix breakfast. Dot and Jerry left about midnight but came back early the next morning. Steve left about 2 am, mumbling something about needing to study so he could stay on the Dean's List at college - a task that we all agreed was important enough to dismiss him from the rest of the Away Team mission. Al left sometime during the late evening to go on a scouting mission with a couple of friends to see who else in the surrounding counties and Kentucky were also holding Field Day activities. I'm sorry to report that mission was not very successful. When they returned in the middle of the night, they reported they had visited at least three other sites and found only one occupied ...but everyone was asleep. That left Mike, Gary (Mighty Gorn) and me to handle the radio and logging for the rest of the night. [Note to myself: Have to organize the nighttime radio and logging duties better next year.] Nighttime would normally be the time to make CW (Morse code) and/or PSK31 (Digital mode) contacts as it's quieter than voice. These type contacts are important because voice contacts are worth only 1 point each, while CW and PSK31 contacts are worth 2 points each. Unfortunately, there was very little activity in these modes that we could hear from our site, so we stayed with the voice contacts as much as we could. Contacts usually thin out during the nighttime but we kept on. About 3 am, I finally went to the gym to take a nap with strict instructions for the Gorn and Mike to wake me in a couple of hours.

They ignored my instructions and I woke up about 6:30 am to find the Gorn as the only member who made it completely through the night without sleep. Mike had only gone to his assigned sleeping spot/bag about an hour before I got up. [Note to myself: Because of the nature of the mission, I decided they did what they considered best under the circumstances so have decided not to pursue disciplinary actions against them for disobeying the CO's orders <grin>.]

Sunday brought the welcome sun out to warm up the area after a very cold night as well as bringing Jerry, Dot, and Al back to the site. The radio and logging duties were again shared with others, but Mike was challenged to get the total contact number over 100, so kept at it as much as possible and I'm happy to report that he made it. We ended the radio contacts at 2 pm local time with 103 contacts total. That was about 20 more than last year so everyone was happy to hear that.

The final activity of the mission was to take down all the equipment and antennas and pack them back into the shuttles they arrived. I'm not sure how this works but there is probably a formula for it somewhere, but it always seems that equipment and gear packed up much faster than they were unpacked. Well, whatever the formula is, we were packed up, had the site straightened up and were heading back for JURASSIC HQ by 4 pm and back into the shuttle bay by 4:30. We were tired so just unpacked what had to be put away and left the rest in the shuttle for unpacking another day. A guick sonic shower, a sandwich for supper, and we were off to sleep off the weariness of the weekend

# **Richard Biggs Memorial Event**

The memorial fundraising event for late actor Richard Biggs was a lot of fun! The event was held on March 19th at the Beverly Garland Holiday Inn in Studio City, CA. There were two sessions: one was a breakfast in the morning, and then in the afternoon there was an autograph and photo session.

For those who are unfamiliar with who Rick was, he played Dr. Marcus Hunter on Days of Our Lives from roughly 1987 to 1991 (I don't remember the exact dates) and then played Dr. Stephen Franklin on Babylon 5 in the late 1990s. I had a special connection to him because way back in those days when he was on Days of Our Lives, I used to run his fan club. So I've known him since then. He died suddenly last year of an aortic aneurysm. He was only 44 and left a wife and two young boys. This event was a fundraiser for his two sons, RJ and Hunter.

There were also some actors from Days of Our Lives, some of whom have gone on to other things such as Lisa Howard (Earth Final Conflict), Mindy Clark (The OC and Buffy), and George Jenesky (AKA Conrad Dunn). George looked great and I spoke to him for a little while. You may remember him from the movie Stripes (he played Psycho) and also Alien Nation. He recognized me from the old "Days-days" right away so that was cool. Also Stephen Nichols (Days & General Hospital) and Matthew Ashford (Days, GH, Search for Tomorrow, etc.) were there, both whom I had known back in my Soap Opera fandom days.

The event was kind of a weird mix, because most of the fans were Soap Opera fans, but most of the celebrities were from Babylon 5! I think I was one of the few, if not the only one, who was a fan of both! Lots of my old soap fan friends were asking me who all the other actors were.

Some of the actors spoke a little bit about Richard and had some cute stories about him. Melissa Gilbert's story was pretty funny. She said that science fiction wasn't really her thing, and that she had never done it before until she was offered the part of Sheridon's wife. "We don't get a lot of spaceships on the prairie." That got a big laugh! Which at first really surprised Melissa, but then she laughed and it was kind of an icebreaker. After that, she wasn't nervous about being on the show anymore. What could be more embarrassing than a question like that? There was nothing more to be embarrassed about!

Jason Carter, who is always a bit hyper, was chasing Bruce & Melissa's son around the room, pretending to try to pop all his balloons! We thought the kid would float away because he had so many helium balloons! Jerry Doyle, who'll say and do just about anything (lots of "colorful metaphors") helped with the live auction of B5 items, along with his assistant Melissa Gilbert.

# SAVE STAR TREK: HISTORY WILL NOT FORGET THE NAME "ENTERPRISE"



We came. We came from as far away as Great Britain and Australia and as nearby as West Hollywood. We were from states as diverse as Vermont, Arizona, Tennessee, Illinois, Texas, and Nevada. We were as young as 8 months and old enough not to want to share our age when asked. We were Black and White, Hispanic and Asian, tall and short, thin and not-so-thin, male and female. But we all shared one thing in common: we wanted "Star Trek" to continue!

Hundreds of fans came to the Paramount Studio front gate at 5555 Melrose Avenue in Hollywood starting at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, February 25. Among these fans were three current members of the U.S.S. Angeles: Gloria Rodriguez, Goldie Frankel, and myself. Inside the legendary film studio, work was beginning on what will likely be the last new episode of "Star Trek: Enterprise", and the last original filmed "Star Trek" of any kind that we are likely to see for at least a few years.

The fans came out to protest the cancellation of "Star Trek: Enterprise" after only four seasons (the last three Trek television series--"Star Trek: The Next Generation", "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine", and "Star Trek: Voyager" all aired for a complete seven seasons). Indeed, there has been at least some kind of weekly "Star Trek" television series in production continuously during every season dating back through 18 years. And if you count the motion pictures, "Star Trek" has been in some kind of production mode going all the way back to 1977!

So why stop now? The decision was made by the executives at Viacom, the parent company of Paramount Television and UPN, and specifically, the fateful decision to cancel has been credited to Leslie Moonves, President of Viacom and head of CBS. Moonves wasn't trying to decrease competition for CBS; that network is consistently on top of the Nielsen ratings race. But the United Paramount Network (UPN) is struggling and always has struggled to find the right audience. Initially launched with the series "Star Trek: Voyager" back in 1995, UPN tried to set itself up as a strong science fiction provider with such series as "Time Trax", "Seven Days", and "The New Twilight Zone". UPN also tried to capture a younger audience with World Wrestling. Still struggling, UPN then aimed itself toward African Americans with a number of urban sitcoms. Most recently, UPN has seen some success with the reality show

"America's Next Top Model." But in general, UPN is still struggling to hold its own among the major networks.

All this time, "Star Trek" has been airing in the form of "Voyager" and then "Enterprise." But ratings fell steadily and consistently, a little at a time, and even the fresh, new prequel series "Enterprise" failed to generate excitement or a ratings revitalization. Some fans blamed a competitive time slot on Wednesday nights. Others blamed a lack of originality in the scripts and bland acting. Still others complained that Paramount and UPN were doing little to market and promote the series. By the end of the third season of "Star Trek: Enterprise", danger of cancellation was guite real. Although a season-long story arc dealing with a 9-11 type attack against Earth by the Xindi had revived the creative energy of the series, ratings continued to slump. As the third season neared completion, an 11th hour decision gave the series a fourth season with the intention of reaching 100 episodes, enough for a syndication package of reruns to local television stations.

But "Enterprise" would face an even greater challenge in its fourth season. In addition to budget cuts, its time slot was shifted to Friday nights at 8:00...a virtual death sentence in television scheduling. As bad as Wednesdays were, Friday nights proved to be insurmountable. Combined with a very noticeable lack of promotional support, the ratings for "Enterprise" dropped to their lowest levels ever in season four (although, ironically, these were better ratings than UPN had generated in that Friday night time slot during any of its previous years).

But the writing was on the wall, and the decision to cancel the series was announced in early February, 2005. Had the decision been made a year or two earlier, fans might not have been quite as upset. Many had thought it was time to give the franchise a rest. But something amazing had happened during the fourth season. New creative people were brought in, and day-to-day control of operations was handled over from Rick Berman and Brannon Braga (who had been involved with overseeing "Star Trek" almost continuously for almost a decade) to newcomer Manny Coto. Coto, along with Mike Sussman and new writers Garfield and Judith Reeves-Stevens and others, brought the series to a new creative renaissance. Many fans who had stopped watching the series out of boredom and frustration suddenly took notice again and started filling up Internet chat rooms and blog pages with excited reviews and eager gossip. "Star Trek" was revitalized as Manny Coto drew from nearly 40 years of episodes (dating back to 1966) for storylines, settings, and characters. The freshness that fans were craving, the return to the "roots" of "Star Trek" ... all this was happening during the fourth season of "Enterprise."

And then, it was suddenly over. Fans around the world were shocked, speechless, and incredulous. How could Viacom cancel "Star Trek"? Would it ever come back? What about the promise of seeing the formation of the United Federation of Planets during the final three seasons of "Enterprise"? Will Paramount just give up on "Star Trek" and let it die?

Paramount and Viacom assured the fans that "Star Trek" was not dead. It would come back again, but after a much-needed rest for the viewing public and for the franchise itself... and after a new development team could be assembled to create a fresh concept. But some fans weren't convinced. Could the "patient" be resuscitated after two or three years... or longer?

Some fans went so far as to rally the troops. Web sites like TrekUnited.com and SaveEnterprise.com tried many creative approaches. One site raised almost \$15,000 in donations to place a full-page ad in "The Los Angeles Times" urging fans of "Enterprise" to write to Leslie Moonves and to the heads of Paramount Television

and the Sci-Fi Channel, trying to encourage at least a fifth season of the series either on UPN or elsewhere.

And one fan, Tim Brazeal from Tennessee, went so far as to organize a protest demonstration in front of Paramount Studios in Hollywood. Originally scheduled for March, the timetable was hastily moved earlier when it was discovered that "Enterprise"'s last episode would start filming on February 25, and most of the sets would be dismantled by the second week of March.

And so fans came to Hollywood, with creative signs that said "What would Kirk do?", "Don't make the same mistake you made back in 1969", "Nielsen Schmielson!", "18 years of loyalty and this is the thanks I get?", "Enterprise saved Earth, now let's save Enterprise", and many more. Some signs were meticulously handcrafted, while others were the product of a black magic marker and colored construction paper. But all were united in their goal: Save Star Trek!

At maximum, perhaps 200 fans were present at any one time, with another 100 or so coming and going during the day. Some stayed from 8:30 a.m. through 4:00 p.m. or later, others could only donate a few hours of their time. But even by the "end" of the day, over 25 fans were still standing in front of Paramount's gates. Several news crews came during the morning to cover the rally, including KABC Channel 7, KTLA Channel 5, local AM radio station 640, and Reuters News Service. Also in attendance was Larry Nemecek, editor of the "Star Trek Communicator", there to interview fans and staffers and photograph the history-making event

The demonstration was orderly, and actually quite fun. Organizer Tim Brazeal


obtained city permits, and LAPD officers were stationed across the street and at the gate. Paramount also supplied some security personnel of their own, but for the most part, the cops and guards were enjoying the fans' show of support. There was friendly chit-chat and joking with security and cops, and fans remained respectful of cars driving through the gate.

There was an almost continuous procession of honking as passing motorists shared their support. Cars, SUVs, busses, 18-wheelers, even a UPS van and a Brinks armored truck honked as they drove past. Many people driving into Paramount would give fans a Vulcan salute or thumbs up. Site-seers on passing tour busses would snap photos of the fans with their signs, certain to have

fun stories to tell the folks back home. Even a motorcycle cop riding by gave fans a guick Vulcan salute!

The only odd thing that happened was around 10:00 a.m. when a half dozen folks in "Star Wars" outfits showed up and started wandering among the "Star Trek" fans. The assembled Trek fans had been advised by Tim Brazeal not to wear costumes or uniforms in order to appear more serious about our protest and not look like a displaced "Star Trek" convention. It turned out that these "Star Wars" fans (two Storm Troopers, Darth Vader, an X-wing pilot and two Jedi) had been planted there by the news crew from the G4 network (formerly known as Tek TV). The news crew wanted to see some confrontations and reactions from the Trek fans, so they called up these "Star Wars" folks and asked them to drive in from Riverside (about 90 minutes) for the "confrontation." But the joke was on the news crew as no confrontation ever happened. The Storm Troopers and Jedi mingled with the crowd in what looked like a show of solidarity with fellow fans. And even giving Darth Vader a bullhorn to "taunt" the fans from a passing vehicle didn't produce much more than a shrug (as Darth wasn't all that eloquent). I overheard the news producer from G4 saying that they would probably just dub in Darth saying something nastier when they edited the footage, since they had the video of Darth with the bullhorn and you couldn't see his lips moving...so he could be saving anything they wanted him to. I hope they enjoy their creative news coverage.

More fun was had by the Trek fans as various members of the "Star Trek: Enterprise" production staff came out to see the protest. Executive Producer Manny Coto and Producer Mike Sussman came out--along with the Reese-Stevens and several other producers--and greeted fans. Other folks from the "Star Trek" art department, accounting office, make-up department, and even the music and sound editors came out a few at a time on staggered "coffee breaks" to see this historical moment. Everyone from the staff was very thankful to the fans for trying so hard to keep the series on the air (and keep them employed). In turn, the fans applauded anyone who said they worked on the show.

At one point, Manny Coto took a mega-phone and talked to the fans. "'Star Trek' fans are the greatest fans in the whole world. Don't ever let anyone tell you anything different. This is a great show, it's a great franchise. It will continue. People are hearing what you're saying here today and I want you to know that we appreciate it, the writers appreciate it, the actors, everyone who works on the show knows what you've done, knows what your passion is for the show...and it really means a lot. So, thank you very much for coming out today."

Later on, Eugene "Rod" Roddenberry, the son of "Star Trek" creator Gene Roddenberry, addressed the crowd, as well. He called the low ratings for the series "nonsense" and went on to encourage the crowd. "I don't want up two large garbage bags to collect the you guys to give up. I want you guys to keep fighting for this. I'll tell you what, even if 'Star Trek' lays low now, it will come back again. Star Trek' will never die. You guys will never let it die." Rod finished by saying that the entire Roddenberry family would always be there for the fans, helping "Star Trek" stay alive and greeted all the fans as personally as well. Rod had also brought along his own film crew to record the rally for a documentary



(Ensign Anthony Montgomery Travis Mayweather). While most of the 'Enterprise" castmembers were already in costume and make-up (and couldn't come out to the street in the hot sun), Anthony Montgomery took a few minutes to greet the fans and thank them for all their support.



Yep, that guy with the camera was none other than actor J.G. Hertzler, who played the Klingon Martok on several seasons of "Deep Space Nine" as well as some other Star Trek roles. He came by just to see the protest and video tape the fans. (Hertzler loves the fans.) Earlier on, actor Jeffrey Combs, who plays the Andorian Shran on "Enterprise"

called TrekNation that he and his company, Roddenberry.com, are putting together.

Although it was overcast for much of the morning, it didn't rain, and the clouds kept it comfortably cool. However, shortly before noon, the sun started coming out and fans were getting hot and dehydrated. Suddenly, a small maintenance cart rolled through the gate and two Paramount food servicemen proceeded to unload eight crates of bottled water for the fans. "Compliments of Mr. Coto" the delivery men said. They even set plastic bottles to recycle later.

Just after lunch time, fans were treated to a surprise appearance by actor Anthony Montgomery who plays helmsman Travis Mayweather on "Enterprise". Montgomery could, shaking countless hands, he giving dozens of hugs, and even tripping backwards over a dog leash while trying to take a picture with a fan from Las Vegas. Montgomery thanked the fans for all their support and told everyone that what we were doing meant so much to the people inside who work so hard on the show.

Other actors poked their heads out briefly, as well, including Jeffrey Combs, who plays Shran on "Enterprise", and John G. Hertzler, whom fans will remember as Klingon General Martok on "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine". Hertzler ran through the crowd with a video camera taping fans and their creative signs, and then he hung out for an additional 20 minutes signing autographs.

Toward the end of the day, fans who stuck around saw three more Trek actors drive through the gate. Dominic Keating (Lt. Malcolm Reed), Marina Sirtis (Counselor Deanna Troi of "The Next Generation") and Jonathan Frakes (Commander Riker of "The Next Generation"). Marina Sirtis actually got out of her car to chat briefly with the fans Sirtis and Frakes where there to appear in the final episode of

"Enterprise", tying the prequel series into its sci-fi future.

Unfortunately for now, however, "Star Trek" has a very indefinite future. Fans were hopeful but realistic about the chances for a sudden stay of execution for "Enterprise". Organizer Tim Brazeal commented, "I think we were successful today. I was hoping we'd have 3,000 people, but 300 isn't bad at all. We certainly got the attention of Paramount's security department! I was worried we'd just have five people show up for ten minutes and then leave. But this was really something." Brazeal went on to comment that he'd been told that a similar Save Star Trek rally in New York City had drawn about 100 people in six inches of snow! He was going to check to see if any other demonstrations had gone on, including one that was supposed to happen in London.

As I walked back to my car, I thought about what we had accomplished this day. Had we saved "Star Trek"? It's hard to say. Even if this turns out to be the swan song for "Enterprise", I could see a pitch to the Paramount executives in two or three years going something like this: "Remember when we canceled 'Enterprise' and all those fans stood in front of the gate for eight hours? It shows that 'Star Trek' is still viable." That will be our legacy from today. It might not be more that a one-sentence reference in a quick creative pitch, but it will carry its weight. No other television show has ever done what "Star Trek" has -- stay on the air for almost forty years, spawn ten major motion pictures, produce over 650 hours of filmed footage, support a billion dollar licensing franchise, and become so widely known around the world that almost anyone would recognize the Vulcan hand salute.

But more importantly, today we said a special "thank you" to some very hardworking people. Imagine getting fired from your job and then walking out of your office to see a hundred people with signs saying you should stay employed, that you've done great work and produced a wonderful product. Imagine the pride and joy you would feel to hear people applaud you at your workplace for the great job you did, whether it was writing a musical score, sewing costumes, putting on makeup, writing scripts, creating background computer displays, or even keeping the financial books balanced. Today we gave a gift back to the people who have given us such a wonderful gift all of these years. And it was a day that all of us--fan and production staff alike--will always remember.

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# Find the Excitement in Trek

The Mirror Universe is not your ordinary Trek. With the current state of Trek however, these are not ordinary times. Now more than ever, Trek fans, and specifically STARFLEET members, should take a long, hard look at the Mirror Universe.

In recent Communiqués, Pamela Fernsler of the STARFLEET Diplomatic Corps, and Scott Akers wrote articles talking about the future of Trek, as well as the future of Sci-Fi fandom in general. In Pam's article, she talks about how Sci-fi came into being, starting with the Buck Rogers and Flash Gordon serials in the 1930s and 1940s and continuing through the B-movies in the 1960s. She describes how many fan clubs sprang up during the 1970s and how one club — STARFLEET — became one of the largest.

are limited directions for story lines and roleplaying. There is nothing new to talk about, no direction that you can go that is some way hasn't been taken before.

And if you believe that, you would be wrong. STARFLEET has much to offer as long as you don't limit yourself to what some perceive as "canon" Trek.

With that in mind, let me now blow the horn for the I.S.S. Hail the Empire! Remember how exciting it was that we finally got to see the "evil" side of James T. Kirk (outside of conventions)? Remember how it left you wanting more? Remember Star Trek: Deep Space Nine and the Intendant? Sisko sneaking around and Garak being more smarmy than normal? That's what STARFLEET needs: more aggression, more paranoia, MORE WEAPONS! STARFLEET needs something that will breathe life into it.

Does your ship have a cloaking device? The ISS Pegasus does. Does your ship have pulse cannons and cruise missiles? The ISS Lexington does. Does your ship have a cute three-headed pupp? The ISS Kerberos does. Do you know why we have all of these wonderful toys? Because there aren't any books or movies saying that we can't!

Think about it: from the very first show through Star Trek: Nemesis, the canon of

donor is that there is a longer waiting period between donation periods. With a regular blood donation you are required to wait 8 weeks between blood donations. With double red cell donations the time is doubled to 16 weeks. This is ideal for blood donors whole only like to donate once or twice a year. This reduces the amount of times a blood donor has to travel to the donor center. One advantage for the patient is that the recipient of the blood donation receives two units of red blood cells from the same donor rather than one. This reduces the risk of post-transfusion compilations that sometimes happens when receiving blood from multiple donors. The final advantage and quite possibly one of the biggest is that the double red cell donation has a greater impact on the blood supply, which is quite often at a critical level, especially with certain blood times like type O and B. Double red cell donation is not currently available in all areas, so please check to with your local blood donor center to see if they are setup to collect double reds. In New England the following donor centers are able to collect double reds: Burlington, Vermont: Bangor, Maine; Braintree, Middleboro and Boston, Massachusetts

A few days after the blood drive I received a letter in the mail from the American Red Trek has been written. You can't give a ship cruise missiles since no ship in Fleet ever had any. # THE XENOARCHAEOLOGIST Starships as characters in the star trek Universe by RADM David E. Klingman • USS Jaguar, R13

I'd like to continue my series of commentaries on science fiction by reflecting on "characters" from the Star Trek universe that we often either neglect or don't even consider: the starships that we've come to know and love!

The obvious "character" that we have seen in many forms is, of course, the USS Enterprise, which has been seen in at least seven incarnations, starting with NX-01 and continuing through NCC-1701 and NCC-1701A up to the "current" version, the Sovereign Class NCC-1701E. I'm fascinated by the thought that the Enterprise has been such an important piece in every Star Trek movie and television show, save perhaps for Deep Space Nine and Voyager, though one can still find mention of either the USS Enterprise or its crew in each of these series.

It seems at first to be a no-brainer. One has to think that the very names of the shows – Enterprise, Deep Space Nine and Voyager – underline the importance of the ships as integral characters in the various series. In addition, we can see this approach in other science fiction shows, such as Battlestar Galactica and Babylon 5. The point, of course, is how the writers and producers of these shows breathe a life into what should be nothing more than spaceships.

My pondering on this has led me to wonder if these starships have personalities. Are they characters in their own right? Are they, perhaps, composites of the crews that breathe life into them? We'll look at them in this article; after you read my thoughts, I invite you to come to your own conclusions.

Star Trek: Enterprise, though arguably the biggest failure of a series in some peoples' eyes, does, in fact, have a certain 'uncertain' personality that I think was either intended (or maybe just an accident) and secondary to its time period, unseasoned crew, and relatively low level of technology. The existence of this uncertainty is perhaps what turned some people off. We were so used to seeing well-developed characters (particularly in the original series, Deep Space Nine and The Next Generation) that perhaps shows like Enterprise and Voyager lacked this strength of character and, ultimately, seemed less appealing.

NCC-1701/1701A and NCC-1701D and E, on the other hand, benefited from having stronger crews. There seemed to be a certain bravado to NCC-1701 and NCC-1701A, and a refinement to NCC-1701D, that reflected their crews. I also have to admit that the ship in the original series shared a certain level of campiness that went along with the cheesiness of the special effects. Likewise, Enterprise-D seemed to be more of a cruise ship or a luxury liner at the command of the refinements of Captain Picard. But both shows worked for what they were and the ships just felt right on the camera. However the ship and the crew appeared to be mismatched on Voyager; I saw it as a disconnect between Janeway and her somewhat fragmented crew, and what should have been a very refined, state-of-the art, spaceship.

Personally, I think the best connection of people and places as characters was found on Star Trek: Deep Space Nine. Its brooding, dark, often dysfunctional atmosphere worked extremely well with its equally brooding, dark, often dysfunctional people and the times in which they lived. It seemed the right place from which to stage the conflict with the Dominion, much more than would have been the case with, say, an Ournal Class Spacedock.

So, for me, the enjoyment of watching the places as characters in the story, as much as watching the people, is what draws me to these shows.

Let me say also that I like every Star Trek show that's been on the air: Star Trek: The Original Series for its certain level of cheesiness mixed with strong character and stories; The Next Generation for its level of refinement and development of a more expansive universe; Deep Space Nine for its "real" feel and a certain level of grittiness of place, time, people, and story; Voyager for, at the very least, some very interesting aliens and potential that may have fallen short of its maximum level of excellence and, most recently, Enterprise for its attempt to take us back to some beginning.

Do I have any favorite starships? Of course! I've always found either visual or technological appeal in the Excelsior, Defiant, and Prometheus-class vessels. It's mostly an aesthetic issue for me, though I've also enjoyed the stories that went with these ships.

Some of you may know that the fiction that we write aboard the USS Jaguar is as heavily steeped in ships and in locations and time as it is in people and character. We've generally come to think of ourselves as something of "owners" in the period and places after the Next Generation/Deep Space Nine/Voyager era. With the recent developments in the Deep Space Nine series of novels, which currently push into 2376, we express in the beginning of our storylines a desire to develop a continuing universe laid down by these shows, and my role in this fiction has been to develop character sets and places to "play" in the fictional universe of the 2380s and 2390s Therefore, we've created our own unique set of characters, which include starships.

Joost Ueffing, Scott Akers, and I have been developing a set of vessels that we feel reflect the character of the times we "live" in" and what we envision as a "modern" Starfleet, populated by various battleships, state-of-the-art exploratory cruisers, and new classes of starships. Therefore, we've created a 14th Fleet composed of, among others, Sovereign, Crusader and Frontier Class Heavy Cruisers; Akira and Eximius Class Battlecruisers; Ambassador and Galaxy Class Explorers; Intrepid, Nebula and Excelsior Class Cruisers; Prometheus Class Tactical Cruisers; Steamrunner and Freedom Class Destroyers; Rapier Class Combatants; Norway, Cantell and New Orleans Class Frigates; Saber and Defiant Class Escorts; Nova Class Surveyors; LeJuene and Puma Class Surveyors; LeJuene and Puma Class Combat Transports; and the Excalibur Class Space Control Vessel. As you may be able to tell by our choices, our ships are as much a part of our story (a somewhat dark and combative time post-Dominion War) as the people we play and the places to which they go.

The notion that characters are SO important to stories is evident in our heavily-developed cast list, which includes all the people and all the starships that have appeared in our stories (http://www.angelfire.com/nc2/sardis/index\_2377-2399.doc). I encourage everyone to take a look, particularly those interested in writing similar stories and those who may be interested to know how we develop names for our characters. After all, names are important, aren't they?

For example, Enterprise itself says a lot about what we've all been talking about for almost 40 years as Gene Roddenberry's vision of the future and what we speculate was supposed to be his concept for a "wagon train to the stars." We can look at many of the starships we've seen – Voyager, Intrepid and others – as part of this same vision. We can even see names such as Defiant, which speak to the darker picture painted in a show like Deep Space Nine. We've used a similar dynamic in thinking of the names, particularly of the ships, in our character development.

Alien names tend to sound very alien; take for example, a name like "Taran'atar" used to describe a Jem'Hadar rather than something generic like "Bob." Similarly, the names I've chosen (as part of my job as Jaguar's Ops Chief and Fiction Coordinator) reflect some type of epic feel to our fiction. Therefore, I've often chosen often mythological names or names of individuals of historic or military significance. If you look up some of the names in our cast list, you'll get a glimpse into history, science, medicine, and military heroes among other things).

The point? I hope this article will encourage you to think about which ships you like and why. Be imaginative, be creative and dream. While Star Trek may be going off the air, there are still a lot of ways that we can talk about it, think up new adventures for familiar characters, and think of the "future's future." So keep imagining!
