



Greetings, STARFLEET,

This is Brigadier K'moghjIH zantai-Ki'RK again with news about the picnic that the infamous USS Inferno had planned for nine months. We had eight of the Inferno's crew there and proudly displayed our STARFLEET flag hoping that ships or crews from around the Fleet or Region 7 might show up as well if they saw the flag.

We had the grove reserved way back in August 2004 for a June 2005 picnic. We got the last grove available for that date that had electricity. We did all of the planning during the month of August and submitted our bid for the Region picnic at that time. On the actual day of the picnic, events did not go exactly according to plan, but we had fun trying to cope with The USS Inferno's sister ships, the the disparity between the plan and the implementation. The away team assigned to acquire the food provisions got lost locating the grove. The cooking grills that were supposed to be there were taken out years ago due to vandalism, but this information did not get transmitted to the Permit Office. We had to send out a second away team to acquire cooking grills to cook the food. We had more food than we could eat because we had planned for about a dozen extra people that we hoped might show up.

We had nobody from outside the ship attend even after heavy advertisement

and we went \$100 over budget. We had eight crewmembers attend and a donation of \$20 from a SFI member in Illinois. That gave us \$100 to work with. The food went \$10 over that, the grove reservation was \$55, and we had to buy two grills at the last minute. I think that if more people would have shown up, we would have been fine. The attendees spent the afternoon watching Star Trek episodes, throwing Frisbee, taking a walk, observing the scenery, playing Scrabble and Risk, or just listening to music or Comedy.

We are planning a July 4th celebration with details to follow. We are also planning another camping trip (Not an official Wilderness Challenge) for July 29-31 at Cooks Forest, PA. Anyone in STARFLEET is welcome to attend. Let the Captain or XO know if you are interested in attending.

When five members of the USS Rubicon decided to attend the 2005 STARFLEET International Conference in San Antonio, TX, they did not expect to come home with one of the highest awards in Fleet: 2004 Chapter of the Year.

This award caps more than 10 years of hard work and commitment for the Rubicon's membership. The chapter, located in the Tri-Cities (Richland, Kennewick, and Pasco) in the southeastern corner of Washington State, began in 1992 with five members and has grown to nearly 50 members. As one of its founding members, I have seen many ups and downs in my time, but this has to be the best feeling I have had during my service.

The Rubicon was founded by a group of fans that regularly attended conventions and movie premieres, while providing some community service along the way. Each year, we celebrate the anniversary of our commissioning — September 25,

In February, our chapter hosts the Region 5 Summit, which is held at RadCon, a local science fiction and fantasy convention. While at RadCon, we also host panel discussions, a Sci-Fi movie marathon room, special effects movie room, and our famous Star Trek Jeopardy.

The Rubicon also hosts many chapter events throughout the year, including Christmas and New Year's Eve parties, potluck dinners, mini-golf tournaments, camping events, premiere parties for Sci-Fi series and movies, and cliffhanger parties for final episodes. (I hate those because you have to wait to see the ending!) All of these activities help us keep an "even keel" and let us have fun.

Our community service projects are perhaps one of the most important aspects of our chapter. Founding member Lea Morgan heads up our Community Affairs Programs, leading us in support of numerous events, including: A number of our members have served, and continue to serve Region 5, where

Did you know that there are real Star Trek coins? They're from the Republic of Liberia, which is in Africa. Liberia's flag is like ours, but they have one big star. The capital is Monrovia, named for James Monroe. Liberia is 96,320 sq km and it is slightly larger than Tennessee. They have 3,390,635 people. The median age is only 18.1 years, and they only live for 47.93 years. They speak English. The average person earns \$1,000 a year.

These coins were made in 1997 and each is worth one dollar. Each coin has a picture from Star Trek: The Next Generation. The front of each coin has the shield of Liberia. The coins are all made of copper nickel – 75% copper and 25% nickel. I'm going to show you the designs of the coins! I just wanted to let you know that I took the pictures and fixed them so they look cooler and better!

STARFLEET RETENTION & RECRUITING

The 2005 STARFLEET Recruiting Contest has ended, and the results were announced at the International Conference. The winning chapters, those showing the greatest membership count growth from 1/1/2005 until the end of June 2005, were: The USS Relentless and USS Hood, with growth of 15 members; the USS Pioneer with 16 members; the USS Anasazi, with 17 members, and the USS Rogue Phoenix and USS Hephaestus, with 18 members. Congratulations to each of them, and to the 103 other STARFLEET chapters which gained members during that period. We have 46 chapters that are under strength, with anywhere from 1 to 9 members.

The form of the 2005-2006 recruiting contest will be identical to the 2004-2005 contest, with the exception being that the record keeping starts with the membership numbers dating from just before the International Conference, and will run twelve months until just before the 2006 IC. In addition, the numbers for 'unassigned' members will be tracked for the regions, to help the regions work on finding chapters for as many of these members as is possible and desired.

The member counts for every chapter will be recorded monthly, starting with July 1 numbers, and the final numbers, taken just before IC 2006, will determine the winners. The place is that the first place chapter will get a certificate good for \$50 in STARFLEET QM items or memberships, the second place chapter will get \$40, third place will get \$30, fourth place will get \$20, and the fifth place chapter will get \$10. In the case of ties, the prizes for the tied places will be summed and shared between the tying chapters, so if there is a tie for first, the \$50 plus \$40 will be split among the two winners, for instance. The Recruiting Manual is now available online, at documents.sfi.org, and will first get some minor tweaks to update names and such and fix a few bugs, then will receive a major rewrite this year. If you have any comments or suggestions (or questions!) about the recruiting manual, please pass them along to me. I will be contacting the Region 99 members about once a quarter, to see if they would like to be assigned to another region or to a chapter. I have several responses from my last contact, and can now reassign members from region to region or to a chapter.

As always, you are encouraged to pass this article along to regional e-mail lists, chapter e-mail lists, and any other electronic or printed media and it may be published in any STARFLEET publication as long as it is left intact.



We in Canada are lucky to enjoy the freedoms of an open and democratic society.

Canada is the destination of choice for many in the world, looking to enjoy a better way of life. Unfortunately there are those who take advantage of our open society with sinister plans and plots, the results of which were seen in London England.

The face of terrorism has changed from the Political struggles against colonialism and political ideology. Though many terrorist claim they commit their acts to defend the Muslim Religion and way of life, it has nothing to do with the Muslim faith, as pure hatred is the motivating factor behind today's terrorist acts. The majority of Muslims are peaceful, law abiding citizens. We in Canada have welcomed with open arms, people from areas of the world that are of Muslim Faith, or of Middle Eastern and South Asian Descent, unfortunately we now know that some bad people have slipped into Canada to operate terrorist cells here. The Canadian Security and Intelligence Service has identified at least 50 suspected terrorist cells actively operating in Canada.

Halifax and Vancouver are Major North American Ports with international shipping markets and also attract their share of the tourist trade. The question is which Canadian City will be the most likely target. My guess would be Toronto, it has the largest population of any Canadian City and hosts many major tourist attractions. What and when could a terrorist incident occur? Well there are several choices, the dual

level platforms of the Yonge and Bloor subway station are densely packed at the height of rush hour, and a bombing at that site could produce upwards of 200 deaths and up to 1000 casualties. Union Station at the height of rush hour could produce a staggering amount of deaths and injuries; it would be a potential target as security is lax there. Throw in a major sporting event or concert taking place just after rush hour, double or triple the estimated count for victims. The next potential Targets are Ontario Place and the CNE, which both attract up to 50,000 people a day at its height. 1 or 2 dirty nuclear bombs would produce such a casualty rate that the emergency response system would fail. Is Canada Prepared? No we are not. Anything larger than the London Subway Bombing would throw us into chaos and panic.

What can ordinary Canadians do to prepare? We must be very vigilant, now is not the time to continue with the status quo of complacency. Take first aid courses, volunteer with the Police Auxiliary, St. John Ambulance, the Red Cross, or join the Canadian Forces Reserves. We must beef up our vigilance, responses, security, training and defense against the inevitable attack which will come; it's only a matter of time.

I think that each year and each new event brings a different perspective. We list accomplishments, we talk about people we met and things we did, we talk about silly moments, and we even find time to gripe about things we thought could have been done better. For myself, this year's IC was completely about the people I wanted to see. The IC Committee shouldn't take this the wrong way, but the IC itself was a secondary motivation for my attendance this year, though decidedly convenient since I now live in San Antonio.

I boil down this year's IC to three highlights:

• Kokaua KiKi's (the combined efforts of a number of people to throw the best room party in the galaxy): The thing that stuck in my mind through the whole experience was the involvement of people in a process that was for the benefit of others and the opportunity I had to be involved in that process. The rating: 4 out

of 5 pips.

Friday night, we opted for a more traditional chain restaurant: Outback Steakhouse. Now I'm not currently a big fan of chain restaurants. They tend to be crowded, their menus are often limited (I don't eat red meat), and I've often seen wait staff that are overtasked and inattentive. But it had been a while since I went to *Outback*, and I was pleasantly

expanded menu that had a number of chicken and fish items (I had salmon). Service was attentive and with a call ahead, we had essentially no wait when we arrived. The rating: 5 out of 5 pips.



Saturday night, we were feeling the fatigue of the first long day (many of us were in the EC/AB Meeting on Friday and we had already run one night of room parties), so we opted to stay in the hotel and go with what was available. Chris Wallace and I attended the banquet (buffet style Mexican/Tex-Mex) while some of our group (the Kokaua Kiki "staff") ordered pizza.

I have to say, with all respect to the IC Staff, that the banquet was disappointing. When we arrived, much of the food was already gone and we had to wait for more. In addition, the food was somewhat bland and there wasn't a lot of variety. Given that this was a Hilton, I was expecting something a little nicer and didn't anticipate waiting for food. I have to give the banquet 2 out of 5 pips for the experience.



Sunday, a large group went downtown to San Antonio after the IC closed. The big thing that marred the dining experience was the oppressive heat, and many of us were unprepared and under hydrated. Since most of us didn't want heavy food or big meals, our restaurant choices were, therefore, more limited. We opted for Republic of Texas on the Riverwalk (steaks, burgers, sandwiches, Tex-Mex, some variety items). My wife and I had eaten there before and weren't overly impressed with the food or service but, this time, I found the food to be better and the service to be better. Still, we lost a little of the enjoyment because of the heat. I'd give this 3 pips out of 5.

On July 4, with a little rest and a little bit of a temperature drop (to a cool 98), we ate at *Dick's*. The service (notwithstanding the insults the wait staff throws at you) was more or less average, and the food decent, though not outstanding. Rating: 3 pips out of 5.



I'd also like to give one final rating to "Kokaua KiKi's" room party. I admit that I'm biased since I helped get it going, but the two room parties were entertaining, and the people had a wonderful time together. I'm giving this one 5 out of 5.

REGION ONE HEMLOCK PROJECT

To: All STARFLEET and Region 01 Starships, Shuttles, Space Stations and specifically STARFLEET- Region 01 Science Officers:

I was on R&R with my wife of over 30 years- MCPO Patti Herrmann recently in the Great Smoky Mountains. While at the Sugarlands Visitors Center we went on a tour of the Forest. While there we learned of a Crisis facing the Forest Enviroment. I immediately thought of all of You in SFI. After some consideration I submit the following. Announcing: THE REGION 01 HEMLOCK PROJECT.

The USS RUTLEDGE NCC-74215-"The Flagship of STARFLEET" and the Office of R1 RDC Chaplains & Counselors has initiated this Volunteer Project to Help Save the Hemlock Plant in the Southern Appalachians and Great Smoky Mountains & Blue Ridge Mountains. The Hemlock Plant faces a critical threat by the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid which is native to Asia. The HWA-Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (Adeleges tsugae) was introduced to the US in the 1920's in the Pacific Northwest and in the early 1950's to the Washington, D.C. and Richmond, Virginia areas, and has since expanded it's impact throughout the eastern US creating extensive damage to natural strands of Hemlock, specifically eastern Hemlock (Tsuga Canadensis) and Carolina Hemlock (Tsuga Caroliniana) The Hemlock Woolly Adelgid is a tiny aphid-like insect barely discernable to the naked eye. If allowed to proceed on it's current impact, the infestation of Hemlock Woolly Adelgid will destroy all Hemlock Plants creating a Biospherical catastrophe affecting the Plant and Wildlife of our Natural Forests. Currently, 80 per-cent of the Hemlock Plants in Virginia's Shenandoah National Park are dead because of HWA infestation. Foresters compare the critical threat from HWA to that of the ACTION TEAM that are engaged in efforts

Chestnut Blight which eliminated Chestnut combating the HWA Infestation. The Trees from the Southern Appalachians and radically changed the Forest composition of the Southeast. Hemlock Plants help cool mountain streams that are home to trout and other native fish, as well as crawfish, salamanders and numerous aquatic insects. In winter, Hemlock plants moderate ground level temperatures and help keep streams ice-free. In thick Hemlock boughs, birds find shelter and places to nest. In one study, 96 per-cent of all Wood Thrush nests were in Hemlocks. You can quickly see the devestation to the Enviroment, if the Hemlock crisis from the HWA insect infestation is not eradicated. The USDA and Foresters are moving aggressively to control spread of the HWA Infestation. But they need our Help--- This is being accomplished by a trinune campaign against the HWA insect infestation. Systematic injections of pestacides and insectacidal oils and soaps are two courses. But the most promising efforts to abate HWA Infestation is from Biological Control through the release of two tiny non-native Beetles: Laricobuius Nigrinus (Lari-Beetle) and the Pseudoscymnus Tsugae (PT Beetle) show the most promise. They both actively hunt the HWA insect as prey and feed voraciously, and only eat the HWA insect. Tests in Connecticut and Virginia show that relaese of the Beetles can reduce HWA populations by 47-87 percent in five months! Thus the purpose of THE HEMLOCK PROJECT is to help provide the United States Department of Agriculture and our Nation's Foresters with these Beetles so that they can be released to combat the HWA infestation and help Save the Hemlocks in the Southern Appalachians and Great Smoky Mountains from certain death and destruction. Each Beetle costs roughly: \$ 2.00--- so the Call is for our SFI Science Officers to consider helping to raise donations to be contributed specifically to the HEMLOCK WOOLLY ADELGID

Let's "consider the possibilities" to quote one of our favorite Vulcan Science Officers named Captain Spock. There are roughly 200 Chapters in SFI. If each Chapter donated just \$ 10.00 to FRIENDS OF THE SMOKIES that would mean \$2,400.00 was donated towards the puchase of 1,200 Beetles that could be unleashed to combat the HWA Infestation ! Promotion Nomination Submission Tips:

Submit promotion nominations early.

The SFI Promotions Department receives many nominations for promotions. Please try to plan ahead when nominating someone for a promotion to be awarded at events. You need to allow enough time for processing, and EC deliberation (plus 1 week for mailing) in order to receive a promotion certificate in time for an event. Submit promotion nominations as early as possible to ensure the certificate is received in time. If you submit your nomination 5 weeks (or earlier) prior to the event, you will have a better chance of receiving an answer to your request in time for the Summit, Conference, or other event.

It is also a good idea to send a separate email to promotions@sfi.org to let me know if you have a deadline.

Promotion Nomination Tips:

Here are some helpful tips when nominating someone for promotion.

--Use the online form at http:// promotions.sfi.org for the fastest results. I can forward your Nomination to the EC Promotions listserve immediately after receiving it if you use the online form. You can request an email form also—just send an email to promotions@sfi.org & ask for a blank email Nomination form. This method takes a bit longer to process.

--Nominee Name

Enter in the nominee's name exactly as it should appear on the certificate. Please note that the promotion certificate will be printed with the name exactly as it is given on the Nomination Form for the promotion request. So unless "Big Tater Tot Billy" really does like to see his name displayed as "Big Tater Tot Billy" instead of William, please use his proper name. Otherwise, he may be disappointed with his new promotion certificate :(.

--Double-check everything:

Double-check all addresses, names, numbers, and proof read the Nominee Qualifications.

--Give your contact info:

Make sure you supply a phone number &/or email address for yourself....just in case the EC needs to reach you regarding your Nomination. This can save weeks or more of time.

--Filling out the Nominee Qualification section:

The most common reason a promotion is denied by the Executive Committee is insufficient information in the promotion request. The Nominee Qualification section requires you to document, in your own words, why you believe this nominee deserves the promotion at this time. Be specific, and comment about each contribution made by the nominee at the International, Regional, and Chapter levels of STARFLEET. You

can prepare this ahead of time and paste it into the "Nominee Qualifications" area on the online form if you wish.

Simply stating "She is a wonderful person." "The chapter would not have survived without him." "She is an incredible asset to the region." "He promotes STARFLEET every chance he gets" does not supply enough information. These sentences are nice compliments for the nominee, but do not add any weight to the nomination for the EC's consideration. They do not give specific details on the contributions the nominee has made.

Remember, you are trying to CONVINCE others (the EC) that this person truly deserves this promotion at this time. can't stress this enough...be specific...give details. Point out every reason the nominee deserves this promotion and back it up with WHY she/he is an asset to the region, exactly HOW, WHEN and WHERE she/he promotes STARFLEET, etc. --ONLY include details of contributions the nominee has made since her/his last promotion. The EC only wants information about the nominee's contributions since the last promotion.

--Endorsements:

Enlist the help of the nominee's CO, XO, or others who may know about some of the nominee's contributions. Ask others to send an email to me at promotions@sfi.org including specific detailed reasons why the nominee deserves this promotion. I will add these as endorsements to the original promotion request.

> --Nominee and Nominator must be different individuals

Nominating yourself is not allowed for any reason. Occasionally a member will submit a self-nomination. These are promptly returned to the member and not accepted as a valid promotion request.

--Brief note on procedures:

Promotion requests for Captain/Colonel are forwarded to the respective Region Coordinator for approval. I can track them if the RC informs me of the promotion. Requests for promotions to Commander and below are redirected to the appropriate Chapter Commanding Officer for approval. If you have any questions about promotion requests for the ranks up to and including Captain/ Colonel, please contact the appropriate CO or RC, or send me an email at promotions@sfi.org if you need help.

All requests for Fleet Captain/Brigadier and above are forwarded to the Executive Committee for consideration & approval. If a promotion is approved by the Executive Committee, the promotion certificate is then prepared and mailed out or sent to an event for presentation. Once your promotion is announced you should receive your new rank certificate in 2 or 3 weeks time.

KLINGON K'HLUK COIN OF KAYLESS

CMDR Bruce R. Schulman USS Hornet, R1

This massively thick triangular copper coin was supposedly minted on the Klingon home world long ago during the First Empire. The obverse features Kayless the Magnificent, who united the Klingons. The Trimaris of the First Empire is on reverse. The coin contains one Klingon K'hluk of pure copper, (about 34 grams or 1.1 troy oz. for you earthlings.) Its value was equivalent to one large alcoholic beverage and they were used frequently in wagering. In addition, it fits the hand quite well and can be thrown with enough force to make it a useful weapon. The name K'hluk may be derived from the sound of the coin makes bouncing off of a skull. It is an unusual and well-made coin derived from Star Trek lore.

Greetings, STARFLEET,

This is Brigadier K'moghjIH zantai-Ki'RK (Larry D. French, Sr.) again with tribute to Scotty and how he has influenced my life.

I have been a fan of the original series of Star Trek ever since it first came out in 1966. I may have only been five years old at the time, but it was a great show for me. I had never been involved in organized fandom since 1991, but I had my own Star Trek fan club in high school. I had seen Jimmy Doohan at conventions at least four times. I got to go to my first Star Trek convention when I was stationed in the U.S. Air Force at Langley AFB, Virginia. My first Star Trek convention was Gendocon '83. Jimmy Doohan, George Takei, and Nichelle Nichols were the quest stars. Out of the three, Jimmy was the most personable. When I asked if I could have my photo taken with them, Jimmy responded with a Scottish accent, "Why, sure!" while George agreed reluctantly, and Nichelle refused all photographs with fans. He was great. Being of Scot-Irish heritage, I really admired how he inspired me to research my Scottish heritage.

I saw him again in 1991. I loved the way he regaled stories about his accents and what he would do to Ensign Kirk if he were Captain of the Enterprise. This was my first convention as a member of STARFLEET International. The convention was held in Monroeville, I believe. This was before I got involved with the Klingons. I had the attached photo (below) taken with him and really cherished it.

I saw him again at Station Square in Pittsburgh, PA in 1992 during my experimental Klingon days. I was just starting out as a Klingon and floundering at it. He didn't seem to mind the Klingons. He was again a joy to see and anyone could tell that he truly admired and loved his fans. I got him to sign my copy of "Mr. Scott's Guide to the Enterprise". He again answered fan questions and regaled stories about what it was like to work with the other actors.

In 1993, I saw him again in Monroeville, PA. I got Jimmy to sign my 1991 photo, which made it extra special. I used to show the photo around and you could see how he loved his fans. I truly enjoyed the trivia quiz, where you had to identify the episode or movie from the quote that Scotty gave. My favorite quote from that quiz was "Admiral, there be whales here!"

Scotty will be missed by all Star Trek fans, but most especially by those that grew up with the original series. His knowledge of engineering was amazing and the way he helped people showed that he had a kind heart. I remember in a video interview where he talked about a lady that he saved from committing suicide. That lady traveled hundreds of miles to see Jimmy because of the encouragement that he gave her. That is true friendship and kindness. Hopefully his kind spirit will live on in all of his fans. Goodbye, Jimmy, and God bless.

This year we're scaling back the usual conference meetings and discussion panels to just Saturday morning. Then break out your uniforms and grab your cameras, folks, 'cause we're going site-seeing!

Before the weekend is over, conference attendees will enter the bridge of the Galaxy-class U.S.S. Enterprise, stroll through the grounds of Starfleet Academy, and walk in the footsteps of Captain James T. Kirk on the planet where he fought the Gorn.

In addition to all this, we'll be hosting a Saturday evening banquet and a Friday night party, and everything will be based out of a luxurious hotel with an unbelievably low room rate for the weekend.

It'll be a conference like none you've ever attended before! And the best part is that the U.S.S. Angeles will be arranging for transportation to all siteseeing events. Those people flying into LAX can take a free shuttle to and from the hotel and never have to rent a car for the whole weekend. We'll handle everything. All you have to do is have a great time and take lots of pictures

The 2005 Region 4 Conference will take place during the weekend of October 7-9 (which is just before Columbus Day). The conference will be based out of the Marriott Courtyard Los Angeles LAX Hotel. This is a 3-star hotel at a 2-star price. Conference attendees who mention "STARFLEET Region Four" when they book their room will get a discounted super-low room rate of just \$79/night plus tax. (Important note: you must call the hotel directly at 310-649-1400 to make your reservation. The Marriott's central 800-number does not have our group rate in their computer.) The hotel is right next to Los Angeles International Airport with 24-hour free shuttle service. And don't worry about plane noise...the hotel is completely sound-proof, and the rooms have

double-paned windows to keep the roar of plane engines surprisingly silent. You really do hear nothing (we have checked out their rooms). The windows open, although this will allow in the noise of planes, so we recommend just leaving the air conditioner running. Each room has a small refrigerator, tub and shower, and free high-speed Internet access. There is also wireless access for \$9.95/day. The hotel has a gym and Jacuzzi, as well as a 24hour market that sells snacks, sandwiches and salads (made fresh daily), and other "essentials." While there aren't many restaurants within walking distance, the hotel offers an impressive breakfast buffet (including omelets and waffles) for just \$9.95 per person.

The Courtyard is a Marriott-owned hotel and is one of the newest hotels along the LAX Airport "strip", having been built in 1993 and remodeled just last year. Their rooms are quite large and can easily hold 2, 3, or 4 persons. (Note: There is an additional charge of \$15 per person per night for a third and fourth adult guest.) Each room has a sofa (not a pull-out bed) and the hotel offers cots, as well.

Because we are getting a special room rate, any room cancellations made less than seven days prior to check-in will result in the person being charged for a single night's stay regardless of whether or not they stay at the hotel. Cancellations made seven days in advance or earlier will receive a full refund of their entire deposit.

We've also set up discounts for airfare on American and United Airlines for those people flying in for the conference. For American, call (800) 433-1790 and mention StarFile code 71H5AF and you will receive a 5% discount off of their lowest qualifying fare into and out of LAX for that weekend. For United, call 800-521-4041 for between a 5% and 10% discount off of their lowest qualifying fare into and out of LAX for that weekend. Both phone numbers are manned during daylight hours seven days a week but might be closed if you call too late in the evening.

And now, here's more information about what we'll be doing during the conference weekend:

Friday Night Room Party (7:00 p.m.-11:00 p.m.)

Come up to our hotel suite for snacks and refreshments and to pick up your conference packet. Stay to chat with fellow 'Fleeters, watch videos, and just hang out and have fun.

Saturday Morning Conference (9:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.)

Before the official conference begins, there will be an hour set aside for the STARFLEET Marines to meet and discuss things (attendance is optional for non-Marines). Then the general session will include chapter introductions, state of the region, some member-produced videos and an open discussion (topics TBD)

Saturday Star Trek Site-Seeing Tour to Hollywood (2:30 p.m. – 6:00 p.m.)

Mini-vans and/or busses will be waiting to take attendees to Hollywood Boulevard where we will visit the Hollywood Entertainment Museum (where we will get exclusive access to the Enterprise-D bridge set), the Hollywood Walk of Fame, and Grauman's Chinese Theatre. The registration fee for this trip includes admission to the Museum. Once inside, you'll get to see actual set pieces from Star Trek: The Next Generation--including the "horseshoe" tactical panel and command chairs from the Bridge, the Enterprise-D cutaway schematic panel from Engineering, Captain Picard's office, an actual Borg, and many more Star Trek props, alien prosthetic heads, and panel displays. Bring your camera to take pictures sitting in the Captain's Chair or standing at Worf's post. The Museum also features the bar set from Cheers, Fox Mulder's office from the X-Files, and lots of other items from the long history of Hollywood. Afterwards, we'll walk from the Museum down Hollywood Boulevard where you can see the Walk of Fame stars of Star Trek actors DeForest "Dr. McCoy" Kelley and James "Scotty" Doohan. Finally, we'll end up in front of the famous Chinese Theatre where folks can take pictures of the concrete block that contains the handprints and autographs of the original Star Trek Cast. There will be time for a little souvenir shopping and then back to the hotel by about 5:30 or 6:00 (time approximate). Banquet attendees will have an hour to freshen up before dinner begins.

Saturday Afternoon Discussion Panel (2:30 p.m. – 5:00 p.m.)

This is an option for those not wishing to go on the Saturday afternoon site-seeing tour to Hollywood. The conference room will be available for attendees wanting to meet and have open discussions about any topic. No official agenda has been set yet, but the room is available up until 5:00 p.m., when the hotel will begin setting up for the dinner banquet.

Saturday Evening Banquet Buffet Dinner (7:00 p.m. – 10:30 p.m.)

The banquet will feature a few special guests, including Jim Van Over (who worked in the Paramount Star Trek art

department for over a decade), Larry Nemecek (publisher of the "Star Trek Communicator" magazine, and Max Cervantes (prop maker on multiple Star Trek series). These guests will be bringing some "show and tell" items, including one of only two surviving props of the actual Sword of Kahless.

Register for this event early, as there are only 80 spaces available for dinner. Dinner will consist of a catered buffet with a cash bar. The banquet will include award presentations and promotions and as well as some fascinating stories from our special guests about what went on behind the scenes while filming Star Trek.

Sunday Star Trek Site-Seeing Tour to the Japanese Garden and Vasquez Rocks (9: 00 a.m. – 4:45 p.m.)

Sunday's trip will consist of two tour stops and a stop for lunch (cost of lunch is not included). The morning stop is the famous Japanese Garden and Donald Tillman Water Reclamation Plant. This beautiful and serene area was used as the filming location for Starfleet Academy and Headquarters in episodes of TNG, DS9, Voyager, and Enterprise. Even if you've never been to the Japanese Garden before, you'll feel déjà vu as you stroll around the grounds looking for Boothby. The registration fee for this trip includes admission to the Japanese Garden.

At 11:30 a.m., we will continue our trek, stopping for lunch along the way at a group of fast food restaurants located in a small mall. After a 90 minute lunch break, we'll be just a short ride away from Vasquez Rocks State Park, a filming location featuring mysterious slanted rock formations that was used in countless Star Trek episodes, as well as in westerns and television commercials. This is another great location to get photos while dressed in uniform. The return trip to the hotel will last approximately 90 minutes.

So you're probably wondering what all this will cost. Well, we've made it all pretty darn affordable. For the whole package ---- including the Friday night party, Saturday morning conference, Saturday evening buffet banquet, and both tours (including transportation and admission to the museum and garden)--the price for registration is \$116. Or, if you prefer, you can pick and choose which events and/or tours you want to attend and lower your cost by purc-



STARSHIP PROFILE: LOKNAR-CLASS PHOBOS-SUBCLASS FRIGATE

The Loknar-class frigate was one of the success-stories of 23rd Century starship design. A frigate design developed first by Andorian engineers, the Loknarclass was first commissioned in 2229. The design was extremely popular, and proved highly effective in service, so much so that a series of production blocks followed the first run of these vessels. Over the next several decades, the Lactra, Ariannus, Cairo, and Jezar-subclasses followed the first block of Loknar-class frigates into service.

Following the success of the linear warp drive and the "New Technology" refits to the Constitution-class heavy cruiser in the early 2270s, a number of classes were selected for such refits. The Loknarclass was the subject of considerable debate regarding such a series of refits. It had already been determined that the Larson-class destroyers would not be refit, for a number of reasons, but the Loknar had proven far more effective in the field, and remained extremely popular among not only Andorian officers, but those of many other races, as well.

As a result, the U.S.S. Phobos (NCC-2786) was brought into dock in the late 2270s to become the test bed for a New Technology refit for the Loknarclass. As with the Constitution-class, the refit proved extensive, although it was speeded along through the use of proven components. In addition to the distinctive LN-64 series warp drive units, the Phobos received additional phaser banks, improved impulse engine assemblies, an enlarged hangar bay, enhanced sensors, and a lower weapons pod that mounted the four torpedo launchers.

The new vessel, designated the Phobossubclass, was an immediate hit. It was conservatively estimated to be 30%-40% more powerful than even the Jezar-subclass, and was believed to be substantially more effective both in direct combat engagements and in patrol and exploratory roles. The larger hangar bay also substantially increased the vessel's versatility, which pleased the admiralty a great deal.

Plans were quickly made to both refit earlier Loknar-class vessels to the new Phobos-class configuration and construct a block of new-build vessels to the new class's specifications.



RETURN TO FLIGHT "The shuttle returns to space once more"

In the news was the launch of the space shuttle Discovery. that if left unrepaired they would cause drag upon re-entry and possibly some

This historic launch was the first after the tragic loss of Shuttle Columbia on 02/01/ 03. The cause was determined that the shuttle had been damaged during take off when a piece of insulation from the main rocket came flying off and hit the shuttle. The scientist and engineers at NASA beleived that they had solved this, and other minor issues, and attempted to send another shuttle to the international space station. This time it would be the Discovery. The first launch attempt was canceled on 07/13/05 when they ran into a problem with a faulty fuel gauge. After determining that this extra gauge was not a symptom of a larger problem, the shuttle was resheduled for another launch date. They did not replace this gauge however because it was one of 4 redundant gauges on the shuttle. The loss of one gauge was not a problem as long as the other gauges were working.

Finally, On 07/26/05 the shuttle was launched once more. This time NASA had mounted cameras on the hull of the shuttle to monitor any debris fall off and damage that may be caused by that debris. During the course of the ascent, the same thing happened again; a piece of foam insulation flew off. This time, however, they were able to see that the foam had missed the shuttle thanks to views from the cameras. However, there were still problems.

After reaching orbit the astronauts used the shuttles robotic arm, mounted with cameras, and the space station cameras to scan every inch of of the shuttle's hull. By using these cameras they were able to find that there were gap fillers in the ceramic tiles of the heatshield that were protruding from the hull. NASA beleived

drag upon re-entry and possibly some major problems. The normal heatshield disperses the heat upon re-entry throughout the underbelly of the shuttle. These gap fillers would cause drag that would be like taking a blow torch and concentrating it in one spot of the hull for a prolonged period of time. In this case the spot would be on the belly of the shuttle near the nose, overheating that spot and prossibly causing damage that could be disasterous. There was further concern about a thermal blanket below the cockpit that was also damaged during take-off, which experts feared would tear off during re-entry. The two gap fillers were sticking out between the heatshield tiles near Discovery's nose section, each less than 3 cm long. The pieces of the gap filler were probably shaken out by the vibrations during lauch, NASA stated.

Up until this mission, NASA had never had an astronaut make repairs to the shuttle belly before, for fear it would easily be damaged. After making repairs to the space staion by replacing three gyros, they made the neccesary repairs to the shuttle. Astronaut Robinson made an unprecedented space walk and pulled the gap fillers out with his finger. He then held up the pieces he had removed and stated, "I am putting it in my trash bag." Robinson, who was accompanied on the spacewalk by crewmate Soichi Noguchi, had received a 12 page email to prepare him for the removal operation. He is the first person to see the underbelly of the shuttle while in orbit. He was positioned in place by the robotic arm onboard the shuttle. There was a lot of concern that he would have problems removing the gap fillers but in the end he was able to grip them with his fingers and dislodge them completely. After studying the thermal blanket problem, NASA decided to leave it alone and allow the shuttle to come home.

On 08/08/05 the shuttle was scheduled to land in Florida at 6 in the morning EST. However, the weather would not allow it. So the landing was scrubbed and Discovery would wait one more day. On 08/09/05 the first two windows of opportunity were missed due to weather concerns again. However, the third was open and the shuttle touched down at 5: 13 am PST at Edwards AFB in California without any problems at all.

The shuttle program has been in operation since the late 1960's with each shuttle in service for no longer than 10 years each. NASA is now seriously looking into a new program and trying to decide if it is time to retire the STS (Space Transportation System) all together. With the Discovery problems, along with the losses of Columbia and Challenger, they want to make sure that space travel is safe travel. Shuttle Atlantis was scheduled to go up in 09/05, but that may be delayed or even canceled, depending on NASA's findings.

It is my opinion that NASA should begin retiring the STS and begin the use of a newer shuttle design, possibly the space plane design that we in fandom have seen in movies and TV. It is moere efficient and controllable. It takes off and lands just like a commercial jet and there is no need of booster rockets to get it into orbit.

As a side note, NASA woke up the crew of Discovery on 08/03/05 with a little Star Trek flare. Every morning NASA plays the crew a song of the day to wake them up and get them started on the right foot. That day they woke up to the sound of "Where My Heart Will Take Me," the theme song from Star Trek: Enterprise, by Dennis McCarthy. This was done as a suprise from Deputy Shuttle Program Manager Wayne Hale. See, there are Trekkies at NASA. Figures.....



Well, I had little to talk about in this issue's article, until now. Leave it to Starfleet's greatest engineer to give another engineer something to talk about

You have all, no doubt, heard of the passing of James Doohan, known best to us as the incomparable Montgomery Scott. While we all had expected it, knowing Jimmy's health conditions, it does not make his passing any easier. I can honestly say that Scotty had an effect on my life in a particular way.

I must admit to not having been much of a Star Trek fan until the release of Star Trek: The Motion Picture. I watched the opening, as Scotty took the controls of the observation pod and gave Admiral Kirk a first rate tour of the rebuilt U.S.S. Enterprise, NCC-1701. Seeing her majestically ease out of the refitting dock hooked me. She was beautiful. And she was the work of Engineers, men, like Montgomery Scott. And as Mr. Scott stood on the bridge's upper deck watching, he was beaming with pride in his true love. After four 5-year missions into the inhospitable void that is space, she had returned battered and bruised, but she had returned. Mr. Scott had known how to treat his lady, and she had brought him home every time. And now, she was reborn, with a new life. She would, again, "Boldly go where no man has gone before."




