I met Edgar Torres (and his wife María) shortly after joining the USS Northstar. It was at a joint Osiris/Northstar Halloween party, back in October 2000. I hit it off great not only with the Osiris crew, but especially with the Captains Torres. It was enough for me to join the Osiris as an associate member. I have maintained my Osiris membership to this day.

They were there for me, too, when I was dealing with my own illness in 2001; they visited me in the hospital and always had something - a word, good food, something - to help with my healing. The Osiris, led by "Cap'n (recently promoted to Commodore) E," were the ones who threw a surprise farewell party for me when I moved back to California. I kept in touch with Edgar and Maria via e-mail, mailing lists, and video chat. There were times when they had a Webcam set up so I could "attend" Osiris meetings, thanks to the magic of Yahoo! Messenger.

Edgar also had this near-obsessive devotion to Superman. Man, I'd never seen someone so into Superman or DC comics in general, as Edgar. He could tell you any detail about the Last Son of Krypton, and I could not keep up with him on the vast amounts of Super-trivia at his fingertips. He and I could geek out not only on Trek, but also on the Man of Steel, as well as Green Lantern (my favorite superhero). Edgar was always quick with a joke, a reassurance, but was also there with the proverbial kick in the pants, if the situation called for it.

When María told me the news that Edgar was sick in the hospital with abdominal cancer, it hit me in my own gut. How could someone so young be afflicted with such a painful, awful illness? What did she mean that it was incurable? As a physician, I felt helpless to save my friend. As a friend, I was stunned, upset and heartbroken. As a fellow STARFLEET member, how would this affect the leadership Edgar provided and showed to not only Region Seven, but to the entire organization?

My fiancée, Terry, and I were fortunate to visit Edgar last November, just before Thanksgiving. I was in NYC for a conference, and went with this sinking feeling that it would be the last chance I could see Edgar. María had told me before that Edgar's treatment was only being done to ease his pain and discomfort. As I had feared, the chemotherapy did a real number on Edgar's weight, as well as his body overall. But "Comm E" didn't quit. He had a soul and strength as strong as any Kryptonian's.

We will miss Edgar. We cry for him and his family, and mourn with them. I lit a candle for Edgar in church recently, in his honor. If I were a Klingon, I'd be warning Sto-Vo-Kor that a true warrior is on his way. But... seeing that I'm not Klingon, I will drink a toast to my friend tonight. I only knew Edgar Torres for five years, but I felt I'd known him for much longer.

May Peace be with you, Comm E. We love you, Papi!

HISTORY OF THE USS STORMBRINGER

This Document is classified. If you do not have clearance to receive this information, you are guilty of treason, punishable by 30 years in a STARFLEET penal facility.

HISTORY OF THE USS STORMBRINGER

In the year 2266, the Romulan Star Empire penetrated the neutral zone for the first time in over 100 years. In direct violation of the Treaty of Algeron, the Romulans tested the "iron" of STARFLEET by threatening the outposts along the Federation border of the zone. After much debate, STARFLEET responded by dispatching the USS ENTERPRISE under the command of Captain James T. Kirk to directly confront the Romulans in a tactic of deceit in 2268. During this mission, Captain Kirk managed to steal one of the cloaking devices used so effectively by the Romulan Fleet. After returning to spacedock after using the device to escape from the superior Romulan ships, the device was removed from the ENTERPRISE and refitted to an experimental STARFLEET prototype vessel, later to be named the USS STORMBRINGER. As the use of cloaking technology was expressly forbidden by the Treaty of Algeron, the ship was assigned to Covert Operations Command and technically "did not exist." The official STARFLEET report to the Federation Council stated that the device was "alien technology" and could not be utilized due to damage incurred during the ENTERPRISE's escape from the Romulans. This was an age old tactic known as "disinformation.

(It worked better than anyone could have possibly imagined.)

On a classified stardate in a ceremony involving only a few select individuals, the experimental starship USS STORMBRINGER, NX-0000 was secretly commissioned into STARFLEET Covert Operations Command and assigned to Captain Jonathan Harris. Captain Harris was commanding the USS EXCALIBUR at the time. Therefore a decision was made to fabricate an "accident" involving the EXCALIBUR and the M-5 computer. According to official records, all hands perished in the "accident."

After reassignment to the "non-existent" STORMBRINGER the Captain and crew served admirably on numerous classified missions deep into Romulan, Klingon, and Tholian space. Unfortunately, Captain Harris and crew were killed in the line of duty during a classified mission when forced to engage the combined forces of the Romulan and Klingon empires, shortly after their treaty was made public. Sometimes all you have to do to get a great opportunity is to ask for it. That is exactly how the crew of the USS Joan of Arc got a recent opportunity to share the wonder of Star Trek with the "next generation" of young students at Casa Linda Elementary in Corpus Christi, Texas. While attending a PTA meeting at my son Alex's school, we learned of an interesting event soon to be hosted by the school. In hopes of sparking increased interest in science and, consequently, boosting test scores in that area, the school would host a "Weird Science Night" on October 27th, 2005, with a focus on the planet Mars, which would be passing close to Earth at that time. After hearing the details, I approached Dr. Ridge Hammond, the school's viceprincipal, to ask if outside assistance with the program would be welcome. Dr. Hammond welcomed the offer with open arms and grew more interested and excited as I explained about STARFLEET, the USS Joan of Arc, the various people and personas that staffed her and what they could contribute to the event. Dr. Hammond wanted to hear more and meet the group in person and arranged to join the Joan of Arc's crew for their next dinner and meeting. Before scattering the children about the campus, Dr. Hammond made a special introduction of our group, member by member, with a little background about each person's planet and origins. Alien greetings were offered by Andorian CO FCPT Kris Dobie and in fluent Klingon by Robert Shaver (translated by his Cha'Ditch, CMDR Jason Rhew). He then turned over the microphone to me. As a veteran STARFLEET officer and an accomplished speaker, I talked a little about STARFLEET and the United

Federation of Planets and explained that the Federation was made up of over a hundred member worlds, each filled with unique people with unique gifts who, together, seek to better themselves and the universe around them. I further explained that working together in this way through the Vulcan concept of Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combination meant that no matter what race, sex, age or religion they were or if they were big, small, fat, skinny, top or bottom of their class... everyone was an important part of the whole. (Dr. Hammond later told me that my encouraging words were greatly appreciated by many of the parents in attendance in addition to the children).

Once the introductions were finished our group, like the others, went to our respective room to await the groups of excited and inquisitive kids. They were greeted by our Ferengi (LCDR Tex Dobie) before making their way into a room featuring a TV with an animated Star Trek episode playing in one corner and various Trek artwork and other items of interest lining the walls. I explained a little about how starships work to future galactic designers and engineers using my prizewinning model of the USS Joan of Arc as a visual aid, while others collected candy and a coloring book of various aliens from our Trill (ENS Diane Beets) and Orion (CAPT Robin Van Cleave). However, it was Robert the Klingon that was, once again, the undeniable hit of the show. He had an impressive display set up in

one corner of the room which displayed numerous items from the Klingon homeworld and from his "travels". There were pictures of various Klingon garb and a model of a ship on which he once served. He explained Klingon culture and regaled the awestruck children with a variety of stories in answer to their eager questions. Children that came to that room for a piece of candy left with something far more special: a glimpse into a bright, shining future full of potential and diversity and the wonders that science and exploration can unlock.

That should be the end of the story, but it's not. Following the event Dr. Hammond received such a positive response, both in parental reaction and students' increased interest in science, that he decided to write up the event in an area educational newsletter. This, in turn, sparked an interest among area schools in hosting similar events and he was asked to talk about his "Weird Science Night" at a continuing education seminar for area Assistant Principals. Since the USS Joan of Arc had figured so prominently in the program's success, he invited me to speak to this group of educators about what we had done that night and how Star Trek could spark an interest in science and IDIC could make every child realize that they are an important part of a greater whole. Now, those Assistant Principals are taking our ideas back and applying them to the education of children at their schools, continuing to spark curiosity and learning through imagination and one man's vision of a greater, brighter future.

Sometimes it is simply amazing what can come about as the result of simply going up to someone and saying, in the truest spirit of Gene Roddenberry's vision, "Let me help".

ROOM FOR KATRINA CMDR Robert Suttles • Shuttlecraft Rahxephon, R3

Due to the response of the nation, and in fact the world, one might mistakenly assume that Katrina was the only disaster to ever befall New Orleans. Those who know anything of history, however, know better. However, the disaster of Katrina is no less deserving of narration than any of the others.

My own experience during this modern New Orleans disaster known as Hurricane Katrina is long and involved on so many levels that I fear that such a short description will do it no justice. I still find it strange that someone, such as me, who came through the storm with so little loss, could have so much to tell. But, a life—any life—is made up of many stories, and stories upon stories; and so, briefly, here is my story of how my two month Katrina adventure began.

I had worked for the Best Western Landmark Hotel in Metairie since February of 2003. Like most hotels and other businesses in the area, I suppose, they made a list of volunteers who would stay at and work at the hotel during a given hurricane should one hit the city. Like every year before, I was one of the first to put my name down on that volunteer sheet. Even though I had never before actually had to carry through on that obligation, I was more than willing to do so.

As Katrina began her long, slow march through the Gulf of Mexico, I must admit that I had only a passing interest in her approach. I had ridden through three other full hurricane seasons in the gulf region, mostly while residing in the Days Inn of Kenner, and had always come through without so much as a rattled nerve. While still no nerve was ever rattled during Katrina. I did find this particular storm to be a little more demanding.

I got the call from the Landmark on the Saturday prior to the storm that my services would be required by the following evening. My roommate and I packed some scarce belongings into two suitcases and a couple of book bags. Within 24 hours we had everything packed, and our two bedroom townhouse apartment was about as secured as we could make it.

We checked into the employee-designated hotel rooms at around 5 o'clock on Sunday. My duties seemed reasonably normal during the time leading up to the storm. I kept a periodic eye on the televised weather reports, and watched endless updates and announcements as the storm was reported to lurch ever closer. It almost seemed strange how the sky always seemed to stay such a beautiful blue with only streaks of white clouds across them.

After dinner that evening, spent among colleagues and guests alike, we retired to our double-bedded room. Even the evening seemed calm, until just before midnight. About then was when the wind picked up. It did not begin as a howl, exactly. It was more of an unnatural whimper. That sound changed in far too much of a hurry.

I couldn't say for certain exactly what all of the sights were. I only peaked through the curtains occasionally. My logistical mind screamed at me to keep them closed so that the air pressure would remain constant on the inside and outside of the glass. I also did not venture beyond the room much. Many people had moved into the hallways; some because their balcony windows had imploded, and others out of fear that their windows would soon follow suit.

But, the sounds were telling more than enough in their own way. Soon, the wind stopped had stopped whimpering, and became the choir howl of a hundred wolf packs from a nightmarish dreamscape. The rain, moving nearly horizontally, left hit the class like scattershot from a hunter. I heard screams, and I heard glass breaking. It was when I heard the two together that my roommate got a little jumpy. I tried to calm her as best that I could, but her own natural skittishness always won out.

My own emotions, oddly enough, never wavered, though. The strangest part of the entire experience, even to me, was my complete lack of panic or fear. My mind and soul never shuddered, and seemed to simply accept the entire Katrina event as an act of nature, unalterable. As ridiculous as it may sound to some, throughout the entire ordeal I felt that it was my own nature-based religious spirituality that kept me so uncommonly calm. I accepted Katrina, on a spiritual level, as an offspring of mother Earth and father Sky, and that whatever They chose to do with it, that I would simply have to trust in Their judgment. I sincerely hope that the beliefs of others proved as comforting to them.

I saw the other guests and workers early on the morning following the storm. The change in people and their demeanors was immediately obvious. I walked down to the eight-story lobby in the now tomb-dark and dank hotel. Much of the glass on the east side six-story window had been blown inward and laid in the lobby floor. The water, which had flooded the streets, had risen just shy of the top of the outer steps. The main ballroom was a raining swamp now, as many of the air-conditioning units on its roof had been ripped away. The vast majority of windows in the northeast were destroyed, as were the guest rooms behind them. Many of the rest of the windows were likewise, but to lesser extent.

We were all trapped in our little manmade isle in Metairie now. The Landmark was all cut off from even its immediate neighbors now, like so many other places. They all looked like islands of stone, steel, and shattered glass.

Only the fact that the Louisiana State Police had set up a base inside the hotel kept everyone well fed. We did our best to accommodate them and the other guests. In a 17-story hotel with a dying generator, no opening windows, and no more luxuries it proved to be very challenging indeed.

Over the next two days, there seemed very little distinction between guests and staff. Everyone pitched in to help clean the glass, and serve the sandwiches. Then, finally, the evacuation order was given, and we were forced to close the building.

On the very last night, though, I saw the only really good sight that resulted from the catastrophe. I saw it as I was standing atop the third story of the hotel's open-air parking garage. There was no roof overhead, and hardly a spark of light pollution in the entire area. I saw the stars.

A sky lit with an ocean of stars stared back at my wondering eyes. More stars than most people had known existed above the skies of New Orleans. Constellations from a thousand deities and legends shined down on me, as if in promise to see this place renewed.

As I gazed, lost in awe, I finally felt something. Peace.

to gather information on Cadets and invade their privacy.

This is FALSE! The Birthday Recognition Program for the Cadet Resource Department only, sends out a birthday card. That is it. We do not make a public announcement on any of the lists, or have it printed in the CQ, or other newsletter, for public knowledge. If that is what a parent would like to give permission for, they need to see Jimmy in the Morale Department. Our progam is for <u>A</u> card only.

This process is started with a webform request from the Cadet Resource website and continues only if parental permission has been given or can be obtained. No record is kept to send one out the next year (new year = new request + new permission given). The only record that is kept has to do with the financial aspects of this program (i.e. cost of cards and postage). Since SFI is unable to give many of its departments a budget to work from, my business has been more than gracious to offer to pay for these items as a "charitable contribution."

Rumor #3: The International Cadet Resource holds complete responsibility and liability for the safety of the Cadets while surfing the internet or participating in any of the Cadet Resource Programs.

After a twenty minute conversation with a Nueces County Judge that is assigned cases similar to the statement above: This is FALSE! As long as the International Cadet Resource can show that it has taken "reasonable" precautions against privacy violations and has made "reasonable" attempts to prevent internet predators from gaining direct access to Cadets, International Cadet Resource or Starfleet International Star Trek Fan Association, Inc. can *not* be held liable. He said it has to do with parents needing to take an active and particiaptory roll in their child's activities and that parents are the keys to keeping children safe anywhere. The wording on the permission forms will reflect this: that parents must understand that, while this issue is of the utmost importance to International Cadet Resources, the safety of their children is ultimately their responsibility!

As a concerned parent myself, I make it a priority with all aspcets of any program that I run which has minors as the primary participant. This is I why I have had the following in place since the beginning, almost three years ago, of reasonable precautions and procedures:

•The STARFLEET_CADETS yahoo group requires PARENTAL PERMISSION for a Cadet to join.

•The only adults allowed on that group are CS, VCS, Director of FRC, Director

of International Cadet Resource and the parents of Cadets ON THAT GROUP.

•A change that has occurred in the past year: PARENTS ARE REQUIRED to join the Yahoo group as well and acitively receive emails from it. They will not be allowed to post, as this forum is for the Cadets of SFI. Parents are there to simply monitor what messages are posted to that group and are highly encouraged to remain in contact with me should they have any problems, questions, or concerns. Parents do have their own forum found under STARFLEET_ PARENTS, also a yahoo group.

While I am aware of some other rumors that have been spread by persons who are misguided, at best, and "unscrupulous", (being polite) at worst, they have no basis in fact or reality and therefore will not even be dignified with a response.

Whew! Now that we've finally waded through all of that, I'd like to state again how happy I am for Cadet Resources to be open and available once again to the children, young adults and parents of STARFLEET. As we continue to build and move forward, I hope to see the return of all those I had the pleasure to serve in the past through the program and look forward to welcoming those new to it as well. I am, as always, open to any and all questions, concerns and suggestions for the improvement of the program and resources available to STARFLEET Cadet/Youth Programs. I also look forward to working with all who wish to become involved. If you are interested in this program, or the resources available, and have not heard about it from your RC or CO, then feel free to contact me directly for more information.

The children of STARFLEET are the future of STARFLEET! Let's give them something to be proud of and call their own as they grow into the "Next Generation" of STARFLEET leaders.

"AN EVENING WITH STORY MUSGRAVE"

On April 17, 2005, the Colburn Earth Science Museum in Asheville, NC had the pleasure of hosting a talk by astronaut Story Musgrave. Dr. Musgrave is a fascinating man, born in 1935, earning 6 graduate degrees in everything from math to business to chemistry to literature to medicine, serving in the military as a U.S. Marine and earning his U.S. Air Force Wings. And of course, there is his NASA work, being selected as a scientist-astronaut by NASA in 1967. Dr. Musgrave is a veteran of 6 space flights, including designing and flying on the space shuttle mission (STS-61) that repaired the Hubble Space Telescope in 1993

The focus of his multimedia presentation was "Earth As Art", which included numerous slides of Earth as seen from space, mostly from the Hubble Space Telescope repair mission. Dr. Musgrave is an excellent speaker. He talked about his youth, about Earth Day, about Mother Earth's beauty, and how we need to protect the Earth. His slides and talk were a grand celebration of Earth, the artistic beauty of Nature and of Earth.

I like his philosophy, too. He spoke about having the right relationship with the Earth. The Earth sustains us, and we have to sustain the Earth. "How you view the future," he said, "is affected by how you view the past." He has a curiosity about why we are here on Earth, about when (in history) we are born. We need to have total focus, concentrate on the moment, and not be distracted by stuff.

Dr. Musgrave spoke about the importance of exploration, about the meaning and hope of our existence in the universe. "Exploration is the human quest for the heavens." He emphasized that "we've got to get it together, we have to get along as people. If we think of ourselves on a grand journey (think of ourselves as Earth people, Solar System people, Galaxy people), then we will get along." He said it is good to reach out and touch the universe, but "it is more important to let it touch you."

Dr. Musgrave promised to return to Asheville for Earth Day 2006. He signed copies of a new biography about him titled, "Story: The Way of Water," as

well as copies of his DVD, "A Space Story." You can order copies of his publications at (http://www.spacestory. com/intro.htm). I was able to speak to him for just a few minutes while I got his autographs. But I spent most of my time after his presentation talking to one of his daughters, Holly Kay Musgrave. Holly Musgrave is a fundamentalist Christian who, to me, has inconsistent views of the space program and about science. We had an involved discussion about religion and science, and about President George W. Bush and the Republican Congress cutting back the budget, trimming spending on scientific programs, and politicizing issues such as climate change (for example, global warming) and genetic research (another example, stem cell research). She seemed blissfully unaware of how this negatively impacts science and the world. When I told her about Congress' plan to eliminate funding for the Voyager spacecraft, she seemed surprised. Voyager 1 is just now exploring the edge of the solar system, and beyond, which has never been done before and which we won't have another opportunity to do for decades. Dr. Musgrave expressed grave concern about this political effort to kill the Voyager program whose data is invaluable. Holly said she lives in (then-Speaker) Tom DeLay's district and that she would talk to him about it.

I enjoyed listening to and talking to Dr. Musgrave. He has a very devoted and close family, but I was disappointed in the disparity between his views and his daughter's views on certain things.

STARFLEET RETENTION AND RECRUITING VADM Pete Mohney, Director • USS Hepheastus, R2

The 2005-2006 STARFLEET Recruiting Contest is in its fifth month, and the effects of hard-working chapters are really starting to show. Several chapters have made big gains in their member counts since the tracking began. Major standouts include the Saratoga, Thagard, Omega Glory, C M Russell, and Mir, all with double-digit increases.

Other standout chapters, with 5 or more members gained since tracking started after the International Conference, include the following chapters: Ark Angel, Kitty Hawk, Onizuka, Thunderchild, Armageddon, Dark Wolf, Firebird, Palo Duro, Pride of Scotland, Providence, Thor, Wind Spirit, Alaric, Andromeda, Jurassic, Liberty, Rising Moon, Rogue Phoenix, Star League, Star Runner, William ODarby, Bexar, Challenger, Empress, Maelstrom, Okatoma and Tiburon. Seventy-one other chapters have grown by from 1 to 4 members - some great work going on across STARFLEET!

Looking at the regions, since the tracking began after the International Conference, Region 01 has gained 21 members, Region 02 has lost 7, Region 03 has gained 2, Region 04 has lost 7, Region 05 has lost 1, Region 06 has lost 2, Region 7 has lost 7, Region 09 has gained 6, Region 12 has lost 31, Region 14 has lost 8, Region 15 has lost 3, Region 17 has lost 5, and Region 20 has gained 30. Overall, since after the International Conference, STARFLEET has lost 13 members.

We have 39 chapters that are under strength, with anywhere from 1 to 9 members.

Counting the unassigned members from all regions and from R99, the change overall has been from 3871 members on 8/1 to 3858 on 01/09, a loss of 15 members.

One project that I would like to undertake would be to start contacting all of the expired members from each region about once a quarter, but there is no tool in the database to grab all of these people at once (though I've asked for it), and do this chapter-by-chapter would be too tedious. So, I encourage all RC's and CO's to check their expired list, and contact their former members to try to bring them back to STARFLEET!

The form of this year's recruiting contest

is Chapter vs. Chapter! The member counts for every chapter will be recorded monthly, starting with numbers from right after the IC, and the final numbers, taken just before IC 2006, will determine the winners. The plan is that the first place chapter will get a certificate good for \$50 in STARFLEET QM items or memberships, the second place chapter will get \$40, third place will get \$30, fourth place will get \$20, and the fifth place chapter will get \$10. In the case of ties, the prizes for the tied places will be summed and shared between the tying chapters, so if there is a tie for first, the \$50 plus \$40 will be split among the two winners, for instance.

I will also be tracking the count of Unassigned members in each region, which should help us determine which regions most need help with this group. Every region has reduced the number of unassigneds, held even, or gained only one more unassigned member so far. Region 99, the 'holding pen' region, has 150 people in it, which is an increase of 92 people since the International Conference, and where I'll be spending some serious email time trying to get people assigned to regions and chapters in the next month. Many of those added at the end of 2005 came from three Region 12 chapters that decommissioned; I'm hoping that many of those members will join other chapters.

The Retention and Recruiting Manual is now available at the SFI.ORG site on the documents page, and was given out at the recent Orlando Vulkon. I intend to ship a packet of booklets and CDs to each regional gathering over the next year. I can also email a PDF to anyone who would email me privately and ask for one.

The Orientation Officer of the Retention and Recruiting Office, Michael Vermoesen, has been contacting new unassigned members and trying to help them get in touch with nearby chapters, and has steered quite a few members towards this end. He's also been contacting Region 99 members, and has managed to assign several of them to chapters or regions.

As always, you are encouraged to pass this article along to regional mail lists, chapter mail lists, and any other electronic or printed media, and it may be published in any STARFLEET publication as long as it is left intact. I was always taught growing up that when you make a mistake, you admit it and apologize. So, I'd like to apologize here in this forum to Mr. Brugmans for the manner in which this whole unfortunate business had taken place, and that I didn't finalize things with him appropriately. I sincerely regret that. I would also like to apologize to those who were upset by the matter.

I know that it will take time to heal many of the hurt feelings and such from the online fall-out of the decision that I made.

However, I ask that as we move on from this experience, that we try to remember why we are all members of STARFLEET - because we all found something in the show, in the genre that we connected with. That we enjoy a show called Star Trek (and perhaps other Sci-Fi/Fantasy as well), and that we wanted to have fun meeting other fans.

Certainly every organization has its politics and personalities. And for those old-timers in *this* organization, we've seen plenty of that ourselves. But don't forget that we're all fans first. The politics at times in this organization is loud and deafening and drowns out the reason why we're all here - because we're fans. The hurtful things that are said online or in person, the accusations that are made, the conspiracy theories, the character attacks - those are all counterproductive to the fandom and fun that we joined for. Certainly, only a handful may participate in the politics and attacks, and I know the majority of you reading this column probably are unaware that some of the politics exist. But, it is still something that has weighed heavily on me for some time, and the recent events online have made we long for the simpler days of fandom.

And without taking up too much space, I want to repost something here that I found online in a friend's blog. I'm not sure of the original author or origin, but I tip my hat to the person that wrote this. See you in sixty! I think I've said enough, so I'll leave you with:

"The Fandom Creed"

I. I acknowledge that fandom can, has, and will exist without me. I am not important. What I can do, someone else could easily take over. Even if the fandom is tiny, there are probably many more fans of whom I simply have not heard that write/draw/dream things that could blow my mind. Fandom would not fall apart without me.

II. I acknowledge that no matter what I've contributed to it, the fandom owes me absolutely nothing. I will not look for fame, nor will I expect a certain type of treatment from anyone else in the fandom. If people respect me, let them; if people dislike me, let them. I certainly will not threaten to leave and expect anyone to care.

III. I acknowledge that no matter what sort of "credentials" I have in the real world, in fandom, I am merely just another "fan." I might be a published author, a famous artist, or hell, Brad Pitt, but in fandom, if I am not the creator of the canon material, I am merely a follower and I will remember that.

IV. I acknowledge that fandom is a thing created and kept alive by more than one person. People will disagree with me; I will disagree with people. Although I reserve the right to leave the premises or disagree/rant/make snide comments in relative private, I will never flame someone publicly or personally for their opinions. If there is discussion in public, it will be civil and I will keep the peace.

V. I acknowledge that there will always be parts of fandom that I dislike; I also acknowledge that there will always be parts of fandom that dislike me; these parts, I will ignore. There will always be people who will never see things my way, no matter what anyone says or does, and there will always be people who keep producing works with which I completely disagree. Again, although I reserve the right to leave the premises or disagree/rant/make snide comments in relative private, I will make no move to actually stop them. They have the right to imagine their versions of characters, just as I have the right to imagine mine.

VI. I acknowledge that, just as fandom owes me nothing, neither do other fans. It doesn't matter who I am; just because I created a community or many people agree with my portrayal of Character A does not give me rights to anything in the fandom. If I receive praise, I will always remember that it is given freely, not due; if I receive criticism, I will take it and remember that criticism, too, is freely given. Regardless of which it is, I will always feel thankful for the time.

VII. I acknowledge that fandom is fandom and how certain people act/how certain people's tastes run in fandom has no relation to them in real life. Although I reserve the right to like or dislike someone based on their OOC/non-fandom-related comments. I will neither judge nor form opinions about someone as a person purely through fandom. Just as slash writers are not always gay and RPers are not always self-inserts, I acknowledge that the fandom-image I know and the real life-person that I do not may be completely different people.

VIII. I acknowledge that there will be other fans that I dislike personally; I also acknowledge that there will be other fans that dislike me personally; these fans, I will ignore. Again, although I reserve the right to leave the premises or disagree/rant/make snide comments in relative private, I will make no move to actually confront them if they have done no wrong. Being a jerk may have them kicked out of communities and forums, but I will always remember that they have as much right to be in the actual fandom as I do.

And I will always remember that I do have that right.

IX. I acknowledge that just as I am in fandom to have fun, other people are in fandom for the exact same reason, and I will remember that. I will never do anything to actively try to stop other people's fun, regardless of how much I may disagree with what they are doing. Clause reserving the right to leave the premises or disagree/rant/make snide comments in relative private still holds here, but I will never tell another fan to stop having fun in whatever way they want to have fun. And I will never pay any attention when someone tells me to stop having fun myself.

X. I acknowledge that just as everyone else is a person, that I am a person, too. No matter what other fans may think of me from what they have seen in fandom, I will never let that persona/image/ reputation get in the way of being myself if/when I should communicate with them outside of fandom. If they respect me, I will thank them, and if they dislike me, I will accept it, but these things I will strictly keep in fandom only and will not allow them to interfere with my friendships or real life.

XI. I acknowledge that there are people uninterested in my fandom and I will not press my fandom upon them. I will not speak of certain fandoms to those that have no interest in them, nor will I pressure anyone to look at/read/otherwise be forced to come up with reactions to things that they couldn't care less about. I know that fandoms are very specific things, that being pressured into looking at them is highly uncomfortable, and I will not impose that way upon others.

XII. I acknowledge that, in the end, real life is real life and fandom is only fandom. If fandom begins to affects my real life in negative ways, I will remember that I have the option to simply leave and if it gets bad enough, I will. If I am truly unhappy with a certain fandom or the way a certain fandom is going, I will remember that I have the option of simply creating another community for people who share the same interests as me, or the option of just staying and refusing to go with the flow. I will remember that fandom is a simple trade of time with fun, and that if the fun is not worth the cost, I will remember that I am merely wasting time. Above all else, I will remember that remaining in fandom is an entirely voluntary action.

Greetings from Computer Operations!

Now that I've been the Computer Operations (CompOps) Chief for over a year now, I wanted to take a look at the past year's accomplishments and talk about a few new projects that the department will be undertaking.

Membership Processing.

When I began this administration, many people were saying that we should outsource that administrative function. I thought that we just needed to redesign the process so that we eliminate the failure points.

By having two teams doing the same job and splitting the workload, we have generally kept Membership Processing time to less than two weeks. That means that from the time we receive your application/renewal

-- either online or via postal mail -- your membership materials packet has been placed in the mail for delivery to you. Occasionally, there are glitches. But those glitches usually result from missing information or payment processing issues.

If you've received your membership packet after this past February, you may have noticed the inclusion of your database username and password adjacent to your chapter assignment card. Obviously, you have the ability to change your username and reset your password, so of course, the information is only promised to be valid at the time it was printed. This simple inclusion should enable more members to get into the database, relatively quickly, without helpdesk assistance.

By now, you may have already heard that Membership Processing is offering a CD containing the Vessel Registry, Membership Handbook, and other forms that are included as printed materials in the membership packets. However, other resources, including documents and images that aren't generally in the packet are included on the CD as well; and, since the CD's are produced by STARFLEET membership processing, the information is generally more current than the printed information. Right now, this CD is available to renewing members who request it. Look for the checkbox for CD in your renewal application. By default, right now, MP will continue to send printed material, unless otherwise specified.

Database Team.

For more than a year now, I have been trying to find additional database programmers and team members. Robin Smith has been the developer since taking over the project from the original designer, Dino Gravito.

Dino created an excellent tool that has become the greatest productivity tool for

all departments of STARFLEET to work together and share data through Internet availability and access -- the value of our database continues to impress me and others who have had the pleasure to use it for regional and fleet-level duties.

Robin continued Dino's work and built more functionality into the database while "tweaking" those functions already in use. Unfortunately, over the past year, Robin has been able to devote a decreasing amount of time to the database and some projects haven't had the attention they needed -- the most notable one being that of bringing real-time credit card processing (e-commerce) to the database. Recently, I have asked Dino to return to the database development team and he has consented. Robin has agreed to transfer her database workload over to Dino and he will continue the work required to process credit cards in the database.

Membership Certificate Design Contest

CompOps is very happy to announce that we will hold a contest for the 2007 Membership Certificate design. The winner will be announced at the 2006 STARFLEET International Conference and will receive a certificate award and a free annual membership packet. Designs will be accepted from March 1st – June 30th. The award committee of 3-5 people will then review the designs in July to



determine the winning design that will be mailed out to each STARFLEET member in 2007. The award selection committee will be chaired by the Region 15 Membership Processing Team Leader, Matt Ingles. It is our intent to institute this contest as an annual award event from Computer Operations. Currently, we are looking for award selection committee members who will be available, via email, during the selection process (June-July).

And of course, we need those interested creative individuals to begin their designs. Basic details are that the design must include an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ X 11 membership certificate with space left for member's names to be added in black font size 30-35; 2 business cards, one for a crew assignment card, and one as a membership card. Space on each of these cards needs to be left for member's name, SCC #, and expiration date printed in black font size 12-14. Space should also be set a side for database access id and password. Over all lay out cannot exceed 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ X 14.

Those interested in serving on the award selection committee or submitting a design can get more details from Matt Ingles at certaward@sfi.org. Designers must contact Matt before submitting a design.

That's all I have for right now. On behalf of the Computer Operations staff and team members, we appreciate the opportunity to serve you. Please contact me at compops@sfi.org if I can be of assistance or if you have ideas of how your Computer Operations department can serve you better.

If you have a chapter in good standing and are willing to sponsor new shuttles, please contact me so I can compile a list to help potential shuttles.

Another key launch requirement is approval for the shuttle's name and class, NCC number, ... etc. Questions about these should be addressed to the Department of Technical Services (DTS), attn: Adm. Alex Rosenzweig at dts@sfi. org. One thing sometimes overlooked by shuttle groups after receiving DTS authorization is that names are not reserved indefinitely. Be sure to put your shuttle plans in motion before the reservation expires.

<u>Promotion Nomination Submission Tips:</u> Submit promotion nominations early.

The SFI Promotions Department receives many nominations for promotions. Please try to plan ahead when nominating someone for a promotion to be awarded at events. You need to allow enough time for processing, and EC deliberation (plus 1 week for mailing) in order to receive a promotion certificate in time for an event. Submit promotion nominations as early as possible to ensure the certificate is received in time. If you submit your nomination 5 weeks (or earlier) prior to the event, you will have a better chance of receiving an answer to your request in time for the Summit, Conference, or other event. It is also a good idea to send a separate email to promotions@sfi.org to let me know if you have a deadline.

--Filling out the Nominee Qualification section:

The most common reason a promotion is denied by the Executive Committee is insufficient information in the promotion request.

The Nominee Qualification section requires you to document, in your own words, why you believe this nominee deserves the promotion at this time. Be specific, and comment about each contribution made by the nominee at the International, Regional, and Chapter levels of STARFLEET. You can prepare this ahead of time and paste it into the Vice Admiral Victor Swindell

"Nominee Qualifications" area on the online form if you wish.

--Double-check everything:

Double-check all addresses, names, numbers, and proof read the Nominee Qualifications.

--Give your contact info:

Make sure you supply a phone number &/or email address for yourself....just in case the EC needs to reach you regarding your Nomination. This can save weeks or more of time.

--If you have questions or need help drop me a note at promotions@sfi.org. I'll be happy to help in any way I can.

'STAR WARS' ACTOR PHIL BROWN DIES AT 89

Phil Brown, who played Luke Skywalker's Uncle Owen in the 1977 hit film "Star Wars," has died.

Brown died of pneumonia Thursday at the Motion Picture and Television Country House and Hospital in Woodland Hills, said his wife, Ginny. He was 89.

Though Brown worked in stage and film for more than 30 years, many remember him best for his brief role as the loving uncle who tries to give Skywalker a normal childhood and keep him from knowing he has Jedi roots. Uncle Owen and his wife Beru meet an early end at the hands of imperial storm troopers.

It was "a very small part by comparison to the roles I had previously played. To be quite frank, I never gave it a thought again," Brown told the Baltimore Sun. Brown got the part through unusual circumstances.

He moved his family to London in the 1950s after being blacklisted during the communist scare in the United States. A longtime progressive, Brown always denied being a Communist.

In London, he found work on stage and in such films as "Tropic of Cancer" (1970) and "Twilight's Last Gleaming" (1977).

In the mid-1970s, George Lucas was filming interior scenes for "Star Wars" at a London sound stage and needed an actor with a strong American accent.

Brown got the role, then spent a month or so in Tunisia filming a handful of scenes.

He returned to California in the early 1990s, quickly discovering that the role

had made him a celebrity. He became a popular figure at science fiction conventions.

The son of a doctor, Brown was born in Cambridge, Mass. and graduated from Stanford University.

He was accepted in the Group Theatre in New York in 1938, and first job on Broadway was as a dancer in the play "Everywhere I Roam."

The Group Theatre folded in 1941, and Brown moved to Los Angeles looking for work in the movies.

Along with other former Group Theatre members, he formed the Actor's Laboratory, which produced critically acclaimed works in Hollywood.

He directed plays by Arthur Miller, Nikolai Gogol and Arthur Laurent. In 1948, he

moved to London and played opposite Helen Hayes in Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie."

Returning to Hollywood in 1949, Brown found work as a director. Two years later finished his first feature film, "The Harlem Globetrotters," starring Dorothy Dandridge and members of the famous basketball team.

But that promising start ended with the "Red Scare" and the government focus on some members of the Actor's Lab. Brown and his wife left for London and stayed for 40 years.

He is survived by his wife of 65 years; a son, Kevin, of Hawaii; two grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

Tempting as it may be to embrace laziness and inertia and stay inside the hotel all weekend, I urge everyone attending a STARFLEET International Conference or Regional summit or conference to get out, do a little exploring, see some sights, and enjoy the local color.

One of the factors considered when the Executive Committee selects each year's winning IC bid is what's available in the surrounding area, in terms of both available eateries and tourism opportunities. This is intentional, and critical! It's pretty much impossible for the event's planners to manage to keep every attendee entertained all weekend, so it's important that the surrounding area offer some diversions of its own.

Welcome to the next installment in my series of columns about STARFLEET's annual gatherings. With thanks to Scott Akers for the idea, I'm going to explore — as I hope you will — the world outside the IC hotel.

Got some Spare Time?

The first step in planning to enjoy life outside the event hotel is making sure you have enough time to do so. While some STARFLEET members have lots of spare time during an IC or summit weekend, most attendees find themselves with plenty of scheduled stuff to do, between meetings and panels, general sessions, banquets, and so on. So, I make a point of allowing myself an extra day or two, when time and funds allow. This lets me be relaxed about the beginning and end of the weekend (such as the traditional Dead Dog Party), as well as providing plenty of time for sightseeing.

That often means traveling on Thursday and Monday rather than Friday and Sunday, which has the added benefit sometimes of offering lower airfares, or more readily available free frequent flyer award tickets. But more to the point, it gives me a chance to get settled, as well as checking out a couple of extra local eateries with some folks who live in the area. Even if you don't already count some of the locals among your friends, you'll very likely find someone from the area who'd be happy to join you for a bite, or another traveler willing to share in an adventure.

FROM THE LATINUM CARPET RADM David Klingman USS Jaguar, R4

Welcome to my 44th installment of *Communiqué* fodder - yes, this is my 44th consecutive submission to the CQ, and in this issue I wanted to talk to you about the challenges in writing 44 consecutive articles and what interests me these days.

It's not easy coming up with something every other month, particularly when what interests me changes and doesn't necessarily jive with what's happening on television and movies where science fiction (and Star Trek) are concerned. For most of my STARFLEET "career" I've focused on aspects of Star Trek that interest me - my Xenoarchaeology articles, various scientific topics from the Star Trek universe, and my roles at the various levels within the STARFLEET hierarchy. So where does that leave me, now that Star Trek is more or less off the sensor screen? Other science fiction shows? Fantasy? Horror? Something else?

The challenge I find myself facing is just what do I want to write about that I think will interest everyone else in STARFLEET? What is it that people in the fan club like to watch/like to do with their time? Certainly, I can write about my travels (the quantum slipstream is always warm, just in case I have to fire it up), I can write about STARFLEET events I've attended (IC, of course, is the biggest one, and it's my intent to visit the folks in Philadelphia this year, provided the Air Force is willing to let me take a few days leave), and I can write about the people I've met along the way.

Still, that's been done already. As you the readers know, there are plenty of articles in the CQ about chapter and regional events, charitable and humanitarian endeavors, and the like. It's not my intent to repeat what anyone else has done or

write similar pieces from issue to issue. My challenge is to stay original. Only you'll know for sure if I've succeeded, or if I'm spinning my wheels as you turn the page to something that's more interesting to you. Hopefully some of us connect and have similar interests.

So what does interest me these days?

Well, there are a few things... Let's start this issue with *Stargate* and see where it takes us.

I was fortunate enough to receive Seasons 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Stargate: SG-1 for Christmas and then complete the 8 seasons of boxed sets thanks to a New Year's Day "buy one get one free" sale at BestBuy, so now I have the complete series on DVD (and spent much of New Years and the following days watching as much of it as I could). What is it that draws me to Stargate? Probably the same thing that draws me to Babylon 5, Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, and the developing series of stories in Battlestar Galactica - the broad story that spans multiple seasons, and the opportunity to see the characters, ships, technology, and universe develop in tandem (the excellent writing and acting don't hurt either).

For anyone who's been under a rock for the last eight-and-a-half years, here's my down and dirty review/recap of *Stargate*:

Following the events of the feature film (where Dr. Jackson and Col O'Neill defeat the Goa'uld System Lord, Ra), the key players become involved in the development of an operational command to oversee the Stargate Program, the exploration of worlds connected by the stargate network (which, it turns out, was created by an ancient race, smartly



referred to as The Ancients), and bring back advanced technology to help fight the Goa'uld (who it turns out are made up of many System Lords who have posed over the centuries as the gods of various mythologies). In the process, Earth encounters many Human civilizations transplanted by the Goa'uld, as well as some non-Human alien species. In the span of eight seasons, we also manage to defeat the Goa'uld, free the Jaffa, forge alliances with a number of other races, including the Asgard and the Tok'ra (basically the 'good guy' rebellion of the Goa'uld), and discover Ancient technology that enables us to locate the Lost City of Atlantis (which serves as the spin-off for Stargate: Atlantis).

What I found interesting initially about *Stargate* and throughout most of the series is how few 'alien' species there have been, compared to how many Human civilizations we have encountered. It's far more challenging (in my opinion) to write the types of stories involved with *just* Humans involved, as opposed to the "random forehead of the week" we've seen on *Star Trek* - this has been one of the major criticisms I've had regarding *Star Trek*, particularly where potentially interesting alien species have been encountered and just left as afterthoughts

- once again, in previous articles I mention that many of the potentially interesting aliens from Star Trek: Voyager have been underdeveloped/under-utilized as my primary criticism to enjoying Voyager to its fullest. Enterprise, in my opinion, also falls into this trap, since I would have been far more interested to see the development of the relationship between Earth and its first allies (Vulcans, Andorians, Tellarites) and the foundation of what would become the United Federation of Planets, rather than the appearance of so many aliens who were, in my opinion, misplaced (about 75-100 years too early, if you ask me). Stargate, on the other hand, spends a great deal of time developing the relationship between many Human civilizations and just a few alien cultures, which lends a different kind of charm. Don't get me wrong the universes of Star Trek and Stargate are both well-developed, and the major aliens in both series are more or less appropriate; it just seems to me that the aliens in the Stargate universe are more intentionally placed, while the aliens in Star Trek are often incidentally placed for purpose of a single story that sometimes works, sometimes has a valuable lesson, and sometimes is well written and well acted. Consistency, I think, is the big difference here.

I guess the bottom line is that eight seasons of *Stargate* have been of consistent and higher quality than five *Star Trek* series. Perhaps this is a luxury that *Babylon 5*, *Stargate*, and *Battlestar Galactica* have that *Star Trek* didn't - the opportunity to create one universe in one show with more or less one team of people developing the stories. Too many cooks in the *Star Trek* kitchen perhaps? Perhaps. That's for each of us to decide.

Next issue, I'll talk about *Battlestar Galactica* and see where that takes us.

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE FLEET HISTORIAN GEN Scott Akers • USS Jaguar, R13

Once again we are gathered her together to pay our respects to five valiant ships and their namesakes that came before them. These last four ships of the Constitution class take their nomenclature not from strictly ships of the United States Navy, but show that Earth of the 22nd century had gone far beyond such parochialism and was able to honor not only those might ships of America's past, but also those of other nations, even those who were at one time or another opponents of that same US Navy. Herein we will look at the Intrepid and Valiant, ships of Her Majesties Britannic Navy. Kongo, a vessel of the Imperial Japanese Navy, the Potemkin of the Russian and later Soviet Navy, and finally the Defiant named for a fictional ship of England, that garnered so much publicity that some thought she had been a real vessel.

There have been three ships to date to carry the name HMS Intrepid, built between 1890 and 1894, she served first as a cruiser, and as Naval Technology evolved so quickly, she was converted first into a minelayer, then a depot ship, she met her end in 1918, when she was sunk as a block ship (filled with concrete) in the entry to the Port of Zeebrugge on the Belgian coast, this was to prevent ships and more importantly submarines to be able to use that port (and it sister port Ostend). This action came to be known as the Zeebrugge Raid. The raid itself only slowed the German Navy for a few days, but was considered a moral victory for the British Navy.

The second HMS Intrepid was an I-Class Destroyer, commissioned in July of 1937. She served successfully for several years of World War Two, aptly living up to her name. On October 14th, 1939, she with her sisters Ivanhoe and Inglefeld cornered, attacked and sank the German U-Boat, U-45 south-west of the coast of Ireland. Intrepid was also part of the task force that chased down and sank the Battleship **Bismarck** in the May of 1941. She followed this up with convoy duty to the besieged British forces on the island of Malta in 1942. Sadly, she was sunk by a German Junkers 88 aircraft while in the Aegean Sea on September 27th, 1943.

The third HMS Intrepid L-11, was a Landing Platform Dock, (an amphibious warfare ship) which was able to serve its entire life 1964-2004 without being sunk. Built in the early 1960's in Scotland, she had a large floodable well deck in her stern, and a flight deck above that capable of supporting either Helos or Harriers. She carried 8 landing craft as well as her detachment of either Royal Marine Commandos or British SAS forces. She served in the Falklands campaign

against Argentina, and was noted for the tragic accident in 1982, of a Sea King Helicopter when SAS forces were trying to cross deck to another vessel. Eventually it was decided to replace her due to the vast amount of asbestos aboard which would make overhaul to expensive. She was replaced by the HMS Bulwark, part of the **Albion** class, in 2004. (1)

Our next homage is to the USS Valiant, with six British ships carrying that name. The first HMS Valiant was a 74 gun Ship of the Line, while larger than most ship the American Navy would have until the American Civil War, she was still considered only a third rate, and was used to guard the ends of the Battle Line. She was followed in 1807 by another Third Rate Ship of the Line which served in the Napoleonic Wars, and again in 1825 by yet another Third Rate which served throughout the Mediterranean Sea.

The fourth HMS Valiant was launched in 1863, an ironclad battleship of the Hector Class, and served for over 50 years, before being decommissioned and renamed the Valiant II. She was eventually sold for scrap in 1957, with nearly hundred years afloat. Not much information is currently available about her, but she apparently served with distinction during the long era of Pax Brittanica.

The fifth HMS Valiant was launched in 1914 as a Queen Elizabeth Class Battleship and served with distinction at the Battle of Jutland and was the flagship for Admiral Hugh Evan-Thomas' 5th Battle Squadron of the Grand Fleet. Between World Wars One and Two, she was upgrade to a configuration of 36,513 tons displacement, 197 meters in length, a crew of 1,220, cruising speed of 24 knots with a range of 4,400 miles. She carried 8 x 15 inch guns, 14 x 6 inch guns, 4 x 21 inch (533 mm) submerged torpedo tubes, and 46 other smaller and anti-aircraft guns. During World War Two, she participated in the sinking of the Vichy French Fleet at Mers-el-Kebir, fought at the Battle of Cape Matapan, and the Battle of Crete. She was sunk in shallow water at Alexandria Harbor by Italian Frogman, but was raised and repaired and served much of the rest of the war, until damaged again in the Indian Ocean. After the war she served as a training vessel, until decommissioned in 1948 and then scrapped in 1950.

Finally the sixth and latest HMS Valiant S-102, was launched in 1963 as the lead vessel in the Valiant Class of nuclear powered submarines. Displacing 4,800 tons while submerged and just 87 meters in length, she carried six 21" bow torpedo tubes and could maintain 28 knots

submerged indefinitely. She was refitted in 1970 and 1977, served in the Falklands War of 1982, and was again refitted in 1989. Following the development of permanent engine trouble in mid 1994, she was retired and decommissioned that same year. She awaits a time when it will be safe for her reactor to be removed to be removed from the water and converted into a public display at Devonport, England. (2)

Our next ship is the USS Kongo, named after three ships of the Japanese Navy. These ships were all named for Mount Kongo in the Osaka Prefecture of Japan. The first Kongo was an 1878 armored corvette of the Imperial Japanese Navy. She was designed by the distinguished naval constructor Edward James Reed, and built in Great Britain. Seventy meters in length, Twelve point four in breadth, she displaced 2200 tons, and combined three sailing masts with a single shaft reciprocating engine to achieve 14 knots. She had a crew of 308, armor of 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 inches, and carried three 6.8 inch guns, six 6 inch guns, and two 14.4 inch torpedo tubes. She served in the Russo-Japanese War of 1905, and was decommissioned in 1909 and later scrapped.

The next IJN Kongo was Japan's first super dreadnaught class ship, and the first ship of its class. Built in England and launched in 1912, she was completed and sent to Japan the following year. She saw little action in World War Two but experienced two major overhauls before World War Two began. With a crew of 1360, her class was the first to carry 14 inch gun main armament, and carried eight such guns as well as sixteen 6 inch guns secondary guns, and 118 twentyfive mm Anti-Aircraft Guns. After her final rebuilt she displaced 36,600 tons, was over 220 meters long, and nearly 31 meters in breadth. Her maximum speed was 30 knots, and she could cruise continuously for 10,000 nautical miles at 18 knots.

While most of her duty was spent escorting aircraft carriers, she participated in the Battle of Guadalcanal, the Battle of Leyte Gulf, and was finally sunk in the Formosa Straights by the US Submarine Sealion. She was the only Japanese Battleship sunk by a submarine, and the last battleship so sank.

The third Japanese ship named Kongo serves in the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Forces and is the class ship of Destroyers modeled after and improved upon the US Navy's Arleigh Burke class. Four Kongos have been built so far, displacing 9,845 tons making them as large as some cruisers, and giving them a draft to deep for anything but ocean going service. They are equipped with the advanced Aegis fire control system, a vertical launch system with up to 15 VLS tubes and 90 missiles in the magazines. In addition they carry two CIWS defense mounts, and two triple tube torpedo mounts, and a single 127mm 54 caliber gun. Powered by for gas turbine jet

engines, the Kongos can cruise in excess of 30 knots for extended periods.(3)

Our next ship is the USS Potemkin named after the Imperial Russian Ship Potemkin (in Russian pronounced Patyomkin) which was a pre-dreadnaught battleship of the Russian Black Sea Fleet. Built at the Nikolayev shipyard in what is now the Ukraine in 1898, but not commissioned until 1904. The named honored General-Field Marshal Grigori Alexandrovich Potemkin, hero of the Russian Drive to annex the steppes lands of the Cossacks, and a favorite of the Tsarina Catherine II. The ship's most famous exploits was actually a mutiny by its crew in the Russian Mini-Revolution of 1905. Joined initially by the crew of an escorting torpedo boat, and for awhile another Battleship, the Georgiy Pobedonosets, the Potemkin held off the Russian Fleet for eleven days before finally surrendering to Romanian authorities. Some of her crew returned to Russia and were convicted of Mutiny, while the rest waited until the Bolshevik Revolution in 1917 to make their return. The exploits became part of the famed silent movie, the "Battleship Potemkin", a classic of Stalinist propaganda. (4)

The last ship of our three-part article is not one of the original 14 ships, but one that figured prominently in the episode "The Tholian Web", as well as the Enterprise episodes "Dark Mirror I & II", the USS Defiant. As far as this researcher can find, there was never a warship in Earth History named the Defiant, but rather was a ship in a much played 1962 movie "H.M.S. Defiant" starring Sir Alec Guinness, and Dick Bogarde. Set in the pre-Napoleonic conflict between England and Revolutionary France, the 'Defiant' was one of the ships participating in the Spithead and Nore mutinies, where British working class sailors rose up against upper class officers. The Mutiny itself challenged the British aristocracy and instilled in them a fear that their own working class may revolt much like the French did a few short years before. While the ship was not real, the movie had great impact, and when Roddenberry made his show the Defiant was there. During the Enterprise episodes, a painting of the movie ship was hung in the ship's briefing room. Rumor has it that the writers for the later episodes never knew that the ship was only a movie creation.

Conclusion

Well that's it. Six months, three articles, fifteen ships. It has been fun, it has been interesting, and now it is the end. Until I write again, I remain:

EDITORIALS

STAR TREK'S POSITIVE MESSAGE - IT'S STILL IMPORTANT ADM Alex Rosenzweig • USS Avenger, R7

The genesis of this essay came in the midst of a gripe-and-grumble session. I saw what I felt has become a serious problem, not only in STARFLEET, but in fandom at large, and I was basically griping to some friends. So, one of them said, "This sounds like a good essay for the CQ." And she was right, because this is worth discussing.

Watching this organization of late, it has struck me that there has been a small, but distinct, trend toward enthusiasm for a lot of very dark themes. These themes include, but might not be limited to, militarism (and I do not mean patriotic defense of country, I mean aggressive saber-rattling and intimidation), totalitarianism, aggression, paranoia, and just plain garden-variety anger. I can't honestly say why it is that that enthusiasm got started, but I have to admit, it concerns me greatly.

Why, you may ask?

Consider: What is the message of Star Trek? What did the show tell us? It suggested that it's possible, despite all the tensions in the world, for Humanity to overcome that, to live in peace with each other, and even more, to reach outward, together, into the universe on the greatest mission of all, to "see what's out there". Not everything out there was friendly, of course, but our characters and the civilization they represented overcame adversity without ever losing sight of the principles for which they stood. Indeed, it was those principles which, much of the time, gave them the strength to overcome that adversity.

Star Trek fandom embraced those principles, and came to believe in a philosophy that said violence was the last resort, not the first. We embraced the idea that exploration, discovery, and finding the wonders that lie beyond the border was something worth emulating, and that building a positive future by helping our world become a better place in the present was something worth doing.

Starfleet, the exploration and defensive agency of the United Federation of Planets, is the embodiment of those ideals: the bravest, best, and brightest of all the Federation's peoples, joined together to reach out into the unknown and make it known. The people who make up Starfleet are the ones who believe that you fired your weapon if, and only if, you'd run out of alternative ways to resolve a situation, and they're not happy about having to do it. They would, but they wouldn't like it.

Our organization is based on that agency. That agency's ideals and missions are underlying principles behind much of what our organization does, and assumedly—holds dear. When someone says, "I am a member of STARFLEET", the fact that our organization represents and supports those ideals, within the very structures that make it work, speaks to the appreciation of and commitment to Star Trek's positive future. Our many programs and events and charitable works are further testament to that...and they're fun, too.

Or, at least, that's the theory.

In practice, the embrace of the sorts of themes I spoke of at the beginning of this article, raises questions. People say, "It's all good fun!" But is it? Are those themes really "fun"? In Star Trek, and indeed a lot of storytelling, whether it be Trek, scifi, or just stories in general, those things are what our heroes overcome. Those are the tools of their antagonists. They are not there to be emulated, and indeed, in episode after episode, they are shown to be flawed. For example, in the original Star Trek episode "Mirror, Mirror", in which Kirk and a landing party from Enterprise were transposed into a hostile, opposite version of their world, Kirk told the Mirror-Spock (an honorable man in both universes), after Mirror-Spock predicted the collapse of his Empire, "I submit to you that your empire is illogical, because it cannot endure." And it doesn't endure. It falls. Of course there are Star Trek episodes in which our heroes went off to battle. But they didn't enjoy it; they did it because it was necessary to preserve their way of life, just as the brave men and women of our Armed Forces today go into uncomfortable, hostile placesand sometimes even do battle in foreign lands-to protect and defend our way of life.

I think that it's understandable that some of those darker themes have come to

the fore. We live in uncomfortable times today. We're not sure what the future holds. People are frustrated, and often angry. They want to get aggressions out. But in doing so, they play out negative archetypes, and create negative perceptions. One person I communicated with regarding this situation described how stunned he was that these dark themes have themselves engendered negative reactions. But another person had the following to say (quoted with permission): "I joined STARFLEET because it was a group of people who wanted to make a positive impact in the world around them...I cannot fathom how that is accomplished by a group who insist in participating in a subset that encourages assassination as a legitimate form of promotion, torture as a legitimate form of interrogation, etc."

Now, obviously, I don't think that these folks actually believe in those things in their everyday lives! Far from it! But it nonetheless presents a very negative impression, and that negativity can make the presentation of a positive environment that much more difficult. Is it just for play? Obviously. Does it present a positive message? I have to question that.

I think it's in times like these that, maybe contrary to today's "conventional wisdom", we **need** to have that idealism. We need to be able to say, "Tomorrow can be better." We need to be able to say, "I'm not going to kill today." We need to be able to say, "Who's going to take the first step toward trust? The answer is, I will." When Star Trek first aired, it was a turbulent time in our people's history, and we wondered if we'd make it through. Star Trek's positive, hopeful message spoke to those fears, and the result has endured for four decades (and counting). Today, it's still a turbulent time, and we still wonder, and the message of the various Trek series still holds true. We can be better, and we can still reach for tomorrow, with enthusiasm and hope, not anger or fear.

Can our organization still stand for that, while offering current and prospective members a fun and worthwhile experience for their membership dollar? I believe it can. But it needs to do better than it's been doing lately. Some people say that the future of Trek and science fiction is dark and unhappy stories. I disagree. I think that the message of a positive future, where exploration and discovery are more powerful forces than weapons or fear, is as strong and relevant today as ever, maybe more so. And I think that STARFLEET can and should embrace it, in **all** aspects of our organizational life.

That enthusiasm for each other, for tomorrow, and for a positive and bright future can sometimes be a challenge, but it's worth it, and I challenge each and every one of you to join me in meeting it.

Last January, the SFMC strength stood at approximately 740 members. As of January 9, 2006, the SFMC membership is 839 (397 Active Marines, 442 Reserve Marines) in 127 units, according to the SFMC database. We hope to continue making improvements and meeting the needs of the membership to help you enjoy the SFMC even more in the coming months and years.

NCO CORPS SGM Scott Grant

Role of the NCO in the Corps:

The classical representation of the role of NCOs has for years identified them as "the backbone of the Army," an accolade that brings to mind a vision of stalwarts who guarantee the honor, integrity, fortitude and esprit de corps of the force. I would not want to alter that vision, for it is an apt portrayal of a vital role an NCO must play; nevertheless, it has long been my contention that the analogy fails to portray the far greater scope and responsibility associated with the corps of men and women.

In my view, the NCO Corps provides not only a skeleton on which to hang the body but, more important, the nerve system that allows the body to function.

The fundamental mission of the NCO Corps is automatic execution of the doctrine, the customs and the orders of a command. It is the assurance of execution that guarantees that the Corps can function in accord with its plans and the intentions of its commanders. It is the NCO complement of any command that watches over the conduct of Marines as they do their duty in response to the dictates and desires of the chain of command.

The NCO must also be prepared to substitute for the officer corps. Every NCO is familiar with the exigencies of the service that results in him having to serve as the alter ego of the lieutenant or captain who is "not yet assigned," who departed before his replacement arrived, or who went on six weeks of schooling or temporary duty. During those periods, motivation and leadership, normally the responsibilities of the commissioned officer, devolve also on the NCO. The Infantry School teaches lieutenants that "Follow me!" is their creed; when lieutenants are absent, sergeants step forward.

A final NCO responsibility, one that is unwritten, unproclaimed but real, nevertheless, it has the responsibility for training, molding and caring for second lieutenants - and for a lot of first lieutenants and captains, too.

The NCO Corps has grown and matured in it role in the past few years. World War II saw good NCOs spread very thinly through the force. It was only the lucky lieutenant or captain who found a platoon sergeant or squad leader or first sergeant who was professionally competent and more experienced than himself. The NCO Corps got by on dedication, patriotism and on-the-job training.

Mecha Force

Greeting Fellow Starfleet Members,

I will be talking about mecha. For those of you who do not know what a mech is, please read on; for those of you who do, you can skip this section. Mecha is the name given to giant mobile war machines. What do we mean by giant. The average height of a SMFC mecha unit is between 25 to 35 feet, weighing anywhere from 10 to 100 tons in total weight fully loaded. Now, what do we mean by mobile war machines. Well, in our real world time, an Abrams Tank is a mobile war machine. In the case of a mech, it is a war machine that tasks on the appearance and movement of a robot, or in most cases humanoid, that is piloted by a person. So, take the Abrams barrel and place it on a 25-foot tall robot and you basically have a mech. Now, please understand that this is a simplified explanation of what a mech is, but it covers the basics.

One (1) of the issues people may have with the incorporation of mechs within the Star Trek universe is that they are war machines, for the most part. They do not fit into Gene's dream. Understand this simple detail, the Dominion War. Even the exploration ships of the great fleet are designed with weapon systems, which are to be used for defensive purposes. Fighting is an aspect of our nature. This is not to say that I agree with it or not, just pointing out a point of fact that is backed up by our own history. The inclusion of mech is not that far fetched. The mecha can be found within the SFMC, which places them outside of the exploration part of the Federation and into the military aspect that is the Federation.

The SFMC Academy offers a series of courses and a manual detailing the SFMC Mecha Branch can be found under TRACOM of the SFMC web site. Outside of the SFMC Mecha Branch is an independent group of SFI/SFMC

members known as the Mecha Council. It is the purpose of the Mecha Council to work on details and to discuss the various aspects that are mechs. The group runs a list serve using YahooGroups!, a free message service that can be found at: http://groups.yahoo.com/group/sfmc_ mecha/ Any member of SFI/SFMC may join the list and are welcome to join.

Further information on the Mecha Council can be found at the web site: http:// www.mechacouncil.org. One (1) of the projects the Mecha Council directs is the publication of Mechajock: the Newsletter. The newsletter is filled with information relating to mechs and is published, as of this date, by monthly.

The Mecha Council is proud to announce our help in sponsoring the first annual STARFLEET Battletech/Mechwarrior Tournament. The tournament is directed by Paul Williams bt-contest@ mechacouncil.org and began on Jan. 1, 2006 and will end the weekend of the IC06, where the top three (3) winners will be announced. The three (3) winners will receive prizes as for their placing in the top of the game play. The tournament uses the standard published rules of Battletech/Mechwarrior (BT/MW). The old text manuals/books published by



FASA can still be found. I have personally found auctions work great for rebuilding your library. 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On December 16, 2005, the crew of the USS GALLANT brought some joy to the families of children spending the holidays being cared for at Children's Hospital of Central California. These families, staying at the Ronald McDonald House of the Central Valley, in Madera, California, spend most of their days visiting their ailing children in the Intensive and Critical Care Units of the hospital. Around 6pm, they head back to the Ronald McDonald House for a bite of dinner - which they generally make themselves in kitchens provided for them - try to relax for a couple of hours, and then either go to bed or go back for another brief visit before visiting hours finally end.

On this particular Friday night, however, they were greeted with a surprise when they arrived at the House - STARFLEET officers, a Klingon warrior, dinner ready for them (sandwiches, chips, snack pastries, and soda), and a showing of STAR TREK VI: THE UNDISCOVERED COUNTRY in the common area "living room". Dinner donated by two businesses from nearby Fresno, California (Savory Sandwiches and a local Vons store) - was much appreciated, and these families were

Sometime during the evening, a threeyear-old boy being treated for cancer arrived with his mother in the common area... and although he knew no English (and certainly no Klingonese) and therefore could not communicate with him, he was fascinated with the tall Klingon warrior, who knelt down to the child's level and communicated on a level that has nothing to do with height and everything to do with love. House Marketing Director Pedro Santana was ecstatic about the visit, and invited the GALLANT back whenever they wished to return. More visits - including possible future dinner-and-a-movie nights - are being planned. But for now, the memories of that cool night in mid-December shine as bright in our memories as the beautifully decorated trees that decorated the Ronald McDonald House of Central California.

EPILOGUE: This report was delayed for a sad reason. The picture, taken by Mr. Santana, was not included in the House's newsletter or forwarded to me until recently for a sad reason: the dear child



pictured has taken a turn for the worse. He was diagnosed with two more tumors and has been sent to Stanford for treatment beyond the capacity of Children's Hospital of Central California to provide. Mr. Santana told me the boy's mother asked to be remembered to us in thanks for the dinner and movie night, and stated that, "This is the reason why we appreciate
