Stardate 107017: Today was the big day! I could feel the tension rise as members of all Region 5 ships entered the room! According

to Regional Coordinator Rear Admiral Nat Saenz, every single ship of Region 5 was indeed represented in today's meeting, and this has not happened for the last six years! How is that for my very first summit meeting! The Region 5 "ships of the line" consisted of the USS Crusader, USS

Daniel Soule, USS Rubicon, USS Thermopylae, USS Wildhorse, USS Antares (all six representing Washington state), USS Destiny (representing Oregon), CM Russell (representing Montana), and Greywolf Station SFR-501 (a Jupiter-Class Space Station representing Idaho). All commanding officers or envoys of their respective ships were formally introduced upon their entrance into the conference room.







# **ECAB** Report

Since early October, the Executive Committee and Admiralty Board have discussed a number of matters, including:

- STARFLEET's filing of a three-month extension on its IRS Form 990. There was a discrepancy between the number submitted on last year's Form 990 and the number produced by the financial books. Chief Financial Officer Liz Woolf and members of the Rickard administration were planning to discuss this matter with former CFO Pat Spillers in order to reconcile the numbers before filing a new IRS Form 990.
- The demise of Region 20. Region 20 coordinator Adi Jones allowed his membership to lapse this summer and also asked that his chapter - the USS Saratoga - be decommissioned. The only remaining chapter, the USS Icarus, had no assigned STARFLEET members as of mid-November.
- A personnel matter involving possible financial improprieties in Region 1.

In addition, the following personnel changes (independent of election transition) have occurred:

 Ray Brown has resigned as STARFLEET's Inspector General and has been replaced on an interim basis by Robert Westfall.

## An Exploration of Newfoundland's Science Museums

At the end of May, I traveled to St. John's, Newfoundland, for a geophysical conference. While there, as is my custom when traveling, I visited three science museums: the Newfoundland Science Centre, the Fluvarium, and the Johnson Geo Centre. The third one is my favorite, and I'll discuss it in a moment. But first, the other two.

The Newfoundland Science Centre was established

in 1993 as a non-profit charitable organization within the Murray Premises in downtown St. John's, with exhibits geared for small children to spark their interest in science at an early age. According to their charter, their mission "is to 'spark curiosity and inspire interest and participation in science and technology' through the presentation of interactive exhibits, informal education programs, and the delivery of provincewide outreach programs." They have a small selection of clever exhibits that explain basic science principles in simple terms a child can understand. Hands-on exhibits include astronaut space gloves and a plasma ball and several others. They have a cool solar system model hanging from the ceiling, a StarLab planetarium show, and many other exhibits. For information online, visit http://www.nlsciencecentre.com/

The **Fluvarium** is a world-class freshwater interpretation center run by the Quidi Vidi Rennie's River Development Foundation

(QVRRDF). The word "Fluvarium" comes from the Latin for "windows on a stream."

The QVRRDF was formed in 1985 by a group of concerned citizens who wanted to clean up Rennies River, which had become terribly polluted. The river is now so clean that people can fish from it again. The foundation has a mandate to promote freshwater education and restore and enhance the Rennies River watershed.

I found the highlight of the Fluvarium to be the nine large underwater windows which provide visitors with a panoramic view beneath the surface of Nagle's Hill Brook as it flows past the building on its way to Long Pond. Most of the fish you will see through the Fluvarium windows are Brown Trout (*salmo trutta*) who are very inquisitive about the humans looking at

them. I think they love to have their picture taken! You're able to study the life cycle of the fish, from spawning to adulthood.

Other exhibits focus on river ecosystems and include fossils and geologic eras, glaciers, urban watersheds, bogs, freshwater mammals and bugs, amphibians, and a cool display on composting. The displays are geared toward children, but are good for adults, too. The Fluvarium passes 10 to 12 thousand school kids per year through the Aqualab education program. I found the **Johnson Geo Centre** to be the most exciting of the three science museums in St. John's. The first thing you see as you descend to the lower exhibit level is a scaled display of the solar system hanging from the ceiling. The colorful orbs dwarf everything else in the Reception Hall and are most impressive. The Geo Centre was conducting classes for schoolchildren while I was there. The classes I eavesdropped on included geology, minerals (igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic rocks), and renewable vs. non-renewable resources.

Based on the province's unique and truly remarkable geological history, and its contribution to scientific knowledge, the Geo Centre's purpose is to establish and promote Newfoundland and Labrador as "Earth's Geological Showcase." The building was dug into the geologic strata of the island so that one wall

of the Centre is natural solid rock. You can see and touch geologic layers that are 550 million years old, promoted as:

- -- 450 million years older than the Rocky Mountains!
- -- 350 million years older than the Atlantic Ocean!
- -- 300 million years older than the First Dinosaurs!
- -- 150 million years older than the First Land Animals!

Exhibits discuss volcanoes, earthquakes, rocks, minerals (with samples you can touch), fossils, geological time, some meteorology, ice ages, and plate tectonics. They have anthropological exhibits that display and discuss

archaeological samples of skulls, partial skeletons, DNA, and the history of the rise of civilization. In addition, they have lots of astronomy and space science displays.

Perhaps the exhibit I found most fascinating was the "awe-inspiring Stellarium, showing the 250 closest stars to our own star, the Sun." The Stellarium is a box – a cube about 3 feet big on an edge – that had LEDs representing the stars. A recording discussed features of the nearest stars, with red marker LEDs lighting up to highlight each star's 3-dimensional position relative to the Sun. The stars that were mentioned included Alpha Centauri, Barnard's Star, Sirius, Procyon, Altair, Fomahault, Vega, and the Pollux/Castor binary. The Stellarium is so cool!

The Geo Centre is heated geothermally through holes drilled over 500 feet into the rock. Using heat pumps, they circulate fluids that heat or cool the entire building.

Other displays in the Geo Centre include the ExxonMobil Oil and Gas Gallery and The Titanic Story. For more information, go to their web page at http://www.geocentre.ca/

And now a special treat. St. John's is the most eastern city in North America. It's also located pretty far north, at latitude 47 degrees North. The weather was quite cold while I was there, with daily lows around freezing and highs in the lower 40s F, or about 10 degrees colder than normal. Sea ice was still locked around the north end of the island, a day's drive north of where I was. On the last couple days I was there, an iceberg floated past St. John's and ran aground just a few miles south of the harbor. Pictures of icebergs are nice, but seeing one up close and personal – for real – is most impressive!
