son, an uncle, and a proud member of Starfleet International. Truman was all that and so much more. This is a memoir of the man whom I have loved for twenty years and who sadly passed away on September 29. This is my memory of my beloved Truman.

I remember it as though it were yesterday... The day I meet Truman Temple, it was in March of 1989, the USS Achernar was having an anniversary party. It would be the first of many big events for me as a member of Starfleet. The commanding officer was the late Pam DuPuy. Members past and present were invited to help celebrate this big event. I can remember sitting and visiting with everyone there, just getting to know them when through the doors waked a man six feet tall with brown hair wearing dark sunglasses. As he walked in, he slowly took off his dark glasses, revealing the most beautiful crystal blue eyes I had ever seen. He was introduced to everyone who didn't know him. During the party we chatted, and we found that we had many things in common. He made me laugh so hard at times. I learned that day that he had a great sense of humor. After the party, I found that I couldn't get him off my mind and I wished that I had asked for his number, but I didn't. A few days later, I got my list from the Starfleet Pen Pal Service, and as I looked through it, I found Truman's info. I sat down and immediately wrote him, asking if he remembered me. To my delight, a few days later I got a letter from him telling me he did remember me. That would be the first of many, many letters we would exchange. A few weeks later, Truman asked me to go on our first date to see Star Trek V: The Final Frontier. It would be the first of many dates we would have.

In 1991, the first of many big events in our lives together happened. I learned I was expecting Truman's first child, due in December. Shortly after I found out I was pregnant, Truman changed my life yet again when he asked me to marry him...and of course I said "yes." Truman was very excited about being a daddy, and throughout the pregnancy he was very attentive to me, and very protective. I recall one day he told me I was his little china doll, fragile and precious to him. The big day came, and I gave birth to a beautiful little girl Kimberly. Right away she was the apple of her daddy's eye. Our lives together entered another chapter, that of parents.

The next event in our lives would come on July 17, 1992 when we exchanged wedding vows and I became his wife. Once again our lives were to change when, in late 1994, I found out I was expecting Truman's second child (my third). In December of 1994, the ultrasound showed that our final child would be a boy. Well, as you can imagine, Truman was thrilled beyond words! He was to have a son, and in May, 1995, I gave birth to our son Robert. Truman was now a proud father of three children. My first born, Catherine, loved him more than any little girl could love a daddy. Even though Truman was her step-father, he always loved her as if she were his own; they had a very special bond.

Truman was so much to so many. He was a loving son to Verena and Truman Temple; he was a very protective brother to Tali, Erika, Terry, Kevin and Robert; he was a very proud

My husband, best friend, a wonderful father, a grandpa, a uncle to many nieces and nephews; but one title he held was one of his proudest: the title of Grandpa. Our daughter Catherine blessed the family with two handsome grandsons, Arthur John (AJ) and Mason. Truman just loved being a grandpa, and it showed each time he spoke with or about



There was one accomplishment that Truman was extremely proud of, and that was his time in the Boy Scouts of America. Truman worked hard and was rewarded in 1984 with the rank of Eagle Scout. His love of scouting is shown in his son Robert who, like his father, wants to be an Eagle Scout. Truman was thrilled when he was asked to be the Assistant Cub Master. He loved being a role model for the young scouts.

Truman was much more than the various titles he held. He was a man who loved all kinds of music, he loved to read all kinds of books, and he loved movies of all kinds with Science Fiction being one of his favorites. He enjoyed history and had earned his AA and BA in History. His passion for learning rubbed off on our children who, like their father, want to attend college.

As a husband, he was what everyone woman dreamed of. Truman was raised in the belief that marriage is a partnership, and it showed. He was a great cook, he didn't mind doing his share of the cleaning, the only thing he didn't like doing was cleaning the windows, but that was ok with me. It was Truman who encouraged me to go back to school in 1990 to get my GED and then to later attend San Bernardino Valley College and pursue my three degrees. He was my inspiration for much of my art and my biggest fan. He was always there for every little thing, not just for me but for our children as well. Truman was my best friend, and I love him very much, he gave me beautiful children and was always there for me no matter what I needed. He knew how to make me smile and, when I was sad, he knew that by just doing his impersonation of Yoda, I would laugh

Truman's career in Starfleet started long before I ever meet him. He was a very proud member of this organization and spoke of it to many people. He served on many ships in various departments--he's served as First Officer to a few and Commanding Officer to a few others. When I met, him I think he was CO of the USS Alliance in Los Angeles. He also served on the USS Constitution under the command of Jack Fields. There were many chapters that he was a part of, but the one that he had a deep sense of pride for was the last ship he commanded: the USS Centurion. When we moved from LA County to the Inland Empire, Truman went about trying to find a local chapter we could be a part of, which led us to the Centurion under the command of Aaron Murphy and Jim Monroe. From the first time we meet Aaron and Jim, we knew we had found a new home in Fleet and became friends with both of them and their families.

Truman has also served Starfleet in other ways: he was Armor Branch director and DCO of Tracom. He was a very active member of Starfleet Academy, always busy writing and taking numerous exams. Truman also served as OIC of the First MSG in the $4^{\rm th}$ Brigade, and he served a DOIC of the 4^{th} Brigade. He rose through the ranks and earned many awards during his service to Starfleet and the Starfleet

Truman loved being a member of SFI/SFMC and could always be found sitting at the computer writing or grading the many exams, sending numerous emails, and of course making lots of friends. Through his career in Starfleet, he made many great friends and was very proud to wear the uniform to any and all events. His pride in this organization rubbed off on many, but mainly his son Robert who wants to follow in his father's footsteps within SFI/SFMC.

Throughout his career in Starfleet, Truman made many dear and wonderful friends with whom he kept in constant touch on a regular basis up until his stroke in late August. Like so many, his passing on September 29th was a shock to all, and I know that each and everyone who got to know him will miss him in their own way. We all will have wonderful memories of the man who deeply loved this organization and was a big part of it.

Truman was the love of my life, my best friend, and my beloved husband...a man who always made me feel like a queen. He gave the best hugs. He always had a shoulder to cry on if you needed it and a willingness to listen to anyone who needed him. He always knew how to make me laugh when all I ever wanted to do was cry. Truman was always there whenever he was needed.

Truman Temple will be remembered and missed by so many not just in Starfleet, but by all his family and friends. But to me, he was more then the many titles he held. To me, Truman was so much more, and my heart will always be his. I've loved him for twenty years and will always love him.

Choosing a New Vice-Commander for STARFLEET

Of course, I began by contacting a couple of people that I knew and that I felt could step into that role, work with the current Executive Committee, and support the direction and changes that I have been trying to move towards.

After contacting a few people, I found that either the interest wasn't there or that workplace commitments prohibited them from committing to that position fully. It then occurred to me that 1) I should be talking with members who were interested in the position, and 2) that I didn't know every capable person in STARFLEET. I put out an announcement that I would be accepting applications from those individuals who were interested in the position, and I requested they send me their real and STARFLEET resumes and a short narrative as to why they wanted the job and why they felt they should be considered.

Let me say that I was pleased with the response

that I got and that I appreciate those who are willing to "step up" to the rigors associated with the VCS position. As of the 15th of October, I had received applications from the following eleven members:

As you can see, those applicants include members who don't always agree with me or my administration. Actually, a few have been very outspoken in their disapproval. But everyone listed here genuinely wants to do his part to work towards the betterment of STARFLEET and deserve to be acknowledged.

Seven of the applicants sat for interviews. These were extremely interesting and revealing and gave me some difficult choices to make. I narrowed the field to three very qualified candidates. I let the EC have the opportunity to listen to recordings the three interviews (done with the knowledge and permission of the applicants) and give me their input and feelings on these top candidates. With all that I heard from the candidates in their interviews plus input from the EC, I still had a challenging decision to make. I could have chosen someone who has a lot of great ideas for programs in STARFLEET. Or I could have chosen someone whom I know personally and am positive that I could work with very easily. But, in the end, I selected someone who is very knowledgeable in constitutional matters and isn't someone who will simply tell me what I they think I want to hear. Additionally, I know that I can trust this person to pick up the reform banner and see it through for the best of STARFLEET.

To the applicants who were not selected, I sincerely thank you for stepping forward to help and for sharing your ideas and opinions with me. You were, each of you, strong candidates in your own ways. But in the end, there could only be one VCS. However, I hope the rest of you will continue to offer your help and support for the betterment of STARFLEET well into the future.

ECAB Report

The ECAB has been busy over the past few months working and debating on several key challenges facing our organization. It is encouraged that if the membership has questions about any of these discussions that they should contact their Regional Coordinator.

Cuba

Recently, our members in Cuba became a hot topic because of the current state of US diplomatic relations with Cuba. It seems that membership in STARFLEET for those in Cuba is illegal according to US Federal law, specifically the Helms-Burton act, which prohibits US Corporations from allowing citizens from Cuba to have transactions of any kind or to hold US Corporation leadership positions. There have been ongoing discussions and debates on how to both address our Cuban member needs and to be in compliance with the Helms-Burton act. Several proposals are on the table such as constitutional amendments changing or creating membership types or creating external affiliation agreements. Both proposals have their pluses and minuses.

STARFLEET Academy Cheating Policy

Another topic of discussion is the proposal to craft a cheating policy for those who partake of Academy courses. There have been a few reported incidents recently of alleged cheating on certain Academy exams. Since there has not previously been an official policy to deal with reporting, investigating, and potentially punishing cheating, this document has been debated passionately and has taken on many revisions. But I believe it is very close to a resolution.

Motions Voted upon

In an effort to make the inner workings of our organization more transparent the following proposal was presented to the AB:

AB08-04: At the end of the voting period, all votes of the AB shall be made public.

At the end of the voting period, all votes of the AB shall be made public. Votes shall be posted publicly within five (5) days from completion of vote within all official forums of electronic communication (SFI-L, Announcements-L and within the next available publication of the CQ). The public information shall contain the motion as submitted to the AB, the member who submits the motion, the member who seconds

the motion and a tally by region of the vote. Result: Passed: Aye: 09, Nay: 0, Abstain: 07

In an attempt to mandate closer scrutiny on EC business expenditures, the following motion was proposed:

AB08-05: Prior AB Approval of Financial **Transactions**

Any extra-core expenses above the US Dollar value of \$500 are subject to approval by the STARFLEET Admiralty Board before funds may be spent or promised on behalf of STARFLEET. Requests for extra-core spending above \$500 must be sent from the STARFLEET CFO to the STARFLEET Admiralty Board for review and approval. The STARFLEET Admiralty Board must render their opinion by a majority vote on the disbursement of funds within 30 days of the CFO's request. If the Admiralty Board is unable to reach an agreement approving or denying the request within 30 days, the expense's claim shall revert to the opinion of the STARFLEET Executive Committee by majority vote within the STARFLEET Executive Committee.

Computer Operations Report

Greetings,

I have a variety of things to update everyone on this time around. First and most importantly is the announcement about a membership processing policy change that was announced at the International Conference this past June. That change is that, as of February 1, 2009, the default for membership packets will the CD option. We will, of course, still be offering paper packets, but it will no longer be the default option. For example, if someone does not specify their packet preference when renewing or submitting an application currently, we will at this time send a full paper packet. However, that will flip so you will have to specifically request a full paper packet come February.

It is rare these days that you find a membership-based organization that has a membership fee for less than \$30 per annum. STARFLEET must be frugal with its funds, and this is the core reason behind making this change. We have offered CD packets now for several years, and the time is right to make the transition. While a portion of the membership does not always specify their preference,

requests now for the CD so far this year are exceeding requests for paper. This is the trend we were looking for before making this transition. If everyone chooses the CD option, we would save an approximate \$6,000 per year! While of course we will not see everyone wanting a CD, we do realistically estimate a savings of at least \$4,000 per year. These funds could be better used elsewhere such as building other services and resources for our membership, or marketing, etc. There are a variety of good possibilities that could be considered, I'm sure.

The next thing I would like to speak on is the launching of our memberships benefits program, which was announced also at the International Conference. While this program is still in its early stages, we already have several services available to our membership. In the next CQ, we will have details on everything in the program thus far, and more on what we are working to bring on board. For those that are online, details about the companies already in the program are now available on our website. Once logged into web portal from the member's menu on the top right, you will see an option for the Membership Benefits Program. While at this stage

it may appear like your run-of-the-mill discount program, rest assured some of the things we are working on will be quite impressive, if everything pans out. For some of the discounts, don't forget to have your handy dandy STARFLEET Membership Card ready to present to our vendors.

Lastly, as of this writing, there are several additional folks who will be coming onboard into various departments within CompOps. However, there is still a big need of additional talented members. Please take a moment to review the Job Openings contained in this edition of the CQ. Also, if you have submitted an application and have not received a response, please accept my apologies and resend your application so I may review it.

CompOps Current Job Openings

Web Team Member - General

Potential applications should have some experience with CMS portals (knowledge of the e107 platform a bonus!), and a minimum of a basic understanding of HTML and PHP. Each team member is not expected to excel in all areas, but a strong skill set in a particular area would be beneficial, to develop a well-rounded team. Web Team members will be responsible for assisting in the maintenance of STARFLEET's main web sites, as well as helping any department that requests assistance in site development and/or maintenance. Team members will report to the Web Team Lead. Applicants should provide a Fleet and real-life resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help. If the applicant has a portfolio of work, it would be a plus, but is not a requirement.

Web Team Member - PHP Specialist

Potential applicants should have a strong background and skill set in the PHP code language. Applicants should also have a working understanding of MySQL statements and queries, as this applicant will be developing code to interface with various MySQL databases. The PHP Specialist will work closely with the Database Team on various projects. Team members will report to the Web Team Lead, and at times also to the Database Team Lead. Applicants should provide a Fleet and real-life resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help. If the applicant has a portfolio of work, it would be a plus, but is not a requirement.

Web Team Member - Graphic Artist

Potential applicants should have experience in digital art, with an emphasis in the use of art for web sites. Applicants should have a good understanding of a professional graphics suite such as Photoshop, Gimp, or equivalent. Artist will design graphics for use on various STARFLEET websites and web resources, and may be called

upon by other STARFLEET departments to provide assistance. Team members will report to the Web Team Lead. Applicants should provide a Fleet and real-life resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help. If the applicant has a portfolio of work, it would be a plus, but is not a requirement.

Database Team Member

Potential applicants should have a strong skill set and knowledge of SQL databases, with preferred emphasis on the MySQL version 5.x platform. Basic knowledge of the PHP language is a bonus, but not a requirement. Applicant should understand database table construction, relational linking, SQL queries and statements. Team members will be partially split between two sub-teams, existing resources and new resource development. There will, however, be some natural crossover between the two sub-teams. Team members will be required to provide some basic documentation on their work and projects. Team members will report to the Database Team Lead. Applicants should provide a Fleet and real-life resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help. If the applicant has a portfolio of work, it would be a plus, but is not a requirement.

Infrastructure Team Member

Potential applicants should have at a minimum basic general knowledge of internet resources covering the spectrum of the 'web', ftp, sftp, ssh, pop, smtp, listservs, etc. Team member will conduct periodical security audits, and resource evaluation of our various systems. Also responsible for service and security patches to ensure our resources are up to date, and as secure as possible. Members of this team will be responsible for looking at the bigger picture and keeping our various broad resources in perspective. This will be a smaller specialized team, that will work closely with the other teams. The full scope of this team will develop over time. The emphasis in this team is not development but maintenance and security. As such

this team is more of an administrative function. Team members will report to the Infrastructure Team Lead. Applicants should provide a fleet and RL resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help.

Infrastructure Team Member - Mail Systems

Potential applicants should have a decent understanding of electronic mail systems, and listservs. Applicant will be responsible for setting up e-mail accounts, forwarders, vanity names, and assist with list membership administration. Team Member may also assist members in accessing web-mail tools, or helping to walk a member through configuration of a local mail client. Applicant will be responsible for keeping spreadsheet records up to date, and accurate, and readily available access to Microsoft Excel or OpenOffice is a requirement. Applicants should provide a fleet and RL resume, and provide information on any relevant skill sets that may be of help.



Communications Report

Too Much STARFLEET, Not Enough STAR TREK

That was one of the first things people started telling me about the CQ when I took the job of Comm Chief: everything is about STARFLEET, but aren't we supposed to be a *Star Trek* fan club? Where's the *Star Trek*?

Indeed!

It's a tough thing to balance. On the one hand, there are a lot of important elements of communication with the members that are mandated by our organization's constitution that require the *Communiqué* be the dissemination medium. On the other hand, didn't we all join this club 'cause we're *Star Trek* fans? Too much of the Fleet stuff and the *Trek* stuff is crowded out. Too much *Trek* stuff and we can't keep the membership informed on important club news.

What is a boy to do?

Well, I'm going to try to find that balance. In recent years, *Star Trek* news and articles have been nearly non-existent in the CQ. However, I am now requesting that STARFLEET members submit some *Trek*-related content along with their chapter and region articles. I'd love to see fan artwork, *Trek* news, interviews with anyone involved with *Trek* in any way, *Trek* book and novel reviews, and even those fun "*Trek*nology" articles that try to explain how the cloaking device works or counting how many *Voyager* shuttlecraft were destroyed in the Delta Quadrant.

This issue takes a step in that direction with a large portion dedicated to the closing of *Star Trek*: The Experience in Las Vegas. I put out a request to members to send their stories about visiting the Experience, their feelings about it closing, and any fun photos of the attraction they wanted to share.

Response was overwhelming...which is why so much of this issue is filled with articles and photos about this one thing. I considered trimming the Experience content down a bit, but then I thought about all the members of this club who never got a chance to see this amazing place. And now that it is gone forever, I wanted to give these members a chance to experience the Experience as much as possible. I even have some special behind-the-scenes goodies from my own professional involvement with the Experience.

More Than One Farewell

Star Trek: The Experience is not the only thing taken from us all too soon. In the past few months, STARFLEET has lost two very special members: Debra Kern and Truman

Temple. Both were shining examples of how much of oneself someone can dedicate to this organization and its many members. I did not know Deb, but Truman was a "neighbor" of my chapter, the *U.S.S. Angeles* in southern California. And even though I only got to meet Truman in person once quite a number of years ago, he was a frequent contributor to our Region 4 chat list. The one thing I can say about both of these officers, however, is that with all the negativity that can rear its ugly head here and there in this club, I never heard nor read any bad thing about either Truman or Deb. That's truly remarkable and says so much about both of these wonderful people.

And while I don't want the CQ to become a regular place for obituaries, I felt these two officers were both such paragons in STARFLEET that they deserved to be recognized. There is a special tribute from STARFLEET Academy elsewhere in this issue, and Truman's widow, Cyndi Temple, asked to write a personal memorial for her husband. I hope you will read what was written and join me in remembering our absent friends.

A New Vice-Chief of Communications

Okay, back to the happy news! When I first took over Communications from Peter Christian, he offered to serve as my Vice-Chief temporarily until I found a replacement. In the meantime, Rob Kitson was already serving as Content Editor, helping to encourage members to submit content for the CQ, then helping to organize that content. Rob was doing a great job, being proactive, responding quickly to e-mails, and always offering to take on more tasks if needed. In many ways, it was an "on the job interview" and Rob was passing with flying colors.

So in early October, I offered Rob Kitson the position of Vice-Chief of Communications and he enthusiastically accepted. He'll still be acting as Content Editor of CQ, but now he is also my personal Number One, and I couldn't have asked for a better officer to replace Pete Christian.

Now That's a Communiqué of a Different Color

The more astute readers may have noticed something different about the printed versions of last issue and this one: twelve pages of full color! Over the past many issues, the full color pages of CQ were limited to the front and back covers and the center spread...everything else was black and white. Well, it turns out that somewhere back down the road, someone got their wires crossed, because our current printers have always offered us up to twelve pages of full color for each issue. It has to do with those twelve pages all being printed on one giant full-color sheet and then being cut up. The other pages are printed on

black and white sheets of twelve (to save us money). But that first sheet is available for twelve *full color* pages, and I intend to keep taking full advantage of that fact. Over the coming months, I'm going to see what else we can do to try to increase the quality of this here newsletter.

More Communication! More! More! More!

A frequent complaint from STARFLEET members is that they want more communication from their leadership. I know, because up until being Chief of Communications, I was one of those complaining. Now I'm in a position to finally do something about it!

So one of the first changes I implemented was creating the new Regional Relay Officer program. I discussed it briefly last issue, but for those who missed it, the RROs are sent important e-mails from the Executive Committee to forward to their regional chat lists. RROs can also relay back to me any concerns or questions that appear on their regional chat lists that need to be brought to the attention of the EC. In some regions, the Regional Coordinator already performs these functions. But the RRO offers members yet another path to communication to and from the EC.

So far, eight regions have assigned Regional Relay Officers, and the program is working wonderfully. Over a dozen special announcements were forwarded via the RROs during my first two months as Comm Chief. One of these e-mails (inviting STARFLEET chapter and regional webmasters to forward me their online contact information for a special sci-fi fandom Internet project from Roddenberry Productions) resulted in over 55 responses! The folks at Roddenberry now think that STARFLEET rocks.

Members wanting even more communication from HQ can subscribe to the STARFLEET Announcement-L (just send an e-mail to <sfi-announce-l-request@lists.sfi.org> and put the word "subscribe" as the Subject). And for the really hard-core, there is the official SFI-L (send an e-mail to <sfi-l-request@lists.sfi.org> and put the word "subscribe" as the Subject) list. SFI-L is a place for members to discuss issues involving our organization. But be advised: many folks who post to the SFI-L feel very passionately about this club...and they don't always agree with each other. As such, the SFI-L can be rather-shall we say--intense. If you'd rather just get the hard news and not the shock jocks, Announcement-L is the way to go.

There are also several other unofficial chat lists, websites, and blogs about STARFLEET, many managed by those same passionate STARFLEET members. Most chapter



COs and RCs can provide you with lists of some of these unofficial resources.

STARFLEET also has our own website at < www.sfi.org>, which has lots of information about our organization and sometimes even news. I'll admit that I would like to see more frequent updates of our website, and that might just be happening soon. More details about STARFLEET website plans will appear in the coming months.

And, of course, for those of you who don't spend much time on the computer, there's always this here STARFLEET *Communiqué*, coming your way once every two months.

And Speaking of Schedules...

As I mentioned last issue, the CQ has seen some delays this year. When I took over as Comm Chief last issue, I

decided to try to get the CQ back on schedule by trimming the interim between issues down from two months to about six weeks for a few issues. If all goes well, this current issue should be mailed to members in late November or early December. Then we'll be aiming to have CQ #150 out in late January and #151 in early March. By that point, assuming I haven't angered any deities or broken any temporal laws of physics, the CQ should at last be back on schedule and we can finally return to two months between issues.

And Speaking of CQ #150

Next issue will be our big anniversary issue. And not only will the *Communiqué* be hitting the big **one-five-oh**, but in 2009, STARFLEET the fan club turns 35 years old! We're actually the oldest continuously operating *Star Trek* fan club ever. Rob Kitson and I have put out requests

online for members to write articles on what STARFLEET means to them and their chapters. I'd like to #150 to be a celebration of all the wonderful things this organization has done and all it has to offer. I'd love to get photos and logos of chapters from around STARFLEET. And I'd love to have stories of fun and friendship and everything we joined this club for in the first place.

The deadline for submissions for CQ #150 will be November 20. Because of the time it takes to print and mail the newsletter, this deadline will have passed before the printed issue #149 makes it into members' hands. But Rob and I will be blanketing the official and regional online chat lists with requests for submissions. With luck, we'll have an issue loaded up with everything that makes STARFLEET the best *Star Trek* fan club ever!

And with that, folks, I am outta here.

Announcing the STARFLEET Alumni Outreach Program

Recently, some members have been concerned with STARFLEET losing members. It's by no means a mass exodus, but after spending the last few years hovering around the 3,800 member level, we recently had a member total of about 3,500 members.

Now, some of this decrease may be cyclical, some may be due to the slowing economy, some may be due to just forgetting to renew (we've had a recent glitch in getting our member database to send out auto-reminders shortly before members expired), and some members may just not want to be in STARFLEET anymore.

Whatever the reason, I campaigned on a platform of "Members Matter" and as such, I am committed to doing whatever is necessary to keep STARFLEET populated with happy and satisfied individuals dedicated to having fun.

To this end, I've implemented two initiatives. The first is tasking the Computer Operations Department with tracking down and correcting the bug that seems to be preventing reminder e-mails from being sent out to members whose subscriptions are about to expire.

But even more exciting is a new program combining the efforts of three different departments: Communications, CompOps, and Operations. It will be called the STARFLEET Alumni Outreach Program, and here's how it will work.

Even members who get e-mail reminders don't always remember to renew their memberships. Sometimes they don't wish to rejoin, but other times it's just an oversight, and a friendly tap on the shoulder will do the trick.

CompOps has just generated a list of names and e-mails of people whose STARFLEET memberships have expired this year. The Alumni Outreach Program will e-mail these former members and ask if they would consider rejoining STARFLEET. If they say "No," we'll politely ask if they would like to share their reason with us and/or make any suggestions for how we can improve STARFLEET in ways that would make them want to rejoin. No hard sell, and "No" means "No." I don't expect to convince all former STARFLEET members to renew/rejoin, but I'm hopeful we can get a good percentage. And let's face it, even one member returning to the fold is more than we would have had without any outreach program.

The STARFLEET Alumni Outreach Program will be placed under the Communications Department (since it involves sending out communications to these former members). The new Program will also work closely with the Recruitment & Retention Program already active within Operations. In this way, we can coordinate efforts to bring new members into Fleet, keep the members we have, and bring back members who leave.

Directing this new program will be Captain George Ann Wheeler of the *U.S.S. DeBraak* of Region 7. Annie has been a STARFLEET member since 2004, served as Director of the College of Sci-Fi Cinema for the Academy, and recently took over as Dean of the Institute of Science Fiction Studies. Each year, Annie helps out at the STARFLEET recruiting table at the Shore Leave and Farpoint conventions in Maryland, so she has lots of experience in talking up the organization.

Helping out Annie will be Vice-Chief of Communications Major Robert Kitson of the *U.S.S. William O. Darby* of Region 4. Rob joined STARFLEET in 1996 and was awarded the 2008 Shield of Valor before becoming Content Editor of the *Communiqué* and then being made Vice-Chief of Communications. Rob is extremely enthusiastic about STARFLEET and loves writing e-mails to people. When Chief of Communications Jon Lane offered Rob the chance to be a part of this new program, he eagerly accepted.

The initial outreach to former members will likely take a few months to complete, as there are hundreds of members to contact. However, in the future, we hope to "catch up" and have the Outreach Program send e-mails to members within two months of their membership expiration. Annie and Rob will keep track of how many expired members renew, how many say they'll renew and don't, and how many members prefer not to renew. They will also keep a log of any reasons or suggestions shared by these members and compile these into a report that the Chief of Communications will share with the EC/AB a few times a year.

If there's anyone out there who is enthusiastic about STARFLEET, friendly, social, and reliable--and would like to help contact former members and be a part of this exciting new program--please contact George Ann Wheeler at AnnieWheelr@aol.com. I don't know how many assistants she will ultimately be looking for, but I'm certain that she and Rob Kitson would appreciate having extra hands on deck to write all those hundreds of e-mails.

NEW DUTY ASSIGNMENTS ON THE OTHER SIDE OF LIFE


Two staff members of STARFLEET Academy, one past and one current, who have emblazoned paths for many of us to follow, have transferred to the very best of duty assignments. Both Debra Kern and Truman Temple have reported to the Haven of Rest, the side of life beyond this mortal coil.

Technical sergeant, U.S.A.F., retired Debra I. Kern, 53, of Alamogordo, passed away July 15, 2008, at the family home. She was born Aug. 17, 1954, in Jacksonville, Fla., to Howard and Irene Hirst. She was a U. S. Air Force veteran who retired Jan. 1, 1999, after serving in Desert Shield and Desert Storm. She was a life member of the VFW. American Legion and Disabled American Veterans. She enjoyed playing softball and her pets. She married Jack Kern May 27, 1989, in Colorado Springs, Colo. She is survived by her husband, Jack Kern, of the family home; and her sister. Diane Hirst, and her mother. Irene Hirst both of Sarasota, Fla.

Deb joined STARFLEET in November of 1995. She created the Klingon Warrior Academy in May of 1991, adding onto it from June through November of the same year. She also created 7 levels of Xeno-Studies-Klingon within the STARFLEET Marine Corps Academy in February 2003. Debra received several SFMC Awards.

Deb was one of Starfleet Academy's hardest working Directors... always coming up with new ideas, and ways to attract students.

Temple, Truman Doebeli, 43, passed on to be with our Lord Jesus Christ, September 29, 2008. Truman is survived by his wife Cythina, three children, Catherine, Kimberly, Robert, sisters Tali, Terry, Erika, brothers Russell, Kevin, and mother Verena.



Born on April 19, 1965, Truman was raised in Los For all of us at STARFLEET ACADEMY, Angeles, CA. Hewasan Eagle Scout. Hegraduated from Cal State Los Angeles with a BA in History.

Truman started his STARFLEET career in November of 1986, making him one of our longest serving members.

He was dedicated to and served in many ways in both SFA and TRACOM, where he completed a combined total of 1,106 exams, earning him 21 Boothby's and several Citations. The last Boothby award Truman earned, the Omega 1100 Silver Star (and the highest yet to be earned) has been renamed to the Truman Temple. He created many exams across several Colleges, or assisted in their creation, as well as beta testing many that were created by others.

In his twenty-two years as a member of STARFLEET, Truman earned twelve Academic Excellence Awards and well over one-hundred SFMC awards - including the STARFLEET Cross (4 times). On October 5, 2008, LGEN Truman Temple was awarded (posthumously) TRACOM's highest award, the TRACOM Commander's Award.

As we all know, most cultures and religious persuasions speak of a life beyond. If that is true, and somehow, I believe it is, there is that wonderful hope that we all will meet both Deb and Truman again someday.

Statement of Activities and the Statement of Financial Position for our first fiscal guarter as of September 30, 2008. As you can see, we've ended our first guarter with a Net Income of \$4,453. Our largest expenses were *Communiqué* expenses and Scholarship Awards followed by Quartermaster supplies.

As previously mentioned, more detailed financial statements are available online for all members to view at the SFI home page. Please sign in using your SCC# and password to access the members only section.

Recently, I understand some members may have had difficulty in renewing their memberships. I had sent an email to all the RC's in regards to this matter to pass on to their regional members. containing some general advice about this problem. However, I feel it's best this information get repeated for all to see in case they were not made aware of it. Following is that information.

When at all possible, use the online application/ renewal process and use the PayPal link to use your credit card so it's processed immediately... and this way you'll know if you have a problem during this process.

When giving your credit card information for STARFLEET to process, make sure all the information is correct, including checking to make certain your billing address for your credit card is the same as what's in the data base. If it's not, put it in the notes. Also, make sure your email address is correct, so that you can be contacted if needed.

Requests can only be sent out to what is in the database, and if there's no response, the application is deleted after the final notice. The initial request is sent the day the credit card is processed with a request to contact. Normally, two to three weeks later, a final request with cc to the CO & RC is sent with a notice to contact within 10 days. If there's no response from the member, CO, or the RC, then that member has his/her application deleted for non-payment two weeks later.

within three weeks, contact the CFO-Vice@ sfi.org to see what the problem could be if you used a credit card. If your email address in the database is incorrect, then most likely you didn't receive a notice of a problem with your application.

Greetings, along with this report is the current. When processing online and it's not approved. All members need to make sure they have completed the process to use the PayPal system to either send their payment by their PayPal account or used the tab for a credit card. Remember, just going to the PayPal page is not enough. You have to complete the process and get a confirmation that your payment has been processed.



Star Trek: The Experience Closes After Ten-Year Journey Through the Cosmos

On August 15th, 2008, six intrepid explorers of the *USS Haise* made the pilgrimage to what to Trek fans will surely be remembered as one of our "hallowed" sites: The *STAR TREK* EXPERIENCE. We will all remember basking in the glow of the most famous spacecraft ever while eating a distinctively "alien" meal at Quarks. The actors, always the consummate professionals, bravely kept up their personas as we pondered

the absurdity of closing such an institution mere months before the opening of a new Trek adventure. When we asked our tour guide, "What could they (the Las Vegas Hilton) be thinking?" He could only shrug helplessly and answer, "You're preaching to the choir."

The crew members bought an all-day "Captain's" package deal, which included unlimited rides through the theme simulations, dinner at Quark's restaurant, a souvenir glass, and pictures on

the *Enterprise-D* bridge. Despite word that attendance had been down during recent years, fans from all over seemed to be taking one last opportunity to see the exhibit, as the line at Quark's was at least an hour long, and the entire Experience was packed with fans in costumes and *Trek* T-shirts. Actors variously dressed as a Borg drone, female Andorian commander, or Klingon general moved amongst the guests posing for pictures, making funny quips about "humans," and interacting with the crew.

The highly-detailed timeline of *Star Trek* "history" was the most comprehensive display known to Trek fandom, beginning in what we know as our past and going long into the future, incorporating all four series. The *Haise* crew found it impossible to spend enough time to thoroughly review the details in a single day. It was all they could do to get through both rides, do the "behind the scenes" tour, and eat dinner. Some members were able to get through both rides twice, but that was pushing the limits of both time and stamina.

In the Klingon Encounter, participants were told that one of them was the direct ancestor of Captain Picard, who was being hunted down in our present day by a rogue Klingon commander bent on erasing Picard's future existence. There was a highly convincing transporter simulation that literally took your breath away, then a turbulent shuttlecraft ride, complete with starship battle sequences and massive special effects.

The Borg Invasion was also guite engaging, as actors played

the roles of Starfleet personnel fighting an onslaught of the cybernetic fiends led by Alice Krige reprising her role as the "Borg Queen." Robert Picardo plays the "Doctor" and Kate Mulgrew stars as "Admiral Janeway." In this adventure, the guests are told they have a strong genetic resistance to Borg "nanites," only to be captured and injected by the evil Borg probes. The seats of the ride are specially rigged with devices

which prod the viewers, producing the convincing sensation that nanites are indeed circulating inside their body. The Doctor valiantly tries to fight the Queen long enough for Janeway to lead *Voyager* again in a dramatic battle to free the participants from the Borg Cube and save the galaxy.


Finally, in the "Secrets Unveiled" tour, *USS Haise* members were treated to a guided journey backstage, showing how all the effects worked, including the complex ride simulations. The actors' dressing rooms were packed with memorabilia

along the walls and one could spend an hour there alone looking at well wishes from various celebrities.

Indeed, as one entered the Experience, there were large walls full of supportive statements written by fans, urging the Las Vegas Hilton to reconsider closing the Experience. Others left pictures of their visit and statements of appreciation for the ten years of service to the Trek community. This author left a letter by the Haise crew in homage to the venerable institution.

It is not known exactly what will replace the *Star Trek* Experience at the Las Vegas Hilton. Rumors abound. One of the *Haise* crew heard that it would be turned into a "nightclub," but this is not known to be true. Several people commented at the absurdity of closing the *Trek* theme park with a new movie being released next summer. When the tour guides heard our lamentations, they could only reply that we were "preaching to the choir." Indeed, members of STARFLEET INTERNATIONAL will deeply miss *Star Trek*: The Experience and express great gratitude to the staff and actors over the years that made it possible.

The crew of the *USS Haise* and members of STARFLEET INTERNATIONAL will deeply miss *Star Trek*: The Experience, and we send our gratitude and admiration to the staff and actors over the years that made it possible. In their grief, we would like to note that the first person to step foot on Mars may very well be one of the people inspired by their noble effort. Godspeed to you all at the Experience.

The end of an era...

Starting Friday, Aug 29th, Suzie Plakson (from TNG - Dr. Selar and Worf's wife K'Ehleyr), Beverly Washburn (from the TOS episode "The Deadly Years"), and Chase Masterson (DS9's Leeta, the Dabo girl) were there signing autographs all weekend. For the whole weekend, I believe I had lunch or dinner at Quark's at least four times. Hey, had to get in as many meals as possible! I also visited both attractions at least three times each. In fact, it was so strange and unusual to have to WAIT more than 20 minutes to get on either of attractions.

Attending the final weekend from the USS Angeles were Commanding

Officer Jennifer Cole, Executive Officer Jacqueline Bundy, Chief of Security (and Shuttle Liaison officer) Gloria Rodriguez, Chief of Operations Candi Rosales, Chief of Communications Dave Mason, Chief of Computer Operations Jonathan Connor, and crewmembers Jim Van Over, Luis "Soval" Valentine, and Cliff Gardner.

filled up and I mean filled up! By the time the ceremony began (which was after 10 pm), neither Jonathan nor I could move much. We were really packed in there. I think the people behind me tried real hard to get into my shoes several times, that's how close everyone was. Sheesh!

At around 10:00 pm, Russell Giles, one of the Experience managers, got up and thanked everyone for coming, for supporting the Experience over the year,s and asked us to give our thanks to all the employees and cast members who entertained us for over 10 years. He left the stage and about 15 minutes or so later, Chad Boutte, Operations Manager for the Experience, got up on stage, said a few words, then introduced Suzie Plakson.

The Decommissioning Ceremony

Part of the speech that Suzie read from went as follows: "This is both a celebration and a farewell...an homage to the human tradition that will live on to the 24th Century and beyond. On January 4, 1998, Stardate 51347.9, Star Trek: The Experience, designated Time Station 1001, was charged with a ten year mission--to explore the roots of our own 24th Century culture, to catalog information and histories that were believed lost, and to preserve the notions and ideals of its founders, the United Federation of Planets. Managed and governed by Starfleet Command, this bustling community of commercial, scientific and strategic significance has been a resounding success. General Order Number One--The Prime Directive--was followed to the letter, ensuring that all of its events unfolded as they should, without undue influence of officers and crew. Ten years is at once a long time and just the blink of an eye. Ten years is over three million visitors and over 150,000 missions flown."

Monday, Sept. 1st: the final day...

I went down to The Experience as soon as I was ready, to check things out. I had no idea what to expect, so I was surprised by what I found: a gold curtain was already up, there were lots of people milling about, and a stage was set up. By the stairs leading down to Quark's, there was now a large sign informing you that filming was in progress, so if you didn't want to be filmed, then stay away, yadda, yadda, yadda...

For the final 'decommissioning' ceremony, it was just Jonathan Connor and me, everyone else from the *USS Angeles* had gone home. At about 8:30 pm, we found a spot to stand by the Space Quest bar, where we were up a little high and could see the stage without (much) interference. The crowds were amazing! That entire area





After her speech, a roll call began of all the cast/crew of Star Trek The Experience, which was the bulk of the ceremony. From my vantage point, I could see cast/crew/staff lining up along the museum walkway and as their name was read, they each walked down the ramp towards the casino and were enthusiastically greeted by us fans. At the bottom of the ramp, a lucky fan was there to greet them and hand them a special commemorative certificate (nope, never got to see it, so I have no idea what it looked like nor what it said). The final cast members to come down were the various Starfleet crews followed by the alien characters: the Borg ("7 of 16", "5 of 16", "8 of 16" and "Larry of 16"), the Klingons (Major Kahlen, General Motog & Commander Churoq), Ferengi ("Quan" and "Rog'l"), an Andorian (K'Stran Thral), and finally, Professor T'Pril, the lady Vulcan, played by April Hebert. Here is what Suzie had to say at this point, but first she called back to the front, "Captain Chad Bouett, in accordance to tradition, the to disembark--Miss April Hebert." Lots of applause here as

April came down the ramp, Suzie continued, "For ten years, this banner, bearing the seal of the United Federation of Planets, has stood watch over this facility. In observance of maritime tradition, as our longest serving crewmember, you are entrusted with its safe keeping." April was really struggling to hold back her own emotions, but when this was announced, she was caught off-guard. Everyone, I think, got choked up by that, including me.

Chad gave his own final farewell speech, ending by holding up Sisko's baseball and saying "Live long and prosper." Then it happened--the gold curtains came down. That was it. The Experience was closed. We lingered there for a bit longer, mostly because we still couldn't move! But it didn't take long for the crowds to thin out. Both Jonathan and I were hungry, so we invited the two people who had been squished next

to me (on my left), Lauren and Robert (both from Kansas City), to join us for a late dinner. Funny thing, we didn't know their names until we actually sat down in the restaurant! We then sat there until after 2am just talking. We walked them back to the monorail station (which was right next to the Experience), and we could hear and see some of the partiers (those invited to the VIP party immediately after the curtain came down) still going strong. So, we lingered a bit more in front of the curtain, took a few more photos from behind the curtain and said our farewells to Robert and Lauren.

first crewmember assigned to the Experience is now the last Tuesday morning. Sept 2, time to pack up and check out. Bummer! As we took the last of our luggage to our cars, we



made one FINAL detour to the Experience... I took out my video camera and got some of the final photos and video that I'd ever be able to get, and then it was really time to say goodbye. It was hard. Even writing this, I'm tearing up again. I hate that it closed. I hate that I now no longer have a place to go to geek out. Guess I'll just have to go back to all my photos and videos to keep those memories alive from now on.

I have a deep background source known only to myself (and my support ship CO), whom I've chosen to call "Deep Trek". He is happy to share his first-hand inside knowledge of the show. Although a good journalist never reveals his sources, in this first installment, I present Deep Trek's background, in his own words:

"I have always enjoyed the show and I was privileged to work on it when it was still a Desilu production. I had trouble understanding at the time why it was being canceled. "I well remember the bulletin board just inside the main sound stage, where the bridge and engine room sets were located, had a banner saying that they were now receiving more fan mail than The Monkees. That singing group had received the largest amount of fan mail to that point in Hollywood history.

"The rear of Desilu's studio lot backed up to the rear of Paramount's lot and was separated only by an eight foot chain link fence. There was a legal question of monopoly that was smoothed over when Paramount bought Desilu by the agreement that the two would be run as separate entities for five years. The truth is that the fence was quietly torn down two months after the merger and no trace of Desilu could be seen after that. My checks all came from Paramount.

"My title was Prop Maker, Miniature, Special Effects

Number One. I worked through the I.A.T.S.& E. Local 44, which is, or at least was, the sole source of this craft

"What with electronics having grown into what they presently are, I expect that things have changed a lot since 1972 when I quit the studios and moved to Virginia. I rarely even see the title of Special Effects on the credits anymore. I always look because I hope to see the names of friends, but even my apprentice who went on to do the effects on many movies (including Iron Eagles) has retired."


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USS Wildhorse at Star Trek: The Experience

On one end you have those in the organization who willingly volunteer for leadership positions and take time out of their busy schedules to try to do their best in service of the membership. Unfortunately that willingness puts a bull's eye on their backs from those who either do not agree with the policies or simply don't like them as a person. They become subject to vicious rumors, unfounded accusations, and innuendoes that have a profound impact not only on the programs the leader is trying to institute but also on a very personal level, as well.


the first organization to have to grapple with this same situation. Other organizations have successfully addressed this challenge by a simple word: compromise.







Making a Case for the "Official" Discussion List

As many members are aware, when I became the STARFLEET Commander, I opened up a new "official" discussion list for STARFLEET members, SFI-L <sfi-l@lists.sfi.org>. There were some issues when I opened the list without a written set of rules (I was going to use the Officers' Code of Conduct as the basis of the list rules, but many feel that the code is too vague). So I closed the list down for a time while rules could be written to define the behavioral expectations and consequences for violation of those list rules. The list is now active again and has been since late September, with many STARFLEET members choosing to join the list, read posts, and share their thoughts.

Recently, I have been asked about the purpose of this new "official" list when another list, STARFLEET-L <<u>STARFLEET-L@fleetlist.org</u>> already existed for the members.

Actually, the STARFLEET-L discussion list is defined as an "unofficial" discussion list. It was created by members who were concerned that that their communications might be curtailed by those who get elected to lead STARFLEET and wanted to ensure their "freedom of speech" rights.

Unfortunately, some members abused this freedom of speech in ways that were negative and hurtful to other members. The one thing that seemed to have been forgotten by many is the concept that, with that freedom, comes responsibilities to be truthful and honest, and an expectation of mutual respect for, and politeness to, others.

After a relatively short time, certain members were taken to task for their inappropriate and belligerent behavior by STARFLEET's leadership. However, the Admiralty Board ruled that since the list was "unofficial," there could be no disciplinary action by STARFLEET upon those members responsible. And since that list was also open to non-members, STARFLEET had no ability to discipline them in any way.

And so the problems of inappropriate communication and extreme behavior continued on the STARFLEET-L, and many members began requesting an alternative to this "unofficial" list, something that would instead be considered "official" and therefore could be supervised by STARFLEET.

There were several reasons cited by members who asked for an official list:

- 1) Some felt that the unofficial list was too political and controversial for their tastes. Those members wanted a list where STARFLEET members could go and expect to chat with other members about STARFLEET, discuss their fandom, and exchange ideas with other members without having to endure the bashing and flaming present elsewhere.
- 2) Some members wanted an area where those other members who repeatedly chose to attack, berate, make false accusations,

and start malicious rumors against other members could be held accountable and be disciplined for their actions. Sure, it has been pointed out that there are legal remedies available to deal with those members, but why should a STARFLEET member have to incur the expense and hassles associated with lawsuits to protect their right to a chat list free of cyber-bullying?

3) Some just felt that the unofficial list was inappropriate for



discussion of "official" business, especially given the fact that the list includes non-members.

Regardless of the reasons cited, I felt that the creation of an official list was a good idea because members asked for it... and it costs STARFLEET nothing to create it. Also, in the early days of my administration, I had contracted with a legal firm to review our organizational documents and advise me on other legal matters concerning STARFLEET (another article will appear on this subject in CQ #150). In the course of those calls, I discussed STARFLEET's relationship with the unofficial list and our attorney agreed that there should be an official list, as well.

She offered a very straightforward explanation of why NOT having an official list was actually a danger to this organization. The reason was that, in the absence of an official list, the "unofficial" list could be legally argued to be our de facto "official" list. Here was her reasoning on that legal opinion:

- The list was "owned and operated" by a STARFLEET director.
- The list was created for STARFLEET members to discuss STARFLEET (the organization), and
- The list was used to communicate organizational business and policy by STARFLEET officers and directors.

The danger to STARFLEET stemmed from all of the malicious postings being made in the public environment of this "unofficial" STARFLEET-L. If anyone decided they had suffered some injury or harm resulting from these uncontrolled e-mail messages, a good lawyer could argue (using the three simple points above) that this was an official communication mechanism for STARFLEET and hold us directly liable.

In my opinion as Commander, STARFLEET, this represented a clear and present danger to STARFLEET, both in terms of potential financial liability and also to our reputation as a fan organization. There were, in my opinion, only two options. The first was not really an option: try to close down the unofficial list. Since the STARFLEET-L was technically not controlled by STARFLEET, this option was never considered workable. The

second option, and in my opinion, the only option that could keep Starfleet protected legally, was to create a second, completely official list, and that is how SFI-L came to be in the first place.

However, creating the official list seemed to anger a segment of the online community who felt that I was somehow slighting the members of the unofficial list. Others said they felt threatened by the "accountability and control" aspects of the official list. Many of those members quickly joined the new list and brought the environment of the unofficial list with them--actually, some would say that they created a worse environment. Arguments and flaming broke out quickly, and STARFLEET's ability to control the list was challenged. Member e-mails from those who simply wanted a new list were lost amidst the flurry of emails that were posted criticizing the list

and its creation, criticizing the moderators, and criticizing the lack of participation by the administration. The list was taken down, and the moderation team was asked to develop a set of clear rules before the list was re-opened. Apparently, the rules weren't so clear, as there are still some definitions and clarifications needed. I'm happy to say that the moderators are constantly looking at what is working and what is not, and things are being better defined and clarified as we discover where the "holes" still exist.

In the next few sections of this article, I would like to express some of my own opinions on list-related issues that have arisen of late.

Where is the Commander, STARFLEET?

Some STARFLEET members seem to expect the Commander, STARFLEET to be online all of the time (or even most of the time). They use my absence from both the official and unofficial discussion lists as a basis for much of their criticism of me. Now obviously, I don't have the luxury (or desire) to spend most of my days sitting behind a keyboard waiting for an e-mail so that I can respond immediately. But neither am I avoiding communication with the membership, and I would like to point out a few important pieces of information about my availability to members:

1) I have, personally been paying the cost for a toll-free number so that members can call me, without charge, to discuss STARFLEET matters. (I average about 6 phone calls per day from people with questions ranging from "How do I start a chapter?" to discussions about policy and issues.)



2) I have asked for volunteers to watch the online forums and let me know when someone needs a question answered. And often I ask them to relay my answer(s) back to the list. To my shock and utter frustration, many of those members who have stepped up to help me with this task frequently wind up being personally attacked themselves just for trying to lend a hand. They have been called "sock puppets" and "attack dogs" and "Salpologists" (which, I am guessing, means they are apologizing for me in some way). Such name-calling among allegedly mature adults is, to me, truly shocking.

3) I routinely conduct the business of STARFLEET while I drive from place to place. Whenever possible, I show up to chapter and regional events. And while a member rightfully pointed out that not all members attend these events, it is also true that not all members are online. At this point, the STARFLEET Constitution does not require any member of the AB or EC to be online. And while I think it is a good idea for us all to be online, I think that the notion that requiring STARFLEET's administration to hold a more-or-less constant "24/7 online press conference" is impractical, unfair, and, at this point, not mandated by the STARFLEET Constitution.

Being Disruptive

Some members have stated with fervor that moderation and banning of them from the official list violates their member right to participate in STARFLEET at any level they choose as guaranteed in our Membership Handbook. I am sorry to disagree, but I don't see that.

The official list remains open to any active member of STARFLEET. But unlike the unofficial list, it is not open to non-members. Members who let their memberships lapse will be denied list access, and those subscribed members who allow their STARFLEET memberships to lapse will be removed from the list. So this limits the official list to only active members of STARFLEET.

The STARFLEET Executive Committee serves the membership and we have no control of or responsibility to non-members. Thus has the EC provided the official SFI-L as a virtual meeting place for STARFLEET members, and every member of STARFLEET has the right to join that meeting. But no member has the right to disrupt that meeting any more than they have a right to disrupt any other meeting in STARFLEET.

Think about it: what would you do if someone in your chapter, or a non-member, came to one of your chapter meetings and acted as they do online? Would you not tell them to settle down or leave? Would you tolerate abusive language and name-calling, especially when it was unjustified and wrong? Would you let other people ruin your fun, or would you simply put up with it...or would you just quit coming to meetings?

Members' Rights

I can't speak with certainty about other countries, but in the United States, there are two categories of the rules we live under: civil law and corporate law. Civil law dictates how citizens should live within their communities, and corporate law dictates how businesses operate.

Under civil law, an individual can exercise their freedom of speech, but even that has certain limitations (like not yelling "Fire!" in the middle of a crowded theater). However, in general, freedom of speech is a civil liberty that Americans enjoy in almost all aspects of their lives.

Under business law, however, this isn't the case. If I choose to be publicly critical of a business, where I am either an employee or a customer, the business has the right to terminate that relationship and remove me from their property. Imagine a checkout clerk standing at the register screaming at customers that all the merchandise in the store is overpriced. Or imagine a customer in the supermarket yelling that the

store sold her rotten meat. The business has the right to fire that employee or force that customer to leave the store.

However, that same individual can stand outside in a public square or on public property and do or say anything they want, as long as they don't violate the civil law.

The Executive Committee is tasked with the day-to-day business of STARFLEET. And as an aspect of that business relationship with the members of STARFLEET (who pay money to be a part of our organization) the SFI-L has been provided to serve a business need of those STARFLEET members. As a business, STARFLEET has to maintain some level of order or the chaos will hurt the organization. A few determined members of STARFLEET cannot be allowed to disrupt the civility of the online meeting that STARFLEET has established for all our members. It would be wrong to allow it. The official list has rules, and they will and must be enforced. Members are not allowed to engage in outrageous or extremely negative behavior there when it disrupts the purpose and tranquility of the meeting. The right to disrupt is NOT guaranteed by our constitution.

SFI-L is a private meeting for members only. As an alternative option, STARFLEET-L exists outside the authority of STARFLEET and could be thought of as the public "town square"...as even non-members are subscribed to that list. Admittedly, what is said there may be unfair, unsubstantiated, or untrue, but in the past the Admiralty Board has ruled that STARFLEET (the organization) has no control over the content or postings there. STARFLEET members are free to decide whether they want to participate in either list or both. And it is apparent to me that STARFLEET members want both lists: the private virtual meeting place with the controls and safeguards it offers, and also the "town square".

The two can peacefully co-exist, in my opinion.


I am a new member of STARFLEET, although I have been a fan since the original series aired. This past June, I loaded up the family, having provided them sufficient bribes (the bribes being a



Ambassador Soval Reports on the Closing of Star Trek: The Experience

Ifyou attended the final weekend of *Star Trek*: The Experience, you may have met Soval, a Vulcan Ambassador. For several years, Soval has posed for photos and signed autographs at the Experience and at *Star Trek* conventions. On this special occasion, Soval also performed his ambassadorial function by exchanging condolences and farewells with visitors and cast members alike.



The man behind the Vulcan ears and wig is Luis Valentine, originally from Queens, New York, and now residing in Los Angeles, California. "I have loved *Star Trek* since it first came out," says Luis, "But I really started making myself into a Vulcan after "*Star Trek*: Enterprise" came on the air. I am an admirer of Jolene Blalock and as her role as T'Pol. Also, with "Enterprise", you were able to see and understand Vulcans more, and I found myself being like a Vulcan."

Luis went on to describe how his alter ego, Vulcan Ambassador Soval, first became famous. "When the cancellation of 'Star Trek: Enterprise' was announced in 2005 and I heard about the 'Save Enterprise' rallies that were being held all over the world, I took part in New York at the Paramount/UPN building to show my support for the cast and crew of the show. While attending and marching in full Vulcan garb, a man with a camera approached me and wanted me to make a comment about the cancellation of

the show and why I was there. I replied that the *Enterprise* is trying to save earth and now it's time for Earth to save *Enterprise*. Unknown to me at the time, that cameraman was from VH1. I found out when my old captain from the *U.S.S. Black Star* in Miami, Florida called me up and said, 'You're a star...you were on VH1!' I was shocked and excited. That was when it all started for me."

We next asked Luis to describe his feelings (not Soval's, as Vulcans do not display emotions) about *Star Trek*: The Experience at the Las Vegas Hilton closing its doors forever. "As I arrived this last time, I thought back to the first time I made the pilgrimage to the *Star Trek* Experience. It was during the Las Vegas Convention in 2005, and the first thing that caught my eye when arriving were the huge starships above you as you enter. It made me feel as if I stepped forward in time to the world of *Star Trek*. Though I didn't get to ride the rides that first year, I was able to the next year, in 2006. The Klingon Encounter and Borg 4D were great, and each time I rode them, it made me feel special...like I was living a real Starfleet mission.

"Then, on my third visit, in 2007--during the Region 4 Conference--I was able to go on the Back Stage Tour and see how the Experience works from the inside...and see the magic behind the rides and the characters. We were shown where the cast members come in and change and get into make-up. We were shown the secrets behind the rides."


Having an alien persona of his own, Luis commented on the many cast members at the Experience. "Another thing I noticed was how they stayed in character as Ferengi, Borg, Klingons, Vulcans, and I can't forget the Andorians and Romulans. I noticed how the fans reacted to them and how they would try to catch them out of character. But like an alien in *Star Trek*, they played their parts like professionals and never once have I seen then talk or act out of character."

On this last trip to the Experience, visitors immediately started asking for photos with Soval. Some thought he was a cast member at the attraction. When asked if he worked there, he said, "No, I'm just a dedicated fan. I like to do this for the fans." But the alien characters, some recognizing Soval from past visits, talked to him as one of their own. They shared their sadness at leaving and how they'd miss the fans and fellow actors. A Borg named Eric eventually invited Soval to the cast dinner and decommissioning activities. Soval regretfully had to decline this honor, as his schedule wouldn't permit staying the extra time.

Still, the Ambassador had the chance to give an interview to a Paramount film crew on his last day. After signing a consent form, he told about his involvement with the *U.S.S. Angeles*, Trek to the Troops, and his website Editzplanet.com. He was informed that the interviews being filmed here would be

possibly included with the new "Star Trek XI" movie DVD. It should be noted that not all interviewees behaved with Vulcan decorum. Soval witnessed a Klingon loudly cursing (in Klingon) the closing of the Experience. This was done for the film crew's benefit and drew enthusiastic applause from Quark's customers.

Ambassador Soval was also able to help out a gentleman who'd come all the way from Puerto Rico to claim his Final Backstage Tour of the Experience. His winning eBay bid, \$1701.00, apparently did not include a ticket for the Experience rides. Soval and the gentleman discussed this injustice, rather loudly, at the ticket desk, which inspired an Experience employee to find a solution. The winner got his ride ticket.



Soval had a last Mind Meld at Quark's Bar while he signed baseballs being circulated among cast members. He learned that these mementos would be presented to special fans, following a tradition enacted in the Deep Space Nine episode "Take Me Out to the Holodeck". Some cast members would also keep, or be awarded, these prized souvenirs. Oh, and those Mind Melds hardly affect Vulcans at all, according to reports.



IC Savvy: Bidding on the 2011 International Conference

The 2008 International Conference has just ended, and I'm delighted to see lots of interest from several groups in putting together a future event of their own. I remember that enthusiasm right after I attended my first IC in Cherry Hill, New Jersey, in 1997, and I finally got to help host an IC here in Ithaca.

As I write this, IC 2009 is just a short year away, in Greensboro, North Carolina, celebrating STARFLEET's 35th anniversary, as well as the 40th anniversary of the first moon landing. And, at this year's IC, I announced that the

winning bid for the 2010 International Conference will take us to Sequoyah State Park in Wagoner, Oklahoma. Visit www.ic2009.org and www.ic2010.org, respectively, for more information about those upcoming events.

What about 2011? If you're interested in hosting a future International Conference, the next two years are covered, but it's time to start thinking about bidding on future years! There are lots of things to think about, and there's lots of information on the IC Liaison web site at ic.sfi.org, but here are some basics to get you started.

When and Where

STARFLEET's annual International Conference is generally held in the summer, between late June and

late August, so most schools won't be in session and most families will be better able to travel. It's pretty much impossible to avoid all scheduling conflicts, but try to pay attention to such big events as WorldCon and Comic-Con, as well as popular regional events like Dragon*Con, Convergence, and Shore Leave. Especially if they're in your part of the country, big fandom events will tend to reduce your attendance, and it's not nice to make people choose.

There are pros and cons to holiday weekends; it's nice to have the extra day off from work to travel and enjoy the IC without taking more vacation days, but many folks may already have big plans around three-day weekends.

Sometimes, the "when" will be taken care of for you by the "where"; you'll often find that the hotels or other venues you choose will have a limited number of weekends available-yes, even three years out--and your choice of weekend will be effectively be determined by when they can host a large group, or provide the best rates.

When thinking about which facilities to talk to, it's worth considering where they're located, what amenities and affordable rates they can offer guests, what kind of deal they can offer you, and, of course, whether they're even big enough to host an IC. Chances are, you can contact a local convention & visitors bureau or local tourism office to find out which area hotels meet the basic needs of an IC. If they don't have meeting space and guestrooms for at least a couple hundred attendees, it's probably not worth considering them. (While it's possible to spread out an IC with attendees staying in more than one hotel, or staying

in a hotel that's separate from the conference facility, it's far from ideal, and would make your bid less likely to be selected.)

As for location, are they near an airport for convenience to travelers coming from a distance? Not too far from a major highway? In an interesting downtown area that offers extra attractions, entertainment, and dining opportunities? Airport hotels and downtown hotels each have advantages and disadvantages; downtown hotels often have higher room rates and charge for parking, but airport hotels may be isolated from eateries and other places an IC attendee may want to visit. Hotels with complimentary airport shuttles offer a significant benefit, since they limit the amount of time and energy the IC staff will need to expend getting attendees to and from the airport.

High-speed Internet access and a pool (ideally with a hot tub, popular at recent ICs) have become crucial features for an event hotel to offer. Some hotels have free Internet access and some charge for it; get the details figured out in advance. Fitness rooms, guest computer workstations with printers, refrigerators in (or available for) guestrooms, and so forth also help to make a hotel attractive to guests, and thus to events such as ours.

Striking a Deal

Hotels are quite accustomed to putting together attractive package deals to bring in conference business, so don't be shy about asking for favorable treatment and pricing.

You can and should ask for both an attractive room rate that will be available for individual attendees, and a discounted rate for conference space that we'll need for meetings and other events all weekend.

Standard hotel room rates vary enormously, not just from region to region throughout the U.S. and beyond, but also from city downtowns to suburbs to rural areas. While we've mostly managed to find room rates below or just over the magic \$100 mark, that will be harder and harder as the years go by--and it's no longer unusual to find full-service hotels quoting rates north of \$200 or even \$300 per night, especially in big cities. We'll leave the question of whether such room rates are worthwhile for another discussion, and simply say that

most STARFLEET members wouldn't be able to afford to come to an event with such high hotel costs.

The first IC with room rates above \$100 had the advantage that the hotel, an Embassy Suites, customarily includes complimentary "happy hour" evening drinks and munchies each night, and complimentary cooked-to-order breakfasts each morning, which made the higher room rate a much better deal. If your hotel can "throw in" some amenities that they normally charge extra for, whether it's parking or Internet access or breakfast, you may similarly be able to make a higher room rate more palatable if they can't reduce their rates.

Frequently, a hotel will offer a complimentary suite (or at least a complimentary room) for the Commander, STARFLEET to use for the weekend, and perhaps extra free rooms based on the number of rooms paid for at the conference rate. The 2008 IC in Ithaca, for example, was offered a nice suite for FADM Lizard's use, as well as an additional free room-night for each fifty paid room-nights.



What's a "room-night"? It's the currency of the hotel world, essentially one room that's been paid for, for one night. One person paying for a hotel room for three nights in a row constitutes three room-nights, and five people each paying for a hotel room for three nights in a row constitutes fifteen room-nights.

In addition to free guestrooms, we were able to strike a deal with the hotel that gave us sharply discounted conference space based on the number of room-nights sold. Meeting space is otherwise often quite expensive, in the thousands of dollars for a whole weekend for enough space to hold an IC. (In some cases, IC organizers have arranged for discounted conference space based on the level of food and beverage, or F&B in hotel parlance, sales, such as banquets, lunches for the EC and AB, and bar business.)

Don't fall into the trap of committing to a minimum number of room-nights and promising to pay for unsold rooms. It's extremely risky, and could expose you, your group, or even STARFLEET to thousands of dollars of expense that offers nothing in return. Asking the hotel to set aside a room block in which members can reserve rooms at a discount, and making sure that room block is big enough, isn't the same as promising that many rooms will be taken. In other words, a reservation block and a room-night commitment

are not the same thing. Naturally, allow the hotel to set a deadline for reservations in that room block, after which the rooms are available to the public.

That means we should be asking the hotel to set aside more rooms than we'll necessarily need, with a reservation deadline far enough in advance of the event that they should have no trouble selling remaining rooms to others if we're not using them. If, for example, you expect 300 people, it's reasonable to ask the hotel to set aside 150 rooms in a discounted IC room block until a month before the IC-after which they're welcome to make any unused rooms available to the general public, IC attendees included. If we only end up using 120 rooms, it's not reasonable for you, the host group, or STARFLEET to be asked to pay the hotel for the thirty rooms that didn't get used. (Those numbers are just examples; we've actually used anywhere from about 75 to about 120 rooms, or anywhere from about 140 to about 250 room nights, for recent ICs.)

Budgeting

There are lots of things you'll need to plan on spending money on when planning an IC, and lots of ways you can

bring in revenue to cover it all. I'll go more deeply into financial planning for an IC in a future column, but the most important summary I can offer here is: plan on spending less money than you think you'll have, and plan on bringing in more money than you think you'll need. Remember that you'll need to cover not only the cost of the hotel space and all of the food they'll be charging for, but also mailings to chapters, materials for attendees, web site and e-mail services, and the CS's travel expenses.

Where can all this money come from? Not just attendee registrations and meal payments (which ought to cover all anticipated costs), but also program book advertising sales to members, chapters, and local businesses, as well as dealer tables and merchandise sales.

Get Planning!

If you have any questions about bidding on or planning an IC, now would be a good time to ask them! Bids for the 2011 IC will be accepted in early 2009, so now's the time to start your planning. Bank Account Information

We started the month of July with a balance of \$1,133.32. We had deposits in the amount of \$1,009.46 and no withdrawals during July, leaving the account balance at \$2,142.78. I would also like to thank BGN Lauren Niemeyer for editing and proofreading all the general SFMC manuals. Her changes will be made and those updated manuals will be released at next year's IC.

SFMC Websites

The SFMC websites continue to work well and they have received an overall positive response from those that use them. I continue to fix any issues and problems that are found, either by a Marine or myself, when visiting the pages. I have updated the Alert Rosters on the SFMC site. I plan on updating the Alert Rosters every six months.

Do those words sound familiar to you? If you're a long time enlisted member of the SFMC, I'm sure they do. They are, of course, the motto and slogan of the SFMC NCO Corps, and I'd like to thank BGN Sean Niemeyer, COINFOCOM, for honoring my request to add them to the NCO page on the SFMC website.

Now, let's be clear about one thing. You don't have to be an NCO in the SFMC to put "service before self" or to strive for excellence in everything you do. I'm absolutely sure that every one of us can think of an officer or ten that we know personally that does the very same thing. But to the career SFMC NCO or WO, those two phrases are often what we expect from our peers and ourselves.

Unlike the "real world," there aren't many in the SFMC or SFI that remain in the enlisted ranks. There may not be any enlisted members in an entire MSG, or even an entire battalion. It's not surprising in a *Star Trek* based organization. That choice can be hard for a lot of people to understand.

As a reminder, for the most part, there is no rank requirement to hold down any position in the SFMC. If a position requires OTS and OCC, it doesn't mean you have to be promoted to officer status. Make your preference clear to your local CO before taking the tests. If necessary, you are within your rights to turn down a promotion. There are enlisted members of the Corps serving in many billets that are traditionally thought of as belonging to officers. Oddly enough, the only positions I know of offhand in the SFMC that have rank requirements require the person holding it to be enlisted.

Moving on to news from the enlisted ranks, I'd like to take time to congratulate CPL "Shakes" O'Connor of the 313th for earning the Advanced Medical Proficiency Ribbon. I'd also like to give special recognition to GSGT Dave Lowe of the 631st. Gunny Lowe is one of those officers I mentioned earlier who has decided to return to the enlisted ranks. Star Trek: The Experience - One Last Time

Star Trek: The Experience has closed its doors. It seems unbelievable. No more Region 4 Conferences in the Federation Circle at Quark's; no more hurried trips from the Promenade up the stairs (or ramp) to the line for the rides again and again; no more perusing through Garak's Clothing store, or the Admiral memento shop. It's all gone.

Vicki and I were lucky enough to join fellow 'Fleeters in a last gathering in the fabled halls of Quark's Bar, The Promenade, and the always-enjoyable Klingon Encounter and Borg 4-D Adventure. When we heard in April that the Experience had lost their lease at the Las Vegas Hilton Hotel, there was a flurry of subspace messages around the region attempting

to get as many persons together as possible for one last fling. We decided upon Aug. 23rd, as the Labor Day Weekend (their final weekend open) for most of us is a family time.

Travel plans were made so we would arrive on Friday, Aug. 22nd. We booked our reservations at the Hilton Hotel itself, so our room would be closer to the Experience. It saved a great deal of time.

But things didn't run smoothly as I would have liked. The flight to Las Vegas was uneventful, but when we checked into the Hilton, we were assigned a room on the 14th floor, except it didn't have a wheel-chair accessible bathroom (which was strange considering the fact that I checked us into the hotel, and I was sitting in my wheelchair at the time, and I know that the clerk saw my wheelchair, considering he had to lean forward over the front desk to look at me). Even so, there we were in a room with a non-accessible bathroom. I called the front desk to tell them our problem, and the voice on the other end of the phone, after a moment


checking his computer screen, agreed completely, giving us another room with a free upgrade for our trouble.

The new room was nicer. It had a 35-inch LCD television, a lovely view of the Las Vegas Strip, and an accessible bathroom... although I question their engineer's idea of accessibility. The sink counter was at my chin height. I could see only the top half of my face in the mirror, and the roll-in shower was built up instead of being set into the floor, so that as I showered, water ran over the bathroom floor causing a very dangerous slippery situation. Talk about a lawsuit looking for a place to happen!

As it was, we spent very little time in the room as we had come to enjoy the Experience one last time. And we did! Friday night we went to Quark's for dinner. The line to get in wound around the Federation circle and took 40 minutes to get seated. It took another 30 minutes for our food to arrive. Good thing there were plenty of Warp Core Breaches floating

around. We had just about finished ours when our food arrived. By the time we finished, it was almost closing time and quite a few people had been turned away because of the lateness of the hour.

We went to bed, inebriated and stuffed, and fell into a deep slumber. When we woke, it was rush, rush, and rush to get cleaned up, dressed and downstairs by noon, when we were to meet outside the Experience. As we exited the elevator and walked toward the Experience, I was gaping at the crowd. People had come from all over the country to have one last encounter at the Experience. The line to get into the Experience went out the doorway, and out into the hallway



where the Hilton had non-*Star Trek* shops for the convenience of their customers. It was there that we met Dan Toth and Ed Stockton, our erstwhile member from Pennsylvania. He had flown out just for this event. We got in line with them, got our

tickets, and began the long wait to enter a ride.

On the way up to the Ride entrance, along the ramp, is the "History of the Federation" timeline along the wall. It starts with the scientific revolution and proceeds through the five *Star Trek* series. It incorporates the series episodes in the future history.

At the top of the ramp is a museum showcase with costumes and props from the multiple series and theatrical movies. This winds up above Quark's Bar and Restaurant and around to the backside to the entrance of the two rides. When the rides are over, you are taken by elevator down to the lower level and come out at the Promenade and the gift shops and Quark's Bar. Just the place after such an exciting adventure.

Dan and Ed started with the Klingon Encounter, and Vicki and I did the Borg 4-D adventure. When we arrived at the Promenade, we looked through the gift shop. Garak's Clothiers was closed. There were no T-shirts to buy. I had planned on purchasing several shirts. I had thought they would have a memorial shirt especially for the closing, but I was wrong. They were reducing all inventories and not restocking. Bummer!

We went to Moogie's Trading Post to wait for our Bridge picture session. It was only several minutes later when another couple and we were led to the backstage elevator and whisked to the bridge set. The other couple was in Starfleet uniforms and

I let them go first. As they were having their photo taken, Vicki and I wondered around the set, having the chance to view in detail what one could only see briefly during the Klingon Encounter ride. We had our picture taken, and with a few minutes until the next group came through, we spent the time taking our own pictures and enjoying the ambience.

Arriving back at Quark's, we had thought to stop and get something to eat, but the line to get into Quark's wound around the outside and back towards the stairs up to the casino floor. We passed. Instead, Dan, Ed, Vicki and I went to the buffet located by the Sports and Track parlor at the rear of the casino. Everyone else seemed not to eat that much, but I pigged out. I knew just how long a day we were in for. I wanted to fuel up so as not to waste time later.

Afterwards, Vicki went up to the room to lie down, Dan, Ed and myself headed back for the Experience. The lines were just a long as they were hours before. Forty minutes was an average wait time. Since each ride can only hold so many people, (27 for the Klingon

Encounter, and 48 for the Borg 4-D Adventure), there was plenty of time to get to know the people around you. Many had interesting tales to tell.

Several young couples near me were telling the people around them that they had never heard of the Experience until a friend had sent them a link by e-mail telling of the imminent closure. So they decided to come and check it out before it did.

The rest of the night became a blur of standing in line, going through the rides, and then standing in line again. After they closed the rides at 9 pm, I headed back to the room. I thankfully crawled into bed, groaning at the thought that our plane left at 11:20 am and we would have to get up early.

Our shuttle to the airport met us at 8:15 am outside the Hilton Hotel, and we were at the airport 20 minutes later. One last memory to remind us of what had been.

Writing Quark's Menu

I am a professional Trekkie.

What this means is that I've worked with Paramount's Viacom Consumer Products Licensing Department as a consultant "expert" on all things *Star Trek*. The gig started back in 1996 when my Internet design company had landed a job creating the marketing website for the Starfleet Academy CD-ROM game for Interplay Games. I'd written up a proposal that caught the eye of Juliet Dutton over at Paramount. Having only recently landed

the job in *Trek* licensing, Juliet was desperately trying to watch all the Trek episodes and learn the series. She desperately needed someone with a thorough knowledge of the franchise and a professional attitude.

Believe it or not, I actually got paid \$20/hour to read over *Star Trek* CD-ROM game scripts and comment on them, looking for breaks with established continuity. Over the years, I've worked with a number of licensees in different capacities, but in the beginning, it was just in the *Star Trek* computer gaming division, since I was only really working with Juliet.

Then, during the early summer of 1997, I was "loaned out" to another division of *Star Trek* licensing. Kirsti Wolfe was working with Paramount Parks on a new *Star Trek* "theme park" in Las Vegas. Kirsti was more of a Trekkie than Juliet, and Kirsti was frustrated by having to reject attempt after attempt by the Paramount Parks licensee to submit a decent menu for this *Star Trek* Experience's restaurant. They were coming up with generic space names like "cosmic burger" and "galaxy fries." Kirsti knew this wasn't proper *Trek*, and she needed a writer with both a sense of *Star Trek* and a sense of humor.

By this point, I had done a fair amount of writing for some of the CD-ROM games, so Juliet knew that Jon Lane could turn a phrase. At a weekly staff meeting in July, as Kirsti was voicing her frustration with Paramount Parks, Juliet

Well, before you could say, "Make it so!" I was holding two lists of menu items--one for the drinks at Quark's bar and one for the food items in Quark's restaurant. There were nearly 80 different drinks and food items to name, and I didn't have much time.

suggested contacting me to see if I would be interested in

Looking for some immediate help, I turned to my fellow crew mates aboard the *USS Angeles* in Southern California. Conveniently, we were having our annual August pool party the following weekend. So I brought the menu items along and asked for help in thinking up names for everything.

Ten years later, few of us who were involved remember who thought of what names. Janice Willcocks, Jennifer Cole, Dave Mason, Joanne Minerbi, myself and a few and "Tribble Tenders" (taste just like chicken!). TNG gave us the always-popular "Holy Rings of Betazed" and that explosive drink, "The Warp Core Breach" (which later was mentioned on an episode of *Deep Space 9*—talk about art imitating life imitating art!). *DS9* references included "Joseph Sisko's Bayou Lingini" and the tasty "Cardassian Cooler." For *Voyager*, of course, we had the "Hamborger" and a drink called "The Badlands." And my personal favorite was a *Trek* movie reference for the chicken fajita wrap that we named "The Wrap of Khan."


Often the descriptions were funnier than the names themselves. A good example was the drink called the "Red Shirt." The description read, "A favorite drink of *Enterprise* security guards. It helps them pass the time while they're barricaded in their quarters trying to avoid landing party duty."

Not every idea was approved, however. I remember there was a Melon Colada drink that I wanted to call "Melon of Troi." The

remember there was a Melon Colada drink that I wanted to call "Melon of Troi." The name was rejected, and I think it eventually became the "Orion's Belt" because the ultimate drink color was green. But I was most bummed when they wouldn't let me have my first choice of name for their chocolate and peanut butter pie. "Kai Pie" would have been perfect, but the licensing folks felt it was too obscure. So, instead, it was called "The Pie of the Prophets," but I snuck the name "Kai Pie" into the description anyway.

The original Quark's menus-drink and restaurant--were printed in full color and had a futuristic X-folding cover. It proved very popular (I was even asked to sign my autograph on a couple when people discovered that I was one of the menu writers). However, even though both menus were for sale in the Moogie's Trading Post gift shop for \$10 each, a more popular pastime became the clandestine theft of menus by diners at Quark's. In fact, I was

told that over 1,000 menus had been stolen in the first six months alone, while only 14 were sold! (Fortunately, I was never offered royalties...not that it would have mattered.) In defense of some of those thieves, though, it wasn't made clear until later in their first year of operation that the menus were not complementary and any missing menu would be charged to your meal check. (That policy didn't last long, however.)

others came up with names for over half the items before running out of energy and time. Then I went home to think up even more names, plus do the really challenging part: write descriptions of everything.

The names were fun and very Trekkish, covering TOS, TNG, DS9, and VOY (no *Enterprise* NX-01 yet). Original Series names included things like "Journey to Basil Pizza"

I've included scans of all of the original menu pages elsewhere in this issue of the Communiqué if you want a really good bunch of laughs.

People often ask me which menu item I was most proud of naming. I always answer that it was the Fresh Catch of the Day because I'd had so much trouble coming up with a decent *Trek* name for it. Not much you can do with fish. So I thought about the "catch" part and was going with "Odo's Fresh Catch of the Day" (since Odo arrests people and catches crooks). Nah, it didn't thrill me all that much either. That's why it stuck in the back of my mind for weeks until one day--in the shower, of all places--it hit me, the perfect name for this menu item. Odo went away to be proudly replaced with...wait for it..."Fisherman's Worf"!

Over the years, the menu changed often and sometimes dramatically. As certain dishes and drinks proved less popular, items were removed from the menu and new ones were added. I was never asked to write another menu for them, and with each new version of the menu, less of my original items were left...and what replaced them wasn't nearly as clever or funny. For example, "The Wrap of Khan" later became the "Grilled Chicken Khan" (huh?). I used to tell people after the menu changed: "If something makes you laugh, it's from the original menu." Of those original 80 drink and

food items, only 18 made it to the bitter end... including two perennial favorites: the "Warp Core Breach" and the "Holy Rings of Betazed."

The final menu (which I'm holding up along with the original menu in the photo that started this article), was introduced shortly before the Experience closed forever. It had way fewer selections, was printed in simple black and white, and had a farewell message on the cover that said, "THANK YOU FOR 10 OUT-OF-THIS-WORLD YEARS."

Did people steal this last menu as much as the original? Well, I can only speak for myself...and my lips are sealed.

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Signing My Name to Star Trek: The Experience

with Paramount Licensing and how I, along with members of the crew of the USS Angeles, wrote the original food and drink menus for Quark's Bar and Restaurant at Star Trek: The Experience in Las Vegas.

But my involvement doesn't end there. I also signed my name right in the center of the Borg Invasion 4D ride--and no one ever knew! Here's my second Star Trek: The Experience story for you...

One of my very good friends is Adam "Mojo" Lebowitz, Emmy Award-winning special effects animator on "Babylon 5", "Deep Space 9", "Voyager", and most recently "Battlestar Galactica." (Yes, I do love to name-drop.) In early 2003, Mojo had been hired to supervise the computer-generated special effects for the new Borg Invasion 4D ride at Star Trek: The Experience.

Mojo was aware that I am not only a hard-core Trekkie, but I'm also a trained graphic designer. I'm intimately familiar with the LCARS computer readout design from TNG and Voyager. Originally designed by Star Trek scenic artist Michael Okuda (and affectionately called "Okudagrams"), this style of computer interface was seen throughout Starfleet vessels of the 24th century and would be a vital part of the Borg Invasion 4D ride.

In the previous article, I wrote about my involvement to be given a tour of Copernicus Station, where the station personnel pick up a large vessel on long-Emergency Medical Hologram from *Voyager* was working on a breakthrough vaccine to immunize people against assimilation by the Borg nanoprobes. Apparently, some of us



have a natural resistance to these nanoprobes, and the Doctor will be doing some "painless" tests on our DNA.

While the Doctor proudly takes most of the credit The idea for the ride was that your group was about for this brilliant approach to resisting the Borg, the

range scanners quickly descending on the station. With a look of shock, the Doctor and the station's crew realize it's a Borg cube. Red Alert! Shields up! Arm all weapons!

Copernicus Station is no match for the Cube. Within moments, a Borg cutting beam slices away a section of the station--the part with you and the Doctor aboard--and a tractor beam draws your helpless chunk of station toward the Cube.

With Borg drones penetrating the station's defenses and grabbing up Starfleet personnel for assimilation, you group has precious little time to escape. Security officers try to get you through the debris-lined corridors to a shuttle to try to escape the Borg tractor beam.

You all barely make it to the shuttle in time, but it's too late. Your shuttle gets drawn into the Cube, and the Borg Queen herself shows up to assimilate you in the very chair in which you're sitting. Blasts of air combine with a snaking Borg probe to simulate nanoprobes hitting you in the face. Then bumpers from the seat jut out into your legs and back to make you feel like you're getting implants installed. And finally, you hear whispers through speakers in the head cushion behind you with the voices of the Collective inside your mind.

Only the Doctor can save you by interfacing with the Collective Neural Matrix, trying to get you to resist giving in to the Collective until Admiral Janeway can

arrive with Voyager to save you and defeat the Just as Michael Okuda himself hid people's names Borg Queen.

Quite a ride!

My bit was primarily at the beginning of the ride, when the Doctor is introducing you to the station and the project just as the Borg attack. The video

of the Doctor is what I like to call "the Brady Bunch" screen, with a large video window on the left and three smaller ones stacked on the right. While the Doctor and other scenes from the station dominate the large video on the left (along with 3D effects), the three smaller windows on the right switch between scenes of other officers and LCARS readouts.


While Mojo and his team worked on all the 3D graphics, I had to design anything that was 2D (flat), like the longrange sensor scan, shields energizing, damage reports, station schematics, shuttlecraft prep, and all the red alert graphics. All in all, I created 12 computer animations, each running between 10 and 20 seconds in length, some of them repeating as loops.

And how did I sign my name? Well, that part was easy! The frame that divided the "Brady Bunch" screen into four windows was itself an LCARS display.

on buttons and control panels throughout the Enterprise-D and Voyager, I hid my own initials right in the center: "JPL 7". Jonathan Paul Lane, and 7 is my lucky number. Under that, I put "WES 9", my fiancée's (now wife's) maiden initials: Wendy Elizabeth Stanford, and her birthday is September, the ninth month.

So for five years at Star Trek: The Experience, thirty to forty times each day, nearly one million people stared at my initials smack in the center of Borg Invasion 4D for five minutes at a time. And no one knew it...

...until now.




