



AB Discussions and Votes

There have been a few topics of discussion which have been brought up before the AB over the last couple of months, here's a brief summary of those topics:

Membership Suspension of Scott Akers

The AB considered the case of Dennis Rayburn *v*. Scott Akers, discussing options for addressing the issues raised in the IG investigation and a possible membership suspension of Scott for his conduct in the matter. The matter went to a vote by the AB.

JAG Officer Replacement

With the vacancy left in the JAG office when Richard Jolitz resigned and chose to not renew his STARFLEET membership, the AB began discussing a replacement for the JAG Office, and continues to review several candidates. At the time of this writing, the AB has not selected a replacement.

Amendments to the Membership Handbook

There were a number of corrections that were proposed for the membership handbook, which were reviewed by the AB to

address areas that better reflected how STARFLEET was doing business or to correct information and make it more accurate. These changes were reviewed and moved for approval. At the time of this writing, the AB has not completed the vote to approve these amendments.

AB09-06: Official Discussion List FAQ

Region 13 (Joe Sare) made the following motion: The AB accept the Official STARFLEET Discussion list FAQ, as submitted, and rule that they are enforceable by the list owner and their staff.

Region 5 (Cathey Fuller) seconded the motion.

Result: Passed: Aye: 11, Nay: 3, Abstain: 2

AB09-07: Membership Suspension of Scott Akers (Rayburn v. Akers)

Region 8 (Owen Swart) made the following motion: That the Admiralty Board suspend the membership of Scott Akers for the period of three years in response to the results of the most recent investigation by the Inspector General. This motion was seconded by Region 13 (Joe Sare).

Result: Passed: Aye: 9, Nay: 4, Abstain: 4

NOTE: Region 10's vote had come after the deadline for voting, resulting in a tie vote between those in favour and those opposed/not voted. As such, the Commander, STARFLEET as the Chairman of the Board voted to break the tie, confirming Region 10's vote in favour of the suspension

EC Discussions

EC continues to hold regularly-scheduled conference calls to discuss a variety of topics, such as:

A chapter name and NCC number combination request/ appeal;

Membership Renewal versus Membership Reinstatement; STARFLEET's Budget for the next Fiscal Year;

Membership Drive Materials;

The STARFLEET Quartermaster, shopping cart system and Spread Shirt online store;

IC2009;

Vic's Place appeals and the IG investigation regarding it; Member and chapter perks;

Membership numbers since the release of Star Trek.

Leyla Fayyaz, a producer for Fox 5 "Good Day New York", was seeking out *Star Trek* fan club leaders and contacted me earlier in the week. Originally, they hoped to have had two locations, one in New York and one in New Jersey. But by Thursday afternoon, they decided to go with one location, and they chose Toms River.

Commander Keith S. Shikowitz, new member Andrew Sterman, and Communications Chief Steve Worth made the 90-minute trek from Rockland County, NY to Toms River, NJ, arriving in time for the 6 a.m. setup by the morning news crew at the theater.

We had arranged to have a display of *Star Trek* memorabilia at the theater for the weekend promotion of the film, and that included a replica of the captain's chair from the original *Star Trek* TV series.

I recently heard someone say, "*Star Trek* is just a movie," and I've been thinking about that ever since. I'm sure many people who were lined up to see *Star Trek* on several screens in Lynchburg and all over the country this weekend felt that way. But they also

enjoyed an action adventure that was fast-paced and exciting and had characters that they were in some way familiar with. If you are a die-hard *Star Trek* fan, you appreciated a wonderful movie plus all the subtle nuances that laced the film throughout, harking back to *Star Treks* past ... and loved it. I thought it was one of the best *Trek* films so far.

> So back to that comment, "Star Trek is just a movie." To many it is, but it's far more than that if anyone cares to think about it. Using my chapter as an example, we got our chapter together in 1983. In 1984, we launched as a shuttle, and in 1985 went to starship status. In 1985, we had our first chapter fundraiser --an on board ship auction in August of that year--and we

raised \$50. WOW! In December of 1985, we adopted our first charity: a local Social Services welfare child, and we paid for his Christmas gifts. We donated that entire \$50, but it felt so good to know we'd made Christmas possible for a child who otherwise would have had none.

In the 25 years since the Heimdal launched, we've continued every Christmas to adopt a Social Services welfare child, increasing our donation amount as we became more successful at fundraising. Over the years, we've also widened our scope to include 10 charities that we support on an on-going basis. We've sent 2 students to Space Camp and are sending our third in July of this year. In 25 years, we've fed numerous discarded animals in shelters, made Christmas happen for 2 welfare kids and 2 senior citizens each year, come to the aid of hurricane victims, supported the Pediatric Cystic Fibrosis Fund in memory of one of our members, cared for families in need through the Salvation Army. presented timely public service programs to the community, and become a caring presence in our area. And that's just the *Heimdal*.

All over STARFLEET, chapters are helping feed people, giving kids wonderful holidays, caring for animals, educating their communities, and MAKING A DIFFERENCE. And all of this has happened for 25 years with the *Heimdal*, longer and ongoing with other STARFLEET chapters, and just beginning for new chapters starting out with our organization.

So here's the thing ... is *Star Trek* just a movie? No, certainly not...not to STARFLEET chapters and the communities in which they reside and serve. Without *Star Trek*, STARFLEET would never have been born. And without STARFLEET and our caring chapters, it would be impossible to guess how many kids would not have had Christmas, or how many animals would not have been kept long enough to be adopted into good homes, or how many families would have gone unfed or natural disaster victims left alone to fend for themselves. Looking at all we do, my answer to that question, "*Star Trek:* just a movie?" is an unequivocal NO. And when I sit in a theater being thoroughly entertained and excited

by the latest *Star Trek* film, I know for my chapter and the many chapters of STARFLEET, I'm not just watching a movie. I'm sitting in the midst of the reason so many people and beings have been helped throughout the years...something that would have been impossible if *Star Trek* were "*Just A Movie!*"

Communications Report

What a Difference a Year Makes

In preparing my annual Communications Departmental report to the STARFLEET membership, I went back to last August when I took over as Comm Chief and read a bunch of saved e-mails. Which e-mails? Complaints. Gripes. Frustrations. Angry rants. There were quite a bunch. And while the EC hasn't solved all of the problems we had last year, it's amazing how many issues have been addressed and, in many cases, solved.

I'll concentrate primarily on those complaints and problems that the Communications Department had a direct role in solving. Let's dive right in...

The STARFLEET Communiqué

I am pleased to say that, since issue #148, five issues of the CQ have been published, none of them later than two months after the previous one (which is our schedule). I am still trying to trim off a week or two from that two-month schedule to make up for the one-issue of lateness left over from early 2008. In other words, our most recent April/May issue came out in June, arguably a month or more later than the cover date would suggest. I'm working to nudge the release date a little closer to the cover date, but it really does take about two months to finish a full issue. Even so, we've managed to trim off about two weeks so far from our initial eight-week deficit.

Print quality was a completely different challenge. Starfleet has been using the same Oklahoma-based printers for over 10 years, getting a CQ on newsprint. But I wondered: would it be possible to go to magazine format, full color, and keep ourselves within budget? Our Oklahoma printers didn't have magazine presses, so I called around. After getting 17 different price quotes from the redwood forests to the gulf stream waters, and even from overseas in China, I discovered that we're actually getting one hell of a deal from the Oklahoma guys! The cheapest bid I got for an issue was more than double what we're paying now. The most expensive was 9 TIMES more! So we obviously needed to stick with newsprint. But, oh, that messy ink came off on your hands every time you touched a copy of CQ.

Well, it turned out that all we needed to do was ask our printers for better paper. (That simple? Yeah.) Moving from standard newsprint to Hi-Brite paper made all the difference, and you can see it in the higher quality of the CQ from #149 onward. I also discovered that we had more color pages to work with than just the front and back covers and the center spread. Instead of 4 color pages per issue, we had 12. Turns out we were paying for 8 color pages that we weren't using! But the best news of all was that these discussions with our printer resulted in them offering STARFLEET a 20% discount if we signed a one-year contract (so they could order all our paper for the year in bulk and pass the savings on to us). After more than 10 years, what's

one year more? So we signed the contract and are now paying LESS than before for better paper and more pages of color! How about that!

One of the biggest complaints I read from last year was members calling for there to be more Star Trek in the CQ. Now, to be fair, we've got 16 active regions, over 200 chapters, and over 3,700 members, most of whom submit articles about their own activities. We've also got a lot of STARFLEET "business" content to include -- like the EC reports, staff listings, and the "Attention On Deck" Marine section. Even so, I'll admit that I, too, wanted to see more Star Trek. So in late September, I brought a motion before the EC to start including Star Trek imagery in the CQ again--not just logos, but cast member photos and episode and movie stills. For about ten years, STARFLEET had been avoiding using such images for fear of getting a cease and desist order from Paramount. Meanwhile, countless other Trek clubs and websites were plastering Paramount's intellectual property all over the place...without even a single slap on the wrist. We were the only one out there "behaving ourselves," and it seemed the time had come to finally come back inside and enjoy the party with everyone else. I also began to ask members for more Trek-related submissions to include. And so Star Trek returned to CQ.

EC Communication with the General Membership

Remember when virtually no one from the EC would tell members anything (not just Sal Lizard, but virtually the entire EC)? A year ago, members felt like most major decisions were being made behind a curtain, that member concerns were not being listened to at all, and that the EC cared and shared little about what was going on with anyone other than the EC itself. This needed to change.

One of the first things I did after taking over as Comm Chief was to create the Regional Relay Officer program. Although STARFLEET has an official Announcement list and a Business Discussion list, these two online chat boards reach only a few hundred members. Most regions have their own chat lists, though, and the outreach to members is much more vast when those lists are included. Now, some RCs were already forwarding messages from the Announcement-L to their regional lists, but others weren't. However, by appointing a Regional Relay Officer (RRO) in every region, we created a new line of communication between the EC and the member. Sometimes the RRO was the RC himself or herself. Other times, it's been a helpful member that could take on some of the work that the RC would no longer have to worry about.

In the last ten months, nearly 60 individual announcement messages from the EC have been e-mailed to the RROs. That averages out as 1 to 2 messages each week! From a starting point of virtually no outward communication from the

EC toward the membership to weekly messages is a pretty good improvement. What's more, the RROs have been instructed to forward important messages from their own lists to the EC if the RRO and/or RC feel the message is important enough to warrant EC attention. So the relay could go both ways and, thus, the lines of communication between the EC and Joe Member were increased and strengthened.

The SFI.org Website

One of the challenges facing the STARFLEET website was the lack of a reliable Webmaster. This changed in January when one humble member stepped up to volunteer for this challenging position. Not wanting to get involved in Fleet politics, this member asked to remain anonymous and became known simply as "Webmaster X". (And contrary to some conjecture-no, Webmaster X is NOT Dave Lowe. Indeed, they live in two different states.)

Armed with a competent Webmaster, Computer Operations teamed with Communications to rebuild the SFI.org website from scratch. Part of the reason for the teamwork is that the Comm Chief (me) happens to be an Internet Information Architect and Usability Specialist professionally. As such, I worked closely with CompOps Chief John Halliday and Webmaster X to architect the site, defining three primary types of users: the veteran member, the new or casual member, and the non-member thinking about joining. The new site structure would allow each of these user types to easily find what they most wanted or needed. Armed with the "blueprints," Webmaster X proceeded to create some wonderful graphic design and assemble the entire website using the Joomla Content Management System.

After four full months of planning, designing, and buildingduring which time Webmaster X probably wanted to throttle me on numerous occasions--the new STARFLEET website was unveiled in early April, a full month before the new movie was released. Feedback was almost unanimously positive (how often does THAT happen in this club!), and by the time the *Star Trek* film came out, the news media was finding our site through search engines and contacting us first because, as many reporters told me personally, we looked like the most professional and well-organized of the *Star Trek* fan clubs out there. Traffic to our website tripled when the new site was unveiled, and tripled again when the movie came out.

The hope is that this new sfi.org website will stay updated more frequently and accurately than the last version because every piece of content only appears in one place. And new content can quickly be added into appropriate categories, rather than being tossed in randomly somewhere.

Now, the Member Database...that's a completely different story that I will let John Halliday tell.



Declining Membership

This item and the next are siblings. At our lowest point, Fleet strength declined by about 10-12% from the numbers that existed when Sal Lizard took office. But why? Did people not like Sal? Did people not like the political infighting? Or was it another reason altogether?

To help get to the bottom of this mystery, Communications set up the Alumni Outreach Program, directed by Fleet Captain George Ann Wheeler of the *USS Debraak*. AOP was different from Recruitment and Retention. AOP dealt with members who had already left STARFLEET. With help from then-Vice Chief of Communications Rob Kitson, Annie Wheeler created a friendly e-mail that could be sent to members who had expired and not renewed. This e-mail did two things. First, it invited the member to rejoin STARFLEET in an unpressured way. Second, if the member did not want to rejoin, it asked why not, hopeful that getting feedback from them would help us improve the STARFLEET experience. Responding was completely optional.

In late 2008, after being given a list by Member Processing Administrator Matt Ingles of members who expired between January and September of 2008, Annie and Rob sent out over 800 e-mails. The vast majority received no response, which was not unexpected. However, about 100 former members did respond... and here's what they said.

Fifty renewed. Just like that! They had forgotten or else had run out of money, but after getting the e-mail, they came right back to STARFLEET. Of the other responses, the most common reason for not renewing was economic. The recession hit hard, and suddenly \$15 was a lot of money. However, a number of these respondents (close to 12) said that they intended to rejoin just as soon as they had enough money to spare. The next most common reason for leaving: loss of interest. This was either a loss of interest in *Star Trek* itself (remember, the new movie was still 7 months away and no ads or trailers had aired yet) and/or a loss of interest in their chapter's activities or people. And at the bottom of the list was politics. A few people had gripes against the current administration in particular, but just as many folks said they just didn't like the politics in general and had no specific problem with the Lizard administration.

Two months later, Computer Operations managed to work around the glitch in the member database that was preventing renewal notice e-mails from being sent out. Sending manual reminder e-mail to expired members seemed to help with the member drop quite a bit, as did the growing enthusiasm for the new movie. However, there are still STARFLEET members that don't renew, and this summer, AOP plans to send out another batch of e-mails to members that have expired over the last six months and see if we can bring a few of them back this time, too. And if not, let's ask them why they left.

Supporting Recruitment

So we addressed the problem of non-renewing members, at least somewhat, but what about recruiting new members? By late last year, it was looking like little to nothing was being done to prepare STARFLEET to capitalize on the media blitz that would accompany the new *Star Trek* movie release.

After an admittedly late start, STARFLEET's public relations department awoke from hibernation as Admiral Brandt Heatherington took a more active role as PR Director. After researching options for national Press Releases, Brandt hooked STARFLEET up with PRWeb, and we issued our first-ever national Press Release in March, 2009. This was, in many ways, a test of the process. The Press Release did okay, but not great, in terms of getting us exposure. But this was valuable information, because our next Press Release would be the biggie. Released just a few weeks before the movie, we decided this time to use the highest of

the four levels of service offered by PRWeb (instead of the second lowest, as we did the first time). And the second Press Release was a huge success, getting much better coverage but also utilizing the top tier service of PR Web to increase STARFLEET's ranking on search engines. By the time the movie came out, any Google or Yahoo search for "Star Trek Fan Club" would result in STARFLEET's site link at or just under the top of the list...making it easier for both fans and the news media to find us.

A second piece of the recruitment puzzle came from the CQ. During the talks with our printer, I discovered a disturbing fact that I didn't know about. Each issue, we were paying for 3,000 copies of CQ but sending out only about 2,000 to members. We were keeping another 100 or so in reserve in case a few got lost in the mail, but nearly a thousand copies of each issue (that we were paying for!) were being tossed into the recycling bin. The reason for this was that, like most printers, ours has a minimum press run of 3,000. And the truth was that we had nowhere to store 1,000 extra CQs issue after issue. So they were tossed.

Still, I didn't like this one bit. We realized there was money in the STARFLEET budget to ship the extra CQs to the Quartermaster to sell to chapters for recruiting efforts. Unfortunately, the shipping costs from Oklahoma to Alabama (where the QM is located) added a cost that made purchasing the extra CQs uneconomical. And what was worse, after two issues of CQ didn't sell well, the QM was running out of storage room...and it looked like these issues would be thrown away anyhow, only this time in Alabama instead of Oklahoma.

But then we thought of a great idea: a CQ lottery. Each issue, we would draw names randomly of chapters who wanted extra CQs for recruiting. Each winner would get 100 free CQs (no charge for shipping--we would simply ship them from Oklahoma directly to the winners instead of to the QM). The new lottery was a big success. Nearly 30 chapters signed up for the first drawing, and 9 winners received a box of 100 newsletters just prior to the movie release. The second drawing already has 40 registered entrants.

Finally, under the guidance of Dave Blaser and with design help from Christina Sievers, STARFLEET also released, just prior to the movie premiere, a STARFLEET tri-fold brochure ready to photocopy. Several chapters used this for local recruiting, including handing out 150 at the red carpet premiere in Hollywood.

Explaining the Legal Fees

Perhaps most controversial of all the complaints were the questions being asked over and over again about why STARFLEET had needed to hire a law firm, how much had been spent, and what we received for our money. Although Sal Lizard promised multiple times to explain everything to the membership at large, the months went by with no explanation forthcoming.

I came into the position of Comm Chief from the outside, and I was one of the many demanding answers. I soon learned, though, that the reason for the silence wasn't sinister or nefarious at all. Instead, the task of explaining the legal expenses was simply overwhelming, and no one knew where to start. We had indeed gotten a lot for our money, so much so that explaining it all didn't lend itself to either a quick or simple response.

Still, the work of answering the questions needed to be done, and after a few delays due to the holidays and ice storms in the northeast, I was finally able to sit Sal Lizard and his Chief of Staff Sam Black down for two recorded phone calls lasting a combined five hours. With Sal's answers in his own words, I proceeded (with some help from an anonymous volunteer) to transcribe those five hours into a series of articles intended for the CQ. So far, there have been two segments published, totaling nine full pages combined, with another 90 minutes or so of interview still to transcribe. It's a huge task (and I no longer have my volunteer). Whether you like the answers Sal gave or you don't, the fact remains that this information needed to be shared with the membership. Too much money (over \$9,000) was spent from STARFLEET funds for members not to be told the specifics. So the complaints may now focus on the whether or not we should have gone to the lawyers in the first place, if we got our money's worth, and what should be done about legal services in the future. But at least there are now facts out in the open to argue about. A year ago, the complaint was a total lack of information and communication. Now, finally, there are answers instead of silence.

Improvements Everywhere You Look

I recently received an e-mail from an old friend of mine from within STARFLEET complaining about a number of things. I asked jokingly, "So, am I doing *anything* right?" This member replied, "I don't really know. I stopped paying attention to most things going on in the club. I don't read the CQ or follow much of anything beyond my chapter."

And I realized that, for many people in the club, this might be the case. Out of sight, out of mind. Of course, the CQ and the new website are very visible aspects of what's going right at the moment in STARFLEET...almost everyone sees the obvious improvement in those. But there's so much more, if you just look around. I realize that the Sal Lizard administration had a rough start, and half of the original EC members left or were replaced in less than a year's time. But the current EC team is one of the strongest I've seen in over a quarter century of being in STARFLEET. Early mistakes were made, to be certain, but the mark of a good leader and team is the ability to identify mistakes, correct them, learn from them, and not make them again. And that's very evident in this EC.

To be sure, there are still lingering traces of resentment out there to Sal and his EC (although significantly less than a year ago). And let's face it, some mistakes are still being made. We're all only human, and you can't please all the people all the time. No EC in STARFLEET's long history was ever universally loved for its entire term. But what's amazing is, if you do take the time to actually look around, you'll see that this EC is quietly, competently, and confidently building an incredible new infrastructure within this organization...as strong as or even stronger than it's ever been before. It's not just the Communications Department; it's CompOps and the Academy, ShOC and Ops, and even our renewed Financial stability. It's everyone coming together, great volunteers on the EC, AB, and beyond giving their all for this club that we love.

So if you're like my old friend who "stopped paying attention," you might not have noticed one of the most impressive renaissances in the history of STARFLEET. But it's out there, my friends. All you have to do is look (and maybe read just a few pages of the CQ). STARFLEET is on top again...and it's okay to be proud to be in this club. I know I am.

As a postscript, I would like to say a special thank you to my own winning team. First, Prasith Kim-Aun continues to do a top-notch job on CQ layout issue after issue. He's fast, reliable, hard-working, agreeable, and very talented. Second, there's my Vice-Chief of Communications, Dennis Rayburn, who is always ready to lend a hand (and I appreciate him handling the newsletter awards this year). Special shout-outs to Brandt Heatherington, Annie Wheeler, George Flanik, Alex Rosenzweig, and Gary Hollifield, Jr...all of whom are essential parts of the Comm Team. And finally, a sincere expression of gratitude to the anonymous and humble Webmaster X, who stepped up to take on a job that almost no one wanted, did that job expertly well, and continues to make frequent updates to the website on an almost daily basis. If you haven't checked out sfi.org lately, trust me, you should. My sincere thanks to all of these wonderful volunteers.

For a complete listing, you can use the Chapter Finder, Vessel Registry, or even look through the chapters listed on regional

pages. Just follow the links at <u>www.sfi.org</u>. This is also a great time for all those commanding officers trying to expand their chapters or even just to bring the chapters up to minimum crew strength. Virtually every region had a healthy increase of new, unassigned members. Talk to your regional coordinators to find out more about unassigned members in your regions. On a different note, we are quickly approaching this year's STARFLEET International Conference. Many members are working hard to make this great event a success. I want to do my part to help, too. Therefore, I am planning a panel on ShOC/Ops items of interest, such as chapter launch, chapter management, recruiting, and so on. For those members who can't attend Fleet events in person, we try to bring these events to you electronically. We are also working on other aspects of fleet operations to make use of the Internet to improve our operating efficiency. This includes online Vessel Registry Requests and so on. We have developed functional specifications for some of these. To make these features a reality, we need your help. If you have experience with PHP/MySQL programming, please contact COMM John Halliday at CompOps <<u>compops@sfi.org</u>> as soon as possible. We can definitely use your help implementing these new features in the SFI Database.

It has been a very busy two months since my last report, and I am now able to report progress in CompOps on a number of projects.

CubeCart

CubeCart is the new online commerce system that we recently finished configuring with all the STARFLEET Quartermaster products. When you have a chance, I highly recommend that you check out the new site: <u>http://qm.sfi.org/</u>

Some of the features of the new system include a shopping cart, automatic calculation

of shipping and handling based on real-time access to a the USPS web service, notification of new orders to our Quartermaster and Financial office staff, and the inclusion of a PayPal interface that makes it very easy to pay with your PayPal account (or just use your credit card if you don't have a PayPal account--no PayPal account is needed).

New Website--Success!

We always seem to want to re-do everything to fit our own style and preferences. This is especially true when we have a lot of expectations, some of which come from outside but mostly from within. The transition to a new system is still in the works, but is

now proceeding at a 'reasonable' pace. Requirements are still being gathered to cover the functional requirements of each of the modules of the web application, but the database design is currently nearly complete.

We have plans to include an online VRR system, SFMC reporting capabilities, a more sophisticated but easier-to-use user interface, and much more.



Shakedown Operations Report

Greetings, STARFLEET.

I am hoping all of you have enjoyed the summer so far. I have.

I am happy to announce the following launched chapter-in-training: Welcome the USS FireFox to STARFLEET. This is a meeting chapter and is currently based in Ozark, Arkansas. For info on joining this ship, please contact Commander Chris Tolbert at

Please remember that you have a source available to you if you want to start a new chapter. It is called the START2007 Manual. It can be downloaded from STARFLEET's website in the documents section.

Biff Bassett was our webmaster for both the ShOC site under SFI.org and ShOC's standalone site. Biff worked hard to keep them updated, and you should think of Biff when you take a look at the ShOC sites.

Vice ShOC, Admiral Alex Rosenzweig, has resurrected an old program that wasn't put into effect some years ago. It is called the Accelerated Shakedown Program. Below is a small portion of what it is all about.

Accelerated Shakedown Program

If one reads the START Manual, one sees that, as part of the shakedown, a group is expected to get certain things done. Well, if a group came into the shakedown with some of those things already done, or with certain characteristics already in place, what if we could establish that those would be equivalent to a reduction of time for the shakedown?

For example, a shakedown period might be reduced if a group could demonstrate...

- CO and/or XO already passed OCC.
- Group already has a newsletter/ publication.
- Group already has bylaws/constitution/ manual/promotion system/etc.
- Group was a former STARFLEET chapter within the past 5 years.

- Group was a former STARFLEET chapter within the past 10 years (but more than 5)... this would be equivalent to less of a time-savings, since a group older than 5 years will need time to get re-acclimated to changes in the organization.

- Group has been in prior existence for 1-5 years.

- Group has been in prior existence for 6+ years.

Then we set an absolute minimum of a 5-month shakedown, and using the above (or other) criteria, once we set time equivalents to them, time could be reduced from the full 9 months down to the 5-month minimum, depending on which criteria the group fulfills when the shakedown starts.

It is our expectation to implement this program as we launch new chapters. To view the full details visit the ShOC web site.

We all talk about how STARFLEET is a family, and many of us have seen it proven true firsthand. My latest proof of this statement came on the morning of April 17, 2009. On this morning, at about 8 a.m. MDT, I and my Chief of Operations (and good friend), Philip Dillard, were involved in a rollover accident on I-25 northbound at about mile marker

50 in Colorado. We hit a slick spot on a bridge over a drainage culvert and Phil lost control. We rolled about 1.25 times while spinning and came to rest in the median ditch on the passenger side. Fortunately, the most serious injuries were a broken metacarpal on Phil's left hand and severely strained Trapezoid and Pectoral muscles on my left side...as well as cuts, bruises, and other such injuries on both of us, more seriously for Phil. We'll heal. I wanted to take a moment and tell you all about the selfless, courageous, and overwhelming offers of help from our fellow STARFLEET members in Colorado.

When it was obvious that Phil was okay and would heal, albeit slowly and with much pain, I began to worry about how we would get to Denver for the convention (Starfest) that we had been headed to at the time of the accident. I called my XO, Laurie McFarland, but her family was worried about her driving with the weather being as ugly as it was (Denver got about 14" of snow that Friday and Saturday), and rightly so; the weather was horrible and not conducive for driving. I had also contacted Bran Stimpson of the USS Tiburon in Denver and Joe Hinson of the USS Qual'at (soon to be USS Independence) in Colorado Springs. Bran was in an appointment and could not leave. Joe offered to come get us and take us to Denver, or at least Colorado Springs if the road to Denver was closed when we got there. Joe's other half, Carol Stewart, cleaned out their truck, and they drove the two hours to Walsenberg, CO to pick us up at the Spanish Peaks Regional Health Center.

After they arrived, in better weather, Joe and Carol actually took the time to drive us to the impound

yard where the truck had been towed and helped us recover as much of our personal belongings as possible. As we headed north to continue on to Denver, Joe and Carol also stopped at the accident scene and helped us salvage even more personal belongings that were left on the road, including Phil's cell phone and other items. We then he slowed as we went on. We then stopped so Phil could get his prescription pain medication before finishing our trek.

It is not often that we find friends and acquaintances that are so willing to give huge amounts of their time and put themselves at risk for another. Joe

proceeded north to complete our interrupted trip. Just north of Colorado Springs, the weather got ugly and, in deference to Phil's and my shattered nerves and destroyed confidence in icy conditions, and Carol did that; Bran Stimpson and Laurie McFarland were willing to do that. Bran gave us a ride to the Airport on Monday morning, taking a couple of hours out of his busy schedule to help us get home. We don't find people like this very often in our lives. If you know of people like this, make sure they know how much you appreciate them and their efforts on your behalf and do everything you can to repay their selfless acts of kindness...either to them or to someone else in their name.

Knowing that words cannot ever express how much Phil and I appreciate the assistance we were given, but wanting to show my gratitude and give them recognition for their selfless acts, I issued the following awards as a result of the events of Friday, April 17, 2009:



You can just rip off the corner of the envelope, or postcard, or the section of the parcel, which holds the stamps. The ONLY requirement for me to sell them is that the stamps be undamaged. If you are careful when you tear or cut the stamp from the envelope, it will be acceptable to my buyer. If you have a question about a particular stamp, please just send it along and I'll do the triage here. For your information, my current buyer requires almost all stamps "off paper" -- that is, soaked. He then buys by the



Friday May 1st, a table supplied by the theater and two more supplied by the USS Appomattox were set up by John Sprouse

and Margaret Grunwell. The tables were covered with a 'space' pattern material with our Star Trek collectible ships on top and two murals. On Saturday, May 2nd, starting in the afternoon and with more props to share, Chuck Rayburn, John Sprouse, Alan Provo, Meg Roach and Margaret Grunwell manned the table to promote Star Trek and STARFLEET as folks came through for X-Men Origins: Wolverine. "I still live with your mom!"

An even bigger laugh. Everyone has a smile across their face. And then the movie begins, and the tomfoolery stops. Along the way, me and 500 people I never met laughed and cheered together.

Hey, you... with the bootleg copy of the movie that you watched on your computer? Yeah, you didn't get that. So sad.

I really liked this movie. Sure, I wanted to like it, but it doesn't always work out that way. But I think they've done a great job at balancing the old with the new.

Star Trek has to reinvent itself to be relevant in today's world. I know that, even as I cling to the past. I hope this does the trick. I know we'll all be watching the box office receipts this weekend...it'll be huge, we all know that. The real test is the second week, and the third, and so on. For this movie, a \$100 million opening weekend is pointless if it pulls in \$22 million on the second week.

I will say that if this doesn't reignite interest in *Star Trek*, I just don't know what will. This is a very well made movie, a great summer flick (I completely agree with them pushing the release date to the summer), and it's some darn good casting. This is the first movie in a long time that I want to go back to see at the theater again.

Much Better Than I Expected!

I have just returned from my first attendance of "Star Trek".

WOW!!! OMG!!!!

It was a helluva lot better than I expected! Of course, because of *Star Trek: Origins* (a fan series that I am HEAVILY involved with), I felt sad to see the death of George Kirk aboard the *Kelvin*, but the film does not suffer from his loss. Rather, it points the direction of this alternate reality.

One of my previous gripes was Abrams's apparent ignoring the age gap between Chekov and Kirk, but to my surprise, there was an elegant way around the problem: Chekov is the 23rd century's Wesley Crusher!

Leonard Nimoy, resuming the role of the future Spock, does not arrive until halfway through the movie on planet Delta Vega (gee, where have I heard that name before?) where he saves young Kirk from an ice creature that looked more like a *Star Wars* creature (no complaints here though--I've always thought *Trek* could use more exotic animal life.), and discovers Scotty manning a dead-end outpost with a small alien creature played by Deep Roy.

Bruce Greenwood delivers an excellent performance as Captain Christopher Pike in this movie, giving a *Star Trek* hero a far-far-FAR overdue chance to shine, which the late Jeffrey Hunter never got. However, I was lukewarm toward Sarek, who was adequate, but utterly lacking in Mark Lenard's charisma. Of course, Lenard would be an almost impossible act to follow, so I guess I should cut him some slack.

As in *Star Trek: Of Gods and Men*, [a fan-produced *Star Trek* movie available over the Internet and on DVD--editor], Vulcan is destroyed in this reality by our villain, Nero, a Romulan miner who is after genocidal vengeance for the destruction of Romulus and his family in the future. But his time travel was apparently an accident! Sadly, Spock's mother, wonderfully played by Winona Ryder, does not escape Vulcan as Spock rescues their leaders while the planet is literally crumbling around them. Vulcan was filmed on location at Vasquez Rocks, best known to Trekkers as the planet where Kirk faced the Gorn in TOS's "Arena" but which has also served in various other episodes, including Mintaka in TNG's "Who Watches the Watchers", planet M-622 in *Star Trek: Of Gods and Men*, and a planet in Dominion territory in the fan-made movie *USS Angeles: The Price of Duty* (the real origin of *Hidden Frontier*!).

Uhura's long-established-but-never-uttered first name (Nyota) is FINALLY given screen time in this movie (I bet Nichelle

Nichols loved that!), and Majel Barrett Roddenberry delivered her last-ever performance as the *Enterprise* computer in this movie, which I have to think that Gene would've been proud of. It starts TOS over, without destroying what has come before very nicely, in my humble opinion.

My only major continuity error notice was Uhura ordering a Cardassian drink in the bar scene, where Kirk gets into a fight with 4 cadets, unless contact was somehow established earlier in this timeline, due to Nero's interference. However, one nice thing to note was that the future dates established in this film actually remain constant with fan series like *Hidden Frontier*! How about that?!

The real surprise was that the original Spock did not make it back to his reality in this movie, but instead elected to remain and help Vulcan create a new home world.

I'd give this movie a 9.6 out of 10, and am planning to see it at least 3 more times in the theatre!

It Was Fun and It Was Trek

As a long-time fan, I expected to have issues with the alternate



universe, and I did. But I still expected the basic storyline to make sense on its own terms, and that's what really fell apart for me. There are so many contrivances, characters acting in ways they just wouldn't, and oddities of situation that I kept getting thrown out of the story.

What I liked was that the movie is very colorful, very epic. It's BIG. It has scale, and that's something that *Trek* hasn't been given nearly enough of in the past. The cast are great, and the cinematography is superb, as are the VFX. There are some great laugh-lines, and for *Trek* fans, the game of find-the-Easter-egg is a lot of fun.

But aside from the stupid "reboot"-aspects ("reboot" = "failure" in my storytelling lexicon, on a real basic level), what really bothered me was that, over and over again, I kept hitting points where I'd see something and go, "Huh? That makes no sense! Why wouldn't such-and-so be there? Or why is this being done this way when it's so illogical?" And so forth.

There were also some very bad production design choices. Having the "bowels of the ship" look early high industrial just broke the illusion. And not only did they not look consistent, design-wise, they looked like the buildings they were, not the interior spaces on a ship.

So, in the end, like all movies, this one had good points and bad points, but in this case, the bad points unexpectedly outweighed the good ones for me, by a lot. It's a very pretty, fast-paced film, but the story is a poor one and required far too many contrived elements for it to work for me. I can't turn off my brain enough to just accept it all blindly and on the face of it, and thus this *Star Trek* didn't work too well for me.

Star Trek Lives Again!

An *Enterprise* Crew for a 21st Century Audience

I'm just getting in from having seen *Star Trek*, and as a long-time fan of all things 'Trek,' I have to say I was mightily impressed. This is fast-paced adventure with one action sequence following another.

The movie was able to introduce fresh faces on familiar characters while remaining true to the original spirit of the 43-year-old legacy.

The new cast did well with their characters. Long-time fans are likely to side more with Karl Urban's portrayal of Doctor McCoy as being the most like the original character, initially played by DeForest Kelly.

The film's opening sequence sets the tone for changes to Kirk's basic character, and allows for greater flexibility in Chris Pine's performance than to simply try to be William Shatner doing Kirk. The film, which tells the basic story of how this crew comes together for the first time, takes a few liberties with several of the characters, adding new dynamics which are both interesting and appealing to a younger demographic. These changes have a great deal of potential for being further explored in film sequels, or a new televised series, should the show be brought back to the 'small' screen.

The film successfully works in several elements of humor, which help to offset the heavy tensions of the crew in a life-anddeath struggle. We see Leonard Nimoy reprise his role as an aged Spock. His part in this feature is the binding tie between the events of this film and everything Trek fans have known of this fictional universe for the past 43 years.

I went into the theater tonight with no pre-set expectations and have come away very satisfactorily entertained. JJ Abrams has successfully introduced to a new generation of fans an *Enterprise* crew for a 21st century audience. I look forward to seeing where they go from here.

Down Under Expectations

On Thursday, May 7, 2009, *USS Genesis* crew members, and members of the Adelaide-based United Federation of Planets, went to see the 11th *Star Trek* movie.

We had been waiting a long time for this movie, just as many others around the world. Finally, the anticipation would be over. Would J.J. Abrams be able to pull it off? This is the moment we had been waiting for. A number of reviews I read about this film said that the writers stayed true to what has already been established. After seeing the film, I don't think they did. This is my story, or, in other words, my review of the film.

I would like it noted from the start that, overall, I did enjoy the film. Actors Chris Pine, Zachary Quinto, Karl Urban, and the rest of the cast were well chosen for the roles. They played their parts to perfection. I would go so far as to say that, if one was to close their eyes, one could almost imagine younger versions of William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy, DeForest Kelley and the rest of the original cast reprising their roles.

I enjoyed the film. As a standalone film, it was entertaining, full of action with just the right amount of comedy and throwaway

lines. As part of the *Star Trek* franchise, though, there are a number of inaccuracies I picked up on which left me somewhat disappointed. Bear in mind, I've only had the one chance to see the film. There may be some discrepancies in my report. However, I'll try to be as accurate as one can be while working from memory.

I place the time frame somewhere between the years 2155 (the end of the 4th season of *Enterprise*) and 2265, the beginning of the original series. The film starts with the attack on the *USS Kelvin* and the crew evacuating the

ship. We see Kirk's mother being put aboard a shuttle while Kirk senior remains on the bridge of the *Kelvin* in the hope of destroying the invader. Just prior to the destruction of the *Kelvin*, James Kirk is born aboard a space shuttle in deep space. According to the "*Star Trek* Encyclopedia," Kirk was born in 2233 in Iowa on Earth, not in outer space on some fleeing shuttle. I guess having Kirk be born in outer space in the middle of a battle seemed a bit more dramatic than just being born on Earth.

Spock's younger years on Vulcan are reasonably accurate. Again, the Encyclopedia tells us that as a young boy, Spock was teased and tormented by other Vulcan boys, saying he wasn't really a Vulcan, and we see this in the movie.

As for Pavel Chekov, in the original series, we don't get to meet him until season 2. However, there is nothing to say he wasn't already serving aboard the *Enterprise* prior to that. In the movie, my feeling is it would have been better placing him in some other part of the ship. That way, by the time the second season of TOS rolls around, Chekov would've obviously worked his way through the ranks and been promoted to navigator at some stage. Likewise for Sulu. Prior to being the helm officer, Sulu was initially assigned as the ship's physicist. So why is Sulu at the helm of the ship in the movie? Why is he not doing what a physicist does or something else?

The film's interpretation of Scotty seems consistent to what has been established in the "*Star Trek* Encyclopedia".

And what is this obsession Kirk has with wanting to know Uhura's first name? It is clearly established in the appendix of the "*Star Trek* Chronology" that Uhura does not have a first name.

My biggest beef, though, is the *Enterprise*. It is too new, too big, bridge is all wrong, and too flashy. One has to remember that

in the original series, by the time Kirk takes command of the *Enterprise*, the ship is already 19 years old.

If one was to go by today's standards, working backwards from 2009, we have the space shuttle that holds seven people. Before that, there was the Apollo program and the Saturn V rockets that carried the 3-person command module, and before that there was the Mercury and Gemini programs that only carried 1 person into space. If you follow the TV series, then the movies, you notice that as time moves forward, so improvements are made; technology gets better--there is a natural order of progression.

So if you are going to work backwards in time, to a time before the original series, then, for want of a better term, everything should be "dumbed" down accordingly. The transporter technology is far superior to what we see in the original series...another piece of technology that should've been "dumbed" down.

And then there's that whole story about events that take place 129 years in the future causing the Romulan and Spock to somehow travel back in time and carry on their fight. For the events to take place in the present time, i.e. as Kirk, Spock and McCoy are training at the Academy, or after they have graduated, it means that the events in the older Spock's timeframe happen around or after 2378, immediately after the events in "Nemesis."

My last piece of comment refers to Leonard Nimoy's part in the film. While I have a great deal of respect for the man, I really think the film could have done without the older Spock and that whole time travel thing and the battle with the Romulan from the future. In my opinion, the film would've been better if it just concentrated on the early days of STARFLEET, Kirk, Spock, McCoy, and company and more about the human element.

In fact, I would go as far to say that *Star Trek* just doesn't cut it as a movie. *Star Trek* works best as a weekly TV series. For one, there is too long a gap between movies, and there is only so much time in a movie to get the story across and establish characters, even if it is characters we have come to know and love. In television, you have time to explore many different storylines. You think about it, all the best stories and episodes are those we have seen on television: "The Inner Light", "Darmok", "The Best Of Both Worlds", "The Trouble With Tribbles", "Devil In The Dark", "The City On The Edge Of Forever"...to name a few. No doubt you have your own favourite episodes. *Star Trek* really does work best on television, not on the big screen. By giving us a movie once every few years, Paramount is only paying us fans lip service. We need to get *Star Trek* back on the television.

This is my opinion; you may have an opinion of your own, and I respect that. If you have seen the movie, enjoyed it, and got something from it, then I am happy for you. As fans, though, we deserve better.

Since 1984, Riverside, Iowa has held Trek Fest to celebrate Kirk's future birthplace. With the events of this movie, that claim is nullified. They can't celebrate what didn't happen.

The music and sound effects at some points were so loud that they drowned out the dialog. I always thought the dialog was what told the story, not the music and sound effects. They

are supposed to be there to augment the scene, not cover anything up. One thing I did like about the sound effects, when the view changed to an exterior shot of a battle, the sound got very quiet. It was an attempt to remind us that there is not sound in space. That was well done.

Star Trek has 40+ years of history that was tossed away with this movie. From the opening scenes, canon is broken and never fixed. First, I'm not seeing a lot of the problems that you are seeing. The major changes that they introduce are, I believe, covered by the overall change that is the driving force in the film. I heard an interview with the writers last night, and they commented that too often Science Fiction deals with time travel in the 'OMG--We've broken X, Y, and Z, and now we need to fix it!' that has happened many, many times in *Trek*. In this case, they went with 'OMG--We've broken X, Y, and Z, and we just have to roll with it...'

Another thought I had was simply this: How many of these 'continuity issues' are actually conflicts with what was established as canon in TOS, TNG and the films, and how many are conflicts with other, traditionally non-canon sources (such as comics and novels)? Is some level of the frustration due because now story 'X' no longer makes sense? I mean, officially, they could have said Uhura's name was Melissa or Stephanie or Janelle-- it really isn't ever mentioned in any other 'canon' source prior to the new film.

Anyway, just some of my thoughts. I'm cool with the changes. I think they make sense and are logically consistent within the *Trek* universe. I think that it'll be fun to watch this story unfold as we move forward.

But then again, I thought that casting a woman as Starbuck was also a great concept... so your mileage may vary.

You Have To Decide for Yourself

About 7 years ago I came "out," in a manner of speaking, by deciding to attend a *Star Trek* convention, thus publicly admitting I was a TREKKIE (Trekkie, Trekker, I really don't



care--I've always been one, but few people had ever known). Yes, I had watched the series since the first program--(I admit that, too...I'm old) in all its incarnations (okay, it took a while for *Enterprise*...which eventually grew on me despite the theme music...sorry!), but I had never walked around advertising my love for the *Trek* world, although I really didn't hide it either. I thought attending that convention would be a one-time event, but I've been going to every con that I can reasonably justify ever since. The chance to let out my inner geek and share interests with like-minded individuals has been an indulgence, but one for which I don't apologize.

That brings me to this, an attempt to put into writing my views on the new movie. I feel a little presumptuous, given my relative novice status, even trying to comment--I have not memorized the titles of every episode or scene from every movie, just enjoyed the ride. Trekkies of the world have waited in anticipation, cautiously optimistic, and bemoaned its initial delay, until finally we sat holding our collective breaths throughout its first showing until the end credits, when we breathed that sigh of relief and grinned as the audience burst into applause (okay, I admit to a few tears too).

The first time was with my local STARFLEET chapter (USS Tiberius) at the local Beach Theatre. The second time around was pure pleasure (especially as that one was in IMAX), and it didn't change through the third showing either. Friends from around the world have forwarded reviews, comments, and shared their own impressions. Techs in my dentist's office poked their heads in last week to ask what I thought about it (answer: "mumble, mumble", head nod, thumbs up.). My friends have all universally loved it, from the Australians who got to see it in APRIL, to the ones I've dragged to the theatre with me, regardless of their level of Trek knowledge.

Wil Wheaton's blog described it better than I ever could, and another favorite of mine is the review from The Onion. I've loved the reactions of fellow fans...on the one hand they are delighted; on the other, they alternate between pointing out discrepancies, canon violations, and then immediately making excuses for them. ("Uhura-Spock"? "Well, he IS still finding himself at that stage ... " You get the idea.) And that pesky space-time continuum, alternate time line or whatever, can also be used to explain anything away. Best are the comments recognizing inside jokes -- the lines that are a must, plays on ideas, and mention of the fate of Admiral Archer's dog. Nurse Chapel was spoken to, but not seen by me, and I still haven't caught the glimpse of a tribble, supposedly in the bar scene. And I don't object to the nods to other Sci Fi classics (I loved Star Wars, and Nero's ship looks like it's straight out of Babylon 5); programs of ALL kinds have universally been riddled with

Trek references, so why not? The others still have some catching up to do, don't they?

So what it boils down to is, you have to decide for yourself. I loved the action, adventure, special effects, music themes interwoven throughout, especially the silences during the fight in the opening sequence. I loved the humor, and the plot wasn't as important as the character development, because after all, hasn't it always been the people who tell the story...or ARE the story? Hasn't it been their very human reactions and interaction that brought us back

time and again? Morality tale or action adventure, I've always felt that essential humanity is its greatest appeal.

Last summer, I wrote an essay that made me reflect on how each series also reflected the time in which it was written and the society of that time. This movie is the same, and rightly so. What struck me most was the level of respect with which the legacy was treated, by the actors as well as Abrams and his team. Will it create a new generation of *Trek* fans? A fifteen-year old fan weighed in by telling me it's better than *Wrath of Khan* and all his friends are interested in seeing it. In the meantime, I guess we will continue to remain cautiously optimistic that something we've found value in CAN find a new incarnation for a new generation that still reflects the best of the old. And in the meantime, we can continue to enjoy the journey, hoping it will go on for a long time to come.

Error Trek

Hoping against all hope, encouraged by stellar reviews and with great expectations, I (the original *Star Trek* fan) went to see the new movie, prepared to enjoy myself and the *Star Trek* reboot, which is hereafter referred to as STR. What I got instead was not a reboot but a boot in the butt and a kick in the teeth. On a scale of one to ten, it's about a four; eye candy but little else. When I vocalized my opinion, others wanted to know why. So here I go.

Why do I dislike a movie which, by all "logic" I should have liked? Let's start with the most basic and important point. While

the original series--I'll call it TOS--had its share of misfires, overall it was based on character-driven stories. STR's new characters were shadowy or transparent interpretations of the originals, used for jokes. Spock was way off the mark; giving Uhura hickeys on the transporter is a no-no. Vulcans do not touch, nor do they publicly show affection. This is especially true if he's going to hold up a very important mission. He spent years fighting his human half to become more Vulcan. Now we're led to believe that was all a mistake? Right... Sulu's fencing interest was played correctly, but as the consummate helmsman, he should know which buttons to push and how to get out of space dock. A cheap laugh. If he didn't know this, how did he get so far in Starfleet? Poor Chekov, who didn't make it to TOS until the second season, he can't even speak clearly enough for computer recognition. Great for another cheap laugh, but I wouldn't want him on my bridge...that could lead to a disaster during a critical moment. He seemed awfully confused, as well. The Academy must have lowered their standards a bit. Scotty was a joke, period. And what is it with the little guy with Scott? Is he a mascot? A pet? Just what or who is he? If Scotty were Irish (perish the thought), I suppose it could be a leprechaun. Anyway, Scott is not the engineer by which all others are judged; he didn't seem to know anything at all.

McCoy, on the surface, was okay. But I really think he has a drug problem or memory lapses. It's as if he's the film's obligatory stoner. There's no focus and no sense of dignity. Some of the best moments with McCoy came from his moral and humanistic stances. He was the compass by which Kirk could move in the right direction. Also, he was often Kirk's conscience, reminding the captain of the important issues, and not very quietly either. At the very least, Kirk sought him out to get a second opinion. The new guy doesn't seem to have a handle on himself. I wouldn't want him as my doctor. Again, joke, joke, joke. By the way, they got the origin of "bones" wrong, too. Didn't any of the writers watch TOS?

Superficially, they got Kirk right, as well. He's a womanizing, cocky, take-charge person and so on, but the finer points are missing. He had a softer side, which was seen when dealing with the loss of crewmembers and similar situations. Maybe they'll find that in the next movie. Uhura was the one bright spot--intelligent, professional, compassionate, and all in a very independent woman. Maybe somebody watched an episode of TOS after all. Just that kissing Spock thing...

As I said, the most important issue of TOS was always the story itself. Overall, they had very good writers. Gene Roddenberry used the Hollywood pool, but he also sought out some of the best sci-fi writers of the time. The list included Harlan Ellison, Richard Matheson, Robert Bloch, Theodore Sturgeon, and others. STR is basic action-fed eye candy, with little character development and a very superficial story. Action, action, action; damn the story and full speed ahead. (Apologies to Admiral Farragut.)

It's a shame, the heart-to-heart conversations and confrontations between the main characters, whether protagonist or antagonist,





gave TOS some of its finest moments. These moments included observations of the human condition and the future of mankind. *Star Trek* became a series of small morality plays, a look at many changes going on in the 60's and beyond. Roddenberry cleverly addressed these issues in imaginary places so NBC executives and network censors wouldn't recognize what was going on. It was well done and thought provoking. The resulting conversations from watching those shows were really interesting. The only comment I heard from people exiting the theater focused more on the special effects. TOS did far better stories with relatively bargain basement effects.

The story of STR, such as it is, serves only one purpose: to set up a flimsy scenario that erases the bulk of *Star Trek* history and mythos. While we're on the subject of the story, wasn't it just a bit familiar? Let's see: my wife is dead, I'm mad, and so I'm going to kill a lot of people or make them suffer, primarily...well, it was Kirk in *Wrath of Khan*, now it's Spock. So, there is a little difference. Also, instead of red matter (just what is that stuff and where did it come from, writers?) used to create singularities, we had the Genesis torpedo used to create habitable worlds. Ah, yes, originality...it never dies in Hollywood.

When I heard that Abrams was going to be directing STR, I decided to watch *Lost* to get a feel for his style. After a brief period, I realized that time travel wasn't just a device he used now and then, it's the entire show! TOS used it just three times in three years; Abrams uses it all the time. Time travel is a wonderful device, but you can go to the well too often, then it becomes a crutch and a cheap way out of situations, or into them, depending on your objective. I'll admit that *Generations* was a bit of a device, but how else were you going to get Kirk and Picard together? I've since been told I just happened to watch episodes of *Lost* where a great deal of time travel was going on, but the whole series isn't usually like that. Right. *Lost* is an aptly named show.

Then they eliminated Vulcan and Amanda Grayson, which was totally unnecessary and pointless. The dynamic of Spock and his mother was very touching; why kill Spock's window to humanity? Maybe they could use flashbacks to keep Amanda alive. No, that's already been used with *Superman*. So now Vulcan is gone and the Romulans are in deep trouble. Yes, they converted the supernova into a singularity, but how good is that? Singularities are not nice neighbors, and even if Romulus and Remus are spared the radiation and extreme gravity, they have no sun. All their plant and animal life will die out. Maybe they'll ask the Federation for help. No, wait, that was done in *The Undiscovered Country*. Well, you can't be original all the time.



One of the interesting parts of TOS was the technology. Paramount (excuse the use of this word) of this is the star of the show, the *U.S.S. Enterprise*. What? The *Enterprise*? Yes! Recall the intro to the shows: "These are the voyages of the starship *Enterprise*..." Not Captain Kirk, not humanity, not the Federation, but the starship. Granted, it's not much good without a crew, and that was tried, but it is the focal point. That's why Gene Roddenberry spent so much time on its look and function... so much so that the U.S. Navy looked at the bridge design for possible inclusion in their

fleet. So what did the STR designers do? They started from scratch. With a ship already designed, why bother? Spend your time and money where it's needed.

The exterior of the ship retains most of the basic curves from the original 1701, but there are changes--I'm not sure why--but I'll let that go. So let's look at the interior. Somebody actually designed that? I hope they didn't get paid. The bridge looked like a Las Vegas arcade, and engineering must have been filmed in a DuPont chemical plant [editorial note: the engineering set was actually filmed in the Budweiser Brewery], right down to the steel I-beams and concrete floors. Even our current navy looks better than that. The open deck motif may be visually stunning, but one small hole in the hull and the entire ship becomes an oversized vacuum bottle. Nice work, people.

The transporter got a new swirling effect so the crewmembers won't sparkle anymore, in more ways than one. The crew's quarters seem to have taken a step backward and look awfully cramped. I guess they had to make room for all that oversized plumbing in engineering. You know, that place where comedian Scott transported in. What is all that water piping for? It's not only out of place, it's downright stupid, placed strictly for a laugh. If you're going to redesign, give it some thought and intelligence. Intelligently-designed ships seemed to be lacking on Vulcan, too. Spock's ship was like something out of *Star Wars*. I fully expected Jar Jar Binx to step out of the cockpit.

Speaking of shaky technology, how does a team skydive through the atmosphere unprotected? (This was done previously in a deleted scene from *Generations*; I just love those original ideas, don't you?) Why does Sulu take a sword and not a phaser? A bit bulky, isn't it? The transporter trick was cute, but the *Enterprise* left hours ago. How can Kirk, Scott, and what'sits-name transport aboard? If the red stuff only takes a drop to make a star go black, why does Spock carry a big ball of that stuff? Oh yes, it's for the Romulans so they can destroy the

universe. And how does a Romulan rate a Roman emperor's name? Does that put him on a more equal basis with James Tiberius Kirk? Come on, writers; give us a break. See how easy it is to write a story? Lastly, and the most obvious error, you build the *Enterprise* on the ground, so how in the name of Newton do you get the thing into space? Let me guess: it has something to do with time travel.

Another complaint isn't limited to STR, but it bears discussion. The action was okay, but give me a nice establishing



shot and then do the action at a reasonable focal length. I can't appreciate all the moves if I can't see them. And please stay focused for more than a few seconds. I've heard that the typical shot of twenty years ago lasted an average of twenty-five seconds. Now it's about three. It's dizzying and it doesn't help that the camera doesn't even stand still during the close-ups. It's almost always weaving and bobbing. You need Dramamine to watch it. I know why it's done; it's for the younger audience. Can you say "A.D.D."? Movies are becoming glorified arcade games.

Back to the story, such as it is. Let's review now. There is no personnel office at Starfleet. People just show up and get a job, such as Spock hinting about needing a post. He asks if he could be first officer for Kirk. What about Kirk? Let's get this straight: he hasn't graduated from the Academy. Remember, they were discussing his dismissal when it hit the fan. He hasn't formally been assigned to the Enterprise, and now he's the captain? A more plausible scenario would have been a resolution to the cheating charge. (In Wrath of Khan, we were told that he got a commendation for original thinking.) Then he could get an assignment as a junior bridge officer on another ship and then the rank of captain after resolving another crisis in the next movie. In the meantime, Sulu can learn where the parking brake is, Chekov can learn how to talk, Scotty can drop the comedy routine and pick up a wrench, Spock can sort out his feelings, and McCoy can get his act together, please!

The whole movie has a feeling of a let down, a compromise, and even a cheat. I'm reminded of the *Dallas* sequence in the shower where it was revealed that all that had gone on before was only a dream.

So now the bottom line is in. STR made a lot of money in its first weekend. Abrams is in good with Paramount because all they care about is the bottom line. They never understood *Star Trek* and if the film made money, well, who cares if the new reboot is bad? They pulled the same boner with *Mission Impossible*, turning it into the "Tom Cruise Show". So I'll continue to watch the old shows and be happy with the thought that they were first and are infinitely better.

Gene Roddenberry once described his creation as "capturing lightning in a bottle." It was the perfect blend of cast, writing, design, make-up, costumes, technicians, and the other myriad of things that make a series great. As the saying goes, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." I think a better idea would have been to continue introducing new characters alongside the originals, such as Saavik and others. The adventures of Captain Sulu would have been nice, too...a passing of the baton. Then let the new characters grow into the existing universe. The idea



that *Star Trek* was broken and needed fixing is just wrong, and STR's sole purpose was to fix the perceived problem. Well, now *Star Trek* is 'fixed.' I had an old beagle hound that was fixed, and he was never the same either.

As I walked out of the theater, I noticed the STR poster. The *Enterprise* is a blur...how appropriate.

Last year, STARFLEET retained the services of a legal firm, Hurwit & Associates, to help us with a number of issues which Fleet Admiral Sal Lizard (the Commander, STARFLEET) and the Executive Committee at the time felt were important to address. Over the course of approximately six months, our law firm provided us with \$9,100 in legal services.

But what, precisely, did we spend our money on? What services did we receive, and why were those services necessary in the first place?

These questions and more were on the minds of many concerned individuals who felt that STARFLEET's paying membership deserved to know what their dues were buying. But for months, no details were forthcoming from Sal Lizard or the Executive Committee.

When I joined the EC, I felt strongly that this information needed to be shared with the general membership. What I discovered is that nothing was being purposefully hidden, but rather, what our \$9,100 had bought us--information, consultation, review, letters, feedback, advice, and more--was so extensive and far-reaching, so complex and intricate, that Sal Lizard had no idea where to even start explaining it all. And to be honest, no one else was stepping up to volunteer to figure out how to explain it all to the membership either.

I set up a series of recorded conference calls with Sal Lizard and Sal's Chief of Staff, Sam Black. Two calls and over five recorded hours later, I finally had the answers to what I believe are most of the questions the membership has wanted explained.

I present here the third and final part of the transcript of my conversation with Sal, his answers word-for-word. My hope is that members read this interview in the spirit it was conducted: with an open mind and a desire for transparency regarding the thought processes and actions of our elected Commander, STARFLEET.

- Commodore Jon Lane Chief of Communications, STARFLEET

When last we left off, we were about to move on to the next month's invoice (for services rendered in May, 2008). As a summary, for the month of March, we spent \$4,323 on legal fees. For the month of April, we spent \$2,089. Then for the month of May, we spent \$775. So the trend was downward as Sal realized how quickly legal costs can add up.

Also at this point in time, we were shifting lawyers from Tracey Bolotnik to Anne S. Rosenthal because Tracey left on maternity leave sometime in early May. As a side note, Tracey's delivery went well and she is now back at work and remains our primary contact at Hurwit & Associates.

Jon: Okay, so at this point, there's not a lot to report for this particular month. There's four items. The first two are on the same day, it looks like--it's hard to tell from this fax. It could be that one is on the 5th of May and one is on the 6th. The 5th of May, assuming that's the first day, was 1.35 hours, and it's a telephone conference with Sal Lizard "Re: Code of Conduct, review proposed revised Articles."

Sal: She was reviewing the revised Articles of Incorporation.

Jon: Okay, so she put together some Articles of Incorporation...

Sal: Well, actually, we did. Gary [Halverson...then VCS]'s team had a paralegal on it who took the information that Tracey Bolotnik had provided, because whenever possible, we didn't have the attorneys do the work; we did the work. And so, using the materials that she gave us, and the boiler plate from her own legal firm, the paralegal on Gary's team was able to redraft the Articles of Incorporation for restatement. And then we sent them over to Tracey to be reviewed. But they never got to her, so Anne reviewed

them for her because she was on maternity leave.

Jon: And also, you were talking about Code of Conduct here, so how much did we get from them on Code of Conduct?

Sal: This was an ongoing thing with the rights and the Code of Conduct. They actually reviewed, I believe, our poll [in the CQ]. Isn't that about that time?

Jon: Probably, yeah.

Sal: Because it had to do with Code of Conduct. And I was trying to make sure that it was an appropriate thing to do.

Jon: Taking the poll was an appropriate thing to do? Or the Code of Conduct?

Sal: The poll on the Code of Conduct...that I was asking appropriate questions, etcetera.

Jon: Ah, okay. So you were basically setting up to do the poll in the *Communiqué*, which, honestly, I think was still kind of a joke...at least personally.

Sal: Well, in the *Communiqué* it was because it was all done wrong. First off, it was way late coming out, so there was only, like, a few days [to respond]. But if the *Communiqué* had come out on time, there would have been about a month for people who got the *Communiqué* to send in their answers. Plus the insertion wasn't put in correctly. It was just put in the fold, whereas I actually wanted it inserted within the pages, so when you folded the CQ over, it would actually fold that page also, which would keep it in there better, more likely. And then, finally, we didn't know it, but somebody pointed out right after it went out that because it went out on plain, white paper, it could be Xeroxed and somebody could just load up the poll one way or the other. So that's why I didn't extend the date after all, which I had started to do.

Jon: What did we discover from that poll, by the way?

Sal: They're all online. We found out that the majority of the membership believes that the Code of Conduct is enforceable, that it shouldn't be replaced, it shouldn't be removed, and that the AB needs to enact policy where policy doesn't exist or clarify vague policies. And all of those results are still online. As a matter of fact, I just sent the results of that poll back to the AB because they asked for them. It was actually published in CQ, in number 146 or 147...it was the one that came out right before the IC.

Jon: So on the 6th, right before Tracey pops, "Respond to inquiry from Sal Lizard re: state law, membership and board meeting requirements for redraft of By-Laws."

Sal: Right. As we were redrafting the By-Laws, we had a few questions.

Jon: Okay, so basically, as you're redrafting the by-laws, she's reviewed the revised Articles on a previous date, she's reviewing them again, and now she's off to have a baby. And on the 21st, you got a free quarter of an hour from Anne to "Review file and e-mails to and from Tracey to and from Sal - courtesy unbilled, re: transfer of file." In other words, she's not charging you because...

Sal: Well, that's because I called her up and said, "Tracey was supposed to have finished up this memo and send it to me. Do you know if she ever did, 'cause I didn't get it?" So she went into her files and looked for it and resent it.

Jon: Gotcha. And then another quarter of an hour where it looks like Anne introduces herself to you: "Telephone call to Sal Lizard to discuss Cease and Desist letter re: website StafleetFail.com and revision to By-Laws and Articles of Incorporation, re: removal of members." So apparently you



talked for 15 minutes about Starfleet Fail as well as revision to By-Laws and probably just introducing yourself.

Sal: Actually, I called her up, and she was the one who took over for Tracey, so we spoke about this, and then I said, "Oh, by the way, I've written a C&D to a member of STARFLEET. If you would just like to look it over and let me know what you think, I would appreciate it because I want to cross my t's and dot my i's." So she looked at it, and she actually thought it should be a little bit harsher. And then she also pointed out to me the fact that if he didn't, what was I going to do? Actually, this was a little bit later on--I don't know if she even billed me for it-because basically he told me to get bent. And she said, "Well, really, what're you gonna do? If you sue him, are you going to be able to collect anything? Would it even be worth your while? And so I basically apologized to Dave [Lowe, the creator of the Starfleet Fail website] for the C&D and told him that it was a knee-jerk reaction--which it was--but it had to do with a lot of things. First off, I think the site is detrimental. You know my own particular story about not being able to audition for a film because of that site.

Jon: Okay, here we are now in July--on July 10 of 2008--and the monthly bill on that one is \$1,559...so we obviously went up a little bit in July. At this point, it looks like we have not dealt with Dave Lowe other than a very brief review of your Cease and Desist letter, which, based on the fact that you had a quarter of an hour for her to review that and talk about other stuff with you...so at most, you spent \$82 on Mr. Lowe. So now, on the 6th of June: "Telephone conference with Sal Lizard regarding the Scholarship Fund and possible 501 (c) 3 start-up, review website re: applications request for Scholarship funds donations and research legality of same." You spent about a half an hour on this.

Sal: One of the things that came to my attention around that time was that STARFLEET had been paying for scholarships out of the General Fund. What we did was, we would ask members to donate to a Scholarship Fund, and we kept it separate on the books (how much money was in there). But when people applied for a scholarship, let's say there was only--the scholarships are in the amount of \$500--let's say that there was only a thousand dollars in the Scholarship Fund. What we would do is if we had enough money in the General Fund and four people applied, we would give out four scholarships. So we would use the thousand dollars that was in the Scholarship Fund and four people applied, we would give out four scholarships. So we would use the thousand dollars that was in the Scholarship Fund and thousand dollars from the General Fund. And the other thing that was happening was that members were donating a dollar or more on their membership applications to certain things like, say, the Neelix Scholarship, and what happened was it was all going into the same fund. So there was a perception that we could be committing a fraud...

Jon: And where did that perception come from? Was that something that you just one day woke up and thought about, or did somebody mention it to you?

Sal: If no money was in the Neelix Fund but there was \$500 in the McCoy Fund but nobody applied for a McCoy Scholarship and somebody applied for the Neelix, they'd go ahead and award that. And my wife, who happened to overhear the conversation, pointed out how angry she would be if she donated money for a specific purpose, and then was to later find out it was being used for something else. Not only that, but since people were donating to a Scholarship Fund, and that was a separate thing, then the funds should come from the Scholarship Fund. And by using member monies--the Operational Funds--without member approval, we were actually, y'know, lying to the members...which is a fraud in legal terms, as you know. So I asked, and she said, first off, we shouldn't be co-mingling the funds. So what STARFLEET did was we backed out the scholarship fund and put it in a separate account. And now we're keeping track of the individual funds, and we're awarding based on what fund has the money. We're doing it using what I like to call "the right way." So we're no longer co-mingling the STARFLEET funds, and we're no longer using STARFLEET operational funds to supplant member scholarships without member knowledge.

Jon: Okay, well that looks like the next few calls with her are all about

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that, because on the 11th of June: "Legal research and consideration of scholarship funds and 501 (c) 7 exempt activities" is listed.

Sal: And the other thing was, we asked about the possibility of forming a separate foundation called the Scholarship Foundation, which could be a 501 (c) 3 so that it would be a tax-deductible donation. And she said we could do that, but it would cost money.

Jon: How much money?

Sal: Oh, it would cost the same as setting up a corporation--whatever that costs. I didn't ask her to go into specifics because, at the time, I was trying to cut back. Every time I talk to her. I try to limit my time and cut back. So that was something that I discussed with the Chief Financial Officers and we decided we'll take it in baby steps. The other thing was this: they did tell us that, if we created a 501 (c) 3, which we could do--a separate foundation--it has to be written very carefully because what we would need is, we would need to make it so the trustees, or whoever was in control of it, we would have to write it up in such a way that they were in role positions... like the Commander, STARFLEET, the CFO, the Head of the STARFLEET Academy, and a member-at-large, and a member of the AB, and that sort of thing. And the IRS would very closely monitor it because it was a 501 (c) 3...much more than they do a c (7). And so, therefore, if we did comingle funds or anything, we could be in a lot more trouble than we would have been if continued doing it as we are now. So that was another thing that gave me pause to think about this, but we thought it would be best to do it in baby steps. We had other issues that were a little more pressing. Just separating the Scholarship Fund from the operational funds was a big thing. And that was our big step. And so now we don't co-mingle, and we're doing things the right way. The only thing we didn't do was set it up as a separate tax-exempt foundation.

Sam: And no further scholarships will be paid for out of the general funds. They will not be covered out of the general funds. If the money's not there, we're not going to be making up the difference, as it were.

Jon: So even if somebody applies for Levar Burton and they have a wonderful application, we want to give it to them, if Levar Burton has \$412 in it, they're not getting a penny?

Sal: They're not gonna get the \$500. They can get the \$412.

Jon: Oh, in other words, we'll give them what's available.

[NOTE FROM JON: For anyone who is curious, this was the point where the first call ran out of recording time, which I believe had been reserved for four hours total. Since Sal, Sam, and I were all pretty exhausted by this point, we decided to reconvene the following evening to finish up the last few items on the final two invoices. What follows is from the second call.]

Jon: So we are now up to the 13th of June, where a very short conversation was an e-mail that was sent regarding a legal question: "Follow-up issues re: scholarship program and private inurnment"--so that's also all about the Scholarship Fund. So let's go to the next one...

Sal: Oh, uh, sorry to interrupt you. Because her invoices mention "private inurnment," we probably ought to discuss what that is.

Jon: Yeah, let's go through what "private inurnment" is.

Sal: What that is--something that's actually covered in our Constitution where it talks about the fact that no one member of our organization can profit at the expense of the rest of the members. And one of the things that happens is, in the case of our scholarships, because we're collecting money for scholarships separate of our operations, what happens is, if we use operational money to pay for scholarships, then members are getting personal inurnment, which is illegal. So that's one of the things that she pointed out, was when we were doing this in the past, it was actually an illegal act. And so we quit doing that.

Jon: Now, when you say it's "illegal", are we talking about criminally illegal or civilly illegal?

Sal: What she said was that, in accordance with our Constitution, we are not to give members money. They are not allowed to profit, and because of the fact they we're collecting money separately from the scholarship, a very clear argument could be made that we were personally inurning people from our operating funds...which isn't supposed to be the way it works. And yes, that could be determined to be fraudulent. Like everything else, it's up to a judge. But, she said that the argument could be made that we were defrauding the membership.

Jon: Gotcha. Okay.

Sam: Additionally--I'm looking at the e-mail--additionally, she also mentions that this could jeopardize our 501 (c) status with the IRS. To fund the scholarships, since they're being collected separately and kept separately, to fund them out of the general revenue, which may be a violation of the IRS rule that "No part of an organization's net earnings may inure to the benefit of any person having a personal or private interest in the activities of the organization."

Jon: So let's wander over into the next three items, which are all for the same day. Looks like a little bit of an expense here--which are all on June 26th--started with a telephone conference call with Sal Lizard "Re: incorporation of regions"...and then continued on the 26th with "Draft and revise memorandum or cost/benefit for incorporating regions" and an e-mail to Sal...and then finally, we had a third of an hour of the partner looking over this: "Consideration of creation of regional organizations, liability, exemption benefits, disadvantages." Basically, this sounded like an important enough bit of questioning that she brought in the partner for the first time in what looks like over a month and a half of legal consultation. So, you wanna discuss what the whole issue of incorporating the regions was?

Sal: Sure. Well, actually, what happens is the idea of STARFLEET being incorporated was to offer the organization certain protections under corporate law. Well, several of the regions have thought that it might be a good idea for them to incorporate separately, and that's been discussed on a number of occasions. It came up again in Region 3, and Michelle [Fanelli], who was the newly-minted RC at the time, replacing Brad Pense, asked me if I would ask our attorney about it.

Jon: Okay, so that was basically Sal responding to a request by an RC, not by the AB?

Sal: Not by the AB, by a particular RC, but she also pointed out that other regions had talked about it, and it would be good for the organization to nail that one down. So I saw it as something that would be good for all regions, which is why the resulting information was actually shared at the ECAB meeting in New York.

Jon: So, I guess the big question here is: what did we find out?

Sal: We found out that regions could incorporate if they wanted to, however,

AN APOLOGY TO ADMIRAL JOHNATHAN "GUMBY" SIMMONS

After the publication of CQ #152, Admiral Johnathan "Gumby" Simmons sent me an e-mail complaint about the issue. Gumby felt that, in Part 2 of the interview with Sal Lizard, during which Sal endeavors to explain our legal expenses from 2008, that he (Gumby) was unfairly and falsely accused of something that he did not do. Gumby demanded an official retraction and a public apology from me for damaging his reputation in STARFLEET.

I reread the CQ paragraphs in question carefully (as I had also written them carefully) and initially declined to print a retraction and apology as I felt there was nothing that misrepresented the truth in the article, that it was not libelous, and that Gumby had, in fact, done what the CQ had reported. I offered to let Gumby respond in the next CQ and to print whatever he submitted, but I didn't feel that either a retraction nor an apology was justified based on what was printed.

Gumby wrote me back, explaining further--asking more precisely for a correction rather than a retraction. (And for those of you wondering, he was actually quite polite and calm in re-explaining what he thought was the precise misinformation that was published in the CQ.) And in what I am sure will be a shock to everyone reading this, I actually agree with Gumby.

And so I do issue him a personal apology for what was presented in CQ #152.

And for those of you wondering just what the heck I am apologizing for, read on. Those not wanting the typically long Jon Lane explanation and just desiring to savor the apology, feel free to skip to the end.

Okay, here's what happened in a nutshell. First, the interview with Sal in the CQ has been presented in as much of its entirety as I could manage. I wanted Sal's own words to see print, not a summary or interpretation of them. So in Part 2 of the interview, Sal was discussing that STARFLEET is a corporation and, as such, occasionally circulates documents among the ECAB that are considered confidential. Some of these are not shared with the general membership, others are shared with the members but are not intended for the general public to see.

(This is fairly standard in most corporations, from big companies like Coca Cola and General Electric to smaller member-based organizations like the Rotary Club.) Sal even mentioned in his interview that when he was a member of Rotary, were a member to publicly distribute a confidential document of the organization, that person would no longer be a member.

I then asked in the interview what member(s) of STARFLEET had published confidential documents to the general public, and Sal replied that Gumby had done it on his Fleetwatch livejournal blog. In an attempt to verify Sal's claim (thinking I was being a good reporter--we'll come to that part in a second), I checked the Fleetwatch site and discovered that, indeed, those confidential documents were accessible through Fleetwatch. So I included that verification in CQ, mentioning that Gumby had, in the past, been the administrator of Fleetwatch, and the documents had been made available to anyone coming to the site since last October.

Here's where the correction and apology come in, folks...

The article makes it sound like Gumby actively placed confidential STARFLEET documents where they could be accessed not only by the general membership but also by the general public...essentially the big "no-no" that Sal had been talking about. For the casual member of STARFLEET, this would make Gumby look like a bad guy.

The correction that Gumby pointed out is that the documents were actually distributed and posted by other members of STARFLEET on different websites (not Fleetwatch). They were the ones who actually did the nasty deed. Gumby simply linked from Fleetwatch to those other sites after the fact. In other words, someone else threw the brick through the window first.

CQ represented Gumby as the original brick-thrower, and that was incorrect. Had I bothered to contact Gumby rather than simply checking the Fleetwatch site, Gumby could have shared this important fact with me. But I did not contact him; I only checked his website. So I hereby present the correction and an apology for making Gumby out to be the original perpetrator of the posting of confidential STARFLEET documents. He did not throw the brick through the window.

Now, this doesn't get Gumby completely off the hook, and I told him so during our e-mail exchange. In my opinion, this is one of those "two wrongs don't make a right" scenarios. He didn't post the confidential docs in the first place, but he did still facilitate others seeing those documents by supplying links to them. In other words, someone else threw the brick through the window, but that doesn't mean you can reach though the broken glass and grab a few items from the store window as you pass by. It's not as bad as what the first guy did, but it isn't anything to brag to the police about either.

However, there is a big difference between what Gumby actually did and what the CQ implies that he did, and it's my fault that the incorrect implication is in there. So for that, and for any damage this might have done to the reputation of this 18-year STARFLEET veteran who has served as an AB member, an EC member, and even briefly as acting Commander, STARFLEET...I do apologize.

As Gumby and I wrote in our respective e-mails to each other, we don't hate each other. Indeed, we both love this club with every fiber of our beings. When we agree, there's no stopping us. When we don't, well, look out...'cause neither of us is likely to back down when we feel it's for the good of STARFLEET. We're more alike than either of us would ever want to admit...and shock of shocks again: Gumby and I found ourselves in agreement on that point, too.

None of us is perfect--me, Gumby, Sal--but we all do try our best and, hopefully, when we aren't perfect, we can step up, admit it, and try to do better next time.

- Commodore Jon Lane Chief of Communications, STARFLEET it would also invoke some IRS issues. They would have to prove and get their status as a 501 (c) or whatever, and it would make them more liable for things that happened in their region than if they were part of the STARFLEET incorporation, which is a bigger umbrella and offers them a little bit more protection. It could be logistically a nightmare, actually, by incorporating, they would become a separate fan club...strangely enough.

Jon: Gotcha. Well, that's important pieces of information. When all is said and done, if anybody's curious, the total amount of time spent on this was about three hours at what looks like mostly the \$330 but a little at the \$400. So about a thousand dollars was spent on this regional incorporation question...in case we're keeping score. So that covers June, and now we move into July, and this is actually the last item that we've paid any money for legally, and there's one hour spent for two different items on the 7th of July. The first item is a tenth of an hour, and it's a telephone conference (I guess you had a very short call) with Sal Lizard "regarding Dave Lowe of Starfleet Fail re: defamation, trademark, and cease and desist reply"... which I believe that Sal had already written, a Cease and Desist, and was asking her to just read it over.

Sal: Right.

Jon: And give feedback. So Sal was basically trying to save STARFLEET money by writing the Cease and Desist order himself...because Sal likes to think he's a lawyer. And then on the 7th as well, of July, she spent .9 hours (nine-tenths of an hour) to "review Dave Lowe website and rumors, review STARFLEET website, further teleconference with Sal"-so she was actually able to look at the entire Starfleet Fail and the Starfleet website in less than an hour...not too bad. And then had a further teleconference with Sal and "draft and revise reply to Lowe's defamation and use of trademark name and logo and e-mail to Sal re: same." So, when she says that she revised the reply to Lowe's defamation, is she revising your Cease and Desist order?

Sal: What she actually did is she revised the Cease and Desist. She suggested that I include some harsher language, but I had already sent it out. So while I had asked her to take a look at it, she sent me back her responses. I didn't send him a revised version.

Jon: Okay. So basically, we're talking about .9 hours for her to do a whole bunch of stuff, including looking at the website. I'm guessing, if she revised the letter, we're looking at maybe five minutes of her time. So it's probably negligible. She spent five minutes on something we never used. So \$27.50 for something we didn't use.

Sal: Well, y'know, the thing of it is, because I had her on the phone, I just said, "Hey, by the way, I sent out a Cease and Desist, if you'd like to take a look at it and tell me if I did anything wrong, that'd be great." And she sent back that she had a couple of suggestions. But to me, she also told me that, if I pursued Dave Lowe on behalf of STARFLEET, the only thing that a judge would probably do is have him take down the site, and we probably wouldn't get much else out of it.

Jon: So basically, STARFLEET's remedy at this point would simply be him taking down the site. We would obviously spent lots and lots of money going in front of a judge, 'cause a lawyer would have to do it for us at \$330/hour. I guarantee you, knowing from my wife, that it's not going to be just one or two hours in prepping for a case like this. So realistically, STARFLEET could be looking at a thousand to maybe even as much as three or four thousand dollars just to get somebody to take down Starfleet Fail.

Sal: Exactly. And I saw it as a futile attrition of our resources. To me, I was trying to be money-conscious.

Jon: Something tells me most people would probably think you weren't.

Sal: I know, I know.

Jon: All right. So basically, total amount spent for Dave Lowe seems to be \$330. And the majority of it was actually discussing Dave Lowe *after* you sent a Cease and Desist order, just trying to figure out if there was anything that you had either done wrong or could have done better, and/or if it was even practical to take any more aggressive action, which apparently it wasn't. Okay, well that finishes up all of our legal invoices. So the next question on my list of questions is: are you planning on using our lawyer's services again in the near future, and if so, for what reason?

Sal: The only reason that I can think of right now, barring some sort of a lawsuit or something that would entangle STARFLEET, the only reason I could see using the attorneys would be to look over our revised governing documents after we've had an opportunity to make some changes, just

to tell us that we need to work further. And they may very well say, "All of these changes are great, and they're all a step in the right direction; you still need to work on it a little further." But in any case, I will not go back to the attorney until after the AB has okayed it.

Jon: So the last question (and then we get to wrap up the phone call) is: some members have voiced concern that the decision to consult our attorney, which can get expensive quite quickly, should not rest solely in the hands of the CS...is this policy being adjusted or not?

Sal: Actually, the policy is that it does not rest solely in the hands of the CS. The Constitution and Handbook task the Executive Committee with making business decisions, and this was seen as a business decision and was voted on by the EC. The EC is tasked with looking out for the good of STARFLEET, just as the AB is. We both share those fiduciary responsibilities under the law. But the EC also felt that it was a valid business decision to bring in an attorney and look at our governing documents and other things that could get STARFLEET in trouble. When we were discussing it, one of the things that was discussed was: would it be better to spend \$10,000 to protect ourselves, or just sit there with our flies open and take a chance on losing everything? And we saw the attorney as an investment. But the decision does not rest solely with the CS. It rests with the entire EC, and every one of them are charged with helping to protect the assets of STARFLEET...just as the AB is. Our Constitution, when it was drafted, though, granted the membership responsibilities--as far as rights, etc.--to the AB but the business decisions to the EC with the AB basically monitoring it.

Jon: Okay. Well, I'm good for that.

Sal: Now, can I say a couple of other things?

Jon: Yeah, anything you want...

Sal: All right, here's what I'd like to say in closing, and that is, first off, anybody who knows me knows that I care about this organization and would not do anything purposefully to harm it. Spending \$10,000 of our money...

Jon: According to my calculations, you've spent 9,094...just to be accurate.

Sal: Thank you. If spending \$9,094 somehow puts us into a place where this organization winds up complying with the law and protecting itself from problems with the IRS and problems with future lawsuits--and it makes the members happier overall in the long run because of changes to our governing documents--then I still see it as a good investment.

The other thing is, I will remind members--some of whom weren't around, but when Dan McGinnis actually left this organization, he left the organization with no money and members to whom we owed membership packets and CQs to for over a year, plus we had bills to pay. I was one of the first EC members that came on board, with the Mike Smith administration, and the EC members and certain other members of the organization put their own monies into this organization to bring it back and to pay those bills and to get those membership packets out. And we did so without asking for reimbursement. We know what it costs to run this organization and how squandering the money can hurt the organization, and how other people have to pick it up.

It's never been my intent to squander anything. I try to make sound business decisions, and I've actually put my money where my mouth is in this organization on several occasions before becoming CS. Other members have done it also. But there's a lot of members out there who are complaining and worried that the coffers are going to dry up. And the truth of the matter is, as long as STARFLEET members care, this organization will go on.

I really feel that way, and Sam has heard me say it a number of times. There's a lot of people out there that point fingers at me and talk about how I'm spending their \$15. They don't realize that there was a time when a lot of us--and you've been around, Jon, you know--a lot of us put our own money into this organization to get it back on its feet again after McGinnis. And so I don't take that lightly. I know that you have to spend money to make money. I really believe that we have to spend more money or recruiting and PR. But at the same time, I don't want to spend it foolishly, never have. And as you now have been able to ferret out, I think you can actually had some very, very good exchanges with the attorney that would be helpful to the organization.

attorney told us? There's obviously a lot of loose ends. There's a lot of things where we have memos from the attorney. How are we planning to actually put this now-nine thousand spent dollars to use in the next two years of your administration?

Sal: Well the answer is simple: I can't affect anything unless I have the cooperation of the EC and the AB. And what happens, as the leaders of this organization, we need to take a realistic look at what the attorney has provided us, and we need to act on it. What we need to do is guit being complacent as an organization and accepting that, because we've been here 35 years, that we can be here another 35...or even another 10 or even 5. A corporation, by law, is treated as a living entity--and that's where "corporate" comes from, it means "body"--as people, we have to adapt to an ever-changing environment. And our organization has to do the same. The Constitution that was written back in 1997 is not absolutely applicable for today. There are changes that need to be made; there's things that need to be tightened up. Society has changed; our own society within the organization has changed; our governing documents need to change with it. But it's up to the AB and the EC to actually do something with the information that we got from the attorney. And ultimately, it's up to the members to vote in those changes. So we as an organization can actually squander away the nine thousand dollars, or we can take the information that we got and act on it.

But that is up to more people than the CS.

EPILOGUE FROM JON: So what did Sal learn from all of this? What changed? Or did things just go on as they did before?

Fortunately, the answer is things DID change--and in my opinion, much for the better. After spending nearly \$9,100 on attorney's fees, STARFLEET went nearly a year without another legal invoice. When it did come time to consult with Hurwit a& Associates again, Sal and the EC first went to the Admiralty Board with a REQUEST to approve funds for additional legal services. In this case, the reason for consulting with the attorneys was to get a very specific set of instructions in writing from them on how to correct our documentation. Previously, to save money, Sal took written notes on the advice the attorneys gave him about fixing our governing documents rather than having the attorneys write something up for us. But the EC and AB felt that we needed something clearer, guidelines we could follow that came directly from the law firm. And indeed, this would hold Hurwit & Associates accountable just in case their advice proved incorrect or insufficient.

In short, we wanted it in writing, and the lawyers estimated three hours to write up an overview memo explaining what needed to be fixed and how it should be fixed. So the EC asked the AB to approve up to three hours (or \$1,050) for this service. With a vote of 9 aye, 4 nay, and 4 abstain, the motion passed and the law firm's services were engaged.

Now, as I write this, we face another legal decision, also involving the EC and AB together. The lawyers estimate an additional 6-10 hours to construct a complete set of By-Laws that would correct and replace our Constitution so that STARFLEET's rules would be in compliance with actual laws (as opposed to contradicting may of them). The lawyers would also update our Articles of Incorporation to comply with North Carolina law (where we are incorporated). Doing this would cost us \$2,000-\$3,000, but it would make our governing documents rock solid.


Or we could do it ourselves. We could try to create our own By-Laws (corporations do not have "constitutions"--so w'de need to start calling them "By-Laws" in order to be on solid legal footing). The problem is, we might not get everything right. We would, of course, want our lawyers to review our work, which would probably be about 2-3 hours. They would likely give us feedback and corrections. So we'd try again. Then there would be another review. In short, it could end up costing nearly as much to do it ourselves as it would to have the attorneys do it properly.

Discussions on this question have only just begun, so I don't know the outcome as I write this. But the important thing is that I said DISCUSSIONS. Sal Lizard did not simply decide to go off and spend thousands of more dollars without checking with the AB. More voices are being heard in this significant situation that literally affects all members of STARFLEET.

Considering that the whole reason I needed to do this interview with Sal in the first place was because the decisions to spend STARFLEET money on legal services were NOT being discussed beyond the EC--the fact that now those discussions are happening and being voted on, that's a MAJOR improvement.

Submit your questions to our email; however, if you prefer to contact us personally, then do so as well using the above e-mail addresses and we can speak to you directly by phone if necessary. Questions will be published, but names shall always remain confidential in order to protect and respect the individual asking the question.

Question: What is required for me to become a Chaplain for my local Chapter?

Answer: First of all, discuss your interest with your Chapter Commanding Officer in order to determine the need for this position. Some Chapters utilize the Ship's Counselor position for this purpose, and STARFLEET has a completely separate Resource Division for Counselors, but there is nothing wrong with having both if your CO approves it. Second, although a Chaplain is not required to hold any type of "real-world" ordination or credentials involving a denominational belief, you should have at least some type of background or training in the area of moral/spiritual values. Remember, you may be required to provide guidance to individuals from all types of faiths/beliefs, so you MUST be totally impartial and nonbiased to the members of your crew and absolutely never attempt to recruit for your own personal/particular beliefs. Finally, be involved with your Chapter's activities and events. We know you can't be everywhere at one time, but the more you are able to participate and interact with the members of your crew, the more they will feel at ease if the need arises for your assistance as Chaplain.

We look forward to serving STARFLEET in a fashion that puts us "full speed ahead and straight on 'til morning."

Cave Rescue - Part 2

EDITORIAL NOTE: In part 1 of this article, two cave explorers in Glenwood Caverns in Glenwood Springs, Colorado were 12 hours overdue and missing. A rescue group of 70 people-including five members from the USS Omega Glory--was assembled. An initial search team crawled through miles of underground passages, some of them incredibly narrow, until the two cavers were found. Mike, one of the two imperiled cavers, fell twenty feet in an area known as the Forbidden Zone and broke his leg and wrist. He was drifting in and out of consciousness. His caving partner Erik tried to get help and, not being familiar with the cave, got lost. He was not hurt, but he was reported to be hypothermic.

Two evacuation teams were assembled. Jennifer Scott and Max Khaytsus of the Omega Glory were part of the Evac 2 team. Carrying rescue and medical equipment through a half mile of treacherous passages, the two teams managed to get Erik to safety. But the injured Mike was proving to be more of a challenge. As Evac 1 tried to pass Mike on a stretcher up to Evac 2 in a higher cavern through a small passage, the teams guickly realized he would never fit...

Evac 1 took hold of Mike. The haul line was released. I stretched to ease the aches as Evac 1 unpacked Mike. He was bundled up pretty diligently. He was bound in an OSS, on a backboard and inside a sked. Great approach for a spinal

injury. I wasn't sure how much it did for a broken leg and wrist. Unpacking Mike took a while. The passage he was in really wasn't designed for the work people were doing in it now. They

pulled him out of the sked, unstrapped the backboard, and tied the webbing into the OSS directly. They were ready.

I assumed my position. The loose rock was a pain in the ass. My feet dug into the breakdown below me, sliding slivers of rock threatening to give way as I leveraged my weight against the webbing looped behind my back. Three other cavers helped haul. Each time they pulled, I felt rocks under my feet give. Mike didn't feel much lighter with the sked and backboard off.

I spotted Rick Speaect making his way down the slope. Did he come in by Y2Krawl? I got the impression that Y2Krawl was not a bidirectional passage. For that matter, neither was Easy Out. Someone announced that Easy Out was available again. I guess that was good news, not that I was looking forward to making that trip.

We finally managed to haul Mike up. While the rescuers around me released the webbing and pulled up the sked and the backboard, I held Mike up so he wouldn't slide off his rock. He was sweaty and smelly and I was pretty happy when he was taken off my

hands. I sat back as I watched him get packaged. I was thinking that, by now, I was sweaty and smelly, too.

Jennifer took Mike's blood pressure and pulse rate. His heart was racing. His breaths were shallow and fast. His blood pressure was pretty low. "Roll him! Roll him!" Several people tilted Mike on his side and I heard him vomit.

"Damn." I wasn't sure who said that.

"Next time lift the face shield," someone else said.

In cave rescue, we have special helmets that come with a riot helmet style face shield. They're designed to prevent the patient's nose from being scraped off along a low ceiling. Needless to say, they prevent patients from being able to vomit freely, too.

Jennifer checked Mike again. His condition was deteriorating. He had to be moved. She decided to go with the sked without the bulky backboard. That should be fine. He did not have a spinal injury. As Evac 2 started

repackaging Mike, Evac 1 started coming up the hole. They looked beat. We were, without a doubt, taking over from them.

Rick told us that the collapse at Easy Out had been taken care of. Evac 3 was staging in the passage on our side of Easy Out. They intended to do a lap carry to get Mike out. We needed to get him up there to make it happen. A few members of Evac 1 volunteered to come along. The remainder were going to rest, then pack up all the gear left behind, including personal caving packs, and take everything out after us. I figured that I'd stay and help. That lasted about five minutes. Evac 2 got Mike up the slope of the Register Room.


"Max! Get up here!"

That was Jennifer. As Mike's medic, her job was to be within arm's reach of him at all times. His vitals were constantly being checked, and she had the soul decision if we were to move him or not. She wanted me to stage people to help get Mike from the flat passage at the top of the Register Room out into the breakdown area on the other side where Rick was setting up a crew to receive the sked.

Easier said than done. The passage was already packed with cavers, and the sked stuck out of it like a humongous cigar. Jennifer was along one side of it. I contemplated how I would get around the obstruction, then found a hole and squirmed through to the other side. We did not have enough people to do the job. The continuous chain Rick was dreaming of was fundamentally broken. I told people to move towards me to backfill the gap. Rick got Evac 3 to fill the gap on the other side. We managed to slide Mike through to where the passage made

a sharp left turn. The only way to get through this was to run him to the right, putting his head and torso in a crevice, then turn and slide him though. The task was made even more complicated by Jennifer's need to be next to Mike. I think this section took me a painful two minutes to get through on the way in. Coming out with Mike was no picnic.

Rick and Evac 3 picked up Mike on the other side. They needed to turn him. Jennifer wanted to check his vitals. Evac 3 needed to restage for the lap carry. I was just happy

to lie on a cold rock and hope that no one else wanted to crawl through for the time being.

"Max! We need eight more people for the lap carry!"

That was Rick. I think he may have taken over Evac 3. Why me? I didn't really need to think much about that. I was probably more experienced than two-thirds of the people in my group and Rick knew my skills. We're both emergency responders. We practice this stuff together a lot. We cave together a lot, too. It made sense why he wanted me up there. I was a known factor. I just didn't want to go that way. I was hot, sweaty, incredibly thirsty, and my water bottle was in the Register Room, a narrow passage and a mob of people back.

I rolled over and sat up. Damn. "Count off seven and follow me," I said to the woman behind me. I squeezed down the passage and into that one room where you could stand up without fearing that you would fall off a rock. Mike was on the flat slab. Jennifer was checking him. Rick and a couple of other cavers stood next to them.

"Which way?" I asked.

Rick pointed down the hole to Easy Out. "We're short to do a lap carry."

I headed into the hole. I figured that members of Evac 3 would shift up, but not a single one of them moved. I had to go over them in a two foot diameter tube that weaved like an out of control hose. It's a good thing that cavers are friendly. You end up touching things underground that will get you arrested up on the surface. I must have climbed over twenty people. They managed to assemble a huge group. Each one took a segment of the passage and the idea was to simply pass Mike's sked up a person at a time. Three people would be in contact with the sked at any given time.

At the end of the human chain, I continued up the passage to allow the cavers behind me to fill the passage without having to crawl over more people than they needed to. Rick's estimate was perfect. Just enough people to fill the remaining length of the tube. I was next to the Easy Out communications station, and more cavers stood there, ready to receive Mike. I used the opportunity to lean on a rock and relax. The rock did not move and, for a change, that was good.

"Are they coming?" someone asked.

"Max, I need you back down here." That was Jennifer. I was feeling like a yo-yo. She better have my water bottle with her.

"Yeah?"

I climbed over a bunch of cavers to a narrowing in the passage. Erosion had cut the passage narrow at the bottom and left knobs in the walls. I remembered that nasty spot.

"We need muscle to get Mike through here."

Great. Where's Rick?

Jennifer crawled over me, putting her knee on my chest. I could have done without that. On the other side of the

passage was a big SAR guy.

"Ready?" he asked.

No. I got my legs down in the eroded channel, positioning my hips so that they were level with the knob in the wall. I knew I wasn't strong enough to hold Mike up in here. That was impossible. I just needed to get him over the obstructions.

"Okay," I said. "Slide him onto me."

The SAR guy put his shoulder into the base of the sked, and it slid up my legs and up to my hips. This was not a lap carry. This was body surfing. Smooth

plastic goes easily over clothes and cavers. It gets stuck on rough rock surfaces. The tip of the sked bumped the knob. I forced my knees up and tilted the sked over the protrusion. There was another push and the sked was on top of me, balanced on my chest. I felt air seep out and my chest deflate. Not good. I could hear cavers struggling to pull the sked off me. Someone was still trying to push it over me from below. I needed air. Gathering all my strength, I pulled my legs up and forced the bottom of the sked up with my

"I think so," someone else knees. Whatever had caught gave way and the sked slid further up, coming off me. I extended my arms and gave it one last heave. Inhaling dusty cave air felt great.

"You okay?" someone asked.

I tilted my head back and looked up the passage. The skid was slowly moving up. We were done. Mike was passed off to the next group, and I was just happy to lie where I was. It had been quite a day. I just wanted to find my water bottle.

I ended up staying in the cave longer, helping get packs and people out. We maintained our human chain at Easy Out to ferry all the gear left behind. Eventually, we could head up. Word coming back from the surface was that we had succeeded. Mike and Erik were out. We got them out alive. I located my bags, drank water, then picked up other bags that did not seem to have owners and headed towards the exit. The commercial trail in the cave was a pleasure after the day that I just had. Talon and Donita were still working entrance control. I was checked out of the cave. They did not say anything to me, but I figured, based on the looks they gave me, that I didn't look particularly good just then.

I followed a stream of cavers up the hill to the Glenwood Caverns Visitor Center. Up the stairs, across the patio, and towards the banquet room. Cavers were bundling up rope and repackaging the sked. I paused at the top of the stairs. Mike was standing there, smiling, munching on a large chocolate donut.

He toasted me with the donut. "That was fun."

I was too tired to even attempt a wisecrack. "Glad you're okay. Cut back on the donuts. You've had one too many."

Cave rescue is a hard job. No one wants to get hurt. Sadly, a bad chain of events may end in tragedy, and for this one reason we practice what to do if the call ever comes. Cave rescue is based on mountain rescue principles, but there are

significant distinctions due to the type of an environment rescues may need to take place The dynamics in. are different. The concerns are different. On the whole, cave rescue is the opposite side of the coin from the large-scale disaster scenarios that we face in CERT. In a large-scale disaster, you try to do the greatest good for the greatest number. Sometimes this means you will allow people to die because you can't afford to spend resources on them. In a cave rescue, you do everything you can

to save one person. You go through a lot of pain yourself to get the job done. Practice is important. Understanding the mechanics helps you save lives. We train for this on a regular basis.


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
