STARFLEET ANNUAL AWARDS



Among the proudest honors that STARFLEET can bestow upon its members, the Annual Awards are right up there at the top. Unlike most of our other awards that can be presented at multiple times during the year or which can be given to more than one member at a time, the Annual Awards are presented only at the International Conference (once a year) and to only one member or chapter per category (except in rare cases of a tie).

The process is simple. Each region holds its own annual awards in the first half of the year and compiles a list of winners in up to eight different categories: Commanding Officer, Enlisted Member, Flag Officer, Junior Member, Officer, Shakedown Chapter, Mothership, and Chapter of the Year. Not all regions issue awards in all eight categories, but every regional winner is sent up the flagpole to the Executive Committee for review and judging within those eight categories. The Executive Committee then votes on and selects one winner in each category from all the regional winners.

Occasionally, there is a tie, and re-votes are attempted, eliminating nominees who didn't earn enough votes to make it to the tie. And on rare occasions, those re-votes still result in a tie. In fact, that happened this year. To be honest, it's surprising that only a single tie happened, as the finalists this time in nearly every category were so impressive, and the EC struggled to find just one member or chapter in each category that shone above the others.

There's not enough room in this newsletter to print the several dozen nomination write-ups in their entirety. So instead, the full list of nominees is presented, along with the winner and the full, unedited text of their nomination. You'll notice that in some cases, the person who wrote the nomination is identified. Other times, they are not. This was simply how the text of the nominations was submitted, and if the nominator identified him or herself in the text, that name made it into \emph{CQ} .

And finally, you'll notice that not all regions are represented. Only regions that submitted finalists to the Promotion Director of STARFLEET had their members and chapters nominated. If you don't see your region in these lists, contact your Regional Coordinator and try to help encourage more nominees next year for annual awards in your region.

Ensign Derrek Kyzar (*USS Corsair*, Region 3) (NOTE: Derrek was promoted to Ensign 3/10/2010 but was Enlisted in 2009)

Shortly after becoming an official member, he and his girlfriend attended their first gaming convention, CoastCon. While there he participated in several free trial games and was exposed to a whole new set of games that

he enthusiastically reviewed for the crew.

A month later was the Ponchatoula Strawberry Festival. Since Derrek lived near the festival he offered his home as an after festival recovery. Little did the crew know what was in store for them. Derrek Kyzar introduced the group to Rock Band. Hooked up to a large projection screen and to a large surround sound, the members of the *Corsair* became Rock Stars! Even members who had little musical ability were encouraged to play and enjoyed it immensely (three couples went out and bought Rock Band for themselves after this event!)

Derrek was front and center when the time came for the 2009 *Star Trek* movie. In uniform, greeting other fans, he represented the club and STARFLEET in the best possible manner. At this point he had only been a member for three months and he was a shining example of the ideals of *Star Trek*.

A week after the four day *Star Trek* Movie promotion the need to rock was back for the next "Geek Retreat" with another Rock Band event that was held at Derrek's home which was joked as "Kyzar Stadium". Derrek also represented the *USS Corsair* at Dallas Comic Con where he got a chance to meet other members of Region Three, such as, LGN Aaron Murphy. If he didn't know before, he knew now that STARFLEET is a huge family wherever you go, ready to support you.

With September, it was time for another Rock Band session -- only this time the company that produces Rock Band had a new product -- The Beatles: Rock Band. Now the rock n roll stars of the *Corsair* could still play guitar, bass, and drums but could also do three part harmonies! People who never really listened to The Beatles became fans. Of course this rocking event was at "Kyzar Stadium" again.

To assist the chapter in Relay for Life, Derrek placed up signs and donations flyers at his store to help "Team *Corsair*". The team was the 80's so members dressed the part and Derrek brought Rock Band. A tent was erected and a generator was started up. After about an hour things were not going as planned with the set up. After some motivation from the CO, Derrek located the problems and overcame them to provide Walkers with a chance to rock out to the 80's and raise more money for the American Cancer Society. The Tent was "rockin' out the tunes" so much that the DJ for the event made sure to cross promote our fundraiser because it was "just that awesome". The Rock Band tent was such a success, that the local ACS chapter asked if the *Corsair* could do that again next year.

Derrek attended the Pirate Day Wine Tasting at the Louisiana Renaissance Festival. Because he was now newly engaged, he was in the spot light every time the "serving wench" came around by trying to (playfully in character) steal him away from his bride to be.

On New Year's Eve, Derrek was promoted to Warrant Officer and helped rock in the New Year with the rest of the crew.

It is not always an easy thing to guide and assist another reach for their goals and dreams and then rejoice as they achieve it. The *USS*



Thermopylae has had the honor and privilege of being asked by five newly forming chapters to be their guide and mentor as they worked their way through the process of moving beyond being a small group of fans to become a strong and dedicated Ship of the Line.

The best example I can give of the *Thermopylae*'s excellence as a Mother

Given to a chapter who through the course of the year displayed the qualities of hard work, charity, unity, and cooperation exemplifying the ideas of Gene Roddenberry and his dream. I nominate the *USS O'Bannon* NCC 5372.

Below a list of activities in 2009 that document the ways and hows the crew of the USS O'Bannon takes

the Roddenberry dream of making the world a better place for all a reality. If a club does not have fun it will not survive. We work hard,

play hard, give to our community and to our fellow crewmembers (our extended family) and if not for the unity and cooperation of all, the *USS O'Bannon* could not accomplish what she has done in the past, in 2009, and will continue into the future.

First let's talk about hard work with a load of cooperation thrown in. In January and February, we hand wrote on card stock, pasted a Valentine onto the card stock, decorated them with stickers, sorted them so each hospital and outpatient clinic did not receive all the same type of cards, boxed and mailed to nine centers throughout Maine and New Hampshire. We shipped a little over 1400 cards. Some wrote, some pasted, some stickered, some counted and sorted but without the hard work and cooperation of each member young and old, we never would have been able to completed the number of cards needed and shipped in time to be delivered by Valentine's Day.

Throughout the Spring and Summer, the *O'Bannon* has yard sales to help raise monies for our charities. Yard sales take a lot of unloading, set-up, pack-up and re-loading. We did these six times last year.



Without the backs of our members and the coordination of just having the yard sales at Kandy and Shawn's home and/or where and when to deliver the yard sale items like to Kim or Brian's homes, we would not have raised over 400.00 to help our neighbors.

Second let's talk about charity. The O'Bannon has three types of charities: charity of time, charity based on our funds, and charity based on donation both within and without the club. We sponsored two blood drives at the Red Cross Blood Donor Center in Portland, Maine. We wear our uniforms and/or trek related t-shirts. We bring snacks for the donor table. We handle registration, baby sitting if needed, and the donor table. We are there from about 8 am until 2 pm. We walked in two A-Thons in Sanford, Maine. We raised the following: March of Dimes (6 miles) \$400.00 and Alzheimer (3 miles) \$191.00. We collected (crew only) and manned the telephone for one hour at the Waban Telethon in Sanford, Maine. The collection of loose change came to 149.14, which are matched by an anonymous employee at General Electric in Somersworth, NH. A few members cook and donated the food and their time to Rolling Thunder. This organization is a Veteran's Motor Cycle Club that raises monies for various charities like Toys for Tots and the York County Food Pantry. Members collect and purchase books for children and young readers. Out of our own pockets and from free donations, the O'Bannon was able to deliver 438 books to the Maine Literacy Program in Waterboro, Maine. These books are distributed throughout York County. The Maine Literacy Program is the heart and start of Mrs. Barbara Bush. The books are given to anyone free of charge. It is the hope of Mrs. Bush and us that as adults and children learn the wonders of the printer word many doors and opportunities will be open to the Maine poor and less educated.

At the end of the yard sale season, all the clothes were separated into several piles. Some were donated to Good Will and the Salvation Army. Others were donated to two very well deserving agencies. Three large trash bags were donated to each: Dress for Success in Portland, Maine and Care and Share of New Hampshire. Dress for Success provides free of charge two outfits per female only customers. Care and Share of NH provided free of charge two outfits per male and female customers. Both agencies work to give less fortunate people a chance for a good job interview by providing clothing and assistance with preparation for interviews.

The *O'Bannon* set up a Klynk account with Hannaford Store in Maine. All bottle/can returnables from the group are tallied and the monies are placed in the account. This money is used for Toys-for-Tots. With a donation from a member's friend and the returnables, \$106.00 was raised for toys. Kim Capelle did her wonders with the cash and loads and loads of toys were delivered. I believe she was able to purchase over 120 toys. Each year the *O'Bannon* cleans out their closets and collects coats from family and co-workers to be dropped off at the annual WCSH-Coat-for-Kids campaign. The coats are collected at various grocery and business throughout Maine. Pratt-Abbott cleaners of Portland, Maine takes the coats and cleans and repairs them and then sends them to the Salvation Army. The coats are given out to anyone needed one. This year we collected 64 coats and even a few snow suits, hats and mittens.

Caring Unlimited is an organization that creates safe houses for adults and children in southern Maine and southern New Hampshire. We donate toiletries, games, toys, and cleaning supplies. All items are donated by the members of the *USS O'Bannon*.

Now where does all the monies collected from our yard sales go? Well I will tell you. (1) Safe Haven Humane Society for Cats received \$50.00. (2) York County Food Pantry for Thanksgiving Baskets received \$100.00. (3) Kennebunk Animal Shelter in conjunction with Caring Unlimited (see above) received \$50.00 worth of pet food as well as other donations of litter, toys, collars, cleaning supplies by the crew. (4) York Country Food Pantry and Homeless Shelters received \$150.00 in cash several bags and boxes of additional non-perishable food for the holidays. At the same time, several boxes of shampoo, conditioners, shaving cream and razors and various other personal hygiene items and bags of towels and sheets were donated to the Homeless Shelter. The toiletries, towels, and sheets were donations from the crew.

Third, let's talk about unity -- pulling together to help its member. We do that by being there and having fun. Sometimes the get togethers are just what a member needs to break away from the not so nice stuff going on in their lives. We are a family!! Disco Bowling. Talk about letting your hair down and just having an old fashioned good time. We bowl to 70's music with disco lights and the whole deal. Bad Movie Time: We take a very bad movie and sit and chop it about. BBQ and Pool Party. Great time during the summer. Everyone brings something to share and whatever you want to cook. Mark and Shawn are the chefs. We eat, hang-out, and some even venture into the frigid cold waters of the pool. Mini-Golfing. Well we try to golf. Some of us are better at it then other. Does not matter, we laugh and cheer on our team mates and even others on our rival teams. Girls Night Out. Just the girls of the O'Bannon have a time out. We enjoy some good food, and most of all some great company. I will say a bit of male bashing does happen. We all talk about what is going on in our lives and help and support each other. Movies. Boy do we go to a load of movies. Nice night out with friends. I think we went to about 15 movies in 2009. We hang out before and after and just unwind.

O'Bannon Moving Crew. If not for the help of our friends in the O'Bannon, moving would be a long drawn out process. If not for the help, Shawn and I would never have gotten it done in the time needed to move into our new home on New Hampshire. The O'B M.C. helped others move as well. Thank you in advance for considering the USS O'Bannon for Ship of the Year.

Report from the Commander, STARFLEET

One of my greatest pleasures since becoming a member of STARFLEET has been attending STARFLEET's annual International Conference. 
On Saturday morning, during the General Session, Dave Blaser was at the podium and told those assembled

excellence of the entries submitted. Newsletters from all over the fleet were sent into my office for the contest and then submitted to a blue ribbon panel of judges...who did their job with my thanks and are now in the STARFLEET Judges Protection Program.

For the Best Layout award, the judges commented to me that the biggest thing they looked for was layouts that were effective but not overcrowding. Another judge commented that it needed to be very pleasing and attractive to the eye as an improper layout lowers the chances for a newsletter to be read. The winner of this award was the unanimous choice of the judging panel: "The Caldera Chronicle", published by the USS Krakatoa of Region 12, for their Klingon issue...which was a true delight to look at.

Most Informative was a very hard decision for our judges as this award centers on the actual content of the newsletter. One of the things that our panel this year was very picky about was whether the content was genuine information of interest to the reader or simply filler to finish out an incomplete newsletter. Our judges finally came to their decision and awarded this one to "Avenger

7, whose newsletter had so much information that, according to one judge, "...they could not have shoehorned a single bit more into it."

While the categories of Layout and Informative are narrow-judging fields, when you try to select the best newsletter in the fleet, you have to consider everything. The three winners that our judges selected are examples of well-rounded

newsletters with great layout and a lot of information for their readers.

> Third place was the only repeat winner from the previous year. Last year, "Right Full Rudder" was the winner of the Most Informative award. This year, the USS O'Bannon of Region 15 walked away with the third place award.

> Second place in this year's contest was captured by the USS Bonaventure of Region 1 for their newsletter "All Ahead, Warp Factor One". This newsletter was a true pleasure for our judges to examine, and if it had not been for the ultimate winner of this year's award, might very well have been the overall winner. "AAWFO" featured a very colorful layout that captured and kept the attention of the eyes, a lot of information that was well balanced between news of the chapter and information that members would enjoy reading.

> The First Prize winner for this year was the unanimous choice of the judges, just as it was for Best Layout. "The Caldera Chronicle",

published by the USS Krakatoa of Region 12, walked away with the grand prize for their submission of their Klingon issue. It was a wonderful newsletter that was a perfect example, in the eyes of the judges, of the best balance of color, content, display, and overall presentation. My congratulations to them and to all of this year's winners.





Communications Report for 2009-2010

This Has Been a Really Great Year for STARFLEET!

I think back over all of my many years in this organization, and there have been few times that I can remember a more organized and progressive period for Fleet Headquarters. Some of the more cynical members out there might say, "What organization? What progress?" It seems so easy to toss out criticism. But for those who have been around a while, try to remember an administration when membership packets were processed so consistently quickly. CQs came out on time, member Helpdesk requests got such immediate attention, and problems with the member database were dealt with as rapidly. Try to remember the rare times that an administration stayed within budget year after year and actually came out with a bit of a surplus while still investing in the club growth and infrastructure.

Think about all the positive changes, improvements, and upgrades STARFLEET has seen: redesigned website, improved *CQ* graphics and printing/paper quality, the STAR Program, new items from the Quartermaster, new courses from the Academy, the new annual Short Story Contest with celebrity authors doing the judging, new resources for recruiting, new perks for members, and an improved media presence for STARFLEET itself. And of course, there's the incredible amount of work that was done over six months on the revisions to the organization's Bylaws and Membership Handbook (the former to be voted on by the full membership, and the latter by the AB if the former passes).

Membership surged with the release of last summer's *Star Trek* movie blockbuster, rising nearly 20% from anemic numbers in the 3,400-member range to a pretty steady 4,000 members (where we've been for the past couple of months). Sure, we crested just above 4,200 in the early spring and fell back to the 4,000-member range, but when the expected drop-off of "surge" members came in May and June, numbers actually stayed pretty strong over those couple of months. In other words, we slipped back a little, but to nowhere near the 3,400 count we started at before the movie came out. Of course, there's still more growth potential out there for STARFLEET, but these numbers are certainly solid ones.

However, my particular focus is the Communications department, and here is where some of the most exciting things have happened.

The STARFLEET Communiqué

We have now had two consecutive years of on-time CQs! Counting our last one, there have been 12

back-to-back issues published no more than two months apart. Each issue has been a whopping 48 pages, with nearly perfect attendance for such features as EC reports from all eight departments, the ECAB report, Attention on Deck for the SFMC, Flag Officer Promotions and Awards, and even regular features like "Deep Trek", "Ask Prigal", and the "Chaplain's Chat". We've even now published all six winning short stories from our first annual Short Story Writing Contest from last year, with the next round of winners waiting their turn.

I'd like to thank an amazing editorial crew, starting with our MVP (Most Valuable Prasith): Captain Prasith Kim-Aun, the CQ Editor-in-Chief. Without him to lay out the majority of pages for each issue, I would—quite quickly—go insane. Prasith is as much responsible for the consistent quality and look of CQ as I am, and he deserves a round of applause. Also a big help are my proof-readers: BGN Gary Hollifield, Jr. and ADM Alex Rosenzweig. I'd like to additionally thank CAPT George Flannik of the USS Genymede for getting me on-time installments of "Deep Trek" and MGN Sean "Cerberus" Niemeyer of the USS Asimov for getting me on-time installments of "Attention on Deck". Neither one has ever required even a single nag or reminder! And finally, a nod of the virtual hat to the ever-mysterious but always conscientious Webmaster X for getting the online CQ posted to the member database usually within hours of me sending it. Webmaster X has also kept most other areas of SFI.org updated with lightning speed and thoroughness.

The *CQ* Lottery continues to be extremely popular. There are now 84 chapters entered, of which 72 of them have won once (no one wins a second time until each entrant has had a chance to win). We average about 7 winners per issue, each receiving 100 free copies of *CQ* mailed to them for U.S. members or 50 for international members. Sending international chapters only 50 issues was a compromise solution to the challenge of allowing non-U.S. chapters to participate in the lottery without blowing the budget. Using US Postal flat rate international packaging, non-U.S. chapters can be sent a box of 50 *CQ*s for a cost only about three times more than domestic shipping. Shipping 100 copies overseas could run as much as ten times more than domestic.

A New and Better Printer for the Communiqué

The printing quality for CQ #158 (two issues ago) was less than stellar. By some estimates, as many as 50% of our issues had severely mis-registered plates on the color pages and certain middle pages cut off at the top (right through the page headlines!) during the folding/cutting process.

Although some printing problems are inevitable each issue, these most recent mistakes were significant and do not appear to have been caught by any kind of quality control person at Edmond Sun printing. And there have been some other problems over the past two years, including areas of black text left blank because plates were not hitting pages correctly and color pages where flat colors like blue or red faded to a strange purple because, again, plates were not hitting pages correctly.

Starting on July 1, Edmond Sun—who has been supplying STARFLEET with a printed CQ for over 15 years, with very fair and modest price increases during that time—was going to increase our printing fee by an eye-popping \$300/issue (or about 30%). I was able to negotiate that down to only a \$200 increase, but it still seemed significant. But let's face it: with a major price increase looming, this was not the time to screw up printing on the last issue printed at our old price. But screw it up they did.

After discussions with PJ Trotter and her motherin-law, Gloria Trotter, of Countywide News (the folks who handle our labeling and mailing from Oklahoma), they suggested getting a competitive bid from another local printer, the Shawnee News-Star, with whom Countywide does a good deal of business.

I had previously contacted Shawnee News-Star for a bid a couple of years ago, and at the time, they were significantly higher than Edmond Sun. But with the recent price increase, Shawnee's most recent bid was only about \$50-\$80/issue more for essentially the same product—same page count, same size, number of copies, paper quality, etc. In fact, Shawnee can actually offer four additional color pages per issue—raising the total from 12 to 16 color pages per issue.

So we've changed printers. Last issue (#159) was the first issue printed by Shawnee News-Star, and it came out quite well. Yes, it's a big move after so much time with Edmond Sun. And there's no guarantee that we won't still have some printing problems in the future with these new printers. But Countywide's relationship with the Shawnee News-Star (they have no relationship with Edmond Sun) will hopefully put a little more pressure on them both to deliver a decent product. So far, so good...

STARFLEET Makes \$1,000 Selling Ads

For the first time in our organization's history, STARFLEET has netted nearly \$1,000 for the fiscal year by selling advertising in both the *CQ* and also as banner ads on our SFI.org website. We made \$300

from Roddenberry Productions for a series of six ads on the back of *CQ* #152-157. (Roddenberry has also committed to another six ads for the next year at a higher price that will come to \$450 for the year.) Another \$300 was made from Atari's launch of *Star Trek Online*. We also had advertising from Motel 6, Red Roof Inns, the Philadelphia Marriott, a mail order company featuring high-end *Star Trek* products, and a couple of different museum locations featuring the touring *Star Trek Exhibit*.

While we can't guarantee that every year will be as successful as this past one, the sudden influx of advertising has resulted in the EC setting consistent advertising rates that we feel are fair and competitive for the 4,000 Star Trek fan impressions we supply through $\it CQ$ and the 10,000-plus Web visits per week to SFI.org.

Star Trek Online

Certainly one of the most exciting things to happen to STARFLEET this past year was our involvement in the release of the new Star Trek multiplayer online game from Cryptic Studios and Atari. We were initially contacted in September by Atari and their PR company, DKC in New York City, to do some advertising in our newsletter and/or on our website. But Atari and DKC were so impressed by the entire STARFLEET fan organization that things quickly went beyond simple advertising. STARFLEET's own PR Director Brandt Heatherington, CompOps Chief John Halliday, Vice-Chief of Comms Dennis Rayburn, and I participated in multiple conference calls with people from the Star Trek Online marketing team to discuss plans and possible strategies for reaching fans and leveraging a relationship with Star Trek's oldest and largest fan organization.

By the time we were done, not only did we have commitments for \$300 in print and online advertising from Atari, but STARFLEET was also given some special perks not offered to any other fan club: access to a "sneak peak" interview with the Executive Producer of the game two months before its release, an invitation to a *Star Trek Online* "summit" that included a tour of the offices of Cryptic Studios and a hands-on opportunity to play the latest version of the game before its release (Ops Chief Jerry Tien and I attended that gathering), and finally, STARFLEET members received secret codes to unlock a special TOS tunic for their Avatar if they bought the game and created a character...a great membership perk not offered to any other fan club.

But things didn't stop there. After a successful launch, DKC came back to STARFLEET a couple of months later to ask if we would be interested in

having a seat on a *Star Trek Online* Advisory Council, intended to make the game better and more appealing to fans, as well as to help think up new ideas to get word out to more potential players. And finally, DKC and Atari donated a few hundred limited-edition *Star Trek Online* promotional plastic cups from Del Taco for us to sell through our Quartermaster and donate the proceeds to our Scholarship Fund. If we sell all the cups, STARFLEET could make enough to pay for one complete scholarship!

STARFLEET's Continuing Relationship with Roddenberry

As was mentioned previously, STARFLEET sold six \it{CQ} ads to Roddenberry Productions over the last twelve months to generate \$300 in ad revenue. And this next year, a new commitment to six ads from Roddenberry at a higher rate will result in \$450 in revenue. But that's not all.

STARFLEET's relationship with Roddenberry continues to be strong in other areas, as well. Last year, Roddenberry gave us 240 of its new 3D lenticular prints of the *USS Enterprise* to sell to our members. And for each print sold, STARFLEET was to keep \$2 as a donation to our scholarship fund. During this past year, we sold 107 of those prints so far, meaning that the scholarship fund has seen a donation of \$214 from Roddenberry Productions.

Most recently, Roddenberry has created a special contest open exclusively to STARFLEET members. To help celebrate the launch of Roddenberry Search, STARFLEET members will each receive a special "swag code" from the Member Database to use when they sign up for an account at RoddenberrySearch. com. Members will be given an initial 60 tokens and can earn more just by searching the Web like they always do, only using the Roddenberry Search toolbar. And members can earn tokens in other ways, too. At midnight PST on December 1, the STARFLEET member who has earned the most tokens will win their choice of one of three prop replicas valued at between \$60 and \$120 each. This contest is exclusive to STARFLEET members—no one else may enter because only STARFLEET members will have the special swag codes and each member's code will be different.

Public Relations and Advertising

The Communications department originally budgeted for up to three Press Releases for the previous fiscal year (each at \$360). However, our first Press Release, promoting our new strategic partnership with Atari and Cryptic Studios involving Star Trek Online, did not receive approval for publication by CBS Licensing. The reason given was that STARFLEET operates without a license to use Star Trek while Atari is a paid licensee. CBS could not give permission for a licensee to publicly acknowledge an official relationship with an unlicensed fan club.

This left STARFLEET with only one newsworthy item to publicize: that legendary *Star Trek* writer DC Fontana would be judging our 2010 Short Story Contest. That Press Release went out in May and got picked up by TrekMovie, TrekWeb, and Trek Today (among others—including IMDb, believe it or not). We're not sure yet if it produced any new members—it probably did—but it certainly served us well in keeping our name out there prominently as a premier *Star Trek* fan club. STARFLEET's Public Relations Director, Admiral Brandt Heatherington,

crafted the Press Release and is trying to track the results as best he can. Brandt is also beginning to take over the STARFLEET Facebook and Twitter pages, among other projects.

In the meantime, we were left with over \$700 in unused marketing funds. So STARFLEET finally took its first steps into online advertising using Google Ads. We decided to spend up to \$10/day (or \$300/month) for two months of Google Ads to see how things go. So far, with a report submitted by Webmaster X after just one month, over 2,200 people clicked on a paid ad to come to STARFLEET's website, and of these, 21 clicked on "Join Now" within 30 days of their initial visit. This implies that we are converting about 1% of visitors from Google Ads, although we have not been running the program long enough to get accurate statistics yet.

For the coming 2011 Fiscal Year, the Communications department has opted to focus our marketing/advertising budget primarily on Google Advertising, lowering our monthly expense from the initial \$300 to \$200 in order to keep the program going for the entire year.

New Press Kit and PR Guide

In October of 2009, Admiral Brandt Heatherington and I produced two long-awaited documents intended to benefit the entire STARFLEET organization. The first, a sleek Press Kit designed for the media, is now available with information on our club's history, organizational structure, activities, celebrity members, and even advertising rates for $\it CQ$ and sfi.org. And everything is written for someone who might not be familiar with $\it Star Trek$ (rather than just for the hardcore fan). The Press Kit is not intended to recruit but rather to gain press coverage. Therefore, toning down the "fanspeak" language helps to present STARFLEET as a professional and well-established organization.

The other new document is the STARFLEET Public Relations Guide. Written to help instruct a member, chapter, and/or region/fleet level officer or group in finding ways to market themselves and get the word out about events, the PR Guide was written primarily by Admiral Heatherington, drawing on his real-life experience as a PR professional.

Together, the STARFLEET Press Kit and PR Guide represent two great new tools for members at all levels of the organization. Both documents are in PDF format and can be downloaded from the sfi.org website.

STARFLEET Graphics

Speaking of the sfi.org website, the culmination of a personal dream of mine became reality after a few months of effort during this past year. For a long time, many STARFLEET members asked where they could get a hold of graphic files and logos for Fleet departments, regions, chapters, SFMC, and a host of other miscellany. Finally, there is now a repository of graphic files available on the STARFLEET website for any member to access and download. The folders include chapter logos for over 90% of currently-active chapters, all regional logos, multiple formats of STARFLEET logos, Executive Committee/Department logos, SFMC logos, and miscellaneous logos.

The Alumni Outreach Program

Every three-to-four months, the Director of the

Alumni Outreach Program collects a list of all STARFLEET members who have expired and not renewed their memberships in over two months. The list is then sorted through to eliminate members who passed away or canceled their memberships. Then e-mails are sent out to the rest, inviting them to rejoin STARFLEET or, if they have decided not to, to please let us know their reason(s) and what we might be able to do to improve the membership experience.

Although it's difficult to know exactly how many expired members the AOP has brought back, estimates are about 30-50 over the previous 12 months. For the vast majority who chose not to renew, the leading reason was lack of money. The second most common reason was that the member simply lost interest in either STARFLEET itself, *Star Trek*, or being part of an active fan club. Further down were complaints that their chapter didn't do anything, and a very few complained about chapter or fleet politics. We have noticed that a good portion of non-renewing members (not a majority, but a noticeable minority) never joined a chapter.

As the program continues, we hope to be able to use the feedback and statistics to increase STARFLEET's membership retention rate. Right now, we're only just beginning to collect enough data to start making some conclusions, as each mailing only results in, at best, about a 10% response rate. So out of a couple of thousand total e-mails sent out, only a couple of hundred have written back to the AOP Director.

Speaking of Directors, Fleet Captain Annie Wheeler had to step down from her position back in February due to time commitments. I'd like to personally thank her again for doing such a fine job in setting up the program and running it for over a year. Her assistant, 2nd Lieutenant James C. Jones II, has taken over the Director position and just finished sending out his first batch of a few hundred e-mails.

The Spreadshirt Online Store

The STARFLEET Spreadshirt online store has generated about \$70 in profit over the past year. Those are not staggeringly great numbers, as they represent only about 35 items sold. However, the cost to maintain the online store is zero or our club, as any item purchased is printed to order. The online store features items with both the classic and new style STARFLEET logos printed on T-shirts, sweatshirts, messenger bags, laptop cases, umbrellas, scarves, and even bathrobes. I highly recommend that more members check out the store. The prices are reasonable, and the print and product quality is top-of-the-line.

The 2010 STARFLEET Election

And finally, as I prepare to end my two-and-a-half year run as Chief of Communications in December, I've also taken on the constitutionally-mandated role of Election Coordinator for our triennial campaign to select our next Commander, STAFLEET. At the risk of jinxing anything, let me say: "So far, so good." There was some initial resistance to the naming of Vice-Chief of Communications Dennis Rayburn to be Lead Moderator on the Election chat list. Indeed, the decision became so controversial that some members demanded that the Admiralty Board discuss the matter, which they did. However, no directive came from them to replace MGEN Rayburn, and the Election List went active with Dennis doing the lead moderation. After three and a half months, as I write this, there have been no complaints submitted to either myself or STARFLEET Inspector General Wade Hoover about Dennis' performance. Indeed, he has remained very professional, polite, but also stern in enforcing civil behavior rules and proactively shutting down threads that begin to get out of hand. Indeed, Dennis even moderated me on one occasion!

As for the rest of the election, things have been surprisingly and refreshingly civil this time as compared to last time. There don't appear to be any controversial forums like the infamous Vic's Place from the 2007 election. Fleetwatch has been mostly quiet, with only seven primary journal posts about the election since June 1st (significantly less than 2007). And so, with many of the historic sources of Fleetwide controversy either absent or mostly silent this election, and with two wellliked candidates who would each make excellent Commanders, STARFLEET, the campaign season has unfolded with civility and healthy discussion rather than the accusations and rants that plaqued us three years ago. And so far, members have reacted very positively.

On the headquarters front, we faced a few speed bumps along the way (including at the last-minute having to find a new CPA firm to count the ballots). When the dust finally cleared, though, we had a CPA firm in place only 24 hours later than our club constitution mandates (August 2 instead of August 1), and all the Election Packets were assembled and mailed out on September 1, also as mandated. And this was quite a large Election Packet this time, filled not only with candidate literature and a ballot but also with a copy of the revised Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation plus a special CQ survey. I daresay this was the most challenging election packet to prepare in nearly a decade, but we got it all done in time.

And now, it's all up to you, the members. If you haven't voted already, remember to get your ballot mailed in. In order for your vote to be counted, it needs to arrive at the CPA no later than November 15.

And That's a Wrap...Almost


With only another three months left in my term as Comm Chief, this will be my final annual report for the foreseeable future. I'll write more in my final ${\it CQ}$ article in issue #162, but for now, I would just like to say that it has been an honor and a privilege to serve STARFLEET these past two years, work with an amazingly fantastic EC and AB, and hopefully leave things in a better state than how I found them.

There will always be room for improvement somewhere here in this large organization. And while not everyone has cheered everything that's happened during the Sal Lizard administration, I still feel extremely proud of all the hard work and positive improvements we've accomplished. Change is difficult, risky, even scary sometimes. But change is the only way that things get better (and occasionally worse). It's how things evolve. STARFLEET has evolved over these past few years...and at least in my humble opinion, much more for the better than for the worse.

I wish good fortune, wisdom, and patience to my successor (and to the next EC, whoever they may be). He/she/they will not always be blessed with all three of the above simultaneously, but if they can keep at least one of those three balls juggling in the air at all times, they might just make it through to the other side. I did...almost (not finished quite yet!).

<u>CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER, STARFLEET</u>

Report from the Chief Financial Officer

Greetings, everyone. For those that couldn't make the IC a few weeks ago in Wagoner, OK, the following is my report that I presented during the General Session.

Once again, I'm pleased to report that we've ended our current fiscal year with a net income of almost \$7,300. In last year's budget for this period ending, I had forecasted a loss of about \$400. During this current fiscal year, we took in a total income of about \$73,300, although our budgeted forecast for this period was \$81,600. Therefore, we came in under budget by \$8,300 of expected income.

Although we expected to earn more, we also spent a lot less. To be more precise, we spent almost \$66,000 during this past fiscal year, and our budgeted forecast for this period again was about \$82,000. The good news is

we were able to spend almost \$16,000 less than what we had budgeted for.

Our largest expense for this past fiscal year-ending, which is supported by our membership dues, continue to be *Communiqué* expenses at almost \$17,850. As I said last year, we're getting the best *Communiqué* Starfleet has ever had thanks to Jon Lane.

Membership processing continues to be the second largest expense that is supported by our membership dues at a cost of about \$7,300. Our other two largest expenses for this past fiscal year have been IC Expenses at almost \$12,200 and Quartermaster Supplies at about \$8,700. These expenses historically have been supported by IC registrations, meals, other associated income, and by STARFLEET'S QM and the SFMC QM sales of merchandise, along with the IC's quartermaster sales.

Now moving on to the future, based on our current membership levels and expenses, we're forecasting a loss again of about \$400. Hopefully, once again we might be pleasantly surprised, but it always pays to expect the worst and hope for the best.

Sales Taxes

Currently, I'm pleased to report again that we have no outstanding sales tax issues with any states or municipalities. We're continuing to work to ensure all sales tax reports are filed on time and before their due dates.

Federal Form 990

Our outside CPA reviewed and approved the Federal Form 990 EZ, 990T, and various attachments at no charge to STARFLEET. The completed tax returns were mailed a few days prior

to its due date of November 15, 2009.

IC Reports

IC 2009

We received the final report from Steve Halber for IC 2009 on May 24, 2010, and it was posted with our other May financial activity.

IC 2010

Their report for May 2010 was received on June 3rd.

Well, that was it. I hope everyone enjoyed my report and once again,

attached are the financial statements for the period ending June 30, 2010, along with the year-to-date totals. AB Discussions

Discussions during June focussed around reaffirming AB Resolution AB95-011 regarding the City of Charter for chapters, the draft Bylaws as presented by the Bylaws Review Committee, finding someone to act as STARFLEET's Internal Auditor to conduct internal reviews on STARFLEET's finances, a suggestion from a member about forming a Membership Representative Board, the STARFLEET Election List Moderator, ranks and Flag Officer Promotions, and polling members of Region 20 regarding the selection of an Acting Regional Coordinator.

As noted above, a suggestion came from a member about possibly forming a Membership Representative Board within STARFLEET, the concept behind it basically being that each region in STARFLEET would be allowed a number of Membership Representatives based on the number of active chapters within their region. The function of the Membership Representative Board was described in the suggestion as follows:

"Basically what this idea above does is put the members of STARFLEET in charge of seeing their idea, concerns, STARFLEET Policies, as well as procedures into their hands. Much like the Admiralty Board does now. The Admiralty Board can still do what they do, but they would have to send whatever resolution they work on to the Membership Representative for them to share with their respective regional members to see how they feel about the proposed AB Resolution then discuss it amongst the other Membership Representative,s of which they can then amend the Resolution or vote on it as it stands. If Membership Representatives amend an AB Resolution, it is sent back to the AB for the Admiralty Board to re-discuss and vote on."

When the Bylaws were drafted, there were a number of things which had come out of what we call the Constitution which are procedural, and part of the purpose in the work that the Committee was formed for was to clean up the Bylaws and remove procedural text so that it could be appropriately worked into the Membership Handbook.

By the time the IC had come around, the Committee was down to two sections of the draft handbook which had been causing some issues... and then the IC hit, and we collectively found out about the problems that STARFLEET was encountering with getting a CPA and some text written into the procedures for the Triennial Election that required a CPA to mail out the Election Package.

I'd like to take a moment to give my personal thanks to the members of the Bylaws Committee for their hard work, open discussions, and for taking the time to consider concerns that came to them from both each other as well as the members of STARFLEET. Great work, folks!

Annual Campaign

When it was discussed, the AB felt that this board would be very much what the AB currently does and would result in making the process that the AB goes through to determine policy to be an even slower one than it is presently.

Discussions that took place during July were in regards to matters taking place in Region 20 at the given time.

The votes that are discussed in this report are all relating to those that took place both in June 2010 (AB10-05 through AB10-07), as well as those which happened during the ECAB Meeting at the 2010 International Conference in Wagoner, Oklahoma (AB10-08 through AB10-18).

Region 1 (Ruth Lane) made the following motion:

Note: AB95-011 deals with each chapter having a City of Charter to establish their location. This was originally announced in CQ 63. However, subsequent editions of the membership handbook did not include it. Region 2 did not cast a vote in this matter, and such is noted as an Abstain.

AB10-06: Motion to Accept the STARFLEET Bylaws

Region 12 (Jeff Higdon) made the following motion:

"Region Twelve motions to accept the STARFLEET Bylaws and send said Bylaws to the membership for their review and vote."

Region 2 (Jack Eaton) seconded the motion.

AB10-07: Motion regarding poll of Region 20

- 1) Ask someone in your chapter to print out the Academy course catalog (available at < http:// academy.sfi.org > or go directly to the catalog site mentioned above) so you have the information you need to apply for the college/course your desire. Since the catalog is several pages long, rather than your crewmate printing the catalog, you can ask him or her to email me < mrspeapod@myfairpoint.net > with your name, SCC#, and surface mail address. I will print and send the catalog directly to you.
- 2) If option #1 doesn't work for you, contact me with your request and I'll be happy to send a catalog directly to you. My mailing address is: Peg Pellerin, 180 South Reynolds Road, Winslow, ME 04901.
- 3) You can also ask your CO or XO to apply for the course for you using your name and SCC#. The course director will e-mail the exam to the CO or XO to print out and give to you. You could then complete the exam and return the answer sheets by regular mail. Be sure to include two or three U.S. First Class stamps to receive your certificate by return mail.

I hope the above suggestions are helpful to those of you who have been aching to take SFA courses and haven't been able to find a way to get them.

Ten Minutes in the Sun: USS Riverside Helps a Record-Setting Trek Fest XXVI

The June sun in Iowa is known to be harsh. It was a real trial for the people trying to set a new Guinness World Record for most people gathered in *Star Trek* costumes. This attempt was at the 26th annual Riverside Trek Fest, in Riverside, IA. The Fest, celebrating all things *Trek* in the "Future Birthplace of James T. Kirk," went all out for this event. Some events were honors, and some were real treats. They all contributed to a real unique experience for attendees at Riverside's Hall Park and at the nearby Riverside Casino and Golf Resort.

Aside from the Guinness attempt, the Trek Fest 2010 edition was to feature several new events: University of Northern Iowa Professor Rod Deiser would give a great presentation on "Friendship in Star Trek." The organizers of Trek Fest, the Riverside Area Community Club (or RACC), rechristened their Riverside shuttlecraft float/artwork. This was in the Star Trek tradition of naming shuttles for famous scientists and explorers. The group was honoring the name and memory of University of Iowa Professor James Van Allen, discoverer of the Van Allen radiation belts in earth orbit.

Trek Fest XXVI Guests of Honor included Walter Koenig (returning for the third straight year), BarBara Luna (Marlena Moreau of the TOS episode "Mirror, Mirror"), and James Cawley (James Kirk of the awardnominated web series Star Trek: Phase II). Unfortunately, a reported car accident kept Mr. Cawley from appearing. The Guests of Honor were to be truly honored, with the first stars on the newly proposed Riverside Walk of Fame. This is to be a bricked landscaped walkway and enhancement to be installed later in 2010 for the area surrounding the Kirk Birthplace marker in downtown Riverside.

STARFLEET's chapter home-ported in Riverside, IA, the *USS Riverside* NCC-1660, and her integral active-

interest group, the USS Riverside Lobo Flight Crew of the Davenport, IA/ Moline, IL area, were on the ground to help enjoy the event. The group was also going to participate and help run Trek Fest events. Several members of the Riverside and the LFC joined USS Riverside Executive Officer James Olson, who was honored with being named Trek Fest parade announcer and presenter, to kick of the Celebrity Q&A at Riverside Casino, introducing the Q&A Master of Ceremonies: Riverside-as-Kirk's-Birthplace founder Steve Miller.

Attending for the Riverside/Lobo delegation were Commander Olson, Quartermaster and Commander Dennis Arps and his wife, RACC officer Renee Arps, and Lobo Flight Crew's Senior NCO Chief Petty Officer M'Haus of Vulcan (aka Mike House), who was to run the *USS Riverside Trek* videothon at Hall Park in Riverside. Also attending were Petty Officer First Class William

Van Brunt and Ship's Ambassadors and Trek Fest Parade judges Brad Smith and Liz Robinson. Joining the combined crew were LFC Crewmen Alan Thompson and his wife, and Healer H'Dee of Bajor (aka Heidee Thompson). Rounding out the group were Crewman Mary Cichanowski, sporting an NX-01 jumpsuit, and her friend Pam McLaughlin joined her for the fun at Trek Fest.

The events for Trek Fest largely went well, though as with any event, "best intentions" did factor in to make some events seem a bit ad hoc, put together at the last minute and even "MacGyvered". Professor Deiser's presentation on Fest Friday evening was a nice follow-up to the Star Trek trivia contest, which was won by Star Trek: Phase II associate producer Alexander Yi. The University of Northern lowa professor was very eloquent in pointing out the different levels and kinds of friendships found in Trek and especially in exploring

the "TOS triad": the friendship of Kirk, Spock, and McCoy.

The parade, themed on the TOS episode "Mirror, Mirror," was a great kickoff for Fest Saturday. Commander Olson had a great time announcing the various local group floats and especially had fun watching parade judges and ambassadors Liz Robinson and Brad Smith discuss which floats were better than others. The parade featured the new shuttle James Van Allen, a Klingon Bird of Prey, and a refurbished USS Riverside NCC-1818; the starship is the symbolic namesake for the STARFLEET chapter.

Immediately after the parade, Commander Olson, the Thompsons, and PO1 Van Brunt went to the costume contest. The Riverside/Lobo personnel had fun with the Federation portion of the costume contest, judged by BarBara Luna and Walter Koenig. Crewman Alan Thompson even made the finals before Gregg Piper of Iowa City, former RACC officer and "Mirror, Mirror Kirk," won the first prize. Participants came from as far away as the countries of Turkey and Colombia. There were even a few very brave (foolhardy?) Klingons in attendance, and Stormtroopers appeared from the Des Moines Garrison of the Fighting 501st. They were all in full armor or leather...and lots of perspiration!

The Guinness World Record attempt had been the brainchild of Commander James Olson, after seeing the benchmark London record set on Valentine's Day. He approached and received approval from RACC to include the event in

Trek Fest XXVI. Through a spring 2010 decision, the RACC decided to put the event under the oversight of RACC Public Relations Assistant Fred Monfeli, who also headed a chapter for Starfleet Command in eastern IA. The RACC received official sanction from Guinness in March, making the *Riverside* attempt the first one of several tries to bring the World Record to the United States.

The "Riverside Four" mingled with very hot, eager, and patient participants at the Hall Park tennis court, answering a challenge from the USS Shooting Star, a Trek fan group in Tampa, FL. The group had offered in April 2010 a challenge to Trek Fest "...in the spirit of competition." This challenge was for them to set the World Record, before Trek Fest could in June. Their attempt in Tampa. FL. on May 1st. did break the British record of 99, scoring 110 people gathered in Star Trek Costume. However, on the same day, FedCon in Bonn, Germany set the new unofficial benchmark of 507 people. The British

attempt was still official at Trek Fest time, but the German attempt was the one to beat.

The trick for Guinness consideration was to have people in recognizable Federation, Klingon, or *Trek* alien costume from any of the six series (animated series included) and the eleven films. The participants had to stay, filmed or photographed, in one area for 10 minutes to qualify for the record. Since the organizers decided to use a concrete, fenced-in tennis court, it would have been ideal...but not at 1pm on a June afternoon in lowa!

Ten minutes at 92 degrees, even in basic command gold, made the average participant feel like the finished dish on a Julia Childs cooking show—"Trekkie flambé." However, after the last person was counted, only one individual required medical attention; she was reportedly okay after a short while. The USS Shooting Star had issued a challenge to set the record in the US "...in the spirit of friendly competition." Riverside, IA, answered by trouncing the Tampa attempt with 153 people, a new American record. It wasn't the unofficial German record, but did beat the London attempt, and the "friendly competition" gave Riverside and Trek Fest bragging rights in America...until the next attempt. The hot participants from Trek Fest wished them good luck-and more air conditioning.

[Editorial note: The folks in lowa and Germany would not be able to hold onto their records for long. The new US and World records were set in Las Vegas on August 7: an unofficial count of 543. At the time this is being written, another attempt will be taking place at Dragon*Con in Atlanta, GA on September 4.]

Some Trek Fest events had to be postponed, as the area along the English River on the south edge of Riverside was flooded at Fest time. The Demolition Derby and Kiddie Tractor Pull gave way to the Kirk's Stomping Ground Rodeo (the biggest event draw in 2009) and though muddy, proved a popular feature of Fest Saturday. The Celebrity Q&A proved even more of a unique experience.

The Riverside Casino and Golf Resort had an unusual dilemma: how do you have a *Star Trek* Convention and a concert by rock legends Bachman & Turner (of Bachman Turner Overdrive fame) on the same day? They pulled out the stops and made the Q&A a conditional success. Commander Olson of the *USS Riverside* had to rush from the 92-degree Guinness site to the 64-degree climate-controlled Casino stage. While he shivered and readied for the Q&A, he was informed that a last-minute

change made him the presenter for the Riverside Walk of Fame. The project creator and *USS Riverside* recruit Elischewah "El" Basting had originated the idea to honor her favorite *Trek* star Walter Koenig. Due to unforeseen circumstances, she would not be able to honor her favorite star in person.

Commander Olson dutifully introduced the show and broke the first news of the new American record just set. Then Olson had the pleasure of introducing the "Father of Trek Fest," Steve Miller. He briefly recounted how, in 1985, as a Riverside Council member, he'd approached his fellow City Council and they had petitioned Gene Roddenberry and Paramount to claim Jim Kirk as their "Future Son." Gene Roddenberry wrote a very cordial reply saying, in part, "...as far as I'm concerned, the first who asks is the first who gets." The rest was history.

The Q&A began in earnest with Walter Koenig. He was funny, vigorous, and engaging with the audience. He recounted how he had become popular as Chekov with young girls, and then he held forth on Bester from Babylon 5 as a favorite role. Koenig also spoke at length on his development and release of *Inalienable*, a 2008 film which has gained cult status.

Steve Miller called Olson to the podium, and the Riverside XO related how Ms. Basting, a Marion, IA adjunct college educator, had conceived and developed the Riverside Walk of Fame. The proposed bricked patio and walkway would feature stars, in part honoring the Guest of Honor who shared the stage with Olson. This, he said, was to redress the Hollywood Walk of Fame snubbing Koenig for over 6 years, including 2010. Ironically, all other Original Series

stars and Gene Roddenberry have Hollywood WoF stars. In fact, the Stars for the Riverside Walk of Fame were on display to the side of the convention at that moment.

Olson stated that Ms. Basting had a personal message for Mr. Koenig: that he represented the best in friendship, in humanitarianism, philanthropy, and community action. Koenig had personally touched Ms. Basting, and for Mr. Koenig to return to Riverside for the third year in a row, that it proved her right. She had commissioned a student of hers, Scott Hendricks of Cedar Rapids, IA, to hand paint the one-of-akind reverse-painted plaques. Then she

designed the stars, made from red Iowa flagstone. With that, Commander James Olson had the pleasure of presenting the first Riverside Walk of Fame Star to Walter Koenig. The convention crowd gave him a standing ovation.

After the crowd calmed, the Exec of the USS Riverside had a further surprise. Having turned over one plague of several to induct the Riverside Walk of Famers with, Olson told the crowd that he'd informed Steve Miller that he had been going to call the next honoree out of the crowd. That wasn't necessary, as he himself was the next inductee. Miller, the founder of the "Future Birthplace" concept for Riverside, was very surprised, especially since the land where the Kirk Birthplace marker is located in downtown was, in fact, his property. Miller then publicized a plan he and his family had decided on: they were donating the Kirk Birthplace property to the Riverside Area Community Club, ensuring a tourist destination for Trekkies around the world to be there for years to come.

James Cawley was to be next, but due to his reported accident, *Star Trek: Phase II* associate producer Alexander Yi, the *Star Trek* trivia champion, then came to the podium and gave an update on Cawley's condition, which reportedly was good, and that he would try to reschedule his appearance. He also gave information on upcoming episodes on the awardnominated web series. Olson gave Mr. Yi James Cawley's Walk of Fame plaque, and he said he'd definitely make sure Mr. Cawley received it.

BarBara Luna, who was personal friends with Cawley, met briefly with Yi onstage and then held forth on her own Q&A. Answers to questions included: Shatner was a good kisser, she didn't date Elvis, and yes, she was on *Bonanza*. Then Olson was called back to present the last Walk of Fame plaque to Ms. Luna.


The Celebrity Q&A wrapped up with photo and autograph sessions with the Guests of Honor. Commander Olson was interviewed by a colleague, Bryan Dettamore, co-host of the *Star Trek* and Sci-fi genre webradio broadcast, the *Lou Trek Show*. The Indianapolisbased duo gave a very nice close to the Celebrity Q&A.

Though activities for Trek Fest Saturday continued in Hall Park with a carnival, the Rodeo, live music, and finally fireworks (courtesy of the City of Riverside), for the *USS Riverside*, it was time for something very special: the annual *USS Riverside* Shipwide Summit. This annual gathering is the only regular meeting of the *Riverside*'s crew, other than the activities of the Lobo Flight Crew. The rest of the year the starship "meets" online at < www.ussriverside.us >.

The Shipwide Summit yielded some bittersweet news: due to some unfortunate happenstances and negative experiences at the Fest, a few members from the USS Riverside decided not to participate either in future Trek Fests nor continue with membership in the chapter. That was sobering news. But the remaining members then agreed that the process, rough though the Fest had been, had bonded the others more closely. The experience had made the USS Riverside and Lobo Flight Crew stronger. As a very touching surprise, Riverside eecruit El Basting was feeling well enough to attend the Summit meeting. She brought a treat: being a native of the Netherlands, she had baked a "pie" (more of a mochabuttercreme icing cake), which every weary Trekkie appreciated as the ambrosia it was.

The camaraderie through the end of the Shipwide Summit was the best aspect of the entire Trek Fest. Through sometimes disappointing, hot, or negative experiences, the *USS Riverside* and Lobo Flight Crew together exemplified the edict from the crew of the *USS Voyager*: it is not so important getting to your destination... it is the journey together that counts.

May your voyages in STARFLEET and in our fine chapters worldwide prove to you that *Star Trek* lives and is stronger than ever. Live long and prosper!

Being a Comic Book Writer and Producer

When I was a kid, I'd read the Houston Chronicle's Sunday Comics page—the largest selection of all color comics in the United States—which made me want to be a comic artist. Although I did not allow my ability to draw grow as much as I would have wanted, I have found a niche in becoming a comic writer and producer.

It sounds easy to write a comic, but to be honest, it is not. You have to have a preconceived notion on how you want the story to go based on the number of panels on the page, the amount of action you want to show, similar actions. You must also describe what you want to see on each panel. I've often discovered that the most general description is also the best and gives the artist enough freedom to work rather than super-detailed image ideas. For example, here is a quick excerpt from my main graphic novel:

Page 1

Sun setting on a palace on the Nile.

Panel 1

Eboni is sitting in her room, clutching her belly.

Panel 2

Eboni pulls an urn to herself and throws up.

Panel 3

Eboni looks up and moans.

Panel 4

EBONI

How... how can I tell them I love Jabari? How can I tell them that he's gone to war and left me alone with our child?

Panel 5

Eboni gets on her feet and staggers to the door.

It's bare bones, but if you're an artist, it's just enough to let your imagination run wild.

The only other difficulty of writing it is finding the time or inspiration to write more. I've written 24 pages of the graphic novel, and I hired an artist, but beyond that, it's difficult to move forward. Even though I've already written the story out in typical form, it's the conversion from that form to a script that is time-consuming and tedious since you're now moving from the story being pushed forward by an omnipresent narrator who allows you to hear the thoughts of the character to translating

that into dialogue and facial expressions. This is also the point at which you figure out how many plot holes you have or inconsistencies,

which you absolutely have to catch BEFORE

laughing stock of comic artists. Once you iron

out everything, you can start with producing

As a general rule, if you're not willing to spend a ton of money on getting the comic drawn and published and then watch the money come in—and hope that you will wind up in the green—comic work isn't meant for you. The hardest choice I've found is choosing an artist. You have to find someone that enjoys drawing and likes the script. If you get an artist that hates the script, you're going to throw your money out the window on a sub par product. My current venture is being drawn by a Russian artist, who has expressed

What was going to be my first venture into comic publishing—in this case non-profit work—ended in tragedy. My friend and colleague, Rusty Haller, a veteran comic artist for Marvel Entertainment, DC Comics, Disney

enjoyment over script and content.

Publishing, Furlough Magazine, and Archie Comics, was set to draw my Star Trek comic (which was in no means easy to write) in the classic style of Filmation. Unfortunately, on September 29, 2009, Rusty passed away in his sleep. His death essentially motivated me to finish writing the script for Star Trek: the M'Kesh Incident, which, if it is ever published either in print, online, or through Star Trek: Phase II, it will be dedicated to him.

Unfortunately, because it is unknown whether or not Phase II will pick up the project, it is doubtful that I will be able to produce it without making it myself. There are two ways that it could be done: live action or animated. Although I would prefer live action, if it is not picked up by Phase II, I will have to go with animation in the style of Filmation's 1977 Star Trek: The Animated Adventures. Ironically, between animation and live action, it would be easier, and possibly shorter, to do a live action film. Live action requires specially-made suits, though while expensive at times, do pay off in the end with a sense of realism

in both feel and look. Often, these suits can be built within 6 to 12 months for anywhere

from \$500 to \$4,000. Animation takes anywhere from 12 to 18 months to produce depending on complexity, but very few studios lean towards realistic portrayals, save the mid-1980's to early-1990's Japanese television shows, which would detract from this story in certain areas. But the Filmation style is so iconic to *Star Trek* that it is impossible to see any kind of animated *Star Trek* movie or series in a different style.

While I am looking for a new comic artist, I have been working on my flagship project, a series of graphic novels under the title of Balthazar's Treasures. It's the evolution of three families spanning a time period of 30 years. All of the graphic novels are based on novellas I've been working on for the past 4 years. Currently, there will be 4 books that cover 1982 to 2010, each one focusing on a set of characters. I'm hoping to find a publisher eventually, but the web address has already been reserved. For all those interested in writing and producing their own comic, you must remember that you will not have 100% gold on your first try. My first try was rot with nay-sayers and complainers who nit-picked every angle, some out of real genuine concern, but the majority seemed to be jealous that they were not able to create a comic in a short time and impress two artists. Working with comics is a learning process. The more you focus on what you want to portray to the audience, the more you learn to refine your craft, the more you refine your stories, and the more developed your characters become, the better the story becomes. Characters that start off as onedimensional take on their own dimensions and evolve into something more. Plots you thought were going to be easy become more complex, making for more character development as the story progresses. You get better as everything goes along, but you also develop your own style.

When I look back, I'm glad that I'm working in comics. I always find it as a medium that mixes the visual stylings of animated television with the narration of literature. I enjoy every minute of working on my comics, even when it's not truly pleasant. It could be worse: I could be sitting in a cubical hating every minute of my life, all the while working a dead-end job. Here's to doing something you love and enjoy.

What Do You Do When Your Tricorder Fails? Perform a Manual Patient Assessment!

Scenario

In the heat of a battle with the Jem' Hadar, you hear a Marine yell, "Medic—man down!" Upon arrival at the location, you hear the cry, and you find an Infantry Marine lying supine at the bottom of a 20-foot deep ravine. After making your way down to the patient, you discover an adult human male approximately 35 earth years of age. You quickly size up the scene and determine that there are no enemy soldiers in the immediate area, so there is no imminent danger to yourself or your patient. In order for you to accurately diagnose him, you must perform a patient assessment.

As you reach for your tricorder, the injured Marine informs you that the Jem' Hadar are using some sort of electromagnetic dampening field, making all electronic devices useless. How do you triage the patient without your instruments? The same way doctors and medics have for centuries, using the tools that are still available to you: your eyes, ears, hands, and your knowledge as a Medic.

Patient assessment has several main purposes:

- 1. To determine whether the patient is injured or has a medical illness.
- 2. To identify and manage immediately life-threatening injuries or conditions.
- 3. To determine priorities for further assessment and care on the battlefield versus immediate transport with assessment and care continuing en route.
- 4. To examine the patient and gather a patient history.
- 5. To provide further emergency care.
- 6. To monitor the patient's condition.
- 7. To communicate patient information to the medical facility staff.

Let us first break down the components of patient assessment so you have an understanding of the basics before we apply them to your patient. There are six (6) components of patient assessment, one of which varies depending on whether the patient has a traumatic injury or a medical illness.

Patient Assessment

- I. Scene Size-up
- **II. Initial Assessment**
 - 1. Airway
 - 2. Breathing
 - 3. Circulation
 - 4. Deformity
- III. Evaluate
 - 1. Mechanism of Injury
 - 2. Nature of Illness
- IV. Determine Type of Assessment
 - 1. Rapid Trauma/Medical Assessment (unstable patient)
 - 2. Focused Trauma/Medical Assessment (stable patient)
- V. Baseline vital signs
- **VI.Transport and Ongoing Assessment**

I. Scene Size-Up

You have already conducted the scene sizeup when you saw that there was no immediate danger to yourself and your patient.

II. Initial Assessment

The main purpose of the initial assessment is to discover and treat immediately lifethreatening conditions. It is important to realize that every Marine you treat is unique even though that Marine may exhibit the same signs and symptoms as another Marine that you treated previously. If any problems are found during the initial assessment, they must be corrected or stabilized before continuing. The initial assessment begins as soon as you approach the patient. When conducting an initial assessment, use your senses to help determine what happened to your patient. General appearances often give clues to the circumstances of the incident. Is the patient on the floor of his/her quarters reaching for a vial of medicine or, as in this case, on a battlefield following an explosion?

You see that the Marine is supine on the ground with his right leg underneath his left and holding the left side of his abdomen. He is conscious and tells you his name is Sgt. Rodriguez, and you ask him if he knows

where he is and the stardate. This helps with assessing his mental status and if a severe head injury might be present. If the mechanism of injury that you have identified is severe enough to cause you to suspect spinal injury, you would take immediate steps to stabilize the patient's head and spine. Luckily, he wasn't close enough to be killed instantly by the explosion, but the concussive wave knocked him down. The Marine fell from the top of the rocky ravine after absorbing the brunt of an exploding photon grenade. This type of blunt trauma usually results in some form of spinal injury. You apply a cervical collar to maintain spinal alignment and tell Sgt. Rodriguez not to move his head and to answer all questions verbally. After stabilizing his spine, you must now move on to checking his Airway, Breathing, Circulation, and obvious Deformities.

A, B, and C's

As you are talking with him, you are simultaneously checking his A, B, and C's. His airway is clear since he is talking, but check inside his mouth for foreign objects that might obstruct the airway later on. His breathing is hard and labored, but adequate enough to delay any immediate intervention. Checking his circulation requires that you check his pulse, usually the radial artery in his wrist. If a pulse cannot be found that way, check the carotid artery on the side of his neck. Determine the pulse rate by counting the beats for 30 seconds and multiply by two. Is the pulse strong or weak? If it is weak, you must suspect possible internal bleeding.

His pulse is 100 and weak. He may be in shock, but you must continue your exam to confirm this diagnosis. You visually check for obvious signs of bleeding, pools of blood or blood-soaked uniform. Upon palpation, you discover a laceration on the anterior of the head. It is not deep or profusely bleeding, so it can be treated later. His skin color, temperature, and condition are also important in determining if there is proper circulation. You note that his skin is pale, moist and cool to the touch. You have determined he is in shock, which is life-threatening. Stop and treat. (See section on shock for details).



After treating for shock, you continue on to **D**—deformities. You saw that his right leg is underneath his left, indicating a possible fracture. You cut away his pants and discover his lower leg is angulated, a sure sign of a fracture. Check for a pulse on the top of his foot (pedal pulse) to see if the broken bone stopped circulation. The pulse is not present, so you must straighten the leg to restore the pulse and to apply a splint. A splint is anything stiff enough to keep the limb straight (tree branch, rolled-up manuals, metal rod, etc.) during movement. Check again for a pulse after the splint is applied. In this case, the pulse has returned. You administer Metropan to manage the fracture and pain.

III. Evaluation

So far, you have determined that the mechanism of injury was blunt trauma caused by the shockwave of a concussive grenade and then landing in a ravine strewn with rocks. Now you have to use your experience and training to give a presumptive diagnosis of what other injuries Sgt. Rodriguez might have due to the type of injury he has sustained. You know that he has received blunt force trauma to his entire body from the initial explosion, and again after landing in the ravine. You consider that he has a weakening pulse rate, signs of shock, and hard, labored breathing. What now?

IV. Determine the Type of Assessment

Based upon your findings, you realize that his condition is barely stable and can worsen at any moment, so do you do a regular or rapid trauma assessment? This case clearly calls for a rapid assessment. When performing the rapid trauma assessment, it is necessary to inspect and palpate the patient to identify signs and symptoms of potential injuries. DCAP-BTLS are the chief signs and symptoms you are looking and feeling for during the rapid trauma assessment of each major body area. It stands for deformities, contusions, abrasions, punctures and penetrations, burns, tenderness, lacerations, and swelling. This is otherwise known as a head-to-toe assessment, where you start at the top of the head and palpate, look, and listen for additional injuries. The majority of the time, you have to cut away or remove clothing that restricts you from examining the entire body.

There are five steps:

- Inspect (look) for: deformities, contusions (bruises), abrasions, punctures, penetrating wounds, burns, lacerations, swelling, unusual chest wall movements, angulated extremities, bleeding, discolorations, open wounds, significant bleeding.
- Palpate (feel) for: tenderness, deformities, swelling, masses, muscle spasms, skin temperature.

- Auscultate (listen with a stethoscope) for: presence and equality of breath sounds.
- 4. Listen for: sucking sounds, gurgling, stridor, and crepitation (grating sound when two bone ends rub together or crackling sound caused by air under the skin).
- Use your sense of smell to detect any unusual odors on the patient's breath, body, or clothing.

In the rapid trauma assessment, be most concerned with identifying potentially life-threatening injuries. If you find any injuries that are life threatening, you must treat them immediately to avoid further deterioration of the patient.

Starting at the head, you palpate the scalp, feeling the laceration you found earlier. There is no noticeable indentation or soft spot near the wound, so a skull fracture is unlikely. You can take a moment to put a dressing on the wound. You continue; checking the neck, then when you arrive at the chest, check for equal expansion of the lungs, broken ribs, etc. You discover a bruise and extreme tenderness on the patient's upper left side. It appears that the patient has a broken rib and, due to his earlier signs of shock, you suspect that the rib might have punctured an organ (possibly his spleen—which is located in the upper left side of the torso) causing internal bleeding. To be on the safe side, you administer Dobutamine Hydrochloride, to stabilize his blood-loss.

At this point, you call for an immediate extraction, but continue your assessment until the transport arrives. Since you suspect your patient has a spinal injury, you should assess his motor function at the extremities. Ask Sgt. Rodriguez to grasp your hands tightly and assess if there is any weakness on either or both sides. If there is weakness present, you can presume there is some type of spinal injury. Also check his lower extremities—can he move his feet? "Can you feel that?" you ask as you tap his feet. Be careful of the fractured leg since you don't want to aggravate his injury. Luckily, he has feeling in all of his extremities, but do not remove the cervical collar or let him move before a more accurate spinal exam can be performed at the hospital.

It is important not to rush to finish the assessment because you discovered a life-threatening injury. This is a common mistake among inexperienced I-Medics that can lead to missing other potentially life-threatening injuries. As you reach the legs, inspect the fracture site once again, checking for bleeding, any open fractures, discoloration, and his pedal pulse. You now have completed the rapid trauma assessment. At this point, while still awaiting transport (or during transport), you get a baseline set of vitals.

V. Baseline Vital Signs

The vital signs should be reassessed and recorded every 5 minutes in an unstable patient. In the stable patient, the vitals should be assessed and recorded a minimum of every 15 minutes. Consider any trauma patient with a significant mechanism of injury to be unstable and assess vital signs every 5 minutes. The vital signs are reviewed briefly below.

- Breathing—assess the rate, volume, and quality of breathing. Determine the quality of breathing as being normal, shallow, labored, deep, or noisy.
- Pulse—Assess the radial pulse; if the pulse is not present, assess the carotid pulse. If there is a carotid pulse but no radial pulse, or if the radial pulse is weak and rapid, the patient is likely to be suffering from shock.
- Skin—The skin is assessed to determine the perfusion status of the patient. Inspect for pale or cyanotic (blue) nail beds and pale skin. Feel the skin with the back of your hand for the temperature and condition. Pale, cool, clammy skin is a strong indication of poor tissue perfusion. A trauma patient with tachycardia (rapid pulse) and pale, cool, clammy skin should be assumed to be in shock.
- Pupils—Quickly assess the pupils for size and reactivity by shining a light into the patient's eyes. Head injury may cause the pupils to become unequal and unresponsive to light.
- Blood pressure—Take the blood pressure.
 Determine the systolic and diastolic pressure. Two signs of serious blood loss and shock are narrow pulse pressure (the difference between the systolic and diastolic pressures) and hypotension.

Assess the patient's vitals, all the time keeping him calm and asking if he is feeling any additional pain or discomfort. You find that his breathing is still labored, but not as bad as during your initial assessment. This is probably due to the Metropan that you administered earlier. His pulse is still 100 and weak. Monitor it closely during transport, as he can crash at anytime due to the internal bleeding. The skin remains unchanged; blood pressure is 90/60mmHg and holding steady. His blood pressure indicates his body is still compensating for the blood loss, but if it drops to less than 90mmHg systolic, he would be in decompensated shock and must be transported immediately. His pupils are normal, equal, and reactive to light.

VI. Transport and Ongoing Assessment

You hear over the din of the ongoing battle the whine of engines coming from the medical transport. You begin to 'package' the patient to be transferred and double-check his injuries to ensure that you haven't overlooked anything. The transport lands approximately

100 meters from your position, and you see two Medics rushing to you with a stretcher. All three of you load the patient onto the stretcher, careful not to compromise his spine.

In the transport, you take the opportunity to do a final assessment and get a detailed history to convey to the receiving physician. The SAMPLE method is the simplest way of remembering what information is needed for your report.

- <u>Signs</u>—during your assessment, you are continuously inspecting for signs of trauma.
- <u>Symptoms</u>—How do you feel? Do you hurt anywhere? What symptoms are you experiencing?
- <u>Allergies</u>—Do you have any allergies? Are you allergic to any medications?
- <u>Medications</u>—Have you been currently taking any medications?
- <u>Pertinent Past Medical History</u>—Have you had any recent illness? Have you been seeing a doctor for any condition?
- <u>Last Oral Intake</u>—When did you last eat or drink anything?
- <u>Events Leading to the Injury</u>—How did this incident happen? Information may shed additional light on the mechanism of injury.

En route to the hospital, your priority is to continuously reassess the components of the initial assessment—mental status, airway, breathing, and circulation—plus vital signs and components of the rapid trauma assessment focused on the patient's injuries. You will also reassess the effectiveness of your intervention.

In conclusion, you must set priorities for management of critical injuries and conditions both at the scene and throughout the transport to the hospital.

Congratulations, due to your effective patient assessment skills, you have successfully diagnosed and treated Sgt. Rodriquez's injuries, and he is expected to make a full recovery. Now that you have learned the importance and effectiveness of patient assessment, you will become an extraordinary field medic and a valuable asset to the Fleet.

Note that this outline is not a substitution for proper medical training and that this is an abbreviated and simplified version of the actual patient assessment protocols taught to EMTs and paramedics.

AND TRY NOT TO GET DATA FACED!



After a quick intermission in the shade, the second half of the games was set to begin. The points were close, with one ship slightly in the lead, so this second set of games would be crucial in determining the winner of this year's Olympics.

Our fourth game, Phaser Range, tested participants' shooting skills. Three targets at varying distances were set up in the woods behind the pavilion. Thanks to R7 RC Wayne Augustson, R7 VRC Bob Vosseller, and R7 Chief of Staff Jeff Victor for providing the inspiring target photos!

Away teams of three members each

beamed over to the line and each member got 5 shots with a Nerf Longshot rifle and one bonus shot with a Nerf handgun. Targets were worth 5, 10, or 15 points depending on the distance and difficulty of the shot.

Wind conditions, terrain, and a learning curve proved difficult for some, but the *Richthofen* CO pulled off a performance

worthy of a sharpshooter to hand the *PoB* team an ugly defeat.

Next up, each crew had to Save Odo. Teams were timed on how long it took to transfer Odo from one bucket to another using leaky plastic cups. To keep Odo from dripping out, participants tried to cover the holes as much as possible.

When planning for the Centennial of Boy Scouting in the United States, Riverside, IA Scout Travis Riggan came up with a great idea. To celebrate 100 years of American Scouting, the BSA decided to delay the National Jamboree for a year, to have the multi-year event coincide with 2010, the Centennial year. A highly-regarded tradition for Scouts from all over the US is trading patches. To have unique and popular patches enhances the entire Troop, as well as gaining the renown of the regional Boy Scouts in the national group's collective eye.

Riggan, 16, is working his way up to Eagle Scout, and this year was asked to be the Junior Assistant Troop Leader for Troop 235 at the National Jjamboree.

Riggan's troop includes portions of Johnson & Washington counties in Iowa. He was motivated by the Boy Scout tradition at the jamborees but also by practical need. Recently, some sponsors for patches dropped their sponsorships of Boy Scout patches.

Travis Riggan had the idea to try something new for the patch designs—incorporating the fictional claim of his hometown: being the "Future Birthplace" of Captain James T. Kirk from *Star Trek*. He sketched out several *Star Trek*-inspired design proposals. He then sought the help of craft artist Loree Sayre. Riggan outlined the design ideas, and Ms. Sayre made the patch designs come to life.

When presented to the Hawkeye Area Council Jamboree Committee meeting in Cedar Rapids, IA, Travis Riggan made his case, with Loree Sayre's help, before the assembled Scout Masters, including 2010 Riverside, IA.

Jamboree Scout Master Gene Fields. The group reviewed the 8 designs, and suggested Scout-oriented tie-ins, including the slogan: "Beam Me Up, Scouty!" All 8 designs were eventually accepted and approved, with one Scout Master, a patch collector himself, reportedly stating, "These patches will be a top trading item!" at the National Jamboree.

To help defray costs to travel to the 2010 Jamboree. Troop 235 is raising funds by offering a limited supply of these Riverside and Star Trek-inspired patches for sale. Proceeds benefit Boy Scouts going to Jamboree. Travis Riggan says that the patches will vary in design and availability, and range in price from \$3.50 to \$6.50. 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
Night of the Dragon! Celebrating 20 Years of Fun with *USS Sovereign*

Long time CO Beryl Washington was a tad tired after a full day at the Philadelphia Comic Con, but you'd





As I write this, IC/IM is looming, and I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate this year's Star of Honor winner. I'll call this fine Marine out by name in my next report, but suffice it to say that reading all the nominations for the various Honor award winners sure makes me proud to be a Marine.

Special thanks go out to the folks who made the job even harder by writing such outstanding nominations for the candidates for the awards. I know I've said it before, but it's up to each and every one of us to make sure our fellow Marines get recognized, and it's always good to see folks going the extra mile and writing up such thorough recommendations.

Speaking of recognizing fellow Marines, as usual I'd like to take this time to give some shout outs to some of our enlisted members. This month, I got a link to a creative little video from MGSGT Matt Ezell of the 327th (SO) MSG using some videogame footage. Email me if you'd like the link. I personally think it's a few minutes well spent. Meanwhile, the 20th BDE has been reactivated, and over in the newly active R20, SGM Marie "M" Wilson is now the acting RC. It should come as no surprise to anyone who knows SGM Wilson that she turned down promotion, and is serving as RC as an E-9.

Remaining enlisted in the SFMC is a matter of personal choice, and it's good to see that choice being respected. If there's an enlisted Marine that you know of that has done something special that you think the whole Corps deserves to know about, please drop me a line so I can mention them here.

One of the responsibilities of SFMC NCOs is to lead the way in community service efforts. Just this past month, I received an email from a Marine who reminded me just why it is we work so hard in that area

While part of coordinating communications for their state's Special Olympics event (over 250 hours put in by members of the brigade), a young participant spotted the SFMC comm. badge the Marine was wearing and told her how much he loved Star Trek. He asked where he could get one like hers, and she quickly removed it and presented it to the delighted youngster. In her words "you'd have thought I'd given him a million dollars", and she went on to tell me how much personal joy she took away from the event.

That's why we do community service ... for those moments when we realize how much what we're doing means to those we're helping. Here's hoping you have one of those personal stories to tell of your own. Please let me know.

In other news, there's a new course available over at the NCO Academy on NCO History and Traditions. I encourage you to give it a whirl.

Now it's time for Top's History Lesson. I'm often reminded that the US doesn't have a monopoly on Marines or outstanding NCOs, and I'd like to tell you about a member of the Royal Marine Corps that you should probably know about.

LCPL Thomas Peck Hunter, a 21 year old native of Aldershot, had recently been promoted to acting Corporal while serving as leader of a Bren gun section of 43 Commando. On April 2, 1945, as one of the leading elements of 43 Commando as they advanced toward their objective in Italy, Hunter and his fellow Royal Marines came under fire from German machine guns while crossing a wide stretch of open ground. Mortars joined the party, and the Marines were in serious trouble.

Acting CPL Hunter stood up, and charged across 200 yards of open ground, firing from the hip and changing magazines as he ran. He cleared three machine guns from houses, and six Germans surrendered to him, but at least six more machine gun nests were firing at the Marines.

From the citation:

"Again, offering himself as a target, he lay in full view of the enemy on a heap of rubble and fired at the concrete pillboxes on the other side. He again drew most of the fire, but by now the greater part of the Troop had made for the safety of the houses. During this period he shouted encouragement to the remainder, and called only for more Bren magazines with which he could engage the Spandaus. Firing with great accuracy up to the last, Corporal Hunter was finally hit in the head by a burst of Spandau fire and killed instantly.

There can be no doubt that Corporal Hunter offered himself as a target in order to save his Troop, and only the speed of his movement prevented him being hit earlier. The skill and accuracy with which he used his Bren gun is proved by the way he demoralised the enemy, and later did definitely silence many of the Spandaus firing on his Troop as they crossed open ground, so much so that under his covering fire elements of the Troop made

their final objective before he was killed.

Throughout the operation his magnificent courage, leadership, and cheerfulness had been an inspiration to his comrades."

On June 2, 1945, Thomas Peck Hunter became the only Royal Marine to be awarded the Victoria Cross in WW2. The posthumous award was given to his parents, and was later donated to the Royal Marines Museum. The Royal Marines treasure his memory and a number of buildings, memorials, and organizations are named after him. Among those is Hunter Company, of the Royal Marine Commando Training Center. Hunter Company is comprised of trainees who have been injured or otherwise physically unable to keep up for a time to maintain their edge while they heal up and can return to the normal training regimen.

Ride For Roswell

BUFFALO, NY—USS Niagara crew member CPO Bridgete Pawelczak rode 33 miles in the 15th annual Ride For Roswell cycling event held June 27. This year's event raised more than 2.6 million dollars and had more than 7,000 participants. Petty Officer Pawelczak raised \$540.

"The Peloton is a unique 12mile non-stop, police escorted ride from Roswell Park to the University at Buffalo-Baird Point. The concept of this ride is to connect Roswell Park Cancer Institute with The Ride event at UB," the coordinator stated. All proceeds raised by The Ride remain right here in the Western New York area.

History of the Space Shuttle Program

The days of the Space Shuttle Program are coming to an end faster than you think. The National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) is going to stop the program because it's too old.

Today I am going to take you on a trip back in history on the start of the Space Shuttle Program. Many people think that the Space Shuttle *Columbia* was the first Space Shuttle, but actually the shuttle program was underway in 1976 during our country's 200th birthday, and long before *Columbia* ever rolled onto a launch pad. There was a mission to test out the orbiter's landing gear: the "Approach and Landing Test." The name of the test vehicle was the Space Shuttle *Enterprise*.

The original name for this test shuttle was *Constitution*, but a letter-writing campaign from a reported 200,000 Star Trek fans to President Gerald Ford and NASA resulted in the changing of the name to *Enterprise*. When it rolled out of the hangar, the cast of the original *Star Trek* was there, including *Star Trek* creator Gene Roddenberry.

What we think of as the "Space Shuttle" is really just the Orbiter, one of three parts of the Space Transportation System (or STS):

- Solid Rocket Boosters (SRB)
- External Tank (ET)
- Orbiter

The first orbiter that was launched into space was the Space Shuttle *Columbia* on April 12th, 1981. The two-man crew at the time was Shuttle Commander John Young and Shuttle Pilot Robert Crippen. For a couple of years, the United States made do with just the one vehicle *Columbia*. But in 1983, the Shuttle *Challenger* was added to the fleet, followed the next year by *Discovery*, and then *Atlantis* the year after that. The last of the six orbiters, *Endeavor*, took its first trip to space in 1992. *Endeavor* was intended to replace the Shuttle *Challenger*.

A good deal of history was made during the life of the Space Shuttle program, such as the first female to go into space—Sally Ride on STS-7 (women then flew on nearly every shuttle mission since). The Shuttle Program also featured the first female Shuttle Pilot and the First Shuttle Commander, Ellen Collen. And the first civilian ever launched into space, Christa McAuliffe, was a woman and school teacher.

History was also made on the scientific side. From its payload bay, satellites and space exploration

missions took flight. Among the most famous were the *Hubble* Space Telescope, the *Magellan* Space Probe, and the *Galileo* Spacecraft that would orbit around the gas giant planet Jupiter.

The Shuttle program did not escape its share of tragedies; two Space Shuttle were destroyed with lives lost. The Space Shuttle *Challenger* exploded 76 seconds after launch on January 28th,1986 and lost seven crew members, including teacher Christa McAuliffe. And on February 1st, 2003 the Space Shuttle *Columbia* was destroyed while on re-entry through the atmosphere over Texas, killing all seven crewmembers.

With three shuttles remaining, their primary missions have focused on building and supplying the *International Space Spation (ISS)* as well as missions to service the *Hubble* Space Telescope. Initial plans were to retire all the shuttles, beginning with *Atlantis*, in 2010. But one additional mission, likely *Endeavor*, is currently be planned for February 2011 to the *ISS*.

After that? Well, the Shuttle *Discovery* has been promised to the National Air & Space Museum at the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C. The remaining three Shuttles—*Enterprise*, *Atlantis*, and *Endeavor*—are planned to be sold to various

educational institutions or museums for \$28.8 million dollars each. Will that money help recoup the cost of the Shuttle program? Hardly! Over its entire lifespan, the Space Shuttle program is estimated to have cost more than \$174 billion! But the knowledge it has helped us learn and the history it has helped us make are truly priceless.












