You May Now Kiss and Mind Meld!

On May 23, 2015, two USS Alaric members – Diane Stanton and I – were married in a ceremony that had a Star Trek, Science, Superhero, and Science-Fiction theme. The local daily newspaper, Asheville Citizen-Times, began their article about our wedding this way:

"You may now kiss and mind meld," Howard Hanger declared to the bride and groom before they placed their hands on each other's temples – merging their thoughts, and lives, together forever.



Although not traditional, what else should be expected from a minister wearing pointed Vulcan ears in a ceremony where Corinthians was read by Batman?



Yes, it was indeed a nontraditional wedding. Guests were invited to come in their favorite costume, so there were Jedi Knights and Vulcans and Fairies and Romulans and Dark Knights and Phantoms and an abundance of Starfleet personnel in attendance. In lieu of wedding gifts, we had asked guests to make a donation to the American Cancer Society or the Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Research in memory of my parents, or to send us copies of the wedding pictures they took. It was a wonderful and exciting and fun and unique wedding, and everyone had a fantastic time!

We had jettisoned the traditional "Here Comes the Bride" music and entrance. Instead, we had the ceremony begin with

"Christine" and "Erik" - characters from The Phantom of the Opera entering the sanctuary to music from the movie. Diane's mother, Barb, was dressed as Christine and her father, Don, as the phantom Erik. After the parents of the bride were seated, Jubilee! minister, Howard Hanger, announced Diane's and my entrance with a unique Star Trek introduction which we had concocted: "Marriage, the final frontier. This is a voyage of Richard and Diane. Their Lifetime Mission: to explore this wonderful world, to fully experience life and their relationship, to boldly go expressing love and more!" Then we entered the sanctuary together to the main

Keeping to our Star Trek theme, my attire was Spock's dress uniform which he wore in "Journey to Babel" and other Star Trek episodes, and which our friend, Teleri, made for me. Diane chose an astronomical theme for her galaxy dress, which she and her mom made. Our close friend, Deni, dressed in a Next Generation Starfleet uniform, was my Best Person (i.e., my female Best Man), and Diane's sister, Debbie, garbed as a

Jedi Knight, was Maid of Honor.

Special readings by family and members of the wedding party preceded the exchange of vows. Debbie and Barb read from favorite love-themed poetry; Don sang Elvis's "Love Me Tender", drawing tears from both Diane and me; Deni reflected on how Diane and I had met; Diane read from The Prophet; and I spoke on why we chose a Star Trek-Science-Superhero-Science-Fiction theme. Diane's brother, Dale, is an engineer who spent time years ago as a missionary in Africa. Dressed in the aforementioned Batman outfit, Dale read from 1st Corinthians 13 in both English and Chaluba, the language of the African country he visited.

Deni drew laughs when she described how she had coached me with my Match.com profile. She reviewed what I had written and thought it was awful, but I posted it anyway. Within a few hours I had received responses from three women, Diane being the first to reply. So Diane and I met through Match.com. But that's not the full story. We had actually met a couple times years prior to my posting the dating service profile. The first was at a churchsponsored environmental meeting, and the second at a climate presentation I gave at the University of North Carolina-Asheville campus. I've given dozens of talks on climate over the decades as part of my job, so I had forgotten those two times we had met, but Diane remembered!



Jubilee! is a non-traditional church, so Howard was perfectly at ease with our non-traditional wedding. As you saw in the Citizen-Times excerpt above, after the Exchange of Vows and Exchange of Rings, Howard, clad in Vulcan ears, gave Diane and me permission to "kiss and mind meld." Mike Birkle, of Retro Reproductions, did a fantastic job with the wedding video, having us "beam out" of the sanctuary at the end of the ceremony. And the reporter from the Daily Planet, as well as the one from the Citizen-Times, did a superb job with their articles!

Instead of a bouquet of flowers, Diane carried a miniature solar system when she and I entered the sanctuary. After the ceremony, when it came time to toss the bouquet, we tossed the planets, one at a time. So there are nine (yes, to us, Pluto is still a planet) lucky folks out there who are going to be married in the future!

I had prepared a PowerPoint of slides which we projected both before (as guests gathered) and after the ceremony. The slides included sayings from scientists, philosophers, and Gene Roddenberry on science, life, Star Trek, and the human condition which encapsulated our feelings. Also included were pictures of cinematic weddings of various Star Trek, science-fiction, and superhero characters. Each slide was projected against an astronomical background scene of the Pleiades, another star cluster, the Andromeda Galaxy, or Spiral Galaxy M64. The PowerPoint served as an introduction to the philosophy of our wedding, a pictorial explanation of why we chose this theme, and an entertaining prelude and postlude to the ceremony itself. I summarized the essence of the PowerPoint slides in my presentation on why we chose a Star Trek-Science-Superhero-Science-Fiction theme for the wedding.

You May Now Kiss and Mind Meld!

Why science? Astronomer Edwin Hubble said: "Equipped with his five senses, man explores the universe around him and calls the adventure Science."



We liked this from astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson: "Science is a cooperative enterprise, spanning generations. It's the passing of a torch from teacher, to student, to teacher. A community of minds reaching back to antiquity and forward to the stars." The Apollo Moon program was in full swing when I was growing up in the 1960s. To me, Apollo represented the best minds of science working together to accomplish a common goal. To me, on Star Trek with Science Officer Spock as our guide, we were exploring strange new worlds in fiction, and with Apollo, we were exploring another world for real.

This combo made science exciting for me, and it still is!

We emphasized in the powerpoint the importance of preserving our spaceship Earth, the only home we know. Earthrise and the pale blue dot were two awesome pictures we used to bring this message home. Project Mercury astronaut Scott Carpenter noted that, "This planet is not terra firma. It is a delicate flower and it must be cared for. It's lonely. It's small. It's isolated, and there is no resupply. And we are mistreating it." Neil deGrasse Tyson said: "We are all connected – to each other biologically, to the earth chemically, to the rest of the universe atomically." From a Native American Elder: "Honor the sacred. Honor the Earth, our Mother. Honor the Elders. Honor all with whom we share the Earth: Four-leggeds, twoleggeds, winged ones, swimmers, crawlers, plant and rock people. Walk in balance and beauty."

Why superheroes? Again, in the 1960s, my favorite superheroes were teams who worked together to vanquish their evil foes — teams like the Justice League, Fantastic Four, X-Men, and the Avengers. These were people with special abilities who accomplished great things by joining together and working toward a common goal. And the Fantastic Four's Reed Richards was even a scientist!

The great astronomer Carl Sagan said the very atoms of our bodies were forged in the hearts of stars: we are made of star stuff. Through the magic of carbon and biochemistry and evolution, we are the universe becoming aware of itself. Expressed another way, Eckhart Tolle said, you are the universe expressing itself as a human for a little while. This is awesome, almost spiritual! In fact, Dr. Sagan said: "The very act of understanding is a celebration of joining, merging, even if on a very modest scale, with the magnificence of the Cosmos. Science is not only compatible with spirituality; it is a profound source of spirituality."

So, from science we learn that we are special, in the cosmological sense. Now, Jesus said, we are but children!



Gene Roddenberry built on this idea when he said, "I believe in humanity. We are an incredible species. We're still just a child creature, we're still being nasty to each other. But we're growing up, we're moving into adolescence now. When we fully grow up — we're going to be something!"

And that was Gene's philosophy in Star Trek. It was a positive philosophy. He said:

Star Trek was an attempt to say that humanity will reach maturity and wisdom on the day that it begins not just to tolerate, but take a special delight in differences in ideas and differences in life forms.

He said: Star Trek speaks to some basic human needs, that there is a tomorrow - it's not all going to be over in a big flash and a bomb, that the human race is improving, that we have things to be proud of as humans. No, ancient astronauts did not build the pyramids - human beings built them because they're clever and they work hard. And Star Trek is about those things.

Gene said: It is important to the typical Star Trek fan that there is a tomorrow. They pretty much share the Star Trek philosophies about life: the fact that it is wrong to interfere in the evolvement of other peoples, that to be different is not necessarily to be wrong or ugly.

Charles Shaar Murray and Mike Marqusee said: "In the annals of science-fiction, where dystopias rule the imaginative roost, Star Trek stood nearly alone in

telling us that our future would be better than our past, that our common problems would be solved, that we, as a species, were fundamentally good, and that the universe would reward us for our goodness."

This is why a Star Trek-Science-Science Fiction-Superhero Theme!

Diane's and my wedding was not only a celebration of our union, but an expression of our feelings and beliefs. It was a wonderful day and wonderful event, and we are very happy that we were able to share it with our relatives and colleagues and Star Trek friends!



Apollo 13 Lands in Georgia

Two icons of space history visited Georgia Regents University in Augusta, Georgia, on April 25, 2015, to explain the phrase, "Houston, we've had a problem here." James Lovell, the commander of Apollo 13, spoke the famous words when the craft suffered an explosion. Apollo 13 launched April 11, 1970 with a crew consisting of James Lovell, John L. Swigert Jr., and Fred W. Haise Jr. These astronauts worked with Gene Kranz, the flight control director, to save the mission. For their role in saving the craft and those aboard, President Richard Nixon awarded them all the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

All science and science fiction enthusiasts are well acquainted with the mission, the astronauts, and the terrifying scenario played out in space. Nonetheless, it was thrilling to hear two of the major players – Commander Jim Lovell and Gene Kranz -- give their personal testimony. Especially to those of us who followed

the events in 1970 as they unfolded.

Hanging on their every word were university students, scientists, community fans, and assorted geeks, including several members of the USS Star League: Fleet Captain Carnell Eubanks (CO), Commodore Jana Sandarg (XO), Fleet Captain Peggy Eubanks, Lt Lucille Skipper and Ensign Tammy Smith.

Kranz spoke first, with the classic statement "Failure is not an option" projected on the screen behind him. The sentence was the title of his book published in 2000, which served as the basis of the History Channel documentary on Mission Control, broadcast in 2003. Kranz painted a vivid background of space exploration leading up to the launch of Apollo 13. Lovell narrated the hairraising story of the explosion and the crew's response to each ensuing emergency. Both presented details not publically revealed at the time of the event. Their suspenseful stories, one from the perspective of earthbound mission control and

the other from the depths of space, exceeded every possible thrill from a tale told on screen or even on the holodeck!

Time travel is not an option (yet) in the 21st century, but we traveled back to the 20th century to relive the drama of Apollo 13. For those of us who saw Kranz and Lovell as young men in 1970 and as legends in 2015, it was truly an evening of awe. "Of greatness and of humility" aptly describes these giants of space history who are down-to-earth story tellers. They fired our imaginations and our aspirations. Even humble folk can travel to the stars.

Have you ever seen a child of animal in a vehicle in the parking lot? Too many kids and pets die in hot cars every summer, either left behind by parents and caregivers or by going into an unlocked car. People who walk by a car and see a child in it alone on a warm day can help prevent tragedies. A recent survey of parents by Public Opinion Strategies for Safe Kids showed that many people are worried about getting involved in such incidents. Some say they are hesitant because they fear a lawsuit. Please don't let that be a reason to stop you. The large majority of states have a law giving people immunity from a lawsuit if they act to protect a life or answer an emergency. The central focuses of any state's Good Samaritan laws make particular the aspect of acting in good faith, not demanding or receiving compensation for your services, and helping without causing or acting in gross negligence or misconduct. Even if you are a licensed medical or emergency care

provider, you are free of any form of litigation by following your state's Good Samaritan laws, if you attempt to prevent loss of life or further harm to a person in dire need. The positioning tilt of the head was awkward when trying to bend far enough down to perform the two compression breathes required. Yet in the classroom environment, whilst slightly embarrassed to be on ones knees patting the somewhat docile 'patient' and asking it 'she was alright? And did she need any help?' it was brought home to each one of us the total and absolute importance why we were learning this new skill. Training in a safe environment is preferable than facing an emergency without any clue what to do and just succumbing to blind panic. Learning about the 'Recovery Position' threw up some interesting points of interest...it was remarkably easy to turn even a heavier personage using the leverage of the raised knee and arm than first anticipated and that secondly 'arms don't naturally 'do' right angles from the body'. Although the days course was quite long, it was great mixture of 'how to' videos, and hands on practice and I thoroughly recommend each and everyone to attend this type of training, you just never know when we may have to use our training for real.

He's worked single-handedly to fix the Member Database when it went belly-up several years ago, taken point on database issues over the past few years, and has been a tremendous asset in our department, as well as a true friend. I wish John and his family well, and hope we'll be teaming up again soon.

So, in light of this, I've taken a different approach to choosing my Vice-Chief. Historically, CompOps is a department that can foster major burnout, and the last thing I wanted to do was promote a staffer to Vice-Chief, loading him/her up with duties across the broad range of CompOps' responsibilities, only to end up looking for another Vice-Chief in a year. So I've designated 3 new Vice-Chief positions, each dedicated to a distinct aspect of CompOps:



Captain William "Tony" Knopes: Vice-Chief, Database Operations

Fleet Captain James Ortega: Vice-Chief, Helpdesk

Commodore Greg Mortensen: Vice -Chief, Web Services

All 3 of my new Vice-Chiefs have been working in CompOps for some time now in their respective fields of expertise, and have been

Next, an update on the migration to our new Web host, Site5. We've begun the process of migrating over all email to the new server, which has proven to be a labor-intensive process. The migration of email addresses has included the importing of years of message archives, going back as far as 2005. The next step is migrating over the discussion lists, including their archived messages, users and settings, which required the assistance of Site5's customer service. After 2 weeks and innumerable support chat sessions, the lists have been migrated, and members are able to use our mailing lists the same as they did on the old Web host.

The next step was pointing our DNS settings to the new Web host, which will allow us to end the blocking of SFI.org emails by some popular email providers like Yahoo! and AOL. In addition, we have also moved over our main Web sites: www.sfi.org, and will soon move the SFA site, the Database and the SFMC Web sites and email assets. That process is being completed by our Database team, as well as our SFA and SFMC webmasters, and I hope to have the process completed by the end of the calendar year.

CADET CORNER

Welcome Cadet,

I am Commander Spock of the USS Enterprise. Right now I am teaching at STARFLEET Academy and I will be your science instructor. We will be doing one experiment per visit. Does anyone know why we experiment? That's right, to find answers to the questions we have about the universe.

Today's project will be invisible ink. You will need the following:

- Half a lemon
- Water
- Spoon
- Bowl
- Q-Tip or Cotton ball
- White paper
- Lamp or other light bulb

Instructions:

- 1. Squeeze some lemon juice into the bowl and add a few drops of water.
- 2. Mix the water and lemon juice with the spoon.
- 3. Dip the cotton bud into the mixture and write a message onto the white paper.
- 4. Wait for the juice to dry so it becomes completely invisible.
- 5. When you are ready to read your secret message or show it to someone else, heat the paper by holding it close

What's happening?

Lemon juice is an organic substance that oxidizes and turns brown when heated. Diluting the lemon juice in water makes it very hard to notice when you apply it the paper, no one will be aware of its presence until it is heated and the secret message is revealed. Other substances which work in the same way include orange juice, honey, milk, onion juice, vinegar and wine. Invisible ink can also be made using chemical reactions or by viewing certain liquids under ultraviolet (UV) light.

Education


This Scholarship is for business and management studies, the study of foreign languages or studies abroad, and for teaching.

Good day, Marines.

Quick reminder. There are two positions open at Forces Command: 7 Brigade Officer in Charge and Electronic Certificates Officer. Even though both position are titled 'Officer' any qualified member of the SFMC may apply. The positions close on 18 September 2015 so please contact me ASAP if you have an interest.

This month I'm going to focus on some concerns I have about the reporting process.

** First off , 'please' do not make changes to your Unit's information without clearing it with FORCECOM first. No changes to unit name, nickname, slogan, branch of service, etc. By this I mean do not simply make a change to your unit report. You need to send me an email asking about the possibility of making your change.

It's not an automatic that this can happen. There may be another unit in another Brigade that is already using that name. That means no matter how much energy and enthusiasm you've already invested in it, you can't have that name. If someone is already calling themselves 'The Lollypop Guild', you're out of luck. I'm sorry if you've asked the SFI ship registry to change your ship's name so it ties in with you unit [and it was approved]. Equally sorry if you've already invested a lot of bucks in have a friend who's a graphics designer come up with a new logo. Check first. We may be able to come up with something fairly close, but it's right of prior domain.

When submitting reports the online



reporting for asks for Unit. Please just use the unit number. Do not use your Unit name, use special characters [1st, 53 rd, etc], etc. Your report is logged in and archived by unit number. Anything extra you add or change has to be fixed manually on my end and just adds extra steps no one needs.

Don't use unit names. Believe it or not, I don't have you all memorized.

And there are only two unit types for administrative records: Marine Strike Group [MSG] or Marine Expeditionary Unit [MEU]. Ignore the MUC and MTU options. We don't use them.

Acceptable: 305 MSG, 88 MSG, 920 MEU

Not acceptable: 305th, The Jolly Rogers, The 299th MTU

Now with another International Marine Muster come and gone and with the major awards season over, now is a good time to check out your personnel records on the database. No one's going to know something is missing but you so it's a good to get in the habit of reviewing your personal records every couple of months or so.

You may discover an award or two you didn't know you received. That's always a nice surprise.

It's a fact of life in electronic record keeping that sometimes things go missing. An email may get eaten by a spam folder. Records can be lost on a hard drive. It is the responsibility of the individual to keep a copy of all his personal records, awards received, courses completed, etc. If you find an error, it's certainly acceptable to point it out and request the data be added, updated or changed. Just know that you'll need to provide documentation so that the appropriate correction to the database. Documentation can be a scanned copy of the certificate, an email from the issuing authority, a copy of a Unit or Brigade report noting the award, etc.

I can't emphasis this point enough: if it can't be documented, it can't be changed, corrected or added. If this all sounds familiar, it's something I try to stress every few months or so. It's never a good idea to wait until the last moment to discover something's missing, especially if you're getting ready for a formal dress event like your Unit Holiday formal dinner or an upcoming Brigade Muster.

Just think of it as 'preventative maintenance'.

That's all for now. Keep it safe out there and be nice to each other.

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State of the NCO Corps

Greetings Marines!

As usual, I'm in the booth in the back in the corner in the dark of my local NCO Club, where we could really use a big shovel or maybe even a Combat Engineering Vehicle to clean up the "fertilizer" that stacks up during some of the late night "discussions", and the mandated weekly meeting of Senior NCOs is still opened the same way: "Jacks or better, nothing Wild but Top."

By now, you should be aware that the latest revision to the MFM is available for download at the Library section of the SFMC Website. That would be a STRONG Hint, folks. I won't spoil it for you, but I will say that the most extensive changes were made in Section 7 (Uniforms), including a new TNG era Class B uniform, and a new, "off the rack" Class A uniform, as well as organizing all the little "bits and bobs" authorized for wear on our uniforms.

And, with the publication of a new edition of the MFM, it's once again time I reminded you all (with my tongue mostly in cheek) ... Marines ... every time you ask a question whose answer is clearly in The Book, or answer a question without looking in The Book to be sure you're right, some reasonably omnipotent being somewhere in the universe takes a completely innocent little adorable puppy, fluffy bunny, or playful kitten, or their alien equivalent, and cruelly promotes them to "butter bar". Please, Marines ... think of the puppies, bunnies, and kittens (and alien equivalents)! Check the current Marine Force Manual (MFM) FIRST ...

Since this is the "State of the NCO Corps", it's perhaps time to look briefly at a couple of numbers from a recent data dump from



the STARFLEET database. The following information may be assumed to be B.A.D. (Best Available Data). Of the roughly one quarter of STARFLEET's total membership identified in the database as Marines (Active or Reserve) holding any sort of adult rank (which would exclude Cadets and those with no rank assigned), 20.1 percent hold enlisted ranks. When we add those excluded into the total, 23.7 percent of the SFMC does NOT hold an "officer's" rank. In other words, about one Marine in five is enlisted, and only about three out of four Marines are officers.

As I promised last month, I'm going to briefly touch on the report I gave the Commandant for IC. In addition to my duties assigned by the MFM and Policy Manual, I continued to oversee and promote the March for the Disabled campaign. This component of the Commandant's campaign has now been expanded to run all during the calendar year. And, I "put my money where my mouth is" by logging and reporting up the Chain of Command 20+ hours on this campaign since IC 2014, despite my personal disability and remote location. I also had to note that I quietly celebrated the milestone of serving over seven years in this post, spanning three

administrations, and concluded with "Did NOT shove anybody, living or otherwise, headfirst into the trash disposal system, despite possibly justified provocation."

That last bit is keeping with the last of my stated goals for the coming year, which included continuing to do the jobs assigned me by the MFM, Policy Manual, and Commandant, explore the possibility of collecting all the "History Lesson" segments into one document and making it available to the SFMC Library (a few folks have asked me to do this - feel free to add your voice if you'd like to see it happen), and finished up with "Take my position seriously, but not TOO seriously to avoid burnout."

As I've said many times before: SFMC does not stand for "STARFLEET Martyrs Collective." We are supposed to be doing what we do because it's fun, and keeping that firmly in mind is one of the reasons why I've lasted over seven years as SGM SFMC. Having said that, here's my usual reminder that community service is a big part of what we do, but it doesn't have to involve any sort of organized charity or cause at all. Just giving of your time and energy to someone who needs a hand is the spirit of community service. And remember: "If you don't report it, we can't reward it."

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
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
