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# **STARFLEET SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

Ever since 1990, our organization has presented monetary scholarships to special active STARFLEET members who are attending community colleges, four -year colleges, most technical schools, junior colleges and universities or graduate school, or any other accredited institution/organization that offers a certificate/certified program. If unsure, just ask the Director.

Scholarships are awarded in amounts of up to \$1,000 based on number of applicants and availability of funds. APPLICANTS MUST BE A STARFLEET MEMBER AND MUST HAVE BEEN A STARFLEET MEMBER FOR AT LEAST ONE YEAR BEFORE THE APPLICATION DEADLINE. The application period runs from January 1 through June 15 of each year. June 15 is the Application Deadline. At our annual International Conference each summer, the scholarship winners are announced for the next academic year beginning in the fall semester.

Over the years, the number and variety of our Scholarships have changed. The following is a list of the current Scholarships that STARFLEET offers:

ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY – James Doohan/Montgomery Scott Engineering & Technology Scholarship This very popular Scholarship covers any field related to engineering and other fields of study involving technology, computer science, etc.

MEDICINE & VETERINARIAN – DeForest Kelley/Dr. Leonard McCoy Memorial Medical & Veterinarian Scholarship

This is for medical studies of both humans and animals and is awarded for programs in medical school, nursing school, physical therapy, pre-med, EMT-Paramedic, surgical technician, biomedical technician, and the study veterinary medicine.

ARTISTIC – Gene Roddenberry Memorial/Sir Patrick Stewart Scholarship for Aspiring Writers & Artists This is for all those studying acting, dance, music, writing, literature, or for skills and training relating to the media, graphic artists, film making, etc.

## BUSINESS/MANAGEMENT/ EDUCATION – Armin Shimerman/

George Takei/LeVar Burton Scholarship for Business, Language Studies & Education

This Scholarship is for business and management studies, the study of foreign languages or studies abroad, and for teaching.

MISCELLANEOUS – Space Explorers' Memorial Scholarship This scholarship honors the Apollo, Shuttle Challenger, and Shuttle Columbia astronauts and Russian cosmonauts that have died to further our efforts in space exploration. It is a "general duty" scholarship and applies to all courses of study not mentioned in the other 4 Scholarships. If scholarship applicant's field of study does not quite match up with one of the other scholarship types, they may be awarded this one. Think about it, if every member made a \$1 donation to the scholarship fund each year, we could fully fund the program.

## Yuri's Night: A Celebration of Technology and History

"We live in interesting times"

I don't know who said it, but when I looked it up on Wikipedia there were way too many entries for me to discover the origin. Although when I did look up the quote there were about 5 Star Trek movie and character references.

Thing is no matter who said it, it turns out to be true generation after generation for different reasons each and every decade. Tomorrow there will be people walking on Mars, and viewing the Earth from orbit in a regular basis. Today there are electric cars, they are working on vehicles that will drive themselves, and NASA is allowing private companies to take payloads into orbit, so that the space agency can focus on Mars. And the Past, oh the marvelous past.

Only 50, in fact less than 50 years ago, the humans of this planet first reached beyond our thin atmosphere into orbit around our world, then to set foot on our nearest celestial neighbor.

Recently one of the members of my chapter invited me to a celebration of that past. A celebration



so vital that those of the present are bringing it, because they know our future depends on remembering our past achievements. On April 12th 1961, Lieutenant Yuri Alekseyevich Gagarin, Russian pilot and cosmonaut, sat in the Vostok spacecraft and

became the first person to view the planet we live on from far above any spot previously recorded. After getting the lift off message from the Baikonur Cosmodrome, call sign "Kedr"

(Siberian Pine or Cedar) proclaimed what would soon become a historical phrase in his country, it's a phrase we should all be aware of.

Korolev: "Preliminary stage.... intermediate... main... lift off! We wish you a good flight. Everything is all right.

Gagarin:

"Poyekhali !" {pronounced Púeyuckalee}

(translates into Let's Go! or Here We Go!) And with that word; the Space Age began!

Several interesting milestones of Yuri Gagarin's amazing life should be mentioned here:

Later in 1961 Gagarin toured the world lauded as Hero of the Soviet Union, by Nikita Khrushchev. Yuri's visited Italy, Germany, Canada, Brazil, Japan, Egypt and Finland. Three months after the flight, Yuri visited the United Kingdom going to London and Manchester. The rise to "fame" took its toll on Yuri. He was taken out of the political game after some incidents, after a little while Lt. Colonel Gagarin was re-



turned to flight duty. He became Deputy Training Director in Star City cosmonaut training center, in December of 1963. On

February 17th 1968 Dr. Yuri Gagarin defended his thesis on Spaceplane Aerodynamics

Configurations with a flash and a bang! Yet only a month later Yuri and flight instructor Vladimir Seryogin died in a jet plane crash while flying the MiG I5UT1.

The heroes ashes were placed in bricks and they were layer in Moscow's Red Square.

In 2010 a Space Foundation survey ranked Yuri Gagarin in a sixth place tie with fictional James T. Kirk of Star Trek, for the most popular space hero. There have been four commemorative coins minted with his image. Two in the former Soviet Union and two in Russia for anniversaries 20th, 30th, 40h and 50th consecutively. Several places including

cities have been renamed for Yuri Gagarin over the years including his home village Klushino.

Apollo 11 astronauts left momentous of Gagarin and other American astronauts and Russian

Cosmonauts (The fallen who died in the race for space) in a small satchel on the surface of the Moon.

Since 1962, for more than 50

years now April 12th is celebrated as Cosmonautics Day in the East. In 2011 the 12th was declared "International Day of Human Space Flight" by the United

Nations, (and because this is what this article is about) in 2001 Yuri's Night began as a way to

help us to remember the milestones of Space Flight as an international celebration. Next year during Star Trek's 50th anniversary, it will also be the Yuri's Night 15th annual event.



Since 2015, had the theme of Star Wars, (Star Wars Episode VII: The Force Awakens, comes out in December) next year will be Star Trek in theme, so set your phasers on stun and dress in uniform!

Cofounder of Yuri's Night, Loretta H. Whitesides states: "Yuri's Night is also a celebration of the future. Our intention is that it be celebrated 10,000 years in the future, [We hope]

humanity will still remember the

first human to leave Earth. (We will of course be scattered among 12 star sectors by then). I also think there is a link in that Yuri's Night is committed to helping bring about the culture of the scifi (and specifically a Star Trek!) future, to go along with the communicators, replicators, and spaceships, we are creating today. "

There have been many events and historical events which have linked the fictional Star Trek universe with real Space flight and research over the years. While reading a book that was released a couple of years ago Star Trek and History by Nancy Reagin, put something

important to the front of my mind as I write this. As much as we think of Star Trek as a tale

about a positive human story, many of the episodes were written from the standpoint of the past. The Enterprise crew was constantly traveling to the past or having the past brought to them in order to tell a story about the future.

We can't move into the future without paying homage to the pioneers of the past, when we reach out for the Stars, we will need everyone from all walks of

life to help us get there. We will want to do all the things we are comfortable with out there on our voyages, everyone has a role. And there will be new "entry level" work we may not have thought of yet.

## World TB Day

Every year, on 24 March, the world marks World TB Day (WTBD), one of the world's top health challenges with 9 million new TB cases and the deaths of nearly 1.5 million people each year. The Day is an occasion to mobilize political and social commitment for further progress towards eliminating TB as a public health burden by 2035. Scale of the problem:

More than 2 billion people, equal to one third of the world's population are infected with TB out of this, 1 in 10 will go on to develop TB during their lifetime. Out of the overall 13 million TB cases in 2013, 9 million were new cases but consistently 3 million people were either not diagnosed, not treated, or officially not registered by national TB programs (NTPs). Many of those missed will either die, follow some unknown treatment but most will continue to infect others. Major efforts are needed to close this gap as despite

our best efforts, the proportion of missed cases has been nearly the same for the past seven years.

Among those missed are those most vulnerable to falling ill with TB including very poor and/or malnourished or undernourished people, people living with HIV/AIDS, children and women, migrants, prisoners, refugees and internally displaced persons, miners, the elderly, ethnic minorities, indigenous populations, drug users and homeless persons.

What we really mean

The post 2015 End TB Strategy aims to end the TB pandemic by 2035. A dramatic change needs to take place over the next few years in how we fight TB. Our current tools use technology that is old and outdated, with treatment regimens that are long, complicated and with huge side effects, and with a vaccine that is 90 years old and not very effective, with no point of care diagnosis. It is an opportunity to start thinking out of the box through several ways. [In particular....]

4. Broadening the spectrum of partners' engagement in the fight against TB by engaging with partners in tobacco, nutrition, diabetes and others as well as non medical partners to include social development, urban planning, and the private sector.

As we look at our progress in 2016 so far, let's talk about an issue that's at the forefront of many STARFLEET members' minds.

As you may already know, the STAR-FLEET Helpdesk has recently moved from the office of the VCS to CompOps. And as part of that transition, we've been taking a closer look at root causes behind a lot of support tickets that Helpdesk receives. In plain English, there are issues which keep getting reported again and again – some are common questions that have a simple answer, like "how do I change chapters?" and can be answered by our Helpdesk staff or by our Frequently Asked Questions documentation. And others point to a larger problem that needs to be resolved. Sometimes it's a technical bug, like an issue with submitting MSR's in the database, where the DB team will need to diagnose and fix that problem. And sometimes, the problem is caused by a human process not working properly.

Over the past months, more and more Helpdesk tickets have been related to Membership Processing issues. True, some are fixes that need to be manually performed by a Helpdesk staffer (ex. Moving a member from a family membership to an individual membership.) But many have been indicative of a larger problem with MP itself; not only have we been receiving more tickets from members not getting their new membership or renewal processed, or receiving their membership packets, we have also been receiving follow-up tickets complaining that MP did not reply to their original ticket.

At that point, it's not just an issue of a few packets getting lost in the mail, it's an issue of a serious disconnect between MP processes and the membership's needs. The Helpdesk has always served as a "canary in the coalmine,"



warning STARFLEET leadership about urgent technical issues as well as slowly growing staff issues. When we received multiple issues about members with certain email domains not receiving automated emails from the Member Database, we knew we needed to a Web host that wasn't spam-blocked by AOL or other major web domains. When we received multiple reports of members not getting their renewal reminders, we knew it wasn't a matter of a bad email address in the DB, there was an issue with the automated reminder functions that needed to be addressed by the DB team.

And when we received an overwhelming amount of problems with Membership Processing, it was clear the issue was systemic, something where the whole process was breaking down. And the results were widespread and will most likely be long-lasting: members getting disgusted with their stalled membership, letting their membership lapse and not bothering to renew. It devalues STARFLEET membership, and in turn the organization as a whole. Helpdesk staff has been continually overwhelmed by the complaints from angry members, and these complaints have been shared with the CS, both by myself and many others in the membership.

As a result, STARFLEET has responded -Membership Processing is being restaffed, with a new membership team being formed in Kansas to take over the daily operations of MP. In addition, as we roll out our new electronic-only membership packages, we have given members the option of electronic-only packets as well. By choosing "Download" when you join or renew, you can opt to not be sent a membership packet, downloading the membership materials instead. This will not only get materials in members' hands faster, but will also decrease the # of packets being shipped out, cutting down on MP's workload.

This issue is a great illustration of how SFI's departments are interconnected: MP is not under CompOps, but when that department is having issues, it's CompOps that gets the problems. And as much as Helpdesk worked to get answers to members' issues, there's only so much we can do – the department itself needs to change. And now that this change is being made, I am positive that the burden on Helpdesk will lighten, as the MP backlog shrinks.

To you the membership, I want to give my apologies for these membership issues, on behalf of the Helpdesk staff, CompOps and the Executive Committee. But that and \$5 will get you a latte. I also want to give you my promise to do better in the future. And even though CompOps doesn't handle Membership Processing, and can't influence that process very much, there are still changes we can make to do better in the future. To that end, CompOps is moving to a new Helpdesk tool, one that will be more helpful in tracking and reminding departments of their progress of open tickets, to cut down on the number of issues that "fall through the cracks". We will do better.

Commandant's Campaign Award: This is the reporting cycle for units to report activities for the Commandant's Campaign Challenge. Don't know what that is? To quote the 'Marine Force Manual': This ribbon is given for completing or participating (certain criteria may have to be met to qualify) in a Commandant's Campaign. Still not much? This award is issued by the Commandant for those who volunteer in support of 'Toys for Tots' and the 'Special Olympics'. For the 2015 award cycle any hours spent in support of the Sargent Major's 'March for the Disabled' will continue to be counted.

If someone wants to use another project, there is no guarantee that it will count - that will be on a case by case basis as decided by the Commandant.

The data collection period covers from 1 Jan 2015 through 31 Dec 2015. Please have this information to your BDE OIC in the Feb 2016 report. This way I can make sure I get a report from every brigade and nothing gets missed. This info needs to be to me by 28 Feb 2016. If for some reason you forgot to include the information in your unit report, please send an email to your Brigade OIC ASAP with the specifics.

Needed info: Unit #, Rank, Name, SCC#, what project you were involved in, what you did for them, where the activity happened and how many volunteer hours spent. A minimum of 4 hours of service is required for consideration for this award. I will



compile the list and submit it to the Commandant for his consideration.

FORCECOM's Reading Challenge: My DCO BDR Liam Smith has the oversight for this project. This is a year long inter-Corps competition to encourage folks to read more and it's honestly very simple to get involved. You can not count books that you are required to read for work. E-Books do count since you still have to read them. Audio books do not count at this time.

Your Unit OIC will need the following data ASAP and the rest of the year until the June report: Unit #, Rank, Name, SCC# and then the book title, author, ISBN and page count.

The Reading Challenge runs from 1 June to 31 May. I will compile all the data submitted and winners will be announced at IC this year. There are winners for Brigade, Battalion, Unit and individual [adult and cadet]. The top three in each category will receive certificates and first place in each category will be authorized to add a streamer to the Guidon [white with black block letters that says 'READING (year won)'.

Awards and Nominations: As mentioned above, it's coming up on that time

of year to start your thinking about award nomination. As the Sergeant Major is fond of telling me 'If you can't come up with a reason why your unit and it's members are the best of the best, there are problems.'. Okay - I paraphrased that a bit, but it gets the point across.
