

FROM THE ACADEMY

Since the first of the year you have heard me talk about the Moodle request system. This request system is now live and providing the students with the course material they desire; however, it is also causing a problem for the staff that we had never considered would have developed. Because of the high interest in the Academy offerings, the students seem to have forgotten some of the important guidelines we have in place.



With the availability of material, the students are forgetting that we have requested that courses be returned no more than 5 at a time to allow the directors time to grade the submissions. Our directors, who are completely volunteer and with lives outside of the academy, often receive submissions from multiple students daily. Presenting counts of 25 to

50 exams received a day. This response is increased when people submit say 10, 15 or 20 at a

Interesting subjects draw more response than you might believe, and we do understand, you are using your time to accomplish your goals, but please remember to consider the director's.

Many people expect instant gratification and we do try to return the grades as rapidly as possible but there are times when it may take some time to get the exams graded. To paraphrase what you have heard so many times when calling customer services "with the large influx of exams received your exams will be graded in the order received," Also you may not be aware that Academy policy allows for a 2-week period for directors to reply to presented exams. Many directors will have an auto reply saying your material has been received. Please remember there are circumstances in the lives of the Academy Staff as they are in yours. Family problems, deaths, sickness affect us all as do changes in work schedules nor technical outages.

Our Directors and their assistants work as hard as any real-life teacher when it comes to grading. We regrettably add more stress to the situation when they are required to report their grading each month. This is something required to make sure the students get the credits they deserve.

We have awards coming from the Academy for the hard work the students put into the courses and some who receive distinction grades for their work. The Outstanding student of the month are recommended by each director for the students from their colleges and that student who acquires the greatest number of Outstanding student reports is awarded a certificate of achievement for that month. For the students who complete a college with all distinction grades the director can request an Academic Achievement Award, which is recorded in their Fleet database record.

Each month we are activating additional courses from American History to Medicine. So, each month the interested students can have a new challenge. One thing that few are aware of is the work required to provide the best possible product. Each exam goes through a procedure meant to present a final product which is both accurate and written in a clear, understandable way. Each exam is beta tested as many as 3 or 4 times before final proofreading. After this, it is presented to the members of the Academy command staff to make sure it meets the requirements of the Academy. This entire process may take months to complete.

As we start a new year we are looking forward to an increase in the number of students taking advantage of what we are offering. We encourage all of you to look at the courses available which may be something to assist you in the promotion of education.

Writing Promotion Requests

While I have served Fleet in many capacities on Chapter, Region and Executive levels this past year is the first time I've served as a member of the Executive Committee before and therefore I had never had to vote on promotions. This is a rather daunting and time-consuming task. Some of this comes from a lack of understanding of how to submit a promotion request. Instructions are clear on the nuts and bolts of how to use the form but it's a little vague on what details the EC is looking for as we decide who has earned the requested promotion.

The time in grade qualifications are available for each rank. But what the EC is looking for is not at all clear. I posed the question "What are you looking for in a promotion request?" to the rest of the EC. Not surprising most of the answers were the same. Here they are:

- 1. Time in Grade is a qualifier, not a reason for a promotion. Not even if it's been decades.
- 2. Do not list anything they did before their last promotion. (If you do not know their last promotion date ask your CO, your RC, or Linda Kloempken at recognition@sfi.org.) Nothing they did before their last promotion is relevant. We want to know, in detail (dates included), what they've done since to earn *this* promotion. Do not include extraneous phases such as "this person is what I think is the definition of what a STARFLEET officer should be." or "S/He is such a nice person" We assume that, or you wouldn't be putting them in for the promotion in the first place. We go through up to a hundred promotion and award requests a month during summit season, we do not have time to weed through to find the relevant information. If the relevant is buried in the extraneous it could be missed, and the promotion could be unjustly denied.
- 3. Doing their job, no matter how well, is not a reason for a promotion. They are supposed to do their job and they are supposed to do it well. If they have gone above and beyond their job tell us about that, but give us details don't just say "they go above and beyond". What you consider above and beyond and what we consider above and beyond may be different. As an example: My job as Chief of Communications, among other duties, includes putting out the CQ on time, every time if I do that for the next 2 years, I am merely doing my job not going above and beyond. My predecessor on the other hand, accepted the job knowing the CQs were a year behind. He caught them up and got them on track and kept them that way (as well as doing his other duties). He took on a task others had walked away from and no one else wanted -that is going above and beyond.
- 4. Organizing or significantly contributing to a single event (ie: Region Summit, International Conference, convention, recruiting drive, charitable event) is not enough to warrant a flag promotion. It is a factor but not enough on its own. Multiples of any or all between promotions could be.
- 5. Taking SFI Academy courses (other than OTS and OCC) alone, no matter how many, is not a reason for a promotion. Please do not waste our time with listing the courses they have taken. If they have created a course or taken on the running of a college or some other Academy Staff position **since their last promotion**, please include those details.
- 6. When you are requesting promotions, we are looking for:
 - a. Fleet Captain/Brigadier: **details** of significant activity for their chapter and/or other chapters in their region and/or local community and/or involvement in/contribution to their Region.
 - b. Commodore/Brigadier General: **details** of continued activity for their chapter and/or other chapters in their region and/or local community plus significant involvement in/contribution to their region and/or STARFLEET.
 - c. Rear Admiral/Major General: details of continued activity for their chapter and/or other





- chapters in their region and/or local community, continued significant involvement in/contribution to their region and involvement on/contribution to STARFLEET.
- d. Vice Admiral/Lieutenant General: **details** of continued significant involvement in/contributions to their region and details of significant involvement on/contribution to STARFLEET.
- e. Admiral/General requires details of continued significant involvement on/contribution to STARFLEET.
- NOTES: As with merely doing your job not counting as significant involvement or going above and beyond, merely attending chapter/local/region or STARFLEET events does not count as significant involvement/contribution. We're looking for things like manning booths at conventions. Manning recruiting tables. Going to conventions or other events in uniforms or other costumes and actively promoting STARFLEET not just Trek fandom, things of that nature.
- You do not have to have a Region or STARFLEET title to contribute to the Region or to STARFLEET. For example, I know several members of Fleet who routinely attend local conventions and activities and actively recruit. Not everyone the members meet is local to them so they either give the person contact information for the chapters or, with permission, pass on the person's contact information to the chapters, that are local to them.

This is a significant contribution to their Region and STARFLEET.





Labour Day & Canterbury Appiversary Day in New Zealand

While many New Zealanders have been enjoying a Monday off, their right to enjoy it was the result of some very had work.

Labour Day commemorates the struggle for an eighthour working day, a right that carpenter Samuel Parnell had famously fought for in 1840. He believed a workday day, which is a public holiday. Canterbury Province's was should be eight hours long, leaving eight hours for sleep and eight for recreation.

The first Labour Day was held on 28 October 1890, and it has been a statutory public holiday since 1900. On that of Canterbury in New Zealand. day several thousand trade union members and supporters attended parades in the main city centres. Government employees were given the day off to attend these parades and many businesses closed for at least part of the day. These early parades drew huge crowds and unionists and supporters marched behind colourful banners and floats and they were often followed by picnics and sports events.

However, despite the fun being had, the parades were being held for a much more serious reason to highlight, and protest to change, the long and unreasonable hours Anniversary Day on Dominion Day (the 4th Monday in people were being forced to work. Unionists wanted the September). All other regions in New Zealand have their Liberals to pass legislation enforcing an eight-hour day for own Anniversary Day public holidays. Essentially, like all workers, but the government was reluctant to Labour Day, Anniversary Day is now just another holiday antagonise the business community. What the Liberals did to most New Zealanders.

do was make Labour Day a holiday. The Labour Day Act of 1899 created a statutory public holiday on the second Wednesday in October, but the holiday was 'Mondayised' in 1910, and since then it has been held on the fourth Monday in October.

Although unionists and their supporters continued to hold popular gatherings and sports events, by the 1920s Labour Day had begun to decline as a public spectacle. For most New Zealanders, it was now just another holiday.

Each New Zealand province celebrates an anniversary originally on 16 December, the day of the 1850 arrival of the Charlotte Jane and the Randolph, the first two of four ships to carry emigrants from England to the new colony

However, the A&P (Agricultural and Pastoral) show, which is held annually had its Friday Show Day set for many years as the People's Day. So, in the late 1950s, the Christchurch City Council moved the province's Anniversary Day to coincide with the show and encourage greater crowds. The holiday is presently defined as the "second Friday after the first Tuesday in November", ensuring that it will follow the Melbourne Cup Racing Carnival. This change is observed in northern and middle Canterbury, but southern Canterbury instead observes its

2017 BRITISH TRANSPLANT GAMES

I signed up for the British Transplant Games in April last year, just after I started archery for the first time. The reason? I had undergone a lifesaving and life-changing dual transplant of kidney and pancreas. I was an insulin-dependent type 1 diabetic for 37 years (diagnosed at age three-and-a-half), which unfortunately resulted in end-stage renal failure in the tail end of 2008.



After around four years of renal dialysis, I received "the call" on the 23rd July 2012 and underwent the transplants through the night. I woke up with a new kidney and pancreas, and everything worked as soon as they were "plumbed" in. The feeling of not being constantly tired, bloated, or sick is a feeling like none other; and going from drinking 1 litre of fluid maximum a day to being encouraged to drinking at least 8 litres a day is a different feeling entirely! The biggest change for me was that after 37 years of constantly checking blood sugars and doing injections up to 6 times a day, doing nothing was a culture- and life-changer that I still can't get over. Even now five years in, I still do the odd blood sugar test "just to check!"

Around 6 months in, I was at a transplant clinic; and my transplant co-ordinator asked if I wanted to know anything about my donor. There was limited information she could give me; however, I was told that my donor was a young man named Toby and that he had died of a brain haemorrhage. He had signed up to the organ donor registry, and he had made it known to his family that he wanted to donate. I asked if I could send a thank-you card to the family; I was told I could, but not to expect a reply. It took me awhile to write, as I wasn't sure what to put in; but the initial card was a thank-you.

I then went on our first holiday abroad to Italy in 2015 and sent Toby's family a card with a picture of a sunset of Lake Garda, where we stayed. We received a card back and it described that Toby's last holiday with the family was at Lake Garda. I had just bought a motorcycle; and Toby's father had just bought a motorcycle, as this is what Toby had wanted before he died. The similarities were amazing. I then made the decision to do the games, in Toby's and his family's honour and memory.

TEAM

My team was the Edinburgh Transplant Team (the team you are on is determined by where you had your transplant) and consisted of 38 members including supporters. Last year the team gained 15 medals overall; this year we gained a total of 45 medals!

Everyone in the team above has had a transplant, whether it is a kidney, liver, or kidney and pancreas. There were teams taking part from all over the country, including Bristol, Portsmouth, Ireland, and the Shetlands! The only criterion for taking part in the games is that you must have had a transplant or be a living donor.

THE FIRST DAY - WISHAW SPORTS CENTRE, NORTH LANARKSHIRE

The opening day was my event, archery. I had been training quite hard up to four times a week, including the odd trip to Perth to shoot at their club. I shoot on a Wednesday night, a Saturday Evening, a Sunday evening, and the odd Friday night at Perth. Over the whole day, there were 140 contestants; and these ranged from experienced archers to competitors who had never picked up a bow before and all different age categories. I was in the experienced and... ahem... 40-49-year age group.

I went in to the competition just wanting to honour Toby, not knowing if I would get a good enough score (I looked at last year's scores, the highest of which was 202; so, I figured if I got around the 200 mark I would be doing well!) The round was 2 dozen arrows, in 3 arrows an end. The target I was on had 3 other people from 3 different age groups and categories, and there was a great sense of humour and togetherness between us. It was a feeling you can't describe. When I shoot, I normally know if it is going to be a good competition by the way the first couple of arrows hit; and I started off pretty well, hitting nines.

The weather was typical Scottish weather, four seasons in one. It started off dull, then we had a shower, then it was roasting sun, then overcast again. Hey, we are archers; we shoot all weathers! All the judges and scorers were volunteers from various clubs, and some had travelled up from down south. The targets were loaned from various clubs around Lanarkshire. The experienced age group finished, and then it was just a case of waiting around for scores.

My wife and 2nd Officer, LT Maryellen Strang, Chief of Science for the *Independent*, Chief Engineer Niki Vielma, Andy Pryde, and my parents attended to cheer me on. The biggest surprise was that my friend, LT James Saunders from the *Independent*, and his wife had travelled up from Buckinghamshire to cheer me on!

After a long wait, the scores were announced. David, Ruth, and Rob, all shooting on my target, received gold for their categories; and I received gold and first place with 214 points! I just

Also on Friday, there were events such as Volleyball, Fishing, Golf, Tennis, and Table Tennis.

In the evening, we headed over to Motherwell Civic Centre for an evening of Darts competition and a Ceildh. Four of our team were in the Darts competition; and one came second, gaining a silver medal. The Ceildh was well-attended, with instructions given on the various dances and moves involved, although unfortunately, my kilt kept getting in the way... ahem...

DAY 3

Saturday saw us head over to Coatbridge Indoor Bowling Club to support five of our team who were taking part.

Saturday evening saw the donor run, mini-marathon, and fun run held at Strathclyde Park. LT Maryellen Strang of the Space Station *Independent* took part in the 5k donor run, which is open to all affected by transplants, including relatives and families. The weather was the lovely Scottish weather – torrential rain. It was wet, it was windy, and it was cold. However, just as the race started, the rain stopped! Mary completed her run in just over 42 minutes, and got her own well-deserved gold medal!

DAY 4

Sunday played host to the athletics and track day, which involved various activities from discus throwing, javelin, shotput, and races of various distances such as 400m, 100m, the kilt run, and the relay. It was quite amusing to see our team compete with people from south of the border in kilts.

To make the event more bittersweet, when we got back I received a card from the donor family, wishing me luck (it arrived late due to the route it has to take) and letting me know that the day of my first event would have been Toby's 22^{nd} birthday. Toby (my donor) was certainly shining down that day. Because of his gift of life, I am able to live and do something I would never have been able to do five years ago.

Would I do the Transplant games again? Let's just say the qualifying for the World Games is at next year's event, and I have already signed up to a lawn bowling club; so I will be doing archery, darts, ten-pin bowling, and lawn bowls next year, but my main focus is archery. The

Blade Runner, an iconic 1982 science fiction movie, acclaimed world-wide as a cult film and now regarded by many as one of the all-time best science fiction movies. In fact, it was highly influential for many subsequent science fiction films, TV series and video games.

The premise, the movie follows Deckard, a *Blade Runner* who is forced by the police to continue his old job: hunt Replicants. A Replicant being a bio-engineered android that appears remarkably human. His assignment: eliminate four escaped Replicants from the colonies who have returned to Earth. Before starting the job, Deckard goes to the Tyrell Corporation and he meets Rachel, a Replicant girl he falls in love with.

So why would a classic science fiction movie need a sequel? The first story ends on a perfect note of uncertainty. What could a sequel do, except ruin that ambiguity? Well, you have to find out, don't you? So, when *Blade Runner* 2049 was announced we knew a revisit to the original *Blade Runner* was called for and for two of the 376th MEU Marines, their first visit.

Like all 80's movies the original *Blade Runner* is slow, yet complex, no playing with your cell phone while watching this movie, you'll miss something. The film creates the impression of a bleak, even hopeless, future for society as everyone hustles and bustles about business. The perpetual rain, darkness and shadow give the impression of a society, or world, that has lost its way. The human race appears quite disillusioned, having long since learned to live with the emptiness of their existence, they lack spirit, drive and direction. As a result, the Replicants appear more 'human' in their resolve, they still have hope, they still have direction.

Now, *Blade Runner* 2049. Hmmm, this movie tried too hard to be the original. A slow and quiet movie. Officer K, a new *Blade Runner* for the Los Angeles Police Department, unearths a long-buried secret that has the potential to plunge what's left of society into chaos. His discovery leads him on a quest to find Rick Deckard, a former



discovery leads him on a quest to find Rick Deckard, a former *Blade Runner* who's been missing for 30 years.

Thoughts without spoilers, as a stand-alone film, fine, as an action film, it had its moments, but as a *Blade Runner* sequel, very disappointing. It might be worth watching for the cinematography alone, there is so many interesting details and you find yourself trying to look for landscape comparisons from the first film but storyline, a let-down and quite dull. The music, a dark, melodic combination of classical composition in the original 80's movie that enhanced the cinematic experience but was left mismatched in 2049, relying on being as loud as possible rather than enhancing dramatic scenes. We all agreed that it was 3-hours of our life we would never get back.


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Welcome to the Minneapolis Skyway System!

What is the Minneapolis Skyway System, you ask? It's an interlinked collection of footbridges that travel throughout downtown Minneapolis. Want to stay in climate controlled conditions while you wander throughout the downtown area? This is your way to do it. This system spans over 80 city

blocks or 11 miles, making it the longest system of its kind in the world!

The system started back in the 1960's when the first skyways were planned. Today, the system connects second and third floors of various office towers, hotels. banks. corporate government offices, restaurants, and retail **Nicollet** the Mall shopping district, the Mayo Clinic Square, and the sports facilities at Target Center, Target Field and U.S. Bank Stadium.

This website offers searchable interactive maps that allow you to find exactly what sites you're looking for as well as navigate the entire system. 
