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The Story of *The Starry Night (1889)*

"This morning I saw the countryside from my window a long time before sunrise, with nothing but the morning star, which looked very big," wrote van Gogh to his brother Theo, describing his inspiration for one of his best-known paintings, The Starry Night (1889). The window to which he refers was in the Saint-Paul asylum in Saint-Rémy, in southern France, where he sought respite from his emotional suffering while continuing to make art.

Boring Legal Stuff & Requisite Disclaimers

As the Commander STARFLEET, I often get asked the question, "Why do we do that?" Well, in this series of articles, I am going to do my best to answer those questions.

We are a fan club. Why are we even incorporated at all? This is a great question that comes up on a regular basis. I have been explaining the reasoning to people privately for a while now, but I think it's time to explain it to everyone.

Having STARFLEET incorporated means that the group is its own legal entity. This designation gives a ton of protection to the members, for not a lot of work.

Each year, all we have to do to remain an incorporated body is fill out a little form in North Carolina and pay a small fee. So, that is the work; but what about the protection?

First and foremost, being incorporated gives us the ability to transfer easily from one Administration to another. Because STARFLEET exists in a legal sense, we do not have the problem of a single person getting upset and taking all the work with them if they leave. After all, we have seen far too many groups break off from our ranks, build a membership base, get tired of running things and leave their members high and dry when they quit. We are protected from that with the incorporated status.

Secondly, being incorporated allows us to get bank accounts that actually belong to STARFLEET. I know there are other ways to get a bank account for a group, but this way allows us to have all the security of any other corporation. On top of that, there is no commingling of monies (personal funds and STARFLEET funds residing in the same account). Having these separate accounts and the bank knowing our security policies is just another way that being incorporated can protect the membership. Being incorporated helps protect not only the members but also the EC and AB. Without a STARFLEET entity, the members of the Board would be considered owners of the organization. What that would

mean for them is that their assets and STARFLEET assets would be the same under the law. Why is this a problem? Well if a member gets angry and decides to sue STARFLEET, and we were not a separate legal entity, the person suing could request personal items as well as STARFLEET funds for restitution. As much as I care for this organization, I am not willing to put my house on the line for it. Without that separate legal entity, any money that the organization made would get distributed to the Board; and they would be responsible for all the taxes owing to that. Fortunately, we are a corporation. Only STARFLEET assets are available for possible restitution, and STARFLEET's money is its own.

Lastly, incorporating allowed STARFLEET to apply to the IRS to be a 501(c)(7) not-for-profit organization. This brings me to the next question I get asked a lot.

Why are we a Not-for-Profit at all? Once again, the benefits of this far outweigh the time reporting. Each year we are required to file a 990 with the IRS, which shows our activity was all related to our mission. While this does take a little time, it is very much worth it to the Fleet.

The most important benefit of being a non-profit is that we do not have to pay corporate *income* tax.

Right now the corporate income tax rate is 21%, if we had to pay this then \$1.05 of every membership would end up going to the IRS. Being a 501(c)(7) doesn't get us out of all taxes. We still pay sales tax and some other little taxes, but getting out of *income* tax is a huge benefit for the Fleet.

But doesn't being a not-for-profit mean we can't make any money? Actually, no, this is a misconception that a lot of people have; but a non-profit *can* make money. The definition of a non-profit (or not-for-profit, the terms are used interchangeably) is that no person or group of people can get a distribution of profits or dividends. More simply, it means that all the money made by the organization has to be used to achieve its goals or for the betterment of the organization. I have worked at many non-profits over the years, and they could pay salaries, buy gifts, or reimburse mileage. As long as there is no owner taking the profits away to buy a boat, we are good.

So, does that mean that my membership fee is tax-deductible? Unfortunately no, while we do count as a non-profit, we do not count as a charity. One day, however, I could see us turning the scholarship program into a separate subsidiary, and that would be tax-deductible. But that is a conversation for another day.

So, those are four of the questions I get asked most as CS. Hopefully, I was able to help everyone understand them a little better. As always, if you have questions, you can always email me at CS@SFI.ORG. Just please remember that we are very busy at HQ, so don't get upset if it takes a couple of days to get a response. Next time, I think we will go through the order of our documents and what to do when there is a conflict between them. Until then, fair winds and following seas.

Since the middle of May, a lot of the discussions I've been having with Regional Coordinators, Chapter Commanding Officers, and the members-at-large involve the EU's new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and, in a post-Brexit world, the UK's own Data Protection Acts. Due to the nature of my profession, I've been embroiled in GDPR training and have learned what I could about those laws. Through those conversations with the members mentioned earlier and a well-attended Ask Me Anything (AMA) held last month, I feel that there are still several questions concerning what needs to change in our organization to comply with this law.

STARFLEET, along with all the other corporate entities on the planet, has decided to implement GDPR as a global policy. Therefore, GDPR protections are now enjoyed by all members of STARFLEET, whether they live in the EU or not.

GDPR went into effect on 25 May 2018, and it changes the nature of how we conduct ourselves within STARFLEET. Failure to comply with this may result in fines that could end the organization by bankrupting us or possibly end our affiliations with our European members. The everyday things we do within the Membership Database, like looking up a fellow member, using elevated access to find email addresses to reach out to members, these are protected under this new law. According to the regulations, the following personally identifying information items that we use within our organization to identify a member are protected:

First, middle, and last names / Birthdate/Age.

Physical Address.

Email Address. / IP addresses.

Internally Assigned Numbers (SCCs)*

* With SCCs we must be careful, as collecting, accessing, or transporting any information that has both the SCC and any other identifying information falls under GDPR.

STARFLEET chapters having international members with rights under GDPR will find themselves needing to alter their day-to-day use of the database. An example of this change will affect the oft-used CSV printouts. GDPR protects against what's known as unencrypted Data Transport, which includes printing a CSV of information on a piece of paper and leaving it out in the open. If you're a Chapter CO with a member from the EU on your ship, and you print their personal information and then lose that printout, that's a Data Breach under GDPR; and you must notify the STARFLEET Helpdesk immediately. If you enjoy elevated access to the Database and use your rights to look up another member and then disclose any personal information to another member who does not have those rights, that's also a Data Breach and puts the organization at risk. Notify the STARFLEET Helpdesk immediately.

Following a Data Breach, STARFLEET is required by law to notify those affected. If we do not, we're in violation of the law. Any EU citizen affected by said breach may then file a complaint to the local Data Protection Authority (DPA); they will investigate our organization to determine the damage done to the affected member(s) and assess whether any sanctions or fines will be levied on us.

It is of the utmost importance that we remember that any member trusted with access to this information has a duty and responsibility to protect that data at all costs under this new regulation. Those who break that trust will find their access removed, as they pose a catastrophic risk to STARFLEET by not placing that trust above all else.

This year, at the International Conference, I will be leading and participating in discussions with the attending members on how to modify access, transport, and consent behaviors under GDPR. After my talking with its Commandant and Vice-Commandant, STARFLEET Academy is currently working on a new set of courses for all members on GDPR compliance in day-to-day access and how to report breaches to the STARFLEET Helpdesk at http://helpdesk.sfi.org.

Data Protection is a team effort. Every member must contribute to make our compliance a success. By working together, we can ensure that we're doing the right thing by all members by ensuring that we protect the personal information placed in our hands. If we allow any misconduct to go unreported, we're breaking the trust given to us by our members; we're breaking the law, and we're putting the future of the organization at great risk.

ACADEMY COMMANDANT

This issue I will be giving you a brief overview of the **Institute of Military Studies.**

For those interested in the security of the Fleet and its history, we have an online set of courses covering the job and history of Security Officers. You can take the exams directly and receive your grades shortly after completion.

Courses in strategy and tactics have you considering the actions of ships in the Fleet in various situations.

Richard Hewitt says:

I am the Director of 5 schools in the Institute of Military Studies. Remember, if you do not learn from the past, you are doomed to repeat it.

- A Nation's Beginnings (CMIK-NB) will test your knowledge of US military history from the distant past through the creation of the United States. In this school, we will cover the Anglo-American War of 1812, both on land and on the seas, the American Revolution, the French and Indian War, and the Mexican-American War.
- Ancient Military Knowledge (CMIK-AMK) will test your knowledge of military history from the Egyptian wars through Alexander the Great.
- Coming of Age (CMIK-CA) explores the military actions from after the American Civil War through the Spanish-American War and World War I.
- Military Trivia (CMIK-MT) will test your knowledge of general military history and military-related facts.
- ◆ The Electronic Age (CMIK-EA) will test your knowledge of recent military history, from the Korean War to present.

This school is a fun yet informative college where you just might learn something along the way. Hope to see you taking some of my courses soon.

We have courses available in world military history, from the Vikings through the Norman invasions and the Hundred Years War, to the Napoleonic Wars, the Greeks, Romans, and the Crusades, and how these conflicts influenced the world. We have courses on the history of some noted naval ships, some of which will test your knowledge of what the types of ships looked like.

We have several courses for military enthusiasts interested in subjects from camouflage and defensive tactics to rappelling and the various types of operations. You can pick up information on military equipment, helicopter flight, weapons identification and safety, or communications. You may be interested in the US Special Forces and their histories and training, as well as the special operations troops of other countries around the world.

For those who are not interested in the military but are interested in American History, the Institute of History and Government—IOHG has courses on historical sites and the US Presidents.

You will find a selection of other subjects ranging from Art Appreciation to International history, including Asian studies, African studies, and Middle Eastern history in the Institute of International studies—IOIS.

In our recently expanded Institute of Medicine, there are courses in Medical specialties and Human Anatomy, with more courses being added regularly. There are courses in STARFLEET Medicine, the doctors and nurses of *Star Trek*, as well as real-life space medicine and cancer studies. We have been expanding this college and seeing spinoff courses in Traditional Medicine, Mortuary Science, and Chiropractic Medicine.











If there is a subject you do not see in the catalog, let us know; some Colleges have been closed but can be reopened if there is interest in the subjects. Our prime purpose is to serve the members of STARFLEET by providing information on subjects which are *Star Trek* related and otherwise.

You can now take several subjects online, accessing the courses for download directly from the Academy system, where you do not have to wait to receive them. These are things you can do in one day, when rain prevents you from doing things outside, or you just want to explore the Academy.

Our Directors stand ready to assist if you have questions about courses or need courses graded and entered into the database. If your ship has taken on a challenge to see who can take the greatest number of courses, we will work with you to help you along.

Crusades Military Knowledge

If you are a fan of medieval times, knights, and the Crusades I invite you to visit the College of Crusades Military Knowledge! The college is currently undergoing updating, and we are in the final phase-Beta Testing. What is new you ask? Manuals have been created for each exam. Therefore, students no longer need to hunt the web for their answers, cutting down on the time required to take the exams. The original exam on The Religious Knights has been expanded to three exams. This gives students a closer look at the orders of the Knights Templar, the Knights Hospitaller and the Teutonic Knights.

Once the updates have been approved, there will be 17 courses available covering all the Crusades. There are no pre-requisites and the courses can be taken in any order. The courses cover the military aspects of the Crusades, as implied in the title of the College. While they are not an in-depth study of the Crusades, they give an overview, and may just encourage you to want to learn more!

Civil War Military Knowledge

The Civil War, between The United States of America and The Confederate States of America was the devastating war in the United States. This war pitted fellow citizens, neighbors, friends and families against each other. Even though The United States prevailed, both sides suffered heavy losses. The Civil War College of Military Knowledge covers the battles fought during the war. The student will meet famed Generals Robert E. Lee and Ulysses S. Grant. You will be introduced to the battle sites themselves and recount the way the battles unfolded. Students will also get a sense of the hopes for a quick end to the war and the despondence as it dragged on. The final meeting between Lee and Grant at Appomattox stands in stark contrast to all their meetings on the battlefield; a first step towards reuniting a broken nation.

Some of the battles that are covered are Shiloh, Antietam, Chancellorsville, Vicksburg, Gettysburg, Chattanooga and Sherman's March to the Sea. There are also courses covering the naval battles fought during the Civil War, including one course dedicated to the battle between the USS Monitor and the CSS Virginia. There are 162 courses to choose from in the Civil War College. There are no pre-requisites and the exams can be taken in any order. Currently there are no manuals for the exams; all answers can be found on the web, mostly at Wikipedia.com, however, there are plans to create manuals for the exams soon. So, whether you are a history buff or just want to learn more about this chapter in United States history, please stop by and peruse the Civil War College!

Roman War Military Knowledge

Welcome to summer for those in the Northern Hemisphere and to winter for those in the Southern Hemisphere! Here's what will be happening in the sky during the next couple of months.

The Moon will be New on July 13, which means it will be between the Earth and the Sun, rising and setting when the Sun does. This will cause a partial solar eclipse visible from southern Australia close to Melbourne, from Tasmania, and from Antarctica near Dumont d'Urville Station (where *March of the Penguins* was filmed). The Moon's orbit is inclined at a 5-degree angle, so most months we don't get a solar eclipse at New Moon (typical years have two solar eclipses; there will be three during 2018). New Moon is a good time to view the sky from a site far from city



lights. There will be a Full Moon on July 27, which means the Earth will be between the Moon and the Sun, so the Moon rises when the Sun sets and sets when the Sun rises. The longest lunar eclipse of the 21st century will happen during this Full Moon: 103 minutes for Eastern Africa and Central Asia. It will also be visible after moonrise for South America, Western Africa, and Europe, and before moonset over Eastern Asia and Australia. Full Moon is a good time to observe the Moon, since it is up all night; and you can see the entire near side of the Moon (when it is not being eclipsed, of course). The Moon will be New again on August 11, causing another partial solar eclipse, this one visible from northeast Canada, Greenland, Scotland, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Latvia, Russia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia, and China. The Moon will be Full again on August 26.

Mercury is the closest planet to the Sun, which can make it challenging to observe. On July 12, it will be 26 degrees West of the Sun (just two degrees less than the farthest it ever gets from the Sun), making that a good time to observe Mercury in the evening shortly after sunset. Those who prefer mornings should go outside on August 26, when Mercury will be 18 degrees East of the Sun and so will be observable in the morning shortly before dawn.

Venus will be visible in the early evening during these months. On July 15, Venus will be about 1.5 degrees from the waxing crescent Moon shortly after sunset to viewers in North America. Venus will be 46 degrees from the Sun on August 17, making that a good evening to see Venus for a while after sunset.

On July 31, Mars will be 58 million kilometers away, the closest it's been to Earth since 2003. Between July 7 and September 6, Mars will be the fourth brightest object in the sky after the Sun, the Moon, and Venus. It will be at its brightest between July 21 and August 3. Mars will be in opposition (on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun) on July 27, when it will be four times brighter than Sirius and twice as bright as Jupiter. Be sure to look at it if you are in the path of the July 27 lunar eclipse.

Jupiter and Saturn will be visible in the evening during these months. If you have access to a



telescope, look at Jupiter to see its cloud bands and its four largest moons, and at Saturn to see its rings and its largest moon, Titan.

The Perseids meteor shower will peak in the evening of August 12. The waxing crescent Moon will set shortly after the Sun, making the rest of the night a great opportunity to view meteors from dark sites in the Northern Hemisphere.

So that's what's going on in the sky during July and August of 2018. But, of course, the July/August sky will also contain all the stars, galaxies, globular clusters, and nebulae that they always do.

A prominent trio of stars in the Northern Hemisphere is the Summer Triangle, which is overhead for latitudes between 9 and 45 degrees North during the Northern Summer. It consists of Altair (to which the *Enterprise* was heading before Mr. Spock diverted it to Vulcan in *Amok Time*), Deneb (home to the Denebian Slime Devil), and Vega (where the Vega colony was located). All three are bright stars and so are easily found, even from sites that aren't very dark. If you are at a dark site, you will be able to see the Milky Way going through the middle of the Summer Triangle. If you have access to binoculars and a dark site, you can see how the Milky Way is made up of an astronomically large number of stars. The Summer Triangle can also be seen from parts of the Southern Hemisphere north of about 40 degrees

south. (Altair is visible to almost the entire planet, but one star doesn't make a very good triangle.) Close to Deneb is a double star known as Albireo, which is an amazing sight if you have access to a telescope because the brighter star is very yellow, and the dimmer star is very blue, providing a dramatic color contrast. Another not-to-be-missed telescope object is the Ring Nebula (M57) in Lyra, south of Vega. The Ring Nebula is a planetary nebula that was formed when a red giant star expelled much of its outer layer on its way to becoming a white dwarf. The Hercules globular cluster (M13) of hundreds of thousands of stars is also an excellent place to point your telescope. It's located between Vega and Arcturus.

The Southern Hemisphere also has a famous set of stars, which gave its name to a song by Crosby, Stills, and Nash that reached number 18 on the Billboard Hot 100 in 1982: The Southern Cross. With a declination of 60 degrees south, it is a southern constellation that is directly overhead only to people who are north of Antarctica and south of South America, Africa, and Australia. But it can be seen by



The Southern Cross is one of the most recognizable patterns of stars in the southern night sky, and forms part of the constellation Crux. The Southern Cross itself is actually classed as an asterism (as is the Summer Triangle), not a constellation, as the word 'constellation' applies to 88 specific areas of the whole night sky.

everyone in the Southern Hemisphere and the most southern parts of the Northern Hemisphere. Although bright, none of the stars in the Southern Cross are particularly famous. But nearby in the sky is Alpha Centauri, which is the closest star system to our Solar System. The Alpha Centauri system includes three stars, the brightest of which (Alpha Centauri A) is just a little bit more massive than our own Sun. The Southern Hemisphere has some remarkable astronomical objects visible to the naked eye, including the Large and Small Magellanic Clouds (irregular galaxies that orbit the Milky Way) and Omega Centauri (the Galaxy's largest globular cluster).

If you don't have a telescope, I highly recommend going to a star party, where knowledgeable people with telescopes who can show you the objects discussed above (assuming they are visible from your location, of course), plus many more. To find public star parties in the United States, go to the NASA Night Sky Network site at https://nightsky.jpl.nasa.gov/clubs-and-events.cfm and tell it your location. It will provide you with a calendar of events in your area. For those outside the United States, search the web for Star Party and the name of your city or country.


CANCER ("crab") is the 9th biggest zodiac constellation, and the 31st largest constellation overall, taking up a 1.2% area of the sky. It is visible during autumn to spring from northern hemisphere locations, although best seen during the month of March. The brightest star in Cancer is <u>Al Tarf</u> (Beta Cancri), an orange giant situated 290 light years away of magnitude +3.5. Deep-Sky Objects (<u>DSOs</u>) in the constellation include galaxies (NGC 2775, NGC 2535 & NGC 2536, NGC 2500, NGC 2608), and star clusters (Messier 44, Messier 67). The one meteor shower associated with Cancer is called the Delta Cancrids.



LEO ("lion") is the 3rd biggest zodiac constellation, and the 12th largest constellation overall, taking up a 2.3% area of the sky. It is visible during the winter to spring time from northern hemisphere locations, although best seen during the month of April. The brightest star in Leo is Regulus (Alpha Leonis), a multiple system lying 77 light years distant of magnitude +1.35. Deep-Sky Objects (DSOs) in the constellation include numerous galaxies (Messier 65, Messier 66, Messier 95, Messier 96, Messier 105, NGC 3628, NGC 3607, NGC 3593, NGC 3384, NGC 3842, NGC 3596, NGC 2903, NGC 3626, NGC 3357), as well huge quasar groups (CCLQG, Huge-LQG)....



VIRGO ("virgin") is the largest zodiac constellation, and the 2nd largest constellation overall, taking up a 3.1% area of the sky. It is visible during the spring and summer time from northern hemisphere locations, although best seen during the month of May. The brightest star in Virgo is <u>Spica</u> (Alpha Virginis), a multiple system situated 260 light years away of magnitude +1.04. Deep-Sky Objects (<u>DSOs</u>) in the constellation include numerous galaxies (Messier 49, Messier 58, Messier 59, Messier 60, Messier 61, Messier 84, Messier 86, Messier 87, Messier 89, Messier 90, Messier 104, NGC 4435 & NGC 4438, NGC 4216, NGC 4567 & NGC 4568, NGC 4526, NGC 4261), and a quasar called 3C 273. The two meteor shower associated with Virgo includes the Virginids, and the Mu Virginids.





DEBORAH LACEY TALKS TO USS ANGELES ABOUT ST: DEEP SPACE 9

Deborah Lacey never gave up on Star Trek.

"I auditioned for the part Whoopi Goldberg got," the actress told USS *Angeles* members during our 23rd-anniversary party March 17 at Jeremy Kranz's home in Northridge in the Los Angeles area. *The Star Trek: The Next Generation* role of Guinan went to Goldberg.

Lacey tried out for other *Star Trek* roles such as Kasidy Yates, Sisko's eventual wife. Penny Jerald Johnson was cast instead. But Lacey remained optimistic.

"I was determined. I had auditioned for *Star Trek* for years, and I knew this was the last season (of *Deep Space Nine*)," Lacey said. "For years, they had been trying to find something on *Star Trek* for me."

The role came for her when she was cast as Sarah Sisko, CAPT Benjamin Sisko's mother possessed by the Prophet, in the final season of *DS9*.

Lacey praised Avery Brooks, who starred as Sisko, for being very supportive of her on the set and giving her helpful advice for their scenes together.

"The first time we saw each other was in the makeup trailer," Lacey said. "He saw me over there. He immediately jumped out of his seat: 'Deborah Lacey!' I thought, 'You're going to introduce yourself to me! I don't have to come to you!" Lacey said. "He was a gentleman. From that day on, we just clicked. We were inseparable."

Lacey said the *DS9* writers noticed the chemistry between them and incorporated that into the scenes Sisko had with Sarah.

"I'm getting chills remembering it," Lacey said. "The director said, 'You guys have this little dance going on.' We were not even aware. We got close because of him (Brooks). He was so generous."

Lacey said she confessed to Brooks that she felt uncertain about acting with him. Like some other actors, she felt intimidated by Brooks' talent.

"He said, 'No, no, no. You're not trying to be my equal. You are the person who created me," Lacey said. "From that point on, he lifted me. So, I became Sarah."

Lacey said she saw a certain magic in Brooks that inspired her as she played Sarah.

"I was so proud of Avery that I wanted the mother to be proud of the son," Lacey said.

She said fans frequently ask about her first scene in which her face appears in the sand in Sisko's vision. She explained she never had to go to the desert, where the episode was filmed. It was all done through makeup and special effects.

Lacey discussed her TV and movie career, which started with her appearances on *The White Shadow* in 1979 and 1981 and continued with guest spots on iconic shows such as *ER* and *The A-Team*.

Lacey said Angela Lansbury, the star and executive producer of *Murder She Wrote*, cast her as an insurance agent without an audition. Lansbury made her decision after watching a videotape of Deborah's work.

From 2007 to 2010, Lacey played Carla, the Draper family's housekeeper, on AMC's *Mad*

Her more recent work includes *The Fosters*, a 2014-15 series in which she played attorney Marie. She portrayed a journalist in the 2015 movie *Straight Outta Compton*, Tressie in the 2016 film *Love Under New Management: The Miki Howard Story*, and Margret in the 2017 short *Atone*.

An Interview with Loretta H. Whitesides, Yuri's Night Co-Founder

Loretta Hidalgo Whitesides is a public speaker, co-creator of Yuri's Night, and an author on space exploration. She accumulated over five hours of weightless time as a Flight Director for Zero-G Corporation and plans to travel to space as a "Founder Astronaut" on Virgin Galactic's SpaceShipTwo with her husband, George T. Whitesides, current CEO of Virgin Galactic in Long Beach, California.

Ms. Whitesides received a bachelor's degree in biology from Stanford and a master's from Cal Tech, with a particular interest in astrobiology. In relation to that work she appeared in the 3D IMAX documentary, *Aliens of the Deep*, traveling alongside director James Cameron to hydrothermal vents two miles under the ocean. She has also visited Haughton impact crater in the arctic, to study plants surviving in extreme environments.

I have personally known Ms. Whitesides for 3 years, and she is a wonderful personality and a loving mother of two. She is always trying to encourage us to be the best people we can be; and since Yuri's Night LA is run by an entirely volunteer staff, we do our best for the event because Loretta is such an inspiration to us all.

On May 12th of this year, one month to the day after the anniversary of Yuri's historic flight, we all assembled for the final meeting and wrap party for YN 2018. Many ideas were tossed about and plans discussed on how we can make next year's event even better. The 2018 event was held at the California Science Center in Los Angeles, California under the Space Shuttle Endeavour. This is the third year the crew of the USS *Stephen Hawking* has lent a big hand at the event.

This is our primary charity event, and it requires more than 10 months of preparation. Over the years I've helped out, I have met two male Astronauts who have been to the moon and four female Astronauts including Dr. Mae Jemison, who appeared in an episode of *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, the first woman of African descent to be in orbit on the International Space Station.

Without further ado, I'd like to introduce you to Ms. Loretta H. Whitesides.

DA: Hi Loretta. Thank you for taking a few minutes to answer some questions for the members of my *Star Trek* fan association. I hope that your words here will inspire others to celebrate Yuri's Night in their communities and to further interest in Space Exploration. So please tell me, Loretta, how did it all begin; what gave you the inspiration for Yuri's Night?

LHW: Well, I was working at Johnson Space center in Houston; and on the calendar there it said April 12th was the anniversary of the first Space Shuttle launch, STS 1. And I said, "What? I didn't know that the Space Shuttle launched on my birthday. That is so COOL! How did I get to be 22 and not know this?" It caught my attention, and I thought that was a neat coincidence. It was then 1996, the end of the cold war; and there was an exhibition of Soviet Space Program artifacts coming to visit Houston for the first time since the wall had fallen. I had always been really interested in the Soviet Space Program since watching *2001* [A Space Odyssey] and *2010*, its sequel. I grew up watching these movies and seeing that Space has the power to bring countries together.

In the movie 2010, the USA and the Soviets had to do a joint space mission to Jupiter to find out what happened to HAL; and I was like 10 years old watching this and thought, "Wow, that is so cool." Since then I was always really interested in their Space Program, but we really didn't know much about it, and so I went to the exhibit. It was

always very secret, very much behind the Iron Curtain, very mysterious, and you couldn't just look it up on Wikipedia. All of this was, of course, pre-internet. At the installation, which was called "FIRST IN SPACE," the first thing you see when you walked into the installation was this giant mural of Yuri that said April 12, 1961. And I just went, "GET OUTTA TOWN!" April 12, 1961 and April 12, 1981 the Space Shuttle took off 20 years to the day after the first man to orbit the Earth. And I just went, "BAM!" What an incredible coincidence, and I had never heard of that before. It was kind of unknown because the Soviet programs were kind of unknown at that time. So, this was 1996; and I figured out that in 2001 it would be the 20th anniversary of the Shuttle flight and the 40th anniversary of the Vostok flight, and it was going to be 2001!!! I said, "Come on, we gotta do something"; so, since I grew up in the 80's with Farm Aid and Live Aid, I thought, "We gotta do a big concert!" I thought we could do something in Houston, something in Moscow, and link it up by satellite or something.

Then when I was at the United Nations Uni-Space 3 conference in 1999, I was with youth delegates from all over the world; and I was telling them about this, "Okay, you guys, this date is coming up, and we have to do something. This is too important a date that we can use to bring our communities together and the whole world together and show the power of Space just like 2010 did and how Space could bring the world together. And they said, 'YES, but we don't just want to do it in Moscow and Houston. We want to do in Johannesburg. We want to do it in Tokyo. We want to do it London. We want to do it in Canada." So that is when George Whitesides, the co-creator, came up with the idea to do it grassroots, open source, crowd-funded (before "open source" was a word), and distribute it all around the world.


DA: So, you have been doing this for over 16 years now; and you have such a close connection with an Aerospace company. Tell us a little-bit about that. LHW: So, George and I started Yuri's Night in 2001; and we started dating, then we got married. In 2005, we bought tickets to go on a sub-orbital flight with Virgin Galactic. That was basically a dream come true for both of us. We both love space, and we thought, "What would be cooler than to both go into Space?" So, we became ticket holders for Future Astronauts (Founder Astronauts, actually) with Virgin Galactic. It was a great opportunity to become involved with the company and with that extraordinary community of customers. Virgin Galactic has customers in 58 countries around the world. So, George became hired on as a consultant and ultimately became the CEO of Virgin Galactic. That's what brought us back to California to get that program going.

DA: What a great piece of background Loretta! Now, I know one thing about you, my friend, from helping with Yuri's Night for the last three years. Loretta, you are a big *Star Wars* fan. My readers would like to know, WTH? How does your love for *Star Wars* fit into Yuri's Night? How do you

make that fit in?

LHW: Wow, well obviously, in my costumes it comes out a lot. One of my favorites was when I got to do "Throne Room Leia" and to give the award to Han Solo and Luke Skywalker (who was George that night), which was a lot of fun, you know, with the R2-D2's in the all about and the music playing in the background, it was perfect. I marched into my wedding to the Throne Room Theme, one of my favorite pieces of music. (At the time I was asking this question, the "Leia" Theme was actually playing from someone's playlist on a speaker in the courtyard.) How does it play into Yuri's Night? I think the ethos of Star Wars has been really influential on me. I've always identified as a Jedi, that's who I am at my core. What I like to say is that I'm here on Earth to help bring about the culture of the science fiction future to go on to the space ships. Because if we are the same jerks on Mars as we are here, well then, who the hell who cares? I want to make sure that when we go out there, we go out there to use that as an opportunity to be our best selves as individuals, as a community, and as a species.

 $D\!A$: There was something you said once at the first wrap party I attended in 2016, and it's always stayed with me. I find myself

mentioning it whenever we have one of these get-togethers. It was something like, "When we reach out there and move to the stars, everybody is going to be needed. There isn't going to be a job that isn't in some way going to be needed to help bring us to that point." Could you please elaborate on that?

LHW: Yeah, well, we are taking our whole community with us. You are going to need to have someone who is going to know how to make bread; you need someone who knows how to grow wheat. You need someone who knows how to keep us safe, someone who knows how to communicate and tell our stories back to the home world. Educate the next generation and the things that are going to be life-critical for them to know. People who are going to know how to help us all get along and resolve our conflicts. Because out in space the environment is too harsh to be able to handle big conflicts. It's just too easy for one person to eliminate an entire city. So, we have to raise/elevate our game in terms of how we deal with our own issues and how we deal with conflicts in our community. So, yeah, it's going to take a whole village. It's going to take all sorts, all stripes, to make it work.

M: So, Yuri's Night is also a little bit about community building. One of the things that I really thought was interesting was about holidays we have on Earth and the special events that we are going to take with us. That was something I always thought was interesting about Yuri's Night. How do you feel about Yuri's Night becoming a potential holiday or celebration for our future Astronauts, Cosmonauts, and Planetary Explorers?

LHW: Well absolutely, you know when we started Yuri's Night, we believed this is a holiday that will be celebrated 10,000 years in the future, when humans are scattered through 12 star systems, because the 4th of July won't have the same relevance; New Year's won't have the same relevance. But the day the first human left our planet of origin is something that could still unite our whole species, something that we could all still connect with.

There is something profound and lovely about the reasons and the idea that is at the core of Yuri's Night that is what *Star Trek* is about, as well. From our miracle working Engineers and Technicians to our ship's counselors and security personnel. The fact that, as humans, we love reasons to celebrate as a community. The fact that we do have to raise our game to get beyond the petty things we carry with us on a day-to-day basis. This is one of the reasons I enjoy being involved in the planning and bringing *Star Trek* to Yuri's Night's flagship city. Yuri's Night is more than just "The Global Party." That is just its delivery system. The real vehicle of Yuri's Night is that dream Loretta and many of us have for our future.

History of Yuri's Night

Yuri's Night was created in 2000 by Loretta Hidalgo Whitesides, George T. Whitesides, and Trish Garner. The first Yuri's Night was held on April 12, 2001, exactly 40 years after the launch of Vostok 1. Since 1962, April 12 has also been celebrated in Russia (formerly the Soviet Union) as Cosmonautics Day and since 2011 internationally as the International Day of Human Space Flight.

The 2004 Yuri's Night event in Los Angeles was attended by space-related figures including author Ray Bradbury, space tourist Dennis Tito, X-Prize founder Peter Diamandis, *NSYNC's Lance Bass and Nichelle Nichols (Uhura from the original *Star Trek* series). The event included a large party with 2 dance floors and world-class DJs.

The 2007 event in the San Francisco Bay Area was held at NASA Ames Research Center at Moffett Field in Mountain View, CA. The event featured artistic installations, technology demonstrations, and DJ music continuing through dawn of the following day.

April 12, 2011 marked the 50th anniversary of Gagarin's historic first flight. Over 100,000 people attended 567 Yuri's Night parties in 75 countries, and the crew of Expedition 27 recorded a Yuri's Night celebratory greeting from the International Space Station.

Yuri's Night Today

Yuri's Night events "combine space-themed partying with education and outreach." Parties and events are held at NASA centers, museums, schools, bars, houses, and other locations.

Yuri's Night has been celebrated in locations including Los Angeles, the San Francisco Bay Area, Huntsville (Alabama), New Orleans, Inverness, Stockholm, Tel Aviv, Tokyo, Lisbon, Helsinki, Afghanistan, Latvia, Romania, Peru, Antarctica, and the International Space Station, in addition to many other locations and virtual online celebrations.

Yuri's Night is organized on a global level by an all-volunteer "Executive Team", which provides logistical and promotional support to Yuri's Night events worldwide. Individual organizers are responsible for registering and running their local events.

LCDR Ro Staymates

It has been a little over thirty years since I was first assigned as an observer on the planet Ycnangerp. My assignment was to monitor their growth, both physically and technologically, to ascertain their readiness to join the Federation.

Now, thirty years later, I found myself invited to a ceremony called H'trib, in which a young one is welcomed into the clan, the community, and the Federation. It is a high honor to attend this event, one that in all my years with the Smada clan of that planet, I had heard of but never seen.

In the culture of Ycnangerp, the clans are very fluid. Younglings are brought into a clan, later grow, and leave to begin their own clans and traditions. It was Ynahteb, one of the females of the Smada clan whom I had observed and later lived with, who had invited me to the Ecnop clan's ceremony of H'trib.

I am here providing a detailed account as to what the ceremony entails, to be entered into the Starfleet Database.

The three beings who had been asked to attend all gathered in the Ecnop living space early in the morning. Each of us were designated a space to inhabit, quite comfortable furniture, while the clan head, Ynahteb, with her mate JA, entertained. Indigenous foods were provided: a kind of fowl that runs wild on the planet, covered in a thick, rich sauce and served over grain, some fermented juices, and water.

Over the intercom system, soft music was being played. I was given to believe that this music was provided by a group that had been specially selected by Ynahteb for this H'trib.

As the day went on, activity increased and decreased according to the dictates of the two leaders. Sometimes sitting quietly, talking and joking, at other times moving around the room. Candles burned, and their scents filled the air with local wildflowers and rain after a storm.

JA is a large male of this humanoid species, very broad across the shoulders. Very little hair can be seen as he is of the Warrior caste, protecting his clan and tribe from anything that might threaten their safety. At first look, he appears quite intimidating, much as the Klingons do to the uninitiated. Ynahteb is small, even for a female. Even as part of the Smada clan, in my initial contacts with this people, she was dainty and petite in appearance. As most females, her hair is long and silky, except for a shaved area on the side of her head, designating her as a clan leader and as a part of the Warrior caste as well.

As time went on, Ynahteb began vocalizing. Low growls followed by the occasional shout. The words she shouted were largely untranslatable but had to do with open hearts and hands.

At last, Ynahteb told us that it was time. JA motioned each of us into position around her. I was given a place of honor at her back. A symbolic position of trust, as I both supported her and 'had her back,' as we might say. The other two honorees were given equally important positions to either side of her, while JA knelt before her.

I would like to convey here the intimacy of this time. The world seemed to close around us as though there were only the five of us in existence. Time seemed to slow, as Ynahteb concentrated all her formidable will on the life force that she was bringing forth. JA touched, held, supported, and encouraged her as finally, with a last great shout, the young one was brought forth!

She was so tiny, and yet large for a young Ecnop. And she showed forth the will of her ancestors as she took a breath and shouted into the world.

Izzid is her name.

And we welcome her.

VOYAGER STAR PRESENTS MILES TO GO AT PREMIERE




