## Charting a Path: A Commentary on "Year of Hell"

Having watched Voyager's "Year of Hell" for the umpteenth time, a thought came to me. I'd made a conscious effort to remember the Kes-centric episode "Before and After," in particular a line about the future she sees not always being the future that happens. It is this line that I kept in mind for the two-part episode.

In this episode, we see Voyager get ripped apart and crew members die, abducted, or ultimately have to leave the ship because of decisions made. It is a great episode that lets the actors shine and gives a real sense of the passage of time since the ship has no time for major repairs.

But what I want to focus on today is the difference between Annorax and Chakotay. In the first scene, we see the Krenim timeship destroy a civilization on a planet. What would appear to us to be a massive attack turns out to be too small for Captain Annorax.

With Chakotay, we see him give Captain Janeway a pocket watch that he had replicated many months before. This is a small gesture, and Janeway treats it as such, telling him that it would be better off recycled into something useful.

Later on, when Chakotay tells Annorax of his plan to rid an asteroid from existence, we see Annorax look smug after having Chakotay start a simulation to see what would happen if he did so. It was absolutely catastrophic, affecting the core needs of life.

Annorax, however, is focused on affecting only the surface. He views the life of other races with contempt, thinking that wiping them out will mean not just victory for the Krenim but the return of his wife. This is his biggest fault. He was able to recognize that his initial wiping out of a species ended up in the deaths of millions of his people, but he kept on making decisions that affected many but didn't get him what he wanted the most.

In contrast, we see that Chakotay made the decision not to recycle the pocket watch. Janeway eventually finds it, and this small act of kindness—an even smaller act of disobedience—ended up doing what he hoped. It gave Janeway time to reflect and ultimately, I believe, helped her until those last moments.

So, what I ended up reflecting on was who I more closely resembled, Annorax or Chakotay.

Am I Annorax, the type of person who sees a solution behind every problem? The kind of person who has his core group of those he calls "friends," treating anyone outside his circle with fear and contempt, but also treats his friends as tools with which he improves only himself. Or am I Chakotay, the type of person who can sometimes tell what will happen with a small act but is still prone to make mistakes? The kind of person who does what he can for his friends and is always looking to find the good in others to encourage the best out of them.


There is much more we could pull from quite a few other characters and their decisions, but these two affected me the most personally. Next time you have the chance to watch this very well-done episode, sit back and think which character you identify with the most. Are you the Doctor, who does his best to insert himself into inappropriate moments so that he can feel like part of the crew? Are you Tuvok, who is so 'by the book' that he gets blinded by the rules? Are you Harry Kim, who so badly wanted to stay with the Captain but ultimately went along with the plan because it was her order?

The final part of the second episode shows us the power that our decisions hold. The Krenim Captain, without firing any shots, advises them to stay out of that area of space. This ultimately results in Voyager charting a route around Krenim space, thereby staying out of danger.

What I believe we should ultimately take from "Year of Hell" is be mindful of our actions and words because we cannot control how others define them. We saw two outcomes of contact with the Krenim (three if you count "Before and After"). Like many things we have to decide, there is a negative outcome no matter which path you choose. Understand that sometimes you will make a mistake, but by ignoring that mistake, you could end up making more and bigger ones — endeavour to choose the direction that will make you a better person, every time.

In feeling less like you were, you are more like who you were meant to become.

and, of course, the social drinking at the Paddock Bar, in the afternoon & evening drinking beer and wine.



### **Raktajino Ruminations**

How about something to tickle your funny bone? I am sure there are several versions of this procedure out there. I took the liberty to blend two of them together. Please do not take offense. This is purely tongue-incheek.




# Ship News

# Tribbles & Stem Bolts

### Bachin' it: Experimental Cooking for the Novice

Of necessity, I have been experimenting with beans and rice and with beans and noodles. I have found garbanzo beans (chickpeas) do not throw off the flavor of what I cook, but I also will use other legumes to obtain complete proteins in my diet for strong muscles. Basically, what I do after the staples are cooked is to add flavorful or savory things to make them interesting to eat. Cooking with butter checks the "salty, fat" flavor box along with a pleasing "mouth feel." After this, instead of adding half the flavoring packet from ramen noodles—still cheap even if you do not use the noodles themselves although undercooked or al dente (meaning "to the bite" in Italian) might still work in a dish that needs to be stirred a lot while adding flavor.

I may use the small black pepper grinder bottle I have, as "freshly ground" means "yummy" to me. Or I'll add hot sauce, even salsa if I have it. I will mix some into part or half of the "main ingredient" staples. That way, if I put too much in, I can mix in the remainder of the "main ingredient" to tone down the flavor's intensity; usually, that will be OK. Or, if that was not enough, I will repeat adding the same amount to try to get the flavor right (the correct number of stars for me).

A particular favorite is the "crushed red pepper" that comes with pizza—they've learned to give me extra without even asking. If you like the way a thing tastes, just about any savory thing that comes with delivery food is par for the course in bachelor cooking. I sometimes add ketchup or mustard—or even both—when my "flavor memory" helps me decide what I'd like to eat. That imagination is usually not wrong. If I add what my feelings say I'm in the mood for, I seldom wind up throwing anything away; usually, my problem is eating the whole thing (four servings) and only then realizing I was supposed to save some for leftovers. That said, allow me to be stoic and point out that there are worse things. And this sort of "Coney Island culinary experimentation" surely saves money. Pleasant eating, everyone!

I also might recommend searching the internet for "camp cooking" or "one-pot meals" or similar subjects if your journey continues towards sophisticated cooking. Actually, for me this began because ever since I served in Europe, I enjoyed talking to our cooks; and sometimes they would talk about their recipes. The last time I did, it was a fellow veteran at the VA, a former Navy cook who managed to go from the Navy to the Waldorf Astoria. Nice gentleman. There is plenty of this sort of thing in YouTube videos, as well.

### **SFI Spacedock: Intro to The Masses**

Greetings! I am Fleet Captain Kevin R Plummer of the USS Constellation in Region 1 and owner of Spacedock Earth LLC. Spacedock is a new (as of First Contact Day 2021) web services company that offers a variety of services dedicated solely to the Sci-Fi Community.

The first thing you should know about Spacedock Earth is that it is NOT a money-making venture. It is operated as a service to the Sci-Fi Fandom Community as a whole. These services are provided to Sci-Fi groups and organizations only, regardless of whether they are Star Trek, Star Wars, Battlestar Galactica, Orville, Firefly, or any other type of club. The mission is simply to provide low-cost web services to these groups by splitting the costs between them instead of each having to bear the total costs themselves. We considered making Spacedock a non-profit or a not-for-profit organization. That may happen down the road, but the cost to do so was just too much for now. We felt the money that we are investing into this endeavor was better spent on acquiring software and paying for services like Zoom so that we could pass the benefits on to the community.

So why was Spacedock Earth started? Well, over 2020-21, I watched as many of our beloved groups have had to close due to the loss of membership and funding from those members. I felt that a low-cost alternative to the high costs of internet services might help these groups hang on a little longer and perhaps find and recruit members. That was the idea behind the start of this whole project.

Spacedock's main website will offer a community portal open to all Sci-Fi Fandoms, where news and information, as well as a host of communication forums for socialization, will be available. Membership will be simple: \$1/year (spacefarer passport) or \$5/lifetime (station resident) to this portal. These charges are mainly to discourage bots, hackers, spammers, and other space pirates from joining the station. The portal will be like a mini-Facebook but for Sci-Fi fans only and a great place for people to find like-minded individuals, debate, share, and even recruit.

For groups, Spacedock will offer four different tiers of website hosting. We call these tiers our "docking bays," and each bay will have different hosting options available. The costs for "docking" will start at just \$10 a year, and the top-level will be just \$25 a year. All hosting will be ADFREE and have full FTP access, so each group is free to change their sites as they see fit.

All "docked" groups will have the ability to schedule web conferencing through our paid Zoom accounts to provide unlimited options instead of the free restricted accounts used by many. Limited email accounts (info, CO, XO, 2nd Officer, and any department heads) will also be offered to all docked groups, as well as other features when they come "online."

Spacedock will also offer additional services such as initial software installation, website design, and graphics creation, but these are not included in the "docking fees" and are charged separately. As I come up with new ideas and consider the requests from the Fandom Community, additional services will be offered. It will depend on the total cost of these new services whether they will be added to the docked groups for free or whether they will be optional additional services. Of course, all docked groups will be informed of these as they are added.

Now, thanks to a partnership between Spacedock and STARFLEET International, I am personally offering all chapters of SFI a free year of docking services. Each chapter can choose whatever bay they wish to use without any setup fees, with the first-year costs being absorbed by myself. This offer is only for SFI chapters, as it is my main area of focus for my personal fandom.

So, what are the docking bays, and how much are they? Glad you asked...see the next page for details.

Zoom services are on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is a good idea to schedule as early as you can and, if needed, schedule multiple meetings at once. We will have a reservation system on our main website to allow you to do this easily. If we are continually having issues where times are overbooked, we will add more Zoom accounts to accommodate as best we can.

Spacedock also offers graphic design services. We have a pool of talented artists that we can call on when your group needs a new logo or rebranding. Each artist is slightly different in pricing and style, but we will try to find you a good fit. Graphics are billed separately from any docking fees. This service is available even for groups that are not docked with Spacedock.

And finally, we can also provide basic desktop publishing services. That means we can produce your newsletter for you if needed and provide it to you in pdf format. This does NOT mean we will write it for you!!! But if you provide the content and we agree on a layout format, we will put it all together for you. Using our email services,


we can even set up a mailing list for you to send out the newsletters and any other important communications you have. There is a one-time charge for setting up a mailing list, and the desktop publishing fees are based on the number of pages in the final document. ## **Interview With Author James Young**

#### Thank you for doing this interview.

No problem! *Thanks* for giving me a chance to talk to the folks here at Starfleet.

Some people may not know who you are or what you write about. Please describe the two series that you have created.




So my two primary series are my *Usurper's War* alternate history series

(https://www.amazon.com/gp/product/B074C82SXV) and the *Vergassy Chronicles* military sci-fi universe.

In the *Usurper's War*, I kill Adolf Hitler in November 1940 before he can issue the orders for Operation Barbarossa. Through various circumstances, Heinrich Himmler ends up in charge of the Third Reich, and Germany knocks Great Britain out of the war in August 1942. All of this happens "off-screen," so to speak, as the first book

(Acts of War) opens up with London on fire, nerve gassed, and the Royal Family fleeing to Canada. It's on Book 3 (of 4) right now, with the latest title (Against the Tide Imperial) basically covering operations between the USN/RN vs. Axis forces in the Indian Ocean.



My Vergassy universe takes place in the 31<sup>st</sup> Century. My first novel, *An Unproven Concept*, follows the "starwreck" of the liner *Titanic* due to first contact gone wrong. The eponymous "concept" is the vessel sent to the *Titanic*'s aid, the battlecruiser *Constitution*. If someone's a fan of *Robotech/Macross*, *Battlestar Galactica*, and the *Aliens*-franchise, I'm pretty confident they'll like it.

The other novel in the universe is a prequel entitled *Aries Red Sky*, which details the start of Humanity's final civil war. It sets up a lot of the characters in *An Unproven Concept*, as people kept asking me to tell their backstory.

#### Where do you get your ideas from?

Most of my ideas just pop into my head spontaneously. In the case of the *Usurper's War* series, I've spilled many keystrokes and had several conversations over dinner about the Second World War. It's fascinating to me the number of people who think, "Oh, well, once the US came in, things were pretty much over." I'll freely admit to poking at that myth pretty hard, relying on the history of mobilization and people's feelings at the time. Let's just say I'm very, very happy Adolf Hitler was not a smart strategist, and Allied powers were gifted with several highly intelligent, lucky individuals.

#### What other authors do you like to read?

David Weber and S. M. Stirling (*Emberverse* series) are two of my favorite fiction authors. I recently drove out to Arizona for my niece's wedding and was listening to Mr. Weber's *Uncompromising Honor* most of the way there and back. (For those not familiar with David's books, they could double as bludgeoning weapons. Which thankfully makes for very long audiobooks as well.)

Nonfiction, I highly recommend James Hornfischer, Vincent P. O'Hara, and Barrett Tillman. If you want to know about the USN and why it eventually triumphed in the Pacific, you can't go wrong with that trio of authors. Having met Mr. O'Hara in person and corresponded with Mr. Tillman, I can also tell you both of them are also very helpful people.

#### How many hours a day do you write?

You mean when I'm not succumbing to my crushing DnD habit? (Hand your kids a PHB and some dice, they won't have time for drugs...) I try to write 4-8 hours a weekend. Note *try*, as I'm perpetually behind on deadlines with my books. The good thing about being an indie is you're in charge of just about everything. The bad thing about being an indie is that means you're wearing a lot of administrative hats that seem to bleed the day away when you're not watching.

# How long have you been writing? Do you remember the first thing that you had published?

So, I'll give the official "Mama Young" answer, which is since I was 7 or 8. As she's the poor person who had to suffer through reading my scrawled stories, I think she'd remember.

The first time I actually had real success with it was taking third in a fiction contest back in 1993. My prize was \$5, which I promptly spent at the movies and Taco Bell the following weekend. Pro-tip for any aspiring writers reading this: Do not spend the very first check, dollars, etc., that you ever earn without documenting it in some way. To this day, Mom is very annoyed she was never given a chance to possibly frame that first bill.

## What was the hardest scene—for you—have you written?

I'd say the first space combat scenes in my Vergassy Universe were the hardest. It's difficult to start figuring out what one wants for engagement ranges, weapons, etc., in-universe. Especially when you know some "rivet counter" is going to try and snarkily complain about consistency.

## I know you like Star Trek. What's your favorite Star Trek series? (TOS, TNG, ENT, etc.)

So, I'm more of what you'd call a "casual" Star Trek fan. I mean, if I had to choose or I'm getting tossed in a room with angry Klingons, I'm going to go with TOS. Then I'm quickly going to point out that I haven't even *seen* all the episodes of any series, much less committed them all to memory.

#### **Favorite Trek character?**

Khan Noonien Singh. I'm a huge *Wrath of Khan* fan, and Ricardo Montalbán really brought that character to life. Sure he got a little too fixated outside of the Mutara Nebula, but who among us hasn't allowed our desire for revenge to get out of hand? \*nervous laugh\*

#### Have you ever considered writing a Star Trek book?

Ever? Yes. Since 1991? No. See above comment about "rivet counters." I'm fairly certain any book I'd write would make some heretical error which would see me harassed across the "interwebs" by a howling mob of folks in Vulcan ears. As Clint Eastwood said, "Man's gotta know his limitations...", and I certainly lack the necessary attention to detail to do the franchise justice.

## You attended West Point; what was your military career like? What Branch of the Army did you go into?

I was an Armor officer for the six years I was in. There were good times and bad times. The best part was I learned a great deal about how to treat people, both from excellent and horrific leaders.

#### How did that help shape your writing?

One thing about having been around those bosses is it makes historical leaders come to life a lot better. Another thing about being in the military was it definitely made me understand how various snafus happened. Having seen poorly trained and/or tired staff in action, I completely get Clausewitzian "friction."

# Do you base any of your characters on real people? Have they ever been recognized?

For legal reasons... Just kidding. I've based characters on friends with their permission, and I regularly hold contests for people to have characters based on them in my universe. A couple I know is the inspiration for a pair of officers in *Aries' Red Sky*, as he won a drawing after she bought him *An Unproven Concept* for a Christmas present before they started dating.

## Your wife also writes, doesn't she? What does she write about?

While Anita C. Young is primarily an artist now, she does have a complete urban fantasy series. "The Architects of Lore" is about variants of a virus that explain all of our common humanoid "monsters," from werewolves to vampires. It's a well-done series, and you can find the first book in it on Amazon:

## Have you two ever been in competition for people reading your works?

Not really. That's the joy of being in two widely separate genres. I mean, Anita does take great pleasure in pointing out that *she* can finish a series, which is why I was so glad to get the *Phases of Mars* series of anthologies done

(https://www.amazon.com/dp/B07XLRFTHX), even if that was mainly editing.

#### What advice do you have for aspiring writers?

1.) Money flows to the author, not out from them. Anyone who truly believes in your writing will pay

you for it, either through royalty share or outright purchase. Folks who want you to "pay upfront" or anything similar are scam artists.

- 2.) Editors are worth every penny. Self-explanatory.
- 3.) **There are no shortcuts**. This means anyone who is promising you a "quick fix" is basically using you as theirs.

## The Good, the Bad & the Ugly

This time we are looking at *Star Trek: Voyager*. Personally, I feel *Voyager* is treated badly because people did not understand the position the show was in.

This show was the flagship of a new network, Paramount, and needed to play to a more diverse audience. The writers had to play it safer than what they did with *TNG* and *DS9*. That safer road caused some weakness in the show, but the show still made some good episodes that can be watched several times.

The Good

Living Witness

(Rate: ♠♠♠♠)

We learn our history from the books written. Sometimes the problem is that books are written by the winner. This can cause a slanted view of the things



that happen. This concept is challenged by a living witness in the form of the backup program to the EMH. This episode does a good job showing what happens when we rely on only one set of views to interrupt history. Our view is not the only view, and we can only come together when we start seeing others' points of view. Again, the writers, directors, and actors have put together a piece that helps us see what changes we need to look at in ourselves to bring about change that helps everyone.

# The Bad Threshold (S2E15) (Rate: ♠♠♠♠)

I am not sure what the writers were thinking on this one. The writers try to break the rule of not being able to go Warp 10. If you could go Warp 10, you would be everywhere, and if it works, we can get *Voyager* home in time for dinner. But we can't do that because

then the show is over, and we are only in Season 2, so we need to create another problem if we are able to go Warp 10. When writing, you set up rules so that your audience knows what can and cannot be done. This may be true, but the episode made it like this is the only explanation. The episode comes off as the American Indians being primitive in their thinking. I don't think the writers meant that and if they had a longer episode, they might have made their intentions

apparent, but in the fortysix-minute episode, it was very unclear.


## Don't Shoot, I'm an Engineer!

My crew consists of longtime veterans of STARFLEET who have served their chapters well while climbing the


ranks and successfully passing academy courses with Distinction and Honor.

We have news regarding grades appearing in the database. As of March 1<sup>st</sup>, Directors began adding NEW grades into the database. Any exam from that date onward should be showing up at an appropriate interval after being completed. Directors have seven days to enter any grades from the Moodle automated quizzes (or QAMs as we call them) and fourteen days to enter any grades from PDFs that are sent by email. If you do not see your grade in the database after that appropriate number of days, please contact the Director of the course and inquire about the status. If you do not get a response after seven days, please contact the Dean of the institute for that college.

I have a statement from Jayden Tyronian, SFA Webmaster and ES Liaison from CompOps, regarding the grades from the period when we were not entering the grades into the database:

Grades earned from 1 Dec 2019 to 28 Feb 2021 are now slowly being added to the SFI DB. You may start seeing some of these grades appear on your record (you may also receive an email notification). Please note this is by Institute and College. So, if you have grades missing from a number of colleges but only see some, your others will be added in due course. DO NOT ask us to add in missing grades. They will be added through the import process COMPOPS is undertaking. Notification, when the entire import is done, will be made; at that time, we will be happy to look into any discrepancies."

This will take some time, so please be patient with us all. We know that there will still be some errors once all the grades are imported, and we will do our best to get them corrected as soon as possible. As always, we recommend that you keep your certificates and/or emails from Directors as proof of course completion, as that will be helpful if we need to fix any errors.

Big shout out to CompOps, particularly Tony and Jayden! Progress is ongoing regarding getting the grades from December 2019 through February 2021 into the database. I should note that the grades for the Institute of Leadership Studies (which includes OTS, OCC, and SFDPP) were imported.

SFA continues to welcome new staff members, but we have also lost a few folks recently for various reasons. We have several openings listed with HR, and more are added as needed. If you are interested in joining our staff or know of someone who might be, please visit HR to see the current list of openings.
