Star Trek Is Called Science Fiction, But It's Really More Like ²/₃ Science, ¹/₃ Fiction

One of the most interesting articles I've stumbled upon talks at great length about various issues within Star Trek and just how "scientific" it is. It's on NASA's website.

NASA's Kepler spacecraft and other programs have identified 3,300 planets as well as 2,500 other possible planets just from the tiny bit of study we have managed to do since we first started getting into space. The scientific community believes that life beyond earth is very probable, and considering the size of the universe and all its galaxies, the odds say it's a pretty decent bet that "It's out there."

You may not have heard, but antimatter is a very real thing. While it's only been created in microscopic quantities so far, it's launched a further study into the realms of possibility that we were first introduced to with the idea of warp drive. Sorry to burst your bubble, but dilithium crystals are still just a fictional creation (and warp drive is just an idea at best so far).

NASA does admit that some elements of Trek get the facts and science wrong. Probably the most notable example is the episode where Crusher and LaForge attempt to hold their breath after evacuating the cargo bay of air to put out a plasma fire. One small misstep by the writers certainly doesn't negate a TV series that got most things right, or as the Mythbusters might say, certainly at least "Plausible."

As Trek fans, we know that we are the apple of the eye for the American Association of Artificial Intelligence: The president of that association was once asked what would be the ultimate dream goal for them as scientists, and he replied simply, "Lieutenant Commander Data." Sure, we're a long way away from anything quite so sophisticated as Data or even the android from the film Ex Machina, but who's to say where technology will be in 50 years, or even 75?

Our cell phones are so quickly compared to communicators from the 60s, and other comparisons of lasers certainly are drawn to phasers from any of the series. Before you dismiss the Tricorder as too far off, keep in mind that today's cell phone is as powerful as a laptop computer, while a computer occupied the size of a small house in the 1950s. And medically speaking, what sits in a small room and is called an MRI machine could easily be the size of a laptop in 25 years and the size of a tricorder in the next 50.

The concept of subspace was discovered by mathematicians decades ago, and the idea of subspace is a very real thing today. Although Trek certainly has taken the concept in many directions to solve various problems over the years, so much is yet to be discovered about subspace that it may one day be even more than any Trek writer could have imagined.

Of course, we don't have nearly the science or understanding yet to approach some of the biggest technical creations in Trek, like holodecks, replicators, and warp drive. Though many have said that some of these concepts are "simply impossible," it can just as easily be reasoned that they *are* possible, but the scientific knowledge that makes those things possible just doesn't exist yet. We only can predict the future based on our current level of knowledge—it's impossible to see where something can be possible when the means to make it possible are impossible to imagine or create.

Many of the greatest advancements we enjoy today were total accidents. One classic example is microwave popcorn. When scientists discovered that it was possible and perfected the art of popcorn in a microwave oven, they were actually trying to do something else that had nothing to do with food. If you study history and science, you'll often find that mistakes or missions to solve one problem end with a surprise in a whole new direction and an answer to a question nobody was asking yet.

Dr. Beverly Crusher was asked once about the meaning of life, to which she replied with probably the smartest and most accurate answer: As humans, it does not matter that we know all the answers. Perhaps it's the struggle to get the answers that matter most.

O Captain! My Captain!

When the topic of Star Trek Captains comes up, there is always a debate about who is the best Captain. The problem is that when comparing the Captains, most arguments forget that each captain has their own time and circumstance that call for different ways to command. They compared Star Trek to Wagon Train to the stars in the beginning, so I thought I would compare the Captains to some western themes

Captain James T. Kirk (TOS)

Captain Kirk is like the marshal of the old west. Kirk, like the marshal, protects a local town (Federation border) and the surrounding area, but he may have to go to nearby towns (planets) to help them out. He protects the locals and establishes order



when neighboring people dispute territory. The Captain also needs to make sure the Indians (Klingons and Romulans) don't' make problems for those under his protection. If the Indians start trouble, he is there to shut it down before it becomes a war. He is there to stop trouble with a phaser, and the Federation is there to back him up. He follows a book that previous captains made but knows that the Book is just a set of guidelines and not rules carved in stone.

Captain Jean-Luc Picard (TNG)

Captain Picard is like a governor of a territory. There is not as much to explore, so his exploration is more about bettering what has already been done. His *Captain's Book* has experience from previous captains, plus



it is annotated with his own incidents. His *Book* gives better ways to guide him and help him teach others how to apply the Book.

Captain Benjamin Sisko (DS9)

Captain Sisko is a father figure Captain. He is a family man with a son he takes care of and loves. His relationship with his crew is more like a father figure than a commander. He is always looking for ways his crew can



better themselves. He also has a loving relationship with Bajor. He is always looking for ways to better their lives since the Cardassian occupation. The Book for him helps, but he knows that he will be adding new chapters because the Delta Quadrant's Founders are different from anything they have encountered before.

Captain Kathryn Janeway (VOY)

This series is a true wagon train to the stars. Captain Janeway is a wagonmaster who guides people through the wilderness from Missouri (Delta quadrant) to California (Alpha Quadrant). The only difference,



instead of going to a new home, the Voyager crew is trying to get home. Neelix is the scout who knows the territory and can work with the locals they come across as they travel. Like the Wagon Train, they need to stop off to get supplies and find out what they need to know to continue on their journey. The difference between Janeway and a wagonmaster is that she is forging a new path where the wagonmaster has a course that he already knows. The wagon master did have to forge a new path because of floods and unpredictable weather. Like Janeway, they used the knowledge from other Wagonmasters (Captains) to forge these new paths. Janeway used her knowledge of the sciences and the *Captain's Book* to keep her crew safe and get them home to the Alpha quadrant.

Captain Jonathan Archer (ENT)

Captain Jonathan Archer is like Lewis and Clark. He explores space, helping Starfleet know what is out there and what they have to deal with in the unknown of space. Archer has his Sacagawea, the Vulcan science



officer T'Pol. She shows him the ways of other cultures but also learns that humans have something to offer that space needs. He created the *Book* that future Captains would follow to make their jobs easier.

Captain Michael Burnham (DIS)

Spoiler Alert Even though Michael Burnham received her Captain's rank at the end of the third season, she is the lead in *Star Trek Discovery*. In the first two seasons, Burnham is Army Cavalry. Starfleet



is exploring and taking care of the settlers in the new Federation. Burnham has a special place in Starfleet as she lived with natives of the region (Vulcans), but the rest of Starfleet don't listen as they still have preconceived notions that have not been disproven. Starfleet holds to Archer's

Book as if it knows best where Burnham knows that there are still problems that Archer didn't face. Burnham tries her best to show that the *Book* needs to be used as a guide, not as something written in stone. Burnham's role changes in the last two seasons (spoiler alert) from the past Federation to a future where the Federation is almost gone. Burnham arrives in an era after the loss of Dilithium (the US Civil war when the US needed to reestablish the settlements and forts that were lost during the civil war). She is reuniting the western frontier (Alpha Quadrant) to bring it back under the leadership of the US (Federation). Unfortunately, the Captain's Book has been mostly lost to

this time. What is left is just bits and pieces. Burnham is bringing the *Book* back but still needs to find what might have been added since her era as she only has Archer's original copy and not Picard's larger, revised copy.

Even though this is a brief overview of each Captain, I think we can see that there is something to learn from each. It is not a choice of who is the best Captain but what we can learn from each one to make ourselves better in what we do. Only then can we go boldly where no one has gone before.

The World's Largest Chili Bowl

We do everything bigger in Texas. That includes volunteering to make The World's Largest Chili Bowl. This is an annual event that, for several years, the USS *Diamondback* has helped with raising money for the



local Ben Richey's Boy's Ranch and Family Services in Abilene, Texas. This is an outdoor event that has cook-offs not only for chili but also for brisket, chicken, beans, and desserts. There is also a children's hamburger cook-off. It is a 2-day event over Labor Day Weekend, which includes lots of local vendors for shopping and auctions.

Last year, the event was canceled due to COVID. Because of our past help, we were contacted to help this year even more than ever. Because of COVID, they were seriously short of volunteers. The *USS Diamondback* was asked to help more than ever before.

But how do you make the World's Largest Chili Bowl? The process starts on Thursday night. Our Captain, Donna Jarrett, and her family worked on prepping all the ingredients. The cooking starts on Friday morning. The rest of our crew showed up along with other volunteers to cook. We start cooking

one thousand pounds of hamburger on outdoor gas troughs along with twenty gallons of chopped onions and several gallons of seasoning and other ingredients. Once the meat is cooked, we press the grease out of it and



put it in the fivehundred-gallon pot. The rest of us spend the morning opening about a hundred gallons of tomato sauce. The pot is left to simmer overnight. Now, I'll have to



admit, this was not as large as in past years. Due to COVID, we only made about three-hundred-fifty gallons of chili instead of the usual five-hundred gallons.

On Saturday morning, we began putting the chili into one-quart containers to be sold throughout the rest of the weekend. You can only guess how much your arms hurt after pouring up over two thousand quarts of chili.

The *USS Diamondback* alone was assigned to run one of the two concession stands for the weekend. All the ingredients had been donated, so 100% of the proceeds from our work went to the Ben Richey's Boys Home. The concession stands raised about \$5000 from chili sales and food sales.

They also had the honor of helping judge most of the events. I especially enjoyed judging the children's burgers. When you take a bite, you never know what will be inside. Sometimes jalapeños or pickles. Sometimes interesting spices, too hard to tell what they used. Overall, it was a very fun and exhausting weekend. The *Diamondback* logged 184 volunteer hours for this event. The Boy's Home also had an auction during the cook-off that raised about \$10,000. Plus, each cook-off team and vendor booth paid entry fees. We are so glad we could help this organization have such a successful event. We are looking forward to next year already.

The Hugo Awards are the premier award in the science fiction genre, honoring science fiction literature and media as well as the genre's fans. The Hugo Awards were first presented at the 1953 World Science Fiction Convention in Philadelphia (Philcon II). Remembering Towaway

On December 3, 2021, word was received that VADM Jack Eaton, former RC of Region 2 and STARFLEET Chief of Operations, passed away too soon.

But most of us knew him as Towaway.

In 1990, he related the origin of his moniker in the issues of *Immortal Lines*, the newszine of his ship at the time, the *USS Christa McAuliffe*. Here, for your enjoyment and in his words, is the Towaway Story.



The Towaway Story

Once upon a time, I was the President of the Boston Star Trek Association, once upon a time being 1986. The club was sponsoring the Platinum Anniversary Convention [in] celebration of *TREK*'s 20th year. As guests for this con were Gene Roddenberry, Majel Barrett-Roddenberry, Robin Curtis, David Gerrold, and George Takei. The committee had arranged for all five guests to fly in on the same flight. We would greet them at Logan and return them to the hotel in a limo. Dave Ryan and I had rented a van from Warwick to tote supplies for the art show and eventually carry the stars' luggage in from Logan while they rode in luxury... or so we thought.

As the hour for the stars' arrival drew closer and closer, the committee members became more and more nervous as those who were supposed to be bringing the limo had not shown up yet. At the last possible moment, they did show up, with no limo, though. Stating all kinds of hectic-day-type stories and miscommunication with the limo company, they were also not able to do shopping for the welcoming party planned for the guests [upon their] return to the hotel. While these people stayed and bickered, Dave and I said that we would head to Logan, and time was growing shorter and shorter, and on the way [we] would pick up food and drink for the reception.

Dave and I did know the way to Logan International Airport. We did not, however, have any idea where we were going to do our last-minute grocery shopping. As we headed toward the airport, we spotted a store that was open, and by dead reckoning, found our way to the building. Like the Allied Forces storming the Normandy beaches, Dave and I ran into the store, each with a designated food item to purchase. Just as we got to the checkout, both trailing two carriages loaded with food, we heard over the loudspeaker, "Please make your final purchases. The store will be closing in five minutes!" Talk about timing!!!

We then quickly made our way to Logan and parked the van in front of the terminal. Not finding anyone else from the committee and hearing that [the] guests' flight was offloading just as we walked in the door, we panicked! Dave stayed in the baggage claim area while I went upstairs to greet the guests.

George was the first to walk out the gate, and I warmly greeted him and the others and pointed the way to baggage claim. When we got there, we found that the others had arrived; no limo but for cabs for transportation. We all mingled and waited for the luggage to show. George and I seemed to hit it off and talked the usual "Welcome to our city"-bull. As he and I are talking, I can see a cop writing a ticket for our van. Apparently, I had parked somewhere I was not supposed to. "No problem," I think to myself, "the con can afford a little parking ticket."

Suddenly, Dave runs up to me, wild-eyed and panting, "JACK! THEY'RE TOWING THE VAN AWAY!!!!" I look out, and there is a wrecker backing up to our rented van.

Do you remember, from the Warner Brothers cartoons, how when someone ran away very quickly, they left this outline of themselves in a cloud?

Well, that must have been what happened when I heard what Dave said because George was still jabbering away as I was bolting out the door. I grabbed the ticket out of the cop's hand and quickly drove the van around and parked it again

in front of the terminal, this time in a legal spot. As I got out of the van, I could see the guests getting into the cabs. I walked up to Dave and said, "Jeeze, that was close!"

"Yeah," he replied, "but did you get David Gerrold's luggage?"

"What do you mean, 'David Gerrold's luggage'?" Sure enough, we both looked out, and there, with traffic streaming past on both sid of it, was David's duffle bag sitting in the middle of the roadway. I dodged cars to retrieve it and tried to quietly get past the cab he was in without him seeing me.

We got back to the hotel and had our reception in the con suite. For some unknown reason, I had already been tagged with the nickname "Crocodile" Eaton for the weekend, and it was emblazoned on my con name tag. George came up to me, saw this, and said, "Oh, no! Your name should be 'TOWAWAY' Eaton!!!"

As if that wasn't bad enough, the next day there was a story in the Boston Sunday Herald about the con, and they quoted me in it, identifying me as "Jack' Towaway' Eaton"!!!!

That was how it all started. Since then, each time George and I get together, we pull some sort of joke on one another; sort of a perpetual running practical joke contest, what began as a series of quiet little one-liners and practical jokes. Well, as time went by, these quiet little one-liners and practical jokes began getting louder and louder.

In February of 1987, I attended Shore Leave, at which George was the guest. I saw this as a perfect opportunity to get even for having tagged me with the Towaway nickname. A small amount of pre-planning and a conversation with the Con Committee, and I was set. I had known the con chairperson, Marion Machiesni, for some time, and she was very anxious to see my plan come to pass.

I got up on stage to introduce George to the three hundred or so gathered to hear him speak. As I introduced him, I told the Towaway story. I brought George on stage and said that I had a small gift to thank him for having given me the nickname and, since it was also Valentine's Day weekend, it could serve a dual purpose for him. I then handed him a gift-wrapped box of bikini underwear with a wonderful heart design. It was when he opened the box to show them off that he got the real surprise. In bold red letters, across the front of the briefs was the line of his from *The Search For Spock*, "Don't call me tiny!"

Yes, you guessed it. He laughed!

And laughed!

And laughed!

George instantly came back with, "I'm sure I'll have plenty of use for these, although as soon as they see these, they'll know they have to call me tiny!"



From the Office of the Fleet Historian: THE WHITEHAVEN TOUR





Whitehaven is a majestic landmark cherished by the citizens of Paducah and the surrounding areas. This gracious mansion was once destined to be destroyed but was saved by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. The Transportation Cabinet saw a vision for this grand old home and restored and renovated it to become an awardwinning Rest Area/Welcome Center. Whitehaven possesses great architectural and historical significance. The main portion of the house, a two-story brick structure, was built in the 1860s by Edward L. Anderson. The residence remained in Edward's family until 1903 when it was sold to Ed I. Atkins, a cashier for the German American Bank located in downtown Paducah. The McCracken County Deed records reveal that the property was conveyed to Mr. Atkins by Norton B. Anderson on April 7, 1903, for the sum of \$4,000.00. At that time, Mr. Atkins commissioned one of his good friends, A. L. Lassiter, to begin a complete renovation on the house. Mr. Lassiter was a local architect who had designed such buildings as the Carnegie Library, the Sinnott Hotel, and the Fisher Mansion.

STARFLEET Communiqué

During the period of this renovation, the Classical Revival architectural style was popular. It was common to take Victorian homes and dress them up with large columns and classical detailing. Mr. Lassiter's plans for the home, which he completed, included the Corinthian-columned front porch, ornate plasterwork for the ceilings, stained glass windows, and a classically designed front entryway. Once the work was completed, Mr. Atkins renamed his new home Whitehaven, a title appropriate for the beauty and grandeur of the architectural changes. Two details that Mr. Atkins added to his newly remodeled home were having the name "Whitehaven" engraved into the mantel of the Music Room's fireplace and the addition of stained glass placed above the landing of the staircase, which reads "Whitehaven 1903."

On May 21, 1908, Whitehaven and 57 acres were purchased for the sum of \$7,000.00 cash by James P. Smith, who at the time was Mayor of Paducah and a prosperous merchant as a wholesale grocer. According to the deed books, Whitehaven was described as being located on Lovelaceville Gravel Road. Shortly after moving into the home, the Smiths renamed the residence Bide-A-Wee. Mrs. Smith was of Scottish Heritage, and Bide-A-Wee translates in English as "Come to Rest a While." Mrs. Smith had Bide-A-Wee spelled out in leaded glass above

the front entrance. Under the ownership of the Smiths, several changes were made. A firm, Marshall Fields from Chicago, was hired to redesign the home's interior decor. The new improvements to the interior included silk wallpaper and heavy gold damask draperies. Along with changes to the interior design of the house, the exterior was changed. The additional rooms to the rear of the structure were made to accommodate the Smith family's six children.

The attic space was renovated and became a third-story playroom with beautiful Oriental stenciling and a massive square piano installed. A carport was also added to the side of the home. Mrs. Smith and her daughter, Elizabeth Smith Shelter, were enthusiastic gardeners. They designed and installed extensive formal gardens around the property, where they would host beautiful garden parties. Because of the elegance and design of the formal gardens, Bide-A-Wee was featured on a tour for the Garden Club of America. Elizabeth Smith Shelton was the last member of the Smith Family to reside at Bide-A-Wee. She left the residence in 1968. At the time of her departure, Elizabeth and her family believed that the house would be torn down during the construction of Interstate-24. Although the house was not demolished during the construction of the Interstate, the then-vacant residence suffered greatly from vandalism. All of the original stained glass was stolen, interior mirrors were all broken, as well as most of the doors and windows. Water damage was also an issue. Because water poured into the house during rain and snowstorms, most of the ceilings and floors were damaged. In Paducah and the surrounding areas, there was great concern as to what the future would hold for the house. It appeared as though the house was destined to be destroyed until three events took place in the spring of 1981. The first event was the sale of the property and residence by the Smith family to the then-Paducah Community College. While the community college's main interest was acquiring the land for future expansion, it was also sympathetic to hearing proposals to save the once-grand mansion.

The second event that changed the house's future was the Commonwealth of Kentucky allocated funds for building a Rest Area/Welcome Center on I-24 in Paducah. Lastly and most importantly, the Secretary of the Transportation Cabinet, Frank Metts, and then-Governor John Y. Brown threw their total support and commitment to restoring the Smith Mansion to become that Rest Area/Welcome Center instead of building a new one. At this time, the house was again renamed Whitehaven. Now the house serves a new

and exciting purpose as the official Rest Area/Welcome Center for the Commonwealth of Kentucky and the South. In March of 1984, Whitehaven was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in the United States by the United States Department of the Interior. By having this designation, Whitehaven was recognized for its outstanding historical and architectural significance. The Department of the Interior placed brass plaques on the property to identify Whitehaven as a National Register Property. The restoration of Whitehaven was honored on the local, state, and national levels for the hard work and dedication to detail that brought this property back to its past grandeur. In 1984, the Paducah Civic Beautification Board presented a "HANDS" Award for the restoration work done at Whitehaven. In May of 1984, Whitehaven was recognized by the Ida Lee Willis Foundation and the Kentucky Heritage Council, who presented the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet with a "Project Award." The National Trust for Historic Preservation presented the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet with the Award for "Service to Preservation," which recognized their restoration efforts. In 1984, a local group known as Paducah's Growth, Inc. purchased a collection of former Vice President Alben "Veep" Barkley's memorabilia at an auction of the Barkley Estate.

Barkley was our 35th Vice President of the United States and a native of Lowes, Kentucky. Items included are Barkley's Vice President Desk and Chair, which he received from the President of the Philippines, Barkley's Congressional roll-top desk, Barkley's collection of walking canes, senatorial shaving mugs, the first Vice Presidential Flag, and the 1948 Inaugural Bible and Tuxedo, as well as other Barkley mementos. Because of this gracious donation, there is a special Barkley room in place on the second floor of Whitehaven, which exhibits these items highlighting this local figure's life and political career. These items can be seen on the guided tour provided by the Tourism Department. Because of the funding by the state and federal government, this lovely old mansion was saved from destruction. Anyone wishing to donate antiques and furnishings should describe the pieces and send photographs and copies of documents of authenticity to the District One Chief District Engineer, 5501 Kentucky Dam Road, Paducah, KY 42003. All accepted donations will be identified and recognized in an appropriate manner as having played a vital role in maintaining Whitehaven.

The Good, the Bad & the Ugly

The Star Trek Movies are a series unto themselves and are actually three series: TOS, TNG, and Kelvin*. There are thirteen movies so far—I will lump them together as one group.

The Good

Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home (1986)

Rate: AAAAA I am giving us three chevrons because we still have a lot of work to do to live up to the vision in Star Trek.



The Commodore went over to M'Ranklin and patted him on the back, "Come on Lt, let's go down to Ten-Forward. I think I owe you a drink."



Ops has been putting chapters on StandBy for not reporting. Reports are due and considered on time between the first and fifth of the month. Reports received between the sixth and the tenth are marked as late, and any report received after the tenth is considered Failure to Report or FTR. Three FTRs in a year's time are considered grounds for decommissioning. Ops has begun the process of placing chapters on StandBy and in DryDock for continued Failure to Report.

We have begun placing chapters in Drydock Status due to noncompliance with required SFDPP courses. These chapters have been on Standby Status for over 90 days. Chapters that are in Drydock Status for more than 90 days can be decommissioned.

We continue to have many people either taking SFDPP for the first time or taking the recertification course. Please remember a few things:

- If you have not taken any SFDPP exam with SFA before, you must take 101 and 102 first.
- Each year's recertification course will be due on the anniversary date of the last one that you took. It is best if you do not take it more than 30 days before you are due, and it should be taken no later than 30 days after the due date. If taken after that date and if you have elevated database access for any reason, you risk losing that access (and possibly the position that requires that access).
- COs and XOs are required to keep their certification current, as well as anyone who has a position that gives elevated database access. If you hold a Regional or Fleet position and are not sure if you are required to take these courses, please check with your RC or your supervisor.

We are steadily working on getting more courses into the automated system (known as QAM, or Quiz Activity Module). We appreciate everyone's patience while we do this, as it does take time, and we certainly want to make sure we do the job right.

Work continues with CompOps to get the grades from the "blackout period" imported into the Database. I cannot give an estimate on when this will be finished, but hopefully soon. At that time, we will also be able to restart the Boothby program; and while it will take a little time, all of the Boothby Awards that have been earned will be awarded retroactively.

This is where we are currently:






