MEET THE CANDIDATES ALLEN - BLACK



I would like to introduce myself. I am TJ Allen, and I am running for Commander, STARFLEET.

I have been in STARFLEET since 2009. I have done things in STARFLEET as minimal as being a certification officer in SFSO when I first came into STARFLEET to being the Current Chief of Educational Service.

I have assisted in creating courses and Beta Testing courses in STARFLEET Academy. Additionally, I have worked with both the STARFLEET Academy and the STARFLEET Marine Corps Academy.

I have worked in STARFLEET Marine Corps from the unit OIC of my chapter to S4 of Region 1 to Brigade OIC, even up to FINCOM office in SFMC.

I have worked in STARFLEET Medical as a Training Officer and Deputy Surgeon General.

I have also worked in STARFLEET Special Operations/MACO. I have worked in it from Certification Officer to Intelligence Officer to Deputy Director, SFSO to Assistant Director, SFSO to Director, SFSO. And then, when we were to change our name to MACO, I served as Commander, MACO.

As you can see, I have been in multiple positions in STARFLEET. I have seen changes throughout my stay in STARFLEET. Some are good; some were not so good. At the end of Sal's administration, I was asked to serve as Vice Chief of Computer Operations for the entirety of Dave Blaser's administration.

For the last couple of years, I have been in Education Services as Support Admin and Director of College of Robotics.

In addition, I have served on multiple IC and Regional Summit staffs.

I would be honored to serve as Vice Commander, STARFLEET, and would do so with an open door to all members of STARFLEET regardless of their country or planet of origin.



Platform.

I guess I'll start with my vision for STARFLEET. I'm not going to be making sweeping changes if I'm elected. If someone is doing a good job and wants to stay, I have no problems with that. If they want to move on or if they are found to be not doing what they are required to do then we will replace them. About CS Candidate.

A little about me. I was born and raised in North Carolina. I joined the Army in 1984 and served 11 years. I moved to the Tampa area in Florida in 1995 from Germany. I have lived here ever since. I'm a

network engineer by trade and started out as computer technician and have been involved in IT for over 25 years now. I have been involved in Star Trek fandom for over 30 years. When I was in the Army and moved around every 3 years or so, I would join a local Star Trek fan club, work my way up to XO or Captain then have to move. I have been an Ensign 5 or 6 times, I have been the XO and Captain of three different Star Trek fan clubs. While I was in Germany, I was part of the USS Rhein-Neckar in Heidelberg. I worked with SFI members from region 9 and well as Fanclub Enterprise in Manheim. This gave me a real understanding of how fan clubs in Europe work compared to the US. When I moved to Florida a local fan Klingon fan club was meeting at the local Applebee's and I just happened to be there. I talked to a few of the members and one member was the captain of the local USS Victorious. I haven't ever been to interested in being Klingon so I got the meeting information and attended my first club meeting in December 1995. Luckily, I didn't have to start off an and Ensign so I became chief of operations as a LT. Commander. In the next couple of years, I had become XO and then when the captain moved away, I was voted in as Captain. I've been there ever since.

I joined SFI in 2004 and then later brought the USS Victorious into SFI with a majority on the club members. I became Region 2 chief of communications back in 2010 and stepped down from that position in February 2021. I was part of the 2nd Brigade Staff until May of 2021. I have been the SFMC COINFOCOM since 2013 and for a couple of years before that I was part of the Web team. I'm also currently part of computer operations as webmaster for the SFMC websites. Once all the SFI websites were moved under Computer Operation I have held that position.

I guess the big question is why do I want to be Commander of STARFLEET. I had been thinking about it for a while. Steve Parmley was my DCOINFOCOM for a few years and when he was elected, I thought I might have a chance if I ran. The other thing that helped me make up my mind was I spent 4 days at the VA hospital in the ICU in January of 2022. I didn't really understand how bad my condition was until the Doctor came in and said I had a good chance I would walk out of there in a few days. That surprised me, I thought I had a 100% change of walking out of there but according to the doctor there was a chance I wouldn't. I decided tomorrow isn't guaranteed. If you want to do something you had better do it now and don't wait. Everything can change in a heartbeat, so you better do it while you are able to do so. My hope is I can make the organization better, deal with issues and help the membership have fun.

About the VCS Candidate.

My Dad is Icelandic and my mom is from Tennessee USA. I was born in Iceland and later moved to Tennessee when I was only 12 years old in 1990. In 1991, I was introduced to SFI and have been a member ever sense. I've been involved with Starfleet and became a member when I could pay for a membership.

As a Member of USS Aries, the USS Aries was part of a group of chapters in the Tri City area in Tennessee. It was called the Maxwell Squadron named after my 1st CO Sidney Maxwell who had passed away. the Squadron would always get together for cookouts, Christmas parades, Thanksgiving parades and laser tag. Starfleet became my family and still is to this day. I started a chapter in Iceland USS Excelsior NCC-2000-B and everything is going well. I'm currently RC for region 9 I have members in the region from Iceland, USA, Poland, France, Ukraine, Italy, Spain and Belgium. We always find the IDIC.

CAMPAIGN PLATFORM

Our official campaign platform is a simple one: "We Are Family"! Regardless of our respective individual ages, genders, ethnicities, education levels, income levels, geographic locations, etc., we are ALL bound together by our common love of Star Trek! Likewise, we have all been inspired by Gene Roddenberry more than 60 years ago of a better common future or respect and understanding. We owe it to ourselves as STARFLEET members to embody Gene's innate concepts of common courtesy, mutual respect, and effective/respectful communication at all levels of the organization—thereby treating each other truly as "family" within the Trek Fandom. We humbly suggest such a 'Golden Rule' mindset goes a LONG way to reducing unnecessary drama, negativity, and misunderstandings across the Fleet!

Beyond our campaign platform, we have three very specific "Big Rock" goals we pledge to pursue if elected. First, a future Higdon-Johannson Administration will continue the charge of the Parmley-Herring Administration in streamlining STARFLEET's organizational structures to more closely align with the Fleet's needs. Second, we will launch a special fleet-wide initiative of <u>enhanced outreach</u> from the <u>top-down</u> and the <u>bottom-up</u> throughout <u>ALL</u> levels of our team (including our overseas & unassigned members). Third, during this time of worldwide turmoil, we pledge to dedicate the next three years ensuring STARFLEET remains a well-run organization that actively strives to continuously improve our business practices, operate in an *efficient/transparent manner*, and be both *respectful and kind* to one another!



CAMPAIGN OBJECTIVES

- (1) Make *The Communique* more readily accessible to our membership at-large via automated email-based HTML deliveries via email by a professional marketing platform (i.e., Constant Contact, Mailchimp, or Marketo).
- (2) Establish a monthly STARFLEET Commander/Vice Commander-level virtual "Fireside Chat" (via Zoom & YouTube) where Fleet & Region-level senior leaders participate in a monthly broadcast to the Fleet membership atlarge to share the latest news & happenings. A Fleet-wide email reminder will go out a week early listing key agenda topics & EVERY STARFLEET member will have the opportunity to email questions in or dial-in/ask in-person.
- (3) **Establish a STARFLEET-wide Commander 'Hotline' Inbox** that comes straight to the STARFLEET Commander and Vice Commander with the promise of an initial response within 72 hours of that transmission from ANY member of the Fleet regarding any issue/concern that the member feels warrants senior leadership attention.
- (4) Streamline current STARFLEET membership enrollment/renewal process timelines to ensure our members are quickly & professionally welcomed into the Fleet! These new members should automatically receive in-person and correspondence chapter participation options (based on their individual zip code/postal code) as well as information on our key auxiliary groups within HOURS of their individual enrollment—thus getting them engaged ASAP!
- (5) Establish a consistent and fully-equipped Recruiting & Retention (R&R) function fleet-wide. A small number of individual chapters/regions across the Fleet have great R&R programs, but most chapters could readily use additional support in this area. A future Higdon-Johannson Administration will diligently ensure STARFLEET places the proper focus/resources needed to ensure STARFLEET is readily visible and accessible—and thereby worthy of recruiting our fellow Trekkers onto the SFI Team! Once onboard, if one's initial chapter assignment doesn't offer pan out, rather than have them "vote with their feet," we owe it to them (& frankly ourselves) to try to find another STARFLEET chapter/forum or auxiliary group that might be a better fit for the individual member.
- (6) A final area where we see a distinct need for specific Fleet HQ support/resources is *the implementation of a fleet-wide "Bridge Officer Training Program" at the chapter-level.* Think of Ensign Wesley Crusher serving on the bridge of the *USS Enterprise* (NCC-1701-D) from the ages of 14 to 18 before heading off to Starfleet Academy. We have a couple of chapters across the Fleet that have cracked the code on how to proactively engage and integrate our younger crew members into key departmental leadership mentoring programs. A future Higdon-Johannson Administration hereby commits to establishing a cross-regional & cross-continent team with representatives from every region (and multiple age brackets) to analyze & make recommendations on the best components of these individual 'Crusher Training Programs' and propose how STARFLEET can replicate these across the fleet. With Prodigy and Lower Decks readily available, we have a great opportunity to connect with and inspire our current Generation Z'ers (born between 1997 & 2012). We see this dynamic being very similar to the way Baby Boomers were inspired by Star Trek's Original Series, while later Gen X'ers & Millennials were inspired by the Next Generation, DS9, Voyager, & Enterprise. By making a concerted effort to engage with our teen crew members, we can all be a positive influence in the life of our younger members and hopefully keep them engaged as life-long Trek fans and active participants in STARFLEET!

Serving in leadership positions in Starfleet has been one of the more engaging and worthwhile actions in my life. I have served on the Admiralty Board since 2010 as VRC and then RC of Region 4 until very recently when I retired at terms end, to devote my attention to this race. Over the years I have received regional awards, including Support Chapter of the Year and Flag Officer of the Year. On the Fleet level, I was honored with the Starfleet Cross in 2016, a Distinguished Membership in 2018, and the Command Star in 2020. These awards are listed to show the level of participation and recognition at the local, Regional and Fleet levels that have added to my love of Star Trek fandom and to that of Starfleet.

Being able to apply my real-world experience and training has benefitted the organization. During my time as RC, I worked to update our rules and regulations, assist the Surgeon General and Communique departments in the past, apply my desktop publishing skills in a variety of ways, worked with the CFO to utilize Quickbooks to create Fleet budgets, and assisted other EC departments as needed.

I believe strongly, and have all my life, in the principles and philosophy of IDIC. This Vulcan philosophy is the basis for what OneFleet is all about, above and beyond our core values. IDIC for me is applied to all members within the diversity of our membership. I can respect the right for a member in the Fandom world or real world to be who they choose to be or are born to be. Diversity to me means, within the leadership, we look to the given talent pool to find the best persons for positions, no matter what their color or gender (or non-gender) or nationality, and even encourage persons of diverse populations within Fleet to join in the administration and work of Fleet. There is no place for discrimination in Starfleet, and I will hold a zero-tolerance policy for anything degrading or derogatory to any individual or group.

An important factor in the growth of the organization is the standardizing and customizing of marketing materials. "Cobranding" of marketing/recruiting materials CAN be done in a manner that allows chapters and regions to order coordinated materials. Options for celebrating Pride Month and other special celebrations can be made available for order, including award emblems and identifiers (such as Pet Fleet or Medical). If you want a banner for your convention, or plan to create a booth or back drop, you should be able to look at the approved and provided artwork to order on demand, cost effectively and fast. I worked for 20 years in the traditional and digital print industry as an offset/digital/desktop printer with financial effectiveness as the goal. Using variable data and distribution is a passion of mine that I will bring to assist the Communications Department in taking the CQ into a new form and delivery method that has never been seen before.

Our leadership team will continue with the positive changes that have been enacted, strengthening the things that are working and changing those that are not. We will improve relationships between the various group and regions within Starfleet. It is time to come together and work for positive change that benefits everyone.

Chapters and regions create their own events, often involving charitable work, membership drives (recruitment), and conventions. There are also many examples of members having fun together with gaming, movies, bowling, picnics, dinners, and themed parties. The key is to explore what interests the individual members have and build events around those commonalities. We always want to hear and share your good ideas.

Camaraderie: ". . . to seek out new life and new civilizations"

SFI members have one big thing in common: we love Star Trek! Interpersonal relationships are a cornerstone of camaraderie. Those relationships can be formed in a number of ways, but all involve communication and cooperation. We can form friendships near and far since SFI members can be found around the globe. To be able to learn and gain new insights from our international members is an asset we must nourish. Doing things together, facilitated sometimes by online technologies, between chapters and regions can help members feel a part of the SFI whole. Camaraderie does not happen in isolation, and membership should include many and various interesting ways to get to know each other:

Rec<mark>ognition: "....to boldly</mark> go where no one h<mark>as gone befo</mark>re."

Individuals and chapters deserve the celebration of achievements and the recognition of outstanding contributions. Consolidation of regional and Fleet-wide award programs with the Marines and other auxiliary units is a major step forward. Recognition for chapter longevity is sorely needed on the Fleet level since few Regions offer their own recognition. SFI awards and other printable items, particularly those that could be framed, should be available in a format compatible for each country's needs.

Education: "Never begin a negotiation on an empty stomach." (Ferengi Rules of Acquisition)

STARFLEET Academy is an extremely valuable resource and unlike anything else offered by other fan organizations. While many courses are entertaining or fun, certain basic or introductory courses relating to the organization and leadership positions could stand more rigorous improvement in substance to enhance their relationship to the development of leadership skills in all ranks. More uniformity in communication, presentation, and exam completion/submission would be an asset. We believe in continuing education for leaders on all levels and all departments.

Leadership: "How did you like command?" "Comfortable chair." (Riker & Wort)

The development of leadership skills must be an ongoing endeavor. Development will be most effective as bridges are built to enhance abilities through the interaction between new and experienced leaders. We must also be conscious of the need to train upcoming leaders for our future needs. Ongoing leadership development can be through mentoring, Academy courses, required reading, workshops and presentations, and methods yet to be developed using new technologies. We will work to ensure that our Executive leadership and staffing, outside the AB, are diverse with all types of members from around the world, with the appropriate skill sets.

Health: "I'm a doctor, not a bricklayer!" (Dr. McCoy)

The health and happiness of the membership is very important to us. Healthy life skills, like the recent "health challenges," can be a benefit of participation in SFI. Creative ways of incorporating healthier life style choices can be an important part of the Surgeon General or Medical departments operation. We can also learn from members in different countries on how best practices can affect health. Appropriate recognition for participation in sponsored "healthy living" activities can be added. Publicly available free programs should be examined for suitability and possible implementation.

Accessibility: "Where I come from, size, shape or color makes no difference." (Kirk)

Addressing the outreach and contact with the diverse membership of the Fleet requires us to provide accessibility to Starfleet content and activities. Arrangements for accommodations should be a natural part of any planning process, whether overseen by an Accessibility Officer or other relevant position/department. Members with experience and familiarity with ADA compliance should work closely with those planning and executing SFI content or events, including video, print, online or web content, and in-person events. Developing methods to communicate in multiple languages to ensure our messaging is consistent is another important element.

Diversity: "The fault . . . is not in our stars, but in ourselves." (Shakespeare)

Gazing into the viewpoint of Diversity thru IDIC, we see how Diversity plays a huge part in Starfleet. We all have cultural, sexual, racial, mental, or physical traits that differentiate us from one another, while also having the ability to unite us. We see Diversity as the infinite differences in infinite combinations that is the lived experience. Seeing this broadens and brightens the bigger perspectives on differences among membership identities. Starfleet is dedicated to sharing others' perspectives, and to be supportive of all. The OneFleet team is developing a place where we can all find refuge. Star Trek shows us a universe (or two) in the stars to express the ideologies of universal acceptance. Many turn to Star Trek to escape a world that is hostile towards them. We can make this world less hostile. What is stopping us? Besides asking who we can bring in, we must ask what is keeping others from feeling welcome.





Virtual STARFLEET International Conference – August 12-13, 2022

It's almost time! The Starfleet Virtual International Conference is right around the corner! Starting at 8 pm, Eastern Standard Time (EST), Friday, August 12th through Saturday, August 13th. This year's VIC is not to be missed!

To kick things off on Friday evening there will be a special 8 pm EST presentation from the STARFLEET Marines, titled Operation Barnett and led by the formidable General Carsten. Following Operation Barnett will be a variety of segments highlighting our auxiliary groups, such as PetFLEET, STARFLEET Medical, Diplomatic Corps, Tactical, and the announcement of a brand-new auxiliary.

On Saturday, starting at 12 pm EST, the main event will kick off and feature introductions from the CS and RCs, an award ceremony from Starfleet Academy, the announcement of our fleet awards, a Final Mission ceremony, a Q&A with the candidates running for CS/VCS, *Star Trek* related panels contributed by SFI members, and a slew of celebrity interviews from both *Star Trek* writers and actors as well as public speakers and scientists. At 6 pm EST the VIC will host a special virtual town hall will all four CS/VSC team candidates.

This year's celebrity interviews feature some of the cream-of-the-crop in *Star Trek* fandom, including Rachael Ancheril and Sarah Booth from *Star Trek: Discovery*; Tim Russ from *Star Trek: Voyager*; production designer Dave Blass from *Star Trek: Picard*; writer Melinda Snodgrass, co-producer of *The Orville*, Tom Costantino; fan-film favorite John Carrigan; public speaker Dr. Erin Macdonald; and space educator and scientist Dianea Carroll Phillips.

The presentations will be broadcast from a dedicated webpage, https://sfi-vic.com, where members can watch the live and recorded content from one central place. It will also be broadcast on Facebook and YouTube. For the more adventurous or technologically savvy individuals, we have prepared a virtual conference space courtesy of the folks at Gather (https://gather.town). Our Gather Town features an opportunity for SFI members to interact with each other in groups or one-on-one by integrating video conferencing technology in an 8bit world designed exclusively for SFI members by VIC chair Captain Erin Poole. Featured within the virtual conference space are special vendor booths from our sponsors, select chapters, and other charitable organizations. In addition, there are meeting rooms for SFI members to gather and interact, conference rooms to view the presentations from, and special Holodeck rooms themed around *Star Trek*-related content. The Gather Town will open to the public from 8 pm Friday and remain available until 8 pm Saturday. In addition to all these amazing activities and presentations, we will be conducting a charity auction leading up to and running throughout the event, with SFI and sci-fi-related items benefitting STARFLEET International's scholarship program. Members will be able to access and participate in the auction through a dedicated auction hosting website accessible through the Virtual IC's main website starting the week before the VIC. STARFLEET is the members who embrace you regardless of chapter or region, and encourage people to participate in their activities, regardless of where they are. It is the chapter that sponsors a weekly online poker game

that includes people from other regions, as well as those not even in Fleet, because of the bonds of friendship.

It is the members of Region 1, who have come together (between monetary donations and offering transportation) to make sure that Don and I can attend this year's Summit. STAR TREK & Strange New Worlds

Star Trek is a series that has spanned generations now. As a diehard Trekkie from the 80s and 90s, I find that it's evolved and told many stories but still has a lot of life left in it. Say what you



will of the Roddenberry Era, the Berman Era, or the Kurtzman Era; there is something for each generation in them. When *Enterprise* first debuted in the early 2000s, I was not a fan of it. I was losing interest in *TREK* through *Voyager* and *Enterprise*.

It wasn't until much later in the Kurtzman Era that I decided to go back and marathon all the *Original Series*, *Animated Series*, *Next Generation*, *Deep Space Nine*, *Voyager*, the films, and *Enterprise*. *Enterprise* was a delight upon rewatch, but on first airing, it strayed from canon in ways I didn't agree with at the time.

Say what you will of *Discovery*, *Picard*, *Lower Decks*, *Prodigy*, and now *Strange New Worlds*, but I think we have at least a few solid entries here. I am no fan of *Discovery*, whose serialized nature that DS9 did better for the Dominion War while still having fun stand-alone episodes intertwined. On *Discovery*, I can't remember half the bridge crew's names. It was already too canon-breaking in Seasons 1 and 2, and then it was allowed to do its own thing in Seasons 3 and 4. The super dark, serious nature of it is lost on me. Its serialized nature is also part of what makes it difficult to enjoy or rewatch.

Same with *Picard*. Although Season 2 was a better entry, and Season 3 looks to be good, I prefer the storytelling in *Lower Decks*, *Prodigy*, and *Strange New Worlds*. Each of the three entries is great in its own way. Do I enjoy aspects of *Picard*? Yes. *Discovery* is still a "no." But that's no slight on those who enjoy them. Each of us has our own likes and dislikes and opinions. But *Lower Decks* gave us fun *Trek*—over the top, yes, but fun. *Prodigy* gave us great writing in the vein of 90s animation action series like *Batman: The Animated Series* and *Beast Wars: Transformers*.

But the standout of the Kurtzman Era so far is the show *Strange New Worlds*. We have a solid cast in its freshman season and entry into the universe that re-introduces us to the Enterprise, Spock, Pike, Number One, Uhura, Chapel, and M'Benga. And it's not just the cast but the fleshing out of the characters we didn't know or know all about. The message in a bottle status allows us to enjoy the episodes in

whatever order on rewatching, too. I don't have to feel obligated to watch an entire season to get the plot. Are there serialized elements with character development in there? Yes, but it's done in a way reminiscent of *TNG*, *DS9*, *VOY*, and *Enterprise*.

Strange New Worlds is truly a love letter to Trek fans and finds that common ground of modern and classic Trek without creating too many rifts. It's the one series I can see old and new Trekkies lowering their phasers and shields to discuss without venomous actions. Already in our first season, we have allusions to where the characters have been and are going in their futures. We have strong personal dynamics and chemistry with the cast, and it shows. Each moment that deserves the emotional response gets it and is earned, not forced. It's fun to run back to week after week, and it gives an older Trek fan something to look forward to in the Star Trek Universe.

With the first season almost over at the time of my writing this, and not having seen the season finale yet, I find that this was, bar none, the strongest premiere season in *Star Trek* history. It hit all the notes, checked all the boxes, and gave us a powerfully written and directed season that included a lot of fun and adventure with the crew of the *Enterprise*. That was something TV and *Trek* were sorely missing, a show with the crew and ship of the *Enterprise* once more. And this entry in the franchise, while very new, was a welcome one. Akiva Goldsmith did a superb job bringing us a *Trek* series that invokes the days of old.

The comedy from Pike in the pirate takeover was great, as was the alien that turned them all into storybook characters. Every aspect of this was down to Earth and fun. The fact that Pike has a conference room briefing while cooking a meal to discuss matters shows that this crew is more than a group of co-workers; it is a *family*. The fact that I can name each character of the bridge crew and the transporter chief speaks volumes about how much they helped us see this crew as a family and is also a testament to what they wrote. I can only hope that Season 2 and beyond of this show meets or exceeds what this season gave us.

So, while my original thought was to do a review on Season 1 alone, I thank you for reading my "Ted Talk on *Trek*" and its evolution and the epic conclusion of *Strange New Worlds* Season 1.

As the magnificent Q famously said, "See you out there..."

A Timeless Virtue

Chivalry is defined by Merriam-Webster's online dictionary as "...the qualities of the ideal knight: chivalrous conduct". Much like the qualities that make up a great commanding officer, there is no definitive list of virtues that can be given and called "The Code of Chivalry." The similarities between command qualities and chivalry don't end there. They are also very much alike in that what are considered valued qualities varies significantly from region to region, with each time period, and with the situation. Much like how different cultures in the *Trek* universe hold their officers to similar, though highly nuanced standards.

It should also be stated that there is, however, significant overlap with all of these codes. One need not be a knight in 14th century France to value honesty and courage. Nor does one need to be leading an away team on a hitherto unexplored planet to appreciate creativity or discipline. During a viewing of *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, "*Disaster*" (Season 5, Episode 5), two traits took center stage that fit well within these once and future ethical codes: Trust and Conviction.

Trust, termed "faith" in some chivalric writings, is not always associated with the religious views of the culture that produced the work. Often when mentioned or exemplified in a work, the trust or faith is that which one person may have for another. This trait is regularly shown when authority is handed off as the commanding officer leaves the bridge. This is an essential part of a ship's daily routine. However, it is also a sign of trust in their subordinates. No commanding officer would readily hand off the authority over the fates of their ship and crew to someone they do not trust. It would be irresponsible to do so.

In this way, *Trust* becomes a necessary trait of an officer. This is also the case with any other daily activity. The CO needs to be able to depend on their crew to perform their duties in such a way that the ship stays capable of meeting the needs of a mission as they arise. But there does come a time where, after weighing the advice and thoughts of these trusted crew members, a CO must make a decision. Once that decision is made, they must be willing to see it through.

While it is important to maintain some flexibility and openness to changing circumstances and the views of

trusted subordinates, a wavering leader is something to be avoided. Not only is it essential to garner their crew's trust and respect, but it also helps maintain order. When commands change too frequently or drastically, chaos can slip in. Erratic behavior is at complete enmity with efficiency. And some semblance of predictability helps to manage expectations. For these reasons, a good leader makes decisions with conviction.

What makes a perfect gentle knight and a good officer is having noble characteristics, such as the ones above, and knowing when to exhibit a specific one. In the aforementioned episode, the crew of the Enterprise finds themselves in isolated pockets throughout the ship. Each group has its own major problems to deal with and in far less than ideal circumstances. Worf delivers a child. Dr. Crusher must aid Geordi in a high-stakes technical situation. Data finds himself (or at least his head) being assisted by Commander Riker to stabilize a warp containment field. And Captain Picard must guide children to safety. But the chiefest of situations as it pertains to this discourse is Counselor Troi being the senior officer on the bridge.

Understanding her shortcomings, she begins her short stint as Commanding Officer by deferring to the wisdom of Chief O'Brien and Ensign Roe. However, as the situation with the warp containment field begins to look increasingly hopeless, she is left with the choice of whether to detach the saucer or not. Doing so would save the few lives contained within, but it would abandon anyone left on the other portion of the ship. She chooses to keep the ship together and continue trying to regulate the warp field in the hopes that others would be trying to do the same. This decision drew some criticism from Roe and O'Brien, whose wife was giving birth to their child in Ten Forward.

Nonetheless, she held to her convictions, and all worked out for the best.

In this way, Troi's actions exemplified the finest of chivalric ideals as well as staying true to a key tenant of Roddenberry's dream; when a person has no other choice, they will rise to the occasion. As we members of STARFLEET continue to seek out that dream, we must strive to build those virtues in ourselves. So that when the occasion presents itself, we too can rise to meet it.

A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way, and shows the way.

A Year of Service

The USS *Star League* has just completed a year of service to the fleet, our ship, and our community. As the pandemic raged in the summer of 2020, our ship shifted to virtual meetings and programs while the need for food and necessities of life soared. Crew members volunteered to help with a variety of programs such as food drives and Toys for Tots. In the summer of 2021, we began our second year of service, adding new initiatives to our normal programs. As we begin the summer of 2022, we look back at the projects we were able to accomplish; we hope that as the pandemic wanes, our community draws strength from the generosity and concern of our crew.

We began our summer by donating baby gifts to our newest crew member, Cadet Brett. A new baby, a new crew member, a renewed sense of hope for our crew! Even as the pandemic took a small turn for the worse, the crew held a food drive benefitting the Golden Harvest Food Bank. On August 22, 2021, we partnered once again with the local Regal Cinemas to hold the food drive in conjunction with the thirty-fifth-anniversary re-release of *STAR TREK IV: The Voyage Home*. Even within an abbreviated time frame, we collected 38 pounds of food and \$250 for our local food bank, all while recruiting for STARFLEET with a large banner and *Star Trek* displays.

In November, the USS *Star League* collected food for two Thanksgiving Drives. One was for some crew members facing difficult situations due to the pandemic; the other was for the greater community, our friends, and neighbors. We delivered Thanksgiving baskets with whole turkeys, fresh vegetables, fruit, and basic necessities such as paper products, disinfectants, and toiletries.

In November and December of 2021, the crew participated in a drive for the KAG vs. STARFLEET international food drive. On December 30th, the CO reported the totals of our participation in the STARFLEET/KAG toy and food drive competition to the STARFLEET Ambassador. We were proud to have contributed 229 pounds of food to local charities.

Our usual gift-wrapping service at Barnes and Noble during Black Friday was not held this year because of COVID, but crew members collected many new toys to donate to the Toys for Tots program for next year. In December, our crew donated food baskets and gifts to some of our crew and community members. The crew also donated new sets of sheets, blankets, towels, clothing, toys, socks, and shoes – wrapped in festive paper and colorful bows. The holiday dinner consisted of fresh hams, potatoes, salads, fruits, bread, and milk, among other comestibles.

In April 2022, the crew donated food items and candy for the Easter bags of the homebound members of a local church. By this time of the year, the pandemic had greatly waned, with a few spikes of a new strain making headway, but hopefully, not as threatening as the last wave.

This year of service, from summer 2021 to summer 2022, ended with our crew registering their shipmates for STARFLEET dues, covering dues for needy crew members through the ship's "Help Our Own" fund or through private donations. There has been a lot of need during the pandemic, and we are hopeful that we are bidding it a final farewell.

The USS Star League was invited to participate in the 50th anniversary of the Ridge Peach Festival Parade held in Trenton South Carolina. We were welcomed by the director and emailed afterwards with a heartfelt thanks and wishing us to participate next year.

Boldly Go: Science Fiction - Science Fact

The "Boldly Go: Science Fiction - Science Fact" was a huge success. We were very fortunate to have a captain of not one but two nuclear submarines speak to life onboard these vessels, USS North Carolina and the USS Montpelier. Mr. Mark Davis also spoke to the science fiction - science fact portion, such as how Hollywood writers would adapt living onboard a submarine and military situations and project them into the future to make the show more realistic.

This can be seen in *Star Trek* episodes such as *TOS*: *Balance of Terror* and *ST II*: *The Wrath of Khan*, where submarine tactics are used by the crew of the Enterprise in

combat. He also spoke to the living conditions onboard being very similar: the air is recycled, supplies are what you take with you, away from friends and loved ones with limited communication, and how the crew learns to put aside differences and bonds over time—sharing mealtime and stories of home. There was audience participation as well, in the form of thought-provoking questions.

Other aspects of the event covered the strong women of Science Fiction: from Mary Shelley, who created the genre with her novel *Frankenstein* to Lucille Ball, who gave *Star Trek* and *Mission Impossible* their start, with numerous others as well. We had games and activities for the children as well. We are truly thankful to have the support of our local library, who works with us on these and other events.

USS Niagara Executive Officer Teaches Cub Scouts Basic First Aid

On March 8, 2022, USS *Niagara*'s Executive Officer, CMDR Jeffrey Triz, embarked on a Community Outreach Away Mission to Alexander, New York. While there, he used his experience as a New York State Paramedic and Instructor (now retired after 15 years of service) to teach a group of 5 to 6 members of Alexander Pack 650 Webelos (one of the levels to becoming Boy Scouts) basic first aid techniques.

During the Mission, CMDR Triz discussed and demonstrated basic first aid techniques the Scouts could use in everyday life and on their various camping/hiking outings. He discussed how to properly dress and bandage a wound and stabilize broken bones using readily available materials (such as sticks, tent poles, pillows, sleeping bags, etc.). CMDR Triz showed them some "old-school" techniques he'd learned during his training. He also discussed things like heat exhaustion/heat stroke and what to watch out for, burns of various types, and touching on the various poison plants the Scouts might encounter. The Scouts were enthusiastic participants.

The Webelos/Arrow of Light (AOL) Program is a twoyear program for fourth- and fifth-grade Scouts. Fourthgrade Scouts work toward the Webelos Badge, while fifthgraders work toward the Arrow of Light badge. These Scouts, being the oldest in the pack, are responsible for being good role models to the younger Cub Scouts. It falls to the Webelos/AOL to help explain what exciting activities await the younger Cubs and to help the Cubs during pack activities.





USS Niagara Hosts Community Easter Egg Hunt





Special Tributes to General Dennis Rayburn, SFMC



As I have sat here, I have tried multiple times to type out what I wanted to say about a man that has become more than just a friend; he became family. So, if this is long-winded, I am sorry.

I first met Dennis when I first joined STARFLEET in July of 2008. I met some people online, and the 3 of them said, why not join STARFLEET International. At the time, I did not know what it was. These three people was Tony Knopes, Bill Rowlette, and Ricardo Bruckman. They all three was on the *USS Odin* out of Region 1. So, fast forward, I joined, and I got really involved, started taking courses, and then I learned of a group within SFI called the STARFLEET Marines. I started applying for positions, but being new—and back then, the good ole boy club was really strong—no one wanted to give me a chance.

I then started talking to the 2nd Battalion OIC, which was then Major General Rayburn at the time. I started talking to him, expressed my interest, exchanged numbers, and talked for a long time. He said that he would give me a chance. He liked my attitude and said, "Steve, you will achieve great things in this group." I laughed and said that I did not want to be that big, just wanted to serve and have fun. I served as his DOIC for ten years before I moved to a position at the fleet level that was more time-consuming. I called Dennis and told him I really wanted to take the position, and that I did not want to leave him without anyone. He laughed and said not to worry about him and that he was happy to see me better myself. This is when I became Deputy JAG.

After about 40 minutes of conversation, I agreed to take the new position. Me and Dennis and his wife Jill stayed in close contact even when I moved to Region 12 when I had relocated to Central Illinois. We talked regularly and laughed often. I had never met Dennis or Jill in person, but we became close friends. They were

not just friends; they were FAMILY. I remember talking to Dennis about a crazy idea of running for Commander STARFLEET. He laughed and asked, "Steve, are you sure you want that headache?" I just laughed back and said, "I think I am."

Dennis had supported me when I first joined Fleet when no one else would give me a second look—being the new guy. He just said, "I have your back and will always be there." And he was there. Let me tell you about the late-night phone calls. Just to lose the election and come in third, he called me when they made the announcement and said, "Do not worry, we have three years to get you ready."



And, of course, I got that idea again. I called him and said, "I am gonna run again." He said, "Well, me and Tesla stand by you and will support you." Of course, during the election, he would call me and tell me, "Hey, I know you're at work, but there is a question on the campaign page you need to answer." He was my all-seeing eye, "LOL." Of course, I would pull over or stop what I am doing and answer the email. He believed prompt response was the best avenue. Fast forward, I won the election, and the first person I texted was Dennis to tell him I had won. He texted back and said, "Congratulations! You got some work to do."

The following day he called me. He and Jill wanted to throw a dinner at a local restaurant in Elizabethtown, Kentucky, to celebrate me winning. This was the type of person Dennis was. When he put in his all, he went all in or not at all. His heart was as big as the Earth itself. I got divorced from my wife, Haleigh, shortly thereafter. It was hard because I went from seeing my little girl Fiona every day to every other weekend, and it was very hard, but Dennis was there any time, day or night, when I needed to talk.

What can you say about a man who helped so many and was active for 30 years in SFI? All I can say is that I will miss my friend Dennis. He was family, and I loved him like a brother. I will miss him dearly—hearing his voice when I'd call and him saying, "What's up, boss?"

I look up at the stars and imagine him on a ship flying through space to the last final frontier. Well, my friend "Second Star To The Right" and steady as she goes.

Thank you for being my brother. I will miss you now and always.

I have known Dennis Rayburn and his wife, Jill, for about 26 years, meeting him for the first time at MidSouthCon 15 at the Holiday Inn in Memphis, Tennessee March 23, 1996. This was the date that the chapter I had worked on for the past 13 months, the Shuttle Shiloh, NCC-1881/04, had officially completed its "Chapter-in-Training" and was to be commissioned a full "Starship-of-the-Line" as the Intrepid Class Starship USS Shiloh, NCC-74683. During this meeting, I could see that he was an outgoing and special person with his wit and personality playing out.



Building my Trek "Doll House"

Just like many *Trek* fans who were teenagers in the 1990s, I remember the Playmates playsets and action figures. But with the greatest respect to those nostalgic toys, sometimes they weren't exactly perfect copies of the various sets from my favourite series, *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. In recent years, though, I've found a way to capture those times and better display my collection of figures.

Triple-Fiction Productions (triple-fictionproductions.net), a one-man operation of Casey Sullivan, is a business of 3-D printed Star Trek props and action figure accessories that has made my collection come alive in recent years. Whilst I wish I could say I get a discount for sharing about all the cool stuff I've bought from him throughout the years, this article is just for the love of it. I've purchased a few props that they offer, e.g., PADDs, hyposprays, etc., but I really enjoy the action figure accessories. The first piece I saw that grabbed my eye was the TNG-era Holodeck doors and arch (two separate pieces) (see pic #1). I had some odds and ends in my action figure collection, including a Picard in his Dixon Hill attire that I never had an excuse to show. But now I had a reason to dust it off! In the end, these accessories really allowed me to get out my random Playmates figures (it should be noted that Triple-Fiction also makes accessories for smaller and larger Trek toys, including non-Playmates ve rsions) and display them in ways that I never thought I could.

To be sure, each of these pieces cost more than the Playmates sets back in the '90s, though their value today at a con merch table is probably a bit comparable to Triple-Fiction's prices. What I enjoy about the Triple-Fiction pieces are their more accurate portrayals. For instance, the *TNG* transporter room set (see pic #2) I bought has a place for the transporter chief to stand, a perfect-looking transporter pad, and an additional piece that expands the transporter room to how I remember it on TV. This set gave me an excuse either to use my existing figures or to start exploring for new ones (I needed to find a Chief O'Brien in his *TNG* uniform). Suffice to say, getting into this is not healthy for one's wallet. But I really enjoyed getting back into my action figures and having new and fun ways to display them.

Each time I would get a package in the mail, whether pieces from the *Enterprise*-E bridge (see pic #3) or chairs for the *TOS* crew, my wife would—lovingly, I think—ask if my "baby dollhouse pieces" had come in. When Triple-Fiction offered a Ten Forward set (see pic #4), I was excited to give my Guinan figure her own place. So now I have a Ten Forward on my shelf with Guinan behind the bar, a 3-D chess set (an accessory from some forgotten *Trek* figure) on a table waiting to be played, and a place for my various *Trek* alien figures to enjoy a nice diplomatic reception with my seldom-used Picard and Riker figures in their dress uniforms.

The larger play sets are awesome, but I also like the little pieces that Triple-Fiction offers, which can complement other sets. For instance, I have the *TOS* bridge set from Playmates, featuring the *TOS* figures – but there's only a raised back wall for the rear of the bridge and then a lower captain's chair. So, where do I put Sulu and Chekov? Triple-Fiction offers *TOS*-era chairs as well as the console with the helmman's and navigator's posts. I also had randomly gotten an Admiral Kirk (*TMP*-era) figure I didn't know what to do with. Luckily, Triple-Fiction had the captain's chair available (see pic #5). And then there's my favourite little piece – I had messaged them on their Faceb ook page when they asked for suggestions, saying that I had lost the connectors for my *TNG* Playmates bridge set. A few days later, he offered them for sale!

To be sure, Casey is very open on the company's Facebook page about how supply chain issues affect his ability to keep certain items in stock. And he only makes so many of each item – they can go quickly, even in one day! But customers can put in requests for items and be alerted when the stock is active again. Again, it's a collectors' investment, but it really helped my *Trek* toy collection come alive again, even if it's just to build my big *Trek* doll house.

INTERVUE: Noah Averbach-Katz Talks About Type 1, Discovery, and D&D

Our guest today has been boldly going where few have gone before. As a young man, he has often attended Star Trek adventures with his mother, just like me. And later in life, he and his future wife were classmates at the Juilliard School Drama Division, along with Discovery cast member Mary Chieffo. Since then, he has played the Andorian "Ryn" during the third season of Star Trek: Discovery.

He has bred this amazing D&D campaign for Discovery cast members, which we will talk about later. He and his wife, Mary Wiseman, from Discovery, have just celebrated their third wedding anniversary not too long ago. And just a few days ago, he has launched a Kickstarter for his new short film, Type 1, which in under 24 hours has surpassed its goal of \$25,000. And as of this article, it has more than doubled, over \$66,000.

Friends of the fleet. Ladies and gentlemen, we have Noah Averbach-Katz! (Click HERE to DONATE to Type 1 - his short film on Kickstarter!)

Hello. Thank you for having me, Dean. Boy, when you put it all like that, I've been [a] busy man.



So first, we got to talk about *Type 1*. It reached its \$25,000 goal within a day. I want you to tell us what led for you to write this amazing short story we're about to see, gosh.

Boy, so a lot of different things. I was doing a play in Baltimore. And there was an amazing deaf actor in this show, Michelle Edmonds. I was just struck, you know, kind of getting, she sort of was very gracious and sort of letting us into the little deaf community that was sort of around the show. And then that sort of gave a window to the larger deaf community. And it just made me think about the disabled community at large and also the diabetes community. And, you know, one of the things I was struck with was how they, the deaf community, was really had a real community behind it, you know. They all sort of had, they sort of, you know, all understood the same things about their community. And the diabetes community is so fractured, you know,

there aren't any single places where everybody congregates, where everybody understands the same things. And even with the internet, there's little pockets around here. And along with that, there's not a lot of diabetes, and especially Type 1 diabetes media out there for people to sort of congregate around to flock to see themselves in. And when it has been in media, it has been sort of as a plot point.

And I thought, what can I maybe like develop this into a short, then that was in February of 2020. And then March of 2020, you know, I was in New York and everything sort of shutdown. The reality of not being able to acquire, you know, both for diabetics and anybody who needed prescription medication and not be able to acquire the things you need to become very real.

And so, trapped in this tiny little apartment, we're at the time I just over a few days, I just put the story down on paper. And that was kind of it. And this story of a Type 1 diabetic man and his wife sort of leaving behind some sort of disaster, searching for what they hope is like a cache of insulin so that they can keep going became *Type 1*.

That is amazing to hear about this, and it's a great story. And to let you know, I'm a Type 2 diabetic. I just became a diabetic, surprisingly, at the start of the pandemic.

Oh, well, welcome to The Club.

When I read about your tale, I was like, "This is something that's never been told before. And I'm glad that you became the voice about it." And when I read, you became a T1D for 20 years. You are right that so often, it's usually used as a plot point, or it's almost like the killer did it, because he had Type 1. And I want you to talk about how are you able to take this story that sometimes in the media world was a negative or negative plot point, and decided to give it some positive aspects for a change?

What I'm sort of hoping to do with the movie alongside just like telling a really compelling and interesting and new story is also sort of tie it into the insulin pricing crisis in the United States, which affects both Type 1s and Type 2s, who use liquid insulin. Just sort of give people a window into what it really could be like to ration insulin. What it could barely feel like to not know where you're going to get the insulin that you need to stay alive. And again, doing that in a way that is traumatized, that is a bit removed from our day-to-day reality. So, like a show like *Star Trek* or other sort of sci fi shows, if it's just removed a little bit, it feels like you can step into it a little bit more and not feel like you're being bombarded or talked to, in a way trying to trick people into feeling like, oh, I can really put myself in this situation.

And so that was sort of my thought when it came to trying to, you know, tell this story, that it's not just about people walking through a woods or just telling a story. If there is that sort of meaning to it, of giving folks who either have had to go through insulin rationing—who haven't known where their next dose of insulin is going to come from, or for folks like me who have been very privileged and lucky, but still live with the fear that you are one or two steps wrong, from mistakes or accidents or just some bad luck. Or, you know, things like in the world that are completely out of your control from not having access to insulin anymore and putting that out there.

So, folks who live with this and have lived with it really can see themselves in it. And folks who are new to it can feel like immediately connected to this kind of story.

What are some of the most stigmas that Type 1 or even Type 2 had to deal with?

I think in general, when you talk about the word "diabetes," the sort of clumping in Type 1 and Type 2 diabetics, I think there's a lot of shame and blame around healthiness, weight, choices which one are not necessarily accurate, and two are definitely not helpful when it comes to treating people with the disease. For people to get help with the disease, any sort of baggage or shame or stigmas like that, it just doesn't help people to live healthy lives. It also, even within the medical profession, any kind of judgment or stigma as well, that is brought to the table as well, it just doesn't help people to stay healthy.

For Type 1. There's less of that classic, like "stigmas" attached, and more of a lot of confusion, which can lead to people making wrong assumptions about what we need to stay alive. Whether that's through saying, "oh, you can't eat that you can't do this," which is just

a misunderstanding. Or if that's from people not understanding what to do in an emergency situation, you hear these horror stories of people giving insulin when they don't need any more, which can obviously be very dangerous. And it sort of extends to like the greater disability community and how disabled people are, as a whole, are treated in the United States.

And in terms of statistics, one in four Americans are disabled. It's a massive, massive community who is affected by these things. It's not, you know, this small little niche group who's raising their hand and whatever; it's 1/4 of Americans.

How did you know that the wonderful Anthony Rapp was the right person to direct this piece and help you tell this tale?

Oh, man, well, it just so synergistic, but it just couldn't be more perfect. You know, I wrote this script; Mary's really excited about it. I'm really excited about it. My little community is really excited about it. And I start playing D&D with Anthony, and we hit it off. I'm playing in his home game, and we just get to spend all this time together during Season Three. He was shadowing directors on *Discovery* and shooting some of his own stuff. I think he shot some scenes with Mary, shadowing people like Jonathan Frakes. Just like these incredible directors, and he went to goddamn film school.

I'd like you to talk about the earliest moment you found out about the final frontier.

It's funny, Dean. I don't really remember the first glimpse because I feel like it wasn't like, "Oh, now you're starting" was like, "this is on, you're doing this." You know what I mean? It was just like, it was just a part of what I did, going to conventions, there wasn't really a conversation "Do you want to go? It was like, "Which friend do you want to invite in? Are you ready to leave?" Yeah, you know what I mean? Wasn't like, what do you want to watch? It's like, we're watching *Voyager*.

So, I don't really have like a first moment. It's more just like, it was like a birthright. I think that it was just given to me, passed down from generation to generation.

And I believe it was your mother who introduced you to the trek?

Oh, yes.

Do you remember, as an attendee, who were your favorite guests to see?

Well, I love seeing Robert Picardo. I remember we saw like him. And I want to say, I can't remember who it was with. I'm sure somebody can actually tweet at me and tell me that, but I'm sure that I saw him do like opera performance stuff at the basement of a Hilton in Sacramento. And it was just, it's just so fun, over the top and goofy and exciting. I just remember him like really vividly because he just has such a big personality at these things. It's so fun when somebody really takes center stage, and it's just like, all over the place in a really fun way. And of course, Frakes is amazing, and Patrick Stewart is amazing.

So, let me ask, fan to fan: What is your favorite movie, series, and character? Asides from *Discovery*.

Favorite movie, boy? Here's the thing. I grew up in a very strange time for *Star Trek*, like I hit you know, 11, 12 like, peak sort of consuming TV but not really in your control yet. You know, you can say I want to watch TV, but you still have to get approved of what you're watching. The movie that I have with this is a wrong opinion. The movie that I loved the most in my childhood was *Nemesis*. I shouldn't. It's wrong, but I can't stop me. And that also extends to *Enterprise*, that was the series that I grew up episode to episode with, and sort of have the most sort of deepest, I love them all.

Favorite character is tough. Obviously, Tilly is my favorite character of all time. Love, love Tilly! Outside of that, I really loved Troi growing up because my mom was a therapist. Then getting to meet Marina was very cool. So that's been great. But I do think my current sort of go-to is Shran because I got so invested in him as I was sort of prepping for Ryn on *Discovery*.

Well, that's a great segue to my next question. How did you prepare for the role of Ryn? And then tell us about working with your wife, with David, with this stellar cast for Season Three?

Yeah, I basically just watched all of Shran; that's what I did—you know, his prep. I watched the other *TOS* episode with this sort of fake



Andorian. In terms of prep, that's really what there was at the time was just this performance. I just tried to

watch it and think a lot about the other like *Star Trek* races, species, whatever. It's very clear what they are about, what to cling on. What the Vulcans are about. I think a lot of that comes since they've been around forever in a good way, but like early *Star Trek* is so didactic. It is this trait of humanity or whatever.

So like Vulcans present logic, but they cover their crazy emotions. And Klingons present honor and blood lust, but they are about tradition and doing the right thing or whatnot. When I say Andorians, what I am actually saying is just Jeffrey Combs. What he was doing was sort of putting out like this very cocky, surefooted badass front covering this really deep, well of emotional sensitivity. He's so sensitive. He's so hurt. He's so wounded when that veneer drops as his arc sort of progresses. I kept that in mind because I didn't really know Ryn's arc. I didn't know what was going to happen to him. I didn't know if he was going to be in one episode. I knew he was gonna die because I've watched enough *Star Trek* that I know when people are gonna die. I didn't know how long.

I actually shed tears when he died to be honest with you.

So did my mom. And I just kept that in mind as I was starting to build the character. Being on set was amazing. I got to do so many different amazing things, which is so rare for *Star Trek* to get to have a three-episode arc. Usually, it's like a one-episode arc, especially in the newer stuff. You're there for a season, or you're there for two seconds. To get to do something in between was amazing.

I got to work with so many different people, you know, I got to do early stuff. It was just me and David, you know, and so it was so much fun and such a great bonding experience. And he's such an amazing guy and leader and actor, just a really incredible actor to get to like have my first days on set with just him. It was sort of his first time where he was the guy on set, you know, because they had shot in Iceland.

And getting to work with Mary was incredible because we hadn't worked since Julliard together. And, she's just (Expletive) was so good. I was like, "Oh sh*t, you're really good at this." I've walked in the first time. And she was so relaxed. It was totally her, said totally her thing. And I was like, I need to step up my (Expletive) game right now that she's stomping on me, and it's embarrassing, but I loved it. I really couldn't have asked for anything more. And, you want to live forever and everything you do, but that's not really how the world works.


And speaking of you and Mary, how did you two celebrate your wedding anniversary?

Well, she's working on a play right now in New York, called "At the Wedding" at LCT3, and she's like the lead.
She's on stage the



entire time; she's exhausted. I bought her an at-home massage. I sat on the couch and relaxed, and she got a massage. It was exactly what both of us needed.

Well, that's wonderful to hear. Now we got to talk about this Disco Does D&D campaign. So, you got to tell us all about [it] because it was part of stretch goal number one. Now it's part of stretch goal number two, which stretch goal number one was \$43,000 hours, it's gone. Now its \$65,000!



We started playing D&D [as] a way to stay connected. When we were shooting the pandemic, it was all prevaccine. And we were super, super trying to be as safe as possib le. And we didn't spend any time in the same room together. At this point in [the] pandemic arc, we were sick of Zoom drinks. Nobody wanted to Zoom drink after a week of work, right. So, this became a way for us to hang out. And it was also a way for me to get to know Ian and Blu, who I hadn't really spent any time with, and who are now considered, like, really good friends, which has been amazing.

Anthony would post these updates, just sort of writing out what happened at the campaign. And people got really invested in our little story. We were all very invested in it was this really amazing place to sort of escape to, and people would always keep streaming it and ask, "Are you streaming? Are you streaming it?" And well, honestly, we don't want to stream this. We need this to be for us. In this offseason, Blu really was like, "I want to stream this GD game." and I was like, "I mean, you don't have to tell me twice." We got it up on Twitch, and it's just been so much fun.

We are we're doing almost like a sort of college campaign, which has been very fun. Based off my original alma mater, UC Santa Cruz, I've renamed it Rio Del Mar, which has been really fun. Ian never went to college, and Blu into theater college. I'm trying to give them both the real classic college experience.

"From Unknown Graves," Episode Seven of Season Three of *The Orville New Horizons* brings us the first look at the original Kaylons, the race that created the artificially intelligent robots that we have come to be known as the Kaylons.



The Good, the Bad & the Ugly TOS: Where No Man Has Gone Before

In the last issue, I explored the pilot episode of Star Trek, *The Cage*. In this issue, I will explore the second pilot of *Star Trek*, *Where No Man Has Gone Before*. When NBC rejected

The Cage, the network still felt the series had some value and asked for a second pilot to be made. This unheard-of request made it possible for Star Trek to appear on National TV. It also needs to be stated that Lucy Ball helped because she believed Star Trek would benefit her company, Desilu Productions.

Overview: Where No Man Has Gone Before —The story tells what happened when the Enterprise tried to cross a barrier at the edge of our galaxy. Two crewmen receive god-like powers, and Kirk has to decide what to do before they become too powerful. Part of the problem is one of the crewmen is Kirk's friend Gary Mitchell.

The Good

This episode gives Gene's vision of what *Star Trek* was to be about. The Vision of people of different races working together to explore the unknowns of space. The story tells that the Enterprise crew is looking for a distress beacon, and once they find



it, they continue with their mission even though the beacon reveals that it is dangerous to proceed. When they encounter the *danger*, the crew continues to work and does not give up even though the situation seems hopeless. The struggle becomes intense when the *danger* is one of their fellow crewmembers and a friend. The episode gives a good science fiction story of what we might find we begin to explore the vastness of space.

The Bad

The bad part about this episode is that it is a pilot. We don't know the characters, and we don't get a full understanding of the relationship between Kirk and Mitchell. It might have been better to start the



show with Mitchell and Kirk instead of setting up the relationship between Kirk and Spock. We get enough of Spock in other scenes, but we do not really see what Mitchell is like before the transformation. We are not given enough information to care for Gary Mitchell's loss. Kirk

provides this statement, "I want his service record to end that way; he didn't ask for what happened to him." He refers to a note to be put in Mitchell's service record. "Mitchell gave his life in the performance of his duty." This is supposed to generate empathy for the Mitchell character, but since we do not know him, it falls flat.

The Ugly

Even though *Star Trek* tried to change how we see ourselves, the prevailing thoughts of the time still found their way into the show. For example, when Dr. Dehner shuts Mitchell down when he tries to initiate some playful banter, he calls her a "Walking freezer unit."



This is a typical response to a woman trying to stay professional in her job and the man discounting her as a woman because she is unwilling to play his game. In the 60s, women were just starting to be in positions of authority, and men would discount them by calling them bossy or over-aggressive. Sadly, it still happens today because of the fragility of some male egos. Hopefully, we will soon recognize people for their worth, not their gender.

Conclusion: Overall, the episode is very good and is a favorite of most *Star Trek* fans. The episode has its problems because of the era in which it was made, but the story is fairly intact. I recommend it because it gives a feel of what *Star Trek* is truly about.

The Wonder That Is WonderFest

There were two guests who were actors, though they were not the main focus of the con. Rico E. Anderson, who was in *Star Trek* (2009), was signing autographs and also did a panel. She was in a special section of a display room that had *Lost in Space* sets and props brought by *Lost in Space* superfan Tom Pfrogner, also in attendance. The con ended with a wrap party Sunday night. It was a table reading of *The Trouble with Tribbles* script. The reading was done by a local group called Scripts Gone Wild, along with Kirk Thatcher, Marta Kristen, and Daren Dochterman. You may think you know the script, but this presentation was totally hilarious! The best part was Kirk Thatcher reading the part of Spock in an Elmer Fudd-like accent. The Minnow would be lost – in a temporal rift . . . lost!


The ship set down ashore on an uncharted planet's isle With two Ewoks,




