## **Probe Views Venus Surface**

Believe it or not, we're finally starting to learn about our neighbor, the planet Venus! Recently I read several articles about WISPR telescopes installed on a probe sent to study the surface of the Sun by NASA. As part of the trajectory to reach the sun, the probe passed close to Venus, and the planet's gravity pulled it closer. These images were captured in 2020 and 2021.

When this happened, the probe's telescopes captured images of Venus and were able to cut through the cloud cover to get images of the surface of the planet for the first time ever. It's a random chance that temperature variations allowed these images to be captured, even though the telescopes were designed for photographs of the sun itself. The probe captured a large feature, a highland region, now named Aphrodite Terra.

Because of the sun's proximity to Venus, it's much too bright for the probe to capture images during daylight direct exposure on the planet, so it must get images from the night/dark side.



NASA will use the information to plan future missions and perhaps even Venus-specific missions to study the planet's surface and atmosphere.

## **Remembering** Nichelle

Usually, writing a memorial about someone who passed on is done by someone close to the person. Meeting Nichelle Nichols once does not make me a close friend. Even though we may feel a close bond with a television or movie personality, can we say that we really know the person? We get that close feeling because they are in our homes, or we see them in theaters regularly but is that close enough to give a memorial to a person you only know through media? I only feel for Nichelle partly because of how society viewed her and her role in the civil rights movement. Though we only met once, I still consider Nichelle a friend.

Nichelle may not have started as an icon, but she paved the way for women and African Americans to be seen as other than what the culture of the 60s had made for them. It took Martin Luther King Jr. to point it out to her. Most people

know the story of how Nichelle wanted to quick *Star Trek* because she didn't feel it gave her the steps needed to better opportunities. A chance meeting with Rev. King gave her some insight when he pointed out that Uhura might not enhance her career. Still, it did improve the possibility of better careers for women and African Americans in the country. After the meeting with Rev. King, Nichelle went to Gene Roddenberry to ask for her job back, and Gene handed her resignation back, which he had previously torn up.

When I hear this story, I find something more besides how Nichelle was inspirational to other people. I see a way we all need to live. I learned that whatever you do, do not become discouraged if it does not look like it is taking you to the place you want to go. We need to understand that what we are doing may seem small, but it may have more significant ramifications for others. So, do not stop trying to do bigger and better things but look to see how what you are doing is helping others to do bigger and better things.

The part as Uhura led Nichelle to help NASA recruit 8,000 of the nation's best and brightest, including the trailblazing astronauts who became the first African American, Asian, and Latino men and women to fly in space. Among those recruited were Dr. Sally Ride, the first American female astronaut, and the United States Air Force Colonel Guion Bluford, the first African-American astronaut. As well as Dr. Judith Resnik and Dr. Ronald McNair—both flew successful missions during the Space Shuttle program before they died in the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster on

January 28, 1986. If she had not stayed, she most likely would not have had the opportunity to work with NASA.

When asked about Nichelle's character Uhura, most people will quote, "Hailing Frequencies Open." People cite this line as why Nichelle wanted to quit *Star Trek*—it seemed to be her only line. In *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, Denise Crosby felt this about her character Tasha Yar, giving it as the reason she quit. It may be the line Nichelle used most often, but she did have others. The one that meant the most to me came from the episode *Bread and Circuses*. Spock spoke about how odd the people of the planet would worship the sun. Uhura replied, "I'm afraid you have it all wrong,

Mister Spock, all of you. I've been monitoring some of their old-style radio waves, the empire spokesman trying to ridicule their religion. But he couldn't. Don't you understand? It's not the sun up in the sky. It's the Son of God." I am unsure if they used Nichelle to quote the line because of her Presbyterian background and because Mr. Shatner and Mr. Nimoy were Jewish. Still, I find it interesting that a secular show referenced Christianity. I also believe that Nichelle spoke the line with some conviction. This line let me think that there was acceptance of my beliefs in the *Star* 

*Trek* universe. Even though Mr. Roddenberry claimed to be an atheist, somehow, the script got by him. The part that stood out to me is "the empire spokesman trying to ridicule their religion. But he couldn't." Nichelle had Uhura emphasize this part along with the "It's the Son of God" line. It felt like it showed her belief and her standing against those who ridicule religion.

Nichelle was born Grace Dell Nichols on December 28, 1932, in Robbins, IL, a suburb of Chicago. She did not like the name and asked her parents for a different one. They choose Nichelle meaning "victorious maiden." Her career started as a singer and dancer touring the country with Duke Ellington and Lionel Hampton. Her role on Star Trek made two famous men Trekkies, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and President Barack Obama. When Nichelle met the President, she asked him to confirm a rumor that he had a crush on her when he was younger. The President was proud to confirm that he had a crush on her and was a proud "Trekker."

I met Nichelle in 2018 at a convention in Cincinnati, OH. Even though I could see the toll dementia had taken on her health, there still was a sparkle in her eyes that dementia would never touch. I gave her a communication badge from our ship, which she promptly put on her outfit. Even though she is gone from us, her light will continue to shine on all the people she touched. May we, as Nichelle did, make the world a better place.







I was very blessed in always knowing what I wanted to do, and by the grace of God I've been able to succeed in my chosen career.

#### **The Quilt That Engineering Built** by CAPT Darrell Millner, *USS Heimdal*, R1

I came on board the USS Heimdal, NCC-1793 (originally the USS Asgard, NCC-1843/01) in the mid-1980s. Looking back over the ebb and flow of time, I can still recall my first tour as Chief Engineering Officer succeeding CEO Dennis Henderson and my first interactions with RDC (Regional Department Chief) of Engineering C. Cook.

I've seen Region 1 develop and change through so many cycles, but this was my first tour in the big leagues, 'so to speak.' Back before email, getting that welcome letter from ADM Cook made my day.

Moving forward a few years to 1993, ADM Cook—still RDC of Engineering—takes the lead in a project sending 1foot square pieces of cloth out to the RC, RDCs, and divisions to participate in an effort. They each personalized the squares and returned them to Cook. This included my CO—then RC—Linda Neighbors (now Smith). She then created a masterful quilt for the R1 Conference (Summit). A work of art with excellent thick batting and very good stitchwork.

Warp forward to August 2022, Gatlinburg, TN, USA, and the R1Summit hosted by the leadership of the SS Bennu Station. A well-run, enjoyable, informative, and stellar event. On Saturday evening, after our meal, the annual auction began. And like true Ferengi, my wife Barbara and I acquired several items at almost criminal prices; no, seriously, I felt guilty (ok, only a little bit). Much to my surprise, as the evening and the treasures moved along, there it was, "the quilt that Engineering Built." A slice of

The Good

This episode is one of the great episodes of *TOS*. Two elements make this such a great episode. The first element concerns the suspense that builds with not knowing what the alien Balok will do to the Enterprise. It creates a good edge-of-your-seat feeling that draws you into the story. The second element concerns how each individual reacts to the suspense that is happening. The Bailey character adds to the suspense but also shows what would happen when

dealing with a situation like this. The end, where Bailey admits that he can make mistakes but is still willing to try, gives us a reason to continue working to do our best.



#### The Bad

There were no bad parts that fit this criterion.

#### The Ugly

Technology-wise, the Balok puppet might have been scary on the smaller screen, with most TVs in the 60s being black & white. Today he doesn't look as scary.

Another problem with the episode falls to the sexist attitude of the 60s. Kirk is upset that a female yeoman has been

assigned to him. This may be pushing the boundaries of the 1960s, but today would be seen as sexist. The problem seems that Kirk doesn't feel that Rand is capable of being his yeoman. The bigger problem is



McCoy's comment that Kirk can't trust himself around her. Even though the comment is played for laughs, it makes the situation worse because not only can a woman not be a Captain's yeoman because she is incapable of the duty, but she is a sex distraction for the captain. Instead of making a joke, they could have shown women are capable of any job a man can do.

**Final Thought**: This episode has a good storyline which makes for good science fiction. I feel we can look past the ugly part based on the era and still enjoy it for the entertainment it brings.

#### **Auxiliary Services**

Greetings STARFLEET,

Many of you may know me as a Regional Coordinator or even by my roles over the years in the SFMC. However, this past July, I took on a new one the Director of Auxiliary Services. The position was created on March 19, 2022, by Admiralty Board Resolution (AB22-03) as a new permanent post in SFI, similar to that of the Inspector General; in that the position is not a member of the Executive Committee, works directly for the Commander, STARFLEET, and is on a three-year term.

That same resolution transferred all the existing Auxiliary Departments, as established in the Membership Handbook, Section 10, from the Office of the Vice-Commander, STARFLEET (VCS), to the Director of Auxiliary Services. The entire purpose of the move and this position is to free up the VCS's time and energy back to what that role is codified for in the by-laws—that of Corporate Secretary and being the right hand of the CS. With more and more ideas being pitched for new Auxiliary Departments and the existing ones growing, it was becoming untenable for the VCS to monitor, nurture and manage them all while also doing the more urgent matters of their job.

So what does the DAS do? The first is to ensure that all Auxiliary departments have a clear conduit to the CS and, if need be, the AB, and visa versa. In this way, SFI leadership can direct the goals of the organization and have a clear communication path to ensure that the Aux Depts are in line with that vision. I will also be mentoring those Aux Departments that are established but not yet permanent. My firm belief is that if you are not growing, you are dying—so we need to make sure that all the departments have a



vision for the future. Additionally, all Aux depts must provide a valid service for the membership and/or organization.

It is by that second bit that all new proposals will be judged. We just launched perhaps the most ambitious, in scope, of any Aux Dept—the STARFLEET Corp of Engineers. If you have creative skills: computer coding, 3D printing, woodworking, etc., there is a place for you in the Corps of Engineers. We also have the Diplomatic Corps (Outreach to other organizations + fun between chapters) and STARFLEET Tactical (gaming coordination and mentoring), which are new and growing according to new plans and directions.

We will be getting websites for DAS Headquarters and every one of the Auxiliary departments here soon.

Ben Thomas, from Region 11, is my Deputy for this new effort, and he and I are both very excited to help these aspects of our fandom and our organization grow. If you have any questions, please reach out to me at <u>DAS@sfi.org</u>.

Aug Not Available Not Available First, I need to take a moment for a personal note. I want to thank everyone at all levels of STARFLEET for your thoughts, prayers, and support for myself, my family, and my chapter in the wake of Dennis' passing. I also want to thank Franklin Newman, Jayden Tyronian, and TJ Allen for stepping in and helping to get the SFDPP materials finished (more on that later in this report).

June was a little down for SFA, presumably because much of the membership is enjoying the summer months and spending more time away from their computers and other devices. Just over 115 students completed almost 1200 exams.

The SFDPP 2022-2023 Recertification Course rolled out to all members on July 21. Just in July, 90 members took this exam, which is outstanding. We also revised the SFDPP Manual, changing the focus a bit to look more at what DPP means to us, not just as STARFLEET, but also what it means for our Regions and our Chapters. We feel this will help everyone understand the material a bit better. Additionally, we revised the SFDPP 101 and 102 exams to fit the new manual better.

Thanks in part to the opening of the new SFDPP exams, our numbers were up in July. Just over 1700 courses were taken by 206 students.

After talking to CompOps, we believe we are close to having the cross-wiring problems resolved. The database should no longer be posting grades to the wrong courses; however, there are still some back-end problems that are resulting in some grades showing up incorrectly in the chapter MSRs. CompOps and ES are working together to take what we hope will be the final steps to getting this resolved. When we have finished with that, we will be asking students to report any issues in their database records, other than grades that are still missing from the blackout period. Once we are sure that nothing is still crossed, we will then resume importing the missing grades



from the blackout period. We appreciate everyone's patience with this.

Kudos to the VIC staff for the wonderful event. The SFA staff really appreciated the hard work that went into our area in GatherTown, as well as the rest of the weekend. SFA/SFMCA had an "open house" in GatherTown on Saturday evening; while I don't have exact numbers, I know there were between 45 and 50 people in the Academy area during that time. Staff members spoke to several students not only during the open house but at other times during the weekend, and I personally was able to resolve some issues that were brought to my attention.

As always, we are looking for a few good volunteers. Anyone wishing to join the SFA staff is encouraged to fill out an application at the Humanoid Resources website, or you may contact me directly at jazdansfa@gmail.com; I will be happy to discuss open positions with you.

#### SFMCA NEWS

We rolled out a new MSR in May that allows us to track ribbons, awards, and devices as they are earned. We hope that this will make the job of the Database operator easier for future entries. As always, please be patient as we are an all-volunteer organization, and we have a lot to go through to make this the best Academy in STARFLEET.
