Greetings and Welcome to Summer!!

The past few months have been slower on the administration side of things which has been great.

As of today, the Administration has completed or is still working on:

Updating of the Membership Handbook

The AB has approved the new handbook and that is a great thing. You will find that, among other things, we have clarified some sections, and streamlined the timelines for the elections and IG investigations.

Updating of the Regional Coordinator Handbook

The New Regional Coordinator handbook will be distributed very soon to the Academy for inclusion in the FOS college as well to all currently seated Admiralty members.

Updating of the Operations ManualThis is still in the branding phase and will be sent to Operations and the Academy in the coming days.

Implementing of the new 23-24 SFDPP certification

The SFDPP audits continue. In the past few days, there have been emails going out to chapters to remind them of their need to comply. All members with enhanced access will need to be certified up to the 22-23 recertification before June 30th. Any members with enhanced access that expires prior to that must recertify or the DPO will remove permissions. All members with 22-23 recertification are valid until January 1, 2024. At that point, the new recertification exam will be made available and all enhanced access members will need to recertify, regardless of their certification date, to the 23-24 version in the first quarter of the calendar year. We are moving to a First quarter recertification for all members every year to make it easier for you to remember when you must take the test.

23-24 Operating budget

The new Budget has been approved and is in place to take effect on July 1. This is the first time in 12 years that the Budget has been approved prior to the start of the next SFI Fiscal Year. Well done to all.

Membership Grant

The Grant information is still being worked on. In the meantime, I remind

you all that if you wish to donate anything to the quartermaster for funds to go to those members that need help with dues to do so. Start with your pips. They are the easiest to ship and most needed.

Creation of new Database platform

The Database is still in progress. I am hoping that a mock up version will be shown to the AB by the next meeting. It should have many safe features for us all to use. SFDPP is the focus with this new version. If you have things that you would like to see in the new database, please enter your ideas through the help desk so that we can add them to the future features list.

More Ongoing Work:

International Conference Bids

This administration is seeking bids for the 2024 International Conference. This is the 50th year of STARFLEET and is a special event. If you wish to Bid on this honor in whatever form (In Person, Virtual, or Hybrid), I encourage you to do it soon. All global options will be reviewed. I have heard already of one potential bid, and it would be great to see more.

Directorships

I am very pleased to have placed the Director of Diversity. This new department will focus on all aspects of Diversity thru IDIC. Greetings STARFLEET!

I am very excited to have a number of my previous projects I've mentioned in past issues of the CQ behind me. At time of print, you should all be able to find a copy of the NINETEENTH edition of the Membership Handbook and some associated "release notes" to go with it in the Members Hub of our website. That being said, the official posting was meant to act as an "official" list of changes, but I had a more "conversational" version of those notes that I'd worked on prior to paring it down. I would like to share some more personal thoughts within the CQ about the MHB that I thought you all might like to read from me. Keep in mind that this was used to help write the official release so they will certainly bear some similarities. I hope you all enjoy the read and that our work on the MHB is successful in its efforts.

MHB Release Note thoughts from the VCS

As a member since 2013, I have personally witnessed six previous updates to the Membership Handbook (MHB). With this latest release, my team and I are proud to present this newest edition. In the past, I was involved in charting changes as a member of the Admiralty Board (AB), without fully grasping the difficulties of implementing each modification into the MHB document. Over the years, I have gained valuable insights and successfully shared contextual information and changes with my Region, even in challenging conversations. Now, as the VCS. I have had the opportunity to witness the intricate process behind updating the MHB and gained a newfound appreciation for its complexity. Moreover, I am pleased to offer additional information alongside this new MHB release. Therefore, I present the following "release notes," highlighting significant changes in this nineteenth edition of the MHB Update.

First Note

The VCS team has dedicated extensive effort to produce a document that we can all take pride in. Nevertheless, we remain open to the possibility of oversights and typographical errors. If you come across any issues, please reach out to me or my Chief of Staff, Lauren White. Thank you for your cooperation.

Overall Document Edits

We have diligently reviewed the entire document and aimed to eliminate the previously employed "conversational" tone, which included parenthetical expressions incongruent with the formality expected in a Governing Document. We have made significant revisions to remove the use of "childlike" language and transition the writing style to a more official register. While we acknowledge that some remnants of the conversational tone may persist, a multitude of edits have been made throughout the document to steer it in a more professional direction. Additionally, we have implemented consistent shorthand references (e.g., AB for Admiralty Board) and replaced gender-specific terminology with gender-neutral alternatives.

Refusal of Service Language – Section 01:03 & 02:01

There has been considerable concern surrounding recent cases of membership expulsions or denials. It is important to note that the publicly available details do not fully capture the context behind these actions. We consulted legal counsel to appropriately incorporate the language and believe that it is in the best interest of the organization. The section does not grant a single individual the power to unilaterally block another member's admission, as some might misinterpret. Instead, it states that a member of the ECAB can raise an issue regarding the denial of membership within the first ten days of processing. The governing body, of which they are a part, will then decide on the matter. It is essential to understand that various individuals can sometimes cause real damage to our organization and its members. Consequently, we needed to establish clear guidelines regarding the vetting process, as the functioning of a private organization inherently involves such measures.

Fake Memberships – Section 02:05

The inclusion of this language marks the primary addition in this edition of the MHB update. SFI has long encountered challenges with individuals falsely appearing on various ship rosters. Upon closer examination, many of these individuals were not real, were animals, deceased, or unaware of their membership in the Organization. While the organization previously

responded by accepting their membership fees, my Chief of Staff and I encountered numerous instances of entire fictitious ships existing. These entities had the potential to influence RC and CS elections through substantial membership fees. Although we do not believe this has occurred on a significant scale, the hypothetical scenarios raised concern and necessitated the establishment of mechanisms to address and prevent such occurrences.

CS Background Checks – Section 03:02

Upon assuming office, the CS, my Chief of Staff, and I conducted an in-depth investigation into the concept of "bonding" and its actual implications, as per the organization's intentions and capabilities. It became apparent that the only form of bonding we had was limited to liability insurance coverage for the CS during events. This arrangement did not fulfill the true requirements of bonding. In essence, what we truly sought was a background check for individuals aspiring to run for the position of President.

Election Timeline - Section 04:08

I must admit that I had not given much consideration to the election timeline until I experienced it firsthand. Similarly, when discussing this with various AB members, they too had not thoroughly examined the timeline. From an individual member's perspective, the process may seem as simple as learning about the candidates, casting a vote, and concluding the election. However, I can attest that the overall process is extensive, burdensome, and protracted. It feels like campaigning goes on indefinitely, only to be followed by lengthy International Conference (IC) procedures. The previous timèline was largely designed around the physical mailing of ballots, which posed challenges for international members due to mailing times. The increased utilization of online tools has significantly enhanced our ability to conduct timely and accurate voting. Consequently, we have shortened the overall timeline, streamlined the procedural aspects, and expanded the requirements for candidacy. These adjustments are aligned with our improved online voting capabilities.

Non-SFI Crew - Section 05:04

While the addition of a single sentence may appear minimal, its importance should not be underestimated. According to North Carolina law, Commanding Officers (COs) are responsible for electing their RC representatives. Consequently, COs should only be selected from within the organization, meaning that members listed on crew rosters who are not SFI members cannot participate in their CO's electoral process. Although this may appear stringent, careful consideration reveals the rationale behind this requirement.

Disciplinary and Appeals Process – Section 08

Similar to my discovery of the election timeline, I became fully aware of the disciplinary process only after my involvement in the Disciplinary Board of the AB. Prior to this, I had not realized the extensive timeframe involved, which often exceeded 45 days for committee deliberation alone. This does not even account for the additional time required for appeals. To address these issues, I collaborated with committee members, the current Committee, the JAG, and individuals who had gone through the process to establish clear and defined timelines. We have now set maximum time limits for the process, ensuring efficiency if disciplinary action becomes necessary. Furthermore, it was universally agreed upon within the AB that a member should not have to appeal a decision to the same body that made the initial ruling. To rectify this, the AB serves as the final appellate body for disciplinary matters. The EC retains jurisdiction as the "first line" of review, with subsequent appeals directed to the Disciplinary Board and ultimately to the AB. If expulsion is recommended at any point, the matter immediately comes before the AB, as the decision becomes final upon expulsion. We hope that the visual flowchart provided in the MHB will enhance understanding of the intended process.

Auxiliary Services - Section 11 To better align with the intended purpose of these entities, Jeremy Carsten, as the DAS, prefers them to be referred to as "Services" rather than "Departments." This adjustment reflects their role in fulfilling member service needs. Additionally, we have clarified the process through which

an "Unofficial Group" progresses to become an "Established Service," providing a clear delineation of the various štages involved.

Automatic/Brevet Promotions

This adjustment aims to ensure consistency across positions. Previously, the EC offices were automatically promoted to Commodore, while the AB did not follow a similar progression. Additionally, the various SFAS did not receive any promotions, resulting in cases where Lieutenant Junior Ğrade officers were leading entire Services. To rectify this misalignment, we have synchronized the AB with the EC by aligning them with the rank of Commodore, which is an actual Admiralty rank. Furthermore, the position of Fleet Captain has been designated as an automatic promotion for leaders of Fleet Services. Although it may seem peculiar for individuals to vote on positions they currently hold, this adjustment is a one-time occurrence that will streamline future processes and garner favor among members.

After arriving in London, David took the train up through England into Scotland's historic capital city, Edinburgh. This ride was just over 400 miles for the first leg of his Region 20 tour.

The USS Alba was delighted to have the honour of hosting the first leg of the visit. Alba's CO, RADM Eilidh Montgomery, met FADM Nottage from the train at Waverley Station. I joined them that evening for dinner at The Doric; a pub built in the 17th Century and renowned for its selection of single malt Scotch Whiskies. We enjoyed the chance to introduce the CS to traditional Scottish fare - a smooth, Aberlour single malt with a dinner of haggis, neeps and tatties.

The final stop of the Edinburgh visit was lunch at the Kenilworth Pub on Rose Street. There we were joined by LCDR John-James Smith. We enjoyed sole use of the atmospheric Sir Walter Scott Whisky Vault (you could smell the whisky as you walked in), for a tasty pub lunch (and more whisky). The Alba crew all greatly enjoyed the CS's visit to Edinburgh. It gave us all a real boost to feel so connected to the rest of SFI.

Accessibility – the Mission



Brief History

In November 2021 the Commandant, SFA asked for a few paragraphs of instructions on how to use a screen reader. We wrote the paragraphs, but soon learned we should also add ... a lot more.

"Hello, I'm Commander Cindy Ray; along with Captain Catherine Weeks we are the founders and Co-Chairs of what has become the Educational Services Accessibility Committee, or ESAC. We'd like to introduce you to the work we and our team do to increase accessibility awareness in STARFLEET. But first, let's continue with our Brief (but spectacular) History of: *Accessibility – the Mission.*"

Those few paragraphs turned into pages of instructions for various computer operating systems (OS), i.e., Microsoft Windows, macOS, Android, and Chrome. We also introduced separate screen readers and text-to-speech applications that can be found online, some 'open source' meaning they work with all OS and are generally free, and some paid versions.

Not stopping there, we started writing instructions on how to convert STARFLEET (SF) course manuals and exams as well as other SF documents into more accessibility-friendly formats using recommended accessibility guidelines. Our intent here is to reach out to those members needing more focused assistance than just the use of a screen reader.

Over the course of two and a half years, from that original small request, we've grown into what is now known as the Educational Services Accessibility Committee, or ESAC. The committee has two Co-Chairs and two other committee members. We are currently advertised in the Course Catalog (page 2), SF Facebook pages, the Communiqué. This year we will also have an office at the Virtual International Conference (VIC). We're also looking forward to having a more permanent online presence for easy access to accessibility information, training materials, tips, video's, FAQ's, and more.

Now, we have been officially tasked by the Educational Services Department to establish guidelines, develop instructions, and support essential personnel in STARFLEET Academy (SFA) and STARFLEET Marine Corps Academy (SFMCA). This support can be in the form of verbal or digital assistance converting manuals, exams, and other publications they manage into accessibly-friendly documents. In this way, the use of STARFLEET's Academics can be made available to as many members as possible.

Who do we support?

We support Deans, Directors, and those in the Acting-Dean and -Director's position within each SF Academy. We also support SFI and HQ Staff by request.

We assist Commanding Officers and their crewmembers; and, unaffiliated STARFLEET members by providing advice and recommendations on how they should proceed.

What do we do?

We create an accessibility-friendly version of existing exams and manuals. When the initial template is approved, we proceed to create up to three converted courses. The converted course files will be returned in MS-Word and PDF formats. A Dyslexic Version in MS-Word and PDF formats will be created for each course as well. The content in this version is exactly the same but is written with a Dyslexia-Friendly font and can be uploaded onto Moodle as well. The Accessibility Committee will also teach any authorized members such as college/school staff, BETA Testers or Ghost Writers how to convert existing courses or write new courses into the most efficient screen reader format possible.

How do we do it?

By using recognized accessibility guidelines, the documents are converted into a more accessibly-friendly version for screen readers. Some methods we use are: specific font face and size, alignment of text, styles, text and image color analyzing for our CVD (Color Vision Deficient) members. We also use: specific line spacing, the use of (or not of) emboldened text, spelling corrections, grammar, and punctuation.

After the documents are complete, they are read with the built-in screen readers in MS-Word and Adobe. The final step uses an accessibility checker to insure as many issues as possible have been removed and screen readers are able to read continually from beginning to end without interruption.

Members may also contact the Accessibility Committee for assistance on how they should proceed.

It is recommended that affiliated members enlist the support of their Commanding Officer who may also provide further assistance.

Important Note: If you are making a request on behalf of a STARFLEET member you must be duly authorized and have the permission of said member. Please also follow SFDPP protocol and DO NOT send any PII information such as full names, ship names, medical conditions, disabilities, SCC number, or any other personal information that can be associated with or combined together to form a trackable situation.



Starfleet Alberta Launches USS Wildrose With Pride





Calgary, AB. May 5, 2023

Alberta, Canada, long known for its rich oil and ranching history, has joined the Final Frontier with Pride amid the official commissioning of the USS Wildrose NCC 74704 now on patrol in Region 10.

Under the command of CAPT. Dyre Scheer-Peters, the Wildrose is the first inclusive Starfleet vessel in the province to dually embrace the Pride mission of the LGTBQIA community and Gene Roddenberry's vision of IDIC - Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations.

The new ship officially completed her shakedown cruise earlier this year. It held its commissioning dinner at a Calgary restaurant joined by guests from other Starfleet Alberta vessels, friends, and STARFLEET International commanders via video link.

LtCol Alistair Jardine, First Officer, embraced the new Starfleet Alberta squadron in prepared remarks.

"As commissioning draws ever closer, I've taken to reflecting," Jardine said, "I was a bit worried about two SFI chapters in a city the size of Calgary There was no need to worry; the USS Wildrose was embraced by the USS Chinook crew. We have had several successful joint events and are planning more," Jardine added.

Reflecting the Wildrose's mission of diversity and Pride, MAJ Jardine stressed that Wildrose's energy is infectious.

"The main goal of the USS Wildrose is and always will be inclusiveness. We don't care about skin color, sexuality, gender, or even disability status," he said. "All are welcome on our ship."

One of the mission parameters is joining official Pride festivities throughout Alberta, including Calgary's Pride parade and festival. "As a gay Star Trek fan, I have never seen STARFLEET represented in a Pride parade In Canada. It will be nice to change that."

Scheer-Peters, speaking to the CBC in covering its debut appearance at the annual Parade of Wonders for the Calgary Expo comic and entertainment convention, also highlighted the new profile.

"There's a connection that these strangers - we can just go up to and go,' Hey I like that' or we just pick up conversations from a year prior," he told the CBC in an interview for its website.

COMM Derek France, Regional Coordinator, extended his congratulations to the *Wildrose*, personally pinning Captain's pips to the new skipper's collar at the commissioning.

Tipping a beer in a toast, France quoted an old Naval proverb: "May you have Fair Winds and Following Seas.'

France also noted the commissioning of ships is a welcome occasion for any fleet, dating back to, "fleets going to sea in wooden ships crewed with iron men."

He then read out the orders commanding Wildrose to take its station on patrol.

Compliments were also paid by the commanders of the Chinook, CAPT. James McGuire; the USS Cerberus NCC-63711, CAPT Jeromy Estell; and the OIC of SFMC 10th Brigade, COL Richard Steele.

ADM Paul Reid, former Vice-Commander of STARFLEET international, a special guest at the proceedings, was very impressed to see the growth of Starfleet in Alberta. Reid remarked, "this is the first time that five ships have been in one gathering.'

the Communications Department continues to support the vital missions of STARFLEET through multiple avenues of communication, including social media services, production of The Communique', newsletter recognition, document formatting assistance, and direct email to all members.

Communication Specialist CAPT Gerhard Pretorius, Director of Publicity, Documents & Manuals, has provided valuable assistance in formatting the Command Status Reports and the new Membership Handbook. Gerhard has also been organizing all the newsletter award nominations and getting those to the panels of judges. He does the work of lay-out for the CQ and the new Strange New Words fiction publication. We greatly appreciate his work in making documents "look good."

Work on The Communique' never stops! No sooner has one issue been delivered than we are working on the next. Good progress was made in updating the CQ with the last issue, as well as increasing readership significantly. We hope to continue improvements with each issue. New CQ Editor LTJG Justin Hunt is working diligently to learn the method we use to produce the CQ and is bringing some new ideas to implement as we move forward. Be looking for the request for fan art soon. The first photo contest was fun and successful. The photo contest for this issue had more entries than the first, and we expect participation to

increase each time. The first survey or poll in the Mailchimp did not work as we had hoped, so a different application is being used for this issue. We realize that posting chapter event pictures on Facebook is easy and quick, but don't forget that the CQ wants news of chapter events with pictures too.

The use of Mailchimp to deliver CQ #214 was highly successful. The data shows that this service is very beneficial in reaching the vast majority of members. Efforts are being made to correct email addresses that were missing or incorrect in the database. Any member that did not receive the email should check their spam or promotions folder, and make sure that a valid and current email address is in the database. A new list from the database was used for CQ #215 that would include corrections and new members. Mailchimp Director VADM Trisha Tunis has also sent out the first notice for VIC registration with the information provided by the VIC Committee. This is another great usage for the Mailchimp plan that STARFLEET has purchased.

The STARFLEET group of boards on Pinterest is one of the social media outlets that members can utilize for a variety of purposes. COMM Michael Lewis is the site director and has 30 boards (interest areas) available in a wide range of topics. Additional "pins" are welcomed and encouraged to make the site a useful repository of pictures and information for members, although you do not have to be a member of STARFLEET to join. At present there are 30 boards that had 1501 followers last month. The audience for May was over two

thousand. The largest group of users are presently from the United States, but followers are from numerous other countries as well. Users are about equally divided between male and female, and about 60% of users are in the age range of 18-34. The most visited boards were "News from Around the Planet," "Science Related Events by Region," and "Chapters by Region (1-7)." Michael has written an article for this CQ about the Pinterest group, so be sure to check that out and learn more about this social media outlet that could be beneficial for many.

There is nothing new to report on the other social media services, but they continue to be administered by a dedicated team. They are working on new ways to report usage and progress. One new member of the team should be joining these efforts shortly.

Be sure to check out the new fiction supplement to the CQ, *Strange New Words*. We're excited to enable more of our fiction writers to showcase their works to the membership. Having a competition allows us to further recognize their creativity. We plan for this to be a twice-yearly publication and encourage you to enter your writing for the next edition at year's end

Updates to the START Manual

VADM Steven Bowers Chief of Shakedown Operations, SCC 52370



The START Manual has been the bible of Shakedown Operations since it was first introduced in 1993.

Over time, updates have been made as procedures and processes changed. Right now, I am working on a major update to the manual, and I wanted to share some of the changes here.

Besides correcting any spelling or grammar issues, I have made a number of changes that I hope will make the Manual easier to use.

I've added an Update Log before the Table of Contents. This way, people can see right away what sections or chapters have been updated and when. It is a quick way to see what changes have been made without having to go through the entire document to find them. Also, I have tried to highlight those changes, so they stand out in the manual.

After discussions with the Chief of Operations, I modified the requirements for the CO and XO of a new chapter. The CO is required to have OTS, OCC, as well as

SFDPP 101 and 102. The CO may also need any recertifications of SFDPP, depending on when SFDPP 101 and 102 were taken and passed. The XO is required to have OTS, both SFDPP courses as well as any recertifications. The XO must also take and pass OCC within 60 days of the chapter being launched.

There were several references of having to snail mail documents to SHOC as well as DTS to get a chapter launched. Since most of us do have email, I updated them to say that if you must use snail mail to contact the appropriate area to get the mailing address.

Over the years there were two types of chapters: meeting and correspondence. To us, a chapter is a chapter is a chapter is a chapter. If you are having regular communications, how you do that, either in person or over Zoom, that is your call.

With the help of Kimberly Donahue, we have updated the MSR Online Tool section. Some of the dates were over 10 years old. The screenshots needed to be updated as well.

The section on the Academy has been updated with the assistance of Jill Rayburn. The links have been updated

as well as the procedure for some of the required courses.


We also updated the Accelerated Shakedown Program (ASP). The minimum time for shakedown is now 6 months. We have also reduced the time that can be deducted from the shakedown time based on characteristics which a group may already possess that the Program is designed to help develop. Each characteristic now deducts one week.

I cleaned up the notes page after each section so you can use them to take notes. I also standardized the monthly checklist so you can check items off as you complete them. This way you can keep track of where you are in the process.



Recognition Director asked how to manage PII with this request; CMS will talk to CS about this. In the interim, a line requesting permission to share the award/promotion publicly will be added to the nomination forms for OOM, Promotions and Annual Awards (AA).

- The Commanding Officer of the Year nominees must be verified that OTS, OCC, SFDPP 101, SFDPP 102, and the current SFDPP yearly course have all been taken to be eligible.
- CS would like to resume sending the light up trophies for the Annual Award winners.
- The Chapter Legacy awards are going to be resumed. These awards mark chapter anniversaries and milestones. They are sent out once a year, around the time the IC is held.
- A new award, Member Legacy awards, is being considered. These will mark member anniversaries and milestones. They will be sent out once a year, around the time the IC is held.
- A new certificate, Posthumous Memoriam, is also being considered. This certificate would be sent to the chapter of a member who has passed.

The Information Services Department remains actively engaged in fulfilling its demanding workload, steadily advancing both our routine duties and our long-term endeavors. We are pleased to provide the most recent updates and advancements achieved across multiple projects and initiatives within our InfoServ Department:

Logo Updates:

We have successfully updated all the EC logos to the new Brand versions, as well as the Aux department logos.

Web Awards:

The new Web Awards have been released for RCs to nominate up to 5 regional chapters. This initiative aims to recognize and appreciate outstanding web design and functionality within our organization.

Decommissioned Chapter Member Transfers:

We provided assistance to Ops in transferring decommissioned chapter members. This process ensures smooth transitions and effective management of our member database.

SFI Email and Vanity Email Jobs:

Our team has been actively working on a number of SFI email and vanity email jobs. This effort helps improve communication and branding consistency across our platforms.

SFA Grade Imports:

We have started importing the SFA grades from the blackout period to InfoServ. The majority of grades have been successfully imported, with only one remaining.

Progress on the New QM Site:

Significant progress has been made on the development of the new QM site, which aims to amalgamate all QM stores into one platform. We anticipate having this site online very soon.

This is the Chief of Educational Services coming to you.

Educational Services has been working with the Data Protection Office, the Chief of Informational Services, and the Chief of Membership Services on preparing for the next iteration of the SFDPP exam. It has been determined that the next exam will come out and be ready to be taken by 1 January 2024. The DPO has placed information about this on the Facebook pages as I have been typing this.

The Deputy Chief of Educational Services has pulled an all-nighter looking into the permissions for the academies to make sure they matched with who we have on staff. She has put in for those not on staff to have the permissions removed. At this time, we believe we have the correct people with the correct permissions on staff.

I am impressed with the two academies as any issues are getting handled before they fall to my desk. I want to personally and publicly give them a big shout out. Hip Hip Hooray. As some may have noticed, we are importing grades from the blackout period again. This is a slow and tedious process so please be patient. Once all are imported, then we will ask to have members verify.



On the STARFLEET Academy side below are the comments:

May was a very good month for SFA, with almost 200 individual students completing just over 1975 courses. I know that some of this was due to the Tribble Containment Specialist training that was being conducted by DERP and Petfleet, as well as the Petfleet challenge for taking certain animal-related courses. The number of completions for the month for the Tribble course

was 43, and the number of courses taken in the College of Veterinary Medicine was 82. We love these special challenges and events, and are willing to help and support any group that wants to do one.

We have some good news with regard to the missing grades from the blackout period. The grades from the (former) Institute of Cadet Studies have all been entered, as well as the grades from the Institute of Public Safety and Survival (formerly the Institute of Police, Fire, and Rescue). Please contact the appropriate college Director if you believe there are any omissions or errors (please direct problems with Cadet Studies grades to the SFA Commandant). The rest of the missing grades will be imported soon. We want to thank everyone again for your patience.

We are in the process of adding some new staff to our roster, and I want to thank everyone who applied for our recent openings. We have some schools that are expanding, some that are changing, and some that have been closed that will be reopening soon.

I wanted to highlight one recent revival, the College of Military Movies. In May, 72 courses were taken in that college, which is wonderful given that it was closed a few years ago for lack of interest. Unfortunately, the courses are not yet automated, but we are working to get that done, and the plan is that once the current ones are finished, the college will expand, and those should all be automated when they open. The college currently has 28 courses, and the John Wayne military movies are in the process of relocating to that college as well. The college staff has plans for a great many more movies, so be sure to keep an eye on that college.

Another college that will hopefully be revived soon is the College of Chemistry. This is one of the things that SFA is doing to help support the SFMC and SFMCA, as these courses will be used in the MOS qualifications for various jobs. The SFA and SFMCA are working closely to add those SFA courses that will be meaningful to the MOS project, and the folks at SFMCA are working very hard to revise and expand in that area.





TREK TECH

The Universal Translator,

It is nice to have bits and pieces of the different tongues thrown in, especially when Garak has something unpleasant to say or you hear a Vulcan prayer.


The UT has been used since TOS times, but the first use comes before that. We can see it used in ENT by Communications Specialist, Hoshi Sato. Ensign Sato joined the *Enterprise* NX-01 because they assumed (correctly of course) that they would need someone who could

understand different languages and learn to speak them as quickly as possible. With the help of the ship's computer, she could understand the syntax behind different species' communications.

She created a handheld device that could translate the main languages that were spoken by the known species in real time. This helped the first inter-species conferences eventually led to the formation of The United Federation of Planets.



As time went on the Universal Translators changed many times, some smaller, some larger. Captain Kirk used a large handheld UT on many away missions, while on *Discovery* it turned out Section 31 had already developed smaller ones that could be integrated into their uniform delta badges.



By the time of *TNG*, the translator was included into every comm badge. It had also been so refined that it could complete most translations near instantaneously, even with new species. The universal translator had its flaws, however. For example, when Captain Picard met the Tamarians. Their different syntax, using past experiences from themselves and figures from their history, meant that we had to go back the age of old way of person-to-person communication. Using gestures and expressions to come to an understanding. And of course, all species had their

own version of the UT, just like the Ferengi with one implanted right into their head. Useful for a species that relied on trade with other species and cultures.

The translators we use in our lives today were created so that we could speak to one another, communicate with people that we couldn't normally speak to. They have helped us avert wars, helped us to become closer to people from completely different countries. Whether or not they were inspired by *Star Trek*, they are helping us to imagine a world just like the one shown in Roddenberry's dream. A world where, even though we are different, we come together as one for a better place.

Next time on Trek Tech, we are going to be looking at gravity. From artificial

gravity on the ships and stations to anti-gravity devices used day to day, everywhere in the *Star Trek* universe.

On April 4, 2023,

the USS *Mountaineer* joined the ships of the line, commissioned NCC-325306. She is located in Charleston, WV, and is part of Region One, "The First Fleet."

The Mountaineer is a 32nd century model Large Exploratory Cruiser of the Crossfield class. She is under the command of FCAPT Mary Francen (CO) and CMDR Stephen Richard (XO). She was built on Stardate 2022.08.24, launched on Stardate 2022.10.04, and received her commission on Stardate 2023.04.04 with the motto, "To Go Boldly Where the Mountaineers Are Always Free."

The NCC-325306 is a partaker of a mighty heritage, taking its name in honor of the USS West Virginia (AKA: "Mountaineer Battlewagon"). Her namesake's history is a valiant one, filled with dignified service. After being refloated following the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor, the rebuilt Colorado class battleship went on to serve bravely. She saw action in the Battles of Leyte, Surigao Strait, Mindoro, Lingayen Gulf, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. Her last activity before being deactivated in 1946 was to transport US troops from Hawaii to the mainland in Operation Magic Carpet.

ADM Bob Vosseller, Commanding Officer of the *Mountaineer's* support chapter, Region Seven's USS *Challenger* (NCC-1676-D), had this to say:

"I've lost count on just how many ships have shuttled off the USS Challenger over our 35-year history. Granted these days we are considered their support ship and the chapters to be aren't referred to as shuttlecraft these days but chapters in training taking their nine- or six-month cruise. The USS Mountaineer may well be our first chapter that we've mentored that is not a member of our region. The core members, especially Dave Singleton and Mary Francen, are long time senior members of the USS Challenger. It was wonderful to see them, along with Stephen and Shyann, taking lead roles in the formation and now commissioned chapter in R1. I had urged them to form a ship of STARFLEET awhile back, but between adjusting to a new location and the pandemic, it took some time to get things going. Once it did, it moved at warp speed, and despite their being in a rather isolated area in so far as population goes, they attracted fellow fans that they recruited and quickly reached out to their closest neighbors in the "First Fleet".

They proposed a region wide goal of collecting toys for this coming holiday season extending it to a challenge to their former region as well. They received a regional award and are looking to the future.

They also reached their closest neighbors in Region 7 as well, the USS *Stella Pirata* in Pittsburgh, Pa. I look forward to following the adventures of this particular chapter,

as its roots are strong with the *Challenger*. While they no longer need our mentorship, they will certainly get it if necessary and I know they will have many good times to come.

As of the time of this article, STARFLEET, the International Star Trek Fan Association, Inc. has 1500 followers and 4500 monthly views. As impressive as that is, there are still many who are unaware of STARFLEET's presence on Pinterest. So, here's an overview of what's going on there.

The SFI Pinterest account has several

boards to help keep things in good order and to aid users find what they enjoy. The main board has a little bit of everything from tribbles to stem bolts and beyond. It is a great board for STARFLEET members or any fan of Star Trek. But the content doesn't stop there, not by a long shot. STARFLEET's boards have much more to offer members and fans alike. Some boards are perfect for fans, such as, "56th Anniversary of Star Trek", which is focused on Star Trek: The Original Series, or "We Live for This Stuff" for those who have an affinity for Star Trek: The Next Generation. If aliens and "Cowboy Diplomacy" are what brought you to Trek, then "From the Journey to Babel to Where No One Has Gone Before" could just be the board for you. If the out of universe aspects of *Trek* are your flavor of fandom, we have you covered there too. Should you enjoy following Star Trek actors, "<u>News from Around the Planet"</u> is well worth checking out. Even the actors' pets get their time to shine on the "Pets" board. And should the unfortunate happen, and a Trek personality pass on, they will be remembered on the "In Memoriam" board. Cosplay and fitness also play big roles in the lives of Trekkies, and both have representation here. If you are on the lookout for resources or inspiration for your next Trek themed costume, both can be found on the "<u>Let's Go Shopping</u>" board. Bicycling is a great way to get or stay fit and as fans, we do love to represent. The board, "Bicycle" can help you find what you need to cycle in style.

Additionally, there are boards that focus on topics more tangentially associated with Trek. "Incoming/Outgoing Spacecraft Near Earth contains pins about real life space travel. The science of forensics also has a presence on "Doctor Leonard McCoy's Postmortem Analysis". And since the study of whales is such a major point in The Voyage Home, "Calling Dr. Gillian Taylor" is a board dedicated to humpbacks. But there's more to Star Trek than just the sciences; music and the arts have often been depicted in Star Trek, and "Music Aboard Ship" is composed of music related pins. Shakespeare's contribution to the franchise is celebrated on "<u>The Bard-</u> <u>Shakespeare</u>". The artistic celebration of the fandom is also represented on Pinterest with "Fandom Crafts". However, even more prevalent in Trek than the arts, is another fun topic, weather in space. Yes, space has its own weather, and it has been a plot point in many episodes. Even our very own sun can have fluctuations in its brightness, and if you find Coronal Mass Ejections interesting, you can find out about recent ones in "Space Weather Forecast".

The boards mentioned above are all great for the fandom on the whole, but there are a number of boards that are more of interest to the members that make up this great organization of ours. STARFLEET Academy has a board of its own, as does PETFLEET. Because humpbacks shouldn't be the only critters in the Spot-light. There are also boards broken down to represent the different chapters by region. These are intentionally easy to find and are named "Chapter's by Region" followed by the region numbers contained in parentheses. The Reason We Celebrate

Recipe: Twice Baked Taters by DOIC 1st BDE SFMC Dona Rozelle



Ingredients:

2 medium-to-large sized Russet Potatoes

1 tablespoon butter and

4 teaspoons butter

1/4 cup heavy whipping cream

1/4 cup shredded cheese

½ cup bacon, crumbled or bits (optional)

Pinch of salt

Directions:

(adjust for high altitude or C ovens)

Rinse and clean the two potatoes in water, then use a fork to pierce the skins several times on each side. Coat the two potatoes with ½ tablespoon of butter each, then place them on the center rack of an oven preheated to 400F for 1 hour. Make sure to place an oven tray under the potatoes to catch drippings from the melting butter. When they are done, let the potatoes cool for thirty minutes.

When the potatoes are cool, cut them in half lengthwise. Use a tablespoon to carefully scoop out most of the meat of the potato out of each of your four half potatoes, down to a small layer of potato left inside the skin to keep the potato skin formed. You should not see any skin inside the potato half. Reserve the potato skins, you'll stuff the mixture back into the skins later.

Place the meat of the potatoes inside a medium bowl, adding the rest of the butter, the heavy whipping cream, the shredded cheese (I like to use shredded mozzarella), and the optional bacon bits (crumbled bacon). If you do not USE THE BACON, ADD THE SALT now. Use a potato masher to smash the ingredients together, then when you're tired of mashing them, mash and stir them a little more with the tablespoon used on the potatoes earlier. Carefully and evenly use the spoon to re-fill the potato skins with the mixture, pressing the mixture into the skins carefully. Once the skins are filled to the rim, if you have a little left over, mound them by evenly distributing them all with the remaining mixture.

If you want to immediately consume them, turn the oven to 375F, and put them on a baking tray and place them in the oven for 15 minutes, then broil them on the top rack for 5 minutes for crispy top!

To store: If you have extra halves (you only want one potato half, or you want to eat them later), wrap each half separately and place them in the freezer to store if you are not serving them within a few days. Place the cooled stuffed potatoes on aluminum foil and wrap them tightly by folding the foil longways over the potato half and rolling the foil down, then folding each end up, then rolling each end tightly.

If frozen: When ready to serve them, set the oven to 375 degrees F, and place each half you want to serve onto an oven tray, keeping them in the aluminum foil, but loosening the foil up a bit. Heat them for 25 minutes, then carefully take them out of the foil since they are HOT, and place them back on the oven tray. Put them under the broiler for 5 minutes to crisp the tops of the potatoes.

REPORT: SFMC COMMANDANT

..and the SFMC isn't immune. Because of the retirement of Mark Anderson in InfoCom, the General Staff has had to make personnel adjustments. Jeremy Carsten has moved from ForceCom to InfoCom. His first project he has been tasked with is fixing the forms for both Awards and Unit Reporting. These have been the source of much frustration over the years; from staff not receiving submissions, to being too hard to parse out data. Carsten will be bringing his expertise with Google Forms to create some new processes which will help the staff better respond to your needs. Meanwhile, David Ferber has moved up to COForceCom and will be interacting with Brigade leadership as their point of contact.

By the time you read this, the SFMC will have completed its first in-depth SFDPP audit of Brigade and Unit OICs and DOICs. I'm disappointed to report there were a number of them not in compliance with this mandatory policy. To better facilitate adherence to it, the Starfleet Marine Corps has added two compliance officers who will work under the Deputy Commandant's office and liaison with the SFI Data Protection Team. Please welcome David Priest and Jason Smith as the SFMC's Compliance Officer and Deputy Compliance Officer, respectfully. These officers will also be responsible for maintaining heraldry information. They will be performing

periodic audits, following up with those that have not taken the exams, and relaying when the new recertification exams are available in January.

In addition to being the Commandant's right-hand man, the DepDant has been eyeing the Strange New Worlds monster maroon uniforms. These are now available in black and easily converted for use in the SFMC. A recommended vendor which I have ordered from is *Cosermart*.

ForceCom has been very active. In addition to the SFDPP tasks reactivating 6th Brigade, and the reports cycle, ForceCom is taking up the oh-so-fun process of clearing out the significant backlog of awards that need to be entered into the database. Previously, this wasn't a high priority, and they were not consistently keyed in. The prevailing wisdom of the time was, "the database could fall apart any minute and we were getting a new one anyway, so we didn't want to spend the time." I've reviewed the list and from my evaluation they've been piling up since 2021 or so. Last December, we processed what we thought was the majority of these outstanding records. However, upon a second review, there are still several hundred awaiting processing into the database. After discussing it with the Information Systems team and my staff, we're in agreement that it's in everyone's best interest to make sure everyone's membership record accurately reflects their achievements.

Just so you're aware of how we're updating these records, the method we're following is checking each person's awards record to see if an instance of that award has already

been entered for that date, and if not, then it's entered. This is to avoid duplicates of existing awards. This will be time-consuming, but we've divided the work up into lots. That should make it easier to keep track and maintain the momentum.

The certificates for these accomplishments have already been distributed to the award winners. If you are missing any, please contact Major General Eric Johannson. His email is sfmcforcecom-award@sfi.org.

Speaking of awards, brigades should have submitted their Valor Awards to headquarters by now, in preparation of the Corps level awards.

Another exciting announcement is the return of the Reading Challenge! LGN Jari "Gato" James, the DCO-FORCECOM-Ops will be leading the charge. For more information, refer to the Facebook post in STARFLEET Members Only. The winning Units and BDEs will receive the right to add a Reading Challenge streamer to their guidon. REPORT: DEPARTMET OF TECHNICAL SERVICES

Greetings! Here's the DTS report for 12305:

DTS had a slightly quieter month in May, though all three offices have remained active and there's still been some chapter activity as well. Two new vessel reservation requests were received, both for established classes. One class change was processed, but no new classes were added and no new shuttlecraft were reserved. On the departmental offices side, ASDB had a relatively quiet month in May, but continued work on the Ouroboros-class fightercraft and did more work on the design guery for a Region 20 group, which is moving toward proposing a new class of ship.

OTI had a couple of direct inquiries. one dealing with the class of the USS West Virginia, and another about the States-class assault cruiser. OTI also continued work on Lost Era shuttlecraft and the expansion of the Office's collection of vessel and station silhouettes for use in publications or for other graphical needs. In OSA, CAPT Gerhard Pretorius has contributed several design drawings already, though he had to take a break to work on the Membership Handbook. He has been outstanding as an artist, but we recognize that he is very much in demand, and also continue to search for additional persons to take postings in that office.

ASDB:

CAPT Scott Melrose reports that it has still been a moderately slow period at the Bureau, but they are attending to a couple of items. Scott is always keeping in touch with all of his team members, and has been working with Stephen Lynch in STARFLEET Region 20 on an STO kitbash project which is turning into a design proposal for a new chapter for the developing USS Hibernia. The kitbash, for the proposed O'Brien-class escort scout, will come from components of the Valiant, Defiant, and Sao Palao-class escort scouts. A full write-up for the design proposal is currently being worked on and will be reviewed as soon as possible.

Work still continues on the current *Ouroboros*-class fightercraft for the USS *Avenger's* fightercraft wing. With most of the background work done, one of the staffers, Liam Smith, and Scott are currently working on the schematics on the craft in a lot of Instant Messaging...bit of a time difference between Region 7 and Region 11, by some 15 hours. They expect to have some new renderings and much more done by next month.

OTI:

In May, OTI responded to an inquiry regarding the vessel type of the old USS West Virginia chapter. OTI also did some research to respond to an inquiry regarding adopting the States-class assault cruiser for STARFLEET. There is quite a bit of detailed information on the class out

there, but what it would need for adoption is a group willing to use it. Ray Anders has been so advised, so we'll see if anyone comes forward wanting to adopt it for their chapter. The ship class research is continuing on the Dauntless- and Protostar-classes from "Prodigy". though it is likely at this point that we may await the release of Season 2 of the show for more data. OTI's research on Lost Era shuttlecraft designs, in support of developing the embarked craft load-out for CH 12060 USS Avenger took some good steps forward this month, especially in the realm of beginning the artwork (see OSA below).

Work also continues on the expansion of the Office's collection of starship silhouette graphics, for use in upcoming publications as needed.

OSA - Schematic Artist:

The two applicants who seemed ill-suited for this role were not heard from again, but CAPT Gerhard Pretorius has been exceptional. He's fast, creative, and accurate in his work! Since joining the staff, he has provided drawings of the Administrator-class space station (both FASA's original design and a version of his own), and some design concepts for the Agilis-class perimeter action ship, which sparked a discussion among the creator of the class for the book Ships of the Star Fleet and a design partner of his from years back who had drawn a bit of art for this ship, as to what it should correctly look like. He has also been commissioned by yours truly to do drawings of the Weyland-type shuttlecraft for the Avenger, and was in the midst of those when called to work on the new membership handbook. I know that Gerhard is extremely busy and in demand, and appreciate very much the work he is already doing for DTS. Meanwhile, though, we still continue to search for personnel to fill positions in this office, so the load is not entirely on Gerhard.

The quiz in this article is a fun little exercise that comes from The Katherine Johnson's Operations Department. The quiz is about developing your Emotional Intelligence (EQ) in order to improve your own leadership effectiveness.

A little background on Emotional Intelligence (EQ).

EQ is a hidden aspect of your personality, like the part of an iceberg that's underwater. It's foundational to your life and one key to success in personal relationships (so important for teamwork and leadership). Surprisingly, research has shown that EQ's actually more important to your overall effectiveness than your Intellectual Capacities (IQ).

When it comes to leaders, studies show that 90% of their success is attributed to EQ. It's all the more important that in Starfleet there is little variation in intellectual capacities between professionals. As an example, both Jellico and Picard are very intelligent, but have a huge variance in EQ. People with high EQ tend to have great self-confidence, are more realistic about themselves (selfaware), and have greater self-mastery. Contrast the effectiveness of Captain Edward Jellico (low EQ) with Captain Jean-Luc Picard (high EQ). The great thing about EQ is that it can be improved if we work on it. This Emotional Intelligence Quiz, developed by psychologist Bill Gaultiere, was inspired by Daniel Goleman's research. Emotional Intelligence, as described by Goleman, involves five competencies (or components):

Self-Awareness

Questions 1-3 - the capacity to recognize and understand emotions and to have a sense of how one's actions, moods and the emotions of others take effect.

Self-Regulation

Questions 4-6 – the ability to be calm in the face of adversity (managing conflict), which involves the appropriate expression of emotion, and understanding how one's actions affect others.

Social Skills

Questions 13-15 – the ability to interact well with other people (i.e., some social skills: active listening, verbal communication, nonverbal communication, leadership, and developing rapport).

Empathy

Questions 10-12 – the ability to understand how other people are feeling and to relate to them by seeing issues from all perspectives and to

make objective decisions. (Empathy defuses bias.)

Motivation

Questions 7-9 - the inner force that drives a person to put in the effort required to meet personal needs and goals (including the need to improve), rather than being motivated by external rewards such as money, fame, and recognition.
